




A Long time for...COPPER PENNY

Copper Penny would appear to be emerging as a new group - somewhat of a ludicrous statement being that the Kitchener-based recording unit have been a part of the recording industry for more than seven years. It all began for Copper Penny at the same time the stage was being set for the Big Town Boys, J.B. and the Playboys and the Stampeders. Ironically, only the Stampeders, from that early sixties era, were able to survive and go on to international stardom. Copper Penny however, managed to sustain. They hung by their thumbs through seven single releases and will soon bow their second album - not a bad track record for a group "not making it". Actually, Copper Penny are making it. Their second single release "Sitting On A Poor Man's Throne" having strong "Shaft" overtones, has shown early indications of becoming a steady climber on the RPM 100 Singles chart. Their sound is "black", one of the reasons they tape their sessions at Richard Becker's Pac III Studios in Detroit. The group readily admits that it took them a long time to get their sound together and now that they have it, they'll stick with Becker. Producer of their session was Harry Hinde.

Seven years in the business has hardened the group to the usual disappointments encountered as an almost everyday happening. Original members, Ken Hollis and Rich Wamil have been through it all and because

VAN MORRISON TORONTO, JULY 7/73

The appearance of Warner Brothers recording artist Van Morrison in a Tirebiter/SAC production at U of T's Convocation Hall fell during Mariposa weekend, and provided an interesting contrast. While Mariposa was casual and off-hand, Morrison was in complete control and had hand-picked the hall and the band for a powerful presentation of blues.

Morrison's band was large: two violins, viola, cello, keyboards, two guitars, bass, drums, sax and trumpet. They were tight and the sound was expertly mixed, providing a perfect backdrop for Van Morrison's famous scat-singing.

With his hard-edged voice soaring through the songs, Morrison broke into his la-la-la, hey-hey and did-did-it lines that echo the fifties blues shouts of bebop jazz. And scat was what the audience wanted to hear.

The band was ready for Morrison's improvisations with some of their own. Jazzy solos were everywhere, but the bedrock was solid. The strings provided a colourful touch of counterpoint in places, and the sax-trumpet section added steaming funk to the countrified guitars.

In the 11PM show, Morrison stayed away from the hard rockers displayed on his "Street Choir" album. Though the audience might have wanted to hear "Domino", "Blue Money" and "Wild Night", they didn't get them. Many of the numbers were taken from his upcoming album "Hard Nosed Highway".

SCRIBNER RETURNS TO BOOKING FRAY

Music Shoppe has gone through a series of changes which includes a location change. They are now located at 44 Upjohn Rd., Don Mills (416) 445-9240 and will be known as Music Shoppe International. Under new General Manager, Ron Scribner, the firm is currently organizing tour circuits in the U.S. the UK, Europe and Japan. They are also establishing affiliations with other agencies and key promoters across Canada. They recently firm a pact whereby they are entitled to exclusive representation of acts managed by S.R.O. Productions. They have added lounge acts to their roster, to be handled by Canada's first Blues and Soul department.

Newest acts exclusive to the company are Abraham's Children and The Ugly Ducklings.

Music Shoppe International is staffed by Steve Maley, principal owner of the firm who heads the one night engagement department with Pegi Ceconi and Rob Tustin. Maley has been involved with the agency for the past three years and is a former member of Taxi, Tote Family and SeaDog.

Scribner will head up the steady engagement department with Jeff Charles. Scribner will also be in charge of the company's tour circuit. This is Scribner's first involvement in an agency in six years. He was one of the first booking agents to bring attention to this craft and established the Bigland Agency, the first rock

Musimart have been kept busy with the success of the Blue Ridge Rangers and their Fantasy album (9415). They'll be bowing their follow-up album within the next couple of weeks. Also on tap is a second set from John Fogerty.

Musimart also distribute the Trip line - now seeing good sales action with their ten different twofer releases, all oldies and goodies.

Michel Kordupel is the promotion director for Musimart.

CANADIAN OFFICES FOR CTI RECORDS

CTI Records enters the Canadian disc business with the opening of offices in Montreal flying the banner of CTI Records of Canada, Ltd. The Montreal complex will also act as their central warehousing for national distribution. Heading up the Canadian operation is Lou Munson, who has been transferred from CTI (U.S.) where he was associated with sales and promotion. He is now selecting staff to handle sales, promotion and office duties.

Both CTI and DUDU products are to be manufactured in Toronto with all new releases being shipped simultaneous to the release of the product in the U.S. Merchandise shipped will be newly manufactured under CTI's specification - this being the only product accepted by CTI for return.

Effective July 2/73, CTI Records of Canada, Ltd., is the sole authorized distributor for this product.



It must have been obvious to the trade, that the demographics and the logistics of singles was doomed with the new affluence of young people.

Why would anyone buy a single, when the LP containing the single is on the market, or about to be released. The dollar value of an album is a much better buy, and the music record companies are turning out designs to appeal to an older age group. They obviously look at singles as a child's item and head for the record store with a fist full of bills.

So, in 1973 with no teenyboppers to support singles and no teenybopper singles to speak of, we have LP buyers. Does this mean the end of singles? Probably not, but it might mean the single is a promotion piece, or that the trade will have to program singles to the younger market.

CRIA TO BE REPRESENTED BY CARLTON, COWAN FIRM

The Canadian Recording Industry Association has appointed the Toronto-based public relations firm of Carlton Cowan to administer the activities of the Association.

The appointment was announced by CRIA's new president, Mr. Arnold Gosewich, president of Capitol Records (Canada) Ltd. In making the announcement Mr. Gosewich noted: "Carlton Cowan's experience in working with Associations coupled with their background in the entertainment and music field in Canada was a contributing factor to our decision." The PR firm will handle the day-to-day activities of the Association through Brian Robertson who will be acting as Executive Secretary for the Association from CRIA's new offices - Suite 1100, 111 Richmond St. West, Toronto (416) 367-9745. It will also be the function of the new firm to assist in strengthening the membership of the Association as well as improving the communications between the industry and the public and increasing the overall awareness of the recording industry in Canada.

The CRIA has recently amended its By-Laws to include independent record producers.

Young people aren't as young as they were, and money is certainly no problem when it comes to buying an LP. Many of the younger crowd are mobile to the sound of cartridges or cassettes and the new status symbol with the record buyer is a collection of albums, not a pile of singles.

Where does this leave the programmers? In a very strange position. He is aiming at what the public wants, but what the public wants is not that one single. They want a whole collection of songs by their favourite artist.

On his recent trip to Toronto, Bill Gavin mentioned that no one has ever come up with a format to play, playlist and chart LPs. This is a programming problem that will have to be solved, but not that it's an immediate problem, there will probably be a way.

Many stations already realize that the album is the sound that people want and are investigating album cuts for good programming.

Then does this mean the death of the chart? It could very well be the end of charts as we know them. Charts will have to reflect selections from LPs as being the sought after commodity as opposed to single records. In the past, LP cuts have been hits without a single release, and it may become the order of the day. We may yet see a list of 30 top songs by the artists who perform them with just one difference. The LP will be the commodity asked for and the single will be available in only certain cases when the record company wishes to bring it out. After all we sell music to the masses . . . not packaging concepts.

The consumer tells us what he wants, and it's up to us to supply it to him, and if it's albums they want, it may just be an indication that the record business is growing up or at least dealing more with the young grownups.

MCA CANADA UNVEILS CALGARY COMPLEX

June 24, MCA Records (Canada) hosted a barbecue party to officially open their Western Canadian Distribution Centre located in Calgary. The party was hosted by Jack Williams, district sales manager. Those in attendance included from Los Angeles, J.K. (Mike) Maitland, president MCA Records, Inc., and his wife; Rick Frio, VP of marketing and Lou Cook, VP of administration.

Richard Bibby, VP and National Sales Manager and Scott Richards, National Promotion Manager, were also on hand. MCA recording artist Bob Ruzicka and his wife Deryl made the trip down from Edmonton for the occasion.

MCA's ultra modern office and warehouse showcase actually opened on March 1 this year when MCA became a total branch operation. However, it was decided to wait for more clement weather so that an authentic outdoor western beef barbecue could be staged. In the area of 150 guests from the record and radio industries enjoyed themselves at the outing.

Mike Maitland officially opened the building by cutting a tape and guests were given a tour of MCA's warehouse, considered the largest and most modern in Western Canada.

MARIPOSA: PERFECTING THE FESTIVAL FORMULA

The Mariposa Folk Festival, which held its thirteenth annual festival July 6-8 on Toronto Islands, seems to have hit a winning formula: think small. The festival, in the past a part-time affair for staffers, maintained a full-time staff over last winter and the benefits were immediately noticeable. Not only did Mariposa hold five winter/spring programs in Toronto, but the staff managed to nail down virtually every detail that goes to make a smoothly-running weekend. Compared to pop festivals that are thrown together in six weeks, Mariposa had everything under control.

The "think small" formula was conceived by the organizers as the only solution to the usual hassles of big festivals, namely crowding. With a limit of 8,000 tickets per day (sold out Friday and Saturday), performers could play on small, intimate stages at reasonable volume, instead of blasting away at a huge audience from a stage surrounded by fencing.

For every person in attendance, Mariposa was different, as each listener gravitated toward the music of his choice. And what a choice . . . over 50 different acts all brought together under the umbrella of folk music. Actually, the term "folk" in this case takes in many different types of music, but seems to include mostly singer/songwriters who play alone or with a minimum of accompaniment. They may be blues, cajun, country or Gaelic, but each performer has something to say in his music, and makes his point as a true artist. This is in contrast to "performers who have been marketed by the mass media", as Mariposa put it, who don't necessarily write any music, but perform "commercial"

of this experience they have been able to guide the group through the "fun game" of establishing themselves as a recording unit with powerful one nighter potential. Besides Wamil and Hollis, Copper Penny are: Blake Barrett, Bill Mononen and Ron Hiller, the latter, a former member of Rain, is the newest addition.

Songwriting is also a part of Copper Penny's being. Both sides of their single was written by Ron Hiller, Bill Mononen, and Rich Wamil. Publishing is carried by Chappell. Promotion on the single has been looked after by Gerry Renewych of Chappell. He has worked closely with the group in establishing a communication with programmers and the press, and it's obviously paying off.

Their release label, Sweet Plum, is a part of the Much complex and is distributed in Canada by London. The single has been released in the U.S. on the Big Tree label and in the UK on Pye.

Copper Penny are five individuals who have contented themselves with putting out "their" sound and hoping it has the ingredients to make a dent in the industry. If they don't make it with this one, they've got a dozen more, and with each release, the sound gets better and better. They've got the spirit - that's half the battle.

songs with the aid of huge electrified backing groups. Those the festival doesn't need.

This year, Mariposa finally shed the "Woodstock" image when none of the "mass media" acts appeared as in past years. No Neil Youngs or Joni Mitchells were on hand to stir up hysteria . . . only a bunch of real people whose music is their art and not just a means to make money.

Mariposa-goers had their choice of numerous workshops under intriguing titles such as "Songs of Social Action", "Songs of Displaced People", "Good Time Music", "Dirty and Bawdy Songs" and so on. Several performers shared the stage and played in rotation, with the others joining in as the spirit moved them. When performers had the inclination to explain each song and how it fitted the workshop theme, the audience got rare insights into the process of musical creation.

Several of the artists at Mariposa might be called contemporary performers, and they drew the best crowds. Though far from being media super-stars, names like Murray McLauchlan, Steve Goodman, Leon Redbone, John Prine and John Hammond were familiar to the gathering. They attracted enough people to make it hard to hear if you weren't in close.

However, the best moments were provided by several of the unknown performers such as Malvina Reynolds, a fine lady with greying hair who writes humourous and activist songs; Ardoine Family, a French-speaking Cajun family band from Louisiana; Arthur "Big Boy" Crudup, a grand old bluesman that influenced a young Elvis Presley; Marshall Dodge, a story-teller with a flair for the anecdote; and Adam Mitchell, former rock musician/producer now into a new career.

Crowds were exceptionally orderly, making just a handful of police necessary. Discreet smoking and drinking was in evidence, but nothing that would jeopardize next year's invitation from Metro Parks to use the Island as the Mariposa site. Not a single arrest was made over the Friday-to-Sunday period.

In its 13th year, Mariposa came of age. The formula has been honed to perfection and we look forward to next year's with delightful anticipation. - Dave Chadwick





WEA CALIFORNIA ADDS ACTION SINGLES DESK

A local branch of Warner-Elektra-Atlantic Distributing Corporation (WEA) located in Glendale, California has instituted an "action singles desk" plan that may become the industry standard. The special desk tabulates playlist additions of major radio stations and cuts red tape that often delays getting the new singles into retail stores. When the "action singles desk" is functioning right, it enables WEA to have product in stores the day after the radio station has added the record. Thus WEA earns extra sales in the key initial period and also avoids the common problem of having the radio station drop a record because it is not selling. Each single is given every chance possible to break out quickly.

WEA staffers explained that when a major Los Angeles station adds a WEA record, the "action singles desk" calls all the major accounts (one-stops, rack jobbers and major retailers) and advises them that the station went on the record. He takes the order during the same phone call, if necessary. Then, the staffer follows each order through all steps leading to warehouse shipping.

The "action singles desk" staffer thus bypasses all the little details that bog down some of the other orders (credit check, order re-check, and shelf picking). Orders from the "action singles desk" receive highest priority and the staff member must see that they leave the office on the same day.

The goal of the operation is to eliminate the no-stock problem that is all so common and cuts into profits. But it also has another fringe benefit. After the station has notified WEA that a record is on the playlist, a full report of quantities ordered by all the retailers is available at the "action singles desk" the same day. This information can be fed back to the radio station in time to make up their new chart for the following week.

CREWE TO PRODUCE PETULA CLARK LP

Bob Crewe, who is producing exclusively for Motown Records, has just completed a recording session for Petula Clark. Release label is MGM. A special "lend out" arrangement was apparently made between the two record companies which made it possible for Crewe to produce this session.

Crewe returned to disc prominence last year with his Motown deal which resulted in a session with Bobby Darin.

HAIDA READIES VALDY SINGLE

Valdy, Haida recording artist and brand new dad, has released his new single, "Simple Life". The side is a co-penned of Valdy's and his bass player, Max Bennett. The single was produced by Claire Lawrence at A&M's Los Angeles studios. An album is now being readied for an August release.

Also from Haida comes news of Kathy Stack's initial single release, "Expectations". The single was co-written and produced by Claire Lawrence at A&M's studios.

MORRICONE'S "BEST" TOPS RCA SALES

It has become apparent over the past few months that Ennio Morricone has a large following in the province of Quebec. The Soundtrack "Once Upon A Time in the West" featuring the musical talents of this Italian giant has already exceeded 110,000 units sold.

To keep pace with the growth of the Morricone cult, RCA have released "Best Soundtracks" (KCL1-0008) which contains selections from the "West" set as well as excerpts from the "Sacco and Vanzetti" Soundtrack and other Morricone movie favourites.

Pierre Bellemare, promotion director for RCA (Quebec) reports heavy FM exposure being given to this new album release.

PAGLIARO OFF ON PROVINCIAL TOUR

Michel Pagliaro and his group have completed a tour of Quebec Province which took them into more than thirty-five cities. The tour was completed at the end of July.

Pagliaro's RCA album "Pag" (PCS 4019) and his single "J'Entends Frapper", the latter being the first French Canadian single to top English radio surveys (CKLC/CKWS Kingston) both qualified for Canadian Gold last year.

This gave RCA's Quebec promotion director, Pierre Bellemare and his crew a strong foot in the door for Pagliaro's newest release, "Fou De Toi".

AVENUE TO DISTRIBUTE CLARK'S "ROCK 'N' ROLLER"

Avenue of America have firmed a deal whereby they will have sole distribution rights in Canada for the Dick Clark "Twenty Years of Rock 'N' Roll". The two-record set has been issued on the Avenue label in Canada and on Buddah in the U.S. The package contains thirty original hits from 1953 to 1973 including those by the Orioles, Crew Cuts, Bill Haley, Carl Perkins, Johnny Cash, Fats Domino, Jerry Lee Lewis, Duane Eddy, Everly Brothers and many others.

The set also includes an exclusive bonus record, "Inside Stories with Dick Clark", plus a twenty-four page souvenir yearbook.

Initial reaction to the offering has been exceptional with a reported 70,000 for the first pressing. Gary Salter, president of the Avenue group, is laying on a heavy national TV/radio and in-store promotion campaign.

Suggested retail for disc product is \$6.95 while the 2-tape set will retail for \$8.95.

GEORGE OLLIVER TO RELEASE ON MUCH

George Olliver, off the scene for a couple of years, has returned to the disc race with a Circus production.

The initial single release for the Montreal-based firm is an Olliver penning "I May Never Get To See You Again". The session was produced in Montreal by Bill Hill and is released on the Much label.

His Montreal trip was looked after by Quality's Nicolle Dufour who arranged for a luncheon with Ms. Lamarche of CFMB, a visit with Barbara Pocock of CJAD, an interview with Bill Dick of CBC plus interviews and visits with music directors of CFCF and CHOM.

In Toronto Forster was given the red carpet promo treatment by Joe Owens of Quality who arranged appearances on Elwood Glover's "Luncheon Date" (CBC-TV) and Ron Smith's "Summer Scene" out of CHEX-TV in Peterborough. He was also afforded visit and interview time at CHSC St. Catharines, CHML Hamilton (George Patton), CKDS-FM Hamilton (Bill Osborne), as well as retail store appearances — Sam The Record Man in St. Catharines. Newspaper coverage came by way of the Ottawa Journal.

Chuck Porter who looks after promotion for Quality in Manitoba and Saskatchewan arranged for on-air interviews with Lee Majors, who hosts one of the most popular of CBC radio network shows, and with Dave Harrison of CKY. In Alberta Ben Healy

arranged several radio, television and press interviews.

Back home in British Columbia, Ray Ramsay, Quality promotion manager, is currently setting up a promotion tour which will take Forster into the interior as well as up the coast.

With the important exposure received by Forster, Quality has found an excellent sales pattern beginning to form for his album, "Walkin' Real In An Unreal Land" (Ranwood R8107).

NEW TITLES TO AMPLEX DISCRETE QUAD CATALOGUE

Ampex has added three titles to its catalogue of discrete quadraphonic open reel recorded tape. The addition of the three new titles from three record labels gives the company's quadraphonic open reel catalogue ten titles. The three additions are: "Days of Future Passed" by the Moody Blues on Deram; Paul Horn's "Concert Ensemble" on Ovation; and Al Green's "Call Me" on the Hi label.

In making the above announcement, Jules Cohen, AMD national marketing manager (U.S.) noted: "The initial response to quadraphonic open reel has been good and thus justifies the addition of more titles to the catalogue."

More titles will be added as the market demand increases and as additional quadraphonic masters are received from those record companies for which Ampex markets and distributes recorded tape.

BEST WISHES TO MacCAULL FROM QUEEN AND P.E.I.

Jack Hosier, national ad man for Marathon Music, was working overtime in his efforts to promote Roy MacCaull's new single, "On The Shores of P.E.I." and the results were rewarding. He sent a copy of the single and a letter to Queen Elizabeth and the same to Premier Alex Campbell of P.E.I.

A return letter from Buckingham Palace revealed that the Queen appreciated receiving the record which was written to commemorate the centennial which Prince Edward Island is celebrating this year.

Premier Campbell was also tuned into the single and extended an invitation to MacCaull to visit P.E.I. during the centennial celebrations.

BAILEY TO APPEAR ON QUEEN'S ROYAL TVER

Following his opening night performance at Toronto's O'Keefe, Jim Bailey received an invitation from Queen Elizabeth to appear on the Royal TV Gala Performance. The show will be held in London July 24th.

Bailey, regarded as one of the top impressionists in the business, is probably most famous for his impersonations of Judy Garland, Barbra Streisand and Peggy Lee.

His first album for U.A. "Jim Bailey" picked up good sales during his Toronto stay. His second set, recorded "live" at Carnegie Hall, has been scheduled for a fall release.

NEW ELECTRONICS STEAL MUSIC SHOW

The National Association of Music Merchants held its annual convention last month in Chicago and made it plain to see that new electronic technology is being introduced to music at a breathtaking pace.

The conventioneers still make most of their sales in guitars and organs, but the equipment business is undergoing changes. The "Monster amp" movement of the late 60's has petered out at a reasonable wattage, and the fastest growing instrument is the synthesizer.

Synthesizers have mushroomed in sales since their introduction three years ago, but the price remains high, from one to ten thousand dollars apiece. U.S. sales in 1972 were \$8 million, and currently 4% of all U.S. high schools are synthesizer-equipped. The instrument can create a huge range of familiar and alien musical tones.

Electronics has also begun to appear in wind instruments. A new item called the lyricon looks like a flute, but is played like a clarinet and has 200 electronic circuits to colour the tone electronically. It costs \$1985 in the U.S.

And thus the U.S. trend, which eventually influences Canada, is for electronics to become an even bigger part of the music business.

ZYLAN SET FOR COLUMBIA RELEASE

The Halifax-based Zylan group make their disc debut with an original penning of "Darlin'" (Columbia C4-4012). The session was produced by Al Feeney for Fivetake. The plug side was written by the group's lead vocalist Helene Bolduc and Peter Fraser, keyboards. Publishing is handled by April/Creemore-CAPAC.

Other members of the group are: Donnie Hann, bass guitar; Real Pellitier, acoustic guitar, lead vocalist; Andy Davis, drums, Blaine Murphy, lead guitar; Harold Tsistinas, sax; with Dave Miller and George Wilson both on trumpets. Group members supply vocal harmony and solo bits.

The single has been released in French as well.

MITTLER MOVES TO LONDON

Greg Mittler makes a label change to London Records. Initial deck is a self penning of "Love You Easy" (M.17458). The session was produced at Pac III in Detroit and Toronto's Eastern Sound by John Stewart. Arrangements by Dave Van de Pitte.

The flip, "Where I Came From" is also a Mittler original.



Suggested list for albums is \$2.98 with tapes in at \$5.98. Rodeo is distributed in Canada by London Records.

COHEN FEATURED AT SHAW FESTIVAL

"Sisters of Mercy", a 90-minute musical featuring the poems and songs of Leonard Cohen opened for a summer run at the Court House Theatre (Niagara-on-the-Lake) July 5th. Directed by Gene Lesser the play centres on the different personalities that pass through one man's life (namely Leonard Cohen).

Nicolas Surovy does a fine portrayal of Cohen through the many themes and moods.

Also starring are Gale Garnett (singer/composer/author) most noted for her "We'll Sing in the Sunshine", Emily Bindiger, Pamela Paluzzi, Rosemary Radcliffe and Michael Calkins. Included among the numbers are "Suzanne", "Hey! That's No Way to Say Good-bye", "So Long Marianne" and the title song.

Among his four albums available on Columbia Records, Cohen has also published five books of poetry. Hailing from Montreal this Canadian artist has become an international personality, with his works translated into 23 languages.

**JUKEBOX OPERATOR
LOOKS AT RPM CHART**

I have a small select route of jukeboxes, and buy RPM only for the RPM 100 singles list. Two-thirds of my customers are under 21. What makes them play a particular record on a jukebox? Because they bought it, and have it at home? They heard it on the radio and HAVEN'T bought it yet? And once they buy a record, will they continue to put money into a jukebox to hear it?

Too many records you listed as hits were dogs by my popularity meter. For example, "Orly", "You Are The Sunshine", "Steamroller Blues", "What About Me" (a real dog) and others.

Years ago I reported to radio station CKOC the most popular records on my jukeboxes, but that only helped to keep records on the chart longer and didn't tell me what records to buy.

For the last six years, I relied on the CHUM hit parade, but thanks to that system I found myself with all their hits but it didn't tell me what else to buy. To find out what's new I switched to RPM.

I'm concerned about your chart changes. If the top ten are "sellers" and my customers don't pay to play things they already own, perhaps I shouldn't buy the top ten on your list. I welcome your comments and advice.

Your comments only serve to point up one reason why RPM introduced its new research base for the RPM 100 singles. Several of the records you listed as "stiffs" got extensive radio play, but as you say, that doesn't mean that people will pay to hear them. Our current chart system downplays radio air-time to avoid placing "radio hits" too high.

Your problems with buying new singles from the RPM 100 also spotlights the role of a trade-paper chart in the music industry. People use the chart for many different things . . . a radio station uses it as a programming guide, a retailer uses it for a sales guide and a jukebox operator uses it to buy new records. Thus one chart is put to different uses and must reflect all three trends on a single page. It becomes an AVERAGE, which may or may not mean it matches YOUR PURPOSE to a T.

Faced with all these problems, where do you turn? Whether you are retailing, running a jukebox route or programming a radio station, a chart needs YOUR INTERPRETATION to suit it to your PARTICULAR need.

It is interesting to note that Stevie Wonder's "You Are The Sunshine" was a stiff in your area. This record got saturation play in Canada for over a month before it was released here, thanks to advance U.S. copies and slowness of release by Ampex in this

country. Thus the record was "burned out" by exposure long before it got into jukeboxes. With so many unusual factors such as the above working for or against certain songs, it's amazing that anyone can claim to put out "an accurate chart". There are just too many factors to consider.

Needless to say, RPM's new research base tries to include more "off-beat" information than ever before. We accept facts from all sources and compile them as accurately as we can. This includes radio, jukeboxes, retailers, wholesalers, record companies and record consumers.

Along with RPM's new research base, our chart has become somewhat more "conservative". Many records will in future rise much more slowly, and "isolated" action reports will be downplayed in favour of "national trends". This hopefully will provide a mechanism for keeping "dogs" confined to the lowest chart positions and will also mean a record can be dropped from the chart early in its life unless it shows concrete potential for solid growth in sales. - D. Chadwick

**COLUMBIA TO RELEASE
THREE T-BONE SETS**

The sixty-four year old blues master has just completed a successful two week engagement at Ottawa's Le Hibou and moved into the El Mocambo in Toronto for a week commencing July 16.

**WEA TAPE PRODUCT
SHOWS INCREASE**

WEA's tape product has shown a steady increase since the beginning of the year. Top selling tape, and disc, is Led Zeppelin's "Houses Of The Holy". Alice Cooper's "Billion Dollar Babies" is also a top tape item as are all of his releases. Country and country-oriented tapes have commanded the situation with Doug Kershaw leading the group. The Everly Bros' first album release for Warner Bros., "Best Of" has been a consistent sales winner.

The WEA group are getting into more country and have shown well with the tape and album releases of "Just Thank Me" by David Rogers on Atlantic. Also from Atlantic comes a new signing, Willie Nelson, and his "Shotgun Willie" set. Mike Nesmith's Countryside label is showing signs of getting into the race.

Newest release is Garland Frady's "A Good Love Is Like A Good Song". Tape product on this item is expected shortly.

Coming up are album releases, with 8-track to follow, of Jethro Tull ("A Passion Play"), the Allman Brothers, Danny O'Keefe, and Black Sabbath.






ACE OF DIAMONDS SDD 2200

Berlioz is also represented with three orchestral excerpts from his "La Damnation de Faust" - Marche Hongroise, Ballet des Sylphes and Menuet des Follets. Side two features Debussy's Prelude a L'apres-midi d'un Faune" and the Suite No. 2 from Ravel's ballet "Daphnis et Chloe". The performances and recorded sound are excellent and a bargain on London's budget priced Fontana line.

Crossovers - a change in singles business

In 1973, the record industry is in a period of change on all sides . . . bigger merchandising chains are taking the lion's share of the business that was once in the hands of numerous independents. And on the airplay side, an even bigger change: Top 40

radio stations no longer have a 100% hold on record buyers. Hits can be broken in a city by a progressive rock or MOR station.

As competitive factors push Top 40 outlets into more gold and fewer current hits, there is a tightening up of the playlist to such an extent that new records must wait for a month or two before some Top 40 stations will consider adding them. And in these cases, the longer playlists employed by progressive stations and adult contemporary operations can be a godsend to the record company promotion staff.

The record people we talked to defined the role of the Top 40 station as a "hitmaker" . . . that is, concentrated Top 40 play will push a record into hit sales. The MOR's and progressives, though, are "hit starters" . . . they have an audience that doesn't buy as many records as the Top 40's, but they do

buy some. Their purchases can be enough to "start" a record in the market to the point where a Top 40 becomes interested in adding the song.

Why is this situation only emerging recently among progressive and MOR radio stations? Only recently have these two categories of radio become interested in the "mainstream" of contemporary music. "Old-line" MOR stations who counted no record buyers among their audience are switching to more current music and attracting a whole new audience. Progressive-contemporary stations, be they AM or FM, are no longer "underground" radio with appeal only to a certain small segment. They are broadening their appeal with mainstream contemporary music which often means more of an emphasis on singles of the day.

Where it once was true that MOR, Top 40, and progressive radio covered totally different fields, they are all beginning to overlap and many records can now fit all three simultaneously. It becomes much easier for records to "cross over".

Examples of recent crossovers from progres-

sive radio to Top 40 action are the Electric Light Orchestra's "Roll Over Beethoven" and Pink Floyd's "Money". Examples of crossovers from MOR radio are Charlie Rich's "Behind Closed Doors" and Peter Foldy's "Bondi Junction".

If you had to define what a "crossover" is, the definition would probably end up as "a Top 40 hit record that was discovered first by a radio station of a format other than Top 40". Aside from the MOR and progressive crossovers described above, R&B and country crossovers are also possible. Barry White's "I'm Gonna Love You" is an R&B example and Donna Fargo's "Funny Face" is a country example.

Why so many "crossovers" today? The Top 40 lists are tighter than ever and radio stations outside the Top 40 format are playing many of the records first. Something for promotion staffs to remember: you don't have to put all your faith in a Top 40 station to break a record. Other formats can break it into Top 40 strength. This only points up the necessity to service all types of stations with your best product, instead of concentrating all your efforts on the station with the tightest music list.

CKVL-FM MONTREAL GOES BILINGUAL FOR STONES

Montreal suburban station CKVL-FM (Verdun) went bilingual last weekend to present a locally-produced six-hour special on The Rolling Stones. CKVL's AM & FM stations are normally all-French, but for the Stones program a two-language format was adopted.

The program ran 7PM to 1AM on the night of Friday July 13 and was heavily promoted by the station beforehand. The degree of local research was quite high, as the Rolling Stone's remarkable history was retold with full recapping of the group's four appearances in Montreal over the last decade. Even the sponsor, Labatt's, made a special effort to be historic . . . they provided commercials to tie in with the year being discussed, starting with "oldies" early in the show and ending with 1973 commercials at the close.

General manager of CKVL, Paul Tietolman, spared no effort in producing the radio special. He hired Bill Mann (Melody Maker's Canadian correspondent and Montreal Gazette rock critic) and Jacques Letendre (French music paper critic) to do the writing and production. Also on the air as commentators were Lester Bangs of San Francisco music paper Rolling Stone, and Michel Trahan and Serge Segarini of Elektra recording group The Wackers.

MAJOR MARKET PLAYLIST ADDITIONS

Dawn's "Yellow Ribbon" will probably turn out to be the no. 1 single of the year, and the new Dawn single got instant acceptance to follow it up. "Say, Has Anybody Seen My Sweet Gypsy Rose" was added by CKOM, CJBK, CHED, CKXL and CFGO this week (CKOC from last week).

Donny Osmond is super strong on airplay, gaining a huge count of stations after just two weeks and leaving The Osmonds record "Goin' Home" far behind. Stations adding "Young Love" this week were CKOM, CJBK, CFCF, CJME and CFGO. Previous stations airing the song were CHAM, CFTR, CKLW and CKOC.

Diana Ross looks pretty strong now, as CKLW, CKCK, CJME and CFGO all went on her song. Previously added by CHED and it has two charts tallied in "Major Market Chart Additions."

Copper Penny is taking off fast. Added by CKOC, CKCK and CJME this week with previous stations including CFGO, CHED, CKXL and CJBK.

Les Emmerson is strong so far with "Cry Your Eyes Out". Added by CFTR, CKCK and CFRW this time around, who join previous stations CKY, CFCF, CFGO, CHAM and CJME.

Pink Floyd are making progress. "Money" onto CKCK and CHAM playlists with a total of seven charts in "Major Market Chart Additions."

Stories are strong with new playlists coming from CKCK and CHLO this week. Six stations have charted the record (see Major Market Chart Additions).

Jim Stafford still continues to gain in a long, slow process. Added by CHAM and CJME. Other stations airing their record at some time over the last few months were CKCK, CFCR, CFGO, CKOM, CFRN and CKLW.

Charlie Daniels is gaining airplay, this week CHLO and CKCK. Previously added by CFGO, CFRW and CHAM.

Early acceptance for Carole King and Chad Allen. Carole King's new one onto CKOM and CHLO while Chad Allen's "Spending My Time" hit airwaves of CHAM and CFCF.

Dave Nicol still on the climb with the news that CKLW and CFTR have playlisted him. Previous additions came from CHED, CFCF and CKXL.

Lobo still gaining with a record that appeals to the 20-30 female bracket. Added by CJBK and CFGO this week (CKY and CFCF from last week).

The Programmers BREAKOUT MARKET ADDITIONS

This section of The Programmers recaps the new music added to the two-station markets of Canada. These programmers all operate in a competitive market situation, yet have shown that they can often "pick" a hit before the major markets are aware of it.

Among the two-station markets this week, Dawn grabbed the biggest share of new airplay. The Dixie-flavoured song for Gypsy Rose was added on receipt at VOCM, CJIC, CKPT and CFJC this week (CJOC in last week's RPM).

Two next-hottest records in the breakout markets are the new Lobo and the old Maureen McGovern. Lobo was added by CHSJ last week, and this week he picks up CJIC, CFJC and CKRD. Maureen McGovern, who has been airing in breakout markets since

winter, showed revived action this week with VOCM, CFBC and CKWS all playlisting it.

CanCon material gaining acceptance: Gary & Dave, Crowbar, and Dave Nicol. Gary & Dave had CJIC last week and this week pick up CFJC and CHSJ. Crowbar make their debut with CHEC and VOCM. And Dave Nicol adds CKRD and CHEC this week to his long list of previous action (CHSJ, CKPT, CFJC, VOCM and CHNL.)

Four other new records getting initial acceptance in the two-station markets are Johnny Rivers, Bobby Goldsboro, Wings and Chicago. Here's the breakdown. Johnny Rivers onto VOCM and CHNL with another rock revival single. Bobby Goldsboro onto CHSJ and CJIC with his soft summer sound. Wings onto CKPT and CKRD for a record that looks to be happening faster than McCartney's last "My Love". And Chicago was added at CHNL and CKLC (previously airing at CKPT).

And the Four Tops look A-OK this week as CKRD and CJIC playlist the record. Previous stations on it were CKWS, CFJC and CHEC.

Here's the latest lineup at CKLW. Dave Shafer 6-9AM; Johnny Williams 9-noon; Pat Holiday noon-3PM; Brother Bill Gable 3-6PM in a return to the station after a couple of months at KHJ Los Angeles; Ted "The Bear" Richards 6-9PM; Super Max 9-1AM (his former airname was Max Kinkel); and Mike Kelly 1-6AM. Bob Savage is the weekend man. New program director Bill Hennes confirms that he has made several small updates in the Big Eight sound. He called this a "tightening up, a 1973 facelift". Paul Drew, PD of KHJ is consulting the station and Hennes phones him weekly or so if he has an idea that he wants to bounce off an outside observer. But this is just a fresh viewpoint, and music lists are still under joint control of Hennes and Rosalie Trombley. Hennes comments that, contrary to what the CHUM Report says, summer 1973 is "not too grim" in terms of Canadian music; in fact there are five Canadian records on the Top 30 chart alone. These are all getting sales and phones: Anne Murray, Incredible Bongo Band, James Leroy "Touch of Magic", Guess Who and Peter Foldy. These of course are supplemented by the Canadian playlist but there have been weeks where no Canadian records proved strong

enough to hit the CKLW Top Thirty. Hennes would be interested to know sales statistics on Canadian music, to see whether sales come through on Canadian records. They get 30% airplay, but do they sell 30%? Just how great is the sales share of Canadian music? His quick guess was maybe 10%, since Canada is 10% in population compared to the States. Hard to get detailed, accurate research of this type but maybe the CRTC would be interested in compiling sales tallies of Canadian records. Maybe one answer to the problems of the 30% rule is to make it variable by season . . . higher quotas when there are many records out and lower quotas when the output of Canadian singles is low.

In last week's story on the Stampeders big tour, we forgot to mention that James Leroy and Denim will also be part of the package for the first month. Dates are confirmed on the East Coast from July 13 to August 6 with more to come when arrangements are final.

Darryl Burlingham, PD of CKLG Vancouver, has resigned, but the move isn't effective until expiry of his contract on September 1. Burlingham's future plans are not firm at present.

The Tammy Rafferty single on Periwinkle "Find Yourself A Boy" is airing on CKOC Hamilton and even though product wasn't available in stores right away, our rack jobber sales reports showed a demand for it. It is as high as any other Canadian single is, in terms of retail demand in that city. Order the single from Mark Two Distributors, 445-0878 in Toronto. Address is 1262 Don Mills Rd., Suite 3A, Don Mills, Ont.

"Monster Mash", after just one week airplay on CHUM Toronto, leaped to the no. 2 best selling single at Sam's stores in Ontario. If you're not playing this, you should be. It's been a long long time since anything has broken that fast in Toronto. However, a no. 1 charting at neighbouring CKOC Hamilton helped get it started.

CJBK London into another simple little contest that has sparked the imagination of listeners and gained a fantastic reaction. A Treasure Hunt; find the CJBK voucher, bring it to the station and you can cash it in for \$1000. Clues are repeated each hour and changed three times daily. CJBK has been swamped with phone calls but clues aren't given that way; you have to listen. This type of thing hasn't been done in the market for five years and is really making waves. Each clue leads you a little bit closer.

CFGQ Ottawa just wrapped up its All Time Top 300 Weekend which ran three complete times from 3PM Friday to midnight Sunday, July 6-8. Compiled from three weeks of previous phone calls, the top ten items were: 1 Hey Jude; 2 Joy To The World; 3 Maggie May; 4 Honky Tonk Women; 5 Let It Be; 6 Playground In My Mind; 7 I'm A Stranger Here; 8 Colour My World; 9 Smoke On The Water; 10 American Pie. The station down-played current records in its survey, but Clint Holmes, Five Man Electrical Band and Deep Purple were all so super-strong they couldn't be ignored. Listeners given chances to win a tape library of the show (which included artist capsules, actualities and chart-

Newest jock on staff is Mike Cooper (1-6AM) who comes from North Bay FMer CKAT. Biggest breaking discs this week at CFGQ are "Bongo Rock" from 28 to 15; Maureen McGovern from 18 to 10; Jim Croce from 17 to 6 and Cliff & Ann Edwards from 16 to 5.

Female disc jockeys are finally gaining acceptance in modern radio. Most of them, however, are relegated to the all-night shows. The big American rock stations started the trend and now CKWS Kingston picks up the ball with "Rhonda". She's on the Giant 96 airwaves from 12.15 till 5AM.

Here's the current air lineup at CKOM Saskatoon: Peter Bell, Jack McLung, Wally Cameron, Michael Christie, and Tom Christian. Swing man is Darryl Davies.

Steve Woodruff reports in from his new Cariboo Broadcasting all-night show in B.C. CKCQ Quesnel, CKWL Williams Lake, CKBX Hundred Mile House thus have 24-hour radio for the first time. To start off the program Steve is using a simple "guess the three artists and if your letter is drawn you win \$100" contest. Station went with easily-identified artists for better mail response and received almost 300 entries in the first couple of weeks, probably quite good considering the potential audience. When money runs out, a switch will be made to albums and the "Mystery Phone Booth Contest." Steve calls out to an outdoor pay phone, giving location clues 15 minutes before. This is done close to midnight to maximize the number of people out and about. At the time of the call the exact location is aired, and if someone answers "I'm listening to the all-nighter" they win the LP jackpot. If no answer, Steve adds another record to the pile. Simple, but nutty enough to be fun on a brand new radio show.

Startling statistic out from the U.S.'s Country

Music Association. 25% more U.S. stations have adopted full-time country programming than at this time last year. This trend has also been felt in Canada over the last year with several stations going full-time country, e.g. CFOX Montreal, CJVI Victoria, CKPG Prince George to mention just a few of them. The CMA study also revealed that fully 50% of all U.S./Canadian radio stations have at least some country music, making it a more-programmed type of music than Top 40 is.

WWVA Wheeling West Virginia recently added a 16-track studio for recording its 38-year-old program "Jamboree U.S.A.". And now the studio has become a major income producer for the radio station. They charge \$60 per hour and have been swamped with recording activity of all types. Biggest item of interest has been the heavy use of the studio for producing jingles.

The CRTC has smiled on the Cree Indians in the Manitoba region around Cross Lake. The application for an AM station has been okayed; it'll be a CBC affiliate and use 75% Cree programming. Because of funding uncertainties and a CRTC desire to keep tabs on the station, the licence expires on December 31/74.

New midnight to 6 country jock at CHEX Peterborough is Pete Raymond.

Don't try to claim the new Anne Murray single "Send A Little Love My Way" as Canadian content, cause it isn't. Only the artist qualifies, but music, lyrics and production are all foreign content. Thus with 1 part out of 4 it can't be claimed. However, the flip was Canadian-written and thus that side qualifies.

SLAIGHT BUYS BELLMAN SHARES IN Q BDCSTG.

A story in RPM 14/7/73 referred to Allan Slaight's purchase of CHQM Vancouver and CKPG Prince George, which, if approved, would give the Toronto broadcaster radio interests in each of the top three Canadian markets. This story was based on incomplete information and we offer the following clarification.

The interest that Slaight's IWC Communications Ltd. has purchased is the holding of W.E. (Bill) Bellman in Q Broadcasting Ltd., a public company which owns CHQM AM & FM Vancouver, CKPG AM & TV Prince George, and Q Music Ltd., a background music company. Bill Bellman decided to dispose of his shares in Q Broadcasting, a company he founded in 1959, because the board of directors had demanded his resignation. Bellman was the largest shareholder in Q Broadcasting, owning 50% of the voting (common) shares and 35% of the listed A-shares.

Bellman has arranged with IWC Communications to sell this holding for \$1.64 million.

MCA/CKXL CAP DIAMOND CONTEST

The Neil Diamond contest, a joint effort by MCA Records and CKXL Calgary came to a happy, tearful end with the \$1000 diamond



going to Mrs. Debbie Dickey. The draw was made Monday morning, June 18th by CKXL's General Manager Tom McBride on the Donny Burn's show.

The contest, one of several put on by MCA, began June 4th and ran daily from 6AM to 12MN. Listeners were asked to phone on the hour and guess the hotel room in which Neil Diamond was supposedly being held. If they picked the right room they had a chance at the big diamond draw. According to CKXL Program Director, Bob Robertson, the contest was a success from the beginning. Over a period of two days the station completely overloaded one exchange in the city, shutting down several very important oil company switchboards until it reached a crisis point when the AGT asked the station to use extreme qualifiers to limit the amount of people calling in at one time.

The diamond was purchased from the local Birks outlet. Barry Ryman, western Canadian promo rep for MCA, coordinated the contest with CKXL.

However, since the other 50% of the shares are held by 5 Vancouver men, Bellman's holdings do not give Slaight absolute control. Slaight has offered to buy further shares that are available at the same per-share price, which could run up to \$4.05 million if IWC Communications acquired 100% of available shares. All proposed transfers are of course subject to CRTC approval.

With reference to present programming on the Vancouver and Prince George radio stations, Slaight expressed surprise at the change in June of the CKPG music format from pop to country. Though Slaight's other stations CFGM Toronto and CFOX Montreal play country music, he said "I have not held any discussions with any members of the present Q Broadcasting board regarding present programming or contemplated changes."

The future situation at Q Broadcasting will be interesting to watch. Though Slaight's company will be the largest shareholder, he won't have absolute control of the company, and like Bellman, could be upstaged by other members of the company. However, if he succeeds in buying additional voting shares beyond his 50% holding, this would give him more complete control of Q Broadcasting.

OTTAWA'S CKBY-FM FULL-TIME COUNTRY

CKBY, the FM sister of Ottawa's CKOY has gone full-time country as of July 3rd. Program director Ted Daigle has set about gathering voice clips from as many country people as possible.

Daigle is planning a month-long promotion with "Star Days" during which they will give away the complete record library of the star featured that day. They will also give away FM car radios, articles of clothing donated by the stars and anything else they can get their hands on.

A GUIDELINE TO HOW THE RPM 100 IS COMPILED

The RPM 100 chart is compiled weekly from national sales and radio airplay. In general, upper positions represent sales action while lower positions indicate airplay reports. We offer the following guide to help in chart interpretation.

A record in the top ten is showing up in all our national sales samples. A record from 11-30 is getting major market airplay on 35 to 75% of our major market sample stations and is showing up in not less than half of our sales reports. A record from 30-70 is either getting heavy breakout-market airplay, or is on 15 to 35% (initial penetration) of major-market stations. A record below 70 is getting early airplay (less than 15% of the major stations and less than 25% of the breakout stations).


