

Kanata launches Materick promotion

SMALL TO CAPITOL AS NATIONAL PROMO

John Small has been appointed to the post of National Promotion Manager for Capitol Records. The above announcement was made by Dave Evans, Director of Sales and Promotion for Capitol. Small replaces Bill Bannon who assumes the newly created position of Artist Development and Marketing Coordinator.

With this appointment, Capitol leads the way in attempting to arrange a closer rapport between programmers and record people. Small, until recently, served as operations manager and program director of WKNR AM/FM in Detroit and as a radio/music veteran of fourteen years, fathered the birth of Detroit "underground" radio during his tenure as manager of WABX. Moving to WKNR he brought a progressive music format to its FM outlet while retaining a good portion of the Top 40 market with its AM outlet. Small has always been a keen observer of the record scene and was one of a trio that brought about the "Paul McCartney Death" investigation of 1970.

Living in the shadow of the giant CKLW for so many years, Small became intensely interested in the Canadian recording scene. His new post will allow him the advantage of being able to speak to programmers — having a knowledge of their problems. He noted: "Now, more than ever, music buyers and programmers are looking to Canada for new, fresh, innovative product. Nothing will satisfy me more than to forward this vital movement both nationally and internationally."

MAX FERGUSON RETURNS TO CBC RADIO NETWORK

Following a long absence, caused by the CBC technicians' strike and summer vacations, Max Ferguson rides the airwaves again. The "Max Ferguson Show" re-appeared last week, with side-kick Allan McFee in tow. Once again Ferguson is delighting his audience with characterizations of figures in the news. Between the satire, Ferguson plays his own choice of records and engages in banter with McFee.

RAY GRIFF RETURNS TO DOT IN THE U.S.

Ex-Calgarian Ray Griff has rejoined his old label, Dot. His Blue Echo product is distributed in Canada by GRT who recently released "The Entertainer" (9230 1014). Griff was signed to Dot in 1968 and 1969 where he established himself as a country act to watch. He moved over to Royal American Records and hit with "Patches" and "The Morning After Baby Let Me Down".

Griff has however, had much more success as a songwriter, penning compositions for Faron Young, Eddy Arnold, Jim Reeves, Jerry Lee Lewis, Wayne Newton and George Hamilton IV. The latter made a Canadian hit out of his "Canadian Pacific".

Contract negotiations were signed by Carla Scarborough of Blue Echo Music and Frank Ratner, a Nashville attorney.

DON AND JIM HAGGART HAPPENING FOR ARPEGGIO

It hasn't been too many months since Gary Buck and John Arpin bowed their Arpeggio label which showcases country and MOR Canadian talent. However, the artists signed to Arpeggio are making much of the promotional action on their own. The brother act of Don and Jim Haggart have made impressive gains up the country charts across Canada with their initial release, "I'm Coming Home". The song was written by Jim for his wife, Mary. The flip, "Nashville Girl" has found favour with several stations including CFGM.



Born in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, the Haggarts have been making it together, professionally, for the past year. Jim, however, has been working the band circuit for several years. He started out as lead guitar with the Blue Cats that made a bit of noise in the Maritimes in the 1960s and finally decided to devote all his time to writing in 1969. At about the same time, younger brother Don was gigging with The Buffalo, a New Glasgow group. The two brothers finally got together and made a bid for the disc race earlier this year. The first time they performed together, aside from practices, was their recording session at RCA's Toronto studios. This session, with Gary Buck producing, resulted in the release of their "Coming Home" deck.

One of the big breaks for the Haggarts was the interest in their writing by George Hamilton IV. Hamilton, who is very popular in the Maritimes, picked up a couple of Don Haggart's compositions which are to be included on his next album release.

RALSTONS CELEBRATE 5th YEAR OF BOOT JAMBOREE

Irene and Dave Ralston, two of the original boosters of Canadian country talent, have just completed five years of hosting the now successful Boot Jamboree. This Sunday evening country concert is held at the Locarno Ballroom in the east end of Toronto and has been the launching pad for many of Canada's young country talent. Several of these people who have been given a hand by the Ralstons return on a regular basis for appearances at the Jamboree.

The Ralstons celebrated their fifth birthday by kicking off their new season - Sept. 24th. In for the opener were: Carroll Baker, Roy McCaull, Gary Hooper and Mike Graham. Upcoming dates will see Marathon Records, through Doug Taylor, present the family of Marathon artists (Oct 8) with Ed LaBuick presenting a Country Gold Night Dec. 3rd.

MURRAY HUNT AGENCY BACKING SCOTT/DOUCETTE

Murray Hunt, who heads up his own booking agency based in St. Catharines, has had much success in the pushing of two local artists. Chris Scott and Gerry Doucette. Scott, now showing with his Boot single, "Now That I'm Back", is a native of Niagara Falls and has been experiencing heavy booking throughout the Niagara Peninsula.

Doucette, a native of the Maritimes is now residing in St. Catharines. His initial album release "Never Ending Song of Love" on the Marathon label has been an excellent promotion vehicle for bookings. Doucette penned two of the compositions: "My Prince Edward Isle" and "Fifi De La Gaspesie" with the remainder being songs popularized by Stompin' Tom Connors and other Canadian artists.

DOMINION OFF WITH HOOPER SINGLE

Al Hooper is off and running with another Dominion single, "Toronto With Milk and Honey", a self penning. Publishing is through Two Brothers Music - BMI. The flip, "To Save Humanity", also written by Hooper is published by Waterless Melon Music-BMI.

Hooper is scheduled for Cy True's "Country-time" (CBC) show Oct. 1st, at which time he will perform his "Toronto" number. Hooper books himself through his own Toronto based agency.

BARRY GREENFIELD OFF WITH SINGLE FOR AXE

Axe Records' Greg Hambleton has acquired North American rights to Barry Greenfield's "Sweet America", according to Skip Fox of Media Man. Greenfield recently hit with his "New York Is Closed Tonight", on the Laurie label.

The Axe release comes about through an agreement between Harvey Lisberg, of Kennedy Street Enterprises and was produced by Graham Gouldman, producer of the Yardbirds' "For Your Love". The single is Cancon.

COLIN BUTLER BIG HIT ON WHEELING WWVA SHOW

Colin Butler, the eleven year old country singer from Ottawa, took Wheeling WWVA and its millions of listeners on a Canadian trip for his Sept. 8th appearance. So successful was his appearance that Glen Reeves, general manager of the show, signed the young Butler for two more appearances — Oct. 7 and Nov. 4th.

Butler returned to Canada to headline the Binbrook Agricultural Fair (15); the Community Club Charity Show in Toronto (16); the Leaside Lions Club Crippled Children's Benefit Show (17); and three dates in Mary's Town in Newfoundland (21 through 23). After his Oct. 7 date in Wheeling he will appear on CFTO's Crippled Children's Telethon with Paul Anka and Lorne Greene (Oct. 8).

Doug Taylor, A&R and promotion for Marathon Records, reports good sales for Butler's recent album release. A single release is expected shortly.

BARBERSHOP HARMONY AT MASSEY HALL

The Toronto chapter of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America presented "Onta-Fame '72" September 17 at Massey Hall. The Society was founded to further the cause of barber shop style singing throughout North America. The Society boasts six hundred choruses for a total of forty eight thousand members. The SPEBSQS is a non-profit, educational and charitable foundation.

Part of the proceeds from the Massey Hall show will go to finance treatment for children with speech and hearing defects.

HEAVY ITINERARY FOR ARPEGGIO'S ROSTAD

Wayne Rostad, currently happening with his RCA-distributed Arpeggio single, "November Rain", is inked into a heavy personal appearance schedule. RCA's Scott Richards, touting Rostad single, lists the following dates. Sept. 4th through 9th, Seaway Hotel, Windsor; September 14-16, Burlington Homes Show; September 18 - October 7, Whitehouse Motor Hotel, Renfrew; and October 23 - November 4, Edison Hotel, Toronto.

The "November Rain" single is picking up healthy plays from both country and MOR stations and is represented on both the RPM Country 65 and the MOR Playlist. Rostad is also showing well as a composer with recordings of his tunes by Honey West, the Rythm Pals and Gary Buck.



Around RPM, many of the topics discussed at C4 have become the topics discussed at lunch and at coffee breaks.


As for the social aspect of our meetings, what a unique opportunity to mingle, and discuss the industry with some of the people in the other areas of the business and other parts of the country.

CAPITOL/RUBBER DUCKIE/ABRAMSON SIGN DEAL

Capitol Records Canada have signed a contract with Rubber Duckie Productions for the services of Ronney Abramson. Through the negotiation, Capitol will release an album by Miss Abramson, with full promotion support.

Miss Abramson, who resides in Montreal, was discovered by local producer and owner of his own studio, Andre Perry. He taped a session by Miss Abramson featuring all her own compositions, which he took to Capitol. It was Capitol's A&R Director Paul White who made the final agreement that brought Miss Abramson into the Capitol fold and the release of her debut album. It's expected that Miss Abramson and her new group will tour the folk circuit across Canada to tie-in with the release of her album.

The early enthusiasm being shown toward our Western Canadian meet indicates that we can expect another sellout.


The fact that there are those in the industry anxious to create dialogue is an indication that the industry couldn't be healthier in mind and spirit.

Lure back the buyers

Rodney Booth at Kerygma Records inspired this week's harangue by sending me a letter he had received from two young girls in Lytton, B.C. They had written to Kerygma requesting pictures, lyrics and so on of an artist they had heard. According to Marianna and Heather, "Dad taped it from a friend . . ." It's a funny letter, in it's own way, but it's

enough to break the heart of the most hardened record man. Perhaps we've overlooked the impact such home recording is having on the sales of legitimate tapes and albums.

The CRMA, and its counterparts in other countries are reasonably active in pursuing pirates, counterfeiters and who have you, but almost as one they neglect the ten-year old girls and fifty year old men in Yourtown, Canada (Oh! That took a will of iron!) fiddling with their twenty nine dollar cassette recorders and one dollar, forty eight hour tapes. I would be willing to bet that such informal piracy is really greater drain on record industry revenues than any amount of commercial illegal duplication currently occurring. Being on the mailing lists of numerous corporations involved in record manufacturing, I have a reasonably interesting library of albums littering my house. If I had a dollar for every time someone asked to borrow a couple of albums to tape them, I'd buy Columbia and WEA and call the shots myself.

As I sit hunched over this smoking typewriter it occurs to me that the eight track player in my truck (It's good to have something going on the side!) has not been exclusively penetrated by wholesome company-duplicated tapes, that it fact some bastard cartridges, which started life as blank tape have entered the lily white recesses. Holy copyright infringement!!

I can think of numerous justifications for my disgraceful behaviour in this matter, only one of which I will present. It's infinitely more convenient for me to hear music while travelling here and there than

CAB EXCHANGE PRESENTS "TAKING SIDES" SERIES

The CAB Program Exchange Service is making available, to member stations, a series of "Taking Sides" programs, featuring Reverend Al Forrest and Doug Hall. The two recently returned from a trip to Europe, Ireland and the Middle East. While on location in the various countries, they taped a series of interviews with political figures, foreign correspondents and people on the street. There are eleven segments available, each of about one half hour's duration. Included are interviews with such people as the Syrian Deputy Foreign Minister, a Palestinian refugee, a Catholic priest and so on. Each tape is available for a three dollar service charge.

at any other time. If companies who want their product heard won't supply it in tape form, for understandable financial reasons, then I, as the great white listener will take it upon myself to convert what is supplied into the acceptable medium. Hopefully, that explanation will convince Bert Bettis to call off the hounds of justice which I can hear baying in the distance.

But such fiddling is insignificant, the real problem lies in the very large number of people who borrow an album from a friend to record or record directly from the FM airwaves to avoid shelling out five bucks for an LP or seven bucks for a tape. And, to tell you the truth, I find it difficult to condemn

them for that. After all, if I was out there paying for records and tape with hard earned money I'm not entirely sure that I'd buy all that many, and perhaps I too would be tempted to nip out and buy a cassette recorder and a gross of tapes, who knows?

Maybe recorded product is over-priced, in which case the industry must take part of the blame for its own undoing. Perhaps its the fault of the hardware manufacturers, many of whom unscrupulously invite their customers to tape from the airwaves and so on. I'm not entirely sure that we can pin the blame down all that easily, but I am sure that while the situation exists, the industry will be losing ever increasing amounts of revenue to the home duplicator and that if ways and means can be found to lure Marianna and Heather back into the fold the industry will be the better for it.

THE CBC WAS THERE!!!

Just a note to let you know that Ken Dalziel (our Department Supervisor) Jack Budgell and myself as representatives of CBC, found Communications Four most interesting. Even though the record manufacturers and independent station's conflicts in the industry are really an entirely different ball game than CBC's, I could appreciate some problems I never knew existed. One point mentioned by a Montreal programmer was the seemingly negative attitude of RPM magazine. Your response was that there had not been adequate communication and, therefore, a true picture would be hard to paint under such circumstances.

This hit home a very strong problem faced by the CBC, in particular, my Department. There have been in the past, negative remarks made by you concerning CBC and I considered most of them valid until the last few months. Much of the fault again lies with the same situation that we have not made you aware of what we are doing for Canadian talent. On a larger scale, our Promotion Department has not made it clear of the musicians and potential talent in contemporary music that CBC has something to offer and is interested in developing contemporary artists.

CBC is becoming more and more aware of rock music and has much to offer. We have just finished a summer series at Ontario Place that featured artists such as Christopher Kearney, The Poppy Family, and The Stampeders. I am always open to demo tapes as possible transcription records and have held auditions for same.

Our transcription service gives the artist recording experience in an 8-track studio, financial assistance, and a good quality production to hopefully further his or her recording future with a commercial company. If the talent is not quite up to record material, then we are willing to develop the potential through shows such as "The Entertainers" and "Bring Back The Future" which involve national exposure and 4-track studio experience. The biggest problem is to get Canadian talent to send rough audition tapes or inform my office when and where they can be heard. This, of course, is a promotion problem on our part and will be solved soon.

By way of positive things, enclosed are two transcriptions I have produced since my arrival at CBC. One is three Canadian rock Symphonies with the old Tranquillity Base and The Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra. The other is Greg Adams who, about two months after the record was pressed, signed with A&M Records. I feel with Mr. Adams, CBC has made a successful contribution, something I hope we can do more and more of in the future. I appreciate your concern with Canadian talent and the music industry and will be in touch from time

RAY MATERICK —
THE QUIET ONE

Believe it or not - there are many shy young poets who are searching for the brass ring of the record business. The screamers, and put-ons who make up the major part of the commercial rock business will eventually fade away and leave the way open for those with the real message of what it's all about. One such shy poet is Ray Materick, a "steeltowner" (Hamilton) native who has received his lumps and could be now ready to make it into, at least, the bush league of the recording industry. He knows what it's like out on the streets:

"I spent my morning soft in quiet ponder
Shadowed by confusions of the mind
Searching for a reason why tomorrow might
leave me here

Grasping at the empty sleeve of time and
change and fear
And I thought it should have rained, but it
stayed clear
I don't know exactly where to start
Words are building barricades around my
heart
And my monument misfortune is a drag for
all mankind
Though relatively speaking I am sure it must
apply
Though I'm not so sure if I could tell you
why."

The above is from Materick's "Sidestreets" and is one of the reasons that he has been so well accepted by the college crowd. He's a natural but gutsy folkster with an exceptional feeling for the acoustic guitar and a vocal command that almost dares you to listen. One cut of Materick isn't enough, nor is a casual one play of his album. The second listening reveals what one listener tagged "an exceptional blend of abrasive human sounds

with a smooth and exquisite instrumentation making each unacceptable without the other."

An interview with Materick revealed a ready talker and one who had retained all his experiences, both good and bad in his climb from "a poet of sorts" to "a folk singer of sorts".

Ray, do your songs tell about you, personally?

Most of them do. "Sidestreets" points up some of the problems I've had. Certain lines refer to these problems. People tend to take writers too seriously - like songwriters, and they try to figure out what he meant.

Do you remember writing your first song?

Yes, it happened at the bottom of a bottle of wine. I was about sixteen. I titled it "If There Ever Was A Time", a real tear jerker.

Did you ever have thoughts of recording it?

Not really. I think I've progressed a great deal since then. Even since my signing with Kanata and the release of my album and single, I believe I've improved. I've just written a new song that I think shows this improvement. The line is "Release has never been so well defined" - in the sense that now I know what I'm doing and I've improved in that sense. I find myself in a funny position now, where I'm writing for people.

Did you ever get off on a strange direction in writing?

I wrote "Cherrylee Rose" which was about a hooker. This was after I was at one record company and they told me that I wrote really good lyrics but could I get something with a little bouncier tune and a catchy refrain. I did it and it turned out to be about prostitution, for some strange reason.

What's influenced you most in your songwriting?

Well, I guess it was my father. He was a



minister but he didn't see the light until I was about sixteen. I found it very embarrassing because he hadn't been a minister all my life. He was a bandleader before turning to the ministry. On top of that I was a fat kid, so I took a lot of kidding, which had a great deal of influence on my early youth. Strange though, I allude to religion an awful lot in my songs.

Have you always done the solo bit?

No, I used to play in a lot of bands, but I just couldn't get off on bands, so I guess I prefer being a solo, but I guess I'll get into the band thing again if my record happens.

When did you think about going professional?

I must have been about 23 when I felt I could put my poetry to music. I even went back to University and majored in Philosophy. Lost a lot of my fat, grew my hair longer and got really heavy into the wine thing. But, it was good for me. I wrote a lot of songs and after knocking on several record company doors and getting the usual "don't call us", I stumbled over Kanata and the three guys who put it all together for me.

How about the studio thing? Did it reveal anything?

I was a little apprehensive at first but then I was surprised at my confidence. I guess it was the great professional lineup behind me. We had some of Canada's top musicians in my Thunder session. You know, it's funny. I've gone through all sorts of trips. I've been through the purist trip where I didn't care if anybody liked my stuff. I was writing and performing for myself. I've been through the trip where I wanted people to like what I was doing and I've been through the trip where I didn't care and now I'm at a point of compromise, where I care about what I'm doing but, I also care if people like it.

Materick's comprise is obviously working. His Kanata album, "Sidestreets" has picked up considerable airplay from college radio stations and several Adult Contemporary stations are experimenting with both sides of the single as well as cuts from the album. Materick is, in many ways, a quiet superstar who will probably bounce out of left field and be up in lights before even he knows that he's made it.


Let's have the facts!

It seems that perhaps one of the most important links between record companies and radio stations relies on a good rapport between the record promo man and the music director. The reason is simple.



Without the radio station giving the records their support, the record company is almost completely crippled. No exposure of their product -- no sales. It's that simple. Of course, the reverse is just as devastating to a radio station. With no product, the only stations that could survive would probably be those programming twenty-four hours of

religious content.

Since the two industries rely so heavily on one another, it only seems natural that they should try to work with one another as cohesively as possible. What sometimes burns me is the way a few record companies sometimes forget that it is a two-way street. Of course, we need product, but don't they also realize they need exposure of their product?

What I detest is a record rep telling me how I should programme my market, and a super-hype on a record that is happening nowhere, but he needs an opening market. It's quite evident to me that if a Music Director was not doing his job properly for his particular station he wouldn't be employed for too long. Every MD has his own particular reasons for not playlisting a single. What we do need is first of all, and most important, the product itself. Then, not a super-hype, but honest to goodness down to earth facts - sales, reaction to the product in those markets where it is

being played, and exactly where it is getting air time. Facts definitely have a greater effect on a MD than pressure and hype.

On the other hand, a record rep is trying to keep his job also. It's his responsibility to get his product played, and of course, there's always times when he's the one getting screwed. Let's face it - everyone makes mistakes, and MD's are no exception. There always has and always will be times when a station is slow on charting a big song, or worse yet, refuses to playlist a song for some reason. That happens. It has also happened that a MD is really hyped on some product, and the thing stiffs immediately.

Let's face it. It's a two-way street. Without each other we're helpless. As a record promo man, give the product and the facts first; then try a little 'nudging'. As a Music Director, give the product a fair shake, and be honest about it. If you don't like the record and you don't plan to go on it, tell them.

There is no room for communication breakdowns in the business of COMMUNICATION.

LONDON GOLD TO CKLC FOR MOUTH & MACNEIL

Vince Lasch, London's Ontario promotion manager, recently presented London Gold to Gary Parr for CKLC's part in breaking the recent Mouth & MacNeil hit "How Do



You Do". Parr, program director at the Kingston station, was one of the first to spot the hit potential of the British single and was instrumental in influencing other stations in Canada. The result was a coast to coast chart item and a large sized hit in the U.S.

CKLC charted the record last winter and it remained on the charts for ten weeks.

RONNIE HAWKINS ON BANKS CBC TVER

Rompin' Ronnie Hawkins, Canada's rock-a-billy transplant appeared on the Tommy Banks CBC television show from Edmonton. Hawkins hit it big in the early sixties with a series of rock and roll smashes. He is widely credited with providing the training ground for The Band and many other acts.

On the Banks show, Hawkins performs what is now being called Canadian country rock. Appearing with him is Evelyn Quaife, recently returned from a year long tour with the original cast of "Jesus Christ Superstar".

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I'm not an expert

When this column was launched, we were very emphatic that this was a column by a generalist, and that the author made no claims of being a programming expert.

How does an outsider view the programmers? That's what we answer here, and

this kind of outlook can be healthy and helpful. I talk to many people, who lay their problems on me. We then do our best to help or at least to make an observation.

Questions asked by programmers with regard to the ruling would indicate that few are really aware of its contents. It's not a ruling that requires too much decoding or "reading into". Sure, it's done up in Civil Service language, which can be confusing, if you really want it to be.

There are programmers who claim the 30% content ruling will not work and should be done away with. There are those however, who are of the opinion the ruling has caused "no hardship". Is it possible that stations and programming can be that different?

We hear two stories. One is that there is a lack of programming material, the other is that there is a great deal of programming

available and the quality is no problem.

A few programmers have stated they are happy with the 30% ruling.

I often wonder if the librarian or the music director really know what product is available, and exactly what the ruling permits.

Indeed, it is the programmer of the station's music and his knowledge of the product that makes the ruling easy to live with, or impossible.

Perhaps those stations where the 30% is a problem, a system should be started to assure that Canadian records are catalogued carefully.

Programmers have often told us that it is

amazing how much good programming is available once the ruling becomes a challenge to fulfil.

In this area, the record company can also be of assistance. More and more detailed information about the 30% Canadian content ruling should be made available to the radio station.

The RPM MAPL logos are available to record companies to use in their catalogue at no cost (if they write to RPM for permission to use), and many a programmer who takes a good look at Cancon might find many records they were not aware of previously, perfectly suited for their format. Many of the programmers at C4 (in conversations after the meeting) said there was no problem meeting the ruling and brought to my attention that the ruling was a challenge to create good programming. That's the spirit!

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
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
