Exceptional sales for RCA's Pagliaro.

Contrary to some stories - Pagliaro is alive and well and chalking up exceptional record sales - in Quebec province. His most recent single release, "J'entends Frapper" certified for Canadian Gold (RPM Gold Leaf Award) a few weeks after release. This single had an effect on English Canada with CKLC Kingston moving it to the No. 1 position - the first French Canadian single to top any chart outside La Belle Province. The single was culled from his "Pag" album, which will receive company Gold shortly.

Much of Pagliaro's success can be attributed to RCA's Quebec Promotion Manager, Pierre Bellemare - who joined RCA only a few months before the label signed Pagliaro. Bellemare had acquired a thorough working knowledge of the Quebec market while working with other companies. RCA however, gave him the freedom to promote without stifling his enthusiasm. Bellemare was capable of transferring this enthusiasm to other members of his promotion team as well as to programmers and press people throughout Quebec. National promotion manager Ed Preston also got caught up in the Pagliaro/Bellemare thrust which resulted in a coast to coast promotion by RCA. He made the rounds in Vancouver and Ann Stark took over in Winnipeg, resulting in heavy play on the local French language radio and television stations. Bellemare is a rare promotion man in this country. He's

CHAD ALLAN SIGNS WITH GRT RECORDS

Ross Reynolds, president of GRT of Canada Ltd., has announced the signing of a recording agreement with Chad Allan, a Canadian artist who has been in the music business for over ten years. The first product to be released will be a single titled "Spending My Time", which will be followed by an album, "Sequel".

In 1961 Chad Allan formed the group Chad Allan and the Reflections in Winnipeg. With a change of name to Chad Allan and the Expressions, they had a huge 1964 hit titled "Shakin' All Over" on Quality. When the Expressions changed their name to the Guess Who, Allan left them to host CBC-TV's "Let's Go". This lasted until 1969, when Allan began to play clubs with his own trio.

In 1971, former Guess Who member Randy Bachman approached Chad Allan to form Brave Belt. Allan co-wrote their subsequent hit "Dunrobin's Gone". Since that time, Allan has been doing commercial work for Winnipeg-based Century 21 Studios, and writing songs with lyricist Robb Matheson. A number of tunes have been published through his own companies: And Then I Wrote Music (BMI), and Tin Ear Music (CAPAC). Allan has also engaged Susan Hoyos to look after business management.

GRT has tentatively set release of the "Spending My Time" single for mid-April.

MONTREAL'S GARDEN OF STARS OPEN

The Garden of Stars on La Ronde, touted as the "biggest cabaret in North America", re-opens May 5th for a full summer season. The fifteen-hundred seat nitery will play host to numerous Canadian and international attractions, including the Stampeders, Light-house and Edward Bear. Effective June 16th, the Garden will book jazz, blues, folk and country musicians during the week, with major international acts headlining on weekends. Heading up the operation are Paul Jarema, former Quebec promotion representative for Capitol Records and Sheldon Kagan, Montreal promoter.

With a season extending to early September, the Garden of Stars will attempt to keep cover and liquor charges competitive, according to Kagan. Target audience will be eighteen to thirty-year-olds.

EIGHT FINALISTS IN CBC COMPETITIONS

Eight musicians have entered the finals of the CBC Talent Festival competition for 1972-73. The eight are: piano; Robert Mayerovitch, Kathryn Root; voice: Mary Lou Fallis, Mariana Paunova; winds: Wes Foster, Douglas Stewart; and, strings: Angela Cavadas and Carol Lieberman. The eight were selected as finalists to participate in a special CBC Radio broadcast of "Themes and Variations". Awards of \$2000 go to the winner in each category, \$1000 to the runner up.

MAJOR PUSH BY AVENUE ON UP

Up Records, off with their initial single release, "Hey Miss Maybe" by Greg Mittler, is now receiving a major promo push by Avenue of America, distributors of the Toronto-based label. Up's president, Eddie Okum, a young musician who has been associated with several different groups over the past few years, is working closely with Avenue's promotion rep, Jim Holt. The single has already scored well with the Adult Contemporary programmers and with the soft sound that prevails from time to time on the contemporary stations, it's expected the single will land a few listings in this area.

Twenty-five year old Mittler is a native of Toronto where he completed his education majoring in Psychology and Film and Music for which he received two B.A.'s. This combination has equipped him with a sound basis for songwriting and a repertoire of more than 200 songs. Several of these, already in the can, will comprise his initial album release which was produced by John Stewart. The single session was produced by Stewart at Pac 3 in Detroit and Eastern Sound in Toronto.

RCA SERVICES CANADIAN RELEASES

RCA Records has just completed servicing all Canadian radio stations with a list of all Canadian singles released by the company since January 1, 1973. The twenty-four singles are listed in order of release date. The company will send the release wrap-up to stations at the end of each quarter, with a year-end wrap up going out in December. This week, RCA will mail to all stations a complete list of all singles and albums released by the company in 1972.

HUNT TALENT ORGANIZING ROTARY SHOW

The Murray Hunt Talent Agency is co-ordinating the Third Annual Country Music Show at Polish Legion Hall in St. Catharines, Ontario, as a benefit for the Rotary Club Easter Seal Campaign. On hand for the April 16th spectacular will be some twenty country performers including Gary Buck, Walter Ostanek, Roger Hill and the Blue Country Playboys, Tex Milner, Roy Payne and Dick Scranton and the Westernaires. The bulk of the talent is being drawn from the Niagara Peninsula area.

TUESDAY RELEASES SLAG INSTRUMENTAL

Greg Hambleton's Tuesday label has released "Slag" a major European instrumental hit by the Gemello Twins. According to London Records, the Tuesday distributor in Canada, sales of "Slag" in France alone have exceeded 150,000 copies. The disc is now resting at the number four position on the French national charts. The single, (Tuesday 22) was produced by Roger Choukroun, a native of Paris, and one of France's most prominent hit producers.

BOOT RELEASES BELGIAN "CHEVALIER"

Toronto-based Boot Records has released "I Believe", a single by Belgian, Joe Berluck, likened by Boot to Maurice Chevalier, "and other European performers so adept at putting a piece of music across to an audience". The single, backed with "It's Been a Long Time", features Berluck speaking with musical background. It has been labelled "good MOR novelty fare".

BLUE MINK SIGNS FOR NORTH AMERICA

Blue Mink, the highly successful British rock act, have been signed for release in the United States and Canada by MCA Records. The group is managed by Ahed Music Corporation, the publicly-owned Canadian music company. According to Ahed's Bill Gilliland, enthusiasm for the group at MCA in Canada and the U.S. is "unbelievable". First product out under the MCA signing will be a single, "By the Devil".

DAFFODIL PUSHING ISLAND RELEASE

Daffodil's Mike Docker reports that the Toronto-based company will be providing a full promotional push, in Europe, to the release of Foot in Coldwater's "(Isn't Love Unkind) In My Life", now in the process of being rushed out on the prestigious Island label. Docker is warming the promotional fires with a mailing to one hundred and forty European media people, to be supplemented by a trip to Europe, by Docker this month to assist in the promotion of the single and the group to the media.

YOUNG TO PROMOTE YAMAHA SONG FEST

Ampex recording artists, Young, will be the key to the promotion of Sound '73, a country-wide search for new musical talent, conducted by Yamaha Musical Instruments. Hundreds of young musicians will compete at the local level in Quebec, Halifax, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, London, Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatoon and Winnipeg. Audition facilities are being prepared at Yamaha retail facilities in each of the cities, with three finalists from each city competing for a regional award, the winners going to the finals in Winnipeg. Young will appear in concert across the country as headline act at each regional finals competition.

RECORD PRODUCTION DOWN TAPES UP

Latest figures available from Statistics Canada indicate a drop in phonograph record production and an increase in the production of pre-recorded tapes. 4.53 million records were produced in February of this year as compared to 4.56 million a year earlier. Tape production, however, almost doubled from a figure of 472,571 units manufactured in February of 1972 to 771,253 in February '73.

Would you agree that there would appear to be a lack of communication within our industry - right now? The current string of hits making gains on the international music scene is considered by some to be the result of a music explosion in this country. But in Canada, this success isn't making too much difference. The success apparently occurred in spite of the AM music ruling which has been decried as being a negative factor - and in spite of the fact that some well documented figures have been produced indicating there is a shortage of product.

With only fifteen companies in Canada releasing or producing Canadian content - these figures and all these facts or fantasy must certainly be impressing to foreigners. In Canada, one might hazard a guess that the damper is on the "prophets of doom".

The output of Canadian product in 1973 "is likely to be bad". Some programmers feel the output in the first quarter of 1973 was "disappointing" to "rotten". Keeping this in mind - our progress in the inter-

national markets for this same period has been exceptional. In fact, the Canadian music explosion is much talked about in the United States.

We have been led to believe that an average of 7.2 singles are released each week in

Canada and we are also told that 150 records are released, on the average, in the U.S. (we suspect there are more). Included in that 150 are Canadian and British records and others from all over the world. We must assume that many ethnic records are also included in this total.

Unfortunately, the published figures are destroying our case. Here we are with only fifteen companies and 7.2 records released each week in Canada and with that infinitesimal happening - we command six to seven percent of the international charts.

It's somewhat disconcerting to me to look at the figures of the fifteen record companies credited with 7.2 records and I wonder how the independent record producer (who put up the money) must feel about not being credited with the release of his record. Record companies often give the producer an advance for his production, but it's an advance against royalties and barely covers the cost of the production, if in fact it does. This advance must be recouped before any further money is paid to the producer. Very often there is no money involved at all with the independent producer footing the cost while the record company takes the credit for producing the record.

It's a sad state of affairs but ironically one that has produced an international breakthrough for Canadian content.

Now - let's take a look at the question of the quality of Canadian productions. In Canada, the productions are considered inferior, but not so in the rest of the world. The mere fact that we can do so much with so little is a good indication that Canadian product has reached an all time high in

quality.

One more very important matter. This article could not have been written (and would not have been) had the state of the industry not been such as it is - and if the figures quoted had not been made available to the trade.

A missionary journeyed into darkest Africa and discovered a very primitive tribe. He stood before them and offered food. The crowd cheered and yelled "ballooga". He offered them modern conveniences. Again they cheered and yelled "ballooga". He told them he would bring medical supplies and build a school in the village. The villagers thundered "ballooga, ballooga". He had never seen such enthusiasm and he felt his promises had won over the tribe.

Later while talking with the chief he spotted a cow with a newlyborn calf in a nearby meadow and he asked if he could walk across the meadow and take a closer look at the creatures. The chief said "Sure, but be careful not to step in any ballooga!"

MUNTZ ISSUES SECOND TAPE GUIDE

Muntz Canada Limited, suppliers to a network of one hundred and sixty five retail tape operations across the country, has issued its second "Muntz Tape Guide". The guide is a comprehensive listing of eight track and cassette cartridge tapes available in Canada. Published quarterly, the Muntz Guide is now up to one hundred and sixty pages, with some fifteen thousand individual listings. Also included are stories on artists and music. The second issue features a photographic essay of the recent Juno Awards. The Muntz Tape Guide is distributed free of charge at all Muntz Centres.

MORRICONE CULT IN FRENCH CANADA

A cult following for composer Ennio Morricone has developed in the province of Quebec, according to United Artists Records. As evidence of the almost fanatic following Morricone has developed there, U.A. points to sales of in excess of thirty thousand copies of the soundtrack from the movie, "Duck You Sucker", in the province. In response to continued demand for more Morricone product, U.A. has just released an album containing scores from "The Good, The Bad and The Ugly", "Navajo Joe", "Death Rides a Horse" and "The Big Gundown".

Forty-four year old Morricone, has since 1961, become a major force in motion picture scoring. Over the past decade, he has averaged seven films a year for some thirty directors. Other credits include "Fistful of Dollars", "Sacco and Vanzetti" and "The Decameron". U.A. is currently at work attempting to arrange a concert tour of Quebec by Morricone.

In the past three or so months, the radio industry has had available to it a bountiful

supply of excellent music, current music. Many, many stations have taken full use of that supply and have created a number of international hits. In fact, more hits than at any time in history. A handful of stations however, predominantly in the major markets, are still possessed of the belief that they, singlehandedly can cause the decline and fall of the CRTC regulations affecting domestic content programming. Having faith is great, but there comes a time when reality must be faced and responsibility must be lived up to. The CRTC and its regulations are not going to slink away into the night.

UNITED ARTISTS CELEBRATES 1ST ANNIVERSARY

United Artists Records (Canada) picked Thursday March 29th to celebrate their first year as an independent label in Canada. The actual date was January 17th but U.A.'s Canadian president, Stan Kulin held off for the March date so as to coincide with a visit from Lee Mendell, vice-president of United Artists Records Inc. (International Division).

The party, attended by more than four hundred people, was held at the Hotel Nelson in Old Montreal and was hosted by Kulin. Also on hand from the Canadian company were Allan Matthews, Director of National Promotion and Keith Patten, Quebec and Maritimes promotion rep. The guest list comprised Montreal's entertainment industry, radio, television and press people as well as dealers and rock jobbers.

Highlight of the evening was the cutting of an oversized birthday cake shaped like an album and flying a U.A. banner.

DUMAURIER GRANTS TO EYSO, TARAGON

The duMaurier Council for the Performing Arts has announced grants totalling \$224,500 to various performing arts groups in Canada in the second stage of its five year plan. A five thousand dollar grant to the Tarragon Theatre of Toronto will enable the theatre to stage a month-long run of six plays, using new writers and other personnel. A two thousand dollar grant to the East York Symphony Orchestra will help offset some of the expenses incurred by the Symphony in its presentation of Canadian soprano, Lois Marshall, in two recent Toronto appearances.

One of the most common, and most annoying, ways of attempting to thwart the intent of the domestic content regulations is the playing of a select handful of Canadian gold records. This benefits no one but the publisher, who is occasionally the same worthy who owns the radio station. While it is all very nice to have a bunch of wealthy publishers around, those publishers would benefit equally from the playing of current material, and in addition benefits would accrue to producers and artists.

If these mouldy goldies were being played as to various performing arts groups in Canada, sort of tribute to the artists, no one could complain, but they are being played as a blatant, and sometimes defiant gesture at the CRTC and, indeed, the Canadian public. The regulations unfortunately do not specify that a certain percentage of the Canadian material should be current. They should. To strike any fair kind of balance, at least eight out of ten Canadian titles aired should have been released within the last ninety days or so. Of course, other loopholes will be found, and it is up to the CRTC to start making broadcasters aware that they will have to begin to live up to their responsibilities as users of public property.

BACHMAN-TURNER TO MERCURY RECORDS

Charlie Fach, vice president of A&R for Phonogram, has announced the signing of Bachman-Turner Overdrive. The group is led by Randy Bachman, former leader, and lead guitarist of the Guess Who. Bachman was responsible for many of that group's biggest hits, including five million sellers, "These Eyes", "Laughing", "Undun", "No Time" and "American Woman". Other members of Overdrive are C.F. Turner (bass, vocals), Tim Bachman (rhythm guitar, vocals) and Rob Bachman (drums).

The group's first album, "Bachman-Turner Overdrive" will appear on Phonogram's Mercury label in the United States, and on Polydor in Canada. A \$100,000 advertising campaign has been promised to support the album release. A U.S. tour is currently in the process of being set up.

DKD PRODUCING CAPITOL THEATRE CONCERTS

Don Tarlton, of Donald K. Donald Productions, has announced that DKD will be producing a series of rock concerts at Montreal's Capitol Theatre. Shows will be scheduled at the rate of two per month and will be integrated with the theatre's first-run movie schedule. The deal was concluded between Tarlton and Famous Players. The two have worked together in the past, with DKD presenting concerts in rurally located movie theatres.

First acts booked into the Capitol include Slade, Seals and Crofts, and Dr. Hook and the Medicine Show.



never at a loss for words nor paper to put them on. One note from him on Pagliaro read: "Pagliaro is knockin' em dead all over Quebec with his infectious 'J'entends Frap-



per'. As you already know the kids' response to this song has been more than phenomenal. Anywhere you go whether it be a discotheque,

a restaurant or theatre you hear Michel singing his smash hit. Also any French radio station you turn on or teen oriented TV show you watch you're sure to see Pagliaro doing his thing."

Pagliaro had made good inroads into the English market with his English language records. In fact, he was established nationally - with each of his releases scoring coast to coast action. Unfortunately he hasn't had an English language release in several months which might create problems with him should he intend to follow through with his English recordings.

In any event, RCA and Pierre Bellemare have taken Pagliaro to great heights in the Quebec market. He is, in fact, a "superstar" if that description is still "in". He has appeared on every teen oriented television show in the province of Quebec and has been interviewed by almost every radio station and newspaper columnist in the province. His concert tours throughout Quebec have resulted in "sold out" notices being posted days in advance of the show. Pagliaro is a magic name and one of the new breed of French Canadian who has been instrumental in adjusting the Quebec record industry's approach to the public. English Canadian programmers and press should take a few lessons from their French Canadian counterparts. Showbusiness is big business in Quebec - and it all happened through the press and broadcast media.

PROGRESS CONTINUES FOR CAMPUS DOCUMENTARY

Claude Vickery, who is currently enmeshed in plans to create a documentary on Canadian music for distribution to campus stations throughout the U.S., as reported previously in RPM, reports that the manufacturing arrangements for the six-album, twelve-program series have been finalized in principle. RCA Records will be doing the pressings and jackets, and will perform this service at cost to show their support for the Vickery plan to promote Canadian music.

Virtually all the record companies have now agreed to make their artists available for inclusion in the documentary, and final contracts and waivers are being prepared. Vickery is now finalizing the budget and making calls on prospective sponsors. The Canadian Recording Industry Association will be approached first, followed by firms outside the industry.

Further details on the progress of the campus radio documentary will be carried in upcoming issues of RPM.

MAJOR PACKAGE FOR RACHMANINOFF CENTENARY

RCA Records is currently preparing a five album, fifteen disc collection of the best known recordings of Rachmaninoff. The series will be drawn from recordings made by Rachmaninoff for RCA over a period spanning the evolution of the recording process from acoustical to electrical. Announcement of the centennial set was made by RCA's director of classical music, R. Peter Munves, who said, "Rachmaninoff not only

EDMONTON TAPE PIRATE CONVICTED

The first conviction ever recorded under the Canadian Copyright Act since it became law nearly fifty years ago has been obtained in Edmonton. Arnold Neumann, of Little Gem Agencies of Canada Ltd., was charged with nineteen counts of copyright infringement and pleaded guilty.

Neumann's arrest and conviction came after the Canadian Recording Industry Association supplied information to the RCMP. He was accused of importing and distributing pirate tape cartridges from the U.S. Involved were such titles as "Chicago at Carnegie Hall", "There's A Riot Going On" by Sly & the Family Stone," "Love Story" by Andy Williams, "Tony Bennett Sings His All-Time Hall of Fame Hits", "Blood Sweat & Tears 3," and "Tammy's Greatest Hits Volume 2" by Tammy Wynette.

Neumann's plea of guilty came on the eve of his scheduled trial. He was fined the maximum allowed under law (\$400) and had 2000 tapes destroyed.

was one of the most important composers of the last one hundred years, he also was a titan of the piano. During most of his career, he recorded exclusively for RCA, and during this year when the world will be paying homage to him, we feel it important that these recordings be made available again."

The series, being produced by Jack Pfeiffer and Gregor Benko, will include thirteen works, never before released. Also included will be recordings made with violinist, Fritz Kreisler, and with the Philadelphia Orchestra.

McCARTNEY SPECIAL A TRIUMPH

With minimal advance publicity, which may have affected its ratings, the "James Paul McCartney Special", aired over the ABC network last week, is a good indication that at least one Beatle is alive and well. Apparently produced in England, again publicity and information are lacking, the special was centred very strongly around Paul and his wife Linda. The newly formed Wings were relegated to secondary roles.

Although John Lennon has usually been credited with having the best honed sense of the ridiculous among the fab foursome, McCartney proved that when it comes to visual fun, he is easily Lennon's equal. One of the highlights of the special was a segment with dancers, half of their bodies costumed as chorus girls, the other half as their male counterparts. With McCartney doing a British music hall number in the midst of these metamorphosing transvestites, the result was hilarious.

The Beatles seem to be in the news a lot lately. Lennon, Harrison and Starr have quit Allen Klein, reasons unstated. Apple has released the four album history of the group. And now, a McCartney special. Rumours persist that the group are either currently recording together again, or will be in the near future.

In an industry that has lacked artistic leadership for several years now, such a happening could be the catalyst to get things moving again.

DOWNCHILD READYING SECOND ALBUM

Following their highly successful Toronto appearance with blues great B.B. King, Downchild Blues Band are hard at work on their second album for Special Records. Their first album for the label, now distributed by GRT, "Bootleg", received wide critical acclaim and sold solidly in the Toronto area. The new set, to be entitled "Straight Up", features five original compositions by group leader Donnie Walsh and his brother Rick. The group is currently in Winnipeg taping a segment for a new rock series, to be produced for the CBC by Don Hunter.

\$2000 FINE TO STATION AIRING SEX TALK SHOW

The owners of Oak Park, Illinois radio station WGLD have been ordered to pay a \$2000 fine by the Federal Communications Commission. WGLD allegedly aired "obscene and indecent discussions" when it featured women callers describing their experiences with oral sex.

The fine was the first action taken by the FCC so far in its campaign, spearheaded by Nixon's Republican administration, to clean up American talk radio. The FCC had announced a month earlier that it would investigate and crack down on "topless radio". The Commission reached its verdict based on a February 21 aircheck of WGLD programming.






BIT OF BOTH





NDPer CHARGES BIAS AS CRTC POST LOST

Helen James, a Toronto social worker and former broadcaster, said last week her contract has not been renewed with the Canadian Radio-Television Commission because she is not a Liberal. Miss James, who holds NDP membership, served as one of the ten part-time CRTC members on a five-year contract that expired in March. She said a phone call from an unnamed Cabinet source informed her "the Ontario Liberals want one of their own" to be appointed. Brian Land, a Liberal on sabbatical leave from the University of Toronto's School of Library Sciences was appointed to the Commission at the same time.

Miss James said that Pat Pearce (a former Montreal TV critic), Harry Boyle (of the CBC) and herself are the only three CRTC members with many years of broadcasting experience. Miss James worked for the CBC for twenty years. She said her job carries no salary, but she received \$125 per day for attending meetings plus \$35 per day in expenses. She said she had received a total of about \$3000 in 1971 and about \$1750 last year (plus expenses).

CRTC spokesmen refused to comment on Miss James' allegations. They said there were three posts expiring and that it was not a case of simply replacing an NDP member with a Liberal. One of the three vacancies has not yet been filled.

JASON WINDS UP U. S. TOUR

Jason, the rock harmony showband, have wound up phase III of their "Jason Junket", throughout the eastern United States. This time around, the group played thirty five college campuses. The dates were so successful that the group has been re-booked at all thirty five, according to Toronto's Media Man, public relations firm. The group is now in the process of embarking on a series of Canadian dates, including stops in Kitchener, Galt, Owen Sound, Toronto, Hamilton, and St. John's, Newfoundland.

HORN TIES IN LP WITH APPEARANCES

Horn, the Special Records act recently released with their "On the People's Side" album, are currently on a series of personal appearances tying in with the release of the debut album. The transplanted Montrealers returned to their hometown last week for a gig at Sir George Williams University, in support of Indian and Eskimo protest over the James Bay power project. Among the artists associated with the benefit were Joni Mitchell, Ian and Sylvia, Murray McLauchlan and others.



Toronto BBM book shows interesting FM pic

The March 1973 BBM book for Toronto contained few surprises for the top three positions but FM stations have some interesting statistics. In the top spots, were, as usual, the trio of CFRB/CHUM/CKEY.

On the FM band, however, there is an interesting performance by CHFI. While com-

petitors CHUM-FM and CKFM count on heavy nighttime audiences to keep their circulations up, CHFI is doing very nicely in the daytime. They run about seventh or eighth in circulation, but in daytime listeners per quarter hour jump into fourth spot (both for young adults and for all ages).

Space doesn't permit an analysis of the nighttime audience, but both CHUM-FM and CKFM climb in audience at this time. Note also that both stations rank much higher in circulation when just the 18-49 age group is considered instead of all persons.

Here are the statistics kindly provided by BBM. (The only stations not covered are CHIN AM and FM, which are multi-lingual outlets.)

EMOTIONAL TALKFEST OVER NEWS GUIDELINES

Now that the April hearings are over, and the CRTC has held its special inquiry into the Canadian Association of Broadcasters' "Police news guidelines", emotions are beginning to subside after flaring up to rare heights at the hearings. The CAB and CRTC both used strong oratory in the Commission's examination of the "document" that the police and the CAB signed last year.

With the CAB in the hotseat, strong words began to emerge even before the Canadian Radio-Television Commission hearings in Ottawa. The CAB's executive vice-president, T.J. Allard was in Winnipeg a couple of days earlier for the Media 73 Conference which 150 newsmen were attending. Allard told the journalists that the public does not believe the news that the media gives them. He went on to attack the delegates by relating how he was shocked to learn, over

prepared and is not subjected to checking. Tempers began to flare when the attack on news procedures was switched by Allard to the subject of the CAB's "discussion document", which he said was blown out of all proportion by the media. It was sloppy reporting to make this out to be a "censorship agreement", he said. The newsmen on hand, however, responded with criticism. They said the CAB had no business forming any link whatsoever with the police.

When the scene switched to Ottawa with the CRTC inquiry, CAB president Don Hamilton repeated there was no thought of letting the police have "control" of the news, and the story of why the document came to be unfolded. It was a product of the October Crisis in Montreal. The CAB felt the Cross-Laporte kidnap-murder had been handled badly, both in news and in media-police credibility. Both sides wanted to see better handling of crisis news in the future, and sat down together to work it out. But the CRTC

and signatures on paper. He felt that the media should be aware and responsible enough to give the police view most of the time. CRTC chief Pierre Juneau said if the "guidelines" had been worded better, they wouldn't have been so wide open to misinterpretation. And Commissioner Jacques Hebert was the most blunt of all. He used the word "censorship" which set CAB's officials' blood racing once again.

Media observers are hoping that the hearing alone will be enough to make the CAB vote its "document" out of existence when the members next congregate for the annual meeting. The Association would dearly love to do just that instead of getting an official government rebuke which would make the CAB look pretty small-time. Several stations (including Toronto's CFTO-TV) have in the past dropped out of the CAB because they disagreed with its policies. The CAB has often been cast in a bad public light as far as public and CRTC opinion is concerned. Two earlier examples were CAB lobbying

against more Canadian content on radio and TV.

Some of the CRTC staff are known to feel that the hearing should not end in a sharp rebuke which would be bad for broadcasting's image. They point to the unusual circumstances (e.g. imposition of the War Measures Act) that surrounded the October Crisis and the criticism that the media got from some government officials. The CAB had, in its defence, shown an interview with the then-Justice Minister, John Turner. Turner stated that the media had escalated the crisis and had tended to make the FLQ appear as a credible alternative to the established government. The CAB quoted this as one reason they decided to meet with police for a discussion of newsroom policies.

Meantime, Steely Dan was charted at CKOC, CFRW, CFGO and CKOM to accompany last week's group of CJME, CKLG, CKLW, CKRC and CKXL.

Three records got the last couple of stations outstanding to give them action on 90% of the major station charts. They were "Peaceful" (now on ten majors), "I'm A Stranger Here" (Eleven majors) and "Drift Away" (Eleven majors).

Looking promising on early action are Loggins and Messina, getting charted this week at CKLW and CKLG. These are the first outlets to chart "Thinking of You" though there are several others just playlisting it. Also showing early signs is "Right Thing To Do" by Carly Simon, which hits charts at CKXL and CKLW this week, joining last week's charter CKRC plus half-a-dozen stations with the disc on playlist.

In his performance of the Goldberg Variations, he has chosen to observe all repeats which doubles the length of the work and necessitates the use of four sides instead of the usual two. Harpsichord buffs will be irritated to find that Deutsche Grammophon have neglected to identify the instrument manufacturer.
