

MARTY BUTLER PICKS UP \$10,000 FROM MOLSON'S

The recent "Hear Canada Singing" contest sponsored by Molson's Brewery (Canadian) and the Canadian Conference of the Arts, has left Montrealer Marty Butler \$10,000 richer. Butler's entry, "Can't You Hear The Music" was picked from more than 5000 entries, reportedly the largest competition of its kind ever staged in Canada.



Butler along with the five runners up will be featured on a CTV Network Special which was taped Oct. 25 for televising Dec. 5 at 10PM. Performing the winning entries will be Ocean, Stompin' Tom Connors, Emmanuelle, The Travellers, Ian and Sylvia Tyson, Ginette Reno, and Butler who will perform his winning entry.

CONTROVERSY RAGES OVER "MOM'S APPLE PIE" ALBUM

The recent release of "Mom's Apple Pie" album on Terry Knight's Brown Bag Records has created much controversy that can only help to sell millions of copies of the album. The controversy began, according to reports, when an ad placed in a U.S. trade paper, was censored by the magazine which placed a white "X" over the controversial slice of apple pie on the LP cover. Because of this several major retail outlets, rack and even radio stations have reacted with caution. It has been reported that WLS in Chicago and WIXY in Cleveland refused to accept the 60-second radio spots promoting the album. Apparently it was rejected on grounds that it would only serve to promote the "obscene" album cover itself into the hands of innocent and unsuspecting youth.

United Artists, who distribute the label, have reportedly offered to place an "X" sticker over the wrapping on future albums, but this hasn't been received with too much enthusiasm.

A censored version of the album cover is scheduled for a large Sunset Strip (Los Angeles) billboard the first of November. It too will have a white "X" covering the slice of apple pie.

It is rumoured that a revised version of the album may be in the works. This is similar to the action taken over the Beatles' album, "Yesterday and Today" which pictured the Beatles surrounded by decapitated dolls and pieces of chopped meat.

STONEY PRODUCTIONS SIGNS DONNA WOODWARD

Stoney Productions Ltd. of North Vancouver, British Columbia today announced the signing of singer Donna Woodward to a three year recording contract. Her first single titled Winter Winds penned by herself, will be released shortly by VAN-LOS Music International Limited.

Donna Woodward, although a new comer to the national/international music scene, is a familiar voice and face to concert goers and TV viewers in her home city of Kamloops, B.C. and throughout the Okanagan Valley.

Miss Woodward is the first artist to be signed by Stoney Productions Ltd., implementing its policy of developing Canadian talent.

TAPESTRY SAYS IT ALL IN PRESS RELEASE

Tapestry have shown good initial form with the release of their Polydor single, "And The Music Doesn't Seem To Be Going Anywhere". The Montreal-based group have been trying to break into the disc scene for some time and with this release, they are almost assured a berth on the charts.

Tapestry's press release is somewhat unique in that they use their writing talents to tell their own story, which goes like this:

"And the music doesn't seem to be going anywhere

GRT'S GREEN BREAKS DOCTOR MUSIC SINGLE

Using some of the program moxie he acquired during his days with radio, GRT's national promotion manager, Larry Green, came up with a unique promotion that resulted in Doctor Music getting their foot in the door nationally.

A mailing of the single, "Long Time Comin' Home" went out to MOT, MOR, Adult Contemporary, progressive FM and Campus radio stations along with a request that if the programmer thought the single had potential, to hold onto it until Oct. 14. Results: 13 stations did the Oct. 13 thing and now a total of 23 stations from coast to coast have either charted or playlisted the record. Green has received assurances from many other stations that almost guarantees him a hit single within the next couple of weeks.

This new Doctor Music deck is the first record to feature their seven piece group and, according to observers, is their strongest bid for the charts yet. Much of their popularity has been due their hectic tour dates that saw them into most Western Canadian centres this past summer. They will shortly embark for a month long tour of the Atlantic Provinces.

FLUDD GETTING IT ON FOR DAFFODIL ALBUM

What could be Canada's big group of the year, Fludd have broken into the market with their first single for Daffodil, "Always Be Thinking Of You", featuring their newest addition, Peter Csanky on mellotron and piano. Csanky has added much confidence to the group who are now satisfied they are ready to crack the world market.

They are currently putting it all together at Toronto's Manta Studios with Lee de Carlo giving an assist on production.

It's interesting to note the many kudos the group received from reviewers across the country on their recent tour. Jeani Read of the Vancouver Province read them as being "a beautifully engineered mechanism with a remarkably precise, unfaltering movement. Fludd is uncompromising as well as uncomplicated. The feel is rhythm, and it can be addictive." Andy Mellen, writing in the Winnipeg Free Press, reported: "I was caught off guard by the band's dynamic stage presence and straight-ahead rocking and rolling." The Vancouver Sun's Jack Wasserman found them "as exciting as any group to come down the pike in some time, and that includes the Rolling Stones." From Ritchie Yorke in Billboard: "Fludd was in dynamic form. 'Underwater Music' nicely demonstrated the ability of guitarist Brian Pilling, while brother Ed delivered a formidable blend of showmanship and vocal power. Drummer John Andersen and bass player Greg Godovitz lay down a solid rhythm line to support a strong trio of vocal harmonies — a world act."

Fludd appeared on the recent Maple Music Junket (Toronto) but were obviously ahead of their time, if that's any excuse for the ill mannered heads and other boors making up the audience for their Massey Hall concert.

They were one of the few groups on the bill attempting creativity with their music — an almost lost art with today's musicians. This may have prompted Peter Goddard to write in Miss Chatelaine: "Surrounded by other dreary groups, they emerged with flash and style . . . what happened to the Rolling Stones in seven years has happened to Fludd in 7 months."

INSTANT HIT FOR MWC'S RICH DODSON

Rich Dodson, lead guitar and anchor man for writing material for the Stampeders, is off and already running up the charts with his solo entry, "Julia Get Up". The single was given an early boost by J. Robert Wood who gave the nod to the proposed single in the initial CHUM Report.

Dodson wrote the international smash, "Sweet City Woman" which launched the Calgary group into the circle of world disc winners. They recently represented Canada at the Rio Song Festival and are currently touring Europe to packed after packed house.

A group single is expected to be released on their return from Europe.

LIGHTHOUSE CAPS TOUR AT L.A.'S WHISKEY

Canada's Lighthouse, currently riding the charts with their "Sunny Days/Lonely Places" single, have just completed a successful tour of Western Canada. The tour included Penticton, Calgary, Red Deer, Edmonton, Lethbridge, Saskatoon, Regina, Brandon and Winnipeg, with all concerts sold out well before show time. Lighthouse played two shows in Saskatoon to accommodate the demand for tickets and for the first time in Winnipeg's history, a rock band performed three concerts due to heavy demand. In North Battleford, Sask., they put on a benefit concert for the Red Pheasant Indian Reserve to raise funds for a recreation hall for the youngsters of the reserve raising \$2,500 for the youth centre. They were made honorary members of the Reserve.

Following a brief rest in Toronto, Lighthouse moved out to Portland, Ore., on Sept. 29th and Nelson, B.C. on Sept. 30th.

Their October schedule included: Kamloops, B.C. (4), Kelowna, B.C. (5), Kimberly, B.C. (6), Missoula, Montana (7), San Jose, California (12-13), Sacramento, Cal., (10) San Francisco on the 14th., and the Whiskey in Los Angeles the 18th thru to the 22nd.

LONDON'S MACDONALD HIGH ON URIAH HEEP

London's foreign production rep., Jim Macdonald, has taken over his new duties with a full roster of foreign groups and single artists into Ontario for dates.

Most recent to finalize appearances is Uriah Heep whose latest Mercury album release "Demons & Wizards" has made good gains up the RPM 100 Albums Chart. They are scheduled for Toronto, November 28 to be followed by Hamilton, December 3 and Sudbury (4). The concerts will also feature Miller Anderson, formerly with the Keef Hartley Band before going solo. Miller picked up heavy progressive FM airplay with his Deram album, also distributed by London.

PHILLIPS-LEHY SINGERS RECEIVES CHML NOD

Always on the lookout to give CHML listeners a heavy variety of music, George Patton, music director of the Hamilton adult contemporary giant, has discovered another listener "turn on", this time from a Vancouver-based label, Van-Los. The single, "Those Were The Days", the theme song from the popular television series, "All In The Family", was taped by The Phillips-Lehy Singers and their banjo band. Unfortunately there is no information available as to where the session was taped or who was in charge of production. It's to be assumed however, the single does qualify as Canadian content. No distributor information available.

Patton just recently forced the release, in Canada, of "Playground In My Mind" by Clint Holmes on the Epic label. He received the single through his U.S. record service, and on airing, found strong listener approval.

APRIL WINE/LONDON DO PROMOTION TRIP

April Wine's return to the Ontario market coincided nicely with the release of their latest Aquarius album, "On Record". London's Vince Lasch, handling only Canadian content product, teed up a round of promotion with record stores that returned good sales for both their album and single ("Drop Your Guns").

One of the most responsive retailers was Sam's at Sherway Gardens, Etobicoke, a Toronto suburb. Managers Lou Cooper and Hal Hill arranged for an autograph session with pre-publicity via newspaper and radio mentions arranged by Lasch making the autograph session a success. Several breakout market radio stations in Ontario have either playlisted or charted their single. These include: CKWS/Kingston, CJBK/London, CKBB/Barrie, CHLO/St. Thomas, CHEX/Peterboro, CKPT/Peterboro, and CHAM/Hamilton. CKLW has listed the single as Hitbound.

THUNDER MOVES AHEAD IN LABEL WORK

Slated for completion in early October, is the new Edward Bear LP with Eugene Martynec producing and Bill Seddon engineering . . . Also in the Capitol corner with the same producer/engineer team is New Potatoes.

Bill Amesbury is in the final stages of producing and performing (lead vocal) on his new album for Ached Records "Mama Aint That Moon Shinin' Down So Fine".

The CBC has just recorded the main title theme to their new TV series Bandwagon . . . and the basic tracks for the new Tommy Hunter Show were laid also at Thunder.

CITY-TV AKA "Channel 79" has just recorded their theme song "People City" sung by Tomny Ambrose who also penned the music.

Due for release in early October is the new Flying Circus LP recently completed at Thunder with engineer Bill Seddon, entitled "Gypsy Road" also due out at about the same time is the new Bob McBride single "Pretty City Lady" both to be released on Capitol.

As usual, Thunder is handling a wide variety of jingle work.

Perhaps somewhere along the line, we pictured a Utopian meeting where all the problems of the industry would be ironed out. It didn't happen.

Time is needed to find many of the solutions. Only now are we facing the problems head-on. It could only be a meeting like

C5 that would bring about facts and opinions. Again, I must say that the meeting was not organized as an action committee that would decree and follow through.

Somewhere along the line, the idea of the meeting did get lost. We weren't there to find the problems and map out a long road that might lead to their solutions. The differences of the broadcaster (programmer) and the record people seemed to crash head on from the very first moment the large gathering began the discussions.

Strangely enough, most of those who attended didn't realize that the problems were so great. Many felt the meeting had gone extremely well. It was long after the meeting was over when it became clear to some that the Canadian music industry was in trouble, and the trouble was serious.

The gap between the contemporary programmers and the recordmakers has been growing. The wounds that festered over the years have become painfully serious because of the 30% Canadian music ruling. The programmers of hits feel that record companies just aren't producing enough.

They are of the opinion that there is a definite disparity in the amount of Canadian content they must play and the amount the industry is making available. They indicated that other programmers don't have the same problem in that they are not so tightly formatted. In programming, the temps feel they have been saddled with a hardship. Their sound is suffering.

The problem is therefore simple. There should be more Canadian content coming from the record makers.

How can more product become available, and how can that product be of a better quality? That is the big question.

One of the suggestions was that Canadian content be subsidized by government funding. Perhaps the CRTC had too much

faith in the recordmakers when they came up with the 30 percent ruling.

The CRTC could lower the percentage requirement for all broadcasters, make particular exceptions, drop the ruling entirely or who knows what?

Contemporary programmers did indicate at C5 that there was more progress being made with Cancon before the ruling came into effect.

A number of artists also feel they could do better without the ruling. It was indicated at C5 by Terry Jacks, quite emphatically that he had indications from foreign markets that the "forced play" of Canadian records had been a factor in the lack of success of some Canadian hits. He also mentioned that artists had not been asked about their opinion of the ruling before it was passed, commenting that he in particular had no knowledge that such a move was being planned.

A contemporary programmer revealed that, before the ruling, disc jockeys were anxious to play Canadian content. Nothing made them prouder to be Canadians than to see a Canadian record climb the charts. Since the ruling, the same programmers viewed Canadian content with dismay. Some refer to Canadian records, that had to be played as "beavers" and their lack of enthusiasm is passed on to the listeners. The result is useless airplay and records that get played in cycles and played too often and then are dropped. Sales and listener response doesn't match that of the foreign product being aired. They feel that they can't "work" Canadian records. The ruling is a handicap.

With no tape available from the programming and promotion workshop, I have tried to relate the feelings and the content of the discussions that occurred in Vancouver. If I have misinterpreted anything that was said at that workshop, there are 70 or 80 industry people who can correct me, and correct me they must, because these comments go out to the trade. They are the only evidence that can be presented to those who weren't in Vancouver and at that workshop.

The problem is serious. It is costing the industry millions of dollars because of a lack of progress. The problem must be solved and new ideas and changes must be suggested.

This is a crucial point in the development of the Canadian music industry.

RCA ARTISTS ON THE MOVE

RCA recording artist Gary Buck moves into Toronto's Horseshoe Tavern from Oct. 23 through Nov. 4th. Buck has been busy with his own label, Arpeggio which he partners with well-known arranger John Arpin. Following Buck into the country showplace will be Newfoundland's Dick Nolan from Nov. 20 through Dec. 2nd. Nolan was just recently presented with an RPM Gold Leaf Award certifying his "Fisherman's Boy" RCA Camden album as having sold in excess of 35,000 albums. The album has actually sold more than 100,000 copies which forced RCA to rush release the "Aunt Martha's Sheep" cut as a single. It was this selection that started the whole island of Newfoundland buzzing after being aired on VOCM. The Award was presented to Nolan at a lavish

Gold Record Night, sponsored by VOCM at St. John's Arts Centre. Many Newfoundland recording artists including Harry Hibbs and Michael T. Wall and others, appeared on the show along with Nolan's fifteen year old daughter, Bonnie, a singer in her own right. Nolan has just released another single, "Home Again This Year", which was produced at Audat Studios in Halifax. Bernie McKinley, branch Manager of Crawford Record Sales, has telexed information that the single has already created "Nolan Mania" all over again with orders totalling more than 30,000 the first week of release.

John Lee Hooker, always drawing good crowds in Canada, takes over the Colonial Tavern (Toronto) from Oct. 23 through Nov. 4.



LAWRENCE ROSEBERRY RELEASES ON SOLAR





JUTTA NEY SAYS IT!

Amen. Jay Jeffrie, CHSJ Radio said it all. Working for a production company that produces strictly Canadian product, the letter really hit home. Especially since I just returned from a promotion tour with one of our groups. We visited several secondary and one major market. At one of the secondary markets, we ran into a programmer who would not take a chance on an unproven group. He wanted chart listings to justify his playing the single in question. And he didn't want secondary chart listings, but numbers from majors. I was under the illusion that with a new group you break the single through the secondary markets and feed the figures back to the majors. Now with this new attitude where do we go from here. Admitted, there are a lot of secondary markets who take a record, listen to it, looking for its value in musical ability and production, but a lot are now asking for listings from majors. And now there are majors who are more willing to take a chance on a record by trusting their own judgment. But this reversal in attitude on the part of secondary markets can quickly put to ruin all the progress we've made in the past year.

By the looks of it, it's time for a re-evaluation on the part of radio stations. The Canadian Music industry has made some big strides forward, and isn't it time that Canadian music was judged for quality all the way round, on the same basis as music from any other part of the world? Isn't it time we forget about the stigma attached to the word "Canadian" and let a record speak for itself, no matter where it was produced? And isn't it time radio stations accepted an accurate picture of themselves, their market size and their influence on the rest of Canada?

Jay Jeffrie and others like him are a vital part of our industry, but the others, the ones who won't take a chance, are the anchors that drag the progress. Hopefully, times will force them to change their opinions, or station managers will see the damage done and replace them.

A VOICE FROM THE WEST

For the past two or three years I have been following the music scene in Canada, from a varied point of view, first of all as a performer (99% western Canada) a writer (not too successful) and lately a producer and publisher (very new at both). Not in the too distant past I was one of many Canadians glued to the radio or TV as the most historic nationalist event ever recorded: The Canada; Team Canada vs the U.S.S.R.: hockey matches. It is with great interest that I see you are

My concern here is that a number of these identities will band together in support of such a western Canadian issue, not for the good of the Canadian Music scene but because they feel it will be their one chance to show the terrible eastern music people that God will get you if you're not careful. Personally I had the opportunity of being in both markets, and being a westerner may I say that never have I been treated better than in the Eastern music circles, but really in conclusion my point is simply this, let's not draw, eastern or western issues, but take them as they come, we have people all across this great country of ours who are capable. Does it matter that we say west or east, let's try Canada. I cried for joy and with pride when that last red light came on. Can we in the greatest industry of all music wave that same flag?

A VERY RESPECTFUL HOUSE FOR OTTAWA'S COCKBURN


What confidence and gall this Bernie Finkelstein has. His star performer, Bruce Cockburn, in concert at Toronto's Massey Hall (Oct. 22) and what does Finkelstein do — practically nothing. No announcements, no light changes, no production whatsoever. Just Cockburn, his guitar and a wooden chair. How the hell would you ever expect to make any money that way? Well, there were 2679 paid customers with tickets at \$3.00, \$4.00 and \$5.00, which rang up a box office of \$11,200.00, and it was all done on Canadian talent, and in cold-hearted Hogtown. Finkelstein was even forced to sell 40 post seats and if you've ever been unlucky enough to get one of these — you really have to believe in the artist.

Cockburn was the first Canadian single artist, outside of Gordon Lightfoot, to sell out Massey Hall on his second to last concert of this successful tour. The Toronto gig was the highest grosser of the tour. He does his hometown of Ottawa at the National Arts Centre Nov. 15.

The evening was electric. Cockburn laughed with his audience and they thundered their approval after each set, giving him standing ovations. Says Finkelstein: "The Toronto concert was my greatest moment since I've been in the business. The audience respect was phenomenal."

What did the Toronto critics say? Just about everything there was to say — that was good. Jack Batten, in the Globe, wrote: "The subjects of his songs are hardly esoteric — the lyrics offer serenades to love, to country living, to music itself, and they evoke home and sunshine and rain — but it's Cockburn's special talent to write of them with insights that seem special and unique." The Star's Peter Goddard, "Bruce Cockburn appeared not only as a musician but as some sort of philosopher-poet with silence and calm as his message. The evening had an unearthly quiet about it. There was hush before and during his almost two-hour performance

which was only broken by the two standing ovations. Cockburn was accorded for his two encores." Bill Gray, writing in the Sun, found that Cockburn "is able to communicate with an audience on a one to one basis more easily and more genuinely than any other performer one can think of currently plying his trade in Canada. The crowd was so obviously hanging on every




word, every note, every gesture, that it became in a very real sense an audience participation event."

So, the Toronto critics love Cockburn which, in some cases would be almost as good as having your record programmed on all three Toronto rock stations. However, in Cockburn's case, it means more. He draws his following from the street and he was able to pack Massey Hall without having a hit single. That's communication, and with a team like Cockburn and Finkelstein, who are always in touch with a "common touch", his True North albums will continue to chalk up solid sales and he will probably return, again and again to packed houses in don't-give-a-damn Toronto.

HAROLD TATER'S OPENER LACKS USUAL FINESS

It used to be when you were invited to a Harold Tater opening of an act or room, you could be assured of a memorable (pleasing) evening. Tater unfortunately, went the way of "mass appeal" with the opening of Harold's, a new supper club/lounge at 89 Avenue Road in Toronto. Although there were many of the old Tater supporters in attendance, they were leaving almost as soon as they arrived, being replaced by the "dregs of society" — agency people, most of whom should have ended up on the cutting room floor — years ago.

However, it was a memorable (whatever way you look at it) evening and Tater has entered yet another realm of night life entertainment. One agency observer, crawling out to his car, noted: "This has been the party of the year."

Tater was one of the original innovators of Toronto night life. He converted the Cav-A-Bob into one of the most successful

LONDON PUSHING MARKS' SWEET PLUM SINGLE

Harry Marks, regarded as one of Montreal's finest studio musicians, has shown good form with his initial release on the Sweet Plum label, "Sad and Simple Man". Marks has been receiving an extra promotion push from Jerry Renewych of Chappelle Music; Brian Chater, manager Much Productions and the entire London promotion network. Both he and Chater have just concluded a cross-country promotion tour. He is currently writing background music for the National Film Board as well as new material for his first album for Sweet Plum, expected for release in mid-November.

MCA ARTISTS INVADE TORONTO

MCA Records capitalized on their appearance and extended invitations to dealers and members of the radio and press to watch the band on the Tuesday evening of their engagement. Hot on the heels of Osibisa's Toronto gig, MCA is releasing their third album, "Heads".

On the Wednesday of that week, October 11th, Toronto was treated to yet some more British rock skillfully doled out by Wishbone Ash. They appeared to an enthusiastic audience at Massey Hall which was the first appearance on their busy third North American tour. The tour started off on a lucky note as Wishbone's last album release, "Argus", was voted Top British Album in the 1972 Melody Maker Pop Poll.

PATSY GALLANT BREAKS INTO ENGLISH CANADA

Conquering one goal after another in her climb to international stardom, the pert young beauty, name of Patsy Gallant has entered into probably one of the most difficult stages of her career — the English market. However, her initial attempt would appear to have been quite successful. Her vehicle, "Get That Ball", her first single for Columbia, was first broken by John Mackey, program director at CKGM. Ironically, RPM's Communication Four meeting took place in Montreal at about the time of release which gave Columbia's A&R chief John Williams the opportunity to reach many of Canada's principal and breakout market programmers.

Just shortly after the C4 meeting, Miss Gallant broke nationally which prompted Columbia to set out on a heavy promotion campaign to tie up the loose ends. Saleswise, the single is a success in the Quebec market with Ontario now beginning to show an encouraging return.

How did it all begin, and how did a pretty young French thing put together her English so beautifully that she sounds as if she was teethered on it? Well, that's just about what happened. Miss Gallant was born in Campbellton, New Brunswick, where English was spoken but French was the way of life, so she was able to master both languages — naturally.

Confidence came early in her life when, at the age of five she joined her three older sisters and hit the Maritime circuit as the Gallant Sisters. In between schooling she managed to hang on for fifteen years as one of the Gallant Sisters touring fairs and being interviewed and performing on radio and television. In 1967 she decided to go solo and released a single which led to television appearances on "Music Hop", "Discoteque", "Jeunesse Oblige" and "Smash". A short time later she appeared with Charles Aznavour at Montreal's Place des Arts and again at the same place with Donald Lautrec. Her career in Quebec was solid. She was much in demand for appearances on television shows throughout the province as well as playing concerts — all of which pulled capacity houses.

Miss Gallant first met songwriter Yves Lapierre in 1969 when she became involved in the commercial/jingle business. One of her first commercial ventures was for the Ford Motor Co. Her group was tagged Ford-A-Maniacs and helped extend her career into this lucrative field.

Because she was making a good deal of money, her next step was to find someone who could manage her affairs. Her choice was Ian MacDonald, who has successfully guided her recording and personal appearance activities to the present. She has enjoyed much success in the Quebec market, particularly with her movie theme singles, "Theme From L'Initiation" and "Theme From Ya Pas De Trou A Perce".

With "Get That Ball" having established Miss Gallant in English Canada, Columbia have followed up with her first English album, "Upon My Own". The record is 100% Canadian in content and was produced by Yves Lapierre at Andre Perry Studios. Material for Miss Gallant is penned by close friends including LaPierre, Ken Owen, Judi Richards, Denis Forcier, Steve Kroll, Michael Hart and J.G. Chapudos. Her group is comprised of seven members including two female back-up singers. Her songwriting career is just now beginning to take shape and it's expected future releases will carry her name as writer.

Miss Gallant opens at the Friar's in Toronto Oct. 30 for one week at which time it's expected Columbia will create a "star image" around what could be one of the first of a new crop of English/French artists.

EXTRAORDINARY PRESS KIT FOR WELLS' DISC RELEASE

Arpeggio recording artist, Neville Wells, bows the disc scene with an extraordinarily designed press kit that should add that ingredient of importance so lacking in many Canadian releases. Wells' manager, Gerald J. Belisle, has made a study of disc promotion and designed this kit to bring the necessary attention to his Newfoundland charge.

Wells has been living in the Ottawa area for several years. He received his B.A. at Carleton University. He has run the gauntlet of country/rock/folk artist, sharing the bill with Bruce Cockburn, Murray McLauchlan, David Wiffen, Ian and Sylvia as well as an appearance with Cedrick Smith at the Ottawa National Arts Centre. Coffee Houses, he's done most of them in Eastern Canada as well as the club scene, same area. He's also toured the U.S. college circuit — his most successful with Frank Wakefield, well known Blue Grass instrumentalist/vocalist. Television, he's had a shot at the big ones including "Hi Diddle Day" (CBC-TV) and "Let's Sing Out (CTV) as well as local CJCH-TV shows, "Both Sides Now" with David Wiffen and "Call It Country".

First single release from Wells, "If You Will See Me Through", is a pleasant surprise. From his credits, one might expect anything from a commercial rock screamer to an institutional folky. Wells presents neither. His is a pleasant adult contemporary sound with just enough country to make it interesting. His voice is something less than dynamic but it's got a punch that lasts. The arrangements, by John Arpin and production by Gary Buck are excellent. A guess at where it was produced — RCA Studios in Toronto.

The plug side of his first release is a self penning. The flip, "The Songwriter", was penned by Ottawa's Carisse and Rawlins.

It's interesting to note Wells' attitude toward audiences. In a recent interview with Robert A. Fowler which appeared in the Saturday Citizen, Wells was quoted as saying: "Coffee houses are all similar in that the management, and often the entertainers, demand attention. The audiences

Miss Mortifee sang her own music for the multi-media production, which was well received in Canada and the U.S. Another tour is expected early next next year.

Morrison has rearranged the music for the album which was produced at Studio 3 in Vancouver. The album is an all-Canadian production.

With his Kanata deck, "Hard Life Alone/Season Of Plenty" showing excellent chart moves, Ray Materick has found himself in much demand for appearances. He moves into London's popular coffee house, Smale's Pace for one week (Oct. 31-Nov. 5) with several other dates pending.

Materick has been receiving an extra heavy promotion push from Kanata and London Records (distributors of the label). Billy Kearns of Kanata, who attended C5 in Vancouver, worked the west coast and stopped off in as many centres as time would allow on his return to Toronto. Results have been exceptional with most of the breakout and principal markets giving a berth to Materick's new deck. The strength of the single would appear to lie in its potential with stations programming an adult contemporary format.

TOTH COORDINATES U.S. JAZZ SPECIAL

Jerry Toth will be Music Co-ordinator, Arranger and Consultant for the biggest jazz show ever to be assembled in years. Featuring Duke Ellington, Count Basie, with Joe Williams, Ella Fitzgerald, Dave Brubeck, The Original Benny Goodman Quartet and Doc Severinsen. Taping will take place at Lincoln Centre in New York October 23rd.

Toth's most recent credits: Bobby Gentry, Wayne Newton, Ray Stevens and George Kirby Specials also Canada's own Wayne & Shuster shows plus producing many CTL albums.

CTV'S ROLLIN' FEATURES FIVE MAN ELECTRICAL BAND

Many rumours of a split in the ranks of the Five Man Electrical Band have caused problems with the group. According to Doug Speers, now living in Toronto, the rumours are "just not true". They are still receiving good airplay with their Polydor single "Money Back Guarantee" but it just hasn't been as strong a follow-up to "Signs" as first believed.

The group have taken a breather from their touring which became pretty hectic last year. Out of twelve months they toured one nighters for ten and a half months. They recently taped a couple of solo albums for Les Emmerson and Rick Belanger as well as another group set. Release dates are now being set up. Their touring activity will cease until sometime in February but they will be putting material together for future albums in the meantime.

On their return to Toronto they taped a segment for CTV's "Rollin" series which was televised Oct. 30. Speers remained in Toronto while Brian Rading and Michael Belanger went on to their hometown of Ottawa and Emerson, Rick Belanger and Ted Gerow returned to Los Angeles.

Much of their material is written by Emmerson with their production being handled by Dallas Smith at Sound City Recorders in Los Angeles.

The Conservative rally with Robert Stanfield holding forth, will be one of the largest and last, of this election fight, and takes place in Stanfield's own stomping grounds. Oct. 30 will decide: Mainline or Crowbar?

Bev Marie, Rodeo recording artist, has shown good promise with her second single release on the Rodeo label, "Life Is Like A Merry Go Round". A native of Oshawa, Miss Marie has gained a strong following with her many appearances on jamborees as well as interviews on local radio and television shows.

Miss Marie's initial release for Rodeo, "There's A Little Town (Bobcaygeon)" picked up heavy play particularly in the Ontario Kawartha's holiday region while the flip, "Jessie's Tragedy" gained many MOR playlists. She has covered the Ontario country circuit with appearances at Brampton's Place Royal, Whitehouse Motor Hotel in Renfrew, London's Belevedere Hotel and the King George Hotel in Peterboro. She also headlined the Bobcaygeon Fair and is set for a return engagement (Nov. 6-20) at the King George Hotel in Peterboro.

RICK SPRINGFIELD SET FOR SONNY AND CHER SHOW

Rick Springfield, Australia's biggest rock star who is making a rapid rise in the U.S.A., has recently taped the Sonny and Cher Show, for airing November 26.





This is the first complete recording of twelve Symphonies composed by the fourteen year old Mendelssohn. The maturity of expression and technical assurance displayed in these fine works



is beyond belief. The Amsterdam Chamber Orchestra plays with alert enthusiasm. I would suggest listening to no more than one or two at a session as they are all scored for strings only and the ear will become fatigued by the lack of variety in the sound. This would be quite unfair to a group of works that match the genius of Mozart at the same age. The excellent brochure is printed in German, Dutch, English, and French but the black lettering is on deep blue paper so don't try to read it or you will go blind!

J.S. BACH The Well-Tempered Clavier (Book I)
Joao Carlos Martins - Pianist
Connoisseur Society CS 2025

The young Brazilian pianist gives us on three discs the greatest recorded performance to date of the first book of Bach's Well-tempered Clavier. Mr. Martins performs the work on the piano and in the most pianistic terms possible. He does not attempt to imitate the sound of a Harpsichord, but has thought out



each work as though Bach had written them for the piano. The Connoisseur Society Label (distributed by Almada) has always had an enviable reputation for their superlative reproduction of piano sound and here they surpass themselves. A magnificent achievement.

The coupling and the clear sparkling new recording are the attractive elements here as all three works are well represented in the current catalogue. The performances have all the polish and attention to detail that we have come to expect from Herbert von Karajan and this very great orchestra. The Circus Polka was written in 1942 for the Barnum and Bailey Circus and quotes the theme from Schubert's Marche Militaire.

MARCEL DELANNOY Concerto de Mai for Piano and Orchestra
HENRI TOMASI Concerto for Trombone and Orchestra

French composer Marcel Delannoy was born in 1898 and in his early years was guided and taught by Arthur Honegger. His Concerto de Mai was composed in 1950 for Jeneusses Musicales de France. I find it reminiscent of D'Indy's "Symphony on a French Mountain Air". The performance is polished and musical with fine support from Orchestre Radio-Symphonique de Strasbourg conducted by Georges Tzipine. The last half of side two features a Trombone concerto by another French composer, Henri Tomasi who was born in 1901. Its four movements are marked andante, Scherzo-valse, nocturne and tambourin.

ARNOLD SCHOENBERG Violin Concerto Op. 36

Definitive performances of the two works by Schoenberg in Concerto form. Brendel's masterful performance of the Piano Concerto is his second on disc, the early one being available on Turnabout label. The new version benefits from superior sound and orchestral support. The appeal of both works is limited to enthusiasts of Schoenberg and his school.

Giovanni Simone Mayr was born in Bavaria in 1763 and until recently was remembered only as the teacher of Donizetti. He wrote over seventy operas and this is the first ever to be recorded. The roll of Creusa is sung by the young Canadian soprano Joan Patenaude. The title roll is sung by soprano Marisa Galvany, and Allen Cathcart is an impressive Jason. A thoroughly distinguished revival of a lovely and important opera.

HENRI SAUGUET The Garden's Concerto
Deux mouvements
Orchestre de Chambre de l'O.R.T.F. conducted by Henri Sauguet
Claude Garden - Harmonica

Available from Polydor, this disc offers two major works by the French composer, Henri Sauguet. Born in 1901, he was in his early years influenced by Erik Satie and the group of "Lex Six". The two movements for strings in memory of Paul Gilson opens with a bitter slow movement called "Remembrance". This is followed by a melancholy waltz. The Garden's Concerto for Harmonica and Orchestra was written in 1970 for Harmonica virtuoso Claude Garden who performs it here. It is melodic and light in content.

Stations could learn from contemporary radio

Radio stations broadcasting traditionally could take a page out of the book of format contemporary radio. Many have. The new trend toward adult contemporary programming is a move to broaden the spectrum of sound available to the listener. Good old fashioned radio, as we have known it in the past, is coming to the end of an era.

As the years have gone by, the sound has caught up to us. Standards of the past have now moved up into the rock era, so that current music, even in the middle of the road vein, is evolving into a subtle rock sound. The newer orchestras and arrangers and young ballad singers, being programmed by MOR stations, have been born into the rock era.

Television programming has brought rock into the home of older people. The resistance has worn down, and the new trend of MOR stations is to rock a little and maybe quite

a lot.

Let's not picture the radio scene in a couple of years as being just one block of rock. What seems to be evolving is a younger sound for older people.

Many television viewers now know David Cassidy and the Osmonds. They can relate to them, but often have to turn to the rocker to hear one of their records. MOR stations could spruce up their sound by examining the LP cuts by many artists who have MOT hits and find that particular cut to suit their programming.

Who says that all the rules for programming were written twenty or thirty years ago? There are new innovations being brought into the industry every day, and radio in every format must keep up with the sound. Not only is it good for the ratings, it is also good for the sound of the station.

Too many music directors of traditional formats look at the competitor, who plays rock, as a lower denominator. Often the other sound could keep you abreast of what is coming.

U.S. flag (a sign of distress) and was taken as being an editorial stand against the U.S. This hasn't been explained satisfactorily yet, with many Canadian programmers and a U.S. tipster using it to discredit RPM.

It's interesting to note the importance of classical music within the programming structure of campus radio, one of the reasons Murphy had asked Lawson Cook to be on the panel and also for RCA arranging to have Ettore Stratta at the meeting. George Sanford, reviewer for Radio Sheridan (Oakville) went into much detail in his review of the album, with his capsule comment with regard to the set as: "beautifully clear — strict attention has been paid to the tempi and the 'romantic' string ensemble is rich and full — a delight to listen to and personally one of my favourite pieces for dance." Murphy reprinted Sanford's review, comprising three pages, which he circulated among RCA's sales and promotion staff as well as to other radio stations, campus and commercial.

Using the theme "Let's Talk Music!", RCA, through John Murphy, has indicated a desire to explore, fully, the role campus radio plays in programming and in the buyer's market. It's expected that RCA will hold at least two of these campus radio meetings on an annual basis.

Country stations and their demographics should effect all programmers to the realization that listeners are looking for something on the dial to "tune-in" to. Your station could offer more. The name of the game isn't all music, but there is a definite need to keep abreast of what is happening today. It may help tomorrow. It may even help today.

CKGM, Montreal, has returned to the MLS. Jim Sward of CKGM will co-chair the system along with CKCK's Ken Singer. The new co-chairmen will officially take over December 1/72. They replace Nevin Grant (CKOC Hamilton) and Greg Haroldson (CKXL Calgary).





**CBC RADIO OFFERS
NETWORK FOR BEEFS**

The CBC's radio network offering, "Cross-Country Check-Up" will offer the complete network to the question of "Are Canadians anti-American?" The two hour live radio production is set for Sunday Nov. 5 at 5:10 PM and will feature an international open-line hook-up, unique to broadcasting. The show will be carried by 91 Canadian stations from coast to coast, plus 200 low-power relay transmitter stations. In conjunction with the CBC, this special edition will be broadcast by the U.S. National Public Radio network, comprising 144 non-commercial stations in 42 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

There has been much talk within music circles in Canada about Anti-Canadianism shown by some U.S. programmers and record companies, over the supposed "censorship" of American music through the recent CRTC ruling which requires Canadian AM radio stations to program 30% Canadian content between the hours of 6AM and 12MN. It's hoped that many of those involved in the music and broadcast industries will take advantage of this show to emphasize our feelings of being un-American and not

anti-American.

"Check-Up" producer Tony Burman is of the opinion that Americans "will be surprised at the intensity of Canadian reaction, both pro and con", adding, "I don't think Americans are aware that Anti-Americanism in Canada — either latent or overt — has played so important a part in Canadian history".

The program will open with a 10-minute documentary detailing the roots of anti-Americanism. After the program is underway, part two of the documentary, detailing specifics relating to the question, will be aired on both the CBC and NPR.

"Check-Up" is unique in open-line broadcasting in that moderator Pierre Pascau invites listeners to reverse charges when phoning in. This courtesy will also be extended to the American audience.






