

Wiffen - Songwriter extraordinaire

David Wiffen is a Canadian and he's a part of the same folk club scene that gave us Joni Mitchell, Gordon Lightfoot, Neil Young, Bruce Cockburn and Murray McLauchlan. His popularity here, although widespread, has not yet reached the plateaus attained by his contemporaries, but the belief is held by many that he is ready for the fame he so richly deserves.

Born in England the son of a civil engineer, David moved to Canada when he was seventeen where he studied music in school and was involved with the campus choir and orchestra as well as taking lessons in guitar and piano. "Then one Day", he says "I saw Big Bill Broonzy on a television program. It compounded my desire to play guitar rather than just strum, strum, strum".

He left school after a brief term and returned to England to live with relatives on a farm. "I was a good farmer", he recalls, "but a little carefree. I treated the tractor like a Formula 8". After a series of accidents involving the equipment, David was shipped back across the Atlantic.

In Toronto, David pursued several odd jobs, none of which worked out. "I just wasn't interested. Then somebody who knew I played guitar and sang took me into a coffee house. I'd never been in one before and was surprised to discover that everybody in there seemed to be a freak like me".

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MECH'CAL RIGHTS SOCIETY TO BE STUDIED BY CAPAC

The Composers, Authors and Publishers Association of Canada (CAPAC) will shortly launch a feasibility study on the possible creation of a national mechanical rights society. This society would be owned and administered by Canadian music publishers, composers and lyric writers.

It should be noted that this move only constitutes a preliminary study to determine if such a national society would be in the best interests of Canadian copyright owners. It will also determine what benefits, if any, this type of society would be to Canadian users of copyright music in the recording, tape and film industries.

The establishment of such a clearing house will depend on the in-depth study and whether copyright owners will be in agreement with their works being administered through a central clearing house rather than individual clearance as is the present procedure.

GRT READIES RELEASE OF KOFFMAN/GREASEBALL LP's

GRT Records has scheduled the release of the new Moe Koffman and Greaseball Boogie Band albums for next week.

The Moe Koffman LP, entitled "Master Session" features adaptations of numbers by such composers as Debussy, Bartok and Mozart.

The Greaseball Boogie Band are awaiting their debut disc, simply entitled "Greaseball Boogie Band". The outrageous greasers have put together a double album, which features some live recordings and apparently captures well the essence of the live appearances that have to be seen to be believed.

COLUMBIA SIGNS THE EDWARDS

Columbia Records have signed Cliff and Ann Edwards to a recording contract. The duo formerly released on the Polydor label. Cliff Edwards is currently showing good chart action with his "Carpenter of Wood" single, his latest effort from Polydor.

The Columbia signing was negotiated by the label's A&R chief, John Williams who is now producing the duo at Manta Sound.

An album and single release is expected by January of next year.

NASHVILLE RELEASES "TOO MANY MEMORIES"

Doug Taylor, A&R man for Marathon Music, reports back from his recent trip down to the CMA Convention in Nashville that their Joe Firth deck, "Too Many Memories", is seeing action on two U.S. labels in Music City.

Nashville recording artists Billy Walker and Bobby Lewis have both recorded the Firth tune, which is continuing to climb up the Canadian country charts.

ADAM MITCHELL SIGNS WITH GRT

GRT Records of Canada has announced the signing of Adam Mitchell to a solo recording career. Best known for his days as lead vocalist and guitarist with the Paupers from 1966-68, Mitchell has of late established a name for himself in producers' circles, working with Mainline, Fludd, McKendree Spring, Linda Ronstadt and most recently the new James Leroy and Denim album.

On the personal side, Adam Mitchell is 28 years old, married with a daughter. Born in Glasgow, Scotland, he now resides in Maple Ontario and takes a big interest in auto racing with his car, a formula Ford, being sponsored by GRT and Sam The Record Man this year. Called "The Lighthouse Special", Adam piloted it to a number of victories and an overall good season.

The first releases for Mitchell were produced by himself in Toronto's Manta Sound and are set for release in about two weeks time.

His debut deck for GRT will be "Jenner By The Sea" f/s "White Sox and Brown Shoes", both self-penned with GRT holding the publishing rights.

Adam Mitchell is currently engaged in a tour with Ian & Sylvia and makes frequent appearances on Ian's CTV Network Show. He will be appearing with Lighthouse on November 16 in Massey Hall.

ALTERNATE SHOWPLACES TIDY UP VANCOUVER

The showcasing monopoly of Pacific National Exhibition buildings is now being threatened by a score of new concert locations in Vancouver. Ballrooms like the Pender and Commodore sprang to life during the summer months. Latest hall to attract attention is the War Memorial Gym at the University of British Columbia. An ambitious Student Alma Mater Society working with city promoters James Conrad and Ken Collinge has presented John Mayall and Cheech & Chong to sell-out crowds in excess of 4,000.

In the summer of 1972, comedy's dynamic duo struck local paydirt with Big Bambu (with a hefty assist from CKLG-FM).

Unfortunately, their long-awaited appearance was only competent, marred by repetition of two passe topics: dope smoking and self-abuse. Laid-back Lenny and Sister Mary Elephant, both familiar characters, were merely offered as tokens to a ravenous audience. Biggest response of the too-short set was saved for a new creation of Cheech & Chong — Alice Bowie of Hope, British Columbia.

Evening opener was "down Souther" Tony Joe White. The man gave forth an incredible forty minutes of swamp boogie and earned a rousing encore with an energetic version of "Polk Salad Annie". A timely switch from acoustic to electric guitar added to a well-structured presentation. Tony Joe White is one of the few self-supporting musician/singers capable of shining brightly at all times. — Richard J. Skelly

SOLID ARRAY OF TALENT SET FOR THE RIVERBOAT

The Riverboat in Toronto, for years a club presenting the finest in folk talent, is winding up this year with a solid line up of established and breaking performers.

Last week was split up between Columbia's David Bromberg (October 29-31) and Warner Brothers' Wendy Waldman (October 29-November 4).

For two weeks starting November 6 and running through to the 18th is United Artists' recently signed David Wiffen, a well-respected songwriter for many years.

The line-up continues with Biff Rose (UA) from the 20th to the 25th; The Good Brothers, with their happy, bluegrass sounds, from the 27th to December 2; singer/songwriter Townes Van Zandt from the 4th to the 9th; and the legendary Sonny Terry and Brownie McGhee (A&M) from the 18th until January 6th.

VASTLY IMPROVED FIRST QUARTER FOR CAPITOL INC.

Capitol Industries Inc., at its annual meeting held October 16, reported net income of \$1,295,000, or 28 cents per share, on sales of \$35,244,000 for the first quarter of fiscal 1974. This compares to net income of \$183,000, or 4 cents per share, on sales of \$30,101,000 during the same period in fiscal 1973. There were 4,580,000 average shares outstanding this year as against 4,579,000 last year. Reporting on first quarter results, Bhaskar Menon, Capitol's President and chief executive officer, said:

"Sales were up 17% over the same period last year, resulting in an increase in net income of 608%. This marks the seventh consecutive quarter in which Capitol's earnings have improved over the comparable quarter of the prior fiscal year.

"The company demonstrated exceptional product success during the quarter when Capitol and Capitol-distributed artists achieved six Top 10 singles and seven Top 10 albums of which eleven received Gold Record awards by the RIAA, five of them during this quarter. Most notably six records reached the number one position on national best-seller charts. Artists represented in these achievements, whose recordings continue to enjoy significant sales, are the Beatles, Grand Funk Railroad, Paul McCartney & Wings, Pink Floyd, Helen Reddy and Leon Russell."

Reviewing prospects for the second quarter ending December 31, 1973, Menon said:

"New album releases scheduled for October and November by such established artists as the Band, Glen Campbell, John Lennon, Paul McCartney & Wings, Steve Miller, Pink Floyd, Ringo Starr and Traffic encourage us to expect excellent sales volume at a time of maximum retail activity."

"However", Menon cautioned, "Capitol shares in full measure the current industry-wide anxiety over growing shortages of essential raw materials - especially vinyl and paper".

He was there because, in his own words, "I always like to attend my own crucifixions", and crucified he was, the industry came bearing hammer and nails and joyfully nailed him to the cross time and again . . . why? Good business I suppose!

The case of Ritchie Yorke is just one example of industry hypocrites, Walt Grealis and RPM have been the targets of almost as many knives; if RPM is such a useless rag then why do you all have subscriptions, why do you all read it and why are you so pleased when your name is printed in it??

**NAT'L FILM BOARD OFF
WITH ROCK DOCUMENTARIES**

Canada's National Film Board will shortly release two documentaries on the rock music scene. The first, concentrating on the world rock music scene and its cultural and sociological impact, is expected to be televised by the CBC-TV Network this month. Some of the world's top acts including the Stones are included in the film.

The second deals with a "cultural revolution" within the Canadian music community. Anchor man for this film is Ritchie Yorke who was responsible for putting together the idea for the Maple Music Junket. Much emphasis is placed on Yorke's awareness of the domestic scene and how he contributed to making Canadian music a part of the world music scene. The latter film will be used as an instructional production for Canadian colleges and might also be screened by the CBC.

The films were produced and directed by Jacques Bensimon, NFB producer.

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Walt, through his publication, has done more to put the Canadian Music business on its feet than just about anyone in the country.

There is work to be done, Gentlemen, this industry needs promoting, the "Baby" needs to be brought up with a strong image and a good reputation, and this duty lies with every one of us, we can all contribute something: if we don't we are going to end up with a teenage industry with a mind of a two year old.

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

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COLUMBIA RECEPTION FOR MORAN—EGERTON'S OCT. 17

Mike Watson and Terry McGee again helped to make you feel right at home as Columbia Records hosted various members of the Toronto music community at a reception for John Moran on the eve of the release of his first album "Come Join Me".

Egerton's in Toronto was filled with a party atmosphere as Moran gave those in attendance a solid evening of entertainment and demonstrated his wide range of musical abilities. He was as equally at ease with the quieter, folky material as he was with the bouncier, more contemporary tunes.

Moran, who has Scottish roots, seems to have taken much of his influence from the Beatles, but it's hard for any contemporary songwriter to ignore the impact and the changes that the Fab Four from Liverpool had on the pop music scene. Moran offers a kind of farewell to the Beatles Golden Age in a tune called "The Beatles Thing", then carries on with an excellent rendition of their "Cry, Baby Cry". A lot of his music is a throwback to the more lyrical, more melody oriented songs that punctuated the British dominated mid-sixties.

But, though Moran does take these roots, he builds on them and brings them up to date and into the seventies. His first single "Come Join Me" is a definite progressive rocker but at the same time it's the kind of song that defies any restrictions of time and place.

For his rather slight build, John Moran can let loose with a powerful commanding voice, but maintains the control necessary to sing the tender, softer numbers. — Peter Taylor

NEW YORK DOLLS - VICTORY THEATRE - TORONTO OCT. 27

As shadowy forms drift across the dimly lit stage amidst the blaring strains of "Valley of The Dolls" (cute!) plugging in cords here and twisting dials there, one is frankly apprehensive as to what is about to happen. After all, isn't this the Toronto debut of the now legendary New York Dolls? Of course, and one look around the audience at the curious array of fans will attest to the fact that this is much more than a concert . . . it's an event!

These short moments of conjecture are immediately shattered by the opening chords and vocal grunts of the first number which, to say the least, is abominable. From this opening, the concert takes a beautiful plunge, that if drawn on a graph would resemble the Dow Jones average some forty-four years earlier. The New York Dolls show at the Victory Theatre in Toronto on October 27 has earned its place among the worst concerts of all time.

The Dolls are horrible and rock music has not experienced such an all time low since the heyday of Blue Cheer. Never before have electric guitars and amplifiers been utilized as torture devices rather than musical instruments!

Camping it up between numbers, the visually outrageous darlings of New York City managed to excite a small percentage

MCA has established itself as the industry leader in two record sets that began with the release of the Who's "Tommy" followed by the rock opera "Jesus Christ Superstar", Neil Diamond's "Hot August Night" and then the original soundtrack from the motion picture version of "Jesus Christ Superstar".

For October, MCA led off with Elton John's "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road" which shipped gold on the 4th. Towards the end of the month the long-awaited Who album "Quadrophenia" was released along with sets by Sonny & Cher, Bill Cosby and the Blues Project.

Also on the twofer (\$6.98) series will be reissues of Freddie Martin, John Wilfahrt and Myron Floren. This series already contains sets by The Andrews Sisters, Brenda Lee, Buddy Holly, Bill Haley, Bert Kaempfert, Lenny Dee, Bing Crosby, Guy Lombardo, The Mills Brothers, Liberace, Lawrence Welk, Billie Holiday, Pete Fountain, Burl Ives, Louis Armstrong, Kitty Wells, Bill Anderson, Patsy Cline, Ernest Tubb and Loretta Lynn.

GINO VANELLI TOURS WITH LIZA MINELLI

The New York Dolls show was the first all-musical program to play the Victory Theatre, a tacky Burlesque Hall that will continue to play host to concerts as well as the regular schedule of strippers. S.R.O. Productions have the exclusive contract to book and promote the music concerts in the Theatre and plan bi-monthly shows on Sunday evenings throughout the winter.

BRUCE COCKBURN — MASSEY HALL — TORONTO/OCT. 19

Today when it seems that to have a successful concert one must dress in outlandish costumes and do a couple of knee drops on one's guitar, an evening with Bruce Cockburn would come as a very relaxing change. Well, such an evening was to be had on Friday, October 19 in Toronto's Massey Hall, and it will be long remembered by those in attendance as the unpretentious celebration of life that it was.


Accompanying himself on guitar, Appalachian dulcimer, piano and lip trumpet, Cockburn mesmerized the capacity crowd, who responded after every number with thunderous applause. His melodic voice, intricate guitar work and warm stage presence transformed the expanse of the hall into a close, almost personal relationship that is a distinctive quality of his earlier coffee-house circuit days.

The performance lasted almost two hours with a brief intermission separating the two superb sets. The seven minutes or so of the new, instrumental "Islands In A Black Sky" was enough to reassure the audience that Cockburn is one of the finest guitarists anywhere and that his technical virtuosity is nothing short of brilliant. But, mere manual mastery is not enough and Cockburn steps over that line between instrumental prowess and enters the realm of the creative artist, not just playing someone else's notes, but creating his own moods, images and lyrical passages.

Cockburn offered the audience material from his latest True North album, "Night Vision", but also dug into his past and played a number of his older tunes such as: "My Lady and My Lord", "Sunwheel Dance" and a rousing, communal version of "For The Birds".

"Night Vision" is Cockburn's fourth album for the True North label and is already shaping up to be his best, both commercially and artistically. The audience on the 19th responded well to the new material, especially "Never So Few" and "Deja Vu". — Tim Notter

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ARTISTS...Getting down to business

Promoting a group? The very thought must send a chill down the spines of most people in the music business in Canada. It is seldom accomplished. It is often attempted - badly and usually un-promotes the group.

Now, please bear in mind that I am referring to the promotion of a group by the manager or the group themselves - not about record

company promotion of a record. I will cover that subject in a future column.

There must be ten thousand groups across Canada that would like to work, be booked by a known agent or make a record. What they have to offer is, their talent, their body and face, and sometimes some original material. Wishing will not make it so.

So the group and/or manager talk about how hard it is to become known. They say the business won't give them a break. They complain - and they do nothing.

They may get around to affording 8X10 glossies, or they may have poor quality photos reproduced on cheap paper. This is the extent of their press kit out of which they hope they will be discovered, booked and recorded.

Well, the group "isn't in business", because if they were, they would look at themselves as a new underarm deodorant or a garbage disposal unit and do what is done in business - promote and advertise the product.

The industry is greatly at fault in listening to and commiserating with the "hapless". They encourage the poor waives to think they are hard done by because no one will give them a break.

Breaks are to be had. There are quite a few

of them, and a number of groups and artists have had them. These breaks came by working hard at selling the product with promotion, publicity and advertising.

Like the sexy lady sitting on the windowsill of a bordello waving customers in - the group must learn that their services cannot be in demand, unless the service is known.

The garbage the industry puts out would lead any artist to believe his talent is in demand. It isn't true. There is more talent around than anyone would care to book, record or give a break to. The biggest asset a group can have is their ability to not only perform, but perform in the marketplace and sell themselves to the booker, record company and finally (when they hit the stage) the public.

Artists are known to cry a great deal. If they could put that energy into a good presentation, and good press releases, or a good demo, they might, someday, hear op-

FESTIVAL SINGERS' 20TH ANNIVERSARY

The 1973-74 season of the Festival Singers of Canada, which commenced on October 27, marks the 20th anniversary of Canada's only professional choir.

The choral group, under the direction of conductor Elmer Iseler, has added much in the past 20 years to the Canadian Music scene with impeccable performances. The credit for the consistency of performance rests largely with the founder, Dr. Iseler, who, noted for his determination to create a choir of musical purity and polish, has propelled his group of 36 voices to international acceptance.

Dr. Iseler formed the choral ensemble in 1954 with the original choir numbering 32 and known as Festival Singers of Toronto. During the two decades of development, not only did the quality of performance improve, but milestones were reached that

The next Anne Murray album is slated for release in March of next year.



Spurred on by the success of the first Progressive Music Lovers Symposium, Scott Richards and his MCA promotion team bowed the brand new double album set by the Who, "Quadrophenia", on Thursday, October 25.

Another full house were given the royal treatment as the album played amid the relaxed party. After the album was previewed in its entirety, the progressive music lovers settled down to watch "Charley Varrick", an MCA distributed feature film about an unlucky bank robber who unwittingly rips off the Mafia for three quarters of a million dollars.

"Quadrophenia" is another major work from the mind of Pete Townshend who gave us "Tommy". Like "Tommy", "Quadrophenia" is a concept album that tells the story of a young lad named Jimmy who is going slowly insane. The music is very intricate and quite advanced from the days in which the Who used to smash up all

To use a show biz cliche . . . as luck would have it, the regular entertainer at the club didn't show up and David got his chance to play for the people.

"I never liked to travel anywhere. I'd rather stay in one place for awhile if there's anything in it. A friend called from Calgary one day and asked me if I was coming out. I was half asleep, but must have told him yes because I found myself on my way there. I also stayed in Vancouver for a year or two working up a local reputation before moving back to Toronto".

After a length of time spent working Toronto clubs David headed out west again to play the Winnipeg-Regina-Saskatoon circuit, ultimately managing a coffee house in Calgary. He recalls, "all of the Canadian folk musicians passed through there . . . Bruce Langhorne, Brent Titcombe, Joni Anderson . . . she later married and became Joni Mitchell".

Returning to performing, David played throughout the Northwest, "singing in front of various bad bands" as he puts it, though one of those bands won a contest that included a trip to Montreal. "I just considered it a ticket back home".

David's next venture was to join 3's A Crowd, an established and quite popular band whose personnel included Brent Titcombe, Bruce Cockburn and Trevor Veitch. They played at Expo '67 in the Ontario and Canadian National pavilions and were discovered by Denny Doherty and Cass Elliot of the Mamas and the Papas. A recording contract with Dunhill Records was arranged and an album released.

David remembers that, "Donna, one of our singers, got quite sick and we were all a little hesitant to work in bars, so we broke up. Then a television show was up for grab-

He was signed briefly to Fantasy Records where an album was cut, with much enthusiasm by the company and although it was released in Canada, only promotion copies were issued in the States and it was never made available for sale in retail outlets.

Wiffen's reputation though, remained in the consciousness of those who had been exposed to it. As a composer he has won the admiration of many of his peers in the music industry. In recent years his material has been recorded by such luminaries as Anne Murray, Tom Rush, Eric Anderson, Ian & Sylvia, Jerry Jeff Walker, Roger McGuinn and Harry Belafonte.

As a performer David has begun to redevelop his style and adjust his mental attitude toward his music. The results can be evidenced in his performances on stage. He is a polished professional, a first rate entertainer and his vocal/instrumental capabilities are excellent.

The first David Wiffen album for United Artists, "Coast to Coast Fever" was produced in Toronto by his old friend, Bruce Cockburn. It contains ten songs, seven of which are self-penned, including the single culled from the album, "Coast to Coast Fever" f/s "Full Circle".

Since October 17, Wiffen has been engaged in a tour of Eastern Canada, including a date at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario with Neil Young and culminating in a two-week stint at Toronto's Riverboat November 6 until 18.

**DIAMOND ALBUM MAKES
COLUMBIA HISTORY**

The timing would appear to be perfect for the Columbia release of Neil Diamond's *Jonathon Livingston Seagull*. Initial orders have made this set a guaranteed pressing of 75,000 units with more than half of these going to fill back orders. The beautifully laid out booklet and poster, included in the album, caused some difficulty with the Canadian company who imported an initial 25,000 copies followed by another 25,000. They have now arranged with Parr's Print and Litho to reproduce the booklet here in Canada, with an initial order for 25,000.

National sales manager, Bert Dunseith, has never experienced the kind of enthusiasm from his people as he has on the Diamond album. The Vancouver office was the first in for an initial order of 10,000. Eddy Colero, Ontario branch manager submitted a conservative order for 15,000 and the rest of the country, although enthusiastic, are being cautious which could add to the importance of the set on shipping.

There had been some alarm over the recent legal action taken by JLS writer Bach and Diamond against the producer of the film but apparently this won't have any effect on the release label and at time of writing the movie is still set for an early November opening across Canada.

Brian Cassidy, Promotion Manager for Stamp Records, left Vancouver October 17 for a fourteen day tour of Western Canadian radio stations carrying with him three new Stamp singles. Cassidy planned to cover all format areas with Ken Stoltz "You Were My Home" (pop, country) and Patti MacDonnell's self-penned first for the label, "One Night Stand". Both records are currently breaking throughout the east as a result of the promotion work of Quality's Owens. Stamp Records are manufactured and distributed by Quality.

On the contemporary side is Scott Jarrett's just-released debut "Maryanne". Stamp is pinning high international regards on Jarrett, a talented all-round writer/Performer whose musical excursions have been deep and varied, ranging from experience with his highly-respected jazz pianist brother Keith through to his own, unique style of folk-rock.

While on the road, Cassidy is consolidating bookings for upcoming western province tours by Jarrett and John Laughlin. Laughlin, who has just returned to Vancouver from Toronto via a week-long engagement at the Hovel Club in Edmonton, is currently in production with Stamp contemporary producer Stu Kuby. A Laughlin follow-up to his first singles "Changes In The Weather" and "Do What You Can", from the album "Morning Moon", is slated for early November.

Also scheduled for a November release are initial singles from the Vancouver-based group Sugar Babe and solo artist Richard Stepp, former drummer and lead vocalist with The Northwest Company.

**FILM ON PINK FLOYD
DEBUTS IN MONTREAL**

The Alouette Theatre in Montreal will be the site of the North American premier of the new Pink Floyd film on November 2.

Entitled "Pink Floyd at Pompeii", it was originally shot as a European television program, but has since been expanded to feature film length. The German-French production features the band performing cuts from their "Dark Side Of The Moon" and "Meddle" LP's as well as interview segments with Messrs. Gilmour, Waters, Mason and Wright.

RIMSKY-KORSAKOV The Tsar's Bride

The Tsar's Bride is the tenth opera by Rimsky-Korsakov and received its first performance in 1899 in Moscow. Of his sixteen operas, only the Golden Cockerel has found some degree of popularity. The excellent cast of this Bolshoi Theater production is headed by Galina Vishnevskaya as Marfa, the daughter of Sobakin, a Novgorod Merchant, sung by Yevgeny Nesterenko. The cast also includes Irina Arkhipova and Andrei Sokolov. Russian opera achieved its greatest popularity outside of Russia under Beecham in his Covent Garden productions in pre-war years and one wonders if anyone will have the flair to make them successful with western audiences again. It is rather tragic to think that this fine performance will be treated to an early retirement from the catalogue due to a general lack of curiosity and interest in Russian opera.





The album says "five great tone poems". HEAVY. But here they all are: The Pines of Rome, The Fountains of Rome, The Birds, (no connection to Hitchcock's movie of the same name), Church Windows, and Feste Romane. The material in this set has all been available on separate discs before (M 30829, MS 6587, and MS 7242). The Birds is an orchestral scoring of a group of early airs and dances assembled from works by Pasquini, Rameau, Jacques de Gallot and others. The Philadelphia Orchestra has the lush tone and virtuosity called for in these cineramic works and the recorded sound remains faithful to the originals.

GEORG PHILIPP TELEMANN Scenes from Old Hamburg
 Instrumental Ensemble der Archiv-Produktion
DGG 2538 263

This album from DGG is titled "Telemannia" and is a collection of instrumental movements by Georg Philipp Telemann excerpted from "The Constant Music-Master" and sub-titled Scenes from Old-Hamburg. Actually it is a kind of eighteenth century "Looney Tunes". Twenty-seven brief selections are played on such instruments as Recorder, Traversfiole, Oboe d'amore, Trumpet, Violin, Viola pomposa, Gamba, Trombone and Organ. The ensemble is under the direction of Josef Ulsamer. The Telemann revival which got off to a flying start ten or fifteen years ago seems to have leveled off and perhaps this collection of scatty little ditties might trigger it off again, who knows?

So many Messiahs. But one can understand Deutsche Grammophon entering a new version in their catalogue as their only previous version was sung in German. Their new English version is a strong contender for a top position, being neither overly grandiosus in the Victorian tradition, or precious in the highly ornamented, small scale modern style. The John Alldis Choir is meaty and incisive and combine with the London Philharmonic Orchestra to give the work a manly, forthright profile. The soloists maintain a high standard of excellence throughout, and the continuo is musically handled by Harpsichordist Hedwig Bilgram. The trumpet solo in "The Trumpet shall sound" is brilliantly performed by Gordon Webb. The work is performed complete, without the traditional cuts.



FRANZ LISZT Hungarian Rhapsodies (complete)

Roberto Szidon scored a great triumph with his complete recordings of the Scriabin Sonatas for DGG last season. He now follows it up with an even more brilliant set containing the 19 Hungarian Rhapsodies by Franz Liszt and, as a bonus, the magnificent Rhapsodie espagnole in its original solo version (it was later arranged by Busoni for piano and orchestra, and has been frequently recorded in that form). Top flight recording enhances the colourful glitter of Szidon's stylish playing. Indeed his high success with several of the less frequently played Rhapsodies makes one wonder at their neglect. A whale of a set which should not be missed by any piano buff.

Dave Chadwick's brief read to CRTC

The late Dave Chadwick had been scheduled to appear at the CRTC public hearings in Ottawa Monday Oct 29 to present his brief on the Commission's FM proposals. Mr. Chadwick suffered a fatal heart attack Oct 24. Walt Grealis, publisher of RPM appeared before the hearing to read Mr. Chadwick's brief which follows.

To begin with I would like to list several points in the proposed policy with which I agree wholeheartedly: quality and diversity as broad programming objectives, an end to simulcasting requirements for better-informed air personalities, and an end to background music and automation.

The Commission faces a grave problem when it comes to encouraging new types of radio programming without stifling creativity in the process. The licensee now running a jukebox FM station seems likely to be unmoved by anything short of very specific instructions from the Commission, yet if a rigid rule is instituted it might not be appropriate for FM stations from coast to coast, as some markets have only one station and Southern Ontario has over twenty. One of the few rules that might be workable is a minimum "live" content requirement that would encourage more live music or coverage of other events on a live, remote basis. But more specific definitions of what a program is and how much of it should be aired appears to be exactly what is not required. Perhaps the correct middle path would be to set up several broad areas, for example: quality, diversity, community and creativity and to ask the licensee to file statements showing how his overall schedule is providing quality, diversity, community access, creativity and so on. This would be preferable to setting up rigid definitions of these words by the Commission.

SMILE RECORDS

There seems to be an indication that the Commission is wrestling with the problem of commercial involvement in FM radio and coming up with no solution. It is the Commission's stated goal to award licenses to community groups and it must be agreed that Canadians should have an "open" medium of this kind. However, the television equivalent of community FM (namely local Cable TV) has been less than successful. In general, Canadians are not accepting this type of programming and local Cable TV shows are therefore (because of audience rejection) contributing very little to the fabric of Canadian life. It would perhaps be a mistake to award too many licenses to community groups for their FM stations, although one per market might be more appropriate.

The other alternative the Commission would appear to be exploring is to have the minority audience programming of FM stations subsidized by AM stations. This is fine (within limits) but would be undesirable to see every FM station fall into the hands of AM operators, which is the direction in which we seem to be moving. New licensees should be encouraged to enter the field. Larger markets should be able to support independent commercial FM stations. Large broadcast companies often stifle creativity and programming ideas. In smaller stations, program managers provide fertile ground for new programming. Providing very specific content rules for FM station affiliates with rich AM counterparts assumes that the Commission "knows all" and would make it difficult, in future, to upgrade AM programming since the AM station would be committed to supporting the FM station. It would be far better to have two licensees -- one for FM and one for AM, and let both program with high standards.

It appears from reading the policy that the Commission is very suspicious of commercial radio, and is promoting the fringe areas of programming to show displeasure with current deejay format radio on AM. Actually, it would be more advantageous for the Commission to be working hand in hand with commercial radio to improve it, instead of talking about heavy legislation to rush it into the area the Commission thinks it should occupy. The Commission should learn what commercial broadcasters already know: that there is an audience for most anything and that you can create your own audience, convert them to your philosophy and then open their minds to new endeavours. But this doesn't mean that every FM station can suddenly become like CBC Radio -- a type

of programming that has been shown to have only a small audience. We have CBC AM and FM, now what else new can we add to the Canadian Broadcasting System? We have commercial radio in a well-established position. Can we not take advantage of the expertise of commercial radio in reaching audiences instead of blowing the structure up at its roots? A drastic content regulation for FM could only further enrich AM stations, or cause erosion of listeners to the American FM stations which seem to increase wattages almost daily.

There has been a suggestion that one of the problems with AM radio is their two and a half minute format which might be replaced on FM with a seven and a half minute format. Much could be accomplished if we could take an audience of one million AM listeners and triple their attention span from two and a half minutes to seven and a half minutes. But, very little would be accomplished if you attempted to extend the span to one hour and in the process lose ninety percent of the audience. In other words, restructure commercial radio within its present areas of service rather than a massive changeover which will only enrich present AM formats and U.S. stations while still not reaching Canadians with new information and enlightenment.

The Commission would appear to be suspicious of "formats", but perhaps only because of a lack of understanding. While a "format" is what causes one station to play twenty-four hour background music - and this seems to be the problem, "formats" are very valuable. Indeed, essential to modern day radio. Radio is the everywhere, always accessible medium -- available twenty-four hours daily and in every location: homes, cars, outdoors, portable. It is designed to be used in situations where other activities are happening at the same time. Given such a starting point, it is clear that consistency is desirable for a radio station to serve its audience best. With one or two stations in a market, they will have to be "all things to all men", but when we talk of "creating new audiences" or "exposing audiences to new things" we are presupposing that the station concerned is specializing in serving a small segment of the community. Programs of various types should be scheduled of course, but all aiming at serving the same type of target listener. It would be very difficult to justify a schedule that changes totally from one type of audience to another at each hour of the day (small markets excluded) since unless the

CAB FIRST ON AGENDA FOR CRTC HEARINGS

The Canadian Association of Broadcasters, obviously trying hard to soft sell the CRTC on not making too many waves for future FM programming, didn't quite make it. Their presentation was informative, smooth and well paced — but the Commission wasn't buying it. Noted one observer: "The CAB came with their hat in their hand, but it was the wrong size."

The CAB reps emphasized that they agreed in principle with the FM proposals as suggested by the CRTC but what they were doing as FM programmers wasn't really out of line too much, and they thought perhaps the Commission should look at each market individually.

FM has long been the backward child of broadcasting — and always running at a deficit so it was only understandable that the broadcasters would be concerned with rigid regulations that could create further financial problems in the operation of FM stations. It was pointed up that some FM programmers have, over the past couple of years, launched into creative programming that has appealed to other than AM listeners and that the future for financial achievement looked brighter.

With a well prepared presentation such as that from the CAB, the audience appeared to be waiting for someone to put their foot in it — and it happened. It was indicated

by the CAB that it would be difficult to find experts in music in other than larger centres who could present in-depth FM broadcasting of the calibre the CRTC was expecting. This apparently was too much for vice-chairman Harry Boyle. He reminded the CAB reps of the number of people graduating from music academies each year across Canada and how less than 5% are given a chance in the broadcast industry. The CAB people continued with their small town example but Boyle indicated that most of the complaints he receives are from small towns.

Boyle was highly critical of the blandness of radio and suggested that "People are talking more and saying less. We're living in a world of danger and problems, but there seems to be a diminution of background. How do you manage somehow or other to understand what's going on in the world if all the information, at least in the electronic media, comes to you in chopped up, pasteurized, homogenized, blenderized bits and pieces?" He went on to suggest that listeners would like to be involved with events as they were happening: e.g. the moonshots, the Peking visit, Watergate hearings, housing shortages — radio as a teller of all things — a newspaper of the air. Both Boyle and Juneau were "right on" in their questioning of those who took part in the hearings while the other members of the Commission tried hard to look interested but really contributed very little.

ONTARIO PREMIER DOES IT ON CFRB

Ontario Premier William Davis will have a chance to talk about things other than politics when he exchanges opinions with CFRB's Bill McVean and Bob Hesketh on the station's "Dialogue". The show will be aired week of Nov 5.

The CFRB duo have taken this unique twist with a politician which should present a rare view of the human side of one of Canada's most powerful provincial leaders. The show is aired Monday through Friday at 10:07AM and 6:50PM.

BETTY KENNEDY PRESENTS SHOWS ON CHINA VISIT

"China Today", a series of interviews and discussions taped during Prime Minister Trudeau's recent trip to the People's Republic of China were presented on CFRB's "Betty Kennedy Show", October 29 through November 2.

On the Monday, Betty Kennedy spoke with Canadian Ambassador Small; Tuesday an interview with Dr. Lin Chiao Chih, possibly the most famous doctor in China today; Wednesday a panel of veteran newsmen discussed various phases of Chinese society; Thursday John Burns of the Globe and Mail, called by many the most astute observer in Peking, discussed several topics on China, including the possibility of a new cultural revolution.

Friday, November 2, Betty presented an exclusive radio interview with Margaret

CFRB has scheduled Sunday Nov 4th at 2PM for the airing of a Guy Lombardo Special. The special was prepared by Gene Lees during the famous bandleader's recent engagement at the Royal York Hotel.

Lees, who is president of Kanata Records, has long been a part of the Canadian writing community having been an editor of Downbeat Magazine as well as having by-lines in several other magazines and newspapers. He has also rubbed shoulders with many of the big names in the music world and has been involved in writing lyrics for several including Frank Sinatra.

Lombardo, a native of London, Ontario, crashed onto the scene in 1927, a couple of years before the "big crash". Somehow he was able to survive and forty-six years later brings CFRB listeners up to date on his rise to fame. Lombardo also discusses his favourite hobby - speedboat racing.

Trudeau. Taped during the return flight, Mrs. Trudeau discussed her role as the wife of the Prime Minister, whether or not she will participate actively in future political campaigns and her feelings about being a mother. Also on Friday, Prime Minister Trudeau summed up his feeling about the first official visit of the Canadian P.M. to the People's Republic of China.

PRIVATE SECTOR OFFERED CBC FM

During questioning by CRTC Chairman Pierre Juneau of the CAB representatives at the recent FM proposal hearing in Ottawa, he asked if the private broadcasters would have any objection to sharing FM programming with the CBC. CAB spokesman Bill Ballantine of CKFM Toronto could see no objection to this type of service in areas where it would be appropriate and indicated that this would be investigated fully at the Association's planned seminar to be held later this month.

Ironically, a short time later, CBC representatives R.C. Fraser, Jack Craine and Lorenzo Godin pitched the Commission on sharing some of its FM programs. This would be available after the CRTC has announced a new broadcast policy.

DUGUAY LAUNCHES "ROCK OF CANADA"

Ottawa programmer Gary Duguay has launched an interesting programming series tagged "Rock Of Canada". The series is being touted in foreign markets for those programmers who would like to bring their listeners up to date on the Canadian record scene. Available in either mono or stereo, each program runs approximately five minutes, depending on the length of the song featured. The feature can also be adapted as a sales item with the format structured for commercial content as required. As well, on-air promotional spots, tailored for individual station's identity, are available at no extra charge. The series, thirteen or twenty-six weeks, may be logged as "Educational" in the U.S. under F.C.C. Regulations.

The first "Rock of Canada" feature, containing five new shows per week, will be available for broadcast Jan 1/74.





schedule can be easily remembered the listener just rejects the programming and turns on AM radio. We don't need an end to formats - just better formats. Top 40 formats were designed to reach a large number of people on a superficial level -- now it's time to develop formats that assume listeners as being intelligent and aware, and concentrate on serving those needs. Commercial broadcasters, with formats, bring overall direction to programming and enable the station to "carve out that new audience".

Music is now the backbone of FM radio. Music should remain, to attract the listener, and additional structuring of information and programming done to "widen his mind" as the Commission puts it. But the Commission should recognize that many programs will be short features of ten minutes or less, and longer blocks of several hours will have a good percentage of music content.

Perhaps the only distinction the Commission should make is between a program and a music format and ask stations to show how each hour or piece of content fits, either the "program" category or "rolling format" category. The creative possibilities are endless if the Commission keeps an open mind. On the other hand, it would be very easy for the Commission to impose rigid rules that would restrict programming to narrow appeal. The listener wants music first and foremost.

The music should be a "hook" that attracts the audience to the FM station, so that the station can then slip in the new information to "widen his mind". But if the music isn't there as the "hook" the listener won't be there to have his mind widened.

From all this I would like to suggest that the Commission not regulate the programming of FM stations, but as an alternative, issue guidelines to broadcasters based on the FM proposals and the briefs presented here at these hearings. These guidelines to be in effect for one year. Broadcasters can then indicate to the Commission, in that year, what can be done on the basis of the proposals and if their performance does in fact improve programming on FM, the guidelines can be extended. If FM programming is not improved by the guidelines, it would then be the time to look at the proposals and prepare regulations on the basis of what we have learned in this one year "dry run" of the FM proposals.

As for Canadian content on FM, the same rule should apply. The programmers should be left to arrive at and state the amount of Canadian content they can provide on FM. If in a year's time, the Canadian content of FM does not provide enough Canadian content to satisfy the Broadcast Act, a definite percentage should be regulated in the same way AM programming is regulated. This will give the broadcaster the chance to prove that programming can improve and meet the requirements without regulation.



BEST EVER SEASON FOR CANADIAN OPERA COMPANY

The 25th Anniversary Season of the Canadian Opera Company closed on Saturday, October 13 with a record-breaking box office sale of approximately \$731,000, Opera Company General Director Herman Geiger-Torel announced. The previous record was set in the 1972 season which brought in \$568,918.

Overall attendance for the six-opera, 34 performance season was 87% representing a total of 99,167 people. There were seven standing room only performances: two for "The Merry Widow", three for "Rigoletto" and two for "The Barber of Seville".

The 1974 season will again include six different evenings of opera divided evenly between revivals and new productions. Gounod's "Faust", Bizet's "Carmen" and Verdi's "La Traviata" are the revivals. Scheduled for first production by the Canadian Opera are Wagner's "The Flying Dutchman", "Boris Godunov" by Mussorgsky and a double bill of Ravel's "L'Heure Espagnol" and Bartok's "Bluebeard's Castle".



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
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
