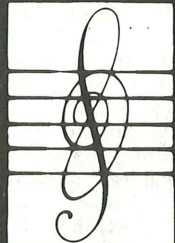

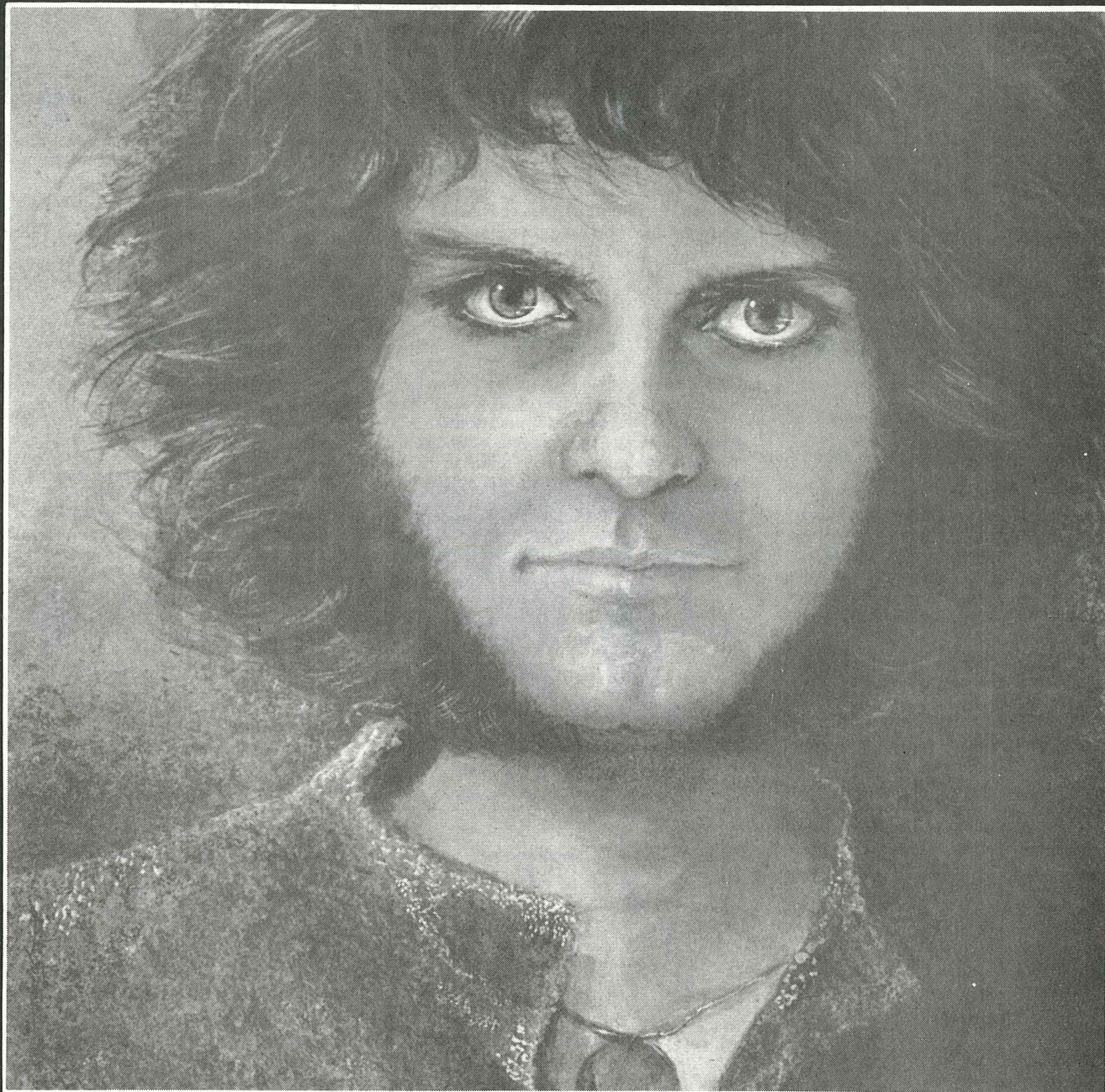

HUD - A&M's superstar

RCA CANADA UNVEILS NEW FALL PRODUCT

RCA Canada Ltd., under the direction of their vice-president and general manager (Record Division), Bob Cooke, took the wraps off a host of new "experiences" in sound at product presentations in Montreal (11) and at their Toronto studios (12). Ed Preston, the man responsible for putting the package together, was unable to present "his baby" because of a sudden illness that forced him off the scene. Coordinating the "hawaiian punch-laced" show was Jack Feeney and Barry Keane with assists from Quebec and Ontario sales and promotion personnel.

The presentation gave Feeney the opportunity to lay a heavy, but sincere hype on "his creation", the "Belafonte Live" album, which was taped through RCA's Montreal mobile services at the O'Keefe Centre in Toronto. On hand, at the Toronto meet, to meet with and talk about their recordings to key dealers, radio and press people were: The Mercey Brothers, Bill Kenny, Charles Linton and Ettore Stratta.

The Mercey Brothers, now gaining national strength on the country charts with "Kentucky Turn Your Back" which was penned by Ottawans Bruce Rawlins and Terry Carisse, will soon bow their self produced album, "Mercey Brothers Country".

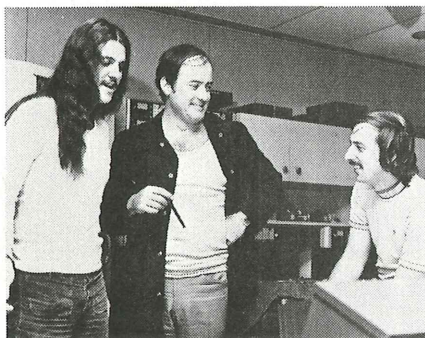
Bill Kenny, the original Mr. Ink Spots who, with his wife Audrey, has been living in Vancouver for more than ten years, helped introduce his new album "With Love" which was produced by Sev Martin and Bert Sprigley at Vancouver's Aragon Studios. Kenny spoke of the importance of music no matter where it came from or from whom, and noted: "My album communicates my voice, not my beauty." Jack Cullen, of radio station CKNW in penning the liner notes for Kenny's new album summed up his remarks with "Canada is where the sun shines on the tenor of Ink Spot fame," and those gathered at both the Montreal and Toronto presentations would appear to have agreed after listening to a very famous and much stronger, in quality, voice from the past.

Charles Linton, star of his own original Canadian musical, "Oh Say Can You See" cleared up a bit of the confusion surrounding

the advance publicity on his album. Teaser ads in RPM featured a U.S. flag, upside down, a sign of distress, without any explanation. A U.S. tipster immediately set out to discredit RPM with being anti-American, which almost created an international situation within the music industry — and it's not over yet. The U.S. State Department is apparently concerned over the use of U.S. trade publications in creating problems where none exist. A booklet, to be included with the album, explains the use of the inverted flag as a symbol of power and not intended as an act of anti-Americanism. His show will soon open in Montreal and hopefully in the U.S.

Ettore Stratta, who discovered Walter Carlos while with Columbia, an association from which resulted in the greatest selling classical LP of all time, "Switched On Bach", was flown into the Toronto show to personally promote his new RCA album, "Adagio". This album, pre-released in Canada, has already shown early indications of being a runaway classical seller. Stratta conducts The Baroque Chamber Orchestra in this new musical experience aimed at the 16 to 50 age group. In explaining his researching the market prior to going into the studios, Stratta was convinced beyond a doubt that the younger crowd were looking for classical music with an instrumental message that would "turn them on".

Other samplings included selections from the "Singalong Jubilee" album featuring the Jubilee Singer; cuts from Daniel Hetu Jou Les Grands Succès De Roger Whittaker" (Daniel is the son of Quebec's million seller organ maestro, Lucien Hetu); The Guess Who "Live At The Paramount"; and another Winnipeg success story, Robbie McDougall. The latter first hit with his Numbus 9

production "The Theme" which was produced by Ben McPeck. His initial album release, under title of his own name, features the "Theme From Rowdyman", the Canadian film, currently meeting with coast to coast acclaim. This theme was penned by McPeck for the young piano virtuoso.

Like other Canadian majors, RCA has also concentrated on the production of domestic talent and the use of Canadian recording facilities and musicians. Their product presentation was 99.3% Canadian content.

JOHNNY YOUNG OFF ON FONTHILL LABEL

Another "steeltowner" (Hamilton, Ontario), Johnny Young, has entered the disc race with the release of his Fonthill album, under title of his own name. The young country singer has already picked up strong play from CKPT/Brantford, CJET/Smiths Falls, CKWS/Kingston and CHOV/Pembroke. Robert Thomson, president of Fonthill Records and producer of the Sound Canada session, has also received promise of play from several principal and breakout market stations. Distribution is being handled by the label out of 28 Allanton Blvd. Brantford, Ontario (519-752-8041). Thomson has been dealing personally with the Towers and Woolco chains in Ontario, the stocking of which has necessitated a second pressing of the album.

Young has been creating a sizeable buyer's market for himself with his touring of Ontario centres. He has played dates in Thunder Bay, Kingston, Smiths Falls, Deep River and others. He is currently playing the Franklin Hotel in Kirkland Lake with upcoming dates in Timiskaming, P.Q., St. Catharines, Peterboro and the Alpine in his hometown of Hamilton.

With the support of fifteen radio stations and strong requests for the Young/Stevens penning of "Rockin' As The Winds Blow", Thomson has culled this cut for a soon-to-be-released single. The flip will be "I'm Tired". Publishing is handled by April Robin-CAPAC.

VARIETY CLUB SET TO SPONSOR BIKE-A-THON

Toronto's Variety Club chapter, Ontario Tent 28, is sponsoring a city-wide bicycle marathon to raise money to benefit limbless children. The Variety Club is an international organization of people in showbusiness and related fields who support children's charities.

Money raised by the Bike-A-Thon, to occur October 22nd, will go to Variety Village, which contains a vocational school for handicapped boys and an electronic limb centre for limbless children. Variety Bike-a-Thon chairman expects to attract an average of five thousand cyclists to each of three courses to be laid out by Metro Parks department.

and top broadcasters to find out if the two could create a dialogue. The purpose of that first meeting was to see if the two factions could coexist in a spirit of unity toward one purpose. remember how negative the feeling was before that first meeting.

Some at C4 know how positive the meet in Montreal really was. It was this meeting that brought about what we dared not admit to or talk about . . . that we really weren't an industry.

At C4, there was a great deal of soul-searching. What Canada really had was a group of record distributors; that the industry was handed to us pre-made; that there was no adventure within the industry except to keep the business at a status quo.

At C3 the industry learned that promotion was weak. That our methods were behind the times. That we were too anxious to blame and not anxious enough to make changes. We looked for a scapegoat. C3 told us there was a problem, but there hadn't been an answer. Both the record and the radio people walked away confused.

At C4, the words "star system" became the theme of the meeting. The theme was introduced by a representative of the French-Canadian broadcasters, Serge Trudeau of CJMS (Mutuel Network).

As he explained the creation of the French-Canadian music explosion, it became clear that the record business in Quebec had created the stars first, and the hits during. In the rest of Canada, we concentrate on regional hits or token programming (and the reason is a lack of a star system that is as bright as that of the other music nations.

The print media came under criticism because of their concentration on foreign stars; their use of the American and British measuring stick to judge Canadian artists, their lack of professionalism and their negativity. Indeed a 30% regulation for the print media might be in order with a few comments about over exposing two or three of Canada's established artists who really don't need and don't want THAT much press (in Canada.)

Canadian television might ask itself what role it has played in assisting the Canadian star system. Canadian producers often upstage their artists in an effort to make the product more acceptable.

The very TV networks that today buy "dumped" foreign television rights could very well be selling the world, Canadian productions, featuring Canadian stars, in a few years.

At C4, unity was discussed. The problem is serious. The Canadian music ruling is here to stay. That was made very clear. It will only succeed if all factions involved work together to that end.

Radio must play the records. Record companies must make enough of them. The dailies must work at making sure that the press of Canada is made as available to Canadian performers as it is to foreign performers. Our critics must become more capable and less critical (for criticism sake alone). Our television system in Canada must work hard and budget heavily to

make Canadian television a medium for young talented performers. If necessary the networks may have to clean house and find producers who are interested in working with stars (not being stars).

The combined cooperation of the media that can make stars will make it possible for the music director who is today worried about his small town image to be happy about his big country participation. The music director who is today trying to break a sure hit, may tomorrow play a game of "a hit is born". He will be able to say that no one else in the world was playing the record the day he put it on the air, because that was the first copy to ever be made available, for programming.

At C4, RPM was accused of being negative about programmers. What that means is that we are not reflecting the attitude of the programmers properly. If there is a positive attitude among the programmers, perhaps we have missed it, and it is up to the programmers to show us their positive approach. C4 brought out no such positive approach.

But let's take the programmer at his word and trust him. Let's take a very positive approach toward what the programmers are doing. Let's look at MUCH Productions as godsent and help them to create hits for Canada and Canadian radio. What difference does it make where the records come from if they are played and create more product. Let's allow the Canadian regionality to flourish.

Let each market play its local talent. Let's try to create a music industry at any cost. Even if criticism of the system is valid, let's sweep that criticism under the carpet for a few months or even a year. One thing we do know is that the 30% AM Canadian music ruling will be with us for a long time. It may even be a higher percentage. What we need is a star system to make it a success, and only the product will be successful if the ruling is a success. We're grown up boys, we can run our ships very well.

There were many points raised several of which went unanswered at the time of the "open forum". One in particular from Carole Risch of Much Productions who pointed out that Much has to fight as hard as anyone else for airplay on CHUM. It was revealed later in conversation with CRTC Radio Chief (AM), Doug McGowan that: "According to a recent Commission one-day monitoring study of CHUM, 242 pieces of music were broadcast, of which 75 were Canadian. Seven performances during that day were Much Productions." This, of course, represents less than 10%.

Two things came from C4. Star system and a positive approach. We certainly can't criticize either. We agree with a need for the star system, but even if we don't agree with the pollyanna approach to an industry in trouble, we are certainly willing to cooperate and give it a try. But anyone who wants to object about a lack of criticism in RPM will have to tread carefully, and whatever the outcome, the name of the game is "profit" and that is a point that was made very well at C4.

(By the way, none of our communication meetings have ever made a profit.)

RCA TO MARKET VIDEO PLAYER WITHIN A YEAR

It doesn't look much different than a hard-cover book, but inside is a cartridge that contains a video tape that will record or playback for one hour on the set that you have in your home right now.



All you need is an RCA Selectavision Mag-Tape Player-recorder and the cartridge.

industry? Video cartridges may soon be the picture and the sound of entertainment through any TV set. Not only will you hear the recording, but suitable video will enhance the entertainment of the sound. The artist that is today singing into a mike will soon have to sing before a camera to produce a cartridge that will be bought like a record and taken home and played, but the video is an added feature.

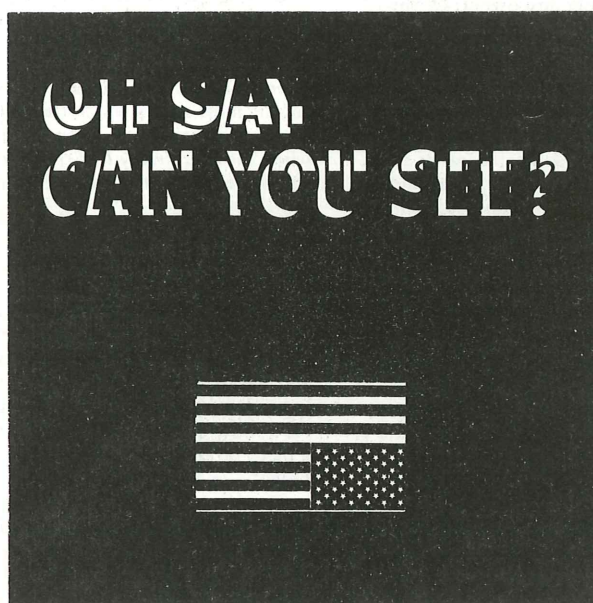
You may think that all of this is only on the drawing boards, but RCA has previewed the new unit and the tape to the trade and the results were just short of being fantastic.

The potential of this new system is limitless. The entertainment value is even being underrated by the trade. Endless uses for video cartridges crop up in the mind. Everything from industrial training programs, educational courses and lectures to video cook (books)

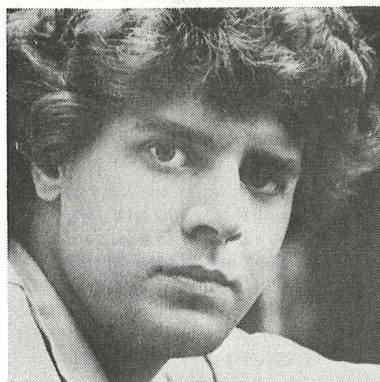
and full feature motion pictures may be made available for purchase or loan on video cartridges. Not only can they enhance recordings of entertainment, but the day may come when the first edition of a new book will be the whole scenerio on video tape.

RCA is the first company to give their system the full ballyhoo treatment, and by late 1973, you will not only be able to buy a unit, take it home and attach it to the antenna terminals of your TV set, but you will also be able to buy pre-recorded cartridges at that time to play on the unit.

Maybe the single you wanted that day will be available on a video cartridge with the artist performing on the tube, or the LP you wanted will be available with one added feature. You'll enjoy watching the performance while you listen to rock or Rachmoninov on a video cartridge.

What about the other media

Well, Montreal's C4 meeting has come and gone, and I think that every one present, and there were about a hundred and sixty, are beginning to see the light at the end of the tunnel. I personally learned a great deal, not only at the meeting itself, but in conversations at the cocktail get-together which followed; in restaurants, hallways and washrooms. A number of the radio people present

confided that at last they understood the rackjobber's function and problems. Many of the record people, and myself, developed a better understanding of the problems of the radio programmer and owner. Of the entire series, C4 proved to be the most valuable and I don't believe we have yet begun to tap the potential of these get-togethers.

Naturally there were some points which had been worn to death in previous meetings. There were a few pot shots, several of them aimed at RPM. And we've got no grounds to complain. We get our fifty cents' worth in every week of the year and have no right, or desire, to deny anyone their opinion. In fact we welcome it.

The single most important point driven home to me in Montreal was made by Serge Trudeau of the giant CJMS. In contrasting the Quebec radio-music situation with that prevailing in the rest of Canada, Trudeau quite accurately noted that there is a full blown star system in Quebec. There are upwards of a dozen weekly tabloids dealing with music and radio, with the emphasis on local artists; there is enormous television coverage of home-grown artists. These are essential elements in a star system. Trudeau did, however, neglect to mention that the dominant language of Quebec has a very great deal to do with this being the case.

This, however, does not negate the truth of

KINGSTON LOOKING FOR TERCENTENARY SONG

The City of Kingston is soliciting compositions from professional and amateur songwriters as entries in a contest to select a tune to celebrate the three hundredth birthday of the city, one of the most venerable on the continent. Andrew Marshall, chairman of the Kingston Tercentenary Song Committee is organizing the contest on a national scale. The winning tune is expected to be an up-tempo MOR composition suitable for use in thirty and sixty second commercial spots. Royalties, in addition to a five hundred dollar award will be made to the winning composer.

Marshall is currently in negotiation with major labels for the release of the tune on wax. A substantial local sale is anticipated. Closing date for entries is September 30th, but will in all likelihood be extended in order to accommodate latecomers. Details may be had from Marshall at Box 1418, Kingston.

his words. We need an all-media star system in English Canada. Up until two years ago all major companies in Canada had been distributors of a commodity. Since the star system in the United States had developed the artists, all that was necessary was to take record "X" into the stations. In many cases, the music director would be familiar with the artist through magazines, dailies, television, teen tabloids or what have you. There was no justifiable need for a star system. We profited handsomely through this situation.

But in 1972 we are dealing with records which are not pre-hyped through the other media. Radio's audience, and radio itself, have not been pre-sold on the artist or song. We are working from the ground up. And unfortunately, in too many cases, we are forgetting this. When a promotion man takes in the new Foot in Coldwater single it is an entirely different state of affairs than when he takes in the new Donny Osmond. There is a gigantic structure behind the success of most artists which ties in press, broadcasting, endorsements, even movies, so that when the disc finally hits the turntable, three quarters of the battle is won.

It will take time to develop this star-making process. There are healthy early indications. On the plane to Montreal I discovered a copy of the Vancouver Province. In the entertainment section was a picture of Skip Prokop taken at the recent Ontario Place concert. Absolutely excellent! The mountains and the three thousand miles are conquered in an instant by this type of newspapering. Now, how do we get the Toronto Star to do a piece on the Stampeders' appearance in Calgary, or the Calgary Herald to do a piece on Dr. Music's appearance in Regina? When we have the answer to that question, we will

be well on our way to establishing an effective means of creating stars. Obviously high key public relations and effective presentation supply part of the answer, but I tend to think that the media is in the same position as the record business. They need first to realize that their responsibility no longer stops at distributing a ready made product (stories on established artists) but is now extended to contributing to the establishment of those artists, who will in turn supply the media with a continuing source of material.

The same applies to television. The early indications are there, waiting only to mature and be developed. Perhaps the most important thing to keep in mind here is that what will result will be a never ending circle of positive results. Canadian television and radio are crying out for "stars" (and owners of broadcast-press holdings should keep this very much in mind when evaluating the performance of their magazines and newspapers), the multi-media star system could supply them. Any Canadian newspaper reader would rather read about a given Canadian legitimate star than his British, American or French counterpart. The result of a star system could possibly be increased interest in Canadian press by Canadians.

Again look at the Quebec example here. The enormous proliferation of consumer music and broadcast tabloids in Quebec indicates that there is an interest in home-grown personalities and news that is little short of fanatical.

But the pump has to be primed. Let's start by paying more attention to all mediums of communication. Let's keep them informed of what we are trying to do. The result can only be of benefit to everyone.

LORENCE HUD A&M'S
CANADIAN SUPER STAR

Before the tag "super" gets out of hand through over use, you had better get used to it when referring to some of the latest Canadian discoveries. A&M have a "super-star" name of Lorence Hud. We went through several weeks of "Hud Is" and then we learned that his first name was Lorence. Speculation was running high as to who he was, what label he recorded for, if indeed he had, and if the promotion was just a "super hype".

Well, the secret is out. Lorence Hud is. He has recorded an album - for A&M, and if it was a "super hype", it worked. The name Lorence Hud is firmly entrenched in the minds of programmers across the country and now all they're waiting for is Hud's sound, which should be arriving about the same time as this issue.

We took a little different approach to Hud and his cover story and attempted to get this shy poet to talk about his album, which follows.

At 25 you're no chicken so you must have been around the recording business for some time. How did it all start?

It started with a Calgary group called For Keeps which was managed by Doug Hutton. I also cut a couple of things for RCA and Apex which was recorded in Los Angeles in 1967 and 1968. At 25 I may be going over the hill but I don't think that way. For me, it's gone fairly well lately. I've always played in bands but I decided to do a solo bit this time around.

Do your songs relate to problems you've had in the business?

Somewhat. But I don't depend on the usual or common material for songwriting. I attempt to be more subtle unless it happens otherwise.

It's been suggested by A&M and others who have heard your final mix that you're going to be Canada's first "superstar". How do you feel about this tag and do you think the programmers may be expecting too much from you?

I've never really looked at myself as anything else but a musician with some ability at writing and singing and just wanting to communicate with my audience whether they be live or through a record. I just hope the programmers, or anyone else for that matter, like what they hear, regardless of the tag.

Who was your producer? Did you write most of the material, and what studios did you record in?

I produced the session myself, thanks to my manager Paul Cheesborough who had enough confidence in me to come up with the necessary money for the session. I wrote all the songs myself and played all the instruments you hear on the album. That's also me doing the vocal background. We used Sound Canada and Eastern Sound Studios in Toronto with the final mixing being done in Los Angeles at A&M's studios. I play fourteen instruments. You can pick out a

few of these which are: organ, piano, vibes, harpsichord, bass guitar, drums, saxophone, and glockenspiel.

Pete Beauchamp, national promotion for A&M Canada was asked why he took Hud's tapes to Los Angeles for final mixing. His answer: "Mixing and the cutting of lacquers are very important to your finished disc product. Unfortunately, in Canada, we have a bit of a problem with cutting lacquers. This process has to be watched carefully and, unfortunately, people here don't watch carefully enough. We had the advantage of having studios in Los Angeles belonging to A&M so did the mixing and cutting of lacquers there. We just didn't want to take a chance with Hud's career in the balance."

Reports have it that A&M south of the border, particularly on the executive level who heard Hud's final mixing, are really high on this new Canadian discovery. A&M in Canada however, haven't taken any steps toward asking for a simultaneous U.S./Canada release. Says Beauchamp: "To tell the truth I'm concerned only with scoring here in Canada. If we can make a loud enough noise in Canada, a world release is easy. We don't want to concentrate on Lorence as being just another Canadian artist - but this is where we want to break him."

A&M are now putting together a strong national promotion campaign that should see Hud break into all formats available: MOT, MOR and country. The A&M people are so high on the "Sign Of A Gypsy Queen" cut that it's expected this will be culled from the album as Hud's first single.

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Putting the armed forces to work

Has it ever struck you as being, well just a bit strange, that Canada still employs a large armed services organization when we haven't been at war for a quarter of a century?

All those guys shining buckles, peeling spuds, playing marches, getting up at dawn, saying

"yes sir", running the flag up and down, firing off a few guns at dummy targets, driving trucks, flying aeroplanes.

It's all a bit degrading when you think about it for a moment. Still I suppose this obsession with mentality that pervades the armed forces has something to do with the psychology of discipline. If you can get a guy to dig holes for temporary latrines, you can get him to do almost anything, even to kill people that he's never even met before.

A soldier's lot, one must presume, is a less than entertaining proposition. One man's meat may be another man's poison, but it's pretty difficult to think of a stint in the armed services as being anything but a total drag, even for an impulsive, violence-crazy redneck. You may get off killing people but you still have to turn the lights out when they tell you. "They" always know best.

It's hard not to feel sorry for these poor people who wind up making the armed forces their career, especially when the forces are not doing what they were formed to do — make war. It's a bit like being in the business of manufacturing records and always preparing for it — cleaning the presses, dusting off the tape machines, designing jackets — but never really actually doing it. You therefore don't get much chance to find solid gratification in what you do.

Not only that — it costs us millions of dollars to maintain this decadent drudgery. I'll agree that nothing is impossible in this day and age, but I would have to confidently predict that Canada will not find itself involved in a conventional land war before the present crop of armed servicemen have hung up their guns. The facts of the situation and our proximity to the U.S. would appear to indicate that (a) wars of the future will be fought with weapons we do not possess, and (b) if we are attacked by anybody it will involve our southern neighbours and they've got the weapons to deal with it.

So why not find something useful and gratifying to occupy the long days of our armed forces. Unlike many of my contemporaries, I am not yet suggesting the disbandment of the Canadian armed forces. I'd just like to see these men and women put their talents into something constructive rather than destructive.

Unemployment being what it is, we obviously cannot use our armed forces to perform tasks which would make even more people redundant. We must locate tasks which by their very nature cannot be carried out by any-

thing but skilled people and high-priced machinery.

I think I may have found something that fits the bill. Why don't we utilize the armed forces to help maintain the wild life of this country, which surely has to be one of our most urgent priorities at the present time?

Let me give you an example. Every year at about this time, the polar bears which inhabit the northern stretches of this country begin their trek to Hudson Bay to await the formation of ice. The ice usually comes first at a place called Cape Churchill, and it is normal for groups of polar bears to travel 300 miles across ground to reach this area.

Frequently when they arrive at the end of summer, food is scarce and the younger more adventurous young bears follow the scents of garbage dumps and a couple of dozen of them usually wind up in Churchill, which is only a few miles away.

The largest garbage dump in Churchill, and the one which attracts the majority of the bears, is to be found on Federal property.

People being what they are (even in the far north), it isn't long before a few fools start antagonizing the bears and creating what the community begins to think is a threat to local children. I mean, wild polar bears wandering around the back streets waiting for some delicate morsel on a bike to ride by. God, we've got to do something about it.

So far we've got a garbage dump, hungry animals awaiting winter, some local idiots annoying the animals, and now a need to destroy the animals.

Yes folks, last year the local elders in Churchill were all set to shoot the polar bears which had been tempted into the area by the smell of human waste. Man against beast is no contest in the violence sweepstakes.

In the years prior to 1971, the local people had simply enticed any stray bears into the back of a truck and driven them ten miles out of town. Most of them returned the next day and it was sort of a game. But the bears did no harm and the snows soon came and the problem ended.

Last year, the Churchill people were all set

to fill the bears full of lead because they wouldn't leave town. Enter Brian Davies, the director of the International Fund for Animal Welfare with a plan to save the bears and the town. Through money raised from compassionate people all over the world (yes, there are a few in every country) Brian was able to get the \$12,000 needed to save the bears. He hired an aircraft, loaded as many bears as possible on board, and flew them 300 miles north. It took several trips but the animals were saved from murder.

I, for one, don't think that concerned individuals like Brian Davies should have to spend their time and money organizing airlifts, to save the fauna of this part of the world. I like to believe that the taxes I pay are used for purposes like the preservation of wildlife.

That's why we have a government. Not only to build roads and sink oil wells and plan airports and keep the wheat from rotting in the silos — but also to preserve the precious little remaining of this country's natural life.

There is an armed services base in Fort Churchill (three miles from Churchill proper) and there is an all-weather air strip in Churchill. Instead of making the people shine their buckles and practise playing war, let's utilize the public services to airlift these polar bears to safety.

That would be a positive step in modern utilization of a valuable labor force, and would enable these people to feel some kind of gratification from what they do. I know I'd feel good if I was able to save a polar bear from some maniac's rifle.

The bears are heading down to Churchill now. If we don't mobilize the armed forces for a bit of real combat (life against death in the animal world) and if Brian Davies doesn't come to the rescue again, these bears are invariably going to die.

If you have any faith at all in participatory democracy, fire a letter off to the man you think should lead the country asking for armed forces intervention in the Churchill polar bear affair. It would indeed be nice to know that this election year would be distinguished by such a piece of rare, humane consideration for the few living things left on this continent.

U.A. RECORDS SIGNS NOBODY

U.A. Records, showing strongly in its first year as an independent has signed Nobody to a recording contract. Heading the six man group is Ian Guenther, a graduate of St. Francis Xavier University in Nova Scotia, and the Julliard School of Music.

First to issue from the group is "Sing a Song For Me" f/s "The Good is Gone", written by Torontonians, John Albany, and produced by Guenther at RCA studios in Toronto.

Guenther has an impressive list of credits including stints with Lighthouse, Bruce Cockburn and Fraser and Debolt.

BOBBY CURTOLA RETURNS TO SANDS

Another great Canadian talent has been discovered by the United States, and dubbed a superstar. Canada's Mr. Personality, Bobby Curtola is, to steal a line from Buck Owens, big in Vegas.

It was announced in the May 20th RPM that Curtola was held over at the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas, and signed to a five year, two million dollar contract. Since then, Curtola has played the Calgary Stampede, Edmonton's Klondike Days, Saskatoon, Winnipeg's International Inn, and opened again at the Sands in Vegas on September 1st.

Programmers

Music ruling not clear to all programmers

The Canadian (AM) music ruling is still a mystery to some programmers. Many phone calls, and conversations with programmers have made it obvious that some (not all) programmers have never seen that section of the regulations, and that some (not all) programmers have seen but are still confused about some aspects of the ruling.

We would like to reprint the ruling in a box over the next few weeks and try to explain some of the aspects of the ruling that may be confusing. But stick with us, we may have a few technical corrections from Doug McGowan of the CRTC if we slip an extra word in somewhere, so you must read the whole series or you may get us and your station in trouble.

The most important thing to remember is that any record released in the first stage of the ruling (that qualified as Canadian content) is considered Canadian content forever (or at least until further notice.) So you can play a record that is one part Canadian in the second year (as long as it was released during the first year of the ruling.)

In the second year of the ruling, the record released must be any of the two criteria

to be eligible for the 30% requirement. Either Music (M), Artist (A), Production (P) or Lyrics (L) — any two of those four must be Canadian as spelled out in the ruling. For example "Snowbird" by Elvis Presley is two parts Canadian content (M&L).

If a Canadian artist records a song that has music, lyrics by a non-Canadian, and the record is produced outside of Canada, the only portion that is Canadian is the artist (A) but M, L and P are all foreign, so in the second year of the ruling, the record is not considered Canadian content as outlined in the ruling and does not qualify. Play it if you wish, but don't count it as part of the 30%.

If your station is suffering from too much repetition of the same songs by the same artists, the problem might be that the music director or the librarian doesn't understand the ruling or doesn't check the wealth of Cancon info in RPM and on the back of record jackets, and on most record labels (or just doesn't care to take the time to become familiar with this information.)

Now, this is the ruling exactly as it was issued by the CRTC. We have reprinted that portion concerning itself with Radio (AM) Canadian content music:

"12. (1) At least 30% of the musical compositions broadcast by a station or network operator between the hours of 6.00 a.m. and 12 midnight shall be by a Canadian and shall be scheduled in a reasonable manner throughout such period.

(2) From January 18, 1971 to January 17, 1972, a musical composition shall be deemed to be by a Canadian if it fulfils at least one of the conditions set out in subsection (5).

(3) After January 18, 1972, a musical composition shall be deemed to be by a Canadian if it fulfils at least two of the conditions set out in subsection (5).

(4) After January 18, 1973, at least 5 per cent of the musical compositions broadcast by a station or network operator between 6.00 a.m. and 12 midnight shall fulfil the condition set out in either (b) or (c) of subsection (5).

(5) The following are the conditions referred to in subsections (2), (3) and (4):
(a) the instrumentation or lyrics were principally performed by a Canadian;

(b) the music was composed by a Canadian;
(c) the lyrics were written by a Canadian; and
(d) the live performance was wholly recorded in Canada.

(6) A mechanical reproduction of a musical composition that is deemed at any time to be by a Canadian continues to be so deemed thereafter.

(7) If a station operator is able to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Commission that the application of this section would result in a significant reduction in the quality and diversity of program service within the area normally served by his station, the Commission may vary the application of this section.

(8) For the purposes of this section, a person shall be deemed to be a Canadian if
(a) he is a Canadian citizen;
(b) he is a landed immigrant as defined in the Immigration Act; or
(c) his ordinary place of residence was in Canada during the six months, immediately preceding his contribution to the musical composition in question."

CFGO LAYS HEAVY PROMO ON OTTAWA

CFGO, the newest radio station in the country, is currently pushing with an extensive promotional campaign to establish itself in Ottawa radio. The campaign includes teaser broadcastings, "GO/14" tee shirts, buttons, aeroplane banners, bus cards, billboards, daily press ads and so on. The clincher is the give-away of a Datsun 240-Z to the winner of a "guess where it's at" contest.

The new outlet is owned by CFTO TV (Baton Broadcasting) and is thus a sister station of CKLW, Windsor. CBC TELEVISION MARKS TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation celebrated its twentieth anniversary in the television business last week (6th). The government-owned network hit the video airwaves on September 6th, 1952, with CBFT, Montreal, to be followed two days later by CBLT, Toronto. The CBC was acting on government authority and with government loans. In 1949, the government announced an interim television policy which allowed the CBC to begin planning production centres and broadcast facilities in major centres. At that time, only CBC affiliates were permitted to hold television licenses.

CFHG THRIVING ON VANCOUVER ISLAND

When playlist additions to radio station CFHG first appeared in RPM's Programmers section, many in the industry requested more information on the station. Librarian, Simon Klautd, has filled us in. CFHG is a non-profit, non-commercial operation broadcasting on 1490 with a power of fifteen watts from the Canadian Forces Station Holbert in the San Josef Valley, located in the northern extremity of Vancouver Island. On the air for over nine years, CFHG operates with volunteer help from servicemen and their families and broadcasts to an audience of fifteen hundred, including workers at the giant Rayonier Logging Company.

Due to geographical and atmospheric circumstances, reception of outside stations is unusual, so CFHG provides a complete service to its listeners consisting of twelve hours a day of CBC network programming, tempered with six hours of self-originated material. Over the nine years of operation, the station has accumulated a library of ten thousand singles and albums, but of course is always happy to receive additional new material.

Staff of the station is as follows: Rod Ives, manager; Leo Ageson, assistant manager; Merrill Humphrey, program director; and Simon Klautd, librarian and secretary. Address is CFGH 1490, Box 8, San Josef, British Columbia.

"Canada AM" marks the first significant threat by television to radio in the morning hours. Radio has traditionally had the upper hand with the early morning crowd, television not showing strongly until the work day has started. If "Canada AM" is able to attract significant numbers of viewers, programmers of early morning radio may well be forced to reconsider their programming methods and concepts.
