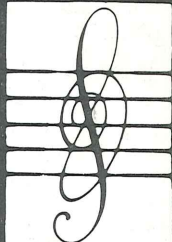

Future of Junos - - CRITICAL

RPM Music poll . . . number nine. Juno Awards Presentations . . . number four. On March 12th, the Centennial Ballroom of the Inn on the Park in Toronto was the scene of the Annual Gold Leaf Awards Trust Fund Juno Awards presentation. The industry gathered to honour the top artist and industry people of 1972. The votes were all counted and the winners were announced in advance.

Four categories were not part of the voting this year. Arnold Gosewich was awarded

Canadian Music Industry Man of the Year, Peter Goddard was named Music Journalist of the Year, David Clayton Thomas was honoured with a Juno for Outstanding Contribution to the Canadian Music Industry, and VOCM was chosen Broadcaster of the Year (John Murphy of VOCM accepted on behalf of the station).

Fifteen hundred music industry people crowded the Ballroom for the event which began at 8PM (scheduled to begin at 8:30) and the cocktail reception lasted until 10PM when the actual stage presentation began. The presentations lasted until 11:30PM and a significant amount of space has already been used in this issue for a photo message to give you an idea of what happened that evening.

It is hard to believe that 1500 people would come out to an event that was originally intended to (a) be supported by a trust fund

established by RPM (the structure of that trust fund is known by everyone in the industry that would be concerned), and (b) the idea of the event was that the industry would honour their own at a gathering.

Now for the criticism. Could it be that the event has become too big to be of any importance, and that it may be impossible for the trust fund (which is heavily subsidized by RPM) to continue with the Awards?

Last year 600 invitations for two were sent out and 900 people attended. This year 600 invitations were mailed and the outcome netted 1500 people.

KAMLOOPS BACKS DONNA WOODWARD

Van Los recording artist, Donna Woodward, was accorded the red carpet treatment by the city of Kamloops recently, while touting her new release, "Winter Wind". Accompanied by Don Marsh, Van Los vice president, Miss Woodward made the rounds of the three Kamloops radio stations, CFJC, CHNL and CFFM FM. According to Marsh, all three "received the record enthusiastically" and are now playlisting it. CFJC TV interviewed the Van Los artist and aired the clip over its "Noon Show" and "Let's Visit Awhile".

Kamloops local newspaper, the News Advertiser, devoted the inside front page of its weekly supplement to Miss Woodward. According to Marsh, "If we could transplant that spirit to the rest of the country, the record would be a monster."

Spegg has been appointed merchandise manager for the retail division and will play a key role in creating and implementing advertising and merchandising programmes as well as having direct responsibility for inventory control. Spegg comes to Sherman's from Eaton's and has a strong and successful history in consumer products merchandising. Colin Cross, well-known in the trade circles in Quebec, has been appointed regional supervisor for the Montreal area and will be responsible for overseeing the day-to-day operations of the four existing stores in that area plus the new stores that are being contemplated. He will also act as store manager for one location. Jean Dallaire, a well-experienced store manager for the Sherman chain in Quebec City, has been appointed regional supervisor for the Quebec City area where three stores are now located and where future locations are planned. He will also manage one store. Spegg, Cross and Dallaire will report directly to Burney, who advised that further appointments will be announced shortly for the Toronto and Ottawa areas.

Capitol's retail division will now have twenty locations through Ontario and Quebec. Burney advised that a minimum of three additional stores will be opened or acquired during 1973 as part of an orderly expansion program.

"gate-crashers" and yet the attendance exceeded the invitation list by 300 people (if every single invitation was used.

Now the question arises . . . should next year's Juno Awards be bigger, or should it be better? If it is to be better, it will be necessary to return to the original concept of an industry function that can become more efficient in nominations, awards, and their actual presentation. If it must grow in attendance, and if the Gold Leaf Awards Trust Fund is only supported as a token gesture, then it should be scaled down.

Should the Awards become a concert, with tickets on sale for anyone who may think there will be a performance by the artists involved, or should it be sold to TV or even given to TV with the possibility that it MIGHT be handled well by the artsy craftsy boys at the government-owned (or publically-owned) network???

Now is the time to ask all these questions - as the Juno Award fever is at its highest. What should it be next year? How much should be spent by the industry to honour their own, and should a growing industry be put on public display . . . just in the hope that it will work out.

First, we must build an industry in Canada. Then, we can present to the public a "show" that is better than the Oscars for the Emmys.

We have a year to figure out just what the future of the Gold Leaf Awards Trust Fund and the Juno Awards will be.

"MUSICAL FRIENDS" SALUTES JUNOS

Jim McKenna, host of the popular Montreal originated CTVer "Musical Friends" recently set aside time on his show to salute the RPM Juno Awards. The show, syndicated throughout Canada and the U.S., explained what the Awards were all about. McKenna explained that the Junos "represent more than just trophies for individual artists - but for those in the music industry these Junos demonstrate that the whole recording industry is maturing and becoming professional. Canadian artists are heard around the world, but their music is finally, at long last, being accepted by other Canadians."

McKenna, through "Musical Friends" and its predecessor "Like Young", have been consistently giving top exposure to Canadian recording acts for more than eleven years.

Featured on the Juno salute were this year's winners performing excerpts from recent appearances. Included were: Ginette Reno, Valdy, Edward Bear, Bob McBride, Shirley Eikhard, Lighthouse and others.

SHERMAN'S MUSIC ACQUIRES MR. SOUND

Capitol Records' growth in full-line record and tape stores has been made evident through recent moves revealed by Tom Burney, General Manager of Sherman's Music Centres, Capitol's retail arm.

Since June of 1972 Sherman's have opened three stores in Toronto and one in Hull, Quebec. Burney advised that in February, Sherman's acquired the Mister Sound record and tape store located in London, Ontario within the Wellington Square Shopping Centre. Concurrent with this move the Sherman General Manager stated that a lease has been taken on a second store in London to be located in The Westmount Centre. Both stores will continue to operate under the Mister Sound banner, a name well-established in the London area that reflects a modern contemporary image. Burney also stated that the image may very well be utilized in further developments being contemplated as part of the Sherman chains aggressive plans to open and acquire further stores throughout Canada in the coming year.

In anticipation of this exciting growth, Burney announced recent appointments in his senior management structure. Wolfgang

CRTC HEARING SET ON BOND ADVERTISEMENTS

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission is considering a change in the Broadcasting Act to permit the advertising of bonds issued by mortgage companies if the bonds are guaranteed by a federal or provincial deposit insurance corporation. It will hold a public hearing on the matter during the April hearings in Ottawa.

Presently, the advertising of bonds, shares or securities is forbidden on AM, FM and TV.

The only exceptions are bonds issued by a government body (municipal, provincial or federal) and trust company deposit certificates. The amendment would also place debentures (bonds) issued by Canadian mortgage loan companies in this permitted category.

This section of the Act is meant to keep "speculative stocks" and similar offerings off the air. However, the bonds of mortgage companies, being guaranteed by the government, are considered a "safe" investment which the CRTC will likely permit on air, according to broadcast industry observers.

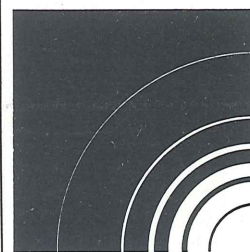

CARLTON SHOWBAND INTO HEAVY SCHEDULE OF DATES

The Carlton Showband, who saw action on both the Adult Contemporary and the Country charts with their RCA deck, "Red Haired Mary", are currently touring Western Canada to be followed by dates in Ontario and Quebec. The first part of March had them flying into Winnipeg for a benefit performance for shut-ins at Princess Elizabeth with George McClory of CJOB emceeing the show. That same evening they appeared at the Centennial Concert Hall where "sold out" notices had been posted. The following morning (12) they appeared on Peter Warren's open-line show followed by a promotion concert and autograph session at Eatons. They bussed into Brandon for two "sold out" concerts at the Western Manitoba Centennial Hall that same day.

Regina was set up for Lorne Harrison's open-line show (13) with an autograph session and promotion concert at Eatons. A reception at Canadian Breweries in the late afternoon was followed by a concert at the Saskatchewan Centre of the Arts - another "sold out" show. They return to the Centre (19) for a show that posted "sold out" notices at the time of their 13th show. North to Saskatoon (14) with a promo concert and autograph session at Eatons - a reception at Canadian Breweries and a concert at the Saskatoon Centennial Auditorium. Other dates and autograph sessions to follow included: Edmonton (15), Lethbridge (16), Calgary Inn (17) and their Western Canadian capper at the Jubilee Auditorium in Calgary (18).

The Showband return to Toronto and an engagement at the Horseshoe Tavern from March 22 through 24. The end of the month has them at a "sold out" concert at the Guelph Armoury.

April shows a full schedule of dates including: Place des Arts (12), Massey Vanier High School, Cowansville, P.Q. (13), Knights of Columbus, Oshawa (14), Cornwall Armoury

(27) and the Civic Centre in Ottawa (28). Also during April they will be taping CTV's "Pig & Whistle Show" from the 23rd through the 26th.

Much of the success of their Western Canadian tour was due the high level promo job done on the Showband by RCA's Western Canadian promotion rep, Jim Hogg who headquarters in Winnipeg.

SAMMY-JO RECOVERS STOLEN EQUIPMENT

Stampeder Sound Inc., reported the theft of their Econoline Van, loaded with \$15,000 of equipment to Toronto police Feb. 2. The van was located two weeks later, emptied of all their equipment which included amplifiers, speaker cabinets, microphones and a 16-channel mixing board. Thefts of this type have been common in the Toronto area, with musicians stealing from one another and fencing the equipment for a fraction of the cost.

The Stampeder episode however, had a happy ending, much to the relief of their insurance company. It was a month to the day (Mar. 2) when Sammy-Jo, well-known Canadian entertainment booking agent, received a tip on the whereabouts of the equipment. He checked this lead out himself and located the equipment in a run-down

garage in West Toronto. He alerted the Stampeder's manager Mel Shaw who brought the police and insurance agents to the scene where photographs were taken and the equipment dusted for fingerprints. Other equipment - amps etc. were also found on the scene which led police to believe the garage was used as a clearing house for stolen equipment. No arrests have been made at time of writing but police believe that with this discovery they are close to a major breakthrough which could bring an end to this type of theft which has been plaguing Toronto musicians for several months.

HUNTER INTRODUCES SCRUBBALOE CAINE

Don Hunter, Guess Who manager, brought his new discovery, Scrubbaloe Caine, into Toronto and a press reception at the Coal Bin. Hunter was given an assist by RCA's Neill Dixon (promo rep).

The group, comprised of Henry Small, Bob Kidd, Jim Harmata, Paul Dean, Al Foreman and Bill McBeth, recently signed one of the largest contracts ever given to a new artist. Their initial RCA single is expected to be released shortly. They'll be at the Abbey Road Pub Mar 26 through 29.

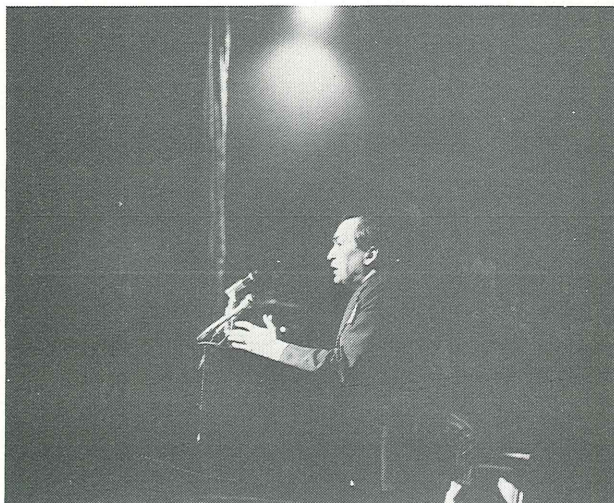

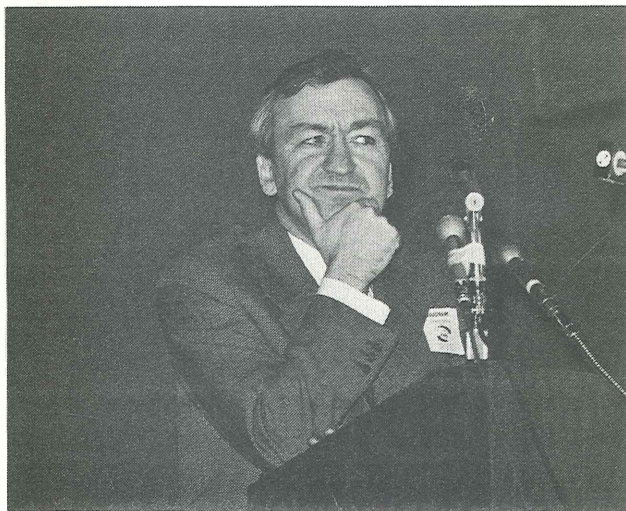

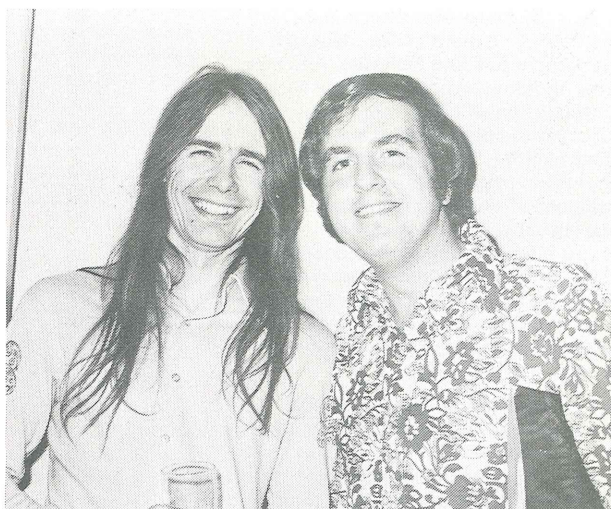

C6 accelerates the process

As the Inn on the Park staff finish the job of clearing away all the record jackets, promo stickers, dirty glasses and partied-out promoters left over from RPM's Communications Six weekend, it's time to review the events and accomplishments of C6.

The most satisfying part of the weekend for yours truly Dave Chadwick was the

opportunity to meet so many of you who read and contribute to The Programmers. Yes, all those telephone voices and telex names do have people attached. . . and big-voiced George Patton of CHML isn't a six-foot Texan after all. Programmers attended from markets like Edmonton, Hamilton, Toronto, Woodstock N.B., Owen Sound, St. John's Nfld., Windsor, Montreal, London and Belleville. And now that we all know each other a little better, the information will flow more freely from one market to another and from radio stations to RPM. The professionalism of programmers improves proportionately to the amount of programming information available to them, but it takes time for PD's and MD's to "build a friend in every market" who can tip them with the latest news. A weekend like C6 accelerates the process immeasurably, so that radio people get "plugged in to the inside track" that much more quickly.

Programmers I talked to felt that this social aspect was more valuable than the planned agenda of C6. The guest speakers and the workshop sessions served to "break the ice" and "get people thinking" and then the real learning came in "head to

head" discussions where programmers compared notes with their counterparts from other stations.

From the very beginning, the question of the 30% rule and "how do we develop good Canadian records" was at the top of the list of topics covered by Ken Middleton (WEA), Pierre Juneau (CRTC), Alden Diehl (CKLW) and Bill Gavin (Gavin Report) as these four men opened the Saturday morning session.

In a way, it is unfortunate (from a programmer's point of view) that Canadian content is always the big item at a Communications session like this. However, it's only natural, given the format of the meeting. Both radio and record people are in attendance, and the one thing they have in common is the 30% content rule. So much of the discussion centres here, to the detriment of other radio programming ideas which are of more specialized interest. The record companies keep saying "We're putting out the best CanCon possible" and the broadcasters repeat "It's not quite good enough yet". There are issues just as important in today's radio as Canadian music, but they weren't discussed in depth because of the record orientation of much of the proceedings.

The appearance of Pierre Juneau, CRTC chairman at C6 provoked surprisingly little reaction from programmers. Nearly all who questioned Juneau were outside the broadcast industry. The only two men to tell Juneau that they didn't like the 30% rule were Keith James of CHED and Alden Diehl of CKLW. Later however, the consensus was that most stations, though they may not like the regulation, feel the time is passed for protesting. It doesn't help the station image and most feel the

CRTC won't change its rule anyway.

Bill Gavin's speech hit home several points of interest to programmers. He touched on the declining reliability of singles sales, and the need to temper sales and request figures with demographic information. In years to come, stations will find it vital to know the ages of people who call in phone requests. Thus a single call from an adult listener might get greater weight than five calls from young teenagers. Gavin also cautioned stations on live commercials. Having a jock read spots for two different car dealers will only destroy his credibility in the rest of his show.

Probably the most interesting part of Saturday for programmers was the taped presentation Gene Kirby of CKEY brought along for the afternoon programming-promotion workshop. In about half an hour, we heard the highlights of the CCBA's programming session at their recent convention. Alden Diehl showed why he is so well-known in the industry with an extremely funny bit on contests. "It's early in March and you're sitting in your office with your feet up - reading RPM saying (I think I missed the next part) "when the general manager comes in and says '.... uuh, there's a BBM coming up in four days. Shouldn't we do something about that?' And the program director says. . . 'well hey you're right, yes we should and another contest is born.'" With an absence of bull and an abundance of humour, Diehl hammered home the three main rules he uses when choosing contests: keep it simple, keep it entertaining, and go easy on the hype if you're only giving away T-shirts and albums.

Later, that night at the RPM cocktail party, with liquid relaxation flowing

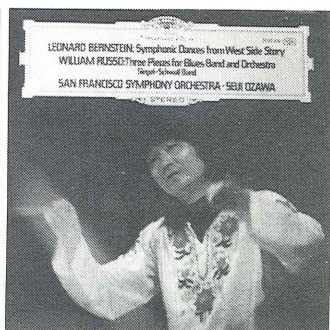

However, complaints of too frequent releases of a work go by the boards when the orchestra involved is a great one like the Berlin Philharmonic. Deutsche Grammophon engineers have caught perfectly the silken beauty of their string tone. Soloist Michel Schwalbe who is leader of the Berlin Philharmonic plays the "King Maximilian" Stradivarius violin



in this outstanding performance. All in all, one of the very greatest recordings of this much recorded work.

An outstanding addition to the slender catalogue of French Opera recordings.

BERNSTEIN Symphonic Dances from West Side Story

This is the second of two discs marking the recording debut of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Seiji Ozawa. The companion disc features three views of Romeo and Juliette by Tchaikovsky, Berlioz and Prokofiev. Side one features a symphonic treatment of songs and dances from Leonard Bernstein's Broadway show "West Side Story". The thrice familiar tunes emerge fresh as paint under Ozawa's knowing direction. The Three Pieces for Blues Band and Orchestra by William Russo was commissioned by the Ravinia Festival in 1967 and had its premier in the summer of 1968. It should appeal greatly to both jazz and classical buffs. DGG's sound is spectacular.

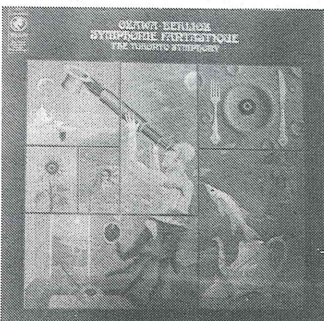
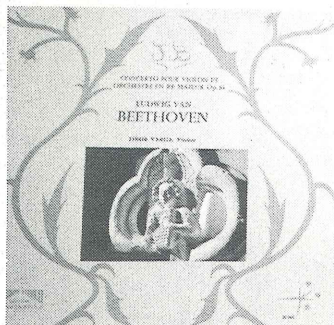
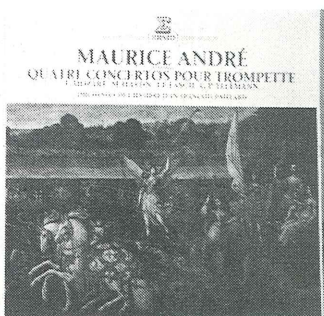

He is joined here by the Zagreb Philharmonic for a serviceable account of Beethoven's much recorded violin Concerto. The recording is bright and clear, with good quality surfaces. There are no liner notes provided and titles etc. on the jacket are in French only.

STEALERS WHEEL A&M SP 4377-W

The old A&M neon lights hype machine has been working overtime putting the word around about Stealers Wheel. There have been several comparisons made between this group and the Beatles, but it must be remembered that to sound like someone else may be flattering to whoever you happen to be imitating but it doesn't necessarily reflect well on the imitator.

If we ignore such overblown comparisons we are much more likely to appreciate this album for what it really is: an exceedingly well-produced (Lieber-Stoller) collection of less than devastating compositions which makes for an easily likeable little round of ditties. "Stealers Wheel" is hardly an historical album, it's not "Sargeant Pepper", it's not even "Meet the Beatles", it's plainly and simply a nice, harmless little set which will fill up the space between the release of the album you liked last week and the one you'll like next week.

This week, then, listen to "Stuck in the Middle With You", now off as a single, and our favourite, "You Put Something Better Inside of Me".



LESS THAN THE SONG Hoyt Axton A&M SP4376-W

Known primarily as a composer, Axton is a powerful, believable performer, and this album could easily establish him at the top of the heap in a very short while. We especially like the title but the entire album is brilliantly produced and written and deserves to be heard.



ROMANY Hollies Epic KE31992-H

The Hollies, like the Bee Gees, have managed, through thick and thin, to present us with consistently strong and interesting albums. "Romany" is no exception and this one should kick off handsomely with the success of "Magic Woman Touch". Also of interest are "Jesus Was A Crossmaker" and "Slow Down".



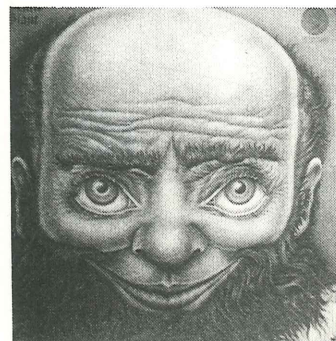
PUB PARTY Various British Records BR3102

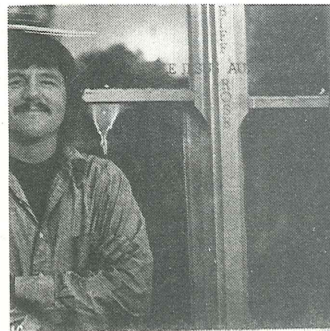
BEST OF THE NEW SEEKERS Elektra EKS75051-P

GENTLE GIANT Vertigo 6360020-K

An excellent progressive album, with touches of King Crimson, Jethro Tull and others, but by no means is it plagiaristic. The "Giant" track goes through some interesting musical spaces, as does "Nothing at All" and "Funny Ways". Gulliver-like packaging should draw interest to this one.

liberally, discussion centred on the latest ratings, educated guesses as to what the upcoming CRFC FM policy would say, and the chances for success of the new CKFH oldies format. Registrants agreed that the scheduled sessions were of uneven quality, with some parts extremely interesting while others were dull. The unwillingness of programmers to get too involved in floor questions and debate was also touched upon. And so much of the learning really began on the Saturday night.

Sunday was the day for programmers to tour the hospitality suites and hear the latest product. Along with this came more informal discussion with other registrants. The day was capped with an Avenue of America cocktail party, dinner and showcase that amazed many.

With every table buzzing with 'this must be costing them a bundle' registrants were treated to the most elaborate junket by a record company ever seen in the Canadian music industry. Seemingly following the philosophy of "the more promotion the better and the sky is the limit", Avenue featured Side Effect, David George, Rose and Abraham's Children as C6 registrants consumed a six-course meal. Each person received a thick promo package with all four of the albums in A of A's first LP release, T-shirts, bios and more. Programmers were exposed to the company's music under the best conditions possible, with president Gary Salter explaining "we never just send a record out in the mail and that's it. We always follow up, to make sure that the programmers have got the record and heard it properly." Walt Grealis summed it up with the comment that Avenue is "pushing Canadian music as it's never been pushed before". And the radio people were dazzled by it all. "No one will be able to say that Avenue's artists died from lack of promo" was how one programmer put it.

Following the Saturday and Sunday came the glittering Juno Awards Monday night, with a Monday morning MLS meeting sandwiched between (if you were a member station). The awards were short on programming ideas but long on enjoyment, star-watching and were once again "the social event of the year" for the record business as an industry.

After it was all over, the comments came in to RPM staff thanking us for handling the arrangements and making this "Grey Cup Weekend" of the music biz possible. "Wouldn't miss it for the world" was the general consensus. And then... time to put away the bottles....gotta get back to the station....got a lot of work to do. And we face a grey Tuesday morning back in the office, but with a lot more links to people "out there" than we had before. And that's what makes it all worthwhile.

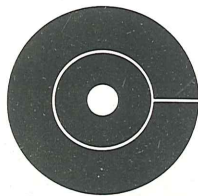

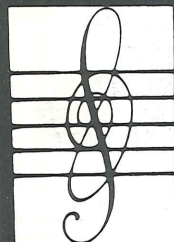

mat change at the Toronto station left him, morning man Mike Williams, and all night man Don Biefer out on the street. Fulton, who started in radio in 1962 at CKCQ Quesnel, B.C., is looking to place the daily show "Toronto Theatre in Review" (which he performed on CKFH along with his 9AM-1PM airshift) with another local station. Writing and covering the theatre thus could become Fulton's forte, in an upheaval that means another creative personality is lost to the radio biz. Well, that's the way it goes in this business. Parting of the three jocks was reported as "amicable — and inevitable in light of future CKFH plans".

CFGO's music department up in Ottawa experiencing a problem with Canadian singles not being stocked by local rack jobbers. Though they've aired for a month now, you cannot buy the new Stampeders, Valdy, Keith Hampshire, Susan Jacks, Everyday People, Flying Circus, Fergus or Mashiya. CFGO tests each disc and if it is weak on phones and weak on sales after several weeks, they must drop it. Other parts of the country where record play is based not on statistics, but on personal taste, don't have this same problem. Maybe the jobbers are also to blame, holding off ordering product CFGO is playing because it's "only a CanCon extra". Anyway that's a vicious circle that hurts the Canadian music industry. Other markets may not think a month is a long time to wait for a record to show, but at CFGO, with the heavy pressure of new product, a month is all the station can afford to wait. Record companies that want chart numbers in these types of markets must promote more vigorously to the rackers. This also reflects a growing problem in Top 40 music departments . . . many retailers are not stocking any type of 45, preferring to make better money selling LPs only. This makes much singles sales research unreliable for radio MD's.

CJBK London running "The Beatles: The Echoes and The Dream" rockumentary in afternoon drive. One chapter each day Monday to Saturday, 4-5PM. Six Beatle record libraries being given away in conjunction. Station reports that the new Alice Cooper LP bumped Elton John from top

spot in album sales following Cooper's concert in London last week.

VOCM taking local newspaper space in St. John's to tell the market of the two awards they received last week. One was a Juno Award to Johnny Murphy as Broadcaster of the Year; the other a Charlie from the RTNDA for first breaking the story of the Newfoundland election.

A goof on the "Big 30" chart at CHEX Peterboro was turned into a contest by the station. The listener spotting the goof (date read Feb. 29 instead of March 1) picked up \$25, a transistor radio, and several albums.

Instrumentals are coming back, as you know, because they provide a balance to the current "sound" of usual hit product. Dueling Banjos and Deodato have shown the way. Now Edgar Winter's "Frankenstein" is doing the same thing. Many programmers are saying "it can't be a hit" but it's already jumping high on majors like CFGO and CKLW. Also destined to hit big is the new Moe Koffman version of "Swinging Shepherd Blues" coming out any day. This was a huge hit in the 50's and the time is right for it again. Koffman and Winter will take time to grow, because of the many overly-conservative programmers, but are just as contemporary as the Banjos or Deodato and will follow them to the top ten. Try 'em and see!

Technical notes from Toronto radio: Format-40 station CHUM's recent work on the control room leaves just one turntable there. All music including oldies is on cart, along with over 90% of all commercials. Why? Records can't get damaged this way; carts have provision for different signal tones that flash lights at announcer to warn him of end of spot or music fade of the song; no wowing, late starts or other music production hassles. New CHUM production control has four-track recording, complete sound filtering, echo, etc. which shows that with professionals, the product (spots) deserves the best.

CJCI Prince George brought off its "World Snowgolf Championship" to great coverage in the local newspaper despite a last minute switch of course due to weather conditions. Lots of pictures of the 500 crazily-dressed golfers scoring 40, 50 etc. per hole appeared in print, all to the aid of the 'CI public image. Western radio stations are invited to hold their own Snowgolf local playoffs next winter and have CJCI fly the winner in to the World Championship scheduled for February 1974.

By far the hottest phone item at VOCM:

"Twelfth of Never" by Donny Osmond. St. John's station also into promo for Education Week which has students writing 30-sec spots for their school telling why it is best. Spots air late afternoon and early evening on VOCM with winning spot getting prize for the school and for the person or class who wrote it. Good p.r. and it gets the kids listening to station to hear their work.

Top five singles as printed in the CJVI Country Scoreboard from Victoria, B.C. are: Cal Smith, Barbara Fairchild, Mel Tillis, Tammy Wynette and David Houston.

CJCJ Woodstock using logo "Memory Maker" to mark format change. Record play is now 30% content of 1955 to 1970 oldies.

CKGM Montreal liked the six-hour documentary "The Beatles, The Echo and the Dreams" so much that it has now been scheduled for airing on FM sister CJOM.

Radio York new appointments at York University in Toronto: Larry Wilson is station manager, Neil Hiltz the program director, and Claude Vickery is music director.

Abraham's Children arrived prepared for heavy radio promo for their Woodstock N.B. gig. CJCJ gave away 218 copies of the Children's new "Time" LP during "Children Week Contest".

Companies: Please add CFGN Radio, Port Aux Basques, Nfld. to mailing lists for MOR and country product. As of March 15 CFGN changed from a repeater station to a live-programmed operation.

Peter Murray of CJCI Prince George wrote in about our article on "favourite jocks". He picks Cousin Brucie, mid-60's, WABC New York: "... he had control and command of the whole show, knew his music and musicians, and was easy, candid, effective and just simply straightforward in his approach." Peter also picked Brian Skinner, mid-60's, CHUM Toronto: "... he was a riot, with his drop-ins and off-the-cuff comments." Peter would like anyone who has any Skinner airchecks to contact him at CJCI so he can get a copy.

CJCJ Woodstock morning man Ray Landry moved to CFCY Charlottetown. New CJ jock is Peter Downie from CHSR (campus station at U of NB) doing the same shift.

Dave Carter of CFRS Simcoe says that station will have its new 10,000 watt, 24-hour operation on the air by fall. Meantime they need record service to be added in preparation. All music types, singles and LPs.

CHUM all-night jock Mark Edwards just got a nice promotion. He's heading to CKVN's morning show in Vancouver. CHUM Ltd. employees threw a farewell bash for Edwards.

New jock at CHIC Brampton is Michael Love. Formerly Bob Trewin of CFRS Simcoe.

CKBB Barrie raising money for the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association and the Barrie "Neptune Club". Jocks Jack Jacob, Ken Trew and John Kalmes collecting pledges per mile for upcoming "Swimathon". Limit of 200 pool laps and two hours time.

Dave Booth of CHYM Kitchener has a good idea. Winners on his "Kaleidoscope" program are sent a questionnaire to analyse their tastes in music & radio. Featuring progressive rock, blues, folk, jazz and old rock (occasionally) "Kaleidoscope" airs on CHYM-AM Saturday from ten to midnight and Sunday on FM from 10PM to 2AM. FM operation going 50,000 watts next week. Interviews also featured on the FM version of the program, with many notable blues and old rock figures covered over the last couple of years.

Barry Hegland, MD at Lethbridge's CJOE passed on his picks for favourite jock: J.B. Shayne of CKLG-FM Vancouver, "a creative master"; and Tom Donahue of KSNZ San Francisco, "he's the father of the underground communicators".

CKLC Kingston running KRLA's documentary "The Christ Chronicles" in five hour-long parts each evening at 7. CHUM Toronto and many U.S. stations have used the program which is very heavy on music of today and interviews. Jesus "freaks" and their impact on the world and on music are detailed. CKLC promotion dept. did a mailing to all area ministers so they could bring the show to the attention of young people.

The Programmers NEW ON CHARTS

PRINCIPAL MARKETS

Confirmed this week on Canada's major charts was "Sing" by the Carpenters. The record went on CKXL, CKLG, CKRC, CJME and CFRW, joining previous chartings at CFGO, CKGM, CKOC and CKLW plus a hitbound at CHUM.

James Leroy's "Touch of Magic" went to fully national status this week as CKXL, CJBK and CKRC charted the record; previously on CHUM, CFGO, CFRA, CFRW, CKLG and CHED on the strength of sales action. Dawn's "Tie A Yellow Ribbon Round the Ole Oak Tree" had a very good week, entering charts at CKXL, CFRA, CJBK and CKOM. Dawn was already charted at CKOC, CKLG, CJME, CKRC, CKLW and CHUM in previous weeks. Vicki Lawrence grabbed CJBK and CFRW to complete a sweep that began with CKLW, CKGM, CKXL, CKOC, CFRA, CJME, CKLG, CKRC, CFGO and CHUM. And Loudon Wainwright III picked up CKXL and CFGO chartings to accompany previous stations CKLW, CKOC, CKLG,

CJME, CKRC and CHUM.

The Stampeders are now transferring heavy playlist action into sales and chartings. Charted CKGM, Radiomutuel and CKRC this week to join CKOC, CKOM, CKLG, CJME and CKXL. The Four Tops had a good week too, taking chart berths at CKXL, CKGM, CKOC and CFRW; previously on CKRC, CFGO and CKLW. Donny Osmond was charted at CKLW, CKLG and CKOC; now he adds CKOM, CHUM and CFGO. And Susan Jacks continues to translate playlists into charts; she's done it so far at CKRC, CJME, CKXL, CKLG and CHED.

Five other records are making progress: Space Oddity, A Good Song, Stir It Up, Neither One of Us, and Little Willy. David Bowie adds CKLG and CJME to previous CKLW berth. Valdy gets his first two charts from CFRA and CHUM. Johnny Nash takes CKXL, CKRC and CKLW to join previous CHED, CFGO and CKOC chartings. Gladys Knight picks up CKOC and CJME, joining CFRW and CKLG from last week. And The Sweet get the nod at CKRC and CFRW after CKLW, CJME and CKXL led the way.

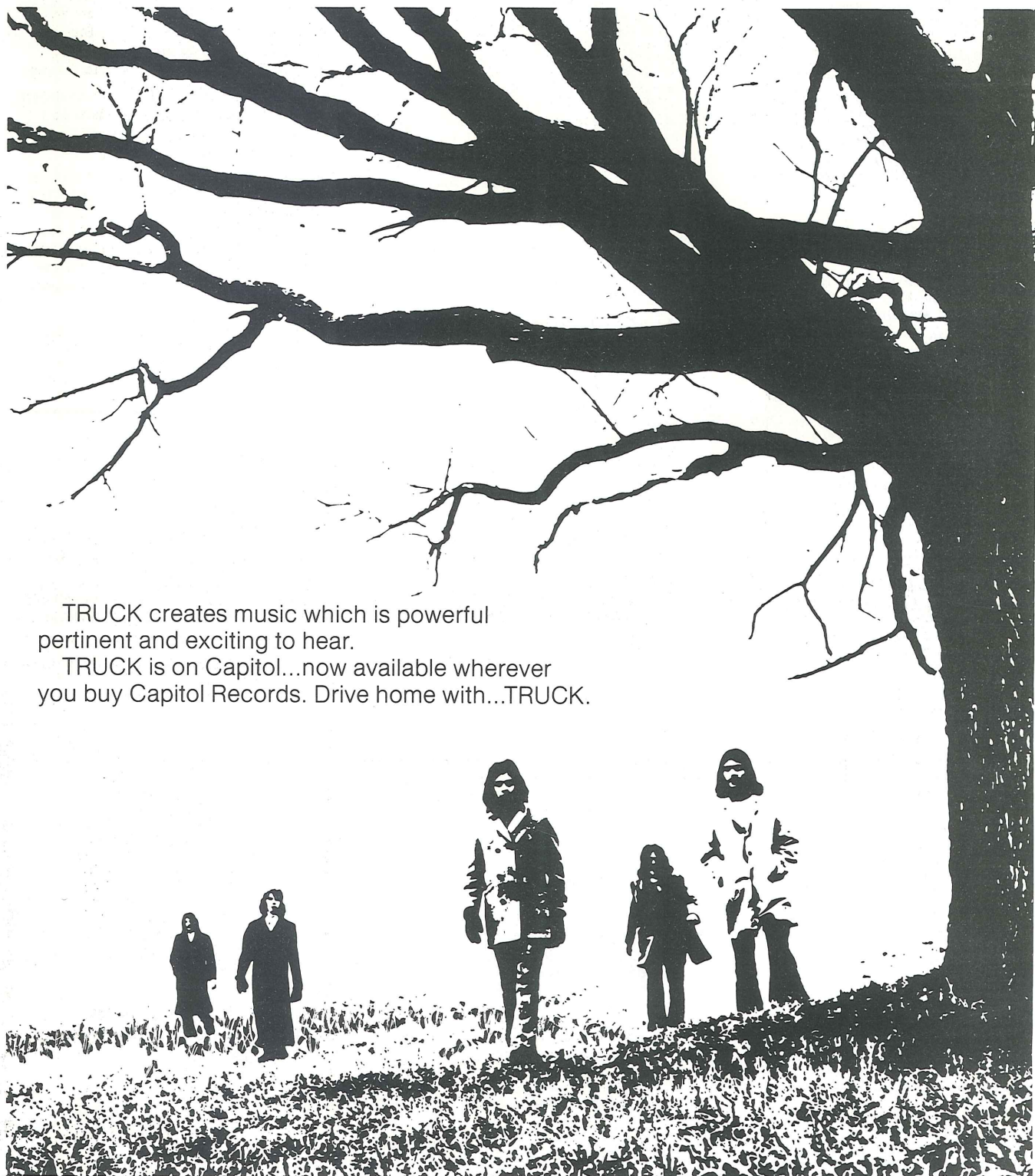

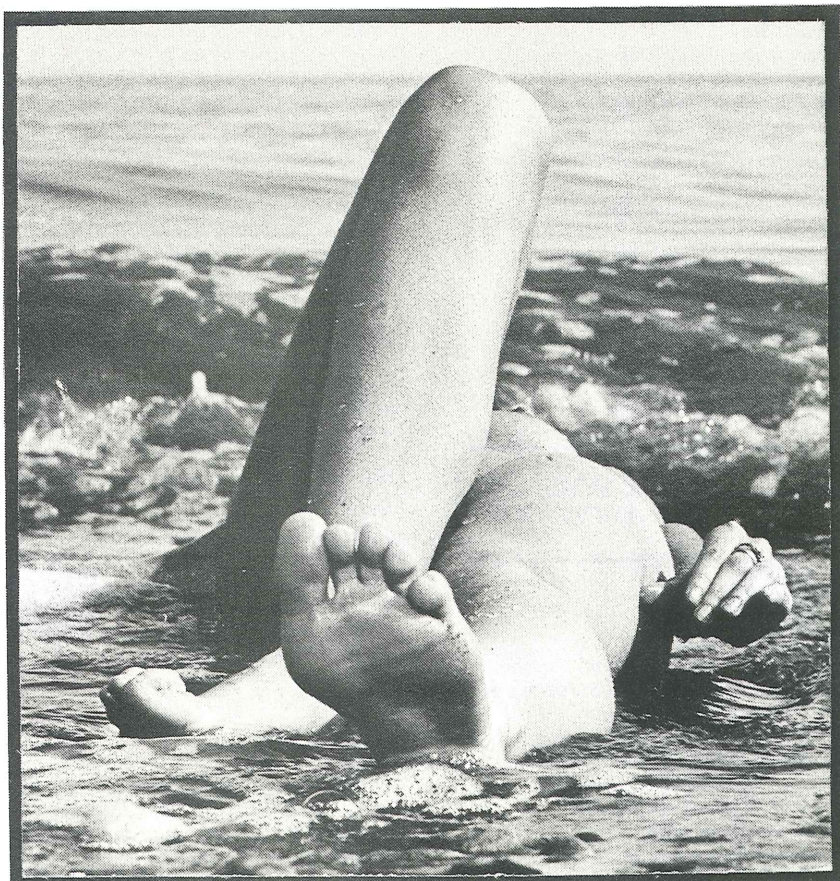

RADIOMUTUEL STATIONS BOW NEW RECORD CHARTS

The stations of Quebec's Radiomutuel network have announced new formats for "Palmares Radiomutuel", their weekly chart publication. The restructuring of the music systems at CJMS Montreal, CJRC Ottawa-Hull, CJRP Quebec, CJRS Sherbrooke and CJTR Trois Rivières came hard on the heels of CRTC criticism of the excessive play of English-language records on the stations.

The most extensive change in the Radiomutuel chart system is the introduction of "Disco Pop", which is the name being given to local playlists of each of the stations. Thus the record industry can now receive separate reports from each of the five markets. These five charts are then compiled mathematically into the Radiomutuel report. Radiomutuel says this will markedly increase the accuracy of their survey, which

is Quebec's most reliable record barometer.

The Radiomutuel stations previously worked with a list of thirty French-language and forty English-language singles. This has now been equalized to thirty in each category. New categories debuting on the chart are "Quebec Looking Ahead" and "France Pop" which are made up of five French singles each. And a Top 10 LP section (French mixed with English) has been introduced.

CRTC SETS HEARING RE POLICE NEWS CENSORSHIP

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission has moved quickly to hold public hearings on the controversial CAB document that would allow the police to censor news broadcasts during "crisis" periods (see RPM 3/3/73). In the meantime, all C.A.B. member stations have been forbidden to implement the policy, which calls for stations to consult with police before reporting on crime, police, and related activities.

The CRTC has invited submissions from the public until April 2, with the hearing to be held April 10. Observers in the industry, however, feel the hearing is only a formality. They point to the original CRTC telex sent to C.A.B. president Donald Hamilton. It said in part: "The CRTC points out that the Broadcasting Act imposes on each broadcaster the responsibility for his programming. The CRTC considers the independent dissemination of news a primary requirement of this responsibility. Consequently, any restraint on broadcasters in this area would be a matter of the most serious concern to the Commission."

UNUSUAL PROGRAMMING DISTINGUISHES CKLW-FM

One of the most interestingly-programmed FM radio stations in Canada by most evaluations would have to be CKLW-FM in Windsor. For decades until it went totally separate last year, it simulcast the rock format of "The Big Eight" (its AM sister) for 17 hours a day and only programmed separately in the evenings. But since then the schedule has expanded to 24 hours.

From 6 to 9AM the station runs a morning show which features adult contemporary music mixed with standard (plum) LP cuts. The program is heavy on personality, featuring a jock talking after each record. The personality, believe it or not, does all his broadcasting from a car as he drives around the Windsor area. With the aid of a very sharp operator and the latest in mobile voice links and cue signals, the production is kept up to high standards. The mobile facility enables the CKLW-FM morning man to pull a switch on the contests that call out to listeners. He simply knocks on their door to play the game with them.

Between 9 and 11.30 the station runs a talk show, and follows this with another hour of MOR music. From 12.30 to 1 it's news, with 1-4PM given over to variety programming (largely Arts, Letters & Sciences with an assortment of music and talk that varies day to day). At 4PM the MOR returns until 11PM with 6.30 to 7 being a news block. Classical music is aired from 11 until 5AM.

From the above format, it is clear that CKLW-FM is far exceeding the FM minimum prescribing 20% of air time to Arts, Letters and Sciences. The percentage runs as high as 35% since classical music qualifies in the category.

Competition in the market is intense, with one other Canadian FM station, plus dozens in Detroit. This tends to fragment the audience to an extent unmatched in any other Canadian market.

BEE GEES WIND UP CANADIAN DATES

After having played successful dates in Toronto and Montreal, the Bee Gees are now in New York, third stop on a projected world tour. The Canadian appearances were particularly well-timed for Polydor Records, who distribute the RSO label upon which new Bee Gees product is issued. The Toronto and Montreal appearances coincided with the release of "Life in a Tin Can". One of the tracks from that album, "Saw A New Morning", is scheduled for immediate release by Polydor, according to press relations man, Bill Horan.

DKD AND FRIENDS TO NEW LOCATION

The Donald K Donald entertainment empire, which recently exited the booking business in favour of concentration on talent development and concert production has moved its headquarters from 170 Dorchester Blvd. E. Montreal to 354 Youville St., Montreal. The move affects Promotivations Inc., Donald K. Donald Productions, Terry Flood Management and Aquarius Records.

CFRM RYERSON HOLDS COMMUNICATION NIGHT

In what was described by many as the biggest event of its kind ever held in the industry, Ryerson Polytechnical Institute campus station CFRM last week held "CFRM Radio Communication Night". The event happened on the Thursday before RPM's C6 weekend and seemed to benefit from increased attendance from industry figures who were in town for the weekend.

CFRM has impressed many with the professionalism of its management, and carried its message to a couple of hundred more with an audio-visual presentation outlining goals of the station, now in its first year of operation. Unusual for other campus stations, but not for CFRM was the presence of three speakers who explored various aspects of campus radio: Walt Grealis of RPM, Dave Charles of CHUM and Doug McGowan of the CRTC. To a mixed audience composed of record people, professional broadcasters and personnel from various campus stations, the speakers touched on several problems with campus stations: the lack of creativity exhibited by some stations, problems with staff continuity, lack of proper music systems and so on. Dave Charles offered advice to those aspiring to professional radio, and Doug McGowan attempted to cast light on the CRTC's carrier current regulations now just coming into effect.

Food and drink was supplied and many attending commented that the reception

was up to a standard of those given by commercial radio or record companies. Thus CFRM management can claim to have succeeded in one of its goals: to be just as professional as commercial radio (in the party-giving sphere anyway).

All in all, it was a valuable evening, airing grievances that needed to be aired and allowing CFRM and other campus stations to meet the industry on a personal level. And of course the radio station came out with a highly-polished image in the minds of two hundred more industry people. CFRM seems to be succeeding in its plan to become "the first station of Canadian campus radio".

NEW ANNIE ALBUM COMING

Toronto-based Happy Sack Productions have announced the early-April release of Anne Murray's latest album for Capitol Records. Entitled, naturally, "Danny's Song", the album is an unusual departure for Miss Murray in that the entire second side is devoted to "live" recording. All five cuts, among them "Put Your Hand in the Hand" and "One Day I Walk", were recorded during three concerts at Ottawa's National Arts Centre on a mobile sixteen track recorder.

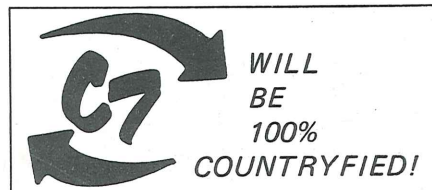

Me Softly", a track which was recorded at the same time as "Danny's Song", for which it was passed over as a single release, and eventually was made a hit by Roberta Flack.

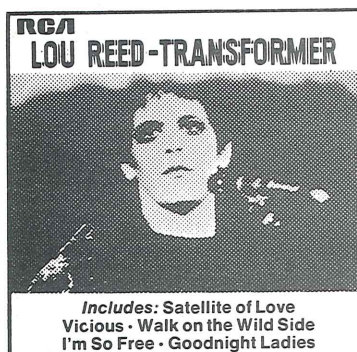

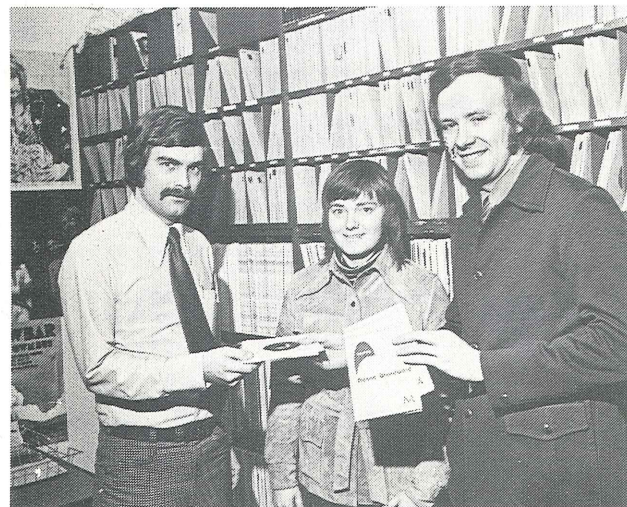

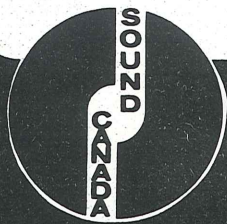
