



Kanata smiles on Foldy

This week, after many moons of struggling, Kanata's Peter Foldy has made it to the top of the RPM Adult Contemporary playlist with his "Bondi Junction" single. That's not to say that every adult contemporary station in the country has discovered Foldy - some are yet to find his voice conducive to strong listener reaction. Contemporary programmers have also discovered that this young Hungarian/Australian/Canadian has it in the grooves. The single was released in January of this year and got off to a dismal start. There was a lot of hard plugging and many disappointments for the Kanata crew who worked closely with London Records, distributors of the label. Foldy's strength appeared to be with the adult contemporary programmers. They believed in the record and kept pounding it to their listeners. Record sales began to show which gave London's promotion network the ammunition they needed to go after the major markets. If Foldy was big in Middleton and Prince George - why not Toronto and Vancouver? Six months later - he is.

The Foldy story began its Canadian chapter when Kanata's Bill Kearns stumbled over the young writer while he was with another company. Two years later he rediscovered Foldy - this time as a performer as well. Kearns whisked Foldy into Thunder Sound



BACHMAN'S BACK WITH ADDED STRENGTH

Randy Bachman is not a new name in Canada's music industry circles. For that matter, he's not new to the listeners either. Former leader of the successful Guess Who and co-writer of many Guess Who million sellers, Bachman recently formed a new group and signed a deal with the Mercury label. (distributed in Canada by Polydor)

A full scale promotion and advertising campaign, a healthy opening budget, a U.S. tour coinciding with the single release of "Gimme



Your Money Please", and simultaneous Canadian/U.S. release of the first album, are combining for a first rate exposure of this band.

With Bachman-Turner Overdrive, Bachman combines the talents of his two brothers and C.F. Turner into a four man "beat" rock and roll band. After the introduction of Brave Belt to Canada's scene, personnel changes within the group united the three Bachman's and singer/writer Turner, and the result of many months of toil is this new endeavour, Bachman - Turner Overdrive.

This is not a three brother combination that will set records, but they do sound good together and big-voiced Turner seems to take pride in being included in the foursome. From record deal to marketing it's been a professional effort for this set and the added professionalism of Bachman and Turner naturally helped the whole thing along.

It's only the first album for this band. Technically, it was in very good hands and even managed to show on the album. Bachman doubles as musician/producer for the group and results show that this role does have its advantages. The album was recorded at RCA studios in Toronto and was under the direction of engineer Mark Smith (Charlee, Leigh Ashford) — a good choice for this type of music.

On the whole, the songs are lengthier than usual which gives the listener better chance to get into the music, and some of the movements. "Gimme Your Money Please" is the pre-planned single but the other cuts will probably give you a better idea of what the band is really into. Although the single has just been charted the album has been a popular pick on all fronts.

Bachman doesn't turn out to be just another guitar man. His playing is an accumulation of

many years of experience and he's bound to become exceedingly better. A prime example is his work on "Blue Collar", a definite for progressive FMers. It's well done. The whole album tastes of Bachman's lead guitar. Side two is mentionably weaker than the first although it just might be a matter of taste, but a few of the numbers turn out to be excessively commercial.

At present, Bachman - Turner Overdrive is into completion of an 11 city American tour, many of their stops being major cities, and climaxing with a week long gig in New York. Hopefully, with the overall response being above average, Canadian music can make another small step forward . . . a second album from these guys could get good. - Saul Podemski

GREETING CARDS WITH HIT LYRICS PAY OFF

Hallmark Cards of the United States has a new moneymaker . . . greeting cards based on lyrics of contemporary pop records. After a year-long experiment the company was gratified with the results and is considering releasing a second group of cards. Out of six new lines of greeting cards that were introduced in the last year, the "Sounds of Love" pop music line had the best sales.

Lyrics from hits by female artists did the best in the sales race. The two hottest were "You've Got A Friend" by Carole King and "It's Getting Better" by Mama Cass. The four others getting best response were "Some Kind of Wonderful" by Carole King; "I Love How You Love Me" by Bobby Vinton; "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face" by Roberta Flack and "That's What Friends Are For" by Paul Williams.

The company said their survey showed there was no correlation between sale of a song on record and its sales in greeting card form.

CRTC GIVES CFGO ANOTHER CHANCE

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission, while talking of not renewing the licence, has given CFGO Ottawa another chance to prove itself. The reprieve came in the form of a short-term licence renewal and a mention that the government body would be watching the station closely.

The Ottawa station is just one year old and appeared before the CRTC on April 11 for its first licence renewal. Commenting on its questioning of station officials, the Commission's decision stated: "the Commission considers that the failure of licencees to live up to the letter and intent of their promises of performance is a ground for refusing to renew licences." It was widely reported in the press at the time of the hearing how the CRTC had confronted CFGO president William Morrison and found him unable to explain CFGO's failure to attain the level of programming it had promised.

The CRTC decision continued: "the Commission notes, however, that in this case the licensee company has undergone

RICHARDS/AMARO/EDWARDS REVIVE SHUFFLE RHYTHM

New from the Canadian Talent Library is an attempt at reviving the "Shuffle Rhythm" of the 30s and 40s. This was a big sound of that era and was punched home by the big bands of Henry Busse, Jan Savitt and Ted Weems. An attempt to bring it back in the 50s was made by Johah Jones and Louis Prima.

The Canadian Talent Library's hopes are pinned on Bobby Edwards, a multi-guitar specialist who played a prominent part in the recent CBC recording of Oscar Peterson's "Canadiana Suite". He is also leader of the Fat City Guitars who released an album not too long ago on the Canadian Talent Library label. Edwards penned the "Shufflebaby" side which was culled from the album as a single. He has brought together the shuffle and 2-beat rhythms with the pattern used by Gilbert O'Sullivan on his "Who Was It" and "Claire" releases. The album contains both these selections.

Giving an up-front assist to Edwards is Eugene Amaro, one of this country's most sought after sax men. He's the lead sax in Rob McConnell's Boss Brass and is featured performer on the CTL release, "The Tenor Sax of Eugene Amaro. An assist also comes from Bill Richards, a member of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. Richards is lead on most of the sweetening sessions in Toronto and is showcased in CTL's "The Bill Richards Quartet". With the Toronto Symphony he is known as a violinist but on the "Shufflebaby" deck he's a fiddle player. Actually the sweetening session featured four violins, a viola and cello. On session, which was produced at Manta Sound, were: Brian Browne, piano; Jack Zaza, bass guitar; Brian Russell, rhythm guitar; Don Vickery, drums; and Peter Appleyard, vibes.

a series of organizational difficulties and accepts the assurances made by representative of the licensee . . . that the commitments made . . . will be fulfilled." The reference to organizational difficulties apparently refers to the fact that Mr. Morrison, the person who aroused the CRTC ire, was also the president and part owner. Chairman of the Board, John Bassett, dismissed Morrison as president, replacing him with Jack Ruttell of Windsor. The CRTC were apparently satisfied - giving CFGO another chance to fulfill the promises it made when it was licensed.

The new CFGO licence extends from July 1, 1973 to December 31, 1974 and "the Commission wishes to follow the licensee's progress closely". In a separate decision, the station was given approval for a power boost from 10,000 to 50,000 watts. This was done to give a more uniform signal in the CFGO listening area.

Music ruling...make it work or forget it!

Is the CRTC serious about the 30% AM music ruling? From the standpoint of the record companies that are investing money in Canadian content recording, this might be a very valid question.

Somehow, the record industry has been stuck with the responsibility of providing enough records for radio station programming to fulfil the requirements. Now it becomes apparent that under the present conditions, the record industry is either working on nationalistic grounds or just supplying programming material to radio stations. The last consideration seems to be profit, and according to a number of record men, the venture isn't turning out to be profitable.

Record men could justifiably feel that the ruling has created a quarrel between the CRTC and the broadcasters with the record companies the victims. The constant badgering of the record companies by radio stations has struck a sour note in record production in Canada.

It has become clear that the ruling from the beginning would be something the radio stations would fight. In the battle that ensued, the record companies and their product suffered while the broadcasters fought out their battle with the CRTC.

The moderate success of the ruling has only

encouraged more money to be dumped into the hopper. Enough time has passed for the record companies to look at the books and take a different outlook on Canadian content.

In no way, can anyone imply that 30% of the music programming in Canada isn't Canadian in content as defined in the regulation. What is happening is that across Canada broadcasters have been programming Canadian content as a "forced airplay" commodity. With this kind of an attitude, the ruling could be hurting Canadian artists and creative people.

It is also true that the fuss that followed the announcement of the ruling was embarrassing to the industry. It was made very clear to artists that the ruling was a crutch to Canadian talent. Many artists to this day are not happy with the legislation of their talent.

All these things were the problems that came with the ruling and after two years, every one of these problems still face us. It might have been the hope of the industry that the two years would cause a mellowing among the broadcasters and possibly the industry would evolve. It didn't happen. It seems that it became the project of a few broadcasters to fulfil the requirements of the ruling while sabotaging the reason for the ruling.

Now it becomes obvious that record companies are reconsidering the value of a ruling that doesn't seem to be working.

It has been suggested that the CRTC is overburdened with other matters pertaining to cable, television and licencing and the ruling applying to Canadian music was launched and left to work by itself.

It might be time for the CRTC to look at the public relations aspect of making the ruling work, and rather than wield their big stick (which they would eventually have to do to save the ruling) Mr. Juneau might take a softer approach and meet with the major broadcasters who control the airwaves and put forth the proposition that the ruling must work for the sake of future programming. Actually there are only a few broadcasters who control the airwaves, so there really isn't that much involved in such meetings.

The CRTC will have to take a firm and definite stand in regard to the ruling, or as many broadcasters have suggested . . . get rid of it because it was a mistake.

Actually such a move would be very beneficial to the broadcasters of Canada, because if the ruling is to continue, it should be made clear to broadcasters that the source of supply could very well dwindle. This could have a great effect on the quality of programming in Canada.

Although it may be embarrassing to some of the heavies in broadcasting to have to sit face to face with the Chairman and discuss the future of Canadian music, it must be understood by these broadcasters that the quality of their programming is at stake. It might also be an opportunity for the major broadcasters to make some of the valid points to the Chairman that their henchmen have been making on their behalf, to the industry. If there is a problem to be solved, this might be the way to solve it.

It may also be said that perhaps the problems of the Canadian AM music ruling might not be apparent to some of the media giants. It might be an eye-opener to some of them to find that their stations are having difficulty and the seriousness of the matter is affecting the production of further recordings.

On the other hand, the broadcasters may not care if new recordings from Canada continue or not. It is most important to the broadcaster that enough product create itself to make the ruling work without affecting programming.

It is time for the CRTC to take this matter to the highest summit and time for a reasonable understanding to take place. If it doesn't happen, then watch the record companies lower their production budgets, drop many of their artists and close the door to independent producers.

It is a matter of record that a number of record companies have made it clear they will be pulling back on their activities. If that is sufficient reason to take action, it might be in the interest of both radio and record people for the CRTC to take the ruling one step further and make it work . . . or forget it.

BEE GEES' "BEST OF" FOR JULY RELEASE

The Bee Gees return to the wax market with "The Best of the Bee Gees Volume 2" which has been set for an early July release in Canada. The set will include their current single release "Wouldn't I Be Someone" and "Letter To Elisa". Also included on the album will be several of their past hits including "My World", never before available on a North American release, "Run To Me", "How Can You Mend A Broken Heart" (recorded by Johnny Mathis and Andy Williams), "Lonely Days" (their first single release after their reunification), and its follow-up, "Alive".

The Bee Gees have recently completed a tour of the UK after which they flew into California to tape two more segments of NBC's "Midnight Special". Their second show was aired June 22 and showcased Canadian John Kay, currently happening with "Moonshine (Friend Of Mine)", Maxine Weldon, Wilson Pickett, and radio personality/recording artist Wolfman Jack.

INTERNATIONAL RELEASE FOR TARRY'S "ROSALIE"

Michael Tarry's Reprise single "Rosalie" continues to climb Canadian charts and is now showing gains in international markets. The single has been released in the U.S., Italy, Australia, Germany, Spain and the UK.

Produced by Tarry and John Pozer at Toronto's Eastern Sound, the single met almost immediate acceptance with adult contemporary programmers and moved very quickly into the country charts and became a "top play" item with contemporary music programmers.

INTERNATIONAL RELEASES FOR A&M CANADA PRODUCT

A&M Canada product has roused international interest. Five Canadian signings have product released in countries around the world.

Topping the list is the successful Keith Hampshire. His current album release, "The First Cut Is The Deepest", having had a good run in Canada has been released in the U.S., UK, Japan, France, Germany, Holland, South Africa, Brazil, Australia, Sweden and Italy. His initial single for A&M, "Daytime Night-time" has already sold in excess of 250,000 copies in Canada and the U.S.

Lorenz Hud, currently represented on the RPM 100 Singles chart with "Master of Pantomime" had his debut album issued in Britain as well as in South Africa, Barbados and Japan. He has just completed a tour of western Canada which resulted in a sizeable radio boost for his single.

The Sound 80 album, produced by Winnipeg's Bob Burns has now been released in Venezuela, Barbados and South Africa. A&M are expected to release "Bongo Rock" shortly.

Haida artists, Valdy and Claire Lawrence have had their albums released in South Africa.

Upcoming from A&M is a single by Ian Tyson, "Love Can Bless The Soul of Anyone". This deck was produced by Bill Misner for Pig-Weed Productions at RCA's Toronto studios.

CANADIAN MUSIC SET FOR CTV NET

CTV has gone all out in its effort to capitalize on Canadian music for their fall/winter season. First off in its "Saturday Date" series will be "Shake, Rock and Roll" which will star Bobby Curtola. The series will take viewers back into the 50s when Curtola was king of Canadian rock. His guest stars will include Chubby Checker, The Four Lads and Chuck Berry. The Curtola series was produced for the CTV Network by Glen-Warren Productions in CFTO-TV's studios.

Also in the "Saturday Date" series is a thirty minute Vancouver production originating from CHAN-TV's studios. Tagged "Banjo Parlor", the name of the game is banjo pickin' and special guests, enhancing this toe-tapping instrument will be recruited locally. Terry David Mulligan is on tap for his "Roq" series, still under the umbrella of "Saturday Date". The series will present four of Canada's top rock groups. The setting will be a concert hall with very little patter. This all-Canadian show was produced for the CTV Network by Glen-Warren Productions at CFTO-TV studios.

Folkies and country folk will have their Ian Tyson back once again. He returns with the Great Speckled Bird for their thirty minute Thursday show. Tyson has just signed a recording agreement with A&M and should have his initial single, "Love Can Bless The Soul Of Anyone" released to coincide with his television series.

"Living Without You" has been added to the MOR list, but other stations might not take the time to listen to the record because they have the same kind of reaction to the group's name. I could be right off base, but I thought it was worth mentioning."

Dave Mills: We are still getting strong regional action from Quebec and the Maritimes. Crawford's have added Dave to their best-sellers list and radio play coming in (i.e. CKGM, CJMS, CFCF, CJAD).



Jesus Christ Superstar: As predicted, the trade reviews were beautiful on the movie. Norman Jewison is a brilliant man. Reaction from most people was "When is the soundtrack LP available" and "I can't wait to see the film again". LP: MCA 2-11000, 8-track: MCAT2-11000, Cassette: MCAC2-11000.



JACK CORNELL TO RELEASE ON RCA

Newest signing to RCA Canada is Jack Cornell, a former Dutch rock artist with eight singles and an album to his credit. He became well known throughout the Netherlands as well as in Germany and Belgium. During his ten years of involvement with the Dutch music scene he became



associated with many groups and wrote most of their material. He writes in Dutch, English and German and has mastered guitar, drums, flute and piano.

It was in 1971 when he decided to leave Holland and try for the music business in Canada. The Immigration Department refused him admittance, advising him that Canada had its quota of musicians. He re-applied as a construction worker and received the nod.

After a year and a half with the labour bit he crashed RCA's A&R department and managed a session engineered by Hayward Parrot and mixed by Mark Smith. The result - a single release of "Happy Dreamer".

The Broadcaster of the Year is awarded to someone from a CCBA member station who has contributed to the well-being of the broadcasting industry and/or to the community, province or country through broadcasting.

The Howard Caine Memorial Award is presented to someone from a CCBA member station who most closely emulates the late Howard Caine in that his attitude to public service has led him to make a significant contribution to his country apart from the broadcasting industry.

The Disq-Pak is molded to the standard album size and is hinged, permitting easy opening and closing. There is no details on weight however, it is described as being slim with an approximate thickness of a two record set.

Carlos Schidlowski, president of Crested Butte, claims that "Anything that can be done by way of design with current packaging materials, can be done with Disq-Pak." They can apparently be hot stamped, embossed or laminated. The outer faces of the package are suited for whatever printing process necessary i.e. imprinting of names, titles, designs etc. The material can be glued or coloured and has the extra advantage of being washable.

The Disq-Pak unit is another step toward damage free delivery. Schidlowski claims: "We are getting close since our Disq-Pak provides a strong yet smooth, convenient to handle package." It was also pointed up that the new unit becomes the permanent enclosure for the product which should be of interest for the private collector.

There are no reports of takers for the new packaging idea but Schidlowski is apparently negotiating with major record and computer companies "on different aspects of the design application."

DISC/TAPE PRODUCTIONS UP OVER LAST YEAR

Advance information from Statistics Canada show both records and pre-recorded tapes as having made gains.

Records for this year (April) are shown as 4.37 million opposed to 4.27 million for last year. Pre-recorded tapes (8-track and cassette) have shown an increase of 725,674 this year over last year's figures of 664,545.

WILLIAMS/COLONIAL A ONE-NIGHTER

Paul Williams, who was scheduled for a week at Toronto's Colonial (June 25-30) threw in the towel after struggling through one night. The A&M recording artist had undergone painful surgery on his teeth before enplaning to Toronto and after his first Toronto set suffered complications that made it impossible to go on. He was flown back to Los Angeles for treatment.

Williams' sad ending of his Toronto gig was a disappointment to many of this city's music colony who had planned to catch this great talent at work. No return engagement has been mentioned at press time. His albums however, are still on display in local retail outlets and reportedly selling briskly.

ZEPPELIN SET FOR VANCOUVER

Led Zeppelin, shattering attendance records on their tour of the U.S., have been scheduled for Vancouver's Coliseum July 17. Their Atlantic album "Houses of The Holy" is reported to be a top seller on the west coast - and across Canada.

Zeppelin have just completed the first half of their North American tour and played to more than 100,000 paying customers in California in less than one week. This included their June 2nd Kezar Stadium (San Francisco) where they drew 49,304 to the largest single concert crowd in the State's history. Grand Funk had held the record for their concert two years ago when they drew a crowd of 45,000. Also on their California tour they sold out the Los Angeles Forum's 18,000 seats twice on May 31st and again on June 3rd.

Zeppelin kicked off their tour at the Atlanta Braves' Stadium in Georgia where they pulled a crowd of 49,236 - breaking the seven and a half year old record set by

the Beatles (33,000). The following evening saw them beat another Beatles' record in Tampa Florida where a capacity crowd of 56,800 paid \$309,000. This has been registered as the largest concert attendance and gross in the history of the United States and bettered the Beatles' record of 55,000 and \$301,000 set at New York's Shea Stadium in 1965.

Zeppelin are moving from city to city on a nine-passenger private Falcon jet. They are being looked after by an entourage of thirty which includes lighting men, sound crew, security men, and road managers. They carry a stereo system of four channels of 3000 watts each, reportedly larger than that used at Woodstock and tagged as "the biggest in the world." They use eight lighting trees which gives them an unusual variety of lighting changes.

Other cities included on the second half of their tour which commences July 6 include: Chicago (6-7), St. Paul (9), Milwaukee (10), Detroit (12-13), Buffalo (15), Boston (20), Providence (21), Baltimore (23) Pittsburgh (23), and New York (27-28).

WATERLOO EXPERIENCES HEFTY SALES RETURNS

Since entering the wax fray with their own Waterloo label, Canada's largest Canadian-owned music publishing house, has experienced encouraging sales with their initial album release, "Hymn Sing" by Eric Wild. William Brubacher, Manager Publishing and Recording Division, reports the album as having sold in excess of two hundred copies each week since the album was released more than nine weeks ago.

75% Canadian-composed, the album contains nine Wild originals. BMI's Whitey Hains is represented on the set with "Sweet Jesus"

JUDGE ORDERS REFUND TO COLUMBIA BUYERS

American record companies will be scrutinizing album liner notes more closely following a judgment in Los Angeles last month. Superior Court Judge Campbell Lucas ordered Columbia Records to pay cash refunds to all buyers of the Earl Scruggs & Lester Flatt LP titled "Breakout". The album liner notes were found to be incorrect when they described all the songs as being previously unreleased.

Plaintiff Gerald Price had launched a class action against Columbia on behalf of all the buyers of the LP. He noted that seven of the eleven songs were previously released between 1958 and 1963 and argued that the album should have come out on the Harmony label (Columbia's budget reissue line).

Judge Lucas ordered Columbia to make \$2.00 refunds to buyers returning the album cover, or \$4.98 refunds to buyers returning the record and cover. Columbia was also ordered to take ads in a national country music publication to notify record buyers of their right to a refund. A further condition required the record company to supply all its retailers with a notice explaining the refund.

In view of the coast to coast acceptance of the album, Waterloo will shortly lay plans for the taping of a second album. All material contained on the set will be published by Waterloo and will be in print and available for sale and distribution within a few weeks.




Last season, Philips records treated us to a new stereo version of Verdi's *I Lombardi* which was his fourth opera to be produced. They now continue their series of new recordings of early Verdi operas with a brilliant new production of Verdi's ninth opera *Attila* which had its first performance in Venice in 1846. The part of *Attila*, King of the Huns is superbly sung here by Ruggero Raimondi, with Sherrill Milnes as *Ezio*, a Roman general. Christina Deutekom sings the part of *Odabella* and Carlo Bergonzi is *Foresto*. The Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Ambrosian Singers and the Finchley Children's Music group provide a rich sonic background under the direction of Lamberto Gardelli and the entire work fits comfortably onto four sides, making things



easier on everyone's budget. An entirely satisfactory introduction to a fascinating unknown Verdi work.

VIVALDI L'Estro Armonico Opus 3

Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields directed by Neville Marriner
ARGO ZRG 733-4 (two discs)

This long awaited release will be a joy to all Vivaldi lovers and to the growing legion of admirers of England's outstanding Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields and its outstanding director, Neville Marriner. Vivaldi's Opus 3 is his first set of Concertos and includes twelve works featuring from one to four violins as soloists. The soloists featured in this recording are Alan Loveday, Iona Brown, Carmel Kaine, Roy Gillard and Ronald Thomas. The performing edition is by Christopher Hogwood who also shares the continuo playing with Colin Tilney. Definitive in every way.

THE SOUND OF WAGNER

The Concert Arts Symphony Orchestra conducted by Erich Leinsdorf
SERAPHIM S-60213

This Seraphim budget line release is a re-issue of an earlier Capitol record done, I should think, prior to Erich Leinsdorf's appointment to the Boston Symphony Orchestra. Leinsdorf has throughout his career built up a brilliant reputation as a Wagner conductor and this fine disc offers ample evidence of his greatness in this field. Includes performances of the *Tannhauser* Overture, the Prelude to Act 3 of *Lohengrin*, the Ride of the Valkyries and Magic Fire Music from *Die Walkure*, the Dance of the Apprentices and procession of the Mastersingers from *Die Meistersinger* and Siegfried's Funeral Music from *Die Gotterdamerung*.

CONCERTOS IN CONTRAST

The Boyd Neel Orchestra conducted by Thurston Dart
L'Oiseau Lyre OLS 158

This "Lyre Bird" release from Editions de L'Oiseau-Lyre is actually a re-issue of a recording made in 1956 but as London Records import the pressings from England, it is not in the budget line price range. The late Thurston Dart here conducts the famous Boyd Neel Orchestra and his team of soloists include Erich Gruenberg and Jack Rothstein, violins, and Cecil Aronowitz Viola and Boris Rickelman, Cello. An interesting and unusual feature of this disc is the Geminiani Concerto Grosso in E minor Op. 3 No. 3 which is performed twice, first in its original version composed in 1733, and again on side two in its second version of 1755. Alexander Scarlatti's Concerto in F minor and the Corelli Concerto Grosso in D major Op. 6 No. 1 complete the stylish programme. The sound, of course, is not up to today's standard.

SCHUBERT Schwanengesang

Tom Krause (baritone); Irwin Gage - (Pianist)
LONDON OS 26328

The collection of songs called "Schwanengesang" were assembled by the Viennese editor Haslinger after Schubert's death. Some of Schubert's finest and most popular songs are included. The Serenade is perhaps the most popular of all but many will recognize *Das Fischermadchen*, *Der Doppelganger* and *Aufenthalt* as well as others among the fifteen great masterworks. A translation of each song is included with the disc. Baritone Tom Krause and his excellent partner, pianist Irwin Gage are as one in their ideal interpretation of the work, and London engineers have caught the beauty of both voice and piano in this outstanding release.

Program categories now ready for discussion

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission last week released its proposed new program categories for AM and FM radio. These new categories, which were mentioned in the April 19 proposed FM policy, are intended by the CRTC to describe and clarify the range of different programming that can be used on AM and FM. The present categories have been outmoded for many years and didn't allow the CRTC to control programming in any substantial way. The new categories reflect radio as it is today and as the CRTC hopes to see it in future.

The thrust of the proposals is away from music as a major form of radio programming, and toward talk. There are eight categories to describe talk formats, and only two categories to describe music programming.

The music category numbers are 60, the "general interest" category, and 70, the "special interest" category. Category 60 would consist of all everyday uses of music on radio, including rock, country, MOR, mood music, political/social comment, short excerpts from stage or movies, pop arrangements of classical or jazz music, and contemporary folk. Category 70, officially known as "Music, Traditional or Special Interest" would encompass the rarely-heard programming such as classical music, opera, full versions of musicals, old traditional folk songs and dances, religious music and jazz.

The eight categories of verbal content proposed by the CRTC were: News, Community Services, Skills and Recreation, Human Interest, Backgrounding, Spoken Word, Advertising and Promotion, and Station Production. A short description of each category follows.

CATEGORY 00 NEWS includes regular newscasts and live actuality broadcasts on "situations of immediate importance."

CATEGORY 10 COMMUNITY SERVICES includes time, weather, road reports, consumer or market reports, community billboard, community emergencies, classified advertising (Swap Shop or listeners' ads), religious services, and problem-solving such as Action Line, requests for help etc.

CATEGORY 20 SKILLS AND RECREATION includes regular sportscasts, and instructions or information guiding listeners to acquire new recreation activities or other skills.

CATEGORY 30 HUMAN INTEREST includes information and discussion relating to personalities and events of general interest rather than immediate importance. This takes in interviews, general advice or guidance,

reports of unusual events, and items such as quizzes or contests.

CATEGORY 40 BACKGROUNDING includes interpretation and explanations probing into news, contemporary major issues, and topics of general interest in the academic field (arts, literature, history, biography, social sciences etc.).

CATEGORY 50 SPOKEN WORD designates "the use of language in imaginative constructions" either prepared or ad-lib. Such things as stories, essays, skits, poetry and drama would qualify but not short com-

ments (which merely provide continuity to separate two items on the air).

CATEGORY 80 ADVERTISING AND PROMOTION includes both paid advertising and the station's own promos. This is a departure from previous regulations in that the CRTC will now have the minutes of self-promotion openly displayed on the station log, where before this listing was not required.

CATEGORY 90 STATION PRODUCTION takes in station or program ID's, technical tests, and brief comments (ad-lib or scripted) which provide continuity between the elements of the broadcast service.

CKPG PRINCE GEORGE TO GO COUNTRY FORMAT

Radio station CPG Prince George, B.C. has announced that it will be dropping its pop music policy and will convert its music format to country. The announcement came June 22 and indicated that the change would be made slowly, using a six week transition period.

Prince George is a two-station market, with CPG's previous format listed as CBC, MOR, and country. The competitive station, CJCI, lists its format as MOR.

New program director Bill Nelson requests all record companies to add CPG to country mailing lists and notes that the transition period in music has already begun, with the cancellation of all progressive album shows.

Leaving the station in the changeover are Larry Bauder (former music director) and Hugh McLellan (former program director).

The CRTC's new list of categories is only a suggested plan at the present time. Discussion and comments will be heard at the Ottawa public hearing starting September 11. Written comments must be filed with the CRTC secretary by August 27.

The first reaction to the new categories felt here at The Programmers, was that the CRTC has erred in providing only two categories for music while giving eight categories of talk. Only two music categories means that all music is either "highbrow" or "lowbrow". This is an oversimplification that will hurt diversity in programming. No distinction is made between usual deejay "rolling format music" and say, a live presentation of a Canadian group, or a structured program discussing the career of a certain contemporary artist.

This two-category system in music should be broadened into at least four or five categories, or else stations will just run deejays and records as the lowest common denominator. They will have to provide some of Category 70 (Traditional and Special Interest) which means classics and jazz, but as for anything of intermediate value, it won't be heard. Certainly at least a station should get credit if it produces a live concert of Canadian music. But under the CRTC proposals this would be equal to the usual format of MOR, country or rock. Hardly a step to take to encourage better programming.

Music is now and will continue to be the mainstay of radio. The CRTC should do a lot more thinking before dividing all music into just two categories. There are at least a dozen types of music, and hundreds of different ways to present each one, ranging from "back to back with no talk" all the way

to "lengthy discussion with the occasional record added for illustrative purposes". With such possibilities of diversity, proposing only two categories appears to be a ridiculous oversimplification.

Seals & Crofts are having action spread over several weeks. Just CJBK charted "Diamond Girl" this week, but the previous charts were CKLG, CJME, CFGO, CKOM and CKRC.

Bloodstone are happening on a national scale now with the news this week that CJME and CKGM charted it. Previously on chart at CKRC, CHUM, CFGO and CKLW.

Cliff & Ann Edwards have a fair bunch of chart numbers with the addition this week of Radiomutuel and CKOM. Previously charted by CKLG, CJBK, CFGO, CHED and CKOC.

Chicago got their first two charts for "Feelin' Stronger" this week. They were CJME and CKLG.

And Maureen McGovern is getting solid sales and requests from women listeners where played. "Morning After" charted by CFGO and CKRC this week (CKOC last week).





The Programmers **TRIBAL DRUM**

CHUM Toronto just wrapped up its "All-Request Dominion Day Weekend". Station took requests on the hitlines, but to minimize distortions caused by "phone freaks" also had employees going directly to the public. They worked the Yonge Street Strip outside Sam's and A&A's to get opinions of people who otherwise would never phone up the station. When interviewing someone, the person was first allowed to name a song of his own free will. Then, he was asked to pick one from the existing list. Presumably, a song that no one selected will in future be dropped from the CHUM library. Music is 95% of your programming and it pays to do research on it. And research is a lot more than just a couple of calls to record stores each week. DETAILED research is worth a lot.

WNBC-FM New York City has instituted a format they call "Rock Pile". It applies 24 hours per day except for the 6-9AM "Imus In The Morning" show (from AM sister station) and the Sunday religious blocks. What is the Rock Pile? The station plays only rock music . . . no news, features, deejays or talk of any kind (except commercials). Companies having "Best Of" albums in country are asked to send them to Johnny Murphy at the station for their gold library. Another change put into effect concerns the good reaction to Mem-

orial University's "Mun Radio" segment of progressive rock from 11 to 1 on Saturday nights. The station has made the 11-midnight hour each evening into an album cut segment, but with a "hit" orientation so it doesn't get too freaky (that is reserved for Saturday night).

Moffat will save money since it can now combine accounting and engineering departments for all three stations. However, all other departments are to remain separate.




