GRT/Greaseball promo pays off

One of the major complaints of recording artists and groups with their release labels is the lack of promotional expertise and money to get the group established and their product off the ground. GRT's Jeff Burns recently came up with both the money and a consumer attention getter, that resulted in increased album sales for the Greaseball Boogie Band in the Toronto area.

Of prime concern to Burns was a promotion campaign that would attract the eighteen to twenty-four age group. A natural was the vehicle most used by this age group during the sun months — a motorcycle, and Burns managed to score four from the Suzuki people. One of the bikes was to be used as a prize, the other three as effective displays in Toronto and area A&A stores.

Burns worked with A&A's Nathon Segal and Lon Appleby setting up displays, ballot boxes, rule cards and posters at the main store (Yonge St.) the Bloor St. store, New-tonbrook and Newmarket.

CFT Radio lent a hand to the promotion with a heavy on-air campaign and exposure of the group's two-record set album. During the contest Greaseball played the Colonial Tavern and made their presence felt, generally, in the Toronto area. The day of the draw, brought a large crowd into the main store of A&A's where the ballot boxes from the other stores were emptied into a large drum. Greaseball were on hand to make the winning draw and Dave Cunniam who was in the process of buying a bike, won himself a brand new Suzuki.

MacLEAN AND MacLEAN WITHDRAWN FROM REGINA

GRT's MacLean and MacLean, opening act for fellow GRTers Lighthouse, during their recent cross country swing, were responsible for a wave of controversy which peaked during the performances in Saskatchewan. Following a Swift Current appearance, a cleric bought local TV time to demand an apology for the "indecent" concert.

In Saskatoon, a reviewer was driven to using four letter words in describing M&M's performance. Fearing further controversy, Lighthouse leader Skip Prokop withdrew MacLean and MacLean from the Regina date, substituting a local hotel band. Although the duo regretted the uproar in Saskatchewan, they stuck to their guns: "We do what we do, use the language we do, because the people enjoy it. We make them laugh, and that's what our objective is. Lenny Bruce used to get hassled too."

NEW BOARD IN OPERATION AT CAMOSUN COLLEGE

Victoria's Camosun College has a new board in operation, feeding the station's output to the campus. The board was donated to the college by CJVI radio, when that station revamped its control room. Camosun instructors Kerm Carlson and Al Lehman, with the help of a professional radio engineer, reworked the board for use at the college. Currently the board handles two turntables, cart machines and puts out two signals which can be fed to eight campus locations simultaneously.


First student operated programming of the campus station is expected to begin in September of this year. Camosun's Applied Communication program also involves students in graphics, offset printing, photography and television.

DAMRON/MOBERG WIND UP ISLAND TOUR

PLP/MUSIMART LAUNCH CLARKE PROMOTION

Peter F. Clarke's "Hitbound", a self penning, is now off and the object of an intensive promotion campaign by the PLP label and Musimart, distributors of the Calgary-based label.

Producer Paul Palaschuk and Clarke spent fifteen months in the recording studios to bring about this release. They began with recording four songs in a four-track, mixing in Vancouver and then recording six songs in a sixteen track studio only to discover that the rhythm section wasn't up to expectations. They finally released record but found that it was badly distorted. They obtained a new pressing — still distortion and finally scrapped all six masters and started from scratch with five new Clarke compositions.

Palaschuk wasn't taking any chances this time. He hired some of the finest musicians in western Canada and added the vocal back-up professionalism of Dixie Lee Innes (Original Caste) and Barry Allen (ex-Painter). Final stop for the Clarke production was Memphis where it was mixed by Ronnie Capone of the Hot Buttered Soul Studios (Isaac Hayes) and lacquering by Master Craft.

TWO GRT ACTS INTO VANCOUVER

Two of GRT's top Canadian artists will be appearing in the city of Vancouver during the month of July. Downchild Blues Band, on GRT distributed Special Records, make a return appearance to the Zodiac Cabaret July 15th for a week. After the Zodiac date, they will remain in the city for a further week, although venue has not yet been announced.

GRT's Moe Koffman plays the west coast city, July 28 and 29th as part of the Benson and Hedges promoted Jazz Festival at the Pacific National Exhibition. Other artists appearing at the festival include Woody Herman and Maynard Ferguson. GRT is distributed in British Columbia by Emerson Sales of Vancouver.

RADA RELEASES MENDIETA 1ST SINGLE

Rada Records' John Rodney has announced the release of the debut single by Peter Mendieta, a Vancouver guitarist now working in the folk medium. Mendieta has been playing for fifteen years and has, over the years, played many styles including classical, country, jazz and rock.

In addition to band work, Mendieta has given a number of solo recitals. The single, "Sometimes a Breeze" f/s "Maple Street Spring Song", appears on the Rada label.

MELHUISH TO EDITOR AMUSEMENT BUSINESS

Martin Melhuish has been appointed Canadian editor of Amusement Business, a weekly newspaper for the mass entertainment industry. Established in 1894, Amusement Business is a division of Billboard Publications.

TINKER'S "SHANG" SHOWING STRONG



COMPOSER BAKER HEADED FOR ENGLAND

Baker will also spend part of the scheduled year long stay in promoting the production of his works, seeking commissions and generally getting his name around.



MERCURY'S HEARTSFIELD BILLED WITH GALLAGHER

Mercury recording unit, Heartsfield, have been firmed as the supporting act for Western Canadian dates by Polydor's Rory Gallagher. Kickoff concert will be at Vancouver's Agrodome July 27, followed by Edmonton's Jubilee (Aug. 16) Calgary's Jubilee (17), Lethbridge Pavilion (18), Winnipeg Centennial Hall (20) and the final date at Toronto's Victory Theatre (22). A Heartsfield album, "The Wonder Of It All" will be released in August.

ALBUM AND SINGLE FOR CLAPTON DATES

Eric Clapton's Montreal concert (9) had the added promotional boost with the release of his new single, "I Shot The Sheriff", and the album from which it was culled, "461 Ocean Boulevard".

Polydor expects Clapton's new single to be as big as "Layla" and will shortly mount a national campaign to bring the record home.

June was a "bustin' out all over month" for Murray who appeared on three television shows in three days in Los Angeles as well as a concert in Oakland, California and the taping of several other television shows including: "Merv Griffin", "Midnight Special" and the "Tonight Show". Also completed was the taping of a television special, in Bermuda, with Engelbert Humperdinck. Talks for an August syndication of this show are now underway.

POLYDOR HOT ON SINGLES FRONT

The recent issue of Cash Box (July 6) reveals that Polydor has 10% of the Top 100 — all with bullets. Leading the pack is Bachman-Turner Overdrive's "Takin' Care Of Business" (28), followed by James Brown/"My Thang" (36), Paper Lace/"The Night Chicago Died" (48), Johnny Bristol/"Hang On There Baby" (51), Ohio Players/"Jive Turkey" (58), Millie Jackson/"How Do You Feel" (70), Donny & Marie Osmond/"I'm Leaving It All Up To You" (72), Tom T. Hall/"That Song Is Driving Me Crazy" (73), C.W. McCall/"Old Home Fillerup and Keep-On-Trucking" (75), and Jim Stafford's "Wildwood Weed" (79). The latter was a recent "Battle" winner on CHUM, beating out — The Osmond's single.

Lurking in the wings is a hopeful single, "Teddy Bear" by Teddy Palmer and the Rumble Band. The Irish-based group recently spent several weeks in the Toronto area and developed a large-sized following, particularly from CHUM Radio. The single has been showing signs of breaking but the going has been slow.

Don Goodwin's Silver Blue outing, "Time To Cry", has now descended the charts after several weeks of chart action, given a boost by his tour of many major Canadian cities. He is currently completing tracks for his first album for the label, containing five new Paul Anka compositions written specially for him. The album should be ready for release by August, to be preceded by a rush release single.

Input. Too often a record company will phone to complain about a record that isn't high enough, or hasn't yet made an entry.

The conversation constitutes a complaint which often could have been resolved with some detailed information that could have been telexed to RPM and should have been part of the information used in our chart compilation.

Whenever we get a phone call like this, the

first thing that comes to mind, is that the party at the other end is "covering up" for a lack of motivation on their part. Record company information is very important to us. A lack of action on a single or LP on our charts suddenly becomes apparent, and a quick phone call to RPM might remedy the situation.

CHARTS AREN'T INSTANT

Reference is often made to the last chart we published and the complaint is based on THAT chart. Meanwhile, the caller can supply a vast number of new listings that are his argument that will raise the item on the charts. Little consideration is given to the length of time that has passed since we compiled the chart being complained about.

One thing I can stress here is the fact that because there are so many of this type of phone call, they tend to have very little value. What does have a great deal of value is the telex that outlines the radio play and sales action of a single or LP. No telex is ever ignored in this office, and all telexes dealing with the chart are immediately forwarded to the individual involved.

UNWARRANTED CRITICISM

You may construe this column as being critical of the efficiency of record company promotion people. Look rather at this column as having been caused by criticism of the credibility of RPM's chart.

Strangely enough, checking of our chart against information supplied to The Programmers continues to indicate that we are amazingly accurate in our computing.

THE NERVE . . .

The hypocrisy of criticising the chart and its effectiveness and then turning around and phoning to complain about the listings and the action, seems consistent with the thinking that goes on out there.

Like the artist who says to his manager, "What have you done for me today?", the idea would incense anyone.

Quite often we have been told that a record is released in Canada and find out a few

MUSHROOM'S "BELIEVE" CATCHING NATIONALLY

After several weeks in the lower end of the RPM 100, "I Believe" by Songbird, a west coast entry on the Mushroom label, was dropped. However, this week, the label's Shelly Siegel reports sales of more than 8000, numbers on twelve charts and "We have over sixty stations on it. Every market in the country is playing the damn thing and we have been getting consistent new charts and playlists."

Those stations Siegel reports as showing strong chart numbers are: CKLG/Vancouver, CKXL/Calgary, CHED/Edmonton, CHSJ/Saint John, CJIC/Woodstock, New Brunswick, CKRC/Winnipeg, CKBB/Barrie, CKGM/Montreal.

Pop stations listing the single include: CFCF/Montreal, CJAD/Edmonton, CFRW/Winnipeg, CKCK/Regina, CKOM/Saskatoon, CFRA/Ottawa, and others.

The Jayson Hoover single, "Love Will Get You", is also picking up in chart and playlist numbers. Siegel reports latest additions as CHED/Edmonton, CKXL/Calgary, CHNL/Kamloops, CFUN/Vancouver, CKCK/Regina, CFGO/Ottawa and more.

weeks later, that the record wasn't released and isn't going to be. The same goes for 8-track and cassettes that won't be released and later show up as being available.

Here we sit, publishing the most thorough and respected record source book in Canada on a weekly basis, and the trade is costing themselves a fortune because of their inefficiency.

Too often we will be barraged with phone calls about one single. The record company phones, the artist phones, the manager phones and sometimes even the publisher of the song calls (if not the songwriter himself).

In a country where few people realize what a music industry trade weekly is, it is ludicrous to criticize RPM and our activities. We need your encouragement and support, not your hypercriticism.

Small wonder that many major radio stations feel that promotion men don't do their jobs well and waste the radio stations time by calling.

It isn't our function to criticize promotion men or cause discontent in the industry, but we certainly have the right to reflect the industry's complaints about RPM. If RPM suddenly resembles a textbook on promotion, it would be a great service to the industry.

NO TIGHT LITTLE SHIP

No, Virginia, the record industry in Canada isn't the tightest little ship in the world, and the problems of the industry shouldn't be heaped on the shoulders of RPM.

If there's no room for improvement, we can go on the way we have for years, but it is my understanding that the music business is becoming one of the largest industries in the world, and it's a shame to think that 80 years later we are experiencing growing pains . . . or menopause.

The end result, of course, was the successful building of an image for Greaseball Boogie Band in the plum of the market. What was most important was the value of this type of promotion to GRT, A&A and Suzuki. With a little more ingenuity and not much more money, the promotion could have been nationwide in scope — and that's what GRT and Burns now have in mind. The contest was so successful Suzuki have indicated they will be working very close with GRT on future promotions. These will involve GRT's distributors — Emerson Sales/B.C., Laurel Records/Manitoba and Saskatchewan, Taylor, Pearson & Carson/Alberta and with their own branch offices in Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces.

The Greaseball Boogie Band will be concentrating much of their effort on the Toronto market in the weeks to come. They will be appearing shortly at the El Mocambo and Ontario Place with cross-Canada tour dates to be finalized over the next few weeks. A new single will be released by mid-August.

NASHVILLE ARTISTS TO MARATHON ROSTER

Marathon Records, Canada's largest independent Canadian country label, has announced the signing of U.S. based country artists, Donna Darlene, Shot Jackson and The Calhoun Twins. Albums, being scheduled for summer release, were produced at Toronto's Thunder Sound Studios.

Initial single release from Donna Darlene will be a Jack Hosier penning, "Testing 1-2-3", culled from her album, "Precious Moments". Besides the Canadian mailing, Marathon will ship DJ copies to more than three thousand U.S. country stations. The single was first recorded by Joyce Seamone, two years ago and, according to Marathon, sold more than 50,000 pieces, earning a company gold award for the artist and composer.

First single off for the Calhoun Twins will be a Marty Robbins composition, "Walkin' Piece Of Heaven" taken from their "Goin' To The Dogs" album. A Canadian mailing on the single has already been actioned.

Shot Jackson, well-known dobro guitarist, will shortly bow an instrumental album, "Straight Ahead" which features Eastwind steel player Bob Lucier. His dobro-ing can also be heard on wife Donna's "Testing".

STUDIO SIX SCORES A CANADIAN FIRST

Judy Gray, manager of Montreal's Studio Six, reports their clientele have now accepted the studio's computer remix section of their newly installed console and are using it extensively in their album work. According to Gray this is "the first such operating system in Canada, and has proven to be a worthwhile investment for the studio".

The computer mixing system provides instant and individual memory for each of the system's thirty-two faders. During a conventional, multi-track mixdown, all level changes are therefore remembered, recalled, or altered when necessary. This allows the producer an extra freedom to build a mix creatively rather than being limited by the manual operation of all the faders during a single pass.

Those using the computerized system include: Les Seguins and Jesse Winchester for WEA and Jim and Bertrand and Jacques Michel. Other studio activities included a session for Ellen McIlwaine, just signed to Kot'ai Records. Initial single will be Stevie Wonder's "Higher Ground" to be released by United Artists. The session was produced by Bill Gagnon of the Ville Emard Blues Band with Chuck Gray looking after engineering chores.


Just released and already showing on the RPM Top Albums Chart is the group's first album, "Freedom For The Stallion", the title of their first single.



One shot at the problems of Canadian country music won't put everything right, in fact it will probably get a lot of backs up. On the other hand perhaps that's just what's needed.

Being as you are programmers and record people you are aware that more than 85% of all Canadian radio stations in Canada program some country music. We have a good number that program only country music including the usual "class conscious" FM outlet. Unfortunately like their pop and contemporary rock cousins, record people argue that country programmers just "don't give a damn" about Canadian country music — and country programmers argue the lack of good quality Canadian country records — and so the battle goes on with only the country performer wondering "what the hell's wrong with Canadian country???"

A quick look at the country charts across Canada would lead one to believe that perhaps the record companies are falling down on the production of Cancon singles. Country programmers playlist and chart practically every Cancon country single released (check your charts). But what indication do these programmers receive from record companies that those records really deserve to be charted — or even aired? It would be interesting to discover just how many Cancon country singles sold 5000 copies. How about 3000 copies? You, Mr. Programmer, what influenced you to program that last Canadian country single you received? You'll probably have to admit to the pressures of the CRTC 30% Canadian Content Ruling.

Let's take a look at the RPM Country Playlist — and remember it's only a playlist. Dick Damron, a Columbia recording artist, is currently popular with "Bitter Sweet Songs". Any promotion that you have received or advertising you've seen has been supplied by Damron himself. He's a country hustler who pays for his own sessions and works his butt off on personal appearances just so he can keep following up his single with more singles and albums. Bruce Miller is high on your popularity list with his A&M entry of "Anna Marie". Here, we have a different approach. A&M, newly into the country game, unleashed their promotion talents to bring Miller home. Ian Tyson's "Great Canadian Tour" and an American entry, "When The Morning Comes" by Hoyt Axton. Experts in music, knowing full well that

country alone just wouldn't supply the necessary monetary return, A&M concentrated on productions that were country influenced but ripe for crossover action. That's the trend — check your contemporary rock charts: Charlie Rich, Tom T. Hall, Jim Stafford, Anne Murray, Mickey Gilley, Olivia Newton-John, Donna Fargo and on and on. Another Canadian with a country influence for A&M is Lorence Hud with "Song That Annie Sings", already crossed over to the pop playlist and making moves towards the Contemporary Rock 100.

Check further down the chart and you'll find Mike Graham with "Battle Of New Orleans" on United Artists. Graham had the advantage of co-hosting a CBC-TV country show as well as a heavy club and concert schedule. Did his single sell 3000 copies? Now we come to two very independent "independent" record companies — small but big on pride. Marathon Records and Gaiety Records. Let's take Marathon first.

Toronto-based and headed up by Jack Boswell, a very shrewd business man. Boswell wants a buck and more in return for his investment. He was stung several times leasing product to record companies and decided to set up his own rack jobbing operation throughout the Atlantic Provinces. Is he successful in selling Cancon records? First of all, that's all he does sell — and yes, he does sell records. It's doubtful though that he sells a lot of singles. His bread and butter is album product. His organization boasts an energetic sales and promotion team: Wally Hill, Jack Hosier and Doug Taylor — and they do promote their product, when they can afford it and when the talent justifies it.

You might just interpret this as a trouble area that bears looking into. Do record companies release too much product by new artists instead of developing what they have? Do they take the attitude of "if we throw enough crap up against the wall, some of it will stick?" Marathon would appear to be having a measure of success with Diane Leigh's "His Kind Of Woman", "Plant The Seeds" by Joe Firth and Donna Moon's "Baby & Me". They're now hustling a new label, Condor, with new artists the Newman Sisters/"Standing On The Promises" and "Happy Birthday" by Con Archer, and they're happening — on programmer's lists and charts but what about sales? Will they

sell 3000 copies each?

Take the Thunder Bay-based Gaiety Records and their current chart happener, "Little Boy Blue" by Carroll Baker, a charmer who has been constant on the charts and one who shows up anywhere, anytime to promote her recorded product. Baker is probably the epitome of the Canadian country singer — friendly, courteous and talented but a star restricted, up to now, to the country field. Gaiety is a small record company. Principals Chuck Williams and Don Grashey are working against tremendous odds. Does Baker sell 3000 copies of each of her singles?

Boot Records is represented on the Country Playlist by the Country Edition with "If I Could Close My Eyes", but Stompin' Tom Connors, who originated the Boot label with Jury Krytiuk and started it all with his first big hit "Bud The Spud" has lost a lot of his sales power. What must he think is wrong with Canadian country? Fortunately for Boot they have expanded into the music publishing business and some of the other endeavours that Connors has involved himself with have paid off. Boot is a very successful country label but have they spawned any country stars? Is there a star system in Canadian country? Is there in fact, any comradery in Canadian country music?

HYMN SING SUCCESS PROMPTS 2ND ALBUM

Waterloo Music has released, "How Great Thou Art", featuring Eric Wild's popular CBC Hymn Sing Chorus, their second album release by the Winnipeg-based choir. Using piano, harpsichord, celeste, organ, bass and tambourine instrumental accompaniment, the album contains many of the show's most requested numbers including: "Abide With Me", "Whispering Hope", "Nearer, My God To Thee" and others. The album was produced at Century 21 Studios in Winnipeg and is being released on the Waterloo label.

William Brubacher, manager of the publishing and recording division of Waterloo, reports a heavy demand for the group's first album and is of the opinion that many sales were missed because of a lack of distribution. Loyal viewers of the CBC show apparently attempted to purchase the album at their local record stores but had to resort to writing to the CBC for information. Brubacher approached distributors with the release of the first album but was unsuccessful in obtaining national distribution and set up the firm's own direct mail service. CBC-TV's "Hymn Sing" is one of the longest running weekly offerings by the CBC Network and is seen each week by more than a million and a quarter viewers, putting albums by the group in the class of "top potential".

Brubacher is still looking for a national distributor. Those interested should direct enquiries to him at 3 Regina St. North, Waterloo, Ontario N2J 2Z7 or telephone (519) 743-4388.

Waterloo has been in the music publishing business for fifty years and the recording of Wild's group is the beginning of a new era for the firm. Says Brubacher: "It's only natural and logical for us to now direct our attention to the Canadian pop music writer and performer".

The campaign and the invasion

Huddled around a board room table is a team of busy young executives planning a campaign to launch a new piece of product. As the meeting goes on, the promotion, the packaging, the PR and the advertising strat-

egy are all discussed and planned in an effort to launch the product and invade the market. Ideas are tossed back and forth and notes are made. The right approach must be taken at every point in the campaign. Tens of thousands (if not hundreds of thousands) of dollars are at stake but even more important, the team that is working on this campaign have the pride of their unified effort

LIGHTHOUSE DRAW 12,000 TO WINNIPEG CONCERT

GRT's flagship rockers, Lighthouse, jammed two shows at Winnipeg's Rainbow Stage, June 21 and 22, at six bucks a head. Besides the paying customers, thousands of fans flooded a park nearby the outdoor venue to catch a glimpse of the group. According to reports from Winnipeg, fans journeyed from such far away places as Minnesota and North Dakota to see Lighthouse.

A minor incident took place during the concert when disgruntled fans, who had been turned away at the door, stormed the gates. The concert was presented by CKRC as part of its Super Summer '74 promotion.

POLYDOR ACQUIRES EARLY ANKA PRODUCT

Polydor's A&R Director, Frank Gould, advises of the acquisition of all Paul Anka material that originally released on the ABC/Paramount label during the late 50s and early 60s. Involved in the deal are nine singles and eighteen titles, set for release by July 15th as part of Polydor's Mouldy Oldies series.

Included in the release will be: "Diana" (PC 1046), "You Are My Destiny" (PC 1047), "Lonely Boy" (PC 1049), "Tonight My Love, Tonight" (PC 1053). A "Greatest Hits" album is being scheduled for an early fall release.

The above deal was firmed by Gould and William Buster of Eric Records of Philadelphia.

to launch and complete the campaign and beat out their competitors.

A great deal of time is spent in the discussion of the approach that should be taken. The packaging has been seen by all and is discussed and plans are made for additional photographs to be taken for the press kits that will be prepared. The angle that will be used in their advertising is discussed and every aspect of the advertising campaign is thoroughly gone over.

Just viewing this meeting and the effort that goes into the planning would inspire anyone. Everyone believes in the product and everyone believes in the campaign and in the ability of the team to beat out the competition.

THAT'S HOW IT'S DONE

If you think I have just described a meeting that would launch a new recording artist or a new label . . . you're pretty naive. In all my years in the record business I have seen nothing that vaguely resembles this kind of an effort put forth to introduce a new record.

With so much product coming out on the market, you might say that it would be impossible to put that much of a concentrated effort into getting a campaign going for every artist and label that comes on the scene.

The record industry in Canada has never had to campaign to get records and artists started, and a meeting like the one described above doesn't happen. Nor are there such meetings on a smaller scale. One wonders just what could be done if an intense effort were made to promo the next big artist into the world market.

POTENTIAL MAY BE DISILLUSIONING

Well, there are reasons that Canadian record companies don't spend that much time, effort and money to build an act. The potential in Canada doesn't warrant the effort, and there is no guarantee that a successful campaign that will create a star in Canada will spread throughout the world.

The result is that promotion takes a very low key role in the record company. Promo men end up working on that which is already successful and furthering that which is already assured.

It was a few years ago when someone asked why we should produce records in Canada when so many good records come out of the United States. That can be taken one step further and you could ask why we would launch a promotion of a Canadian artist when so many good promotions originate in the

United States AND THE UNITED KINGDOM . . . and that is where the answer lies. The fact that the British invasion happened outside of the U.K. is an indication that the campaign can become an invasion of the international market.

Years ago, production and talent were criticized. Today, the facilities and the craftsmen and the people involved in the allied arts of the music industry are an indication that Canada can produce a hit. Now the question is . . . can we promote a hit into the international market?

DOOR-OPENER TO INTERNATIONAL MARKET

Few record heads and promo people realize that the biggest door-opener to the international market is a hit in your own country. It has happened in Canada a number of times, by accident. We should now launch the campaigns that will make it happen with intent.

REMEDY: Release fewer records, but of higher quality. Establish a budget and campaign to promo the artist that is as big as the production cost. Put sizeable head money in front for leased masters so that the record company really gets their feet wet. Compete with the independent labels that are making the major record companies look like amateurs.

The prospectus of a campaign to launch a new artist should be as big as the artist and the session. If you can't stand the heat, pass on the artist.

SHIT AGAINST THE WALL

Promotion and starbuilding better become an art in Canada. The philosophy that if you throw enough shit up against the wall . . . some of it will stick, has proven to be an expensive proposition that didn't work. Tear a page out of the book of foreign stars, and get organized.

It's 1974, and the Government of Canada has handed the record industry a chance to develop a star system. It might be wise to get off your asses before someone decides that the system is being suppressed . . . or are you going to wait for the writing to appear on the wall.

STAYING STATUS QUO

This series would not be possible if I were trying to make friends. It is time to re-evaluate the system. Is IS being criticized and if I'm wrong, YOU have the option of staying status quo.

Now get out there and FIGHT FIGHT FIGHT! You may even get to enjoy it and the clang clang clang of the cash registers.

It was rather discouraging to see two of our countries strongest and most talented artists involved in a situation beyond their control and one which is destroying them in this country. I am referring to Gordon Lightfoot and Anne Murray. Let me illustrate my point with fact.

Gordon Lightfoot is having phenomenal success with both the LP and the single of "Sundown". Have you noticed that in Canada at all the major stations his single went to No. 5 only while it reached No. 1 or 2 at least at virtually every U.S. major. Why? The LP situation is the same with Top 10 sales in Canada, which is great, but I have not seen No. 1 sales here as opposed to the U.S. where it is a gangbuster No. 1. COULD WE BE KILLING GORDON LIGHTFOOT. IS "SUNDOWN" JUST ANOTHER LIGHTFOOT SONG TO CANADIANS?

Even more obvious is the case of Anne Murray. "You Won't See Me" is one of the best singles she has ever had. What Talent! Heading for gold in the U.S. for sure. In Canada, well we thought we had a winner but it only squeaked into No. 15 and was dropped after 7 weeks. Was this just another Anne Murray record? Are we guilty of mass murder of our best talent?

Recently Terry Jacks and I were returning from a speaking engagement and we were discussing this very point. During the conversation a Lightfoot song came on, Terry smiled — pushed the button and we heard the intro to "Danny's Song", he punched to a third station and there was Lightfoot again. Honest Goods! It ended our discussion and tuned to KJR and the hits!

The situation is critical, we all know it, but no one is speaking out because of the frustration of realizing your screaming at yourself.

There will be many rationalizations for the above situation, all I can return to is the statistical facts which continue to raise unanswered questions.

**COPYRIGHT INFRINGEMENT
A LARGE HEADACHE!!!!**

I read with great interest your article (RPM, July 13) entitled, "Commercials Don't Have to Be Bad to Be Good."

In particular, the part that intrigued me most was that which dealt with the use of music from commercial recordings in the production of radio spots.

Since this article did not touch upon the legal implications of such practices, I am taking this opportunity to do so.

Most of the compositions released commercially are copyrighted. Therefore, it is against the law to use any of it in a TV or radio commercial without the prior permission from the copyright owner.

We, as publishers, are constantly confronted with such instances of copyright infringement. However, it seems to us that much of this is due to a lack of awareness on the part of the infringing radio stations or producers. Consequently, I'd like to stress to all those involved in productions such as mentioned in your article, that it is absolutely mandatory that they negotiate with the copyright owners for the fee involved and the required license.

**MORE INFO & BREAKS
ON GREATEST HITS!!!**

This letter is directed at our record companies — re: Greatest Hits packages.

1. When a record is released it should contain a minimum of 14 songs of artists' best works. If that number strains the music then the artist doesn't deserve a Greatest Hits. The number adds to sales appeal and because recording costs etc. have already been paid then a bonus should be passed on to public.

2. Greatest Hits packages should be reviewed every couple of years. An example is Bread's Great Hits Vol. I & II. This, in a couple years should be trimmed to 1 tight record. Same as Byrds Vol. I & II, etc.

3. Great Hits packages should somewhere contain a lot of information — re: songs and artist. The public likes this and it completes the total aspect of the record.

4. Record companies should make available discontinued great hits not only for potential sales but because the music is art and it shouldn't be lost to the public.

Examples are

Gerry & the Pacemakers
Turtles Vol I & II (combine for 1 strong LP)
Yardbirds (a strong package could be compiled).

The list goes on. I urge stronger packages with more concern shown.

Bishop moves into the Toronto area with a showcasing at the Chimney (August 6-11).

Ren Grevatt Associates, a New York-based PR and publicity firm, have been retained to handle U.S. publicity for Murray McLauchlan. The pact with the well-known firm was finalized by McLauchlan's personal manager, Bernie Finkelstein.

CFRB's Dennett makes "common" sense

One week prior to the Federal Election CFRB's veteran newscaster and top dog in the rating race in Toronto, broadcast what he referred to as "a reflection of my personal views at a critical period in Canada's

history". Phones were heavy — and indicated that Dennett was making rarely heard "common" sense.

Negotiations for the release of the Dennett editorial on record were finalized last week with Quality Records' vice-president and general manager George Struth. Entitled "Jack Dennett On Free Enterprise" the single was released on the Celebration label. The flip features Guido Bassi and his Orchestra and their version of "Canada".

Through the kind permission of Jack Dennett and radio station CFRB, the Dennett editorial is reprinted here, in its entirety.

"The Stock Markets dipped again today and while some of the decline here can be attributed to world conditions, such as inflation and high interest rates, part of the blame for our own market slide can be attributed to the fact that not one candidate in the upcoming federal election seems to have the courage anymore to put his name on the line as running on the free enterprise ticket.

"Forty years ago this was the proud boast of both the Liberals and the Conservatives. What's so puzzling is the fact that the name Conservative has been retained, but the Conservative philosophy has not. The Liberals today are further to the left than the N.D.P. was ten years ago and, sadly, in the view of many, we seem to be slipping into the stage of the welfare state where people eventually say . . . 'to hell with working . . . to hell with saving . . . let's blow the wad . . . because we now have the assurance of the government and the politicians that even if the roof falls in, they'll look after us'. What many of these short-sighted politicians and political philosophers fail to realize is that without business, large and small, as we know it, there will be virtually no taxes earned from corporations.

"When corporations and small firms don't make money, they don't hire people to work for them, and when people don't have jobs, they don't earn money on which to pay taxes . . . and when the government doesn't get money from the people, it hasn't any money to keep those who seemed so anxious to rely on the state.

"After travelling across this land for thousands of miles in election campaigns, and listening to hundreds of politicians give their story of how they're going to cure all our ills, and after being on the air with seven Canadian Prime Ministers, I still think the greatest and most pungent politi-


cal comment I've ever heard came in those oft-repeated two quotes from Sir Winston Churchill years ago, when he said . . . 'Socialism is the philosophy of failure, the creed of ignorance and the gospel of envy.' He added . . . 'The inherent vice of capitalism is the uneven division of blessings, whereas the inherent virtue of socialism is the even division of misery.'

"There is nothing that would please me or the majority of Canadians, I'm sure, more than to see everyone with plenty of money to keep them comfortable and have peace of mind. But this sort of Utopia has never been attained in any land in history by trying to tear down wealth, in order to prop up poverty. In Russia, things are on a pretty even basis . . . everyone struggles with virtually nothing and, sad to say, it's that envious philosophy of bringing everyone down to the 'level of the lowest', that's going to hurt the majority of people in the western world over coming years.

"Today it's almost a crime, or considered so, to be a success. It's not right to be thrifty and astute, so that you can save and become secure. There are those who would relieve the successful of their life's rewards to give to those, who often through their own

irresponsibility, have not reached the same level. Of course, the ones who should be helped are those who have remained at the bottom of the scale through no fault of their own. There is nothing that will squelch human initiative more than a guarantee that the government will look after you. Just remember all the promises made by political hopefuls will be paid for with your money and not theirs.

"It's saddening to think that Canadians place handouts and guarantees of government aid, as something honourable. I can remember the day when it was considered something of a

shame by those who were proud of their ability to make it on their own. As I've said before, any government which taxes away the rewards of responsible behaviour and effort, so that it can remove the penalties for irresponsible behaviour, is not something we need or want in Canada.

"So come on all you people running for office in Ottawa . . . let's take a stand . . . and quit this vacillation. Let's have a clear division . . . let's know your objectives . . . whether for the system that's kept Canada going for 107 years, which is free enterprise and personal human initiative, or whether it's for socialism and having a government giving all the orders.

"And don't get social improvements confused with socialistic philosophy . . . because they're poles apart."




