Unlike his usual six to nine morning show, Nov. 14th was filled with many surprising interruptions. Kicking it all off was a "march through" the studio by the Regina Lions Gregarian Band (of which Sandison is an active Lions Band Committee member). After a rousing "For He's A Jolly Good Fellow" which must have caused a few raised eyebrows of Sandison's faithful early risers, the band marched out and in walked the CKCK staff along with H.A. Crittenden, Vice-President of Armadale Communications. Station Manager, Ron Lamborn, did a wild dance and laid an anniversary gift and cake on the by now "blubbing" Sandison, and again the radio audience must have been wondering what kind of a day it was and should they go to work or return to bed. Production Manager Doug Alexander saved the day. He read several telegrams and letters from well wishers and invited Sandison and his wife Margie and family out for a special Armadale dinner. By now Sandison's faithful thousands had regained their cool and joined the "fun making" which had just begun.

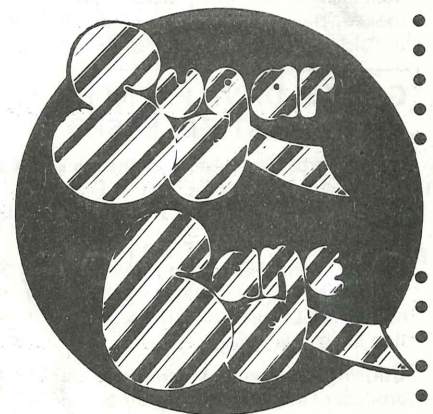

TORONTO'S PRESS GETS IT ON WITH CANADIAN TALENT

Toronto's consumer press, the Star and Globe and Mail, would appear to be getting "tuned in" to Canadian talent. This past week, both papers gave excellent coverage to Canadian recording artists.

The Toronto Star outdid itself with a front page "Entertainment" section devoted to Murray McLauchlan, plus a very favourable review of his True North album, "Day To Day Dust" by Bruce Kirkland. The review was headed "McLauchlan back to full strength in new album".

Ironically, in the same issue, Sam The Record Man ran a large showcase ad on McLauchlan's album and showcased his previous sets, "Song From The Street" and "Murray McLauchlan".

The feature story on McLauchlan was put together by Marci McDonald, one of Toronto's too few entertainment writers having an unusual perceptiveness of the business. She entered McLauchlan's world which happens to be nestled in Toronto's famed Cabbagetown. Wrote Marci: "He boogles around his big open warehouse space spotted with antique junk, pottery, plants and his own painting, a piano on one wall, a ping-pong table taking up half the floor, hiding a fey sardonic shyness behind wire-rimmed shades, a '50s dude white sport coat over torn jeans, one bony knee poking through and an uncommon uneasiness about why it's taking the sake so long to warm up."

The McDonald interview revealed to the "lady of print" a giant poze by McLauchlan and tagged him "At 25, far too young to know the kind of things he sings about. They're songs about junkies and winos, about empty old men and deluded dreamers, about loners trying to be true to themselves and each other, and ladies taking lonely walks on midnight streets, trying to be born again. But mostly they're songs about getting through from day to day and pay to pay and some of the prices along the road."

Marci also got into other things about McLauchlan that many writers have overlooked. His early life as one of six kids born in Paisley, Scotland to a Presbyterian Scot

GARY & DAVE FRENCH COVER JUST RELEASED

Axe Records has announced the release of a French cover version of Gary & Dave's highly successful "Could You Ever Love Me Again" single.

The deck, entitled "Reste Encore Aupres De Moi" is the first recording by twelve year old Michel Lesage with the French translation by Jacqui Amar.

Utilizing the original instrumental tracks, producer Greg Hambleton completed the vocal tracks in Montreal at Studio 6 and Tempo Studios with the final mix being done at Toronto Sound.

Hambleton predicts that the record will be very big in Quebec and already reports outstanding initial orders since the release last week.

father. About coming to Canada when he was five years of age and the problems of "getting it on" in a new country. She also reported the perfect picture of McLauchlan doing his own thing which brought him, more by accident than design, into the record business and a success pattern that has been molded by Bernie Finklestein. The McDonald interview also brought to light that McLauchlan is married — and has been for six years to Patti Sockwell.

A very revealing and timely story for McLauchlan who has just completed a North American tour with Neil Young and is now capable of pulling capacity houses on his own hook — his most recent being Ottawa's National Arts Centre. His single, "Hurricane Of Change" and album, "Day To Day Dust" have become top selling items for Columbia and are making good moves up the RPM charts.

The Globe's Blaik Kirby presented an unusually complimentary piece on RCA's David Clayton Thomas, perhaps not the best of representatives of the Canadian recording industry but nevertheless Canadian. "Close To Home" gains a lot of its strength from the songwriting abilities of Buster Fykes and Rick Knight and both of Alabama's successful singles, "Song Of Love" and "Highway Driving" are included.

THREE CITY PROMOTION TOUR FOR BOB RUZICKA

He begins in Montreal on December 13 and will spend five days on the tour winding up in Winnipeg on the 18th. His schedule will include the regular run of station visits and press interviews as well as television appearances on Cliff Edwards' "Sing A Good Song" and Elwood Glover's "Luncheon Date".

EDWARDS READIES TELEVISION SERIES

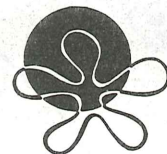
Cliff Edwards, coasting on the charts with his Polydor single, "Carpenter Of Wood" (2065 203) is tidying up final negotiations for his television series, "Sing A Good Song". Anchor station for the series will be CFCF-TV in Montreal with syndication, so far, being picked up by Global for Ontario.

Edwards begins taping Dec. 13 with special emphasis on Canadian guests. These include Michael Tarry, Lorence Hud and Bob Ruzicka. A special New Year's show will showcase John Allan Cameron and the Good Brothers. The thirty minute program will be aired at 5:30PM mid-week.

Edwards has completed mixing several cuts at Toronto's Manta Studios. These include five cuts as a solo and one with his wife Ann. He will be mixing some of these cuts in New York and returns to the studios in January to complete his first album for Columbia with a hoped for single release in January.


On the Polydor front, it's expected to release another single from Edwards' album, "Carpenter Of Wood". The single will be a Ken Tobias penning, "My Songs Are Sleeping" with the flip, "Say Goodbye To Ann", written by Marty Cooper.

Much of Edwards' radio strength has come from country and pop stations however, with the Christmas season moving in and with programmers looking for Canadian content, "Carpenter" looks good for breaking into the contemporary rock market.

issue. The crisis at the post office won't be resolved for some time, and the best advice I can give anyone who wants their RPM on time, is a FIRST CLASS subscription. Although the cost is more, and the handling here at RPM is far more complicated, first class subscribers do get their RPMs on the Monday prior to the issue date.

This is the only solution for the problem. For what it is worth, you might write a letter to your postmaster, but like many other things, our postal system just can't keep up with the amount of mail they must handle and magazines and papers will continue to arrive late.

JUNO AWARDS POLICIES ARE FIRM

Last year after the Juno Awards were held, we asked the trade to make any suggested changes in the categories, nominations and voting policies.

After ten years, we have learned a great deal about polls and the Awards and many of the suggestions were just not logistically or economically possible. Many of the suggestions were very good and in the past eight months we have met and worked out the best possible scheme on the basis of what is possible. The Awards will never satisfy everyone's particular needs, but the same rules apply to everyone and above all the results of the voting reflect what the industry feels. The votes are counted and recounted and the accurate results are what determine the winners. A rash of phone calls just lately have indicated there are many who would like the Awards custom tailored to their personal interests. It is not possible at this point to add a couple of dozen categories and it is also impossible to diminish the meaning of the Awards. The Awards are a barometer of the popularity of many artists in many areas. We would like to accommodate everyone and allow everyone to be a winner. We would also like to have a computer at RPM that could be used for other things but it just isn't feasible.

Trying to influence RPM seems like a

terrible waste of time. It would be time better spent trying to influence the industry out there. They make the stars and they do all the voting. We at RPM don't have the privilege of one single vote. The industry knows who the stars are, and if they don't ... it really isn't an industry.

I hope you all win ... but then it wouldn't mean anything.

PRINTING COSTS CONTINUE TO RISE

In the past six months, the cost of paper, ink and labour has forced the printing costs of RPM up 45%. In September, RPM increased advertising rates 25% to accommodate the increase. Since that time there has been a further increase. In an attempt to maintain our ad rates at a reasonable level, we are attempting to scale down in other areas where possible and we are sincerely hopeful that we won't have to increase our ad rates again unless further increases are experienced.

CERTIFICATION OF GOLD LEAF AWARDS

For five years we have been certifying outstanding record sales with our Gold Leaf Awards. This is the only standardized system of Awards for record sales in Canada. Many record companies have indicated to the industry that they have achieved Canadian Gold by certifying with the Gold Leaf Awards Trust Fund. Again, this is an indication of the artists and records that sell in Canada. It might interest record companies and the industry to see the list of outstanding records of 1972. It appears on page 29 of this issue.

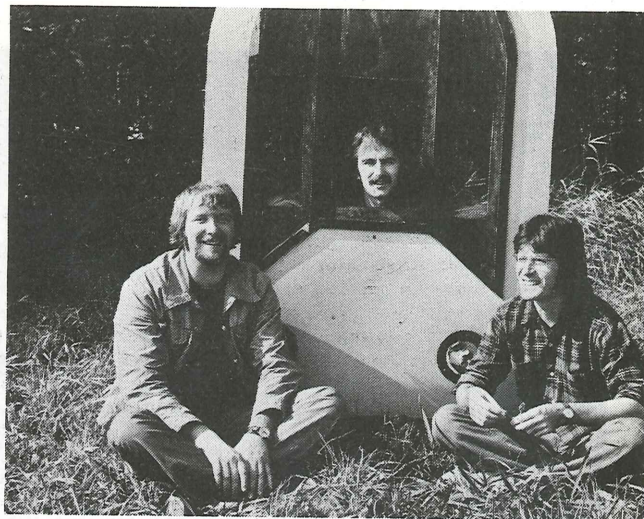

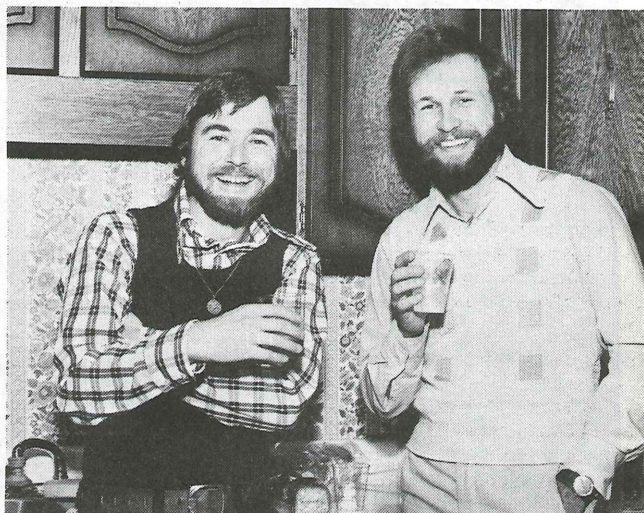

Last week Daffodil Recording artists Fludd completed an American distribution deal through Sire Records. The first deck out in the States is their highly successful "Cousin Mary". LUNCHEON DATE'S SONNY CAULFIELD WITH BOOT

On November 2nd Stompin' Tom Connors married the former Lena Welsh on Elwood Glover's Luncheon date on the CBC Network. In honour of his bride, Connors wrote a new song, "Trading Hearts" which was performed by Luncheon Date's featured entertainer, Sonny Caulfield.

The public response to the song was overwhelming, and Boot Records is rush releasing "Trading Hearts" by Sonny Caulfield this week. The single is backed by another Stompin' Tom song, "Christmas Angel".

The recording was done in Toronto with the Luncheon Date Trio of Jimmy Amaro on bass, Bruce Farquhar on drums and Sonny Caulfield on piano. The three musicians were augmented by Bobby Edwards who sat in on guitar.

Caulfield has been a professional entertainer for 17 years in both his native Montreal and later in Toronto. For the past several seasons he has performed daily on the Glover program.

His music has been mostly sentimental numbers aimed at the MOR audience, while his own preference includes country. With all his years in the music business it really is surprising to learn that the Boot deck is Caulfield's first recording. He explains that he shunned the recording industry until now, because he was not sure the distribution of Canadian records was to the advantage of the artist. Since this situation has changed in recent years, he feels the time is right for his first record.

Larry also informs us that progressive FM and campus stations are very high on the spoken word comedy albums from Mel Brooks and Carl Reiner, "2000 and Thirteen", George Carlin, "Occupation: Foole" and Burns and Schreiber's "Pure B.S."

On almost everybody's collective tongue these days is the Bob Dylan/Band tour and Capitol Records have announced that they will be releasing two new albums by The Band within the next six months. One of these will be a live album recorded at the monumental Watkins Glen Summer Jam. The single album has been taken from the 4½ hour set that the group performed.

ANNE MURRAY PLAYS L.A.'s TROUBADOUR-THANKSGIVING

PROGRAMMERS/RECORD PEOPLE SHOW INTEREST IN PROBLEMS

A recent editorial in RPM (Dec. 1/73) in which the problems of a vinyl shortage were pointed up has brought about much interest by programmers and record people. While some record people disagreed with the suggestion that singles could be phased out, it was obvious that much consideration is being given to the 45s market which represents only 6% of the business. It has since been revealed that some companies are now giving serious consideration to phasing out their budget lines (\$1.98 and \$2.98) and perhaps increasing the price of singles. The latter will be released with much discretion and with less concentration on volume issues.

Larry Wilson, CHUM-FM entertainment reporter and one of the few reporting on today's music scene, saw merit in the editorial and reported the following to his listeners:

"Walt Grealis has written a piece of conjecture in his RPM Magazine - issue of December one . . . an article we'd like to share with you. It concerns the vinyl shortage in the recording industry. A shortage of raw material that goes into the making of the plastic discs. It's an oil derivative, hence in short supply. Publisher Grealis foresees the demise of the 45 rpm single over this shortage. How come? Simple. Singles account for a mere 6% of the market, he points out, presumably meaning 6% of the dollar volume. And it takes labour, money, shipping expenses and a lot of vinyl to turn-out singles. Especially when some of them sell a million copies or more . . . but many MORE of them are DUDS that don't sell at all. It's bound to happen, figures Walt Grealis. But he's suggesting an alternative that makes a lot of sense. Individual record companies could collect their new releases in a basket, and then put them out in LP form! A sampler. Figure twelve songs, maybe by six or twelve different artists from the same label . . . for \$3.98. A good bargain, really, providing the record companies select the music with care. There will be the inevitable rip-offs, where you get only one decent record for your \$3.98, but people will catch onto that garbage soon enough, and it won't happen again. Grealis believes this is where the industry is going to have to go in the very near future. And not a bad move at all. All due to the petroleum shortage we've brought upon ourselves for the last couple of generations."



THE WHO . . . ONE CANADIAN DATE IS NOT ENOUGH

It seems that with Elton John's recent "one Canadian stop only" engagement out west, it was the east's turn for the same treatment with The Who. I'm not sure that the fans can take such small doses of super talent and I certainly hope this action does not become habitual. In any case, the only Canadian performance of The Who took place on the weekend of December 2 at the Montreal Forum, with mostly Quebec area freaks making the scene but also a healthy bus expedition from southern Ontario showing up.

THE TRANSFORMER RETURNS —LOU REED ROCKS TORONTO

The five piece band was laying down some incredibly good rock flowing out in an endless wave; at all times overwhelming but never overpowering. With the house lights dramatically dim and the Massey Hall stage its usual starkness, a shadowy figure drifted out from behind the amplifiers. The lights came up falling on the pasty countenance and deep, blackened eyes signifying that the Transformer had returned.

Lou Reed was playing Toronto for the second time in less than a year in the guise that brought him back to the lime-light, but that he neglected in his first appearance of this year. The first time he appeared in town he bombed horribly, which may account for the sparseness of the crowd at the November 29 show.

Those who did venture out on the cold, windy evening were treated to a fantastic performance of seventies' deca rock delivered in that monotonic, more speak-

Opening the show was a band called Lynrd Skynrd who were fortunate in becoming touring buddies with Fallout Shelter (the actual Who tour) and who managed to gain recognition for themselves and their newest album in a most effective way. The band did well in Montreal and most likely scored highly in other centres, but it's hard to face up to the idea that there are twenty thousand freaks out there who are waiting to hear one of the best rock and roll bands in the world, and their attention span is rather narrow.

ing than singing, voice that seemed to just emanate effortlessly from the bored, expressionless face. Those that elected to stay away lucked out.

The band, now featuring Canadian Whitey Glann on drums and Prakash on bass, were superb and backed Reed with the kind of heavy metal rock music that soars and rumbles around-you like a jumbo jet. As they cooked behind him, Lou Reed pranced and camped his way all over the stage emphasizing a particularly important passage or word with a pelvic thrust here and a hip shake there. His movements were jerky and spasmodic making him look like a mechanical, wind-up jagger as he danced his way through material from his new "Berlin" (RCA) album, as well as some of his past biggies such as "Walk On The Wild Side", "Satellite Of Love", "White Light, White Heat" and of course the monumental "Heroin".

Lou the Transformer is quite the performer, but honey, today's rock is such a drag! — P.T.

NEW ALBUM AND BUSY TOUR SET FOR CHUCK MANGIONE

"Land Of Make Believe Chuck Mangione Concert" has just been released on Mercury Records, distributed by Polydor. The set was recorded live in Toronto's Massey Hall and features the Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra backing Mangione's Quartet and roster of guest artists.

Three tracks from the set have been qualified as Canadian by the CRTC and include, "Legend Of The One-Eyed Sailor", "Lullaby For Nancy Carol" and "Land Of Make Believe".

The album arrives in the middle of a very busy schedule of tour dates and personal appearances by Mangione. December 3rd had him playing at the University of Western Ontario in London. Extensive dates are being negotiated at this time, but confirmed appearances include Hamilton Place, Hamilton (April 5 & 6); the O'Keefe Centre in Toronto (8 to 13); Place Des Arts, Montreal (14 & 15) and the National Arts Centre in Ottawa (16).

In conjunction with several of the college concerts he has been involved with and will be playing in the future, Mangione will be conducting workshops, clinics and short

residencies. In such circumstances, he is prepared to work with local and student musicians in creating truly unique concert productions.

Plans are now being formulated for three major films to be scored by Mangione as well as a re-broadcast of his 90-minute television special, which was bumped off by Watergate on July 16.

Barry Kobus Management will be presenting their first Talent Showcase Sunday, December 9 at the Carousel Inn in Ajax, Ontario.

Agents, club owners and media representatives have been invited to see and hear the artists. Special guests will include Don MacKenzie from Studio City in Edmonton, Jack Herbert from Boston, Joanna Kirby from Roscoe as well as various representatives from the recording companies.

The Showcase will feature ten of the top bands represented by the Kobus Management Group and hosted by Gene Taylor of CITY-TV Channel 79 in Toronto.

extraordinary stage act . . . there was none. That's not The Who. Instead, it was just a basic four man band playing some of the hardest, gutsiest, loudest (etc. etc. etc.) rock you're liable to hear anywhere. There was nothing fancy . . . it was all very basic. . . . Daltrey's powerful vocals, Townshend's energized guitar, Entwistle's lead bass guitar, and Keith Moon on percussion . . . the same four mods that we have grown up with for the past ten years.

Before the introduction of their latest work, "Quadrophenia", The Who took us back to some of the earliest days of "Can't Explain" and "My Generation" and thoroughly titillated the audience . . . they were finally seeing THE WHO. The band played so hard it was everything they could do to instill into the audience the same feelings they themselves were experiencing playing the goddamn stuff.

Part two of the show presented The Who's latest concept album, the double disc, "Quadrophenia", a masterpiece that trade writers world wide feel will top "Tommy", the pioneer of rock musicals. The members of the band took turns preceding each song with a small explanation of what was happening and then set out to play most of the program. Those who were already well into the album concept, basked in total appreciation and contentment, while others were just getting their interest aroused, mainly with the high intensity of the music. The story line is simple, there are no hidden meanings and the ideas are easy to grasp. It's a must to get into as deeply as possible since the combination of concept and musical art makes for total saturation (and basically no regrets). As usual, there wasn't enough and it was over before most had had their limit.

As far as the quad sound goes, the effect was lacking but apparently it was the only mode of presentation that the performers felt could be effective in doing the particular selections they chose to do. And although background tapes were necessary for certain songs and parts of "Quadrophenia", it was not quad sound in the true sense (as it was in the Pink Floyd concert). Not that they needed it, because the sound that was pouring out from stage left and right was electrifying for two guitars and a set of drums.

Surprisingly, there was material to follow the "Quad" set, and here there were excerpts from the "Who's Next" album. "Won't Get Fooled Again" was dynamic, with synchronized backup tapes fitting in perfectly for the impact of the song. It was really time to freak out when they began "See Me, Feel Me" and they floored everyone with their smash, "Magic Bus".

It was due to all this excitement that caused the Montreal crowd to demand an encore . . . and they got one. But it still wasn't enough, and they weren't coming back again. There's just never enough.

To close their Canadian visit on a good note, The Who found themselves arrested and in jail (for excessive damage to their temporary residence, Place Bonaventure) but before morning all was well. Everyone counted on a happy ending. It was a great advertising investment of \$6,000 but it was a hell of an example to leave us. — Saul Podemski

Unbelievable industry excitement over Junos

Well it's getting close to the time when the Canadian music industry will be asked to pick the nominees for the Juno Awards and later a ballot will be sent out to pick the winners.

There is already an indication that the Juno Awards nominations will not be taken lightly

by the industry this year. The whole thing is starting to create excitement, and it should.

There was a time when being a Canadian star didn't mean very much and being a Juno Award winner meant little. In the past three years, the Juno Awards have become internationally recognized and above all, the whole affair has become the social event of the year for the industry.

Record companies and the representatives of the artists should be making plans right now to make sure that a campaign as big as any election is launched to guarantee hits that came out early in 1973 are brought to the attention of the trade.

Out there are a group of involved and dedicated people who are anxious to pick the best. Early in January a form will be sent to all RPM subscribers to make nominations.

VERY CAREFULLY the results will be accurately counted and whatever the ballots show will become the narrowing down of just who the biggies will be. Later in January, RPM will announce the nominees and ballots will be distributed to determine the winners.

If the industry really puts forth a great effort to make the whole thing a success, the winners can be anyone's guess. After the ballots are counted and recounted . . . those artists receiving the most votes will be Juno Awards winners.

This year the winners will be kept secret

until the moment the envelopes are opened on the stage March 25th and announced to the audience. It will be the first time that it will be possible to do this, and the reason it is being done this year is because of the building process of the Juno Awards over the years.

Suddenly there is a reason to fly across Canada to the Awards. They are big, exciting and glamorous. The two days that precede the Awards are filled with things to do, and many of the visitors from across Canada are planning the March trip to Toronto not only for the Communication meeting and the Awards, but also as an opportunity to do business in Toronto.

Five years ago it wasn't possible to ask the industry to just come to Toronto for a cocktail party. Now the combination of reasons makes it realistic to plan ahead and attend.

The dates are now announced long before the event is to take place. A lower Advance Registration fee is offered to those who want to plan ahead, and there is enough excitement to make the whole thing worthwhile.

Last year, the invitation system didn't work out too well. This year those attending will have to arrange their tickets in advance. In this way no one is left out. If you wish to

attend, you buy your tickets early and arrive at the door.

Yes, the whole thing became too big, and this year you will see the first Juno Awards that will be filled with innovations.

It will still be a large gathering of people who represent the industry from coast to coast and internationally. There will still be a theatre style presentation, but this year the Juno Awards have come of age because the industry is excited about who will win.

Artists and industry people alike are excited about who will win, and a great deal can be done by the record companies to assure that if they have a potential winner that the trade be made aware the Juno Awards are important. They are important enough that a Juno Awards campaign could be launched by record companies to assure that those involved in the industry attend, that their artists keep that night clear, that record companies encourage their foreign representatives to come to Canada, and that everyone work to win and make the Awards a Canadian success.

That's the way to build a star system, and many of us, who attended the first Juno Awards at St. Lawrence Hall in Toronto on February 23, 1969, will NEVER forget that evening no matter how big and exciting the Awards become.

MIDDLETON TO TOUR CANADA IN FEBRUARY

It has now been determined that Tom Middleton will be touring western Canada during the month of February. His kick-off date will be Feb. 1st, in Prince Albert. He will also play Thunder Bay, Edmonton, Calgary and several other centres, capping the tour in North Battleford.

Toronto-based folk trio, Edward, George and McLean have been selected as the Canadian representatives to perform at the National Entertainment Conference. The internationally known Conference will, this year, be held in Houston, Texas Feb 2nd through the 6th.

The N.E.C. is considered the world's greatest showcase for new artists and groups and draws buyers from colleges, universities, clubs etc. from all over the world. The Canadian group joins thirty-two other acts picked from several hundred entries.

Mark Robbins, manager of EG&M is currently negotiating a record contract for the trio and hopes to have a release to coincide with the Houston date.

LONDON TO DISTRIBUTE CINNAMON RECORDS

London Records of Canada has announced an agreement that gives them exclusive Canadian distribution rights to Cinnamon Records of Nashville. The new label is currently showing four singles on Cash Box and Billboard country charts with artists Narvel Felts, Guy Shannon, Susan St. Marie and Jimmy Payne.

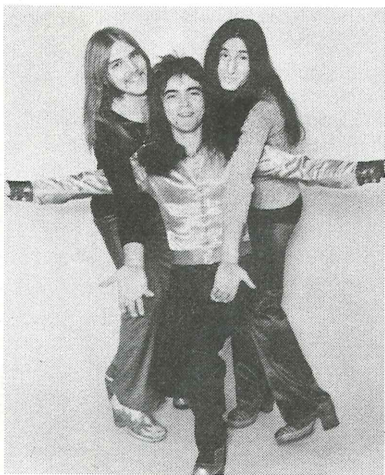

Four colour full pages are also available to the industry and to artists who wish to increase their image.

The deluxe edition will closely resemble the Canadian Music Industry Directory which RPM publishes each year.

RPM . . . the first, now presents another first. The Canadian Talent Directory. It should become a useful tool to the promoter and the booker and is another step in building the industry.

RPM has built the industry for close to ten years, and this is just another stage.

CARROL BAKER INTERVIEW (Eugene Carl - CFRS Simcoe)

Carroll, in what part of Canada were you born and raised?

I was born in Bridgewater, Nova Scotia. When I was growing up, around eight thousand people resided in Bridgewater. I lived there for fifteen years. I moved to Oakville, Ontario, around eight years ago and I now make my home there.

Were you brought up on Country Music, or, did you start to enjoy it after you were raised?

I was brought up on Country Music. My dad was an old time fiddler. Country Music surrounded me as a child.



What recording artists have influenced your singing style the most?

I have always enjoyed the singing style of Loretta Lynn because she's real earthy. Hank Williams Sr. has had the most influence on my singing. I think he was just fantastic. His style of singing really got me hooked on Country Music.

Which one of your records got you known as a recording artist?

The tune that really got me established was the second record I recorded, "Love Now and Pay Later". My first song was entitled "Memories of Home" and it did well, but "Love Now and Pay Later" did the most for me.

Have you ever written and recorded a song about a past experience?

The only song that I have ever written from personal experience is "He's Human Like Me". I wrote the song about my husband. Many of the songs that were coming out at that time were always putting down the man of the house. I felt this was unfair because we women are just as bad at times.

Do you prefer to record established hits or do you like to record new material?

I would not like to record an established hit. When a record is a hit, it's because the person who did it caught the record exactly as it should have been caught. There was a certain magic between the musicians and the singer that happens only once in a thousand times. An entertainer can sing someone else's hit record a thousand times yet he still won't come across as the original artist. I

don't feel that I can take someone else's hit song and do it better. If I go into a club to hear an entertainer, I want to hear that individual. If he attempts to sing all of his songs exactly like Merle Haggard, I'll get up and leave. If I want to hear Merle Haggard, I'll go home and play a Merle Haggard record. We don't need another Merle Haggard, we already have one. You should be yourself. Let your own voice come through and project it the best you can.

Where do you get ideas for songs that you're about to write?

Comments that other people make often stick out in my mind. I may be reading a book and a phrase may stand out. Most of the ideas that I get for songs come from remarks people have said or articles I have read. With a lot of hard work, a good song can be developed from these comments and articles.

Many people come to clubs solely to drink, however, at concerts people come to see and hear their favourite entertainer perform. Do most entertainers prefer doing concert engagements over club appearances?

I think that just about every singer prefers to do a concert because they know that everyone is listening to them. Whether you're appearing at a concert or a club, you should get on the stage and do your best and try to make those people out there know that you appreciate them being there.

There are many people today who will not listen to a record if they know it's country. However, if you don't tell them that a particular record is Country, they will often listen to it and go out and buy it. Why are some people turned off at the word "Country"?

I think too many people today try to "keep up with the Jones' ". Some people feel that today's Country Music is hillbilly music from way back. So, they listen to a more sophisticated type of music because they feel that it separates them from country folk. These people often feel they are a little bit above everybody else if they are listening to middle of the road music instead of Country Music.

In order to get a good sound on record, is it necessary for a recording artist to record in a major city such as Toronto or Vancouver?

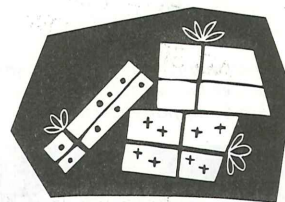
No. I live near Toronto but I record in Thunder Bay, Ontario, because I have had success at that studio. Where a recording studio is located is not really important. What really counts is the product that comes out of the studio on record.

How do unknown entertainers get discovered?

I guess the only thing they can do is to go out and be seen singing. You cannot let disappointment show in your face. If you appear at a jamboree and only a few people show up to see you, don't think there's ten people out there. Think that there is ten thousand people in the audience. Sing to those ten people as you would to ten thousand because maybe one of those ten people will be the one who will launch your career.

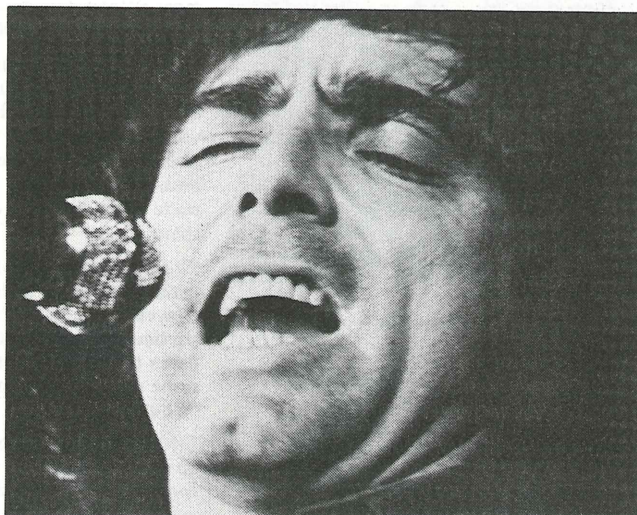

New Albums

VALDY - Landscapes - Haida HL5104

Valdy's latest is already getting its deserved airplay, especially on progressive FM outlets. It's more of the appealing folk/rock music that Valdy has treated us to in the past, with his unique brand of vocals doing the most for your ears. If you know Valdy, then a lot of the selections are not new, since they are included in his live performances. The very talented Claire Lawrence contributes an important part, musically, and brings the whole thing together under his production. The selections are somewhat flowered up in the studio, but you can be sure that each and every song would sound just as fine in concert. We like "Trucker's Song", "Simple Life" and Gordon Lightfoot's "Bitter Green".

MOE KOFFMAN - Master Session - GRT 9230-1041

Attractive packaging opens the way for the newest collection of Koffman's orchestral interpretations. Inspiration for this set came from a variety of classical composers, with the Doug Riley/Koffman team adapting the arrangements to a contemporary sound. Koffman is quite superb and easy going in his role as flautist and is fully backed by a veritable mini orchestra. Favourite cuts are: "Intermezzo" and "Mozart's Ark" - picks for both FMers and AM programmers. All cuts quality for Canadian content.

CHUCK MANGIONE - In Concert - Mercury SRM1-684

This album is actually of historic importance since it is the first occasion in Canada where a recording combines ".....the talents of symphony and jazz musicians." And it sounds as if the combo has achieved its objectives, and in live performance at that. "Legend Of A One-eyed Sailor" kicks off the first side with amazing clarity, with more of the same to follow. With a host of fans here in Canada, his "Land Of Make Believe" performance, done in Toronto's Massey Hall, shows why this man is popular. Although somewhat gussied up - it's plain and simple and very good entertainment.

VIC FRANKLYN - Shangrila - Celebration CEL1889

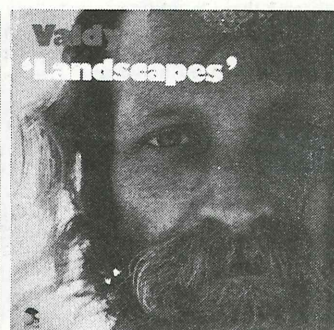
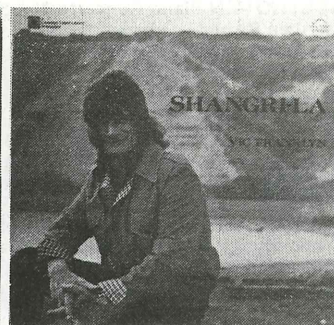
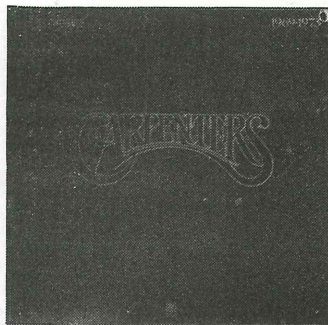
Sounds lean towards MOR listeners, with Franklyn's voice being ideal, although none of the material is originally his. Several selections come up to the standards of the biggies, and there is promise. It's Franklyn's vocals that stir up the most interest - full and whole some. Carole King's "Will You Still Love Me" and the now almost legendary "Behind Closed Doors" stand out as fine renditions. We like "Happy To Know You".

ZYLAN - La Difference - Columbia FS90244

This is the second album to reveal the talents of the Halifax-based group. Horns, keyboards and a fantastic female vocalist form the basis for this extraordinary talent. Although the lyrics are in French, making it a natural for the Quebec market, the musical parts are exciting enough to just listen to without understanding the words. Side one offers "Le Depart" and "Reflexion", both rocking and rolling "getting it on material". Side two's "Heavy" shows another side of their music while "Vivre" shows singles potential. Could be a very important group of the year.

THE CARPENTERS - The Singles - A&M SP3601

This brother/sister team have become the biggest sensation in the



last few years. Their popularity is ever increasing, with fans from all age groups. Here then, is a collection of their greatest hits, including their newest No. 1 hit "Top Of The World". All selections are as happy-go-lucky as the Carpenters themselves and provide us with much relaxation from the rawness of the music of today. The range of appeal of these two is amazing, and this set should prove to be a good choice for a collective summary of The Carpenters.

Stephen Bishop is American born, and studied in London, England with the late Dame Myra Hess. His reputation as a Beethoven player is high and he is aided by magnificent orchestral support under Colin Davis. The recordings are among the most outstanding Philips have produced. Highly recommended.

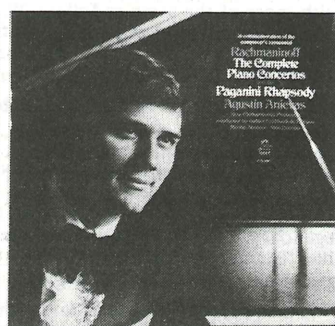
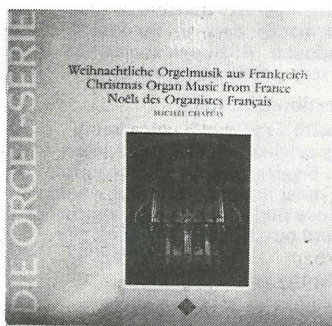
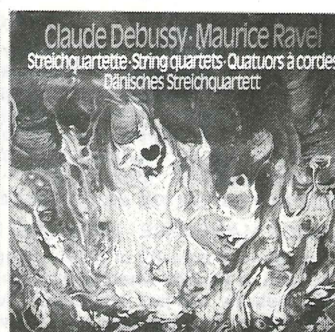
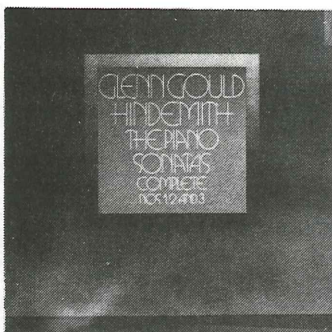
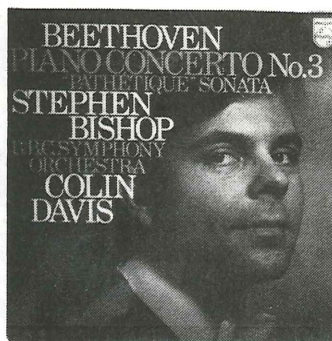
Opera buffs will not have to be reminded of the greatness of Eileen Farrell's performance in this true stereo re-issue on Columbia's "Odyssey" line of highlights from Luigi Cherubini's opera, Medea. The recorded sound is still remarkably fine. The disc contains three lengthy excerpts, one each from the opera's three acts. One can only regret that the entire opera was not recorded at the time because the great American soprano and her supporting singers are in fine voice.

Another coupling of chamber music's "heavenly twins". I am sure by now that most listeners feel that there is a link between these two works, making their separation unfeasible. This recording by the Danish String Quartet lead by Arne Svendsen, originates from the Valois label in France and is truly outstanding both as a performance and as a recording. The playing has a refined and intimate quality and makes no attempt to inflate the works beyond their natural proportions.

RACHMANINOFF The Complete Piano Concertos
 Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini
 Agustin Anievas - pianist
 The NewaPhilharmonia Orchestra conducted by Rafael Fruhbeck de Burgos, Moshe Atzmon and Aldo Ceccato
 ANGEL SCB-3801

This year was the centenary of Rachmaninoff's birth, and to celebrate the occasion, Angel have released this excellent three record set containing the four Piano Concerti and the Paganini Rhapsody. Soloist is the American pianist Agustin Anievas who has had outstanding success with previous recordings of Chopin, Brahms and Liszt. He receives clear, sparkling reproduction which gives him a strong edge over the London set by Vladimir Ashkenazy. He wins too with his alert, incisive playing of the Rhapsody on a theme of Paganini, and his poetic, unhurried performance of the Second Concerto in C minor Op. 18, and the less familiar Concerto No. 1 in F sharp minor. I have the impression that the third and fourth concerti are not realized here with the same command and authority and one hopes that this outstanding young artist will have another "go" at them a few years from now.



HINDEMITH The Piano Sonatas (Complete)
 Glenn Gould - Pianist
 COLUMBIA M 32350

These three works fit with perfect ease and comfort on one disc, with the first Sonata fitting comfortably onto side one and the second and third Sonatas sharing side two. The dry, acid sounding works are played and hummed with supreme ease and authority by Canada's Glenn Gould, who is also responsible for the clever liner notes. Glenn Gould's characteristic piano tone is captured with impressive clarity by Columbia's engineers. The back of the jacket asks: "HINDEMITH: WILL HIS TIME COME? AGAIN?" I rather think not.

CHRISTMAS ORGAN MUSIC FROM FRANCE
 Michel Chapuis - Organist
 TELEFUNKEN SAWT 9596

The Telefunken label, distributed by London label is increasing the scope of its recorded repertoire vastly and in many directions since they began releasing material from the French label Valois. This latest release is both timely and outstanding since it features organ music written for the Christmas season by Louis-Claude D'aquin, Jean-Francois Dandrieu and Claude Balbastre. The organist is Michel Chapuis, who's future releases include the complete organ works of J.S. Bach. He performs the music on the J.G. Koenig Organ in Saint-Georges zu Sarre-Union.

CFTR's Godfrey looks at air checks

You could be in Kamloops or Cornerbrook, maybe even in Lindsay — you feel you have paid some dues and now it's time to try a bigger market. You're ready, and you know you're ready! But putting that air-check together is causing you more frustration than the date you turned down the other night because your P.D. added a couple of hours to your shift.

Well, to begin with — let the date hang loose for a couple of days. Get two half hour tapes together — get your show prepared — best you know how, and lay out an hour of your show.

A couple of thoughts on what you might check out before showtime. Have you read the paper today? Does anything in the paper relate to "your" listeners? If it means some-

thing to you, most likely it will relate to your listeners. How about the music trades? Did anything in RPM, Billboard, Cashbox, catch your eye about an artist or song that would fit in your show today. Speaking of today, what day is it? Maybe the birthday of a famous singer, actor, politician, or possibly the birthday of your local United Way Chairman . . . yes, it sounds hoaky, but maybe it is just what you need to drop into

your show today. Ask a few questions around town, you will be amazed at the answers you get. Remember, name dropping used subtly can be a very good audience grabber.

Now have you got your music together? (regardless of format) — do you know what you are going to play. Is your music prepared? When you hit the air, there is little time to be concerned with second guessing as to what the next record will be.

Did you check the log? Any live spots? . . . read them over. Are there any faults in the log, like carts not in the run? . . . Check it out now, before, you go on air. Did you check with the News and Sports Directors to find out if any topical items had been overlooked? How about the weather? Weather affects a lot of people in a lot of ways. If you have a local weather office, call and get the weather forecast for two or three days. If your format allows you to name drop, give the weatherman's name (who knows you may have to blame a bad weather report on him sometime). Seriously, it does add believability, as well as a very personal touch.

So now you're set, it's show time. Just put down the best hour you've got.

You've done your homework and now it's time to communicate . . . communicate . . . what a word (look it up in your Funk and Wagnalls.)

Take the hour and telescope it. There is no need to include the commercials unless they are yours. And there should be at least two of your own produced commercials.

Your every word during that hour should be on the tape. Yes, mistakes and all. Be yourself, honest self . . . they'll find out anyhow.

DAVIS GOVERNMENT TO SAVE CJRT-FM

Ontario's Premier William Davis has finally made moves to save Ryerson's (Toronto) CJRT-FM. Davis has announced that his government will set up the station under an independent board of directors. This board will have to move fast to apply for a licence renewal. Their licence expires March 31 of next year and the CRTC has already asked for the renewal application which must include who and by what means the station is to be controlled.

The Davis statement also indicated that CJRT's transmitter and antenna would be moved to allow for better coverage of the greater Toronto area.

The Davis Government has been under pressure by Margaret Scrivener (PC St. David) who headed up a committee to keep CJRT on the air. The station, which was financed by Ryerson Polytechnical Institute to a tune of \$175,000 plus, per year, has been existing on a shoestring of provincial emergency grants since early summer of this year. It was indicated by the Scrivener committee that CJRT could become self-supporting over a period of time if the Ontario Government would give a hand. It was their hope that with government assistance the station could revive its popular "Open College" program which was headed by Mrs. Margaret Norquay. This cost is estimated at \$150,000 for the first year and total cost to bring the station back to full strength would be less than \$1 million. It's expected that a portion of this could be returned to the government when contributions from private industry begins to roll.

There is also a possibility that the Ryerson station could receive grants from the Ministry of Colleges and Universities. There would also have to be some juggling over the CRTC's ruling that stations controlled by the province can no longer have broadcasting licenses, but independent boards (as is suggested for CJRT) can be financed by the province.

CAMPUS RADIO SPOTLIGHT CMRC—MT. ROYAL COLLEGE

CMRC Radio exists primarily as a teaching tool of Mount Royal College and its Broadcasting Department. It is their hope that by giving their students on-air experience in addition to their class time assignments, they will be better equipped when they graduate and seek positions in commercial radio.

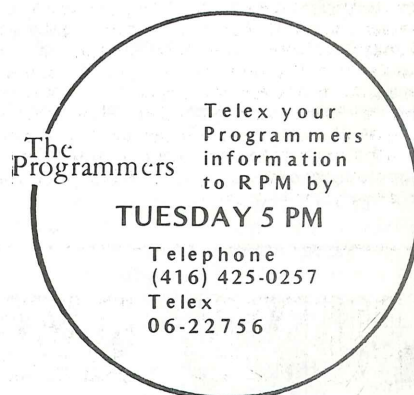
The station is not limited to the campus but broadcasts over the Cable television network together with the University of Calgary Radio. Their broadcast time runs from 4 to 10PM seven days a week.

Programming is entirely under the control of the students with the 4 to 7 slot called Harmony & Rhythm, made up of easy listening music mixed with contemporary sounds. Monday, Wednesday and Friday this is followed by Audio Prism featuring contemporary rock. Tuesday's late night show is Jazz Gallery while Thursday is turned over to the country sounds.

Weekends involve more specialized listening from 7 to 10PM. Saturday's show is tagged Harlequin's Invasion and includes a variety of music, comedy and what-have-you, to provide a bit of fun for those weekend parties. Sunday's special is in a more serious vein with classical music, documentaries and the spoken word featured.

Vic Franklin, Canadian Talent Library recording artist will lead the carols. The service will be taped on the Dec. 16th date for airing Dec. 25th.

CRTC INTRODUCES FRENCH CONTENT CRITERION

In a letter to Francois Bastien President of the Canadian Association of French-language Radio & Television Broadcasters, Pierre Juneau of the CRTC stated that the Commission expects French-Canadian radio stations to play 75% of their music selections in the French language from 6AM to 6PM and 65% at other times.

French popular music stations would be greatly effected by this new proposal which the CRTC feels is a "criterion for licence renewal, one of many. It's not a regulation."

Several top 40 French-Canadian stations do depend a great deal on programming English oldies. In multi-station markets many of the French listeners would possibly turn to English stations and the ruling would create a tune-out factor that many French station owners are very concerned about.

Stations were playing as little as 33% in French and in many cases weren't prepared for high percentage of French content proposed by the CRTC.

The French percentage has nothing to do with the 30% Canadian content music regulations which are still in effect, but make no mention of language when it comes to fulfilling Canadian content.

Just as with English radio stations, the programmers obviously feel that a hit is a hit no matter what language it is performed in or where it was produced.

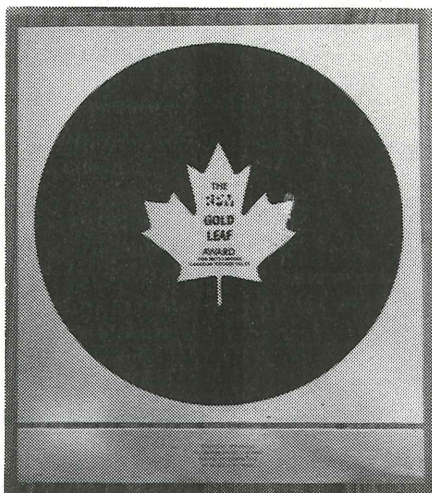
