THE MANY MOODS OF JASON

STONES' TORONTO GIG UNEVENTFUL

The Rolling Stones rolled into Toronto from the airport in a Volkswagen camper and down into the bowels of Maple Leaf Gardens without incident. Toronto police had assigned an extra 500 men to look after the two concert "Stones' Day" (July 15) but they probably could have gotten away with the same number they use for hockey games. The only indication the police were equipped for any untoward incidents was the presence of mounted policemen.

A few scalpers braved the police guard to hustle their tickets but they were convinced to keep their prices down to cost. There were a couple of reports of counterfeit tickets but nothing serious and there wasn't a report of one bust during either show which drew more than 32,000 fans. Radio stations got into the fray and fever of the Stones' concert but Harry Allen of CHIC, a non-rocker in Brampton beat the Toronto stations hands down. The day of the announcement of the concert, Allen picked up several hundred tickets and began his countdown which brought him many new listeners from the Metropolitan area. Radio station CHUM somehow came across a block of tickets which they used to their advantage during the last few days before the show.

Besides the Stones receiving the giant share of the ticket take, WEA of Canada was the other winner. Record and tape sales of Rolling Stones' product were exceptional in Vancouver, Toronto and for the final show in Montreal. Sam The Record Man, Canada's largest franchise dealer, took advantage of the Gardens' date with Specials July 15 and 17. He was selling two factory sealed Stones' albums in the \$10.58 series for \$4.99 which included "Rip This Joint", "Rocks Off" and the same from the \$9.98 series (July 17) containing "Honky Tonk Woman", "Satisfaction" etc. These were offered as 9 AM specials which created a bit of a traffic hassle at the downtown store.

The July 17 show of the Stones at Montreal's Forum revealed at least six series of counterfeit tickets in existence but precautions taken before the show and at the gates apparently cut down on what could have been a problem.

RCA DISTRIBUTING ARPEGGIO LABEL

John Arpin, president of newly-formed Arpeggio Records, and Jack Feeney, manager and executive producer, RCA Limited, have announced the signing of an agreement for distribution of all Arpeggio product by RCA. Initial single release under the agreement is Lynn Jones' "Clap Your Hands" and "You Loved Me Just Enough to Change My Mind" by the Rhythm Pals.

Upcoming is product by the Haggart Brothers, Doug Steiger, Nancy Ryan and Wayne Rostad. Said Arpin of the RCA deal, "We are primarily interested in Canadian talent and know that RCA will go "all out" to promote our artists".

MEL SHAW TO EUROPE TO ARRANGE STAMPEDE DATES

Mel Shaw, manager of The Stampeders and president of their release label, Music World Creations, has left for Europe (July 19) for talks with the continent's leading operators and bookers. Rather than wait for a Maple Music Tour of Europe, a natural follow-up to the Maple Music Junket, which has all but fizzled out, Shaw has moved in to take advantage of the almost unbelievable press his group has received from the Maple Music Junketeers, particularly from Continental Europe. These included full page spreads in several leading dailies including *De Telegraaf* and others.

Shaw has received enquiries for dates from Sweden, Holland, Belgium, Germany, Spain, Switzerland and a tentative Fall date for the Olympia in Paris. Their current Canadian hit "Wild Eyes" has been released in Europe on the Philips label and according to reports the single could follow the lead of their hit "Sweet City Woman", which has just recently been reissued in Europe.

The Stampeders are currently appearing at Edmonton's Klondike Days after successful dates in Red Deer and their hometown of Calgary. They return east to Toronto for several Ontario dates including an appearance at the Toronto Fair's Grandstand.

With all breakout market stations and all major stations but one on their record "Wild Eyes", sales have now exceeded 40,000 - hardly what you could tag a "tuneout sound".

MIKE & TOM DE-BUNK... WEA AIRING NEW SHEET

The "Mike and Tom Show", one of the industry's most popular hype sheets, will cease publication this week. The sheet is put together by Mike Reed and Tom Williams of Warners/Kinney/WEA. Reason given for the suspension of the weekly newsletter is Kinney's name change to WEA Music of Canada, Ltd. The "Mike and Tom Show" covered radio action, artist appearances, and general information on the Kinney group of labels for more than a year.

The "Show", which was heralded into existence with a major story in RPM, headlined "Mike and Tom Lay on Sheet for Industry", will be replaced by an as-yet un-named weekly information piece.

GULF INTO DISC PROMO FOR JAMES LAST SET

Gulf Oil, one of North America's major petroleum companies is heavily promoting, to its credit card customers, a special package of James Last albums containing more than sixty selections. The six album set entitled, "The Many Moods of James Last", is being offered by Gulf for \$19.98, plus shipping and handling charges. The custom pressed set includes such selections as "Canadian Sunset", "Telstar", "Eve of Destruction", "Winchester Cathedral", "Aquarius", "Mr. Tambourine Man" and "Jezebel".

GREEN APPOINTED TO MARKETING FOR GRT

Larry Green, well known for his on-air and promotional efforts on CHUM-FM, joins GRT of Canada in the position of marketing manager during the beginning of August. While with CHUM-FM, Green was responsible for many of the highlights of its programming and promotion, including the Lighthouse special and the station's "Free Summer". Prior to going on-air, Green was copy chief for CHUM AM and FM.

Said GRT president Ross Reynolds of the hiring, "We are very pleased that Larry has decided to join us. He has continually developed creative marketing and promotional programmes for CHUM FM as well as garnering the respect of both the public and musicians. Larry will greatly strengthen our efforts to develop and promote Canadian artists."

Green's background includes most areas of radio, writing, promotion, sales, production and announcing. He has worked in most provinces in the country and was the recipient of the Armstrong Award for FM Broadcasting, presented by Columbia University.

PHONOGRAPH PRODUCTION CONTINUES ON INCREASE

Statistics Canada, the federal statistical body, reports another jump in phonograph record production for the month of May. According to the organization, 4,465,608 records were produced in May, 1972 compared with 3,016,184 in the same month a year ago. Production of pre-recorded tapes more than doubled in the same period, from 322,082 to 733,363.

NEW PRESIDENT FOR QUALITY RECORDS

R.E. Day, chairman of the board, Quality Records Limited, has announced the appointment of William Bays to the position of President and General Manager of the Company. Bays has been with Quality since its founding in 1949. During that time, he has held positions as chief accountant, secretary treasurer, vice president finance, and vice president and general manager.



VARIATIONS ON AN OLD THEME

The prospect of diminishing returns looms ominously before every domestic producer in Canada. All is not that bright

and hopeful on the record production scene. The studios are busy, but not as busy as they could be. Producers are working, but not as often as they would like to. The industry trudges along at a rate just slightly better than one year ago.

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What are the problems that confront the producer? Money! The high cost of production and the low prospect of returns on their investment is fast catching up with the record company and the indie producer.

One producer complains that tens of thousands of dollars later, the return on his investment is next to nil. The pot is running dry and the 30% ruling has only resulted in token airplay of Cancon records — but few hits and fewer money makers.

"There isn't even anything to encourage us anymore" claims another recordmaker. "It is just a constant flow of money out and next to nothing comes back."

"The sound is there, the talent is there, but money is getting scarce. Nobody seems to be making a go of it. I'm not alone in the fight for survival. Other producers are either slowing down or going into debt to speculate. Some are right out of the picture for now".

The studios are there, and they are better studios than Canada has ever had and hourly rentals to match. The sound is coming out of these studios, but it stops dead on the turntables of programmers. If a few spins result — it is a half-hearted effort on the part of many of the big important stations to just play what they have been forced to play.

Success in Canada is the door opener to the United States and the world, but the big hype didn't come with the ruling and broadcasters who "make the difference" are worried about their formulated sound and will only program what complies with the rating race and throw in a few Canadian oldies or some established pseudo-Canadian chestnuts that will fulfill the quota.

Record companies are experiencing exactly what was happening for the past ten years. Thousands of dollars go out in production and manufacturing, but only a couple of hundred dollars return to be re-invested. Many have soured on Cancon production of their own and can't or won't encourage any new escapades for the indies.

The recording entrepreneur is worried. Money vanishes quickly and the threat of diminishing returns has suddenly become a fact of life.

Broadcast producers are growing daily, with their power to expose their own productions. It often appears that their self interest in record production and music publishing has caused them to envy the "sound" that comes from their competitors in making records and they seem to be holding back the development of a music industry.

Criticism of studios in Canada, today, comes from the uninformed. A tour of just a few of Toronto's studios would open the eyes of many broadcasters who are not aware, that today in Toronto the studios are among the most up-to-date in the world.

Everything from 24 track to a bevy of sixteen track studios with all the latest innovations to improve sound, has made Toronto the place to visit if you are a producer or engineer. This is right now. All these facilities are available and in use.

Manning the controls of these marvelous consoles are engineers and mixers with international reputations. Ask any broadcaster to tell you about the sound that can come out of Canada.

As bleak as one may become, being the publisher of a record and music trade magazine, it is still astonishing that Canada possesses facilities that look like they really belong in New York, Nashville or Los Angeles. I can't help but admit that I am astounded by what has happened in Canada in the past year — in studios. and I am equally impressed with the sound coming from these studios. It isn't getting better, it is indeed the best sound the world can produce. The promotional efforts of many record companies matches that sound. The conditions are green, but the situation is yellow and heading toward red.

The great investment in Canada's economy, culture and nationalism is threatened by the prospect of diminishing returns.

No matter how fast the CRTC or the Combines branch of the government move, they cannot move fast enough to prevent the crucifixion of some of our best talent — and always there looms before us the threat of the talent drain being reactivated.

There are indications at present that by the end of spring, many a brilliant young talent will have to look elsewhere for success. Canada isn't happening as fast as was anticipated. Diminishing returns may be slowly grinding the music industry to a complete stop.

Strangely enough these words are as true

CATHY YOUNG READY FOR DISC COMEBACK

Cathy Young, 21 year old Toronto beauty with a voice to match, will soon return to the disc fold through a production deal with Shel Safran. Miss Young, who toured with the "Jesus Christ Superstar" company in the role of Mary Magdalene, has been responsible for the coming together of many of the recent recording acts in-



cluding Timothy, Capt'n Midnite's Dirty Feet and Robert Blyth. She performed back-up vocal duties on all of these sessions including the Hope album produced by Jack Richardson.

Miss Young gave the disc scene a try herself a couple of years ago with the release of "A Spoonful of Cathy Young" on the Mainstream label. Jack Morrow, who recently arranged for a Western Canada tour for Timothy and Capt'n Midnite's Dirty Feet with an Aug 1st date at the Winnipeg Playhouse, is hopeful of signing Miss Young to join the tour.

GEORGE CARLIN TO O'KEEFE CENTRE

George Carlin, who met ready acceptance with his "FM, AM" set on Little David, is booked into Toronto's O'Keefe Centre for three days in early August. The well-known comedian is the author of all the material he uses. Appearing with Carlin at the O'Keefe are Ken Rankin and Dan Cassidy, who also shared the bill with him at Carnegie Hall.

MCA'S PICKARD TO OTTAWA'S LE HIBOU

Sorrells Pickard, Decca recording artist, was into Ottawa's Le Hibou for a week, July 18th-23rd. The artist's first Decca album, "Sorrells Pickard", contains twelve original compositions and was produced and arranged by Pete Drake. Numerous Pickard compositions have been used by such recording luminaries as Ringo Starr, Del Reeves, Ernest Tubb and Kitty Wells.

POLYDOR RELEASES FIRST ENGLISH HUET SINGLE

Montreal-based Polydor Records has released the first English language single by French-Canadian folk singer, Richard Huet. "Banks of the Ohio" f/s "Speak to Me of Love" was released last week. To date, Huet's popularity has been confined to his home province but seeks to expand this with further English recording.


In the immediate future he embarks on a forty two city tour of Quebec as part of the annual "Musicorama". Following the grinding province-wide tour, Huet is scheduled to play Montreal's Place des Arts. Arrangements are now being arranged for possible Ontario appearances. Huet travels with a group of five musicians and a backing vocal group consisting of three girls.

TSS PUTS REPUTATION ON LINE FOR SLAGTER

Dave Slagter has impressed the Toronto Sound people with his board capabilities that the studio executive have set up a plan whereby they'll match dollar for dollar any group, solo act or production house who books the young engineer. Terry Brown of TSS reveals they are so confident in Slagter's professionalism that they are prepared to pay for half the cost of any session in order to establish Slagter as one of the leading engineers available in Toronto.

Slagter has been tape operator on several sessions including those of Pagliaro and Crowbar and has apprenticed with the studios' top engineers: Brown, Doug Riley and Peter Houston. He was also involved in the technical organizing of "Northward Hair".

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HONEY WEST/ROSTAD INTO TROPHY RM/BEVERLY HILLS

Honey West and her group which includes new singing discovery Wayne Rostad, opened at the Beverly Hills' Trophy Room (July 17). Miss West, who has had a long run on both the RPM MOR and Country Playlists with "Country Soul", was somewhat at a disadvantage in the barnlike and noisy room. Besides doing much of her own material she presented an impressive mixture of country and pop with solid offerings of Anne Murray hits.

Wayne Rostad, who has recently released "November Rain", a self penning, had his own impressive cheering section in for the opener. These included: CFGM heavies John Hart and Fred Trainor and their wives; RCA's national promotion manager Ed Preston and his Ontario promotion team, Scott Richards and Johnny Murphy, along with Rostad's manager Gary McColman, promotion manager for CKWS Kingston.

Rostad, a former radio personality at CKWS, was one of the first signings to the newly bowed Arpeggio label. He was produced by Gary Buck at RCA's Toronto studios. Buck is a principal in the new label along with John Arpin. Arpeggio is distributed by RCA.

Rostad carries his new profession well. His voice is strong and although country, lacks the usual hick twang. He, like the other members of the Honey West group, are somewhat overdressed and when you put the 6 foot plus frame of Rostad into a double-breasted yellow canary combina-

tion, topped off with a rocker hair-do - he looks uncomfortable. Voice-wise, he has much to offer, if he gets the right kind of rooms. His initial release is already making gains on the RPM MOR and Country Playlists.

HEART SEIZURE FATAL TO CHARLIE CHAMBERLAIN

Charlie Chamberlain, who has been part of Canada's entertainment scene since the hungry thirties, suffered a fatal heart attack in hospital in Bathurst, New Brunswick (July 16). The grand old pioneer of stage and television collapsed recently while taping a segment of the Don Messer show for CHCH-TV (Hamilton). He was rushed to the hospital but released a couple of weeks later and returned to his home in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia.

Mr. Chamberlain celebrated his 62nd birthday July 14, two days before his death.

MONTREAL FIRM INTROS 3 HOUR CASSETTE

Montreal-based William Cohen Corporation has introduced a low-noise cassette cartridge with a playing time of three hours. The cassette achieves the extended playing time through the use of ultra-thin .25 mil. polyester-backed tape. The cassette uses the standard plastic cartridge.

The C-180LN was developed by TDK Electronics Corporation. William Cohen is the Canadian distributor.

PINDOFF FAMILY COMPETES FOR RETAIL/WHOLESALE MKT.

Eva Pindoff, president of the Music World chain of retail record stores and her husband Kris, president of Pindoff Record Sales, have become deeply involved in competition in different but allied fields of the record business - retail and wholesale.

Mrs. Pindoff, who purchases approximately \$2 million dollars worth of stock from Pindoff Record Sales each year, has just announced the proposed opening of their new Hamilton store in the McDonald Square (Mall) in the heart of Hamilton. It was also announced that lease finalizing plans for a store in the Scarborough Shopping Centre, reportedly the most modern in the world, had been completed. The new Music World store, taking up 3000 square feet, is expected to be opened in July of next year.

Music World now have stores in Yorkdale, Albion Mall, Brampton, Cloverdale Mall, Don Mills, Fairview, Oakville, and Ottawa.

Pindoff Record Sales, besides servicing all the Music World stores also services the Bay stores in Ontario and Quebec, Eaton stores in Montreal and three Eaton stores in Ontario. The Quebec operation is headed up by Bud Farquharson with E. Taylor Campbell looking after marketing for Ontario.

TOBIAS IN CONTRACT SIGNING WITH MGM

Ken Tobias, who first came to attention with his penning of the Bells' hit "Stay Awhile", has signed a long term contract with the Verve Forecast label, part of the MGM conglom. The label is distributed in Canada by Quality Records.

Tobias, who is now resident in Toronto, is currently assembling a five piece group to back him. He is managed by Beaver Productions. All publishing is through his own Gloopscap Music (BMI). In the past year, Tobias has received numerous awards including two BMI Awards, a Moffat Award and a gold record.

CAPITOL TO HANDLE DIRECT IMPORTS

Jacques Marchand, import manager, Capitol Records, has announced that in the immediate future, Capitol will have available direct European imports. At the outset, the Capitol import catalogue will include product from France, Germany, England, Italy and Holland. Product from other countries will be included as demand makes it worthwhile.

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

CRTC LOOKS AT CBC's NEW SOUND

(Ed: Following is the full text of the public announcement made by the Canadian Radio-Television Commission regarding the CBC's proposal for the creation of two distinctive categories of radio programming, Radio I and Radio II. This announcement points up the Commission's fundamental belief in the value of the CBC as a separate and unique program source and its interest in the survival of the CBC under those terms, instead of as a publicly-funded competitor of private broadcasting.)

At its public hearing in Ottawa on March 28 and 29, 1972, the Canadian Radio-Television Commission heard an application by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation concerning a proposal for its new radio program policy. The proposal is generally referred to as Radio I and Radio II. The Commission also heard applications by the CBC for the establishment of six FM stations and a French FM network. These applications were intended to implement the initial phases of the new policy.

The CRTC was impressed with the task undertaken by the Corporation which has been concerned with the apparent changes in the attitudes of audiences towards radio broadcasting and with the proportion of Canadian audiences reached by CBC radio programs. The Corporation has carried out a study on these matters; the proposal submitted to the Commission is the result of that study. The proposal would have a fundamental influence on the development of the radio part of what the Broadcasting Act calls "the national broadcasting service".

At the hearing, the Commission heard representations from the CBC and from several intervenants. After careful review of all these representations and having carefully considered other forms of radio service now available to Canadians, the Commission has come to the conclusion that it cannot agree with the proposed new radio policy.

The CBC is established under the provisions of the Broadcasting Act for the purpose of providing, within the framework of the Canadian broadcasting system, a national broadcasting service that is of a high standard and is predominantly Canadian in content and character. The Act specifies that:

- (i) this service should be a balanced service of information, enlightenment and entertainment for people of different ages, interests and tastes, covering the whole range of programming in fair proportion,
- (ii) This service should be extended to all parts of Canada, as public funds become available.
- (iii) this service should be in English and French, serving the special needs of geographic regions, and actively contributing to the flow and exchange of cultural and regional information and entertainment, and
- (iv) this service should contribute to the development of national unity and provide

for a continuing expression of Canadian identity.

The CRTC is established to regulate and supervise all aspects of the Canadian broadcasting system with a view to implementing the policy objectives established by Parliament. It is within the context of these roles assigned by the Broadcasting Act to the CBC and to the Commission that the decision of the Commission has been made.

Parliament, in enacting the Broadcasting Act, declared that broadcasting undertakings in Canada constitute a single system comprising public and private elements. Each element must make a distinctive contribution to the effectiveness of the whole system. Achieving programming which is varied, comprehensive and of high standard for the total system as required by Parliament, is not an easy objective to attain. The Commission is aware that a great deal of effort is yet required to reach that objective. It is obvious, however, that the role of the CBC in establishing and maintaining standards is of particular importance.

For over 35 years, the people of Canada have supported the service of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation with public funds in order to achieve standards in Canadian broadcasting which a strictly commercial system could not attain. The purpose was also that this "national service" would be available to all Canadians in English and in French as public funds became available.

As a consequence, the CBC cannot, like a private corporation, modify and adapt its services in response to the "fluctuations of the market" in order to achieve institutional survival. There is, in fact, at the present time in Canadian broadcasting, a definite tendency on the part of some private stations in the same service areas to provide very similar services. The Commission is of the view that the trends inherent in the Radio I proposal and in the "experiments" that have been carried out in relation to this proposal shift CBC AM programming away from what is unique and bring it much too close to the programming already available on many of the privately owned radio stations.

The Commission's considered judgment is that the proposal, designed to attract larger audiences, may jeopardize distinctive, high quality radio programming by the CBC. The Commission is not convinced that acquiring more listeners for CBC radio justifies the use of formats and techniques which are derived largely from the private sector. The challenge to the CBC remains in the strengthening and encouragement of distinctive radio programming, something for which, over the years, it has been singularly recognized internationally and nationally.

The Commission recognizes the dilemma facing CBC in attempting to maintain its mandate when so many people seem inclined to follow the trends of North

American commercial broadcasting. However, the mandate of the CBC remains one of providing a broadcasting service of distinctive quality which is predominantly Canadian in content and character and a continuing expression of Canadian identity.

In arriving at its decision on the Radio I and II proposal, the Commission has taken particular note that it would appear:

- 1) to contain an overly centralized programme production structure which would stifle the ability of regional sources to contribute on an innovative basis;
- 2) to be unduly influenced by the popularity standards of people living in urban areas where listeners have a broad range of broadcasting services available in addition to other forms of entertainment and enlightenment;
- 3) to exhibit a concern with audience ratings which is influenced more by standards of commercial popularity than by standards of programme distinctiveness and excellence;
- 4) to be considerably influenced by the CBC dependence for distribution on affiliates, whose natural interests in commercial programmes are sometimes in conflict with the basic aims of CBC programming policy;
- 5) to neglect CBC radio's original function of reflecting to a national audience the total range of our living culture: from the instant reporting of topics, views, and day by day creative successes, to the convincing and competent presentation of the long term concerns of our society, of what is best and most durable in our cultural achievements and in our national heritage.

The Commission is firmly convinced that any tendency on the part of the CBC to achieve better ratings by imitating or approximating programming forms of commercial stations must be strongly resisted. The reason is simple. There is no need for more of the same. More particularly, there is no need to spend public funds largely to duplicate what is already provided by commercial operations.

In the contemporary radio environment it is indeed difficult to provide "varied and comprehensive" programming for "people of different ages, interests and tastes", but the Commission cannot, on the other hand,



CKY'S LYMAN AND A FEW DISC COMPANY POINTERS

I'm a little withdrawn from the music scene nowadays. It's been awhile since I've spouted off, but I think I should do so now.

I keep hearing about the decline in Canadian record production, despite the fact that Canadian radio stations have featured 30% Canadian content for the past year and a half. The record companies complain that they can't make a buck on Canadian product, so they stop making it. The radio stations then have less and less new product to expose, instead of the "more and more" that was forecast two years ago.

I'll tell you why a record company can't make a buck with a Canadian record. It's because their approach is all wrong. The record reps I've talked to think in terms of releasing a Canadian record in Canada. Then, if it's a hit, they arrange for U.S. and overseas release. To me, this is like a Nashville-based record company issuing its new releases only in Tennessee, then expanding to other states if they're hits.

Let's face it . . . the Canadian record market is approximately equal to one major American city. A record that makes money in Canada is not just a hit . . . it's a super hit.

COLUMBIA TO DISTRIBUTE MONUMENT PRODUCT

Columbia Records of Canada, Ltd. have acquired the Monument line for distribution in Canada. Negotiations for the acquisition of the Nashville-based label were finalized by Monument's president Fred Foster and Columbia's Fred Wilmot.

It should be noted that the distribution

How many Canadian artists have the potential to become stars, but never have the opportunity because they never have a record released, or because their success (or lack of it) is judged strictly on Canadian sales? If you're not a potential super star, your opportunity never comes.

Since most Canadian record companies are subsidiaries of American companies, I'd like to see one of them set up an ambitious program of Canadian artist development with simultaneous record release in both Canada and the United States. Only then will we be measuring Canadian artists by the same yardstick that's used to judge most American artists.

If proper care is used in A&R, and in the control of recording costs, both the artists and the record companies should make money, and the Canadian recording industry should grow a heck of a lot faster.

deal covers only record product. Tape product remains with the present distributor, London Records.

There is one exception however, whereby Columbia will handle both disc and tape product released by Ronnie Hawkins who had signed a separate deal with GRT of Canada. The latter wrote the liner notes for the Hawkins' album in which he noted: "We'd heard bits of the legend before we ever met the Hawk. A legend is usually bigger than life but he lives up to it with more purpose, intensity, and obvious pleasure, than your run-of-the-mill hero. This energy flows over into his music, as you will hear on this album. There's more to the man, so stay tuned for whatever happens tomorrow."

That's probably one of the most honest hypes Hawkins has ever received and when you listen to "Bony Moronie", "Lawdy Miss Clawdy", "Maybellene" and the others, you'll discover why words of praise came so easy to Kristofferson.



BIG BAMBU

Two of the funniest guys of record didn't let us down this time. Much of the stuff is very very funny, but be careful when airing it. "Ralph and Herbie" and the television medley are particularly good.

**SKYLARK**

Although not released in Canada yet, Vancouver-based Skylark are a strong entry. Made up of various elements of now-defunct groups, Skylark is a group whose main strength is versatility. Moving from soft-rock to up-tempo with ease, Skylark stands out especially on "Wild-flower".

**RICHARD HUET**
Polydor 2424 063-Q

A commercial folkie whom Polydor is grooming for the English market, Huet comes across just fine in French. "Le Baie James" is an interesting adaptation of "Banks of the Ohio". Production is exceptionally clean and well conceived. Background vocal is a major contributor to the rich sound of Huet.

In an era of super realism and intensity such as this, there are very few heroes left. There is certainly a scarcity within the music world. Ronnie Hawkins is a hero, or more accurately like Bat Masterson, a legend in his own time.

The following are excerpts from the album's liners notes, written by one of his most avid fans, Kris Kristofferson. "Graduates of his school of Hard-Rock include a remarkable number of today's super stars (e.g., The Band, Full-tilt Boggie, et al, 'Hell, I begun to call my place Albert Grossman's Farm Club') who did their basic training under the Hawk's heavy wing before they left the limb to soar on their own. The working conditions are notorious: seven days a week, five shows a night. ('These young pickers are spoiled; hell, I giv'em sixty bucks a week and they don't even want to rehearse after the show'). Yet he consistently manages to put together some of the toughest Rock groups making music. His explanation: 'Son, when you've got as little talent as I do you've gotta surround yourself with the biggies.' Which is, of course, bullshit; but it shows his inability or unwillingness to take himself seriously (a characteristic uncommon to Living Legends).

"Self-billed as 'the working girls' favorite and housewives 'companion,' he packs his club nightly with an audience of (famous) and (infamous) friends and fans. Politicians, Pickers, Students, Jet-setters, Reporters, Young fighters, Old failures - you name it, any age, sex, or occupation, either side of the law. He's as easy with the socialites as with the shit-kickers.

"A legend's usually bigger than life, but he lives up to it with more purpose, intensity, and obvious pleasure, than your run-of-the-mill hero. This energy flows over into his music, as you will hear on this album. There's more to the man, so stay tuned for whatever happens tomorrow."



revived so far. The use of a harpsichord to accompany the recitatives, and the polished playing of the English Chamber Orchestra give the work an almost Mozartian elegance.





Sutherland and Pavarotti interpret the work with uncommon depth and poetry and the score is performed complete. This set leaves its competitors far, far behind.

This is the second release on Select label by the world famous Canadian violinist, Steven Staryk. Playing the "Muntz" Stradivarius, he brings virtuosity and sterling musicianship to



Paganini's twenty-four Caprices. Six of these will be familiar to many in the piano transcriptions by Franz Liszt, and the 24th is known to all as the theme for Rachmaninoff's Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini.

Here in their original form, the Caprices have a diamond like brilliance more akin to Scarlatti Sonatas than the romantic climate they came to light in.

BEETHOVEN*"Hammerklavier" Sonata Op. 106*

Christoph Eschenbach, Pianist

This giant sonata was not always as popular with performers and audiences as it is today. It was even orchestrated by Felix Weingartner who felt that it exceeded the limitations of both pianists and pianos. Now suddenly everyone plays it. Perhaps even Liberace. Who knows?

Mr. Eschenbach's performance is the most appealing I have heard so far, due perhaps to the tremendous pianism and broad range of tonal colouring he brings to it. One's ear is never fatigued by ugly sounds as so often happens in recordings of this rather pugilistic work.

WAGNER*Symphony in C major**A Faust Overture**Overture to "Rienzi"*

Bamberg Symphony conducted by Otto Gerdes

Do you enjoy torturing friends by playing records and asking them to "name that tune"? (If you do, you should be shot at sunrise!) Try this Symphony by Richard Wagner in his student days, and guesses will probably include everyone from Mozart to Mendelssohn and Weber. Quite a good work despite a complete absence of the composer's later orchestral style. The "Rienzi" Overture is more characteristic and contains one of Wagner's grandest, most memorable tunes. An interesting and worth-while release.

SCHUBERT*Sonata in A, Op. 162 for Violin and Piano**Fantasia in C, Op. 159*

David Oistrakh, Violinist

Frieda Bauer, Pianist

Melodiya Angel SR-40194

This is a valuable recording of two of Schubert's most enchanting works for Violin and Piano. Oistrakh and Frieda Bauer play extremely well together, giving balanced and sympathetic performances.

The Fantasia in C is a very difficult work demanding the kind of virtuosity that both artists so ably bring to it, while the more thoughtful Sonata is played with great gentleness and intimacy.

BRITTEN*Concerto for Piano and Orchestra, Op. 13**Concerto for Violin and Orchestra, Op. 15*

Sviatoslav Richter, Piano

Mark Lubotsky, Violin

English Chamber Orchestra conducted by Benjamin Britten
London CS 6723

These early works were both written in 1938 and 1939. The Violin Concerto was composed during the composer's stay in Canada and received its premier in New York in 1940. It was all but forgotten until this recording.

The Piano Concerto is the more appealing work and turned up occasionally over the years in performances by the American pianist Jacques Abram and Britain's Eileen Joyce. Under the direction of the composer, both works received definitive performances. Special praise goes to Russian virtuoso Sviatoslav Richter who plays with a sparkle and elegance not displayed in any previous recording.

"Good Afternoon and welcome to the great Canadian Rip-off!"

You know that changes have been bubbling under the Top 40 for the last three or four years. No longer is the younger generation interested in what is number 13 and what is number 14 on this week's "Cheap 30". They're tired of hearing solid gold from the summer of '62 or the latest heretical hit-bound. They're tired of hearing the "Big 30" thirty big times a day. Enough is enough and they had enough a long time ago. But what is there to turn to as an alternative? . . . well, there's always the progressive FMer who spends the majority of his time trying to put your head through and ends up doing just that. He butchers his music, talks in half meanings that he himself can no longer discern until one tends to scream for mercy and reaches for his favourite 8-track. Everyone seems to agree that the current trend is towards the FM band, (even the gospel according to B.B.M.) yet what has anyone done to salvage our stereo waves from the same spectre of apathy that looms over AM radio? It's no wonder that for the same price as one pays out for six jocks, he can automate, hire one bachelor engineer, and still turn out those tiring cliches and that redundant music, twenty four hours a day.

Personality and ingenuity in radio have been replaced by formats and policies. Young D.J. Smith has become just another labourer on the program assembly line. If he ever quit pushing his name across those 50 K.W. for as little as every third minute, his could be mistaken for any other on-air masquerade. After all, who can really distinguish "Terrible Terryland" from the "Magic Christendom"?

Hope you're foaming at the mouth by now, because your ear-weary listeners certainly are.

Station manager, be thankful that I.M.Slick, sales manager, can still badger your sponsors into believing that your audience is hearing what they want to. Be thankful that there's that "Great wealth of talent" south of the border, willing to do on-air scut work here.

Program Director, be grateful for those few

years you spent on the air . . . when was it . . . Back in '69? They really clued you in to what you're doing now. And don't forget to repay the kindness of unbeatable programming that Bill Fak and Ted Random down in Los Angeles sold you cheap. Don't let it slip your mind to keep up the facade that radio is a great exclusive form of entertainment, almost too good for your listeners. After all, you're already out of touch with them. Don't cop out now. The medium Messiah is just around the corner, and for a few thousand a month, he has a flawless plan to keep you or make you number one. So get out your rate card and your drawing board and let's start over. Don't ever sit down and think about what you're doing. That's too difficult and besides it's almost time to knock off for the day.

"We're out of time for this afternoon, but stay tuned for Stanley Stereotype with all the hits, a few token album tracks and his solid gold one-liners. We'll do it all over again tomorrow!" No doubt.

But don't listen to what some young-buck announcer, who doesn't know what he's talking about, has to say. He's just putting you on - You ought to know.

U.S. RADIO PERSONALITY DOOR SWINGS ONE WAY

There have been many complaints over the past few years on the unfairness displayed by U.S. Immigration and the Dept. of Labour who appear to work hand in glove to keep out Canadian professionals.

Much of this has centred around musical groups but apparently the Toronto Musicians Union have helped ease the situation - and they're keeping it a secret.

It has come to light that yet another area of Canadian talent has become the victim of American protectionism - the Canadian radio personality. It's the habit of many Canadian broadcasters to make a yearly pilgrimage across the U.S. in an attempt to pick up an American voice or one capable of management duties. All that is necessary to get them across the border is a big buck and a promise of employment. But try swinging the door the other way.

Case in point, Donny Burns, one of the top professional voices in Canadian radio and anchor man at the highly rated CKGM Montreal. Apparently Burns came to the attention of the program director of WLS in Chicago and an offer of a job with an almost unbelievable salary was reportedly made. Burns was somewhat hesitant in leaving a position that made him a big fish

in a little pond for one in a highly competitive market and the opposite - a small fish in a big pond. However, and apparently with CKGM's blessing he figured now was the time to break into the big time. Not so said U.S. Immigration. It would take time to clear, but WLS was hot for Burns, as an immediate acquisition. Result - Burns lost the job, the big bucks and the one chance to show U.S. programmers that Canada is a highly lucrative market for the commercially sincere radio voice with that extra ingredient missing in so many of their U.S. counterparts - professionalism.





To many broadcasters this may come as a surprise. They'll probably be the last to know. They're so deeply involved in the formula of what the listeners want to hear, they are missing out on one thing...what the listeners want to hear.

Radio isn't the living medium that the programmers want us to believe it is. Radio is falling behind the times.

Any change in the thinking of the formula that the programmer has "bought" takes a long time to sink in, but there is one area of innovation.

This is the time that another radio station in the market could move quickly to topple the top guy or at least start to upset the ratings. A good sound and a promotion based on the 50s could and possibly would pull in a lot of demographically sound listeners. The 50s are coming back and the reason is that the attitudes of the listener are changing. Everything is changing.

An article on shorter hairstyles is scheduled for RPM in the next couple of weeks. Some noted hairstylists of men's hair say that the hair is going and that beards and moustaches are also hitting the ground. The revolution is over and the peaceful "nothingness" of the 50s is coming back. The sound should reflect this and a few stations have taken the initiative. What worries me is that Canadians and Canadian radio usually pick up trends too late.

So 1972 became the year that rock came back (if it ever left us). There is always the possibility that programming was "had". What the public really wanted was entertainment and the pop culture was nothing but a myth that perpetuated itself into a monster and died a sad death. The pop culture did bring with it the ills of the

revolution. We will be glad to see them go. Hair and drugs and student rebellion were not created by the music of the late 60s, but it possibly did a great deal to promote these undesirable elements.

The question now is what is going to happen to progressive FM formats. They will either have to change or disappear. If they were programming to a minority before, they will soon be playing to a non-existent audience.

All this is food for thought as the sound of the 50s comes back and possibly something you read here may move you or your station to get out and play what the public wants to hear.

Long live rock and roll, and radio as an entertaining medium, not just a computer or a format or a scientific formula that would only appeal to other computers or the media Messiahs. I think I'm repeating myself from a couple of years back.

CHUM'S WATERS MAKES BID FOR VANCOUVER'S CKVN

Allan Waters, president of CHUM Ltd. and whose recent bids to move into the Montreal market via the Marconi complex and CFOX were denied by the CRTC, has now turned his attention to Canada's west coast and CKVN. It has been reported that Waters has completed purchase negotiations with CKVN owner Jack Tietolman for the station. The purchase is now subject to approval by the CRTC.

There is already early indication of a growing wave of opposition to Waters' bid, even from Western Canadian broadcasters. Independent record producers and some record companies have become increasingly incensed over the CRTC's lack of action with regard to Waters' record production company, MUCH Productions of Montreal. Noted one observer: "It's unfair to groups like April Wine and solo acts like Pagliaro who are fantastic talents but because they do come under Much Productions, they are suspected of being pawns in an unfair competition for the marketplace - a situation balanced in Much's favour through the very existence of the CHUM radio empire."

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SLAIGHT ADDS TO COUNTRY EMPIRE

Allan Slaight, one of Canada's most successful country broadcaster and president of CFGM Toronto, will try his country format on Montreal's through his newly acquired CFOX outlet. CRTC approval for the Slaight takeover came at 10:30 AM July 13, while he and his wife Aida were airborne to Montreal for a CFOX country bash at the posh Bonaventure Hotel. It was just a matter of fancy footwork and damned hard work on the part of Slaight's PR people in Montreal that created last minute interest by local press and television people to attend a press conference that same day at 5 PM. The party tied in beautifully with a gathering of Country Music people, in town for a meeting. So, July 13, which wasn't a Friday, turned into a lucky day for Allan Slaight. He was able to host a combined press conference and reception for CMA delegates and the French and English press and make the announcement that CFOX was moving to country music within ten days.

CFOX actually hit the sleepy-time Pointe

Hot! Hot! Hot! says CKY's Ann Stark referring to Foot In Coldwater's, "Anything", "Dance" by Pagliaro and "Carolyn" by Terry McManus. Ann is particularly heavy on the latter and hopes to see McManus break nationally. The Silver Bird entry of "Getting Together" was an original Roy Hennessy prediction of a "hit" and Ann goes along with him for this Vancouver-based group.

Alice Cooper into CKLW's number one spot. Country: Dallas Harms now at the top of the heap at CHOO. Scotty Stevenson, Jack Greene, and Freddy Weller stiffed.

Alice Cooper number one in Charlottetown after three weeks. "Masquerade", "Too Young" and "Bad Side of the Moon" 'really hot'. "Ride Johnny Ride" by Mashmakan now breaking.

"Beautiful" stiffing in Saint John. Wayne Newton still CHSJ's most requested. Conelius Bros. and Neil Diamond still hot at the phones. "Gitchy Goomey" from the "Moods" LP added and pulling strong phone action.

"Wild Eyes" will almost certainly be certified gold in the next few weeks. "Told ya' so!" Disc now slowing in some markets after eight to ten weeks of play but still showing strongly in many markets.

Hollies jump 12-6 at CHUM. Bobby Vinton 13-7. No stiffs. Stampeders' "Wild Eyes" hits number one after 5 weeks of play at CKXL. "Concrete Sea" by Terry Jacks picking up strong requests. Anne Murray's "Robbie's Song" stiffs at No. 28.

Claire (West Island) community with a 48 hour "Country Classic Kick-Off" Friday July 21st at 6 PM. This included giant country hits being programmed in sets of three with listeners being asked to phone-in for their favourite. The top request number, tagged "champion" was then played again along with two new "Challengers" with this sequence being repeated around-the-clock until Sunday evening at 6 PM when the "Country Classic Champ" was named. Then - CFOX concentrated on its new country format.

Getting back to the Slaight party, several big names from Canadian country were in attendance including Columbia's Ian Tyson; Tommy Hunter, recently dropped from the Columbia roster; Gary Buck, a Director of the CMA, flew in from his Calgary date and returned the same day; and top Quebec artists, Jerry and Joanne. On hand from the CMA were: Jo Walker, Janet Gavin; Tompall Glaser; Harry Jenkins; Wesley H. Rose; Leroy Van Dyke; Don Nelson of WIRE; Lee Zhito, Billboard and many others.

Harold Moon, General Manager BMI Canada Ltd., and one of the first Canadian Directors of the CMA was also in for the meeting and press conference. Mr. Moon has been one of the prime boosters of the Canadian music scene for many years, particularly country music, and during the CMA meeting was taken off guard when he was presented with a special Award honouring him for his past efforts insofar as country music, generally, was concerned. A fitting tribute from the

CMA.

In from Toronto were CFGM's program director John Hart and music director Dave Johnson and RPM's publisher.

During the press conference Slaight revealed that the total cost of the takeover, including assumption of certain debts was in the neighbourhood of one million dollars. He also outlined the corporate structure of the new operation - Radio CFOX, Inc. a new Quebec company, as being formed with 80% of the equity held by Slaight Broadcasting, 10% by former CFOX owner Gord Sinclair Jr. who stays on as General Manager, 5% by sales manager Martin Conroy and 5% by operations manager Bernard Greeley. Four of the seven directors of the new company are from the West Island or Greater Montreal. Slaight stressed that "CFOX would continue, and improve where possible, its service to the West Island community of Montreal."

It was also pointed up by Slaight that the growth of country music in North America has been somewhat phenomenal over the past few years. In 1961 there were 80 stations programming country full time. Last year the total had increased to more than 700. This year there are upwards of 790 outlets playing country music exclusively - a jump of 14% in the last year alone.

It's interesting to note that Slaight's CFGM operation ranks second or third in average audience in the 18-34, 25-49 and 18-49 age groups among all English stations in Canada, according to the latest B.B.M.

agree that it is impossible to find new forms and new kinds of presentation to fulfill these essential requirements of service as set out in the Broadcasting Act.

The Commission recognizes the difficulty of the task facing the Corporation. It must produce programs which are of a high standard representing, a distinct contribution to the overall Canadian broadcasting system and which, at the same time, will enjoy as wide acceptance as possible from the public. However, only the difficulty of such a task can justify the need of a tax-supported institution to achieve the objective.

The Commission also is of the opinion that the CBC should phase out the carriage of commercials on its French and English radio networks except where they are indispensable to ensure the availability of programs of exceptional interest. In arriving at this view, the Commission takes into account that annual earnings from commercial advertising on CBC radio total approximately \$2 million as against total annual publicly supplied funds of \$35 million.

In reaching its conclusion concerning the proposed radio policy, the Commission has also been greatly influenced by another consideration. CBC radio service was introduced in 1936. The purpose of this service was and still remains to provide to all Canadians radio programming of a truly distinctive nature in English and in French. In 1972, this goal still remains to be achieved for a large part of the population. According to the best available figures there are still millions of Canadians who only receive a small portion of CBC radio programs in English or in French. A full CBC schedule represents approximately 130 hours a week. Millions of Canadians of English or French language receive only a part of those programs. The number of hours received in some areas can be as low as 14 hours of the English language schedule or as low as 27 hours of the French language schedule.

It would not seem realistic to say that only 20% or 25% of CBC radio programs are essential. People in the larger centres of Canada receive 130 hours a week of CBC radio programs - 100%. Presumably, all these programs are considered essential by the Corporation or otherwise they would not be produced. One cannot argue either that they are essential for the larger centres and not essential for the smaller centres. Indeed, the larger centres have many radio stations, some of them 10 or even 18; so they need 130 hours of CBC programs only because these programs presumably contribute something indispensable and which is not otherwise available. If this is so, then such programs become even more desirable for more distant areas of the country which do not enjoy the cultural facilities and opportunities of the larger centres.

The CRTC is very favourable in principle to the establishment of more English and French FM stations and to the

development of a French FM network. Since some cities in Canada have enjoyed this kind of service for a number of years, it is fair that a similar service should gradually be extended to other parts of the country as funds become available.

However, the Commission is deeply concerned about any proposal to add a second CBC radio service in some areas while many other culturally less privileged areas are still lacking a first full CBC service. As a consequence, the Commission wishes to defer a decision on the applications by the CBC for six FM stations and a French FM network. The Commission will reconsider this matter as soon as the questions of policy raised in the present decision have been solved to the satisfaction of the Commission.

The Commission is also of the opinion that the Corporation should investigate the possibility of affiliating some of the private FM stations now in existence with its English and French FM operations.

MONIQUE LEYRAC SPECIAL ON CTV

CTV aired last week (17) the Monique Leyrac special, taped live at Toronto's Massey Hall, late last year. The show, "Monique Leyrac Magnifique", opened with "C'est Toute Une Musique" and moved through such numbers as "Good Morning Starshine", "La Joie de Vivre" and "The Minute Waltz".

Canadian composers were well represented with Lightfoot's "Song for a Winter's Night" and Gilles Vigneault's "Ste. Adele P.Q.". The special was produced and directed for CTV by Gerry Rochon at CFTO.


