This was one of the rare occasions when the Globetrotters lost a game. The visitors were playing the game while riding kid's tricycles, which were later turned over to charitable organizations for their Christmas

Another promotion, currently happening, is the "Make A DJ Pay" in which twice an hour listeners are invited to vote for the personality they would like most to take them on a Christmas Shopping Spree. Winner is chauffered around town in a Rolls Royce and given \$500.00 to blow on gifts etc.

With Grey Cup being the biggest attraction in Toronto for the year, CKFH took advantage of the ready made hysteria and hosted a Grey Cup a-go-go in Nathan Phillips Square (Nov 27). Emceeing the successful outing was morning man Don Don Daynard and Tom Fulton who holds down the highly rated late

afternoon show. The same crew caused a traffic jam the morning of the Grey Cup by setting up a curb-side kitchen outside the Union Station. York's Bitter End, has found past associations with Canadian talent to his liking because of their obvious popularity with college audiences.

Talent getting the once over by Miss Lippus included: Toronto's Magic Cycle, St. Catharine's Kidds, the Sirocco Singers from Montreal, Major Hooples Boarding House from Kitchener, Ginni Grant, Cal Winzey and many others.

HOOVER RELEASES ON WB

Vancouver: The Trials Of Jayson Hoover, a west coast Canadian group, have bowed their initial single release "King Size" and "Baby I Love You" on the Warner Bros-Seven Arts New Syndrome label (5006).

The group, headed by Jayson Hoover, is comprised of Randy Busby on drums; Jim Harmata, lead guitar; Steve Cartmell, organ; and Bob Kidd, bass. In the short span of their being together (less than a year) The Trials Of Jayson Hoover have become known as a "Super Group" with the very strong rhythm and blues market of

Vancouver. It should be noted that prior to their group organization, as individuals they were perhaps the leading forces in establishing Vancouver as the Soul capitol of Canada. They were former members of the Epics and Shantells.

Besides playing most of the major R&B spots on the west coast of Canada, the Trials of Jayson Hoover have also made a sizeable impression in several top soul spots in U.S. centres including Seattle, Spokane and Portland. On tap for the group is a tour of Canada and the U.S.

COMPO'S CLEM BULL PASSES AWAY

Toronto: Clem Bull, well known and highly respected in the record industry for many years, passed away after a brief illness at the age of 59 Sunday Dec. 1st.

Mr. Bull was office manager of Apex Records (The Compo Co.) for the past eleven years. Previous to this position he had seen service with RCA Victor, Sparton and Columbia. He has been actively engaged in the record business since 1945.

It had recently been reported that Mr. Bull had suffered a heart attack but he had rallied sufficiently to return to work. His passing has come as a great shock to the industry.

Services were held Tuesday Dec. 3rd. Mr. Bull is survived by his wife Nan, daughter Susan and son Ron.

Bob Dylan came out of his Woodstock hiding place long enough to catch singer-composer Jerry Jeff Walker at a New York club last week. With Dylan were Paul Butterfield and Joni Mitchell. Joni did a half hour guest set.

The Doors, who are making less and less frequent public appearances these days, have decided to play at least one major date in New York in January at the new Madison Square Garden. In addition to the group's three million selling albums and four gold singles, they are listed in the new social register "Who's Who In America". Their current album, "Waiting For The Sun", was certified as a gold record before it was released, by the way.

Slim Harpo is in New York performing for an all white audience for what is probably the first time in his career. Harpo, who wrote and recorded such great r&b numbers as "King Bee" and "Rainin' In My Heart", is getting good reviews for his fine blues voice and harp style. In addition to his drummer, Slim is being backed up by another blues great Lightenin' Slim on guitar..



Besides breaking many of the top foreign hits, Stewart has broken several Canadian records. Our writer notes that a radio station in Windsor, who boasts that they are wholly and

completely CANADIAN, were unable to find one Canadian item for their 8:40 AM news of November 23rd.

Ron Waddell of CKDM Dauphin, Manitoba set a new continuous broadcast from a remote location record. His time was 80 hours and 25 minutes. Paul Revere of the Lakehead still holds the station record of 101 hours. Waddell was ordered off the air and out of the

Dauphin department store window, by Dr. Michael Potoski. During his air time, Waddell received many telephone calls from some of Canada's top recording artist including Debbie Lori Kay, Tommy Hunter and Bobby Curtola.




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WHO'S WHO IN MUSIC AT MIAMI'S POP FESTIVAL

NYC: Elaborate preparations are now being made to make sure the 1968 Miami Pop Festival being held at Gulfstream Park in Hallandale, Florida, doesn't meet with the same results as the song fest of last year.

According to New York's Goldstein Organization, the Festival will commence Saturday Dec. 28 and continue through Monday Dec. 30. Headlining the opening date will be Jose Feliciano, Country Joe & The Fish, Buffy Ste. Marie, Chuck Berry, Infinite McCoys, John Mayall's Bluesbreakers, Booker T & MGs, Dino Valente, Fleetwood Mac and the Blues Image.

On Sunday 29 the line-up will include Steppenwolf, Jr. Walker & The All Stars, Butterfield Blues Band, Flatt & Scruggs, Marvin Gaye, Joni Mitchell, Boxtops, Ritchie Havens, James Cotton Blues Band, and H.P. Lovecraft.

The last day (30) will see a return of Feliciano with Canned Heat, Turtles, Iron Butterfly, Ian & Sylvia, Grassroots, Charles Lloyd Quartet, Sweet Inspirations and the Grateful Dead.





(Ed: PLEASE NOTE CAREFULLY)

Unfortunately it is necessary to withdraw this column from RPM. For many years now, Elvira Capreese has been an interesting and informative column. It is regrettable that approximately a year and a half ago, a well organized SMEAR CAMPAIGN was launched to use the secret identity of Elvira as a tool to degrade and harass a very innocent individual in the music industry.

It has only recently come to my attention that the campaign was well executed and many important people were gullible enough to take these irresponsible accusations to heart. The result has been disastrous to a very talented but unfortunate Canadian producer. It has reached a point where the column cannot be continued if it is damaging to one individual.

I wish it now to be known that I Walt Grealis, Editor and Publisher of RPM was completely responsible for the origination and continuance of the Elvira Capreese column. The reason for the hidden identity of EC was that it was my feeling that the subjects dealt with in

this column should be distinctively separated from the other editorial portion of RPM.

The items used in this column were a composite of the many rumours that filtered into me at RPM. As rumours, they were not worthy of use in the regular sections of RPM. Many people contributed to Elvira's column. Promotion men, publishers, record execs, artists, printers (and occasionally the man that sweeps the office).

Elvira has done a great deal to assist the industry. She has brought to the attention of the trade, many shortcomings and was a great crusader for Canadian talent. She said many things that as editor I could not have said. She was often funny, egotistical, emotional, corny, vicious, constructive, malicious, gay, lighthearted, ridiculous and strangely resembled certain types in this business.

She was very respected and revered by many. She was also hated and feared by others.

Every attempt to drop the column was met by a flood of mail. There is no doubt in my mind that this final decision will meet with

the same response.

The name came from the phrase "A violent caprice". It is unfortunate that the column has gone. It would be unfair to continue under the circumstances, and ending this column will free one individual who has attained many accomplishments and really doesn't need to live in the shadow of something that he did not originate and is not responsible for.

As of this edition, we will not be printing Elvira's column and we will not be mentioning her name again. If her name appears in any copy that is to be used in RPM, it will be deleted.

No longer will this column be used as a tool.... and no longer will anyone attempt to ridicule and slander anyone suspected of being its' author.

It is probably too late to undo the harm that Elvira's mis-identity has done. We will all miss her.

I think it can be a glowing last tribute to Elvira to end her column with one of her favourite expressions.)


CHRISTMAS IS MY LOVE

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PROJECT IN TOGETHERNESS



Toronto: At a time when most Canadian organizations have their hand out to the government, the recording industry has again proven that it can get along very nicely without an assist with the tax payers money. The accomplishments of a few devoted people in the recording industry in putting together an album entitled "Christmas Is My Love" only points up what is becoming more and more evident. The Canadian record industry has the production, technical, writing and organizational ability to compete with any country in the world. National recognition of Canadian productions is the only handout the industry would appreciate. "Christmas Is My Love" couldn't be a better vehicle for this type of recognition.

This album project began back in August when a recording organization

known as The Academy of Pop Evolution, comprised of Terry Vollum, Keith Box, Graeme Box and John deNottbeck, were kicking around a way in which they, as writers and producers, could create a saleable product to bring attention to the Canadian recording industry. Being as Christmas was not too far off and that Christmas and children go well together, it was decided to concentrate their efforts in putting out a Christmas album, with suitable musical backing and a choral backing of children.

Getting together a group of well trained children's voices wasn't too difficult a job being as Rosemary Vollum, sister of professional sound engineer Terry, was teaching at St. Rose of Lima school in Scarborough and was quite aware of the quality of the school choir under the direction of

Mr. Bob Slingerland. Sidemen for the project were also easy to contact. Six of Canada's best: Jack Zaza, Russ Fearon, Terry Bush, Peter Appleyard, Guido Basso, and Brad Campbell agreed to go along with the album.

In view of the fact that no one who was approached were too interested in monetary return it was decided to produce this album for the express purpose of assisting the Canadian Save The Children Fund. This was where the real sales pitch by the Academy of Pop Evolution came into play. Doug Sanderson, president of Hallmark Studios, Toronto, was approached and he offered the use of his studio facilities for the recording session; Harold Town, well known Canadian artist offered to do a line drawing for the album cover; Ted Ottley, noted Toronto music

consultant, offered to write original material for the album, and to take part in choir rehearsals as well as an offer to help with musical arrangements for the session, Cockfield-Brown of Canada Ltd. under the guidance of Os Shenk, art director, contributed additional artwork, layout, and back-cover design; John deNottbeck, musician and songwriter, offered to collaborate with Ottley in the arrangements as well as the chore of co-writing four original songs; Dr. Keith Box (Toronto Dentist), put his lyric magic together and came up with the title song; his son Graeme, late of The Last Words, lent a hand at co-writing five originals, and Terry Vollum, gave his services for recording, sound mixing and final editing. The big stumbling block was the Musicians Union. They insisted

that their members be paid scale and that the union receive its regular fee for their pension fund. The sidemen, knowing that all other talent had been donated, apparently turned their fee back into the project.

Bob Stone, president of Robert Stone of Canada Ltd., offered his label and distribution facilities for the project.

With all the ground work in order, the next step was the laying down of the sound and voices. Many hours of rehearsals by the 120 voice choir and the final waxing produced one of the finest Christmas albums on the market today. The album contains six originals, by Keith and Graeme Box, Ted Ottley, and John deNottbeck as well as six standards. These compositions are stimulating and exciting through the talents of musicians not

usually heard on records but who supply the life to television and radio commercials. The voices, although untrained, are sincere and alive with youthful vigour.

"Christmas Is My Love" was indeed a well put together and worthy project. It is a collection of Canadian talent and ingenuity that will no doubt become a perennial example of what can be done.

All Canadian composers' royalties received in the sale of the album "Christmas Is My Love" is to be directed to The Canadian Save The Children Fund. Although too late for foreign participation, project members have been advised that an advance order for 45,000 albums has been placed by the world office of the Save The Children Fund, for distribution next year.




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THE PIG & WHISTLE

Toronto: Probably the best gauge of the popularity of a television show is to take the show on the road. CTV's "Pig & Whistle", through the good services of John Pozer of Variety Artists Productions Ltd., a well known consultant firm, has just completed a western tour that left no doubt in anyone's mind that the show was indeed a national habit for thousands of Canadians each week. This finding comes at a time when CTV needs news of acceptance of at least one of their shows. Latest ratings have apparently not been too kind to a few of CTV's productions.

Probably the success of the "Pig & Whistle" is the audience it is produced for. Being as Canada has a sizeable percentage of English, Scottish and Irish immigrants it's only natural that a television network show presented with an old country "Music Hall" format would be successful, and on a weekly basis. Much credit, of course, has to go to the witty, happy and excellent talent making up the show. Host John Hewer, a natural through his carnival, minstrel, vaudeville and pantomime associations in England, which is so obvious in his ability to keep the show moving from one phase of musical happiness to another. An English Pub just ain't English unless it has a barmaid, and CTV's "Pig & Whistle" has one of the best. Kay Turner, born in England, but now very much Canadian, has still retained the necessities for coming up with the rousers of World War II. Hugh Hogan,

a Scotsman with enough of a burr to stir even un-Scottish blood. Queen Of The Pearlies, Anita Scott, capable of instant Yorkshire, Lancashire and Brooklyn accents, perhaps has more success with her cockney accent. Anita was born in London and notes "My birthplace is Camden Town, so you couldn't call me a cockney." Roland and The Dancers, a North American conception of pubbery happiness, create enough heel and toe action with their reels and jigs that they really aren't too foreign to the show. Keeping the show together, musically, is the Carlton Show Band, who, besides attaining national television star status, have also chalked up excellent sales with their Arc and RCA Victor albums. The group is comprised of Mike Feeney, Seamus Grew, Christy McLaughlin, Fred White, Bob Lewis, John Patterson, Sean McManus, and group leader Chris O'Toole.

Producer/director of the show John Johnson was amazed at the constant flow of cards, letters and telephone calls that came into CFTO-TV each week from thousands of happy viewers who assured Johnson that he had captured the right format for a successful and long running series. Because of this viewer response it was decided to "whistle-stop" the show across the nation. John Pozer, of Variety Artists Productions was consulted and asked to set up a tour that would take the television production of "Pig & Whistle" complete to major centres across Canada. Pozer researched and came up with a six-

city Western Canada tour that saw the "Pig & Whistle" crew playing to capacity audiences of over 40,000 and as Pozer points out these audiences contained upwards of 10% teenagers. From Victoria eastward to Winnipeg this Canadian "Music Hall" production reached the very grass roots of Canada and came up a winner and one of the finest tributes to John Johnson a Canadian television producer could ever receive.

John Pozer is currently lining up an Atlantic Provinces tour for the group and from the many letters and cards being received at local television stations carrying the show as well as at CTV headquarters, the "Pig & Whistle" group is assured of success here as well.

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STAN KLEES

MUSIC BIZ

How often have I said "Any damned fool can make money. The problem is to collect it". This is very true. One of the great difficulties of any business that extends credit is the collection of money. In the record and music business this is especially true.

How many businesses have been great successes on paper, but have fallen short at the bank. How many businesses today are actually keeping money longer and often financing their entire organizations on credit. It is an unfortunate but necessary evil in the economic structure that we have adopted to do business.

This brings me to the subject of "head money" for masters.

An independent producer takes cash out of his business to produce a number of sides by a new artist. His investment for four sides is around \$2000. His sides are completed and he is ready to lease them to a record company. He has found a record company, or a number of record companies who are interested. The question now is HOW INTERESTED.

Are the sides so good that the record company is willing to say, "We wish we had done these ourselves" and indicating that the cost of the production is reasonable..

If this is their feeling, then because of the independence risk in producing these sides he should be entitled to a royalty. A suitable royalty might be 6, 7, 8 or 10 percent of 90% of the retail price (as defined in most leasing contracts.)

Technically the record company in accepting the masters as something they approve of, should return the investment (upon receiving the proper receipts indicating the production costs have not been hyped) and replenishing the independent producers' working capitol for his next production.

This is a very fair and healthy situation for all concerned, because the record company has indicated that they are \$2000. and X% of 90 interested in the masters. They have got their "feet wet".

Since most leasing contracts call for more product, the advance of the production costs allow the producer to create further product.

When we say an advance of the production costs, we are talking about money that will be held against the royalties. Therefore the product must earn back the advance before any further royalties are paid.

Should a producer accept any less than his production costs as an advance plus the fair royalty? If he does, he should bear in mind that he is accepting EXACTLY WHAT HIS MASTER IS WORTH. It is nice to know that it isn't valued at NIL. It is nice to know that the record company has shown faith in your production and are willing to share your investment.

None of the negotiations I have discussed are unique. They are an accepted manner of doing business. They are actually a very good way

of doing business.

Advances are being paid and they should be paid. It is the only ethical way that producers can continue to produce. It has become as essential a procedure as the 60 or 90 day first refusal of world rights outside Canada. Frozen masters have given many record companies a very poor image. Fortunately we have licked that problem.

It's all in the name of common sense and ethical negotiations..

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COUNTRY

There's a great deal of excitement at the Sparton camp over their recent country releases. Leading the pack is Brenda Byer's "Auctioneer" (1696). Larry Page has high hopes for the release of Leon Ashley's new lid "While Your Lover Sleeps" (1697) which should be released within the next few days. Big surprises at Sparton is the response two Canadian productions are receiving across Canada. Billy Charne's "No Lonelier Than You" (1693) and "Destroy Me" by Chef Adams (1692) are now showing strong in many of the provinces.

Brian Nordlund, who hosts "Country Salute" Saturdays from 10:30 AM over CKNX-TV Wingham is in dire need of video films on country artists. Those record companies who would like to take advantage of coverage over this very important Canadian/U.S. border television outlet should direct their films to Brian Nordlund, CKNX-TV, Wingham, Ontario.

Watch for Allied Records to hit the market with several well put together productions by Jack Boswell. Release dates and artists at a later

date.

Rosalie Allen the first U.S. radio personality and the first to air Hank Williams, Jim Reeves and Jimmy Dean, was recently in Toronto for an engagement at the Edison which turned into a held over affair. This was Rosalie's first trip to Canada. Miss Allen is known as Queen of the Yodellers. She was backed by the Chaparrals her first week at the Edison and for the two days she was held over, Myrna Lorrie's group supplied the backing. It's been reported that Miss Allen will soon be releasing on the Stop label, recently bowed by Pete Drake.

Beverley May Barker, a new discovery by Gord Hill, has packed them in steadily during her two week engagement at the Wellington Hotel in Barrie, Ont. She'll be moving into the Plaza Inn, Cobourg, Ontario the latter part of December. Tweety Smith (country comedian) is Beverley's bass player and Johnny Green, formerly with Roy Penney, looks after the drums.

Mona Vary will be in the Toronto and Upper Canada area the first part of next year.

MONA VARY ENJOYING HIGH LISTENER INDEX

Toronto: Polydor country recording artist Mona Vary has made strong strides up the country charts with her deck of "Back In Town To Stay" which was produced by Rodeo's George Taylor and Dougall Trineer.

The release has also sparked interest in the single by foreign interests particularly from the European market. The disc has also been released in French and is now creating high sales through its exposure on both French country and pop stations.

The Ontario market has also shown much interest in Miss Vary's initial release for Polydor. Lori Bruner, fresh from a European trip expressed much confidence for the success of the record throughout the Canadian country market.

It should be noted that over 60% of Canadian radio stations program country records. Many of the stations, not publishing charts, do submit playlists of country action and it has been noted at RPM that "Back In Town To Stay" is enjoying a high listener index. In view of this exposure Miss Vary has been exceptionally successful on one nighters, tours etc. Ben Kaye Associates, personal management firm for Miss Vary, report the months of January, February and March as being almost completely booked. Miss Vary will shortly tour the Ontario market with appearances in Oshawa and Toronto.
