Photo album now in stores

The RPM Starline Photo album is now available in the record stores where RPM is sold each week. This annual, published by RPM, features photos of Canada's top stars, and sells for 25 cents a copy. Record stores have already reported sellouts and have re-ordered. By the end of January, RPM hopes to have circulated 10,000 copies of the Photo Album.

The success of the Photo Album further emphasizes the great interest that exists in Canadian talent by the general public.

Many radio stations have ordered the Photo Album as a promotion giveaway.

CBC 'Festival'

On January 6 at 7:30 PM EST, the CBC radio network will begin their presentation of 27 contestants who successfully auditioned for their "Talent Festival". The competitors were chosen from over 200 who entered the auditions which began last April and took place in major centres from St. John's Newfoundland to Vancouver B.C.

A panel of judges will listen to the broadcasts and begin the process of elimination and final selection of eight contestants who will compete for First Prize in the four categories of, voice, keyboard, string, and wind instruments. The Finals are to be broadcast on April 20.

Adjudicators are: conductor, Otto Werner-Mueller from Victoria, B.C.; violinist, Lorand Fenyves from Toronto; pianist Gilles Manny from Montreal, and tenor Leopold Simoneau, also from Montreal. The chairman of this panel is Sir Ernest MacMillan.

Contestants for January will be: Jan 6. Maurice Brown (Toronto) and Jack Krichaf (Toronto)-Jan 13. Carol Anne Curry (Kitchener) and Isabel Vila (Toronto)-Jan 20. Nancy Greenwood (Toronto) and William Mather (Toronto)-Jan 27. Jan Overduin (Fonthill, Ont.) and Garnet Brooks (Toronto).

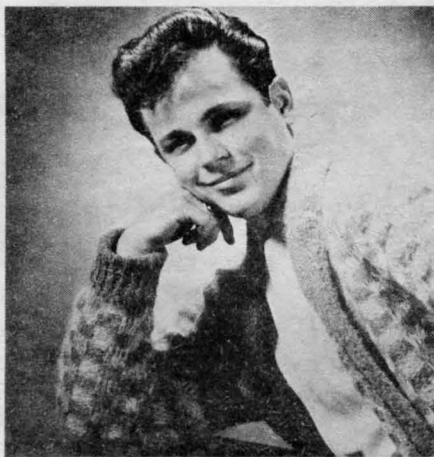
Who will the TOP stars be?

Each year, RPM Music Weekly conducts a poll among the people in the music industry to find the top stars of the year. For two years now the Annual RPM Awards have appeared in RPM to herald the accomplishments of the top artists and the people behind the scenes. In the January 30th edition of RPM we will publish the results of this poll. Meanwhile we would like to take a look at the winners from last year and the new faces that are in the running this year.

The official ballots have all been mailed and Canada's music men are now sitting over their ballots and scratching their heads. RPM leaves the voting to the people who work full time on making the music for you, the record buyer. The disc jockeys, the record company men, the entire music industry. Who will be the winners?

MALE VOCALISTS

Last year Bobby Curtola topped the male vocalist category. Barry Allen won hands down in the most promising category. The runners-up were David

Clayton Thomas, Robbie Lane, Ernie Lyons and Bobby Kris. At the present time the race between this group looks like a dead heat, but the poll will tell.

FEMALE VOCALISTS

In the female category, it was Catherine McKinnon who took top spot with Lynda Layne a close second. Calgary's Dianne James took third spot. This year Debbie Lori Kaye and Patrician Anne join the contenders. The category of top female vocalist is probably the one that will cause the most trouble for our voters. Girl singers just don't have the success on records that male vocalists and vocal groups have.

GROUP BATTLE

In the group battle, the Guess Who and Little Caesar and The Consuls were at the top. The Guess Who were chosen the top vocal instrumental group, and the Consuls took second place as well as winning the "Best Produced Single" award for "My Girl Sloopy". This will be the most competitive cate-

FOLK MUSIC

Gordon Lightfoot topped the folk singer poll last year, and with the success of his "Spin Spin" single

CANADIAN COUNTRY

The country favourites last year were Gary Buck and Diane Leigh. With an even stronger interest in our Country music this year, Penelope Pentelope (RPM's country columnist) felt the race would be a close one, and "with so much good talent, who knows?"

Who will the winners be? They will be the artists, musicians, and record people who have stood head and shoulders above the rest. Like every year there will be a number of surprises. The January 30th edition of RPM will tell the story.

The January 22 "Showcase" is also a two part program. Part one is "Northern Footlights" which includes a tour of Flin Flon and Churchill by pianist Alex Read, singer Elan Gibson, Ted Komar's orchestra and the famous pop group from Winnipeg, The Guess Who. The second part of the show "Laughing Up Broadway" written by Jerry Ross, features the Art Snider orchestra with singers Rita Howell, Jodi Paps, Jack Duffy, Harriet Cohen, Bob Francis and Wally Koster.

The January 29th. show is devoted entirely to Hoagy Carmichael, who also hosts the show, titled "There's More To Hoagy Carmichael than Stardust". Hoagy will sing many of his well known compositions such as "Rocking Chair", "Small Fry" and his latest "The White World Of Winter". Also doing some of the Carmichael tunes will be Margo McKinnon, Ralph Hill, Alan Mills, Sheila Graham, Ray Berthiaume and Fred Hill with the Art Phillips orchestra.

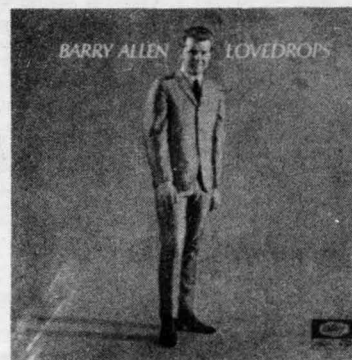

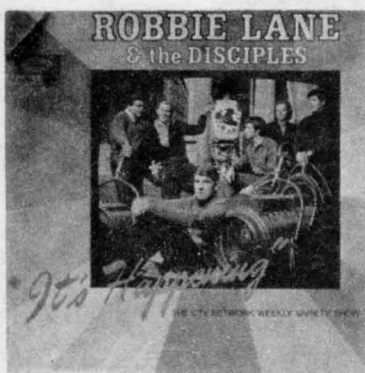

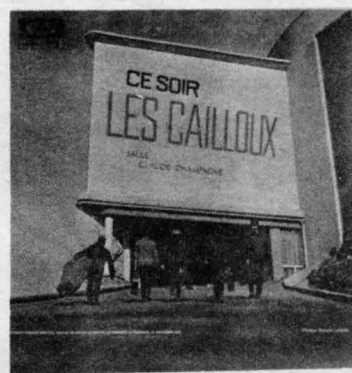

Sparton of Canada Ltd., has appointed Keith W. Archer as record salesman for Toronto and Eastern Ontario. Mr. Archer was born in Regina and graduated from Wetaskiwin High School in Edmonton. Prior to taking the Sparton appointment he was associated with Dunlop of Canada.

Knox Coupland advises that RCA Victor has terminated their agreement with Disneyland Records. The decision apparently came from Disney's top management in California. They have decided to become more involved in the record business on a world wide basis, with Disney reps doing the actual selling but Capitol Records will distribute.

Harold Winslow advises, from Quality, that copyright restrictions have been lifted for the international release of "Snoopy VS The Red Baron". Top seller from the Quality camp is "East West" by Herman's Hermits. "Nashville Cats" by the Lovin Spoonful has caught on quickly across the nation and is climbing most of the charts.

Carol Robbins sends news, from the National Music Store in Regina, that the Monkees LP is still selling very well and "Snoopy" is the record most people are asking for. Hot

sellers are "Believer" and "Single Girl" but Barry Allen's "Teddybears" and Hyland's "Run" are moving well. "Georgy Girl" by The Seekers and Ronnie Dove's "Cry" are also chalking up good sales.

From Janeen Marczak of Jeromes in the Lakehead, comes news that Ma & Pa's "Words" are by far the best selling item in the store. Sandy Posey looks good with her "Single Girl" as does the Chicago Loop's entry. The Yardbirds are also getting action with their "Happenings" and another Capitol single, "Georgy Girl" is showing action. The Four Seasons are showing good action with their "Rain" but pacing them well are The Raiders and their "Good Thing". Also from Janeen comes news that Fred King is back at CJLX after touring the nation with Myma Lorrie. Dick Wilson moves from CKPR over to CJLX.

The House of Sounds, in Kingston, is chalking up impressive sales for "Vibrations" and "Believer". "Cathedral" and "Blue Dress" are still hanging on to good sales. Nancy and Sandy are both doing well. Poppa Sinatra is also up with the winners. Steve Berofo notes that the Esquires' "Sins" is really doing business along with the Ducklings' "Just In Case". "Wheel of Hurt" could be a sleeper. "I Love My Dog" by Cat Stevens getting sales. Steve was enquiring about a group known as the Stormy Clovers

he recently saw on CBC-TV and wondered if they had a record release. (Ed: This group has been around for some time, cut several demo tapes, had a few bites from the U.S., but no wax action yet.)

The big single from Caravan Records is "If I Call You By Some Name" by The Paupers. Teledisc's "They Say" by Time 409 and New Syndrome's "Remorse" by Vancouver's Mike Campbell are showing action. Red Leaf's three entries "Heartbreak Hotel", "Tell Me" and "Love's Just A Broken Heart" are all catching some of the action. The Blues Project album "Projections" has been one of the big R&B sellers in Toronto town.

Up in the Top 5 at Ted's Records in Pointe Claire, Quebec, are "Believer", "Snoopy", "98.6", "Talk Talk" and "Sugar Town". The flip of the latter, "Summer Wine" is also making for sales. "Alaboudy Bam" by The Rabble is in the request stages. This is the first report to be received on this single and we don't have any label or distrib info. "Georgy Girl" and "Pushin' Too Hard" are moving into the better sellers category.

Donovan is the top singles seller at Columbia but "Yo-Yo" by Billy Joe Royal is making a strong bid to snatch it away from him.

The Hollies command the upper hand at Capitol but "Vibrations" isn't through yet. "Georgy Girl" and "Happenings" look like large ones.

Roy Smith reports from the Compo Company, that their first Big Wheel release will be "Standing On Guard" by The Falcons. Roy also writes "Gordon Lightfoot will hit on U.S. (I repeat, U.S.) charts with 'Go Go Round'. Hope you're still plugging Canadian talent."

Ringo shaved his beard, John let his hair grow again, George got rid of his mustache but Paul is staying with his furry upper lip.

LYNDA LAYNE heads for Toronto Jan. 5 to tape an "It's Happening" show which will be shown later on this month. Lynda is also set up for a "Music Hop" show, same month. Her Red Leaf single "Hang On To Me Now Baby" isn't setting the world on fire but it's sure moving in the right direction.

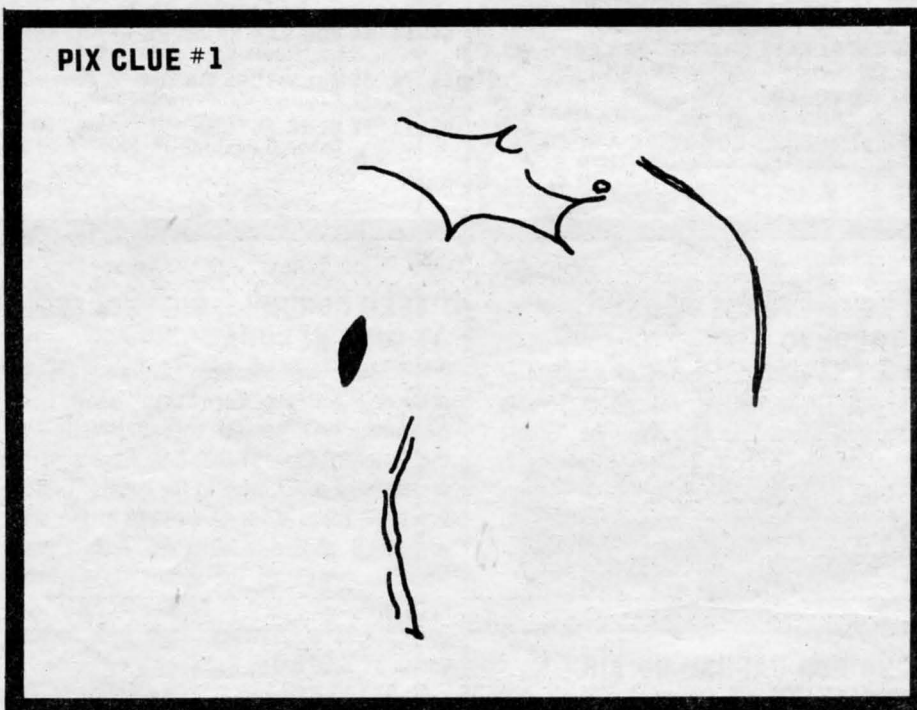

"I see the figure 6 7. I see it clearly. The crowds are milling around the figure 67. There is silence. I only hear the music from FAR FAR away. (Ellie: One FAR would do.)

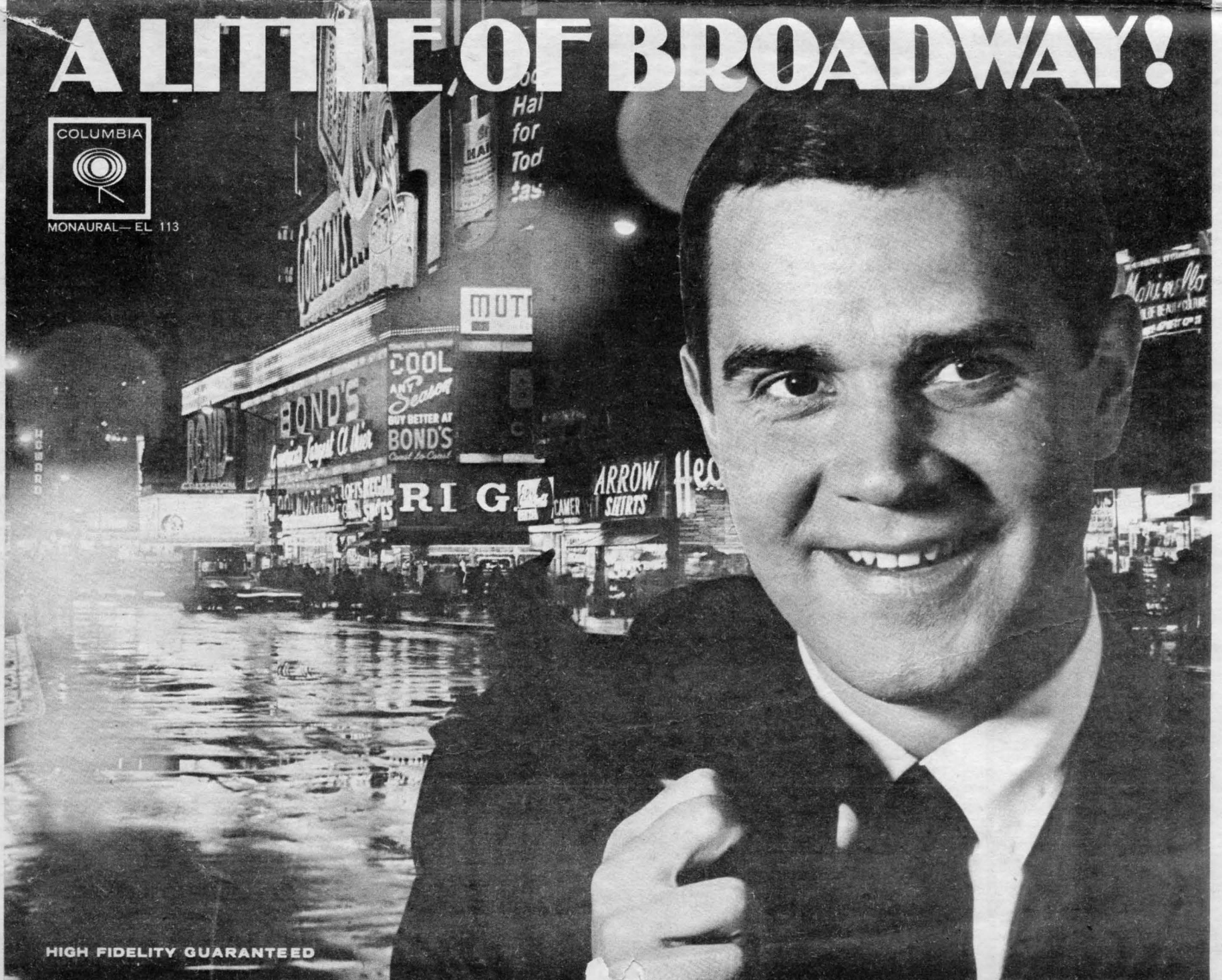
