

QUALITY BEEFS UP SALES/PROMO DEPTS

Quality Records has revamped their national sales and promotion departments which calls for expanding each of these areas. There will be more emphasis on constructive communication with radio stations as well as a more realistic approach to dealers and rack jobbers.

The above announcement was made by Mr. W.R. Bays, president of Quality Records who further announced the following appointments:

Lee Farley moves from general sales manager to director of sales and promotion; Jack Vermeer to national sales manager but will also continue to be responsible for the Ontario sales division; Bob Morten from Ontario promotion to national promotion manager and A&R rep; Gene Lew to Ontario promotion; Brendan Lyttle to national promotion coordinator and Nadine Langlois, Yvonne Culley and Darlene Slonecky to promotion coordinators.

Harold Winslow will move from national sales and promotion supervisor to manager, production coordination. Winslow takes on these new duties to strengthen the liaison between marketing and all areas of inventory and production control.

SUPERIOR SOUND IN EXPANSION MOVE

Sheldon Kagan, one of the few Canadian impresarios who believes that "jazz lives" and proves it by presenting a successful jazz series of concerts in Montreal, has made extensive changes within his Superior Sound Enterprises company. The reorganization, according to Kagan, will effect his company to the extent that it can "emerge as probably the most progressive and creatively aware company of its kind in this city."

Superior is already engaged in promoting rock, folk and country music besides his jazz concerts, but his plans are now for stimulating interest in high schools and colleges for this particular type of music. He has already presented Montreal with the big names of Gene Krupa, Dizzie Gillespie, Lionel Hampton, Dave Brubeck, Woody Herman and the Modern Jazz Quartet. Plans now call for appearances of Don Ellis, Duke Ellington, Bill Withers and Jan Peerce.

Kagan has laid on extensive plans to enlarge the creative concept of the agency and has given a free hand to his new director of the audio-visual department, Robert Burch.

The booking side of the agency is looked after by Ray Dion. His main function is to inform schools and colleges why they should consult S.S.E. on all aspects of entertainment. Working with whatever budget the client comes up with Dion and his team of experts then fit the budget and the bill.

Lesley Rust, besides doing the tea bit, press writing and looking after production co-ordination duties is the out front image of the firm.

U.A.'S MATTHEWS BRINGS BACK "UP AL'S ALLEY"

Allan Matthews, national promotion manager for United Artists (Canada) has launched his own version of the popular weekly newsletter, "Up Al's Alley". Originally conceived by Al Mair, now handling the business affairs for Gordon Lightfoot, Matthews continued the sheet for MCA when Mair left and he assumed the duties of national promotion for MCA. The sheet continued until Matthews moved over to United Artists almost a year ago at which time it was dropped. In the meantime Matthews has received many phone calls and letters asking that he revive the old sheet. He bowed his new sheet Oct 26 which has been mailed to programmers and the press across Canada.

Matthews' new sheet gives pertinent information about album and single releases as well as news about radio station activities and Want Ads for the jock looking to move.

Canadian information on Vol 1 No. 1 points up the signing of Nobody, a six man group now showing chart action with their "Sing A Song For Me" deck. There is also news of the label's first totally Canadian album now being readied for release. The artist is Karl Erickson. Pinky, United Artists' first Canadian signing is ready with his next single release, "Cheatin' Mistreatin'", penned by Al Matthews, Toronto songwriter. Pinky is now backed by his new group, Sweet Lorraine, featuring two up-front lovelies.

STOLZ PICKING UP NATIONAL GAINS

Billy Stoltz, Calgary's top contender for country music man of the year, is doing it with his new Big Wheel single release, "Come On Back". Stoltz recently signed a three year contract with Rada who will manufacture and distribute the Stoltz label. Tagged as one of the best recordings to happen for Stoltz, the single is picking up chart listings in practically every province in Canada.

Although the mailing to radio stations has been extensive, there is no definite national distribution structure at time of writing. Much of the distribution is being handled by Rada out of Vancouver.

ENGLAND'S SLADE FOR POLYDOR BOOST

Slade, the Birmingham, England group which has swept the U.K. by storm, is benefiting here from an intensive promotional push by Polydor Records. The "Slade Alive" album is receiving considerable airplay, which combined with saturation major market radio spots and window displays is resulting in a good sales return, according to Polydor's Lori Bruner.

"Mama We're All Crazee", the group's latest single, will also be accorded the Polydor push, as a result of its success in England. The disc has maintained the number one spot over 'ome for each of the past four weeks. It is not contained on the "Slade Alive" album.

A&M GIVING PUSH TO KEITH HAMPSHIRE

With considerable initial response to his first single for A&M, "Daytime Nigh-time", Keith Hampshire has embarked on a extensive promotional campaign for the record. With A&M's national promotion manager, Pete Beauchamp, in tow, Hampshire moved into the Montreal market for visits to CJAD, CFCH, CKAC, CJMS and CKGM. All these stations are currently on the record. Following a handshaking round in Montreal, the two moved on to Ottawa, where Hampshire was interviewed for the "Gary Michaels Show", a production of Ottawa Cablevision. While in the capital, Hampshire visited CFGO where he taped an interview with the station's John Morrison. Due to the strong response to the record in this country, A&M's parent company in the United States has set a November 17th release date for the disc in that country.

LONDON MOVES IN ON MATERICK APPEARANCE

Vince Lasch, who handles promotional duties for all London Records' domestic product has set up a heavy promotional campaign to tie in with the appearance of the Kanata label's Ray Materick to co-ordinate a series of interviews, including ones with CHLO, Radio Western and others. Print ads appeared in the local university press as well as the London Free Press. Displays and signs appeared in the windows of local retailers. Lasch is now engaged in concentrating play of the singer-composer's Kanata single on the plug side, "Hard Life Alone". Many stations, particularly those with an adult contemporary audience have been going with the flip, "Season of Plenty".

CHILLIWACK FEVER GRIPPING INDUSTRY

With British Columbia leading the way, per capita, in record releases, the hook is now out for the province's anchor group, Chilliwack. A&M have released several press releases as to the coming album and single product, but with most of the company promotion centering around Lorence Hud, Keith Hampshire and Valdy, there has been little said of Chilliwack. Fortunately the group themselves, have taken the initiative and are getting their feet wet with press rattlings that should lay the foundation for their pending releases.

One thing for certain is that they have their next album in the can and they are now pushing for a single release with the album to follow. The session which was produced at Aragon Recorders in Vancouver was produced by the group members themselves, Ross Turney, Bill Henderson, and Glenn Miller. Says Turney: "The sessions were great. The best sides we've ever cut. The longest tune is five minutes in duration. There are eleven songs mostly around two minutes or so."

It's expected that Chilliwack will criss-cross Canada to promote their forthcoming single and album releases.

Discounting, racking and franchise stores

Fifteen years ago, you might have walked into the neighborhood friendly record store and bought a record. If it wasn't in stock, you ordered it and a week later, the record store phoned you to say your record was in.

Discounting was only starting, and many people felt that records at a lower price were inferior. It took that fifteen years for the retailing industry to undergo gigantic changes.

The record store of years ago is today gone to make way for formated merchandising by rackers. Efficient central buying of lead items has made it easier for the record outlet of today to stock that which is in most demand. Additional discounts for larger volume make discounting that

much easier. The album has taken the place of the single, as the larger selling of the two.

Franchise stores have entered the picture. The same name and the same policy greet the record buyer when he walks into a franchised store. He knows that discounts and current stock will greet him. The retailing business is in the hands of professionals able to judge what will sell and capable of manipulating a price that adds volume to the record sales of North America.

What killed the record store of years ago? To many it was a part-time effort with the thinking that "if we had records, people would come in and buy them."

With some, the concept of record store was an easy way to fortune, but the whims of the buyer often confused the small, badly stocked stores. Dead inventory greeted the buyer who turned to bigger stores that had the goods.

The rack jobber began to put racks into drug and variety stores where impulse buyers could shop later in the day after the record stores were closed. The racks were restricted to floor space and the number of titles they could display. The racker discovered there was a pattern to the buying habits of the masses. He made the wire racks into small departments with browsers. He then grew, to supply a whole record department at a percentage of the sales to the store owner.

The risk to the new racked-record dealer was only floor space and ringing up the sales (and the risk of pilfering) but the innovation of records, controlled and sold in volume, was to become one of the threats to the small record store. As discount stores came into prominence, the racker was able to equip and supply a record department. Racking now constitutes an estimated 85% of the sales of sound on records and tape. The industry has changed.

HEAVY PROMO FOR BOOT'S COUNTRY SHARON LOWNESS

Boot Records have laid on a heavy promotion campaign for one of their most recent signings, Sharon Lowness. Her first single release for the label, "Flowers of Darkness" established the pretty young singer as a talent to watch and laid the groundwork for the release of her album, "Broomstick Horse Cowboy". Her next single release, "Flying East" has been tried successfully on her Edison Hotel (Toronto) audience and should be released within the next couple of weeks.

Miss Lowness is backed by her own group known as the Teddy Bears.

Lorne Lichtman, Boot's newly appointed promotion chief, has rolled out the red carpet for a round of radio visits for Miss Lowness as well as Stevedore Steve. The latter will soon release his album, "I've Lived" which contains his "Lester The Lobster" deck as well as his most recent single, "Steel Wheels On The Rails."

Neck and neck with the rackers were the multi-stores and franchisers of name and stock. As the chains evolved from central discounted buying and the name stores lent their name and merchandising (and advertising) to anyone who could buy the franchise (like takeout chicken) records became an item that could be bought from a respected name in records. Franchising was sweeping the nation. Why not records. Merchandising took another step toward the lively art of selling records.

One newspaper ad now lists dozens of stores offering bargain specials at almost the cost price. Large and small department stores now use the services of a racker. The number one LP seller is available at bargain prices. Records released a few months ago can be bought for one sixth their original price. Singles are sold at a few pennies of profit over their wholesale price. The industry has changed and changed and is still changing.

If there is nothing new under the sun, then take a look at the new innovations in record merchandising. There is always a better way and the top men in marketing will find it because of their wisdom or by mistake.

Today and yesterday and even tomorrow someone will add yet another twist to record merchandising, but one thing remains the same. The public's taste is still wide, fickle and unsure. We still have return privileges.



BOBBY G. GRIFFITH READY FOR BIG TIME

Wanna buy a second hand Beaver? Going! Going! Gone to the highest bidder. The Beaver is Bobby G. Griffith and he happens to be second hand because this is his second time 'round in the Canadian merry-go-round music business. The highest bidder was Lawrence Welk's Teleklew Productions Inc., and Griffith is one of the first artists signed by this publishing wing of the Welk Organization which was designed to bring some of today's artists and their music into today's music, which could stand a little updating, from "a one, a two a three"...

How did Griffith make it into the U.S. big time with all this bad talk about the credibility of Canadian recording artists? First, let's take a look at why Griffith went the U.S. route to begin with. The young Winnipegger had a lot going for him with his first release - if you'll remember.

What's Griffith got besides one of the greatest undiscovered talents in the business? A manager, name of Jules Rabkin, who believes and who hung onto his talented young Beaver through one disappointment after another. Griffith and Rabkin looked like they had finally grasped the brass ring of the Canadian music industry when his first release hit on the MTCC label. Unfortunately the company folded before Griffith could do more than just establish his image. Rabkin, in his usual cigar chomping, wheeler dealer manner, moved back into the milieu and scored a contract with Polydor and a single release. That was as far as it went. After all, Griffith was just another Canadian performer and a mailing to radio stations was just about all the promotion he received. Rabkin went out on the hook himself, as usual but it was just impossible to break through the apathy of Canadian programmers towards Canadian recording artists.

Griffith and Rabkin laid low for a short time but Rabkin was convinced that he

would shortly put the power behind the lights of "Mr. Entertainment" Bobby G. Griffith. A trip to Los Angeles and Rabkin had wrapped it up. Dean Kay, General Manager of Mogue Music, one of the largest publishing houses in the U.S., flipped when he heard Griffith's demo tapes and immediately made Rabkin "an offer he couldn't refuse".

In an interview with RPM, Kay noted that Griffith "has the talent to become a superstar, the potential to become a giant. I just want you to know that we are very much involved with Bobby. We're going to be releasing his album here in the States on Ranwood, the same label, my boss Lawrence Welk releases on." Kay was also tuned-in on the Canadian scene. He added: "You know, you've got an awful lot going on in Canada, Toronto especially. We certainly want to generate as much, if not more, excitement in Bobby than anybody else who has come out of Canada, and we hope to turn him into a superstar. Welk is backing him 100% and we'll be bringing him down to do the show. This show will probably be a tribute to Canada with Bobby being the featured guest."

Rabkin has also reached the negotiation stages for Griffith to appear on several other U.S. TV network shows with Flip Wilson and Johnny Carson as strong possibilities.

Griffith will move south of the border with one of the most unique deals ever offered a Canadian artist. He bows the U.S. scene as an entertainer, record producer, writer and recording artist and all this talent comes together with his initial single release, "The Sound Of Peace" and "My Love (I'll Keep Loving You)" to be released on the Ranwood label in the U.S. and Quality in Canada. Griffith will be flown to Hollywood for the Welk Canadian Special to be televised Dec. 3rd.

It's interesting to note that Vogue's Kay who, by the way, penned "That's Life" one of the big hits of the century, was impressed by Griffith's demo - recorded in


Canada at RCA's Toronto studios. Says Kay: "His session was produced at RCA in Toronto and that's where we would like to keep him. We like the sound. As a matter of fact we like a lot of the sounds coming out of Canada and we're always looking for good masters from Canada."

Now that Rabkin has the Griffith bandwagon moving, everything is fitting into place. He's to be handled by Queen's Booking out of New York, the same agency booking Sammy Davis Jr. and he is now being talked about as a headliner for one of the top rated Los Vegas clubs. Sammy Davis Jr. has expressed an interest in the 31 year old Griffith and will fly into Toronto the first part of November to catch him in action.


One identifying feature about Griffith is his ability to pick a strong back-up group. Doing it, beautifully, behind Griffith is George Dearling, drummer; Lou Fortin, bass; Valentine Bent, lead guitar; and Jimmy Carver, electric piano. Each member of his group is a professional and that's how Griffith treats them. They are showcased individually on their own instruments as well as vocally and they in turn spotlight Griffith with one of the brightest and most respectful backup assists available.

What's his bag? You name it, Griffith does it. Rock, soul, folk, middle of the road. His styling is his own and with the help of the giant Welk organization he could be bank-rolled into one of this country's greatest entertainment exports.

RITCHIE YORKE RESIGNS FROM MAPLE MUSIC INC.

Ritchie Yorke, Canada's top pop columnist and one who has been responsible for creating that important missing ingredient in the Canadian music industry - excitement - has just returned from Rio de Janeiro where he represented Canada as one of the judges. Although he had tendered his resignation to the directors of Maple Music Inc. prior to his trip, his reasons for resigning have not been made public. Yorke has supplied RPM with the following letter which was addressed to Maple Music Inc., which should clear up any misunderstanding and certainly shoot down any rumours that may have existed:

"It is with some considerable regret that I would like to inform you of my resignation from the Board of Directors of Maple Music Inc.

"Although there seems little point in endeavoring to hide my philosophical differences over the new order of priorities of Maple Music Inc. - as established by the CRMA meeting of Tuesday Sept. 12 -- I would like you to know that pressing business matters such as the further building up of Rainbow Magazine, make it simply impossible for me to find the time and energy to continue with the numerous duties associated with the position I have held since the formation of Maple Music Inc.

"I am extremely sincere in my hope that Maple Music Inc. will continue to be a vital cog in the machinery which promotes Canadian talent to the world. Furthermore I am more convinced than ever that the efforts of Maple Music Inc. will be the crucial factor in maintaining the momentum which began in the aftermath of the Maple Music Junket. I would like to go on the record as saying that I personally did not believe at any time prior to June 1 that the Junket could have been so vastly successful in putting Canada into the global music market.

"My association with this corporation has

provided me with a much greater understanding of the present state and future aspirations of the Canadian recording industry. It has been a memorable and remarkable experience for me to be involved on such close terms with so many distinguished members of the Maple Music industry. In closing I would like to extend my earnest hope that your efforts in the coming months will be as fruitful and as far-reaching as you and your fellow directors anticipate.

"It seems somewhat irrelevant, in light of the developments of recent years, for me to offer all of the media support I can muster internationally for your cause. Please be assured that Rainbow Magazine, as one of the more obvious ways of reaching the Canadian consumer, will do its utmost to keep its readers well informed on your efforts."

CROWN-VETCH CHALKS UP BUCKS ON COMPOSITIONS

Crown-Vetch Music, with one of its greatest disc vehicles, Boot Records, has scored significantly in the dollar race for Canadian compositions much of it due probably to the 30% Canadian content regulations.

Their big money-maker has been "Maritime Farewell" which never reached hit status. The song was co-written by Jerry Krytiuk, president of Crown-Vetch, Mark Altman the company's producer/arranger and folk singer, John Spence. There have apparently been more than 20 versions of the song recorded including one by George Hamilton IV contained on his most recent album release, "Travellin' Light".

Crown-Vetch also figured prominently in the recent Molson's "Hear Canada Singing" contest. Dayton Brillinger, a former teacher now living in Cantley, P.Q., reached the finals with his penning of "The Old Man, The Crow and The Dam". Brillinger also wrote Sean Dunphy's "And The Old House Died" and is currently working on an album for Boot Records.

POLYDOR OFF WITH CANCON SINGLES

Polydor Records' Lori Bruner reports encouraging initial reaction to the company's two latest domestically produced releases, Cliff Edwards' "Uncle Dad and Auntie Mom" and Tapestry's "The Music Doesn't Seem to be Going Anywhere". "Uncle Dad and Auntie Mom" was written and performed by Edwards, former lead of the Bells, the Montreal-based group who hit with "Stay Awhile". Edwards now makes his home in Toronto. Tapestry, a vital part of the Montreal music scene, recorded their latest at Montreal's Andre Perry Studios.

"The Music" has received a personal pick from both Bill Gavin and Ted Randall.

PATSY GALLANT RECEIVES SIR ROBERT BURNETT AWARD

Patsy Gallant, Columbia recording star now hitting with "Get That Ball" was recently presented with the Sir Robert Burnett Sword Award. This is the first time a Montreal area resident has received the coveted award, presented annually by Canadian Distillers to Canadians "for outstanding work in a respective field."

Miss Gallant received the Award for her work in the field of commercial advertising. During this past year she has been heard on both French and English commercials ranging from airlines, to Quebec Savings Bonds.

In making the presentation, Canadian Distillers' vice-president, R.C. (Bob) Newton, noted: "It was our intention to reward an artist who's name is often unknown to us, who's voice sounds familiar and who's work influences us in a great many ways," adding, "We hope this award will help in the development and exposure of talented Canadian performers, both at home and abroad."



SECOND U.A. SINGLE FOR CLAUDE VALADE

United Artists continues their experiment with the Quebec market and Claude Valade. Her first single for the label, "Pour Un Homme" is still very much alive in Quebec as United Artists releases her second single, "Ce N'est Pas Un Matin Pour Se Dire Adieu", which is Bobby Goldsboro's hit "With Pen In Hand". The flip is Don and Dick Addissi's penning of "Never My Love" ("Non, Non, My Love"). The session was produced at Andre Perry Studios in Montreal by Ben Kaye and Cyrille Beaulieu with Richard Gregoire arranging.

Miss Valade is by no means a newcomer to the Quebec disc market. She has released 26 singles and 3 albums and has become internationally known having toured with Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin and Tom Jones. Her biggest record success was "Sukiyaki" which topped the Quebec charts. Besides starring in "Quebecois" a flick for Expo '67 she represented Canada at the Tokyo Music Festival where she sang "Pour Un Homme". She won first prize in the foreign song category for this entry as well as being honoured with three prizes including an award of merit and the coveted Singers' Prize.

Coming up are appearances in Aruba, Curacao, Jamaica, Bermuda, Nassau, Mexico, Puerto Rico and Las Vegas. The next few weeks will be taken up with a Quebec province-wide promotion for her new single release.

WHO'S GOT THE COUNTRY NEWS?

There's a battle, although not legal yet, over who has the right to the recently bowed World of Country Music. Information received here has it that there was a plan by the founders of the World of Country Music to set up individual satellite, World of Country Music papers in all ten Canadian provinces. Although there was a BC World of Country Music, the paper to become most important has been that which is being published out of Toronto and known as The World of Country Music.

Parties involved with the B.C. country news publication have issued a report that they have "nothing to do with this (Ontario) publication, and no control over its contents. Therefore, we want to be careful about the relationship between the papers, especially since both papers carry exactly the same distinctive logo on the front page".

There had also apparently been some confusion about what the World of Country Music was all about. It had been taken as a songbook, a record or a book about guitars.

Taking all this into consideration the BC World of Country Music has taken a name change step and will now be known as Country Music News. Their intended activities outside the province of British Columbia has not been made clear at time of writing.

A&M BUSY WITH ARTIST APPEARANCES

The promotion staff of A&M was kept busy last week with a hectic schedule of personal appearances by three of the label's most important artists. Valdy, signed to Haida Records, which is distributed by A&M, was in Toronto for a week-long stay at Grumbles. Haida's Keith Lawrence and Ray Pettinger flew in from the west coast for the event. The performance Wednesday night was captured on tape, to be aired over CHUM FM at a date to be announced.

Shawn Phillips, hit Toronto the same week, kicking off a multi-city Canadian tour with dates in London, Quebec City, Montreal and Ottawa. In Montreal, the artist performed four shows at Place des Arts, one of which was broadcast live over CHOM FM. Billy Preston, currently happening with his "Slaughter" single, made appearances in Kitchener and London. He returns to Canada for a date in Montreal on November 12.



Looking at the future of media

Having been off in the relative wilds of eastern Ontario for the past week, I missed my opportunity of discussing the Vancouver C5 meet in last week's issue. I don't suppose there were too many tears shed as a result of my absence, but just in case, I'll do my bit now. Of all the issues raised, and

there were many, the one which sticks with me is the point made by a programmer that the CRTC requires an applicant for a radio license to state what kind of programming he will be providing. In essence to state whether he will be running a country, top forty, progressive, adult contemporary or talk station. If I understand correctly, the programmer who made the point felt that this could restrict a station's competitive ability by limiting him to a given format. The point is well taken but the defense is equally interesting. Unless the CRTC is able to depend on an operator sticking to one area of entertainment, and distribute licenses accordingly, chaos would result and ultimately the listener would suffer.

What interests me is that in spite of the intentions of the CRTC and the unquestioned abilities of many programmers, more and more radio stations are sounding more and more alike. These growing similarities are occurring across all sorts of previously inviolate boundaries. In Toronto for instance the top forty stations are softening their music noticeably, whether due to the state of the recording industry or their own evaluation of a changing market is unknown and not really that important. The adult contemporaries meanwhile are moving in the up-tempo direction. Country music is becoming more citified and progressive is losing its hard rock underground

image for a more all-embracing style. This seems to be the case in many markets, Toronto is only an example. What it all means is that stations at all ends of the spectrum are slowly but surely moving towards the middle, to a position where they can please many of the people a lot of the time. What the implications of this are I'm not really sure but I would surmise that eventually we'll run into exactly what the CRTC says we will, a situation where the listener is left with no alternatives. When and if that does happen, we can depend on at least one station in each multi-station market branching off in its own direction, again providing the variety which the listener deserves.

It's just natural evolution I suppose. But the real question which programmers should be pondering at this point is what direction this evolution will take. It seems to me that what is happening today is merely temporary, the calm before the

storm, for lack of a better analogy. Just as a suggestion from someone whose forte in life is not radio programming, I would think it would be of advantage to programmers to fully examine the role of radio in their community. Is it on the only source of entertainment, of information? If not, what competition is there from other sources of entertainment and information? Do people in your community listen to radio or is it merely background noise? Do they believe what radio tells them? After asking these questions of yourself, look for the honest answers, not the easy ones. With these honest answers you can more clearly evaluate and understand the role which your station should be fulfilling.

I think the next few years will be critical for radio. Television has taken away a large chunk of the radio audience. Videocassettes loom on the horizon as another threat. Will the medium be able to withstand such intense competition or will it wither and become a poor relative. Now is the time to prepare for the challenges of the coming years by honestly assessing the present and planning intelligently for the future.

JAMES GANG ALBUM CANCON --- RCA

RCA Records' Scott Richards reports that all cuts on the new James Gang album, "Passin' Thru" on ABC, qualify as Canadian content. In a release sent to Canadian radio programmers, Richards indicates that all cuts on the set were in accordance with CRTC requirements. Two members of the group, Dom Troiano and Roy Kenner, are well known pillars of the southern Ontario rock and blues scene of ten years ago. The two provide virtually all of the group's original material.

The James Gang, operating out of Cleveland, Ohio, has steadily built its concert and record following over the past few years with a string of highly acclaimed albums and numerous prestigious concert appearances, including venues at Carnegie Hall and the Lyceum Theatre.

ISAAC HAYES FOR ONTARIO DATES

Polydor-distributed Isaac Hayes, who picked up an Academy Award for his original score of the film, "Shaft", has been contracted for three dates in southern Ontario this month. On the eighth of the month, he appears at Kitchener Memorial Auditorium in Kitchener, followed by a performance at the University of Western Ontario on the ninth. The three day mini tour winds up in Hamilton at McMaster University the following day.

To tie in with the appearances, Polydor is arranging for a busload of industry types to arrive in Hamilton on the tenth in order to catch the Hayes performance. Scoot Irwin, recently-appointed Ontario promotion rep for Polydor will accompany the guests.




Joan Sutherland is superb in the rolls of Stella, Antonia, Giulietta and Olympia. The part of Niklaus is sung in great style by Canadian mezzo Huguette Tourangeau. Tenor Placido Domingo is a brilliant Hoffman. From every bar the genius of Offenbach sparkles like a diamond.

This is Alan Civil's third recording of the Mozart Horn Concerti. The advantages of the newest offering aside from advances in recording technique include the beautifully proportioned accompaniments by the Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields,



and the inclusion of a Rondo in E flat K 371 which existed as a fragment and was completed by Alan Civil. Mr. Civil also provides his own Cadenzas where required in the other concerti. There are qualities of humour and humanity in the performances that make this an outstanding release.

Eighteenth Century Overtures

The English Chamber Orchestra conducted by Richard Bonynge

Mr. Bonynge continues to enrich the repertoire by delving into forgotten areas of music and finding gold. It would be difficult to pick a favourite from the eight overtures presented here but I was especially attracted to the "Sargino" Overture by Ferdinando Paer, and the very delightful "Le Magnifique" by Gretry. Other composers represented include Joseph Martin Kraus, Florian Gassmann, Boieldieu, Sacchini, Haydn and Salieri.

BRAHMS Violin Concerto Op. 77

Whether the magic lies with Colin Davis or with the Philips engineers is hard to pinpoint, but the New Philharmonia Orchestra has never, but never sounded so incredibly beautiful on disc before. If their statement of the opening theme of this Concerto doesn't stop you dead in your tracks, then you're due for an overhaul. The great Belgium violinist Arthur Grumiaux who has long enjoyed an enviable reputation with this work, turns in the finest performance imaginable and the sound is sheer luxury.


Here is a winner. The American Harpsichordist Igor Kipnis joins the late Thurston Dart who was one of England's foremost authorities on early music as well as a brilliant performer in a charming and varied programme of music written for two Harpsichords. Outstanding are two Musettes by Couperin with the bagpipe "drone" in the bass, and a magnificent performance of Mozart's fugue in C minor K 426. The Suite in C minor by Handel is a reconstruction by Thurston Dart from an incomplete manuscript and is here recorded for the first time. Fascinating music and beautiful sound throughout.

This recording includes two of his five motets for soloists, choir, organ and orchestra. The texts are in Latin. In Convertendo is taken from Psalm 126 and Quam Dilecta is based on parts of Psalm 84. This beautiful release should generate much interest from choral enthusiasts.

CFCF-TV's public affairs show "As It Is" has set Nov. 2 (press release received here Oct 27) for an hour long study on the effect of the Canadian Radio-Television Commission ruling of 30% Canadian content for AM radio. Those to be interviewed on the show are: Bob Johnston, music director of CFCF and the station's program director Jim Kidd with the CRTC's Doug McGowan speaking on behalf of the government agency. Canadian artists will be represented by Anne Murray, Christopher Kearney and Ginette Reno. Al Mair, business manager for

the big hits of the past. The albums are composites of oldies and make good programming for the nostalgia - taking the place of the current lack of good programming material for many, if not all, stations.

Stations pay hundreds of dollars to have old singles researched for their libraries. Now, the magic of mass merchandising of old hits has made available, to the station, all the real popular oldies.

If your oldies have disappeared, or are worn out, it would be a good idea to start your collection of old hits, on LPs, through the many television specials available, as well as the many LPs of Greatest Hits and Biggest Hits and other collections of artists that are an assembly of the chart toppers of artists of the past.

Too many programmers are anxious to hire services to find old discs when they could buy a Schwamm Catalogue and start a campaign to bring into the stations, many of the oldies they would like to have on file.

If you are worried about the quality of these records, all have been remastered and many have been adapted for stereo play. They are better today than they were on the old original singles.

While we are on the subject, many record companies still stock a line of golden treasures that will enhance the radio station's libraries of old material.

Gordon Lightfoot will also be interviewed along with Serge Trudeau, general manager of CJMS in Montreal.

Arnold Gosewich, president Capitol Records (Canada) Ltd. was interviewed for the show and indicated that he believes it is more important that the people who sell and promote records know if the artist is a Canadian than the radio listener. Greek singing star Nana Mouskouri, was also asked her opinion of the CRTC regulations.

The same show will carry interviews of Maple Leaf Junket organizer Ritchie Yorke and Montreal Star critic Juan Rodriguez. Sam Sniderman, bossman of one of the most successful retail chains, Sam The Record Man, gives a few pointers on the sale of Canadian recordings and Montreal producer/promoter Ben Kaye discusses payola with local impresario, Donald Tarlton.

The "Pop Recording . . . As It Is" program was produced by Bert Cannings and directed by Vaughan Gentle.

The whole object of the exercise is to start a campaign to get all the gold you can, on albums and singles, and to be aware of the sources of a virtual gloryhole of gold on records.

Record programming is the cheapest entertainment afforded any media, and record companies have been most anxious to cooperate for years. The radio station that doesn't take advantage of this, is living in the dark ages of record programming.

The music director who allows record treasures to leave the library and end up in private collections of the staff is a poor curator of one of the most valuable assets the radio station has. Old records actually disappear from the face of the earth, eventually, and a mint copy of one piece of nostalgia is worth its weight.....in gold.

MUSIC DIRECTOR PREPARES CHRISTMAS HIT SINGLES

Thirty years of Christmas hit singles are now available in a new publication prepared by The Music Director firm. According to Herb Jackson, Client Relations Director of Music Director, the 11-page guide lists more than 90 Christmas records that became chart-makers from the year 1942 through to 1971.

Radio station personnel have been somewhat hung up on programming material for the Christmas season and have asked the Music Director to research this particular area which has resulted in the publication of the guide. Music Director also publishes a list of 45's and albums for middle of the road stations in the U.S. and Canada and have been operating since 1967 out of Chestnut Hill, Mass.



STAMPEDERS RECEIVE DUTCH DISC AWARD

One of the highlights of the Stampeders' current tour of Europe was the honour of receiving the Edison '72 Award, the most important Award of the Dutch Record industry. Willen Hoos, a critic for OOR (Ear), the leading Dutch rock magazine, and one of the Maple Music Junketeers reported on the award presentation as well as the nine day visit to Holland by the popular Music World Creations' group.

According to Hoos, the Stampeders gave a total of five concerts, which were all organized by Mojo, the Dutch pop organization. One concert was held in the notorious Amsterdam underground centre known as Paradiso, which received its reputation from the gathering of tens of thousands of hippies from all over the world who have gathered at this popular meeting place.

Newspaper and magazine critics have generally been full of praise for the Stampeders. Miss Elly de Waard from De Volkskrant (The People's Paper) regarded as the best informed Dutch paper, headlined her article: "Pure Rock of the Seventies". Jim van Alphen from Het

Parool, Amsterdam's largest daily, found "A rock show full of excitement." Hoos also wrote several articles which appeared in newspapers throughout Holland.

The Dutch press were particularly interested in bass man, Ronnie King, born in Charlois, a working class people's neighbourhood in Rotterdam. King's real name is Kees van Sprang. Now 25 years of age, he emigrated to Canada with his family in 1954 where they settled in Calgary. Arthur Provoost from Het Mrijke Volk (The Free People), a Rotterdam socialist newspaper, organized a trip to King's birthplace which became a featured article in the paper.

The Dutch record company Bovema-EMI also put a lot of muscle into the promotion of The Stampeders. They released an album containing twelve cuts including "Sweet City Woman", "Carryin' On", "Monday Morning Choo Choo", "Wild Eyes", and "Devil You", and backed it with a hefty national promotion campaign.


The Stampeders went into France for a series of concerts and returned to Holland to tape a television special to be shown before the end of this year. While back in Holland one of the country's leading radio personalities, Vincent van Engelen taped a Stampeders' Special for his top rated show.

Hoos points up the importance of the recent Maple Music Junket which is still creating good press throughout Europe. The Stampeders, Poppy Family and Crowbar have received extensive press with Canada's sweetheart Anne Murray still considered one of this country's greatest musical exports.





