

## GRIFFITH STARS IN WELK'S "SALUTE TO CANADA"

Bobby G. Griffith takes one more closer step to stardom with his appearance on the popular Lawrence Welk show. The young Winnipegger stars on Welk's "Salute To Canada" show, to be televised across Canada and throughout the U.S. South Central Ontario viewers will have a double opportunity to see the show: Channel 11 CHCH-TV Hamilton on Jan 6 and the following evening on WKBW-TV Buffalo

Channel 7. Viewers across Canada and the U.S. should check their local listings for times and dates of the Welk show which is carried by more than 100 stations with an approximate viewing audience of over 100 million.

Opener for the show will be "Hi Neighbour", theme from the old CBC radio network show, "The Happy Gang" which starred Bert Pearl and was a coast to coast listening habit for millions of Canadians during the early forties. Also featured will be Ruth Lowe's "I'll Never Smile Again", Gene MacLellan's "Snowbird" and many other Canadian compositions.

Griffith will perform his current chart item, "The Sound Of Peace", released in North America on the Ranwood label with publishing by Vogue Music. Ranwood is distributed in Canada by Quality. Henry Cuesta, Welk's newly appointed clarinet soloist, will share some of the spotlight. Cuesta is well-known in Canadian music circles, having appeared regularly on CBC radio and television and recorded for the Canadian Talent Library. Cuesta and Griffith team up for "Games People Play" and the show is brought to a close by a stirring choral rendition of "Oh Canada"

The Welk show is just a beginning for Griffith, and his manager Jules Rabkin, who have been trying to fit into the Canadian scene for several years. The success of his single plus the Welk special opens many doors, including dates in Las Vegas as well as guest shots on several giant U.S. television shows, now in the talking stages.

## IAN TYSON SHOW HITS THE ROAD

Martin Onrot's Encore Productions is keeping the Ian Tyson Show busy with an Ontario tour in January. The show, featuring Ian and Sylvia and the Great Speckled Bird, will visit London, Hamilton and Peterborough and wrap it up with a January 28 date at Toronto's Massey Hall.

With 17 albums and three years of TV exposure on the Ian Tyson Show behind them, good ticket sales are expected. The tour has been moving east across Canada, wrapping up the western provinces in December, and moving into Quebec and the Maritimes in February.

## PRIMO PEOPLE INTO HOOK & LADDER

Gordon Allen of Public Relations Associates passes along word of the appearance of The Primo People at the Hook and Ladder Club, in Toronto's Seaway Beverly Hills Motor Hotel. The Primo People are a family of four sisters and two brothers plus a guitar-playing father. Mother, though a professional musician, does not appear with them.

The Primo People, from Detroit, made their debut on the Ed Sullivan show and since then have done well, in the same vein as the Cowsills. Gary Primo, the group's arranger and composer, went to high school in Nova Scotia, and is fluently bilingual.

## ESTEY FORMS NEW GROUP

Rich Estey, former anchor man for the Damned, has formed a new group flying the banner of Rock. Although just recently put together, the trio comprised of Estey (lead), Greg Agnew (drums), and Bruce Oxley (bass) have filled several successful dates including Northern College in Kirkland Lake and a week at the Colborne Hotel in Sarnia.

Rock is booked by Doug Reed of Music Shoppe.

## OTTAWA HELPS CANADIAN MUSIC WITH MIDEM BOOTH

The Canadian Government is putting its money where its mouth is, when it comes to promoting Canadian music. The Department of Trade and Commerce has announced it will set up a Canadian music booth at MIDEM, the international record and publishing market to be held in Cannes, France from January 20 to 26. The MIDEM gathering attracts publishers, agents, A&R directors and programmers from 40 countries.

Canadian government assistance to the Canadian music industry began in a big way earlier this summer, with the Maple Music Junket. Bringing 100 European media people to Canada, the Junket was the biggest music promotion ever organized by a national government anywhere in the world. By providing the MIDEM booth, Ottawa is showing a continuing commitment to the growth of Canadian music.

The MIDEM exhibit will allow six Canadian companies to meet the men who could purchase Canadian material for distribution abroad, as well as provide foreign material for Canadian distribution. The participants at the display are: French-Canadian companies Les Disques Gamma and Les Productions S.M.C.L.; CHUM's group Summerlea/Winterlea/Much; Love Productions; Trans-World Records; and September Productions.

Interest in Canadian music promises to be strong at MIDEM, with the feature appearance of Anne Murray at the festival's evening gala on the final day.

## MARIPOSA ALIVE AND WELL IN T.O. WINTER

Contrary to what most people think, the Mariposa Folk Festival doesn't go into hibernation for the winter. After this year's financial success, there was a little left over to put on a special "singabout" and give exposure to some of the fine talent hidden around Toronto these days. This winter program revives a Mariposa tradition of a couple of years back, and the first December 17th gig will hopefully be followed by more, in February, March, April and May.

The holiday singabout featured Cape Breton singer-guitarist-fiddler, John Allan Cameron, American folksinger Michael Cooney, and Toronto group Friends of Fiddlers' Green. The mini-festival was held at Toronto's Glebe Road United Church with the gate going toward financing next year's Mariposa.

On the afternoon of December 17, a children's program took place, featuring folk songs by Michael Cooney and participation dances and games for adults and children.

Mariposa chose the Glebe Road United Church because it offered a variety of concert and workshop accommodation in a central location, at a cost that allowed ticket prices to be kept low.

Meantime, Dick Flohil is working on arranging talent for Mariposa '73, to be held July 6 to 8 at the Islands.

# RPM's '72 YEAR END WRAP-UP

Although 1972 produced no major international hit by the Canadian record community, the year was significant in many respects. Bill S9, the controversial bill eliminating the right of record producers to collect a performance royalty on their productions passed the House of Commons with nary a whisper of opposition. Du-Maurier Tobacco, in its continuing support of the fine arts, pledged one million dollars to that end, over a five year period. RPM presented its first "Golden Nuts and Bolts Award" to Kinney's Tom Williams. The CRTC approved CHUM Limited's proposed purchase of the Montreal-based Marconi empire subject to conditions

which CHUM was unwilling to meet. Towards the middle of January, Capitol announced the re-structuring of its wholesale division with Bill Bannon looking after promotion and artist relations and Bob Rowe becoming national field sales manager. Decca announces that "Jesus Christ Superstar" has become "the biggest selling British album in history". United Artists Records, until January 1972 distributed by MCA, announces its establishment as an independent record company with Stan Kulin at the helm. MCA's Allen Matthews joins U.A. as national promotion manager. The Canadian Recording Manufacturers' Association announces a "get tough" policy with tape pirates. Hal Weaver, well-known on-air personality with time logged on CHUM, CKOC, CKVN, CJCA and CHLO, dies at age twenty nine. The end of the month sees Much's Pagliaro released internationally with his "Lovin' You Ain't Easy". Ampex Corporation announces an expected loss of forty million dollars for the year ending April 29th.

GRT is named Top Canadian Content Company, Kinney receives two Junos, for Promotional Company and Company of the Year. The posh Inn on the Park presentation party is attended by one thousand industry heavies.

RCA holds its first Campus Radio Meet, a great success. The CRMA announces details of the Maple Music Junket. Date is set as June 4 - 8. Lighthouse sells out their concert at Massey Hall. Balmur, Anne Murray's business arm, appoints Bill Langstroth to the position of creative director. London records holds a two-day meet for branch and sales managers from across the country in Montreal. Frank Mills' "Love Me Love Me Love" is certified gold by the RPM Gold Leaf Awards Trust Fund. RPM congratulates the CBC on its "Jalna" series, shortly after which the two million dollar series is axed. Mort Ross, formerly with Revolution Sound (Toronto Sound) announces the formation of Hopi Records.

The second record-radio meet sponsored by RPM (Communication 2) results in numerous suggestions and considerable dialogue. Capitol releases a special sampler album to help broadcasters meet phase two of the CRTC AM Regulations. Gordie Morrison moves from Quebec promo for MCA to Ontario promotion for newly-formed U.A. Records. Anne Murray tours California and New York on a promotional junket. CKFH receives good reaction to its "Hitmakers" feature. The Select Committee on Economic and Cultural Nationalism receives a proposal to tax all foreign-controlled distributors of cultural materials, i.e. record distributors. The Maple Music junket, first suggested in the pages of RPM is firmed up for a spring date. Tom Connors makes his Massey Hall debut to an enthusiastic and mixed audience. Anne Murray cops her fifth consecutive Gold Leaf Award for album product. The special MOR issue of RPM, in mid-month, receives a kudo or two and helps to shed light on a sometimes forgotten aspect of the industry. CHED's "Rock Canada" special is made available to broadcasters from coast to coast. The Stampeders set a European tour to cover ten countries over a period of forty days. RPM celebrates its eighth anniversary. U.A.'s Don McLean is presented in Toronto with his Gold Leaf Award for "American Pie". The Juno Award winners for 1971 are announced: Anne Murray repeats as Top Female Vocalist; the Stampeders show strongly with three awards, Best Produced Single, Composer of the Year, and Group of the Year, on the strength of their world-wide smash, "Sweet City Woman"; Bruce Cockburn is named Folk Singer of the Year; the Mercury Brothers,

Ampex Corporation's estimated loss of forty million dollars proves to be overly optimistic, a thorough audit of the company's books reveals that the real loss is some eighty six million dollars. European dates are announced for Anne Murray, including stops in Germany, Denmark, Holland and England. CHUM serves a writ on the Globe and Mail for that paper's criticisms of CHUM FM's "mini documentaries". London Records acquires distribution rights to the MOR-oriented Kanata label. Summerlea/Winterlea, the CHUM-owned publishing houses announce their takeover of the Burlington and Felsted Music catalogues. The Stampeders are the feature musical attraction on CTV's presentation of the Miss Teen Canada Pageant. A civil jury in the Ontario Supreme Court awards record producer Stan Klees \$35,000 plus costs in libel action against the Telegram Publishing Co. Ltd., David Cobb, CHUM Ltd., and Robert McAdorey. Talent line-up and additional details are announced regarding the Maple Music Junket. The RIAA's Stan Gortikov expresses disgust at the possibility of payola in the American record industry, and promises a clean-up. Quality Records ac-

quires the Blue Thumb line for Canada.

BMI, at its annual gala affair, honoured its top writer and publishers with Certificates of Honour in Toronto. RPM publishes a chart of international action on domestic product showing disappointing activity.

Andy Kim moves from Steed Records to MCA-distributed Uni. Ritchie Yorke lays the cornerstone of yet another rock paper, Rainbow. Cohorts include Marty Melhuish and Wilder Penfield. "Amazing Grace" hits for RCA making it the first bagpipe record to hit the top ten for a while. Bobby Curtola hits it big during his engagement at the Sands Hotel, Las Vegas. The Rolling Stones tour is announced with dates in Vancouver, Toronto and Montreal. Fludd's "Get Up, Get Out, Move On" is released in the U.K. through Kinney. Clyde McGregor is named national merchandising manager for Playboy Records in Canada. London Records reports an all time high for classical sales. Doug Hutton formulates plans for the multi-media presentation, "Story of Canada". Kinney's First Edition promotion at CKOC Hamilton, draws over one million entries.

Haida artist Valdy embarks on a cross-Canada tour. The federal government announces considerable financial support for the Maple Music Junket. Polydor's first album from Frank Mills tops sixty four thousand units sold, making it the label's biggest selling Canadian album. The CRTC announces more stringent control over Campus Radio and in-house broadcasting. RPM publishes the biggest edition in its eight year history to commemorate the Maple Music Junket. In spite of a certain amount of controversy both before and after, the Junket is hailed as the biggest promotional plus yet for domestic music on the international scene. Countless thousands of inches of copy appear in the European press lauding domestic artists. BMI announces its sponsorship of a series of "Music Meets" across the country.

Ed LaBuick leaves GRT to form his own company. The Alberta government honours country singer Hank Smith. Ed Freeman, producer of "American Pie" is named to produce Murray McLauchlan for True North. CKLG sweeps the awards list at the CAB's meeting in Halifax.

RCA Records moves its head office to new facilities in Don Mills, a suburb of Toronto. Capitol acquires the Island line for distribution here. The Rolling Stones show is marred by violence in Vancouver and there is talk of cancelling the dates in Toronto and Montreal. Paul Jarema is named Quebec promotion representative for Capitol Records. Bill Wallace, well known Winnipeg musician is named to replace Jim Kale of the Guess Who. Kale joins the group's management company, Fist and Ear. BMI Canada is granted a tariff increase at meetings of the Copyright Appeals Board. Chilliwack is reorganized with Claire Lawrence going solo. The Mariposa Folk Festival, held annually on Toronto Island, is held July 14-16 with a surprise visit by Bob Dylan. Allan Waters, president of CHUM Limited, is named to the board of management of Toronto's O'Keefe Centre. The CRTC grants an extension to Marconi to aid in their search for a buyer for CFCF AM, CFCF TV, CFQR FM and CFCX shortwave. The Stampeders make a big impression in their home-town of Calgary at the annual Stampede celebrations. Kinney Music changes its name yet again, this time to WEA Music of Canada, Ltd. A&M picks up rights to Keith Lawrence's Haida label. The Stones pass through with none of the violence anticipated for their Toronto and Montreal appearances. R.E. Day announces the appointment of William Bays to the position of president and general manager of Quality Records. CHUM puts in a bid for CKVN Vancouver, stirring a storm of controversy within the industry. Allan Slaight buys CFOX, Montreal and immediately transforms it into a country outlet, startling many observers.

A survey conducted by Maple Music Inc. reveals that some three hundred million Europeans have been exposed to information on the Canadian music scene as a result of the Maple Music Junket. Mariposa Folk Festival reports a profit on its three day event in spite of inclement weather. Skylark makes its record debut with an album and single on the Capitol label. Edmontonian Bob Ruzicka is released through the WEA-distributed Signpost label. The CRTC attempts to improve its PR with an informal coffee klatch for radio types in Toronto hosted by Chef Franken and Doug McGowan. CHUM

reports a profit of \$1.1 million for the year ended May 31st as compared to \$724,906 in the previous year. A&M Records moves to larger quarters in Agincourt, Ontario. Dick Nolan certifies gold his "Aunt Martha's Sheep" on the basis of sales in Newfoundland alone. RPM's special country music issue surprisingly successful and helps bring the spotlight on the oft-neglected country area.

Dr. Music winds up a successful tour at the beginning of the month, with a climax concert at Regina's Buffalo Days. The RCMP grows increasingly active in pursuing tape pirates. According to the CRMA, the federal police body has hundreds of complaints under investigation. Barrie Broadcasting's bid for CHOO Ajax is turned down by the CRTC. Capitol announces the signing of an agreement whereby the company will distribute product of HP&Bell. Capitol also acquires rights to U.A. Records product in the Maritimes. True North's Bruce Cockburn shows strongly on the first dates of an extensive cross-country tour with packed houses in Saint John, Charlottetown and Halifax. WEA announces a meeting of its promotional staff to coincide with Communications 4 in Montreal. Mike Graham signs with GRT. The Montreal C-4 goes as expected, with a healthy turn-out. Some dismay is registered by the participants as the same tired old questions are raised again and again. A&M puts mammoth promotion campaign behind Lorence Hud, flying in radio people from across the country for an introductory party. CFGO Ottawa puts on mammoth promotion campaign following purchase by Baton Broadcasting. The CBC Television Network marks its twentieth anniversary. John Small is appointed to the position of national promotion manager for Capitol Records.

The Canadian Recording Manufacturers' Association changes its name to the Canadian Recording Industry Association and promptly issues a release stating the henceforth it will speak for itself. The Association formally applies, on behalf of its membership, for permission to use RPM's MAPL logo on record product. Caedmon Records, the predominantly educational label, opens offices in Toronto. A&M opens largest retail outlet in P.Q. (downtown Montreal).







Abraham's Children release first effort for GAS label, "Goodbye Farewell". Much Productions bows its Sweet Plum label, to be distributed by London. London appoints Jim McDonald to Ontario promotion, sharing the load with Vince Lasch. David Clayton Thomas is named the winner of the Rio Song Festival, taking many observers by surprise. Vancouver's C5 meeting stirs up considerable controversy and provides the industry with its first tangible east-west meeting of minds. WEA releases Gordon Lightfoot's first produced-in-Canada album.

Marty Butler is named winner of the \$10,000 grand prize in the Molson's "Hear Canada Singing" contest. Quality restructures promotion department, naming Bob Morten national promotion manager. U.A.'s Allan Matthews brings "Up Al's Alley" back to life. Bobby G. Griffith is signed to the Lawrence Welk organization for records and television appearances. Ritchie Yorke quits his directorship with Maple Music Inc. amid a spate of controversy. The Stampeder receive the Edison Award from the Dutch music industry for their efforts in that country. The Irish Rover's Potato label is to be distributed by Montreal-based Polydor Records. Anne Murray returns to Canada following a hectic month-long promotion tour of Europe. Dave Chadwick is named programming editor of RPM's programmers section. Columbia does mammoth phone promotion on Atkinson Danko and Ford's "Right On". London comes up with the third major novelty tune of the year, "Mouldy Old Dough". WEA finally releases the second Jesse Winchester album to critical acclaim. Neil Young announces a tour of Ontario for the month of January. Thundermug's "Africa", Anne Murray's "Danny's Song", Edward Bear's "Last Song" and "Daytime Night Time" by Keith Hampshire begin to pick up international action simultaneously. Barry Paine leaves MCA to join Polydor and is replaced by RCA's Scott Richards. Jeani Read begins a west coast column for RPM. Bob McAdorey leaves CFTF, Toronto in a dispute over the station's programming

polices. Touch a multi-interest consumer mag is launched by Bob Sniderman. John Stewart, prominent Toronto engineer, joins Avenue of America Recording as A&R man. CHUM's purchase of CKVN Vancouver is approved by the CRTC subject to certain conditions. The CRTC orders Western Broadcasting to dispose of its holdings in Bushnell Communications.

## WEA'S BOAS TAKES MUSIC INDUSTRY TO HIGH SCHOOLS

Don Boas, west coast promotion rep for WEA, has successfully experimented with local high school music classes on the why's and wherefore's of the music industry. His lecture tour includes the picking of an artist for recording right through to how radio station music directors select listings for their charts. His hour-long rap and question and answer period has been well received by both faculty and students. He has sent out letters to various school boards outlining his services and hopes to interest other promotion reps in his venture. Notes Boas: "This is not an advertising campaign but more of an information seminar in hopes of guiding more young people into all facets of our interesting industry."

Boas also reports that with the lifting of the "monsterous police bills", the concert scene is now humming once again. Ten Years After and Wild Turkey were the first groups in for the "lifting celebrations" and as they are both Chrysalis acts, Eric Wright from Chrysalis flew in for the show and an after gig party at Vancouver's Ho Ho. Also making the concert bit were Boz Scaggs and Brave Belt (7), Frank Zappa and the Mothers and Rubin and the Jets (8), Cheech and Chong (9), and Sammy Davis (10).

## HANK SMITH GETS IT TOGETHER FOR ALBUM

Hank Smith has put together productions from the last six months to make up an album release on the Quality label. Entitled "Country - My Way", the set was produced by Dick Damron at Joe Kozac's Kori Sound Studios in Edmonton. Smith's album release comes at a time in his career when he is receiving, perhaps, the most publicity since becoming a part of the country music scene. Once again he was honoured by the Alberta Government with an Achievement Award for his contribution to the Province's entertainment scene. His past single releases have all received excellent exposure on both country and MOR stations.

Included on the album are: "Take Me Home", a Dick Damron penning which made significant gains on the country and Adult Contemporary charts, "Country-fied", another Damron composition that became a national hit for Damron and was included in George Hamilton IV's recent album release, and Smith's own effort, "But Tomorrow There's Another Day".

String arrangement, unusual for a Canadian country production, was the work of Franck Rodgers.

## GOOD BROTHERS (SANS JAMES) GET IT TOGETHER

The Good Brothers have just emerged from Toronto's Thunder Sound Studios, where they recorded a demo tape last week. The four-piece group has enough original material for an album release, and used three or four of their strongest tunes on the demo. The session was in response to interest expressed by WEA, Capitol and GRT when the Good Brothers returned to the Toronto scene recently. Magic Management will make the record company rounds with the demo as the first bit of New Year business.

The Good Brothers are an offshoot of the former group James and the Good Brothers, who released an LP on Columbia before breaking up. The Good Brothers are Brian, Bruce and Larry, and the fourth member is Michael Love.

Recent engagements have included Grumbles Coffee House and the El Mocambo nightclub and the campus gigs. In conjunction with this, Magic Management is currently trying to firm dates on a proposed campus tour of Michigan this winter. The Michigan interest is apparently due to the success of previous gigs in that state by James and the Good Brothers.

In other news from Magic Management, Truck (newly signed Capitol recording artists) will have their debut album released in mid-January. The six piece group have a heavy schedule of dates ahead including a wee-long mid-January tour with White Trash; a headline appearance at McGill in early February; and a tour of U.S. colleges.

## LERoy SIGNED TO GRT CANADA




Comeau began his group career with the Esquires, and was lead guitarist with that group when they won the RPM Group poll in 1965.

## SAVE THE SEALS SPOTS BY CANADIAN ARTISTS

A radio campaign tying in with the national Save the Seals Campaign has been launched by the Canadian music industry. Several hundred copies of a special 7", 33 rpm disc have been sent to radio stations from coast to coast.

The recording features 30 second Save The Seals public service announcements by such artists as Susan & Terry Jacks, Murray McLauchlin, Larry Evoy (of Edward Bear), Joshua, Foot in Coldwater, Neil Sedaka, Don Troiano (of the James Gang), George Hamilton IV and Moe Koffman.

Seal hunting in the Magdalen Islands is currently under a moratorium while the federal government studies the situation. The spots urge Canadians to write the PM and advocate a national park and ice nursery in the area.

The campaign was initiated and produced by the staff of Rainbow magazine in conjunction with Brian Davies, executive director of the International Fund for Animal Welfare. Additional help came from Quality Records and Thunder Sound.

Applause is heard only at the beginning of the recital and at the end of side two. One of the most popular artists appearing before the public today, Ashkenazy turns in an exciting and colourful performance of the Sonata. The two Nocturnes Op. 15 are thoughtfully played, with a fine sense of their poetry and charm.

### FRANZ BERWALD Piano Concerto

Almada has just announced the distributorship of the GENESIS label which is devoted to the restoration of 19th century music to the repertoire. Franz Berwald was a Swedish composer who lived from 1796 to 1868. His Piano Concerto in D major, only twenty minutes long, is bright and tuneful and rather reminiscent of Hummel. Side two of the disc contains works for solo piano including a Theme and Variations in G minor and a brilliant "Presto feroce". Recorded in Sweden, the performances by Greta Erikson and the Swedish Radio Orchestra are expert and stylish and the recorded sound and surfaces are of highest quality. A worthy disc in every way.

### BRAHMS The Piano Concertos

If I were to pick a "record of the year" it would surely be this set. Throughout his career, Emil Gilels has scored some of his greatest triumphs in performances of the music of Brahms and an earlier recording of the Concerto No. 2 in Bb Op. 83 for RCA Victor has been the preferred performance for many piano buffs. Now at the height of his powers, he has recorded the two Brahms Concerti in performances of inspired greatness. Matching his performances in every way the Berlin Philharmonic orchestra under the direction of Eugen Jochum capture the sound and spirit of Brahms and the recording by Deutsche Grammophon is among their finest.

### COLIN DAVIS At the last Night of The Proms BBC Symphony Orchestra conducted by Colin Davis

Anyone who has ever attended a final night at the Henry Wood Promenade Concerts held each summer in the Royal Albert Hall, London will find this disc hard to resist. More like a party than a concert, the audience participation is wildly enthusiastic and includes lusty singing of Rule Britannia, Parry's "Jerusalem", "God Save the Queen" and Elgar's "Land of Hope and Glory". One is also treated here to a crisp performance of the Scherzo from Mendelssohn's Octet arranged for orchestra by the composer, and two songs from Wagner's Wesendonk Lieder sung by soprano Jessye Norman. The late Sir Malcolm Sargent always ended the evening with a speech to the audience and his brilliant wit often made this the high point of the evening. Colin Davis' effort here indicates that he is more eloquent with the baton.

### ETTORE BASTIANINI Operatic Recital RICHMOND SR33190

The many fans of the late Ettore Bastianini will be delighted with this fine reissue of arias from the complete opera sets in which he participated for London Records. Included are arias from Rossini's Barber of Seville, Donizetti's La Favorita, Ponchielli's La Gioconda, Giordano's Andrea Chenier, and Verdi's La Forza del Destino, where he is joined in a duet with Mario del Monaco.



## JOURNEY THROUGH THE PAST


Neil Young

How many industry people today would like to claim Neil Young as their discovery? How many would like to apply that easiest of all things to apply - hindsight, and say they saw Neil Young playing in Toronto's Yorkville district and knew what he would be? The simple fact of the case is that no one did and Young became yet another in the as-yet unabated stream of talent drifting to the south. The blame is not to rest so heavily on the industry itself so as to exclude the other players in the drama. If Young had remained in Toronto, recorded and wrote in Toronto, what do you suppose would have happened to the "Harvest" album for instance? In one word, nothing.

However, here we have a new album, comprising some really fine music, the extended version of "Words" on side three being an outstanding example. The album is marred however, by a certain pompous air - an air which is pretty hard to avoid when you throw in Handel's "Messiah" on a basically folk-rock album. We find the hack job on "For What It's Worth" disturbing also but what the hell, obviously Young intended this album to be some kind of document of his life and times, and it is that, more so than it is a collection of music.




### HOT AUGUST NIGHT




### ALL TIME GREATEST HITS

## QUALITY RELEASING ROCK ON CHARISMA

Bob Morton, A&R and National Promotion Manager for Quality Records, passes on word that Quality plans a major push into the progressive rock market with product from the Charisma label. Currently, the Quality best selling artists are the Partridge Family, Fifth Dimension, Curtis Mayfield, Melanie, Lobo and Sha Na Na, so the progressive rock from Britain will be a welcome diversification and expansion of the artist roster.

Interest first began building in the English Charisma label when Toronto progressive CHUM-FM began airing "Foxtrot" by Genesis from an imported LP. The excellent reaction to Genesis' music encouraged Quality to rush the album out. Also being readied for release is another Genesis set, "Nursery Cryme". Other artists appearing on the Charisma label are Monty Python, Vandergraaf Generator, and String Driven Thing. Buddah recently presented String Driven Thing and Genesis in a NYC concert, which was a total success, and Quality hopes this will indicate Canadian acceptance as well.

Quality continues to restructure its promo staff in anticipation of an outstanding 1973. New promotion managers have been appointed in B.C., Alberta, and Quebec. Ray Ramsay is now the B.C. head, Walter Reducka will cover Alberta from Calgary, and Mrs. Nicole Dufour takes the Quebec responsibility from a Montreal base.

## TONY KOSINEC MOVING INTO CANADIAN SCENE

Tony Kosenic, a native Torontonian with a couple of albums under his belt in the States, is back on the Canadian scene with an appearance on CTV's "Canada AM" show (Dec 13).

Kosinec, not signed to any label at present, did the U.S. college tour circuit for a couple of years and released two well-reviewed albums (his last was produced by Peter Asher of James Taylor fame). Lately, Kosenic has been teaching songwriting at York University and getting some new material together. He discussed past, present and future with co-hosts Percy Saltzman and Carole Taylor, as well as performing his new songs.

### NO COMMENT ON NEWS SECRETЫ SAYS CRTC

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission has declined to advise radio news departments what they should do with information they get from confidential sources.

CRTC chairman Pierre Juneau begged off when he was invited to comment on two Kitchener radio stations which have been criticized for their reporting of a Kitchener downtown development project. W.D. McGregor, president of CKKW and CFCA-FM, and John Larke, general manager of CHYM and CHYM-FM were appearing along with their news directors for licence renewals at the recent CRTC Toronto hearing. Mr. McGregor told the hearing he was associated with the urban renewal project as a member of the city's urban renewal project as a member of the city's urban development commission, but was sworn to secrecy as to the progress of negotiations.

While city council met to consider the development, the public remained uninformed about hard news on the project's progress, although both stations had carried speculative stories. Criticism was later expressed that by suppressing the news, the stations had not acted in the public interest. News of the project later leaked out through a student newspaper.

McGregor said he would have permitted his stations to use the story if a reporter had gained it from independent sources. Because of a desire to avoid a public uproar around what most people saw as a desirable development, city council admitted the media to meetings only on condition that no news be reported on air or in print.

### CRTC APPROVAL FOR FM AT BAKER LAKE, N.W.T.

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission has announced approval for an Eskimo-and-English-language FM station at Baker Lake, N.W.T. The license, issued on an experimental basis, directs that Eskimo personnel be utilized and encouraged by the station in all possible ways. Three hours of local live programming will be aired daily with a substantial part being in the Eskimo language.

The CRTC considers the station to be an experimental operation, with the CBC directed to work with the station to see if a policy can be developed on operating isolated stations. Though money for the station will come from the local settlement council from federal grants, the Commission feels a two-year licence is justified. Performance will be evaluated before the licence is renewed.

### SLAIGHT JUGGLES LINEUP AT CFGM

Allen Slaight, President and General Manager of CFGM Richmond Hill, has announced several new appointments at the giant Toronto country outlet.

Bill Anderson becomes the Program Director of CFGM. Anderson joined the station in September from CJCB Sydney, where he was Assistant Manager and PD for three years. Prior to that, he was an announcer for CHML Hamilton and CFOX Montreal.

Previous PD John Hart becomes Public Service Director of CFGM. Hart has been with the station since 1967, when he moved over from Montreal (CKGM, CFCF). His appointment as Public Service Director will enable CFGM to expand its activities in this important area.

Bob McAdorey returned to his old home, the CFGM morning show on December 11. McAdorey had spent the last two years as morning man of CFTR Toronto.

Other program department execs are veteran music director Dave Johnson, and new news director Peter Dickens. Dickens was appointed to that post in October, after 14 years with CHUM including News Supervisor of CHUM-FM.

### RADIO SOUTHERN MANITOBA WANTS BOISSEVAIN AM-ER

The CRTC has released its agenda for the January hearings at the Skyline Hotel in Ottawa. Along with numerous cable TV applications, CBC low-power relay applications and licence renewals, there is only one application for a new AM licence. Southern Manitoba Broadcasting Limited are requesting an AM radio station in Boissevain. The company presently operates two other 10,000 watt stations (CFAM Altona and CHSM Steinbach) and the licence at Boissevain would also be for 10,000 watts power.

### CKLG & HAIDA HOLD CONCERT FOR CHARITY

Haida Records and Vancouver station CKLG helped spread the real message of Christmas with a concert at PNE Gardens Auditorium on December 19. Headlining was Valdy, who had his "Rock and Roll Song" named Record of the Year by the Moffat stations.

Spring, Stallion Thumbruck, Kathy Stack and Claire Lawrence (formerly of Chilliwack) shared the stage. Proceeds from the concert's \$2 admission were shared by the Native Information Centre and the Vancouver Indian Friendship Society. In addition to Christmas gifts, food and clothing, the money helped to provide children's Christmas parties

### CCR NEWSLETTER OFF AND RUNNING

With the publication of its second newsletter, the organization Canadian Campus Radio has come of age. To quote Al Stirling on page one: "the response has been much better than we really expected." The newsletter contained 22 pages of information, centred around descriptive stories of several of the campus stations, along with the list of programs they are making available on the program exchange.

Stirling, co-ordinating CCR and the newsletter from his offices at Radio Waterloo, is looking for even more co-operation in the future, especially on stations' CRTC comments and technical facilities. Various aspects of campus radio are planned for coverage in articles in the New Year, as well as the usual programming lists, gossip and tidbits of assorted information.

Stations not contributing to CCR are asked to forward information to: Al Stirling, Canadian Campus Radio, Radio Waterloo, University of Waterloo, Waterloo N2L 3G5. With a continuing information flow established CCR will become a unified voice joining together the scattered stations of campus radio.

### BBC RADIO AIRS SHOWS IN NORTH AMERICA

Contemporary radio outlets in the U.S. and Canada are airing a lot of BBC-produced radio programs these days. "History of the Beatles", heard in Canada on the CBC, has now completed six months of airing in 50 American markets and is signed up for 20 more. This BBC production opened a few American ears, and now London Wavelength of NYC (distributors in the U.S.) reports interest at many stations in airing other programs from the thousands of hours the BBC is making available.

Hottest prospect seems to be "Live Concerts from London", a stereo monaural series of 26 one-hour segments. Included are such groups as Deep Purple, Led Zeppelin and Faces. London Wavelength says most U.S. stations who aired the Beatles also interest in the newly-acquired program. In Canada, CHUM-FM is airing the "Pop Spectacular" program with its own title, "London Sessions". CHUM-FM, CJRT-FM (Toronto) and CJUS (University of Saskatoon) are airing the BBC's "Goon Show".

Information on the BBC programs is available from Jerry Acton of the CAB. Programs cost \$5 each (member stations) and other titles available include the live music program "Top of the Pops", as well as "Hancock's Half Hour" (comedy).

## RYERSON'S CRFM ROLLING WITH WINE AND CHEESE

Ryerson Polytechnical Institute finally has a campus station, run by the students. CRFM formerly known as Ryerson Community Radio, initiated its operations with a Wine and Cheese Open House for industry people in early December.

CRFM developed from a lab project for RTA students. Though Ryerson's Radio & TV Arts course is one of the finest in Canada, students didn't have so much as a campus station to gain experience on. CJRT, the Ryerson commercial FM station, only allows RTA students to gain experience as operators, while announcing and administration are handled by professional staff. Eventually, the "lab project" was moulded into an all music station that broadcast from the RTA department. But this year, the executive decided to become autonomous. Plans were approved for funds to be provided by the Ryerson Student Union. Studios were moved to the Jorgenson Hall sub-basement.

The Wine and Cheese Open House attracted personnel from GRT, RCA, Columbia, Radio Gryphon (Guelph), CFRB, CJRT-FM, CHUM, CHUM-FM, CKEY and CFTR. All were escorted through each department of CRFM, which is very well organized, with an administrative staff of eight. (Total staff runs to 70 students.) People from the industry were quite impressed with the calibre of operations, and offered their services to help CRFM in any way possible.

One of CRFM's aims seems to have been achieved already: to create a station of high calibre that would be recognized by the broadcast industry. Several CRFM participants now hold jobs at area radio stations.

The other aim of CRFM was to provide high quality radio entertainment and information that would relate to the needs of Ryerson. Music is contemporary, with no block programming. A news staff of thirty keeps on top of campus news.

CRFM now broadcasts via TV monitors and campus speakers from 8am to 6pm. They will apply for CRTC approval of carrier-current operation soon.

As a member of Canadian Campus Radio, CRFN plans to record interviews with artists playing the Yonge Street strip (one block away) and place them on the CCR program exchange. The Wine and Cheese open house was such a success that CRFM plans another one for early '73, to keep its expanding operations before the industry eye.

## WPRC CINCINNATI PUTS COOPER OFF TV AIRWAVES

ABC-TV, which has been experimenting with various formats in its late night time period 11:30 to 1, had its Cincinnati station cut a rock special in mid-program. "In Concert", which featured Alice Cooper, was ordered off the air by Taft Broadcasting president L.H. Rogers. Fifteen minutes into the show, WPRC-TV viewers saw screens go blank and then "Rawhide" began.

Rogers said he found the all-male Alice

## FULL SLATE FOR CRTC AT MONTREAL HEARINGS

The recent Montreal hearings of the CRTC contained an interesting slate of matters affecting radio. One application to buy a group of five radio stations was opposed by an FM-only operation which said it needed an AM station to help it out of financial difficulties. A corporation of three men involved with CFCY Charlottetown was seeking approval to purchase CJTT New Liskeard, CJKL Kirkland Lake, CKCH North Bay, and CKGB-AM and FM in Timmins. However, CKAT North Bay, which is one of the few FM-only operations in Canada, argued before the CRTC that it should be allowed to buy the North Bay AMer to offset the losses it is experiencing on its FM. Since it is known the CRTC is concerned about the financial picture of its licensees, it will be interesting to see whether the stations will be sold as a package or split up.

Another applicant had the upsetting experience of being told by CRTC chairman Pierre Juneau, to stop wasting the Commission's time. Northern Radio Inc., operators of CHAD Amos, CKRN AM & TV Rouyn, CKVD Val D'or, and CJDG-TV in Lithium Mines, was criticized for failure to solve problems brought up by its listeners. Groups presenting protests reiterated claims that northwest Quebec residents get insufficient local news, too much sports and not enough informative, cultural programs. The company, applying for licence renewals, was told the CRTC was very concerned about the problems, which are not being solved from one renewal to the next.

An application for an AM licence in Lachute, Quebec was opposed by CJET Smiths Falls. CJET felt the proposed frequency would conflict with their signal.

## CHRISTOPHER KEARNEY COMPLETES 2nd LP

Toronto firm Magic Management sends along word that Christopher Kearney has completed the follow-up to his first album "Christopher Kearney". With the recording complete, Sundog Productions is working on the rest of the details like title and cover art, with the release to come in Canada and the U.S. in January, on Capitol records.

Kearney will be touring Western Canada in January, with a week long engagement in Vancouver completing the circuit. His Magic managers report negotiations are proceeding well with a major English agency, for an extensive tour of Britain and Europe

UA's image has received a boost in the last few weeks, with their promotion sheet "Up Al's Alley". The wide readership of Al's Alley in its Compo days, seems to be transferring to the new version. Heavy accent on want ads and radio news seems to be the hook that grabs the programmers' attention.

Allan Matthews, National Promo Wizard behind the Alley, sends along word that "Rockin' Pneumonia" is the hottest UA single, and in Quebec, the hottest UA album is the "Duck You Sucker" soundtrack. This left field hit, now one of Quebec's best sellers by actual sales reports, began at CHOM, the Montreal progressive station. They aired it as a station theme because the choral group on the record sings "Shawn" at one point and it sounded like CHOM. From there, the whole album got play and it went to CJMS French-language play and the Radiomutuel stations.

Two albums hitting hard and fast for UA, are the just released "Don McLean" and War's "World is a Ghetto". Radio play on the singles "Dreidel" and War's title song, are helping the LP sales. Also just out is the Man of La Mancha soundtrack and Peter Sarstedt's "Where do you go to my Lovely" which both show good early indications.

## MIKE GRAHAM ALBUM RELEASE ON GRT

Mike Graham, kicking around the country scene looking for the right sound for several years, picked Buddy Killen as his producer for his session at Nashville's The Soundshop. Results of the session was Graham's album release, "Friends" on the GRT label.

GRT were quick to point up the Canadian content of the album with the use of the RPM MAPL identification logo so as not to mislead programmers. Only two cuts qualify as Canadian content. They are Gene MacLellan's "Redemption City" and "Four Strong Winds" penned by Ian Tyson.

## TENN IS PLANNING AHEAD FOR FLUDD

With Fludd's second LP "On!" just released, manager William Tenn is already hard at work on the third. Tenn recently returned from London, England where he was scouting out studios for the album. ## CBC USES THE SCISSORS ON MAPLE MUSIC JUNKET

The CBC has finally set a date for airing of the pop music special on the Maple Music Junket. The program, filmed last June will air on Jan. 13 but unfortunately (for music fans) will be chopped from 90 minutes to 60. The decision to delete "\$25,000 worth of program" was reported by Globe and Mail columnist Blaik Kirby as being the result of a lack of interest by advertisers in the long version. By making the cuts, CBC hopes to sell \$14,000 of commercial time.

The concession to commercials comes as bad news to several Canadian musicians. Even at 90 minutes, the program allowed only 30 seconds of airtime for some performers. The shorter version will miss seven or eight groups, and even the biggest names will get only one number.

Kirby concluded his column by rapping the CBC for its policies on Canadian pop music. Except for "older-appeal" music like Big Band and Tommy Banks, no contemporary music shows are carried. The just-launched series "Right On!" featuring host Martin Short (of Godspell) has been assigned a fringe time (5 pm).

## FRANCK DERVIEUX PLAYS MUSIC FOR THE MIND

What happens when a Quebec philosopher/intellectual/science-fiction fan goes into the studio to record? Some of the most interesting music ever is what happens. The LP is called "Dimension M", by Franck Dervieux, and it's on Columbia.

Putting a label on the album is very difficult. It's basically instrumental, and could fit into the categories classical, or progressive rock. Contemporary sounds and unusual rhythms abound, creating unbelievably alive and beautiful sounds. The voice of Christiane Robichaud is one of the instruments, along with piano, organ, bass, drums, guitar, electric violin and percussion.

## LLOYD PERCIVAL INTO MUSIC BIZ

Lloyd Percival, director of that great Canadian institution, the Fitness Institute, has a new project these days—promoting a group called Special Delivery. Apparently Percival, while in Detroit working with the Red Wings, ran across the band when he visited the Ponchontrain Hotel. He was so taken with them that he pledged his aid to help the group "make it big". This included bringing them into Toronto, where they cut several demos with Terry Brown at Toronto Sound. A lavish press party was held December 18 at Toronto's Inn On The Park, where promotional videotape of the band was shot.

Special Delivery, though not Canadian, show much potential. Their lead singer is a gal with great power and range, Connie Graham, and the band does a mixed bag of music from Chicago to Sammi Smith.

Percival's future plans for the band, not now signed to a record label, remain unclear. But Special Delivery are sure of one thing—they are getting a chance few other bands get: massive promotion, early in their career.

Franck Dervieux talks about his music like a painter would discuss his paintings, in terms of form, line and texture. He says one of his goals is to bring together the "parallel worlds of adults and young people" with music they both can relate to and discuss. He says he always strives for "the type of show that would force people to open up, put them in contact with new ideas, ideas I can communicate or suggest through my music."

Dervieux' head is already filled with new ideas. In liner notes, he pays tribute to philosophers Robert Champoux and Marshall McLuhan, who influenced him. He talks about the "future-Past", a concept which says that the future is there for all to see (if they are capable), from what is already evident in the past. His music is addressed, he says in the liner notes, to those who can go on a trip with the best legal drug: their own imagination. Music from classical figures such as Liszt is mixed with Dervieux' own new music, creating music that is "a blend of notes and memory-chromosomes travelling through successive "Knots of Time".

When he was 15, Dervieux was a concert pianist in Paris. Later he worked with Serge Gainsbrough, Leo Ferre, and Jacques Brel, as an accompanist. He later became disenchanted with accompaniment, claiming the Chansonniers were just "passing on their own moods through their little tunes. They don't try to get to the heart of society's problems."

Then, he landed in Quebec with Jean-Pierre Ferland, and recorded his album there (Montreal's RCA Studios). Dervieux is excited by Quebec, with its mixture of old-fashioned and avantgarde thinkers. He hopes his music will aid the growth of Quebec by forcing "a juncture in historical time" of these two streams of thought.

Since the liner notes are so important for the understanding of this man's music, Columbia has released the album in two versions, one French and one English.

## MIKE & TOM ROLLING IN HIGH GEAR AT WEA

Mike Reed of WEA passes along word that the winning promo team of Mike & Tom is back in business, with Tom returning from hospital. WEA showed why its promotion department is considered one of the best in Canada, by issuing "The Mike & Tom Christmas Record". This puts the printed Mike & Tom Show into a listenable form for programmers across Canada and is a great attention-getter.

Sales-wise, the Jethro Tull "Living in the Past" is WEA's hottest LP. "Old Dan's Records" continues to sell steadily, and hopes are high for the LP to become Lightfoot's biggest so far. The single is getting play on virtually every radio station, though it's interesting to note that the B-side "You Are What I Am" is definitely heard more than the A, "Same Old Obsession". Although it is just out, Carly Simon's "No Secrets" set is one of WEA's Top Ten, with exceptional radio action on "You're So Vain" to push it along. James Taylor's new album "One Man Dog" is also doing nicely among new product. And advance orders on Neil Young's double LP are very impressive (it's just out).

Upcoming releases include a repackaging of Billy Holiday's old Commodore label 78's in an LP to be titled "Strange Fruit". Interest in the great blues singer has been revived lately because of the biographical flick "Lady Sings the Blues". Another set with interesting potential is "The Age of Television", which will feature 46 excerpts from the first 25 years of American TV. Hosts are Milton Berle and Hugh Downs.

## ENTERTAINMENT PACKAGE TOURING FAR NORTH

Military and civilian personnel living at the radar stations in Canada's far north were visited during December by a package comprised of twelve Canadian entertainers. The program was put together for the Canadian Armed Forces by Toronto entrepreneur Baroness von Vittorac and Rainbow editor Martin Melhuish. Yellowknife, Inuvik and Alert are to be visited.

Frank Gibbs, a folk and country singer, and Sherri-Lee Hall with Trillium, made up the musical portion of the show. Other acts include comedy, a magician, clown, dancers, and a discussion by two Toronto lawyers.

General Manager is now Chuck Benson, production Manager, Waxie Williams and Dan Mody is News Director. Lineup features Wax Williams 6-9AM, J.B. Cartwright till noon and Don Kimery goes to 3PM. 3-6PM is handled by Dan Mody, 6-9PM by Neil Edwards and

9PM-1AM by Rolly Buchanan.

Latest program lineup at CFQC Saskatoon features that rarity of rarities, a two-man morning show from 6AM to noon with Wal 'n Den (Wally Stambuck, Production Manager, and Denny Cari, Program Director). The format is MOT until 9; adult contemporary up to 11 and humour (Trader Time phone-in) till noon. Noon-1PM is heavy with information, female consumer show with Glenis Joyce runs from 1-2PM. The Murray Smith show runs 2-6PM, with country to 4PM and MOT to 6PM. Marty Jeffery brings his young adult rock into play from 6PM to midnite with Dan Germaine hosting the Waxworks from midnite to 6AM. Jim McCrory and Gary Miller do production and weekends, with music director Jason Schoonover also helping out.

Gigantic traditional rocker WABC of NYC is placing the weekly chart in prominence that it hasn't seen lately (what with charts that are alphabetical and stations that don't announce numbers except for No. 1). Their top five is used every week in bus display boards and newspaper ads. The station has virtually no AM rock competition in the biggest radio market in the world. Lately they're more soft-sounding and their jocks do it up softly as well (no more shouting). They've been tagged by some as an adult

contemporary station.

Latest featurette from CAB program exchange is a series of 45 second Snowmobiling Tips, done by Toronto Star outdoor columnist Stan Davies. Fifty in series with price tag at \$1.00 each which makes it very useful as a series for dealers, repair depots or clothing outlets to sponsor.




