



## **Capitol/Hutton.....Canadiana**

It's not too difficult to envision a time, and not too distant, when there will be a meeting of minds by broadcasters and record people, from which will develop one goal — Canadianism. It will probably be a subtle development that could build to an uncontrollable desire to become a unique part of the world entertainment scene. One of the contributors could very well be Doug Hutton. He's a self admitted dreamer and a self-styled "media entrepreneur". His dream — a complete Canadiana suite, now a reality, which he tagged "Cantata Canada".

This hasn't been an overnight happening. On the contrary it has taken Hutton several years of blueprinting, fund raising, researching, writing, composing, rehearsing, recording, mixing, packaging, and . . . guts to turn his dream into reality.

"Cantata Canada" has been described as "a rock musical evolved nationally by writers from across the country, unified and energized by the performance of Privilege, the Canadian 'Jesus Christ Superstar' band, and scores of musicians from the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra."

The meat of the "Cantata" of course, is the use of twenty-four very significant subjects in Canadian history as selected by national historians. Hutton has brought the past into a contemporary mass through the eyes of some of Canada's foremost young contem-

## "CANTATA CANADA" A ROCK MUSICAL

In an unprecedented gesture of national endorsement, eleven key radio stations across the country will air a documentary centred around a new rock musical called "Cantata Canada", depicting the people places and events that have shaped this country's past and future.

John Small, Capitol Canada's National Promotion Manager, and Bob Rowe, the company's National Sales Manager, travelled coast to coast with customized presentations to the stations involved and were delighted with the receptions.

Each station was asked to present an hour-long documentary which would incorporate personal comments and listener forums with the "Cantata Canada" presentation.

Stations participating in the nation-wide premiere documentary special, slated for Sunday, September 9th, are CHUM/Toronto; CFRW/Winnipeg; CKOM/Saskatoon; CKCK/Regina; CKXL/Calgary; CHED/Edmonton; CKLG/Vancouver; CFRA/Ottawa; CKGM/Montreal; CJCH/Halifax and CJON/St. John's Newfoundland and CJON's two Newfoundland network affiliates.

Jerry Atkins, Chief of the CAB, indicated the "Cantata Canada" documentary, as produced by CHUM Ltd., will be made available to most of the associated stations for broadcast a week after the initial premiere runs of the special.

Arnold Gosewich, Capitol Canada President, noted: "Never before have we witnessed such a unified national commitment by the industry. It speaks extremely well of the radio programmers and their managements."

## HUMBLE PIE ROCK VARSITY JULY 12/73

A&M recording artists Humble Pie headlined the first in a series of music at Varsity concerts. The high energy music was best described by lead singer-guitarist Steve Marriott as "Fat Mother Bitchin' Rock and Roll".

The music was hard, heavy and loud but backed by a musical finesse that sets The Pie apart from its hard rock competitors.

The group was amply backed up on vocals by three talented ladies known as the Blackberries. Anybody who can sing along with the wattage output of Humble Pie deserve our plaudits and a lifetime supply of throat lozenges.

Humble Pie are one of the few bands left who still give the impression that they're having fun performing. That sense of fun is transmitted to the audience, who responded to the music after a couple of hours of good rock served up by Leslie West's new Band Wild West. They retain that driving sound of Mountain along with Leslie's fine guitar work.

Also on the bill was Toronto's own Fludd. They've come a long way and their music has a vitality that is equaled only by their energetic stage act.

## U. A. RELEASES MORTIFEE DECK

U.A. has culled the "Blueberries" cut from "The Ecstasy of Rita Joe" album for release as a single. The deck features Ann Mortifee who composed the music for the "Rita Joe" album.

United Artists recently acquired the Canadian rights to the album, a production from the Vancouver-based Kerygma Record Company.

Negotiations for the deal were firmed by Stan Kulin, president of U.A. (Canada) and Rodney Booth of Kerygma.

The album has already been released in British Columbia, where it has sold in excess of 5000 copies and has received exceptional notices from reviewers throughout the province.

"Rita Joe" is the story of an Indian girl in a large Canadian city and the problems she and the city encounter attempting to adjust to one another. The original stage play played to good notices and in Washington, D.C. was acclaimed as an unqualified hit. Critics tagged it "A perfect and probably indelible

moment of theatre" and "One of the most potent evenings I have spent in a theatre in months." The play was put together for the Vancouver Playhouse Theatre Company in 1967 by George Ryga. In 1969 it was honoured as being the first English language performance in Canada's National Arts Centre in Ottawa. Two years more and it was adapted as a Ballet by the Royal Winnipeg Ballet who have featured the Ballet on their international tours for the past two years. Keeping the two year success pattern active, 1973 was the year of the "Rita Joe" wax happening. Ryga and Ann Mortifee teamed up with Rodney Booth of Kerygma Records to bring it all together. Chief Dan George was featured on the album as the father of Rita Joe, one which he was familiar with having this same role in the stage play and the Ballet score. Paul Horn, well known west coast flautist (who releases on the Epic label) was caught up in the excitement and along with Ann and a group of young Vancouver musicians were able to capture the excitement of "Rita Joe" on record. CBC regulars Peter Haworth and John Avison also figured in the musical effort put forward in the album taping.

## TOM RUSH RIVERBOAT JULY 10/73

Columbia recording artist Tom Rush returned to Toronto for a week at the Riverboat. Whether in a large hall, or in a small club, Rush has a command of a stage that he has cultivated successfully over his many years of performing.

He was unaccompanied, which added to the intimate feeling that can be generated in a club atmosphere. Accompanying himself on acoustic guitar, Rush ran through many of his standard selections, such as "Who do You Love" and "No Regrets-Rockport Sunday", as well as some new selections added to his repertoire, such as "Ladies Love Outlaws". Unfortunately absent was his usual, beautiful rendition of Murray McLauchlan's "Child Song". Tom Rush has an ability to take the music of others and make it sound as if it were his. Though he now writes much of his own material he is best known for performing the songs of other writers.

Like a certain soft drink, which shall remain nameless and has the taste you never seem to get tired of, Tom Rush has the sound you never get tired of. - Peter Taylor

# Canada's growing nationalism

Something went wrong in 1967. Canada, a country that had all but given itself away to foreign interests suddenly started to become nationalistic.

Since that time there has been a growing awareness within. Foreign takeovers and foreign control are now a major issue in

most areas of business, finance and administration. Though the result of this growing nationalism is good for the morale of Canada, but in the transition, the process will effect many industries.

Presently there is concern about foreign ownership of advertising agencies and along with it, a concern that commercials aired in Canada are foreign produced. Figures quoted indicate that about 68% of the commercials aired in Canada are produced entirely in Canada. That leaves only 32% (or one-third)

What becomes very obvious from all this is that now is the time for radio and television licence holders to get into the commercial production business. They have all the facilities and most of the talent to create fine Canadian commercials. Their own people are quite capable of assuming the task of assuring that Canadian commercials are truly Canadian and reflect Canada to the listener

## NILSSON COULD BE TRENDSETTER

At a time when virtually everyone is looking for a new trend, RCA's Harry Nilsson could be front and centre with a sound that not only bridges the generation gap (an overused expression) but presents a package of nostalgia (also overused) that is REALLY nostalgia.

Album title is "A Little Touch Of Schmilsson In The Night" (RCA APL1-0097). What makes the album unique is the fact that Nilsson, one of today's most successful folk/rock (for want of a better description) writer/performers, has found "peace" with some of the ballads of the 20s. To add credibility to his find, Nilsson harnessed the talents of Gordon Jenkins to arrange the music and conduct what must be the finest aggregations of British musicians available. From the opening few bars, one is reminded of that old Jenkins magic with "Manhattan Towers" — and then the album gets better. "Lazy Moon", "For Me And My Gal", "It Had To Be You", "Always", "Makin' Whoopee", "You Made Me Love You" . . . and then you're ready for side two.

Music critics have been quick to latch onto the Nilsson set and, although approach with caution, would appear to be encouraged by the fact that what he has done is acceptable to a wider age group.

The Nilsson/Jenkins team will have much success with this set because they haven't overdressed the "platinum" oldies. It's a big lush sound, as only Jenkins could create - all brought into proper perspective with a today's voice equipped with a vocal understanding of the past.

It wouldn't be too surprising to learn that of the 68% mentioned above, a great share of it is already being produced by Canadian radio and television stations. If they started to do this on a full time basis, they would probably find that the figure would move up significantly. Advertising is their business, and the suggested ruling is just a guarantee that more money can be realized by the licence holders.

It's safe to assume now that talent is available in Canada — but perhaps we lack the behind-the-scenes creative people to take advantage of this available talent.

As years go by, the industry will find out that the CRTC's 30% AM radio ruling was designed to return a profit to the broadcaster. It is just a matter of time before the broadcaster will want the talent that the ruling is creating.

Keeping a careful check on commercials and where they are produced, we have found that some of the best commercials being aired in Canada were produced in Canada.

In the years to come, we'll probably find that all we needed was the faith in our own ability. If we can broadcast and be creative, we can look to the people who have made broadcasting in Canada a viable industry, to create commercial productions in Canada.

In case someone is worried that the commercial producers will be affected by broadcasters entering commercial production, if the ruling comes into being, I would think that the one third that is being imported would probably constitute half of the dollar value. Who says we aren't equal to the task?

## GREAT CONCENTRATES ON COMMODORE IMAGE

The Vancouver-based Great Productions have chalked up a successful round of events aimed at establishing the Commodore Ballroom as a major Vancouver showcase of talent. Called in to help kick off the move was the popular Redbone group. They followed their June 27-28 Vancouver dates with a June 29th engagement at the Memorial Arena in Victoria. The west coast has been fair game for this group who gained a large sized following with their first appearance in the area when they worked a date at the Strawberry Mountain Fair, booked by Great's president Roger Schiffer. Their second album was titled "Potlatch" in honour of the B.C. Indian festivities which were thrown in their honour. Schiffer later produced a concert with Redbone and Faces at the Agrodome and again last year when he booked them into Infinity Fair at the PNE Coliseum.

Flash Cadillac and The Continental Kids have a go at the Commodore Aug. 10 and 11th. Prior to their Vancouver date they will appear in Kamloops (Aug. 3), Prince George (4), Nanaimo (8) and in Victoria (9). This group first appeared in Vancouver at Gassy Jack's Place and became one of the most popular club acts to play the city.

## PRE-RELEASE ACTION FOR STEVENS ALBUM

A&M Records, with a teasing campaign of promotion for the new Cat Stevens album "Foreigner", has created one of the most unusual pre-release demands for an album yet seen in the record industry. Though a Beatles album or product from other major artists of the day can stimulate similar pre-release sales, the Cat Stevens album is unique because it created enough action to warrant an RPM chart listing one full month before

## CONLON — NEW RPM CONTRIBUTING EDITOR

Patrick Conlon joins RPM as a Contributing Editor this week.

Heard across the country as a syndicated pop music critic for CBC radio, Conlon has also contributed in-depth interviews with music personalities to the network and to various magazines. In addition he's an experienced television writer, with seven produced half-hour TV plays to his credit.

Born into a broadcasting family — father Ned is a popular Montreal radio and TV personality — Patrick started his professional life as an actor and was featured in half a dozen films and several TV and stage productions before turning full-time to writing. He's also currently Audio Editor of Canadian Stereo Guide, which links his love for music to the machines that make it.

RPM's new Contributing Editor will begin with a regular column called "Conlon's Corner". Conlon acknowledges he owes a debt for the title to his father, who used it in the early days of his own successful broadcasting career. The column has no fixed direction; in fact, it's intended to be a free-for-all exploration of Canadian music and the people who ignite it.

Cause of the delay in release is reported to be numerous changes in artwork requested by Cat Stevens himself, who has total artistic control. The delay forced A&M to move the album from its original "early June" release to "late June" and finally "early July". Even the company itself was caught in the delay, as certain advertising on TV and in the music consumer magazines was placed ahead of time, and exposed the album (though it was still unavailable). RPM's research reports at the retail level showed heavy consumer demand, as customers requested the album which they had been reading and hearing about. Further reports at the wholesaler level showed substantial orders had already been placed with A&M, and the record qualified for a chart position. However by this time the release date had once again been adjusted (to a "late July" timetable).

Interest in the Stevens album was also kept at a fever pitch by his single "The Hurt" which is airing on numerous radio stations. With the summer slump meaning that record sales are generally quite listless, the "Foreigner" album (even though just released) has enough sales and pre-orders recorded to move it from 48 to 24 on this week's RPM 100 albums.

## HAPPY HOOKER FALL CONCERT TOUR

Xaviera Hollander, the controversial authoress of the Happy Hooker, has signed an exclusive agreement with Sheldon Safran to promote her first Canadian concert tour, which will utilize the talents of 30 top musicians this fall.

Shel Safran said that Ms. Hollander's concert tour will feature "a very contemporary today show". She is already established firmly as a leading lecture attraction. Concert dates will be announced shortly.

Ms. Hollander's album, "XAVIERA", on GRT Records, has been charted at several AM Top 40 stations on the strength of local sales. It is not receiving any airplay as yet.

## K-TEL LISTED ON TORONTO STOCK EXCHANGE

K-Tel International Incorporated of Minneapolis is now listed on the Toronto Stock Exchange and has been assigned the symbol KTL. Philip Kieves, K-Tel president, purchased 100 shares of K-Tel marking the company's initial trade on the ticker tape. Toronto Stock Exchange officials welcomed Kieves and other company officers to the trading floor in a brief ceremony.

K-Tel listed 4,003,142 shares of common stock (also traded on the American Stock Exchange). There are more than 1200 shareholders in the U.S. and Canada. The nine-month sales tally ending March 31 totalled \$37.6 million, with net income being \$4 million, or about \$1 per share. Recent prices of K-Tel have been in the \$7. area on its new Toronto Stock Exchange listing.

K-Tel began operations in Winnipeg in 1962 and became publicly-held in December 1971. The company merchandises personal, household and leisure time products through extensive TV campaigns and brought a new approach to the record business by marketing albums in the same successful way used for kitchen knives and other K-Tel products. K-Tel products are sold through over 30,000 independent drug, variety, supermarket and department stores. Other interests include distribution of motion pictures and production of wines.

The corporate headquarters are in Minneapolis with the international executive offices located in Winnipeg. Sales offices for Canada are located in Winnipeg and Montreal.

The album is being extensively promoted on taxi cards, billboards and transit advertising media. GRT has also bought spots on CITY-TV's Baby Blue Movie Program, marking the first time that the record industry has used this prime viewing program to promote album sales.

The Happy Hooker is presently engaged in personal appearances at record stores to sign autographs.

# Guess who's coming to dinner?

## Stanley Kramer

and

## Anne Murray,

Movie Director and Producer Stanley Kramer looks a little like his late best friend Spencer Tracy. He even talks like his late best friend Spencer Tracy, which is to say in the manner of a friendly/gruff favourite uncle. And although Kramer shrinks from the compari-


son, it follows naturally from the deep mutual affection that evolved through their four films together and that ended with Tracy's death weeks after the finish of Kramer's "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner."

Kramer was in Toronto recently to talk about "Oklahoma Crude", his new film for Columbia which stars George C. Scott and Faye Dunaway and which features Anne Murray singing the running love ballad. The score is by Henry Mancini and the lyrics for Murray's song were written by Hal David, who's usually teamed with Burt Bacharach. Over a steak, a timid salad and a bottle of Good Red, Kramer and I spoke of making "Oklahoma Crude" and hiring Anne Murray for a

job he'd originally imagined for a man: "I thought we were going to use someone else for the love ballad. In fact — and Mancini had agreed — I thought we were going to use a man. I mean, wouldn't it make more sense for the character Dunaway plays to be listening to a male singer?" Dunaway is cast in the film as a determined oil driller, manning (womaning?) a lone derrick in the early days of the big Oklahoma strikes; she has no use for anyone else in the human race, including her prodigal father (John Mills) and an itinerant oil worker (George C. Scott). The ballad, "Send a Little Love My Way", is the only chink in a suit of liberated armour. It was Mancini who first altered Kramer's thinking and suggested a girl be hired to sing his song precisely because it would be unexpected.

Several voices were considered and rejected. Anne Murray? "Well," said Kramer, "I wasn't exactly one of her fans. I mean I could hear 'Snowbird' and 'What About Me' maybe three times and that would be all I'd want to hear from Anne Murray." But Mancini pushed Murray: he persuaded a reluctant Kramer that her voice was exactly what the song (and the film) needed.

Now Kramer's a convert to Anne Murrayism:

"She has a rich, true voice that reminds me of some of the best early jazz singers. I was so happy with her work on this song that I took her to the Tulsa opening of the film. She's wonderful, she really is. She's interesting and dynamic and in Tulsa she did a terrific job of helping us promote the film."

In fairness to Murray she didn't exactly do a Cape Breton jig when the song was presented to her. "I didn't know what to think," she says. "The song wasn't in my bag. But then I saw the film and realized it plays a big role." She then recorded the version used in the film for Mancini in Hollywood and Capitol subsequently released a single, produced by Brian Ahern at Eastern in Toronto. Murray isn't heard on the original soundtrack recording: Mancini's an RCA artist and Capitol wouldn't permit a guest shot by her on his album. But she is heard, through an antique Victrola, at several times in the film and happily erases any doubts about her expertise with the ballad.

Kramer thinks Murray was wise to accept the song and predicts it will be a hit for her, especially with Mancini and David as a supporting cast. Moreover he's been heard to mutter (although not at our meeting) that he'd like to see Murray on the screen in an acting role sometime in the future.

Music has always been important to a Kramer film. Remember the theme from "High Noon" and "Waltzing Matilda" from "On the Beach"? Kramer commissioned "The Glory of Love" in its resurrected version especially for Tracy and Hepburn in "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner". But he's the first to admit he'd rather trust the music in his films to someone else and was ultimately content to bow to Mancini's judgment in the selection of Anne Murray.



## DAVID CLAYTON THOMAS WAS BRILLIANT . . . BUT

.... the CBC-TV production (three half hour shows) fell far short of bringing the best out of one of the country's most valuable entertainers. One problem with CBC producers, and it would appear to be inherited, is their ability to overdress that which demands only a simple frock. Surround Thomas with a large number of musicians was probably a nice gesture and the jam session had some merit but . . . . those who tuned in to see David Clayton Thomas wanted just that - DCT in concert. A trip into nostalgia-land, back to the days of "Walk That Walk" and "Brainwashed" and right up to date - "Spinning Wheel", and one of the first Canadian entertainers to have an explosive effect on the world entertainment scene.

David Clayton Thomas is a star, and with a valuable property such as this, more effort, not expense should be put forward in showcasing this already developed image. DCT '73 was an accidental trip into nostalgia-land - the CBC-TV productions of "Music Hop" of several years ago.

Thomas has just signed a management agreement with Norman Weiss of New York -- one of the most powerful behind-the-scenes men in the business. On the heels of this signing came a reported verbal agreement with Allan Blye for a twenty-six week television series, to be produced by Blye, written by Chris Beard and to be produced in Canada -- possibly through CBC facilities. It has also been reported that CBS is interested in running this series with the CBC having full Canadian rights plus 15% of the world action. It's interesting to note that Thomas just recently made public a multi-million dollar action involving CBS. Writs have also been issued against Clive Davis, former president of the CBS Record Group, Columbia Records and April Blackwood, Columbia's publishing arm. Prior to the Davis/CBS fiasco Thomas was apparently successful in receiving a settlement involving more than \$51,000 from his former group, Blood, Sweat & Tears, of which he held a one-ninth interest.

## CANADIAN TOUR FOR PYTHON — SMASHING

The recent invasion of Canada by Britain's Monty Python crew has been tagged "a smashing success". Much of this success was due to the intensive and imaginative promotion set up by Quality Records from coast to coast.

One of the first things they saw on their arrival in Toronto (June 2) was a colourfully decorated double-decker bus - stolen, borrowed or rented by Quality's Bob Morten and Joe Owens. Their trip into Toronto from the International Airport caused one Ontario Provincial Policeman to question their reasons - for being on the highway. Making it into Toronto they did a tour of the "massage strip" where they saw Monty Python posters and streamers decorating Sam's and A&A's. Sunday, a day of quiet in Toronto, was disturbed by a press brunch for the Englishmen at the Toronto Dominion Centre. By this time all three shows at the St. Lawrence were posted as "sold out". After their first show, Quality and the Picadilly Tube management hosted an after-show reception where they were introduced to a new Canadian group, Liverpool, as well as Mel Shaw and the Stampeders. Quality's Ontario promo rep, Gene Lew, took the group under his wing and crashed CHUM-FM where several spots were cut, plugging their show as well as laying down an interview with newsman Larry Wilson. While in Toronto, Python member John Cleese appeared on Elwood Glover's "Luncheon Date" (CBC-TV).

Now a millionaire several times over, owner of a seventeen room mansion in Hollywood as well as having his own apartment in New York City, Thomas has become involved in several endeavours allied with the music industry. One of these is the formation of his own publishing house, Lady Casey Music Inc. which publishes Thomas originals on his new RCA album, "Harmony Junction" (APL-0173).

the British comics. Quality's Quebec people, Nicolle Dufour and Andree Pelletier met the group at the airport with promoter Sam Gesser. Excellent coverage was afforded the group by Montreal Gazette's Jack Kapion and heavy exposure on CHOM and the CBC's "Sound Unlikely" added to the success of the two Montreal shows.

Winnipeg was another treat for the Python group. Chuck Porter, Quality's mid-west promotion rep, met the entourage at the airport along with a CBC camera crew who taped their arrival for the late-nite news report. The CBC also hosted and taped a press reception at the Fort Gary Hotel. Members of the cast appeared on CBC's comedy program T.G.I.F. (Thank Goodness It's Friday) which is hosted by Glenn Marsh. The show will be aired late August. Their sellout performance at the 'Peg's Centennial Hall was followed by a cocktail party hosted by Quality and which drew a large gathering from the press, radio and retailer community. Many of the local dealers had lent their windows to displaying Python's new Charisma album, "Monty Python's Previous Record" (CAS 1063).

CKLG personalities and Quality's Ray Ramsay turned up at Vancouver's Airport with a large cage. The Python bunch were put into the cage for press photos that later appeared in both the city's dailies. The Vancouver effort was one of the most complete with interviews on CKLG, CKNW, CJOR, CHAN, CBC Radio and CHAN-TV. Here also they played to packed houses receiving standing ovations each night.

With only four acts signed, Herschorn will concentrate on developing a "star system" around these recording units. His most successful signing is Tom Middleton who has made excellent gains on the RPM 100 Singles chart with his Columbia deck, "It Wouldn't Have Made Any Difference".

On a recent trip to Toronto Herschorn was tuned in to a Windsor gal name of Alexis, resulting in an immediate signing. The session is being produced by Steve Douglas who has seen duties as A&R man with Capitol Inc. and Mercury and has produced the Lettermen, Jody Miller, Glen Campbell among others. He was brought into the music production scene through his association

with Phil Spector, having acted as studio musician on many of Spector's hit productions. Recording dates for the session have been set for Can-Base Studios in Vancouver as well as a Los Angeles studio. Herschorn has expanded his operation to include management - with Alexis as his first signing.

Herschorn has also signed Jayson Hoover to a recording contract with Can-Base. Hoover is a well-known west coast performer who caught national attention with his New Syndrome and MCA single releases: "King Size", "We Were Happy", and "Freedom Train".

Hoover, a native of Edmonton and a cousin of the late Jimi Hendrix, will be produced at Can-Base Studios by Mike Fliker, who also produced the Middleton single.



Initial album release, "Teen Lives" by Teen Angel and The Rockin' Rebels, has already chalked up sales of several thousand. The Vancouver-based original greaser group are being booked by Barry Samuels and have bookings throughout Northern British Columbia as well as dates in Regina, Seattle and Edmonton.

currently playing the Esquire Hotel in St. Catharines and will be sharing the bill with Buck Owens in Buffalo in September.

A fiddle player from the age of thirteen, James switched to lead and bass and still does - as easily as he moves from country to contemporary music. He has appeared on television and radio shows on both sides of the border including the WWVA Jamboree and the "Ron McLeod Show" (CHCH-TV) and on several Jamborees in Canada and the U.S.

Previous releases included "Savannah" and "Love and Joy".

porary poets.

Says Hutton: "The story of Canada happens to be interesting and important to our identity. If by giving Canada to Canadians with this kind of impact, we can make some contribution to our national self-confidence, all this time and effort will be entirely justified. We're no longer the underdog; there are a lot of great things happening here."

Hutton has proved his belief in his project. He persuaded four private investors to come up with financing of \$25,000. He convinced them not to be "just observers" but to become emotionally involved and not to regard their investment as a nationalistic write-off.

His next chore was to harness the talents of Canadian songwriters for the putting together of the twenty-four happenings that figured in the growth of this nation. It wasn't too difficult a task — the CRTC regulations were responsible for bringing the Canadian songwriting craft front and centre and it was just a matter of plucking the ripest and most creative from the vine. Putting all this talent into musical form then became the job of Privilege, the group who arranged and performed the Western Canadian premiere of "Jesus Christ Superstar".

Hutton taped his first "Cantata" album at Studio 3 Productions in Vancouver in July and August of 1972. A meeting with Tommy Banks, president of the Edmonton-based Century II recording complex assured Hutton of yet another supporter. Banks later noted: "Cantata Canada is much more than this first album. It's an idea — a dream, really — that encompasses every conceivable medium of communication. It's all of the obvious things, an effort to help bring about an awareness on the part of Canadians of their proud past, an enormously enjoyable rail along which to drive the idea that we do have an interesting, exciting history. But in this form, it's mainly one thing — it's good music. Very good Canadian music about Canadian things and Canadian people. It's about every one of us, where we come from, and where we're going."

The record was set for distribution and Banks lent a hand in the final mix. The Hutton/Banks team then decided to try the public on for size, and previewed the suite at a United Fund Benefit in Edmonton. Privilege joined the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra for what turned out to be an eye-opening, audience stomping standing ovation. Hutton's dream became very noisy and much more exciting.

Capitol Canada has become personally involved through its president, Arnold Gosewich, who was introduced to the "Cantata" during RPM's C5 meeting in Vancouver.

It is through Gosewich that Capitol has mustered all its nationalistic feelings into backing this project with the greatest financial and promotional muscle in the company's history.

Hutton has returned to his dream world once again — television — film — theatre — museum audiovisual displays and maybe even videotapes for the nation's schools — as a history turn-on.




**CHOPIN RECITAL**

Maurizio Pollini - Pianist

HMV ASD 2577

This British import features the brilliant young Italian pianist Maurizio Pollini in an interesting recital of shorter works by Chopin. The programme opens with the Polonaise No. 5 in F sharp minor Op. 44 and closes with the popular Polonaise No. 6



in Ab Op. 53 which became the rage during the circulation of "Song to Remember" many years ago. Two nocturnes from Op. 27 and two from Op. 15 are exquisitely played, and the Ballade No. 1 in G minor Op. 23 receives a mighty performance. Pollini must surely rank as one of the greatest interpreters of Chopin alive today.

**AN EVENING AT THE PROMS**

Joan Hammond - Soprano; Shura Cherkassky - pianist  
Sir Malcolm Sargent conducting the BBC Symphony Orchestra

Although the London Proms were begun by Sir Henry Wood, they reached the apex of their popularity under the colourful direction of the late Sir Malcolm Sargent. This charming memento contains a lovely performance sung in English of Tatiana's Letter Scene from Tchaikovsky's "Eugene Onegin". The soloist is the popular Australian soprano, Joan Hammond. Pianist Shura Cherkassky turns in a glittering performance of the Scherzo from the Concerto Symphonique No. 4 by Litoff. Purely orchestral works include Sullivan's Overture "Di Ballo", Chabrier's Fete Polonaise and Elgar's Pomp and Circumstance March No. 1. All that is lacking is a speech from Sargent and the yowling of the "Promenaders".

This two record set is part of a series which will cover all the major works for piano by Johann Sebastian Bach performed by the late Walter Gieseking. The recordings are mono only and evidently originate from broadcast tapes. Gieseking was well represented in commercial catalogues playing the music of Debussy, Ravel, Beethoven and Mozart, but there were few examples of his Bach playing. The performances are deft and fleet fingered, with an amazing control of tone from piano to forte. Some may find his curious tendency to rush some fast movements and to be skittish in certain others a distraction, however, it is unmistakably masterful playing and the recorded sound is adequate.




The late Sir Malcolm Sargent appeared many times on records throughout his career as conductor in performances of Beethoven Concertos backing such artists as Schnabel, Mark Hambourg, Benno Moiseiwitsch and Oistrakh. But he recorded surprisingly few Beethoven Symphonies. It is therefore satisfying to have this fresh and vital performance available in excellent stereo sound, done just before his untimely death at the peak of his career. Beecham's Royal Philharmonic Orchestra play with great tonal beauty and respond beautifully to Sargent's inspired direction. One of the best Eroica's around.

**BAX** Piano Sonata No. 3 in G sharp minor

**LYRITA** RCS 12

This disc from the British firm of Lyrita is one of four devoted to the piano music of the late Sir Arnold Bax who preceded Sir Arthur Bliss as Master of the Queen's music. Each of the four discs contains one of the four Piano Sonatas - massive works of great complexity both from the performer's and the listener's standpoint. The Sonata No. 3 in G sharp minor was published in



1929 and is in three movements and Iris Loveridge essays it with the devotion of a true disciple. Side two contains a group of shorter works, the most significant being a dark and louring piece called "Winter Waters" and a delightfully simple "Lullaby". The discs are available by writing to Lyrita Recorded Editions, Burnham, Buckinghamshire, England.

**GRIEG** Piano Concerto in A minor Op. 16

Eileen Joyce - Pianist

The Royal Danish Orchestra conducted by John Frandsen

This stereo re-issue serves as a rather sad reminder of one of the musical world's most gracious and colourful personalities. Eileen Joyce was born in Tasmania of Spanish and Scottish parents and made a sensational debut in 1930 in London, England playing the Prokofiev Concerto No. 3 under Sir Henry Wood at a promenade concert. Her studies under Teichmuler, Matthay and Schnabel paved a secure way for a brilliant career which lasted twenty-five years and placed her among the world's greatest pianists. Misguided by an unscrupulous manager, she unceremoniously terminated her career in the middle of a concert tour in the early 1960's and except for a single concert for a charity in 1967, has not played since. This recording, done shortly before her retirement gives ample evidence of her sure-fingered brilliance and musicality. The Royal Danish Orchestra gives able support with special eloquence from the horn section. Grieg's Notturno in C Op. 54 No. 4 and Melodie Op. 47 No. 3 make a charming conclusion to the disc.

## CRTC explains radio trends

Radio people who ask the question "In just what direction is the CRTC going?" will be interested in the just-released annual report ('72-73) of the Canadian Radio-Television Commission. This invaluable inch-thick volume recaps all the work the CRTC accom-

plished in the last year, including a detailed listing of all the decisions on applications. But the interesting reading comes at the beginning, when the CRTC waxes eloquent and gives a "state of the union" type report on the major trends of the year.

A careful reading of the report gives you an idea of how the CRTC sees radio today. A little interpretation, and bingo! — you can almost read their minds as to what they don't like, and what they'd like to hear more of on Canadian radio. We present the following excerpts for your perusal.

*The Commission has noted a certain consistency in the "sound" of many private AM radio stations; this has developed because*

### CKY WINNIPEG FUELS PROMO MACHINE

Competition in the Winnipeg market seemed to reach a new peak during the recently-concluded BBM Summer Ratings. One contributor to the excitement was CKY, who had four major pushes going at once.

CKY had as one of its prizes four jukeboxes filled with 100 CKY Hits. Listeners tried to match the random number that was aired by placing a guess on any selection numbered from 1 to 100.

The station's "Superstar Contest" has now advanced to contest no. 4, which involves a 1973 Oldsmobile Convertible. Airstaffers call out hourly, asking listeners to name the "Superstar of the Hour", which could be any one of 14 records airing in the hour.

A weekend programming tactic CKY employed was to run Charlie Tuna's radio documentaries. "Back Seat of Your Radio" hit CKY airwaves, followed the next weekend by "Folk and Rock & Roll".

All summer long the station is giving away "CKY Beach Packs." These consist of towels, suntan lotion, albums, soft drinks, beach balls, T-shirts and other prizes, given away on simple qualifiers.

stations increasingly draw from common news services and selections of recorded music for much of their day-to-day programming. These stations are distinguishable largely by the role they play in enhancing a local sense of community, through the provision of essential information and the development of local personalities.

AM radio's emphasis on the constant updating of news and other information fulfills a "surveillance" function, providing a "foreground" service that at certain times during the day demands listener attention. It extends the information service of news, sports, weather forecasts, and promotion of upcoming entertainment events, to encompass a wide range of social, political, cultural, consumer, and recreational informational needs in its particular community within the context of a variety of musical formats.

There is, however, a trend in some large centers for AM stations to establish specialized formats, either in music or talk, sports or entertainment programming. There has also been, in the past year, a marked interest in nostalgic material: recordings of early radio variety, comedy, and drama; and syndicated historical documentaries on the growth and development of individual artists or music styles.

*The role of on-the-air personnel is becoming increasingly that of an entertainer, a "personality" rather than a simple "disc jockey."*

### CBC EXPANDS FRENCH AM NETWORK IN WEST

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has received the green light to further expand its French AM radio network in Canada's western provinces. The Canadian Radio-Television Commission has approved its purchase of CFNS Saskatoon and the split-frequency station CFRG/CFGR Gravelbourg. The CRTC decision came just three months after a similar ruling which transferred CKSB Winnipeg from private owners to the CBC.

The additional growth in French radio programming in the west is making several adjustments necessary in the CBC hierarchy. A new French program production centre is to be set up in Regina, where facilities already exist for English radio & television broadcasting. As a consequence of having the Saskatoon and Gravelbourg stations programmed from the new Regina centre, the CRTC ordered the CBC to maintain in each of the two centres, one full-time programming employee.

*People are listening more to what is being broadcast between the music, and stations are tailoring their programming material to actual audience needs at various times throughout the broadcast day.*

Open-line programming continues to be an expanding radio format. In Montreal, seven private AM stations broadcast just over 91 hours each week, of which 40 hours came from a single station. On the west coast, where this talk format has been employed for a number of years, broadcasters are making more extensive use of telephone-discussion shows. In May 1971 four Vancouver stations provided 120 hours of talk shows each week; a year later that total had risen to 151 hours. One station contributed well over half of that amount.

*The range of themes treated in open-line programming broadened this year. Most noticeable was an imported US-developed idea, the "sex" open-line show. A number of Canadian stations actually introduced portions of these syndicated tapes into their own programs.*

Both CBC English and French radio networks made a more limited use of talk-show programming, and more selective criteria apply to the public network than to most private radio stations. The Corporation's open-line talk shows are tightly produced programs; usually there is a single theme for each program which is clearly introduced before calls are accepted. Listeners are encouraged to offer further information or to ask relevant questions, rather than to volunteer uninformed opinion.

In 1972, a new AM radio station, CJVB in Vancouver, began broadcasting in more than a dozen languages, joining stations in Toronto and Montreal specially licensed for this purpose. Partly as a result of this new station, AM radio broadcasting in languages other than French or English expanded from 232

The Programmers MAJOR MARKET CHART ADDITIONS

Chartbuster of the week: Dawn. "Sweet Gypsy Rose" was charted by CJBK, CKOM, CKRC and CFGO this week, which adds additional strength to last week's tally of CKOC and CKLG.

Diana Ross, Wings, and Donny Osmond are all hitting fast, though it's a little early yet to call them full-fledged hits. Diana Ross has been charted by CKLW, CKRC and CFGO this week (CKXL and CKOC in previous issue). Wings are looking good with new charts this time around from CKLW, CFRW and CHED, (previous charts were at CFGO, CKRC, CJME and CKOM). And Donny Osmond gets a chart number this week from CJME, CKLG and CFGO (previous chart stations were CKLW and CKOC). Stations are split just about equally on "Million To One" and "Young Love" with the occasional programmer scheduling them both.

Mushrooming forth a little stronger every week is the Pink Floyd record. It was charted this week by CKGM and CKOC. Over the last two months, the following stations have also given it chart listings: CKXL, CFRW, CJME, CKRC, CKLG, CFGO and CKOM which is quite an impressive count. If they had all got on the single simultaneously it would have been a national sensation, but action is spread out by the unfamiliarity of the band on AM radio. Even though they've not had a previous single hit, don't forget the album has been a Top Five seller for almost half a year now.

Strongest Canadians in terms of chart performances this week are Copper Penny and Incredible Bongo Band. Copper Penny charted at CKOC and Radiomutuel (CKGM last week). And the new version of the "Bongo Rock" oldie was given a chart berth at CFRW this week (previous track record includes CFGO, CJBK, CKOM, CKLW and CKOC charts).

Charlie Daniels is selling in areas that he gets airplay. CFGO and CFRW put him on chart this week (previous charts had come from CJBK, CKLW and CJME).

**The Programmers** BREAKOUT MARKET ADDITIONS

This section of The Programmers recaps the new music added to the two-station markets of Canada. These programmers all operate in a competitive market situation, yet have shown that they can often "pick" a hit before the major markets are aware of it.

Four records blasted into the two-station markets this week. Each song gained four additional radio stations, namely the singles from Dawn, Donny Osmond, Wings and Diana Ross. Dawn is now on virtually 100% of stations with CHNL, CKRD, CHEC and CJIC all adding it; previous Dawn stations were VOCM, CKPT, CFJC and CJOC. Donny Osmond is hot in the second week of release with CFJC, CHEC, CKWS and VOCM all jumping on (CJIC from last week's RPM). Wings are likewise looking good in their second week, gaining CKPT, CKLC, CHEC and VOCM this week (CKRD last week). And Diana Ross is now out in Canada; in its first week here CKPT, CHSJ, CHEC and CKWS added added to programming.

Aside from the Dawn, Osmond, Wings and Diana Ross biggies described above, we have

Helen Reddy and Cat Stevens making initial action on their new releases. Helen Reddy onto CHNL, CHEC and CKWS this week (CFJC from last week). And Cat Stevens was added to playlist at CFJC, CKLC and VOCM (first week of release in the breakout markets, though some majors had it earlier).

Charlie Rich can't be stopped. Some stations have aired him for six months and yet the record still keeps gaining more stations; like a steamroller it is crushing everything in its path. This week, three more stations added it, namely CKLC, CFBC and VOCM.

Best new Canadian music: Copper Penny and Incredible Bongo Band. Copper Penny scored this week at CKLC and VOCM; their previous airplay stations were CHSJ, CHEX, CKPT, CHEC and CJOC. Incredible Bongo Band added this week by CKPT and CHEC (previous stations were CHNL, CKLC and CFJC).

Early acceptance coming in for Mickey Newbury, David Gates, Chicago and Stealers Wheel. Mickey Newbury onto CFJC and CHSJ in its first week. David Gates onto CFJC and CHSJ in a similar first-week performance. Chicago added by CKRD this week with CHNL, CKLC and CKPT from last week. And Stealers Wheel grabbed CJIC and CKLC in its first week of regular release.

Three other Canadians to consider are Les Emmerson, Skipper, and Gary & Dave. Les Emmerson added at CHEC and VOCM this week, with CKLC and CKPT from last issue. Skipper's "Down On The Flat Rock" added by CHNL this week, with CKRD and CHEC counted in earlier weeks. And Gary & Dave was added at CHNL this week (previous reports showed CJIC, CFJC and CHSJ).

**The Programmers TRIBAL DRUM**

Interesting scene going down these days in Quebec City. Radio station CFOM, the only English radio station there, is making all the excitement. There is a CBC French station plus 3 private French stations (one with FM as well as CFLS in neighbouring Levis (also French). However, the area was considered to have too few English-speaking residents to support a station, and CFOM almost went off the air a few years back. Through a CBC affiliation and a shoestring budget they managed to survive until three months ago

when Bob Dawson was brought in as program director. The new format is Top 40. Since the CRTC's clampdown on English records on French radio, there are many French listeners looking for contemporary music on the dial, and CFOM went out of its way to accommodate them. All talk is over intros and since it is English-only, adlibs are kept very brief. The only French on the station is in the occasional commercial and on their promo T-shirts which say "CFOM—Mon Nouveau Chum." Music director is Zenie Pawlow, and the music list is 45 songs (including Canadian) of which seven are on super-heavy rotation. Gold content is near 50% during the day and around 35% at night. So far CFOM's new Top 40 format has created an incredible amount of excitement in the market. Station used research from CKGM Montreal and questionnaire from Laval University students to assist in setting up programming goals.

Mike Godin, music programmer at CFCF Montreal has returned to the airwaves. He does the all-night shift Fridays and Saturdays now and loves the extra duties!

Bob Ruzicka's MCA single "Lately Love" is still a big seller in Quebec and the Maritimes even though it's now off the RPM 100 singles chart. The Eastern provinces have been where Ruzicka has sold the most records, with radio stations nearing 13 weeks of airplay in some cases.

Bill Ballance, whose fortunes looked to be dropping a few months back when the FCC clamped down on sex talk shows, is doing OK now anyway. KGBS Los Angeles has given him a \$25,000 raise to bring his pay cheque to 125 G's annually. The syndicated show is being heard in 17 markets now, which is an increase of five from three months ago, when Ballance's format was changed from sex to generalities. At that time a lot of stations had dropped him.

WEA has added another Canadian band to its roster. Mike & Tom will have fun promoting Mood Jga Jga, a four-man group featuring Greg Leskiw, powerhouse guitarist formerly with the Guess Who. First thing the Mike & Tom Show will attempt to straighten out is the pronunciation, rumoured to be "jah jah".

New program director at CKOT AM/FM in Tillsonburg is Bob Capp, whose last job was with CFRA Ottawa. Capp says the music format of the station will remain the same, namely an adult sound with 30% country content. Record service is quite slow at present, so record companies are asked to recheck their mailing lists for the new PD's benefit. Or how about the occasional personal visit, says Capp?

CHSJ Saint John N.B. has revamped its evening programming to make the 9-midnight Rick Roberts get-together into a progressive album show. PD Bob Wallace reports excellent local acceptance, however, he needs albums. If he can't get a better album service from all companies, he'll have to consider dropping the program.

Summer is here, and radio softball teams are sprouting forth. Latest to join in with this community activity is CKDM Dauphin. It also qualifies as "live comedy" which can be fun. CKDM lost the first two games of the

season by 24-5 and 29-14 margins.

CHEC Lethbridge into the "CHEC T-shirt Rip-Off" and using "get your shirt together" to promote its hundreds of colourful call-letter shirts. CHEC one of the first to discover "Little Gandy Dancer", a Bachman-Turner Overdrive B-side selection, still airing to excellent response. Most stations by now have also flipped the single to the "Gandy" side which is exciting, heavy music.

Music director at CHSJ Saint John, Ron Dale, has left now for a position with CJSS Cornwall.





*IN YOUR EAR* continued from page 15 hours in a sample week in 1971 to 319 hours in 1972.

Most other licensees providing some multi-lingual programming did not broadcast as much in other languages as they are permitted under the rules set out in the Board of Broadcast Governors' guidelines of January 1962. These guidelines allow any licensee to broadcast up to 20 hours a week between 6 AM and midnight in a language other than French or English, without seeking special authorization.

Access to the media by community organizations and student groups has become a matter of new importance in recent years, and the Commission is anxious that new ideas and concepts of programming in this area find an outlet for expression. The amendment to the Order-in-Council which prohibited the granting of licences to provincial governments or their agents (P.C. 1972-1569) has resulted in a number of submissions for campus radio stations from previously ineligible student groups.

While many of these applicants propose a large proportion of musical programming to meet the specialized interest of student audiences, others plan to experiment with new concepts of community radio. The orientation of these stations is toward providing a specialized service for the communities they serve; this would include radio drama, lectures, documentaries, and the opportunity for access to the broadcast facilities for the purpose of expressing opinion. Such propo-

sals reflect the confidence of student groups in their own talents and imagination, and in their ability to provide a distinctive alternative radio service.

It is perhaps interesting to note that, in general, AM-type programming fails to achieve significant audiences against competition from television in the evening hours. However, certain FM stations, programming to specific tastes or interests, are able to attract a sizeable proportion of their audiences during these same hours. Among the most notable examples are CHUM-FM and CJRT-FM in Toronto, CHOM-FM in Montreal, and CKLG-FM in Vancouver.

At the December 1972 Hearing, the Commission heard applications for the renewal of the Radiomutuel AM network and radio station CKAC (Montreal).

In announcing its decision on these applications the Commission expressed its concern "with regard to the quality of French spoken on the air" in view of the role of these stations in French-Canadian broadcasting. As a condition of licence the broadcasters are expected to take "appropriate measures... to improve this situation appreciably."

The Commission also noted the increased amount of English-language recordings broadcast over French-language stations, in some cases as high as 53.2 percent. In granting licence renewals to the radio networks Radiomutuel and Telemedia, the Commission stated that it "expects that each station will establish, in co-operation with other broadcasters concerned with this question, a reasonable scheme to improve this situation as soon as possible."

Radio drama in Canada survives in significant quantity only on the CBC networks. In 1971-1972 it occupied 3.4 percent of the average weekly programming on the English AM network, 4.2 percent on French AM, 2.2 percent on English FM, and 3.2 percent on French FM. Last year's figures were roughly equivalent.

Since most cultural events tend to be concentrated in the major urban centres of Canada, small towns and rural communities must rely on CBC radio as an important source of cultural entertainment. There were also encouraging signs that provincial educational stations, and some independent community and campus radio (primarily FM) outlets, are interested in providing both revivals of early radio dramas and production of original Canadian scripts.

What's the gist of all the above? It seems to me the thing that shines through is that the CRTC wants HIGHER STANDARDS in both AM and FM radio. The section discussing AM seems to admit, rather reluctantly, that AM radio is providing a service to its audience: a mass-audience, lowest common denominator type of radio broadcasting. But the "specialised formats" such as talk radio are than discussed in glowing praise, and "disc jockeys" are encouraged to become entertainers with the note "people are listening more to what is being broadcast between the music". This seems to point toward a certain coolness at the CRTC to stations that run music 24 hours a day with deejays who don't say much of substance. It seems clear that while the CRTC isn't about to revoke licences from these "music box radio stations", it would like them to add informative talk shows or features, and would also like the deejays to talk on a more intellectual level than "here's a great song to get you out of bed this morning".

The CRTC also looks favourably on new, creative types of radio programming. Progressive rock stations, campus stations, and radio dramas all come in for lavish praise in the excerpts above.

Over the next few years, radio people can look for the CRTC to expand its push for better programming on Canadian radio, if we take the '72-73 report at its word.
