RPM's Annual Gold Leaf Awards Presentation will take place as scheduled. The five year old Juno Awards (the name that has become synonymous with Canadian music and talent will be held on March 25th, 1974 in the Centennial Ballroom of Toronto's Inn on the Park - as scheduled.

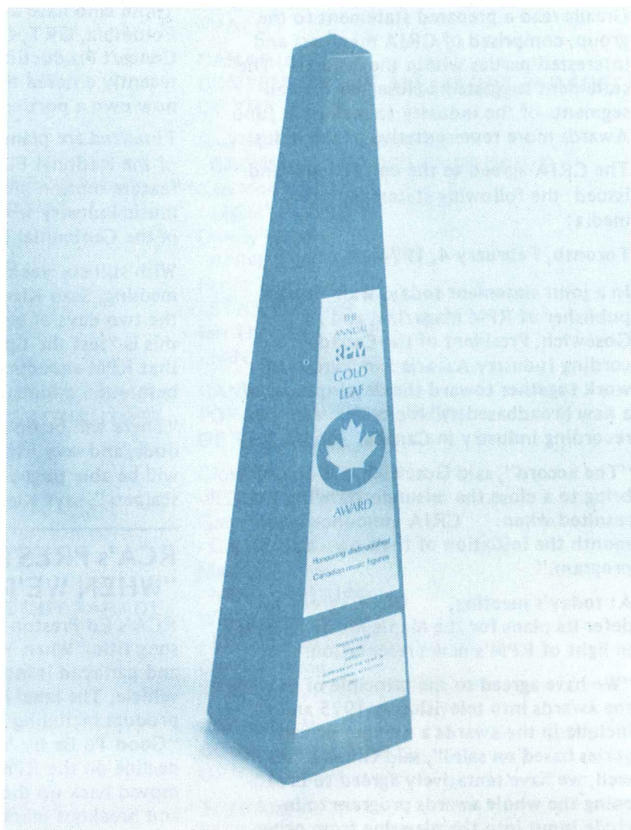
As we go to press, we are receiving telephone enquiries asking if the Juno Awards have been postponed for one year. Definitely not! They will take place and to date there has been an overwhelming demand for tickets.

The yearly event became the subject of some controversy recently because of another awards presentation which was planned for roughly the same time, but in no way have the Awards been cancelled or postponed.

A further story appears on page 2 of this week's RPM and the nominations for this year's Awards appear on pages 2 and 3.

Voting ballots are being mailed shortly, and the industry will then have the opportunity to vote for their favourite Canadian recording stars.

Another event that will occur two days prior to the Juno Awards is RPM's Communication Eight meet which is also attracting a great deal of interest. A World Premiere of a Canadian motion picture on our domestic industry will be featured as part of C8. Marshall McLuhan and Kal Rudman are scheduled to speak at the two day event.

CRIA DEFERS PLANS FOR OWN MUSIC AWARDS

Walt Grealis, publisher of RPM and originator of the Juno Awards was invited by the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA) to attend an emergency meeting at the Royal York Hotel (Feb 4). The reason for the meeting was to clear up the misunderstanding that resulted within the industry when the CRIA announced their own awards program last month. Press and industry reaction to a pair of conflicting awards' presentations had caused a division in the industry.

Grealis read a prepared statement to the group, comprised of CRIA members and interested parties within the industry. The statement suggested a closer tie with all segments of the industry to make the Juno Awards more representative of the industry.

The CRIA agreed to the compromise and issued the following statement to the media:

Toronto, February 4, 1974

In a joint statement today, Walt Grealis, publisher of RPM Magazine, and Arnold Gosewich, President of the Canadian Recording Industry Association, agreed to work together toward the development of a new broadbased awards system for the recording industry in Canada.

"The accord", said Gosewich, "should now bring to a close the misunderstanding that resulted when CRIA announced last month the initiation of their own awards program."

At today's meeting, CRIA agreed to defer its plans for the Maple Music Awards in light of RPM's new presentation.

"We have agreed to the principle of moving the awards into television in 1975 and to include in the awards a number of categories based on sales", said Grealis. "As well, we have tentatively agreed to broadening the whole awards program to include input into the planning from other segments of the industry."

"The CRIA plans to continue its wholehearted support of the Juno Awards program", said Gosewich.

BEE GEES FOR ONTARIO DATES

The Bee Gees, long off the "hit" list, have set three days aside from their North American tour for dates in Ontario. They have been firmed for two nights in Toronto at Massey Hall (Feb. 16-17) and for Hamilton Place in the city of Hamilton (19).

Polydor, distributors of the group's recorded product, have mounted a hefty promotion campaign for both cities which could see a renewed interest in their album product.

They first hit with "New York Mining Disaster" in 1967 which was followed by a string of major single and album items.

Their Canadian concerts will see the group backed by a full orchestra -- making the sound as close to their recording sessions as possible.

RECORD COMPANIES BOOK HOSPITALITY ROOMS FOR C8

With Communication Eight scheduled for March the 23rd and 24th, a number of record companies have already booked space at the Inn on the Park for the 24th which will be a day dedicated to making presentations, exhibits and generally meeting the trade.

A number of companies will have their artists on hand to meet the media. Others will show current product and all will open their doors to entertain the trade.

Those who have already booked suites are: Columbia, GRT, Capitol, WEA, RCA and Concert Productions International (which recently entered the record business and now own a portion of Daffodil/Love).

Finalized are plans for the world premiere of the National Film Board full length feature motion picture on the Canadian music industry which is scheduled for 8.30PM in the Centennial Ballroom (24).

With still six weeks to go before the C8 meeting, Stan Klees who is coordinating the two days of events indicated that all this is "just the tip of the iceberg", and that RPM expects the event to sell out long before the middle of March.

"There will be no tickets available at the door, and very little chance that late-comers will be able to get a ticket except from scalpers", says Klees.

RCA's PRESTON SAYS "WHEN WE'RE HOT . . ."

RCA's Ed Preston has taken the Jerry Reed song title "When You're Hot You're Hot" and parlayed it into a strong promotion vehicle. The label is hot with new Canadian product including the Jack Cornell deck, "Good To Be By You" which began a decline on the RPM Singles Chart but has moved back up the chart because of major and breakout market additions to playlists and charts. The flip, "In Your Eyes" is also receiving play.

The Mercey Brothers have bounced into prominence with a single receiving heavy play on country and "pop" stations. Country programmers latched onto "Our Loving Times" while "pop" programmers flipped to "I Heard Bells". Both sides are from the group's new "Mercey Brothers" album.

Another country act receiving heavy play is Roy Payne and his "Sweet Jesus" single, a Payne original published through Starr and Sunbury-CAPAC. The single was taken from his album, "One Step Forward". Payne has been enjoying good television coverage through the Educational Television production, "True North". The series has now bowed the CBC-TV Network (Feb. 10).

The Guess Who have had their strongest start in many releases with "Star Baby" charted and playlisted across the country. The single has already been "picked" as a winner in the U.S.

Patrick Norman, a household word in the Quebec market, could soon break into the English Canadian market with his "Papil-

JUNO NOMINATIONS READY FOR VOTING

The computing of the results of the Juno Awards' nominations ballots has now been completed with the nominees announced in this issue of RPM.

The return of the nomination ballots has been encouraging and points up the desire of our readers to become involved in the Juno Awards. We now have a fairly good tabulation of how the industry feels about itself, the artists and craftsmen. Their efforts during the year 1973 are reflected in the results of the count.

The theme of this year's ballot was "It's entirely up to you" - a reassurance to the industry that the actual choice was theirs (as it has been over the years), and a hope that the industry would participate and become more involved in the Awards and the voting.

Each category lists five nominees, with the exception of Most Promising Female Vocalist where there was a tie which made it necessary to add a sixth nominee.

or twelve years in the music industry.

Don't let me mislead you. News was always available to the trade, but what RPM did was a job of packaging. That is exactly what we do. We package the news in a convenient form for the industry to digest and discard or even keep as a reference. We actually document the history of the music industry in Canada. Perhaps this is the reason so many libraries subscribe to RPM, and why so many RPM binders are ordered. Our subscribers do collect RPM for its value as a source of information and a pacesetter for the industry over the years.

RPM has also assumed the social and institutional end of the music industry. When RPM began there was no one in the industry who wanted nor was capable of this responsibility.

From all this emerged a better industry because the industry was becoming informed. Equally important was the fact that the industry became aware of their competitors, resulting in better promotions and smoother relations.

Granted, RPM has been "on the spot" a few times. As the "mirror" or "conscience" of the industry, many didn't like what they

read. They were looking for someone to blame and RPM was many things to many people.

I can't remember ever receiving a letter claiming that we had "hurt" the industry. I can't even remember anyone suggesting that we had created problems. I am quite aware there are critics out there and equally aware there is little we can do to appease certain people.

It is interesting to note that I don't particularly like the "press". I find when I read any number of periodicals, I am distressed by their references to RPM. With that in mind, we have been very careful in our reporting and criticism of you and of the system. Obviously, we haven't satisfied everyone, but then that really isn't possible nor is it our purpose.

So, in a week or two we will have been on the scene for ten years, and that proves something. It might suggest that we were needed and that we did accomplish some good. It might also indicate that the industry is that much better because RPM was there.

We opened our door to provide a service to the industry, and the fact that the industry took advantage of that service is an indication that we did it well, and we did it with reliability and we were thoroughly wanted.

For a project given six weeks, we have survived ten years, and the fact that we have also been accepted internationally is perhaps more important than many realize.

The above might sound like we are blowing our own horn, but there is a story to be told and you will become better informed of what RPM was, is and will be, in the next issue of this paper which will concern itself with the ten years of RPM.

LIGHTHOUSE HOT WITH "FEEL IT" SINGLE (GRT)

GRT's Lighthouse, have made impressive gains up the charts with their new single release, "Can You Feel It", the title cut from their just released album.

Radio play has been exceptionally heavy for the new deck with CHUM Toronto adding the cut from the album prior to the single release. CHAM Hamilton was also quick with a playlist add after dropping the group's "Pretty Lady" single just this week.

Jim Jenner, Lighthouse producer, is now in Toronto setting up another recording session at Thunder Sound. The group have been in rehearsal sessions for several weeks. They plan on taking off on a Canadian tour following their recording dates.

Polydor, release label for Lighthouse in the U.S., experienced good response to the "Lady" single which was given an added boost by Lighthouse who just completed their concert swing through the U.S. It's expected the single Stateside will be "Magic's In The Dancing".

BERTRAND FORMS SONOGRAM LABEL

Guy Bertrand, formerly with Polydor Records, has unveiled his new company, Sonogram Records, with a label under the same title. Working with Bertrand will be Johnny Desrosiers.

The label will be basically French oriented but Bertrand will also be looking for strong English acts for his Montreal-based production company. Initial release will be Claire Syrill's "C'est Le Pemps De Partir" ("It's Time To Leave"), which was produced at Sound Quebec by Bertrand. Also ready for release is single and album product by Donald Lautrec, who formerly released on the Jupiter label and is a top name artist in the Quebec market.

Bertrand will also release a single by Clockwork, "Mean Lady", an English language record. The label will be self distributed.

MIDDLETON CONTINUES TO SCORE NATIONALLY

Columbia's Tom Middleton has two hits going for him. His May/73 release, "It Wouldn't Have Made Any Difference" has been getting a major hearing in the U.S. and his latest Canadian release (November/73) "One More Chance" has picked up encouraging sales and plays across the country. There has been a definite thrust with the "Chance" deck in Western Canada where Middleton has broken the ice with his A&W sponsored tour.

The A&W Incredible Concert Series pulled a packed house in Vancouver's John Oliver High School Auditorium. The Sun's Don Stanley wrote: "Middleton, with his back-up group, Snowbird, demonstrated his potential to be Canada's answer to David Cassidy. Good looking with an adequate voice, he seems to have some of that Bobby Curtola charm that wends its way into sub-teen hearts."

The hook for the concert series, and a clever one at that, arranged by Bruce Davidsen of International Promotion Consultants (Vancouver) is the inclusion of a local high school band to supply the back-up for Middleton and his group — usually during the second half of the show. This enticement has proven successful in bringing out parents, relatives and friends of the band members. Stanley found this to be the point where "we saw the true genius of the promoters. The problem of a high school outfit possibly being inadequate is simply resolved because school bands are acoustic and the Snowbirds are electrified. The big band was just audible enough to give a pleasing depth to Middleton's vocals and the dominant electric guitars."

The group's concert in Saskatoon was equally well received by the press. The city's Junior Symphony supplied the instrumental back-up. Star-Phoenix critic Garry Tannyan found Middleton "smooth yet punchy", paying tribute to Snowbird as being "a foursome that seems to expound a solidarity that is so necessary to create consistently good music."

Summing up Tannyan noted: "This concert

ANNE MURRAY DONS LOVEABLE HARD HAT STEEL CITY IMAGE

Kicking off her live performances for 1974 at the beautiful new Hamilton Place (Hamilton, Ontario) was a natural for Anne Murray.

Claiming she had the "jitters" she soon became the "just folks" Annie that so many hundreds of thousands of people all over the world have come to recognize. The warmth from the audience was exceptional and Anne even discovered a couple of Springhill, Nova Scotia natives. "You'll find them everywhere", she said as she prepared to take full advantage of the full, rich, sound-wrapped Hamilton Place.

A medley of her past hits including "Danny's Song", "Robbie's Song For Jesus", "What About Me" brought her to Capitol's first international breakthrough, "Snowbird", which packed a wallop with her audience.

Back-up vocals and instrumentation were supplied by her well-seasoned group, Richard, recording artists in their own right.

Wearing her brand new "hard hat", a gift from the City of Hamilton and sporting new shoes, which she "wiggled" at the audience, the show moved along with ease, drawing wave on wave of audience participation and excitement - rare for this city, which completely capitulated to the sound of Anne Murray.

John Allan Cameron, a Cape Bretoner who toured with Anne almost from the beginning, was "exceptional". He has become a smooth and free rolling music laureate with tales of Cape Breton life spiced with unusual "fiddling" that creates an almost spontaneous reaction from his audience. His "Lord Of The Dance" is a perfect picture song for the witty John Allan.

A new Capitol album by Anne Murray, is now being readied. Upcoming appearances include: the Centennial Hall, London, Ont. (Feb 8); Jubilee Auditorium, Calgary (16) and Centennial Theatre of the Arts, Winnipeg (Mar 7).

Good old RPM West travels east this week to drum up some support from eastern head offices. While in the east, to fulfill commitments made last year, I will be in contact with national promotion managers stationed in eastern Canada to try and enlist their support for RPM West. Many companies have a policy whereby information from across the country must be fed through head office before it is allowed to reach the media. While the reasons for this are understandable, it is perhaps time that branch offices were allowed to provide information directly to the national press. In the case of RPM West this means that news and information would funnel directly from western branch offices to the typography room, through our editorial offices here. This can result in more news of interest, originating in parts of the country other than Toronto or Montreal. For too long, information from outside these two areas has been relegated to a second class status. Remedying this is the prime reason for the existence of RPM West.

And now to advertising. No direct solicitations for advertising in RPM have yet been made in western Canada. We feel that before we can expect any degree of financial support for our operations here, we must first have a product to sell. It is self-evident, though, that RPM will be unable to sustain a western operation indefinitely and to this end we would request that any companies or individuals who have a product or service to sell, get in touch with RPM West for rates and requirements. We don't expect to become rich by doing what we are doing, we don't even expect to break even for a considerable length of time. But what we would like is to see an expression of interest, however small.

We are still experiencing mail and stationery problems, so if you have been waiting for a letter of reply from RPM West, please be

patient. These teething problems are annoying but not disastrous.

Several people have written in requesting subscriptions to our new magazine, RPM West. Folks, there is no new magazine. What we are doing here is simply providing an editorial service from western Canada to RPM Weekly. I will return your money as soon as possible.

Now to those nasty companies in the east. I've always liked records and honest, I don't sell them. It sure would be neat to know what records you're releasing and what they sound like. A few companies have stuffed my mailbox with big cardboard boxes and to those co-operative folks, I extend my thanks. To the others I send my heartfelt pleas for sympathy. It's hard to cover the record industry without ever seeing or hearing a record. I'd whip down to Eaton's and buy them, but the budget won't stand it.

And now we announce the creation of yet another award; the John Erlichman Memorial Award for Honesty goes to the westerner who best describes the situation of westerners in an industry and a culture centred about and largely controlled from a distant part of the country, in three hundred words or less. The winner will get an all-expense paid reprint in RPM. Runner-up receives the H.R. (Bob) Haldeman Rights of Man Trophy and two all expense-paid reprints in RPM. Entries will be accepted up to and including February 28, 1974. Decision of the judge shall be absolute. No tapes accepted.

CHML FIRST WITH MURRAY'S "MIND"

Thursday Jan 31st was one of Hamilton's most eventful days in many years. It was "Anne Murray Day" and the Steel City's powerhouse "popper", CHML, was responsible for all the excitement.

During the course of that day, which led up to her first concert and "sold out" notices, the station programmed recorded and taped material from the Capitol "Superstar". As well, Miss Murray appeared on "Open Line" hosted by Perc Allen. It was during the "Open Line" show when Allen aired the Maritime beauty's recording, "A Little Bit Of Soap". This song was taped during a campus show at the University of New Brunswick, way back in 1965.

Another surprise for Anne was the airing of "Children Of My Mind", a cut from her new album, "A Love Song", and a first time airing for the Hamilton/Toronto area. This song, expected to be released as a single, was written especially for Miss Murray by English composer G. Osborne.

Much of the success of the Anne Murray/CHML record segment and in particular the "Children" first for CHML was due the efforts of Capitol's Ontario promotion rep, Jim MacKay.

TOBIAS READY WITH NEW "SIDE" SINGLE

Polydor's Richard Glanville-Brown reports a simultaneous Canadian/U.S. release for the new Ken Tobias deck, "On The Other Side". The single was taken from his recent album success, "The Magic's In The Music".

Tobias opened a six day engagement at New York's Bitter End (6) and then moved on to My Father's Place in Long Island for a five day stay. He returns to Canada early in March for the CTV Network's "Miss Teen Canada Pageant" where he will have the opportunity of performing his new release.

While in the Toronto area he will fill a March 7th date at George Brown College.

BRUSSEL SPROUT SIGNED TO MUSIC SHOPPE INT'L

Music Shoppe International a Toronto-based booking agency, have announced the signing of their first U.S. act, Brussel Sprout.

The deal for the country rock band from Detroit was firm by Music Shoppe's Ron Scribner and Steve Maley.

The seven piece group now begins a national tour of campus dates during which time they will play ten dates in two weeks in the Atlantic Provinces. They will then move west (Mar. 12) for twenty-two dates across Western Canada which will be completed April 14th in Winnipeg.

Music Shoppe first came across the Sprout at the Canadian Entertainment Conference in Kitchener last fall, resulting in this exclusive agreement for booking representation throughout Canada.

BEARFOOT/ESSEX/DERRINGER SHOWING NATIONAL GAINS

Bearfoot's single "Molly" has broken nicely across Canada with most majors now charting or playlisting the deck. CKLG was the first major to chart the single while CFTR in Toronto plugged into the album cut long before a release of "Molly" was considered. Bert Duseith, national sales for Columbia, predicts this one to be a "heavy Canadian hit". Britisher David Essex has finally proven that Duseith can call them. His "Rock On" single was released Sept. 28. Canadian programmers gave a hard listen to the single resulting in playlist and chart action. The single entered the RPM Singles Chart at No. 89, Nov. 17/73, and although not making significant gains, has remained constant on the chart. This week the single moves up to the No. 1 position and with the

U.S. action its future looks good for the Top Five.

Rick Derringer is all set for what could be chart action on his new release, "Rock & Roll Hoochie Koo". His Blue Sky album, "All American Boy" has set the pace for him, having moved up the RPM Album Chart to No. 39 this week.

Other action at Columbia includes the consistent sales being chalked up for Charlie Rich and his "Most Beautiful Girl" single. This is the No. 3 best selling single in the Columbia camp this week and could be the biggest since Lynn Anderson's "Rose Garden".

Coming up are album and single releases by Billy Joel (a single "Piano Man" now a chart item), a Johnny Winter set to coincide with his Maple Leaf Gardens (Toronto) gig, a double album set from Mountain and two albums from Barbra Streisand — one for Streisand fans ("The Way We Were") and one for movie fans.

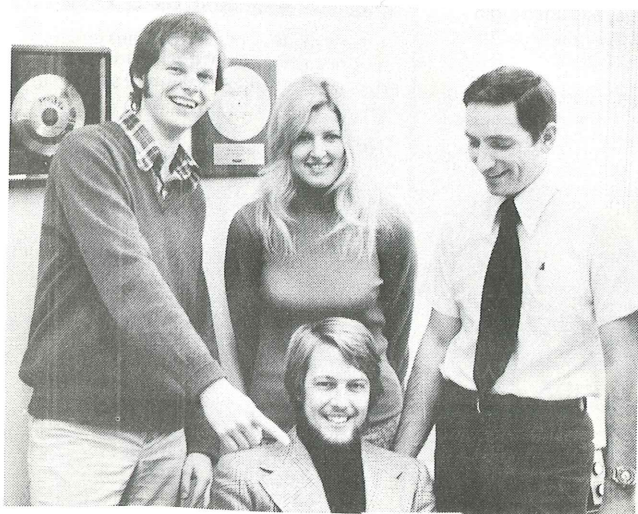

Only Drupi would disagree

LONDON, ENG.

It seems very likely now that the next big artist to emerge from the British pop scene - the first for '74 - will be Leo Sayer, a delightful little chap whose single of "The Show Must Go On" has hit the top of the charts here.

Only 5 ft. 4 in. and less than 110 pounds, 25-year old Leo Sayer is not exactly an



imposing figure a la naturale . . . but when he dons his stage gear, he's something else again.

Actually Leo is a clown and his hit single is concerned with the eternal dilemma of the poor soul who chooses clowning as a profession: he never really knows whether the crowd is laughing at him or with him.

Off-stage, Leo is a quiet, unassuming little man who lives with his trouble and strife in rural Sussex and likes to watch the telly in the evenings. But when he hits the boards, he literally goes berserk. He spends 45 minutes prior to every show putting on a clown's face and full circus regalia. In some ways, it's a logical follow-up to David Bowie.

The other man behind the mask is Adam Faith, one-time British rock idol of the 50's, who recently made a comeback producing Roger Daltrey's first solo album. In Britain, the single from that album was "Giving It All Away", written by Leo Sayer and his composing partner, Dave Courtney, former drummer with Adam Faith's Roulettes. In fact, all but two tracks on the Who's lead singer's solo LP came from the pens of Sayer/Courtney.

The patronage of Roger Daltrey was a big boost for Sayer, who'd been struggling to find a suitable niche for more than four years. In the tumultuous London rock arena, four years can be one hell of a long time.

Endurance is what seems to count these days and Sayer stuck at it long enough for his chance to come. When new manager Adam Faith gave Sayer the opportunity to record his first album, the singer/writer decided to tell it like it was.

"My album is very autobiographical," he said recently. "When we first wrote it, we weren't going to call it "Silverbird" and in fact that came up at the very last minute. We were going to call it "The Loser", which is what it's all about.

"Basically it's the story of a loser and the whole bit is looking back over his life and times. I'm the character in all the songs, the situations are familiar to me, and they couldn't be that dissimilar to all of us because they're all about the past 25 years of my life. There's a lonely streak in everybody and it's very strong in me - I'm a bit schizoid anyway."

The first single from the album, "Why Is

Everybody Going Home", a sensitive song about loneliness, went nowhere, so "The Show Must Go On" was released. It would be a considerable understatement to say that Leo Sayer's record brought a breath of fresh creative wind into the jaded singles' scene here.

"The Show Must Go On" is about that feeling of not knowing whether people are laughing at you or with you, not knowing whether people are on your side or against you. You go along and you play a gig and everybody is looking at you and you never know what they're thinking. You can never work it out; you just have to carry on."

In effect, Leo Sayer uses the traditional clown masquerade as a sort of allegorical thread leading to a broader message.

"You think of a circus and look on that circus as being life itself," he explains. "You've got all the people: lions who roar and who have to be caged in and kept down, the ringmaster who's the guy who's got every-

CANADIAN TOUR SHAPING FOR HELLSROARING GROUP

Hellsroaring's first signing, Teen Angel, are warming up nicely on their frigid tour across Western Canada which should bring them into Upper Canada and Quebec over the next few weeks. April dates include the Russell House/Toronto (1-3), Pembroke (5), Barry's Bay (6), The Generator/Toronto (8-13); The Penthouse/Toronto (15-20), Picton (26), Hamilton (27), The Picadilly Tube/Toronto (29 through May 4).

Moving into Quebec the group plays six days at Your Father's Moustache in Montreal (May 6-11) and return to Ontario for their wind up at the Danforth Hotel/Toronto (13-18 and the University of Windsor (25-28).

thing together, and the elephants who are the big guys with the cigars, everything like that.

"And the clown is always the idiot who's got to keep everyone happy. He's that common denominator between the normal and the para-normal. That's why I use the circus; I think of the circus as life itself.

"I thought the whole clown get-up would make people really listen. I want people to bother to listen to the words because I think it can help them in a way, help them to understand it. Not just for publicity. I always think it's a bane of my life that lyrics are as important as music, the quality of the singer, or the quality of the band. The words mean so much. Dylan taught me that."

Only Drupi would disagree.

Sayer's "Silverbird" album is also roaring up the British charts and the little clown has taken off on a one-nighter tour of the U.K. It's not easy to keep those feet on the ground once the water starts to run.

"It's all happened so fast I haven't even had a chance to get a proper skull-cap made for my clown suit," he said the other day. "I just use a rubber bathing cap from Selfridges (the department store). Really! One minute we were counting our pennies and the next, the machine went stupid."

The pop papers are full of pictures of this little clown, and he makes frequent appearances on television. Warner Bros. have the North American rights to Leo Sayer, and it's going to be interesting to see if they can get the single off.

It's a catchy, infectious sort of record and one can only hope that music directors in the U.S. will give it a shot. The North American rock scene could certainly use a clown at this moment, I rather suspect.

MCA WINDS UP PROMO WITH KELLY'S

MCA Records' Vancouver branch office is now reaping the profits of a month-long promotional campaign conducted through Kelly's Stereo Marts, a major record and equipment retailer in the west. Buyers of MCA records at all Kelly's outlets were given a ballot to fill out during the month of December. The winner, picked last week, receives a steady supply of MCA discs for the next five years as well as a component stereo system from Kelly's on which to play them.

The promotion was backed up by an all-media campaign, including local newspapers, radio spots, window and in-store displays. According to Barry Ryman, western promotional rep for MCA, the contest proved to be one of the most successful ever staged through Kelly's and has resulted in sky high record sales for MCA in the western region.

Each number clearly lets you know why Elvis has been a success for over two decades. The A side gives us a taste of the past with "Heartbreak Hotel" and "Don't Be Cruel". The B side has cuts such as "Love Me Tender", "Are You Lonesome Tonight" and part of an interview of 1958.

CARLY SIMON — Hotcakes — Elektra 7E-1002/P

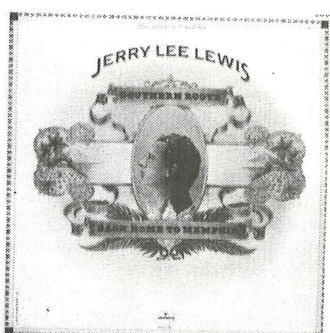
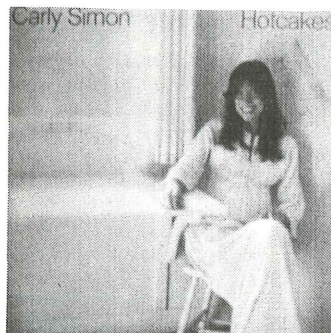
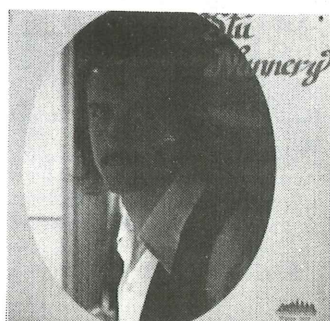
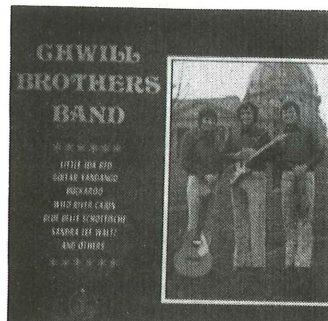
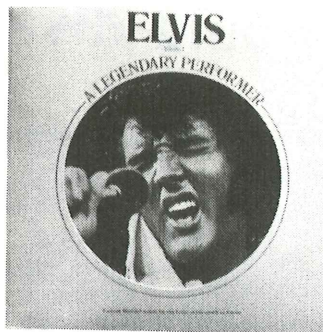
Carly and her husband (James Taylor) team up their talents to produce a classic collector of easy listening music. Her style and sound is unmistakably a folk style message music. A wide variety of woodwinds, tambourine, sax and trumpets are put to use to give her ballads a quality of their own. She is actively involved in the writing of every song on the album with the exception of "Mockingbird". Dr. John adds his talents to "Mockingbird", playing electric lead guitar. Notable mentions from side one are "Man On My Mind" and the title song "Hotcakes". Side two features a very moody song "Misfit" and a very poetic version of "Grownup".

STU NUNNERY — Quality 3023/M

Al Gorgoni has produced this refreshing artist with a full complement of his own folk rock. The tempo is varied from song to song, some with an acoustic guitar giving a "Feliciano" quality and some are almost a sing-along format. Stu's clear voice is put to use with no background help with the exception of instrumentation aided by a synthesizer. A sing-along song "Sally From Syracuse" is very strong on side one, followed by "Madelaine". Side two has three good selections of Nunnery's talent in "Lady It's Time To Go", "Diminished Love", and "Roads". We feel sure that this will not be the last we hear from Nunnery.

This album is as southern as you can get. Approximately 42 musicians were involved in its production, and all of them are from south of the Mason Dixon Line. Jerry Lee Lewis' own style of piano is reinforced by backup of the MG's. If you enjoy Louisiana bayou style of music, this album will give you what you want. Side one features some old favourites such as "When A Man Loves A Woman" & "Hold On I'm Coming". Old favorites on side two like "Blueberry Hill" are combined with new material such as "Big Blue Diamond" to give a varying appeal to this album.



CHWILL BROTHERS — Chwill Brothers Band — Marathon ALS 383-C

Here's a rare gem from Western Canada, professionally produced by Eddie Chwill at Edmonton's Project 70 Studios. Although the bag is country there are definite "pop" overtones, much of it supplied by musician/songwriter/producer/arranger/and what-have-you Dick Damron who supplies an exceptional sound backing with five-string banjo, harmonica, bass and rhythm guitars. Also shining through is pianist Henry Lorieau; Patty Smith, drums; Rusty Campbell, bass; Joe Henderson, drums and, of course, the Chwill Brothers, Fred, Nestor and Eddie., and a lot of fiddling from Eddie. We like "Alberta Cajun".

SONY TC-377 STEREO TAPE RECORDER

This is one in a series of Sony's fine recorders in the medium price range. Speaking from an operating standpoint, it is one of the simplest to run, load, connect, and clean. The TC-377 can be used in the upright position or laying flat. The controls are well marked with the VU meters well illuminated. Brushed aluminum and walnut trim give the unit a functional appearance with the control board blacked out.

To list the total number of features on this tape deck would take a full issue of RPM, so we will attempt to list a few of the more outstanding features. The TC-377 is a 3-head machine with a well designed dust protector that can easily be removed to clean the heads. Two of these heads are used in the stereo or mono recording and the third is used to erase. Three speeds can be used for recording or playback (7½, 3¼ and 1 7/8 ips), in conjunction with this there is a fast forward and naturally, a reverse. A four digit tape counter lets you know where your selections are on the seven inch reels. The counter counts both in forward and reverse. To keep the selections separate and with no noise between, a pause lever is used. A tape selector switch is used to choose regular or high frequency, depending on which type you are using.

An additional feature is the line output level adjuster which allows the tuning of sound. This control is seldom used except in cases where the utmost fidelity is required, and for this an oscilloscope should be used to determine the final product. Finally, a scrape filter was put into the head system to eliminate tape vibration and to stop modulation noise.

There isn't very much you can't do with this deck. Sounds can be mixed in stereo or mono - also, sound on sound recording is no problem with the Sony. Echo is simple to achieve, whether for recording or to use the unit for PA work. Dubbing is often a source of great pleasure for the amateur and using the Sony makes it even more of a pleasure.

Recorded sound quality depends a great deal on the source of material as well as the quality of the tape used. We recorded on normal frequency "pan Canada" tape, and hooded the deck into a Fisher 304B. The results were more than satisfactory, even for a recorder of a much higher cost. This is one of the finest stereo recorders we have come across and should be a valuable addition to even the most elite system.

I wonder just how many of the records in the Trade Magazines are sitting down the street and haven't even made it here yet. I realize that the Ontario area is big and it sometimes can happen that a station could be missed when the mailing is done, but it is getting just a little out of hand here at the Predominantly Number One Station. Oh no not the station that broadcasts to the masses in Motown, but the station that cares about a metro population of 350,000 — CKWW in Windsor, Ontario, Canada. Now of course everyone will curse the Post Master General but let's be realistic, let's point out a few examples.

1. A telex message on Tuesday asking for the new Diana Ross, well it's Friday and where is it, every major in the Windsor Detroit Area has it but not the Number One in Windsor.

3. So Billboard says RCA has released a new single by Charlie Rich from an album of his, well once again call the reps in Toronto and hear that old story it's on its way to you, well the same old story where is it?

Well you see Walt, things aren't all that wonderful here in Windsor when you're trying to program a radio station in combined markets such as Windsor and Detroit. When a new record that's one hundred percent Canadian comes out I get it still hot off the press and then play it even though I'm not supposed to wonder about a non Canadian record that's been out for a month or even two. I'm not putting down the Canadian Content Material, but how about a little balance from the companies. I'll give any help humanly and formatly possible to a Canadian record, but it's the help that I get from some of the record companies I wonder about. The new Canadian releases arrive in a nice package that could easily handle at least one or two non Canadian releases. I have worked hard to build up as much of a rapport as I can, but let's face it, I'm in the business of playing records not getting people to play them. If big brother wasn't across the river it might be easier but the 40 odd stations over there

are real and the only way I can beat all of them is to stay totally Canadian in all the things we do and also to keep up to them with the new music. Both Canadian and non-Canadian.

BOOT RED CARPET FOR TED WESLEY

Newly signed Boot recording artist, Ted Wesley, is being afforded the red carpet treatment from the Toronto-based label. A national promotion campaign is expected to get behind Wesley's single release, "The

James Bay Power Play", now No. 68 on the RPM Country Playlist. The single was penned by Bob Ruzicka through TRO-BMI.

Boot have also released an album by the young Yellowknife talent entitled "Blackflies & Mosquitoes and Other Love Songs". Most of the material on this album was also written by Ruzicka. The session was produced by Garry McDonnall at Damon Studios in Edmonton.

Wesley was born in Zambia of Polish refugee parents. He moved to England at the age of six, emigrating to Canada with his family when he was nine. He became involved in many of the odd jobs that makes men out of boys in Canada's north (mining, truck driving, etc.) shucking it all at the age of 27 to become a performer.

Negotiating the Wesley recording contract was Boot's president Jury Krytiuk who noted: "The Ted Wesley album is part of the Boot plan to do more recording in Western Canada and to get more involved in pop music."

GUESS WHO WILL NOW RECORD IN CANADA

The Guess Who are now firmly convinced they have found a Canadian studio that will enhance their internationally accepted sound. They have been experimenting with the Nimbus 9 studios in Toronto for the past few months and will release their first Canadian produced single since 1968, "Clap For The Wolfman".

Ironically, Wolfman Jack was in Toronto for an appearance at Speed Sport '74 and he was more than willing to sit in on the session and add an interesting vocal extro to the single. The session was produced by Jack Richardson.

Immediately following the session the Guess Who flew into Los Angeles to tape two "Midnight Special" shows. One, a special request appearance submitted by host Gordon Lightfoot, the second to be hosted by Burton Cummings. The Lightfoot show will be televized Feb 22 but no date at press time for the second show.

While in Toronto, the Guess Who and their manager Don Hunter attended a press conference during which time news of the group's headlining the Celebrity Tennis Tournament was announced. The Tournament weekend begins April 5 with a rock concert headlined by the Guess Who set for that same evening. Alice Cooper is expected to make a guest appearance along with as yet unnamed internationally-known recording talent. The Tournament will be a benefit in aid of the National Ballet of Canada, and is the first such Tournament to headline a Canadian act.

EAST WEST SWING FOR MERCEY BROS.

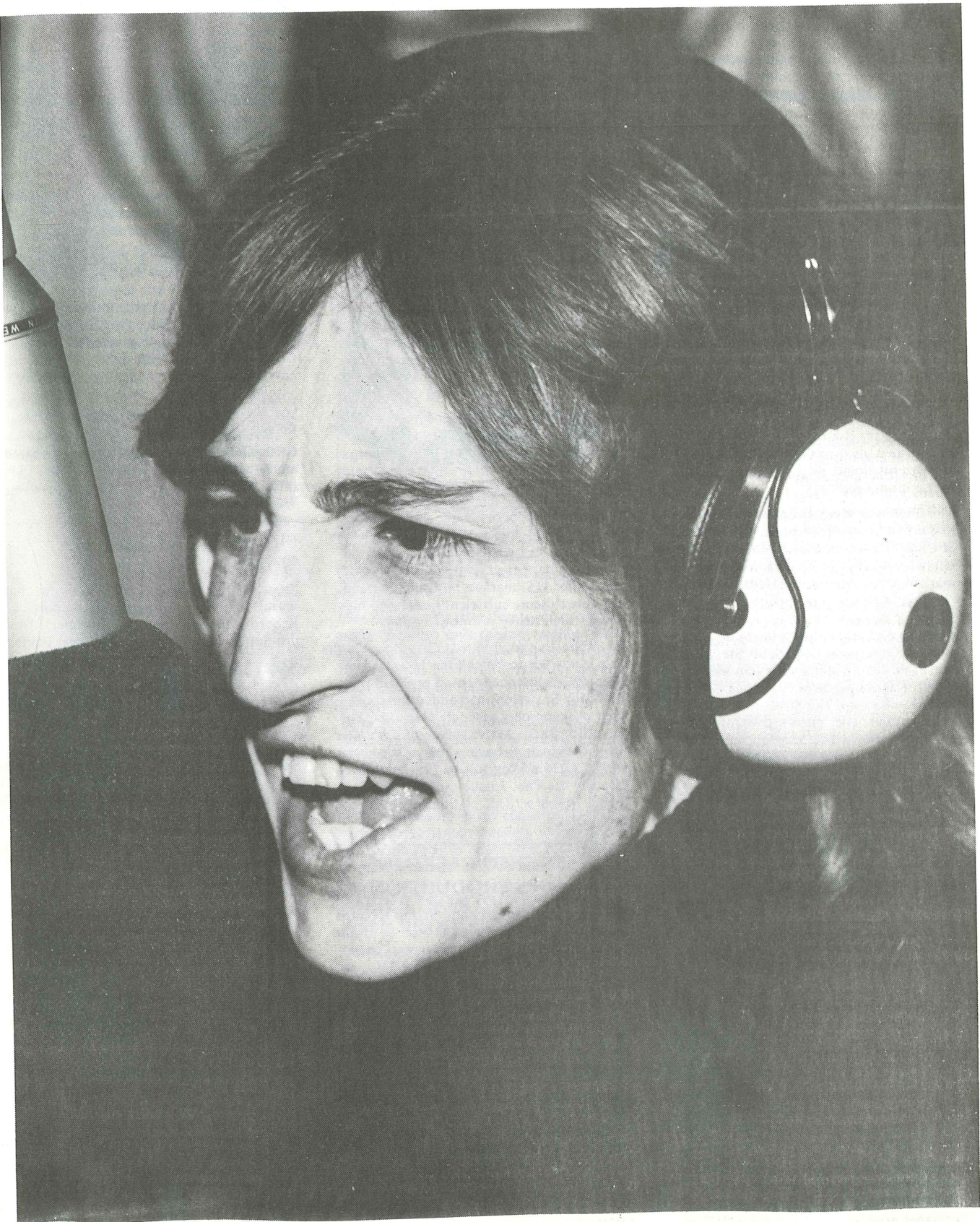
RCA's Mercey Brothers have a hectic schedule ahead of them that takes them across Canada. They have just completed three days at the Dartmouth Winter Carnival (Feb. 3, 4, 5) and after a concert in Alliston (16) head for Vancouver and a taping of the "Tommy Common Show" (18-19). They'll also be playing dates in Alberta including a week at Calgary's Romos Club (Feb. 25-Mar. 2). They have been filmed for a "Tommy Hunter" taping (CBC-TV) Feb. 15.

A three week break during which time they will be working in their new Elmira studios will set them up for a week at Toronto's Horseshoe March 26 through the 30th. They have put aside March 25th to attend the Juno Awards.

RCA's promotion network reports heavy across the board sales and play on the group's single, "I Heard Bells" and "Our Loving Times", receiving split play on country and "pop" stations. The single was culled from their "Mercey Brothers" album, also showing indications of becoming a solid seller.

"SEASONS" CAPTURES U.S. MAJOR MARKETS

Terry Jacks' "Seasons In The Sun", released on Bell in the U.S. has picked up every major market across the U.S. nation. It has become the fastest selling single in five years for the Los Angeles market and has now entered the very critical area of importance for juke operators. The single has been predicted a number one item in the U.S. within the next couple of weeks. All three U.S. trades (Record World, Cash Box, Billboard) show the single gaining on their charts each week with bullets.

Jacks came across the song, a Jacques Brel penning translated into English by Rod McKuen, a few years ago and convinced the Beach Boys that this could be a hit for them. Jacks flew into Los Angeles to produce the session for the Beach Boys and after several hours of producing apparently agreed to disagree and he took his idea back to Vancouver with him. He later tried to convince Larry Evoy of Edward Bear that "Seasons" would be good for the Bear but Evoy turned it down and went with "Last Song" instead.

After exhausting several avenues of getting the "Seasons" out on disc, Jacks finally decided to try it himself. He added strings and formed his own Goldfish label and released his single, distributed in Canada by London Records.

The single was given close scrutiny by both major and breakout stations. Nevin Grant at CKOC Hamilton charted the deck immediately (Nov. 10/73). That same week major marketers Ric Allen CFGO/Ottawa and Mike Godin CFCF/Montreal, playlisted the single. Breakout market programmers were also quick to pick up on the single. Lou Turco and Art Osborne at CJIC Sault Ste. Marie playlisted the lid along with Dan McAllister/CHNL Kamloops, Gene Stevens/CKPT Peterborough and Lee Silversides at CFQC in Saskatoon. The following week, "Seasons" entered the RPM 100 Singles Chart at No. 75 with a bullet and was PICKED as a contemporary winner in RPM's Action Sides.

Major market stations moving the single into their playlist week of Nov. 11 included CKOM Saskatoon/Michael Christie, CKY Winnipeg/Bob Gibbons and CKRC Winnipeg/Doc Steen. Breakout market programmers adding the deck to their playlist that week included CKWS Kingston/Gary Shannon,

POLYDOR INCREASES COST OF DISC SLEEVE

Polydor's Special Products Marketing Manager Peter Horvath has announced an increase in price for their 7 inch library sleeve. The sleeves, available to programmers and of much assistance to librarians, will now cost \$40.00 per thousand. Minimum order is 1000 units and effective date was Feb. 4. All orders placed prior to this date will be honoured at the old price of \$32.00 per thousand.

There has been an increase in the demand for the sleeves and Polydor has recently been saddled with an increase in the cost of paper products.

CHOW Welland/Jay Jeffries, CKPT Peterborough/Gene Stevens and CFJC Kamloops/Barry Bergh.

It was almost like a Christmas gift to Jacks when Bill Hennes went on the single adding it to the CKLW Playlist, week of Dec. 22/73. That was the door opener. U.S. record companies, keeping a close watch on the progress



of the Canadian single, began searching out the possibilities of a release. CKLW's Rosalie Trombley was, perhaps, the most influential party in having the single released in the U.S. on the Bell label, and that's when the action happened. Bell sampled the fourteen major U.S. markets with the disc and was able to score sufficient interest to move in with their heavy promotion guns.

It's interesting to note that Cash Box was the first U.S. trade to "pick" the Jacks' single (Dec. 29). Subsequent issues revealed that 11% of U.S. stations had added the single to their programming schedule (Jan. 12). The Jan. 19th Radio Active survey of Cash Box listed the single as having 30% of the charts with Jan. 26 upping this to 49%, and most recently the Feb. 2 issue showing a phenomenal 70% of all U.S. stations programming the single.

ARTISTS SHOWCASED IN KAMLOOPS PRODUCTION

Numerous Sweetwater and Stamp Records artists are to be showcased in a series of one half hour colour television programs to be produced at the facilities of CFJC TV, Kamloops. Format of the series consists of each half-hour segment being a "special", featuring only one artist. Among the artists to be spotlighted are Ken Stolz and Nightlife, Dave Baker, Patti MacDonnell, John Laughlin, Scott Jarrett and Baraka.

The series, directed by David Summerton and David Proctor, will air over CFJC TV, which blankets the large central British Columbia viewing area, and will be made available to other broadcasters throughout the country on request to Stamp Records. Programs will be available on Sony 3/4" colour cassettes.

NO CANADIAN DISTRIB. FOR U.S. GRC LABEL

U.S. mailing services being used by Canadian programmers often create problems in Canada with releases tagged "hit" yet not scheduled for release in Canada. These records are invariably charted to the chagrin of some record people while the more aggressive sales execs use the situation as an indication of a possible large sized hit — creating a rush release. Some labels, it is found, do not have distribution in Canada and, again the aggressive firms are on their toes with offers of a distribution deal.

GRC, an Atlanta-based label, has fallen into this category. They have a couple of releases, picked by the U.S. trades and, at time of writing, have no distribution in Canada although the records are listed on charts.

The label is showing indications of getting off with a Ripple deck, "Willie Pass The Water", and Dorothy Norwood's "There's Got To Be Rain In Your Life". They also have a country happening with "July, You're A Woman" by Red, White & Blue Grass. Jim Jeffries has apparently joined the label as well.

PINDOFF/EATONS PROMO PEACHES

Periwinkle Records received a boost with a recent combined promotion by Pindoff Record Sales and Eaton's (Kitchener). The promotion centred around the label's new

recording artists, Joanne, Betty and Maria, better known as The Peaches.

Pindoff, through Taylor Campbell, have been busy on similar promotions which have successfully moved product that might otherwise have remained dormant. A full schedule of promo events have been set up with various artists and small labels for the months to come.

Periwinkle is currently readying a single by The Peaches, "In My Diary", written by Al Rain and produced at Sound Canada Studios by Art Snider. The single was culled from the gals' recent album release.

INCREASE IN POPULARITY OF FOREIGN DISCS - CHML

CHML's music director, Johnny Murphy, reports an increase in popularity of foreign recordings. Language doesn't appear to present any problems.

One of the leaders in keeping excitement flowing with an easy listening "pop" format, CHML moved in on the Polydor release of "Ich Denk An Dich" (Danny Boy) by Heintje Simons. They have also experienced good phone response for "Bianca" by Freddie Brecke, a BASF deck, distributed out of Montreal.

Other product that Murphy has found success with are releases by Vicky Leandros/"The Love In Your Eyes", Charles Aznavour/"Old Fashioned Way", Mireille Mathieu/"Acropolis Adieu" and "La Palamo Adieu" and a new Philips release, "Goodbye My Love Goodbye" by Demis Roussos. It was CHML who first introduced the Katja Ebstein deck, "Star Of Mykonos", a United Artists release. The latter is now being prepared for a national promotion push by the label, which will shortly be armed with a new album by this popular European artist.

Murphy suggests that someone in Canada should get on the ball with regard to the recorded product by Walter Scheel, West Germany's Foreign Minister, who recently received much press (Time etc.) and television (Walter Cronkite News) on his song, "The Yellow Wagon Rolls On" (translation) which has apparently sold more than 200,000 copies in Germany alone.

CFPL-AM CONTINUES PROGRAMMING CHANGES

CFPL-AM London continues their shift towards news and information with an expansion of their successful "Open-Line".

Commencing February 11 the show adds another ninety minutes (6-30AM to 12 Noon). This extra time will accommodate more in-depth discussions, which have attracted the listener since the station added their "investigative feature" to the program.

A second boost for the program day is the expansion of assorted mid-day segments into full one-hour magazine-type presentations, beginning at 12 Noon. The entire news department of CFPL-AM will be involved in some aspect of the new program, "Noon Watch". Also a feature of this mid-day presentation will be two major newscasts, commentaries both serious and humorous, business and agricultural reports as well as interviews with people in the news.

WROQ-FM PROGRAMMING TO CANADIAN LISTENERS

Buffalo's leading FMer, WROQ has found heavy listener response in the Toronto and Hamilton areas and in particular through the Niagara Peninsula.

The station's program director J.J. Jordan, with an excellent track record prior to joining WROQ, brought the station out of their bland, automated solid gold programming into an "up-tempo rock and roll" format. Their change in policy has obviously worked with the April/73 ARP showing the station moving from No. 18 in the market up to a very healthy No. 4.

Jordan claims that 40% of his listeners are from north of the border and he has mail response to prove his point. He also has a surprisingly large number of Canadian calls registered on his "hit-line". So as to accommodate his Canadian listeners Jordan uses double time checks — "The time is now 1PM at Q and 12PM in St. Catharines." (The U.S. is on daylight saving time while Ontario is one hour ahead on eastern standard time.)

"We have to pay attention to what is happening in Canada", says Jordan, adding "We'll program anything I think is a hit". It was "Q" that was the first U.S. station to go on single releases by Keith Hampshire and Edward Bear. Jordan was first in with Terry Jacks' current international hit, "Seasons in The Sun". The station also took Wednesday's "Last Kiss" right up to the No. 1 spot, and interviewed the Ampex group on the air.

Jordan makes no secret about the fact that he is after Canadian listeners and programs his station so as to relate to that segment of his listeners making up 40% of his total.

ROBERTSON GETTING ON WITH PRODUCTION FIRM

Bob Robertson, formerly with CKXL Calgary, has increased the activity of his recently formed production company and is now working in partnership with Tinsel and Sham Productions of Edmonton.

The young firm (two weeks) has already tasted success with their Bob Comfort project, "Posters For Your Mind". Comments from the street level have been encouraging as well as that from the radio trade. Stations reporting good response include: CHED/Edmonton, CKXL/Calgary, CJOC/Lethbridge, CKOV/Kelowna and CFQC/Saskatoon.

The Posters are regarded as an educational vehicle as well as having entertainment qualities. They also supply radio programmers with valuable public affairs material.

Ralph W. Kirchen, Executive Vice-President of CHIN Radio will act (without vote) as Chairman of the Judges Committee.

In making the above announcement, Mr. Kirchen noted: "Each of these judges offer both the expertise and involvement with Multiculturalism which, we believe, are essential to an objective analysis of entries for an award of this kind."
