

Industry honours RPM's tenth year

Tuesday Feb 19th was a day set aside for the industry to honour RPM's Tenth Anniversary at a banquet held in the Centennial Ballroom of the Inn On The Park.

Approximately three hundred guests assembled for a cocktail reception which was followed by a full-course banquet. Later in the evening a number of speakers reviewed RPM's ten years and roasted publisher Walt Grealis. Master of ceremonies for the evening was Ron Newman, known throughout the industry for his talents at entertaining.

Guest speakers included: Mel Shaw, Harold Moon, Steve Lappin (Billboard/Los Angeles), Paul White, Bruce Davidsen (Vancouver), Sam Sniderman, Stan Klees, Ed Preston, Sjef Franken (CRT/Canada), Allan Slaight, Vic Wilson, Johnny Murphy, Carroll Baker, and Terry McGee.

Before the festivities got underway, Bobby Curtola greeted the crowd and toasted RPM. He had to hurry off for his engagement at the Hillcrest in Hamilton.

Throughout the evening, RPM was honoured with numerous plaques and mementoes of the anniversary.

The event came about through the efforts of a group calling themselves The Tenth Anniversary Banquet Committee. The Committee was comprised of Glenda Roy (RCA),

GEORGE HAMILTON IV SIGNS EXCLUSIVELY WITH RCA CANADA

RCA Canada scored a first with the signing of George Hamilton IV to an exclusive worldwide contract. This is the first time an established American recording artist has signed such an agreement with the Canadian subsidiary of an American label.

Mr. R.F. (Bob) Cook, vice-President and General Manager of RCA Records (Canada) made the announcement (14) at a packed press conference at the Inn On The Park. Hamilton flew in from his North Carolina home for the conference and then headed for a few days with his family before embarking on six weeks of touring the UK.

George Hamilton IV first made headlines several years ago with his "rock" single "A Rose And A Baby Ruth", which was also big in Canada. He was impressed with "the north country" from his childhood but it wasn't until, backstage at the "Opry" one night when he met Hank Snow, that he decided to see first hand what Canada was all about. While in the Hamilton/Toronto area he heard Gordon Lightfoot's "Early Morning Rain" and immediately fell in love with this Canadian brand of folk. It was much different to what he was used to back in Nashville — the "booze and broads and slippin' around". He met Lightfoot in 1966 at CHCH-TV's "Jamboree", and began including Lightfoot material in his repertoire.

Ed Preston, a drummer on "Jamboree" and later music director of CHML Hamilton, was responsible for bringing Hamilton and Lightfoot together on record and, of course, fell into a natural promotion of the product when he became associated with RCA.

Jack Feeney, another Hamiltonian, became involved with Hamilton IV resulting in his producing several Hamilton albums, including the "Out West Country".

Perhaps the single that did more to bring Canada to the attention of Hamilton was his recording of Ray Griff's "Canadian Pacific", now considered a classic. His most recent release "Dirty Old Man" was a national smash in Canada but a disappointment on the U.S. scene. In fact, Hamilton has sold more singles and albums in Canada than he has in his own country.

HANDLEMAN/HYPERMACHE LAUNCH MASSIVE PROMO

Hypermache (Laval), one of the largest stores of its kind in Canada, in conjunction with Handleman of Canada, have launched what they have tagged as "the largest promotion ever held in Canada". The promotion involves the setting up of sixty-four tables, loaded with tape and album product. The promotion will run from Feb. 25 through Mar. 2.

A massive television and radio advertising campaign has been mapped out along with effective adverts in the local dailies to add muscle to the six day campaign. Recording artists firmed to appear for autograph sessions include: Patsy Gallant, The Stampers, Claude Dubois, Francois Guy, Isabella Pierre and Rene Claude.

Hypermache, part of the Towers chain, opened in October of last year. Plans for a store in central Montreal as well as in Toronto are apparently underway.

Coordinating the promotion with Hypermache is Marcel Robert, assistant branch manager of Handleman's.

Having just completed his CHCH-TV series where he "co-stars with Canada's top country names" (his words), he will soon travel behind the Iron Curtain for a concert in Prague, Czechoslovakia — the first time a country artist from the West has performed in concert in a communist country.

Besides his Canadian television shows, Hamilton stars in his own British series, using "Countryfied", a Dick Damron penning, as his theme, and a show originating from Charlotte, North Carolina. Producer for his Canadian TV series is Manny Pittson, one of the pioneers of bringing Canadian talent to the television screen (CBC-TV's "Singalong Jubilee").

Feeney is just putting together final arrangements for his next album, the first under his new contract. Recording and release dates will be announced at a later date. Bert Mitford, who heads up Music & Artists Agency in Toronto, is the exclusive agent for Hamilton dates and is currently putting together a tour that should see Hamilton appearing across Canada before the year is out.

POCO SESSION ENRICHED WITH CUMMINGS PIANO

Poco's recording session, produced by Jack Richardson of Nimbus 9, picked up a bit of the "north country" sound through the services of "sideman" Burton Cummings of the Guess Who. Cummings was in Los Angeles, having just taped two shows for "Midnight Special" and was collared by Richardson to help out on a couple of selections. Burton's acoustic and electric piano talents will be heard on "Cricket Song" and "Faith In The Family".

The album, the third to be produced by Richardson, will be released on the Epic label sometime in April. The session was produced at RCA's Los Angeles studios.

CLINTON LYNUS BOWS STAGING ENTERPRISES

Clinton Lynus, considered an expert in lighting, has opened Toronto offices flying the banner Staging Enterprises. The Lynus organization recognizes that performers are now supplied with professional services, including management, better sound systems and promotion but is of the opinion there is one area that has been overlooked — lighting and "the quality that distinguishes the amateur rock show from the presentation and presence of a total, high-energy act."

A native of Windsor, Ontario, Lynus became familiar with the ins and outs of lighting while working at a local club. He then travelled across Canada and the U.S., picking up tricks of the trade, working with many name performers including: Count Basie, Paul Anka, Lou Rawls and Jimmy Durante.

Back home in Canada he began working on a system to overcome the problems of a standard system that was too bulky to take on the road and, in many cases, created a problem because of the power drain. What Lynus has come up with is a lightweight, easy to assemble, portable lighting system that plugs into a standard wall socket, "and", says Lynus, "a great asset for any performer who prefers personalized and reliable lighting, each and every performance."

The Lynus system is available to buy or lease. They also design systems, portable and fixed installation, specifically to the requirements and preferences of the individual artist or group.

COLUMBIA RE-SERVICES BEARFOOT'S "MOLLY"

Well on its way to becoming a national happening, "Molly" by Bearfoot is receiving an extra boost from Columbia. Besides a "turned on" network of promotion people, the label is mapping out a national campaign to bring the single home.

One of the first actions by Columbia's national sales manager, Bert Dunseith, was the re-servicing of the single, along with a make sheet on the group. Bearfoot is comprised of Chris Vickery, Malcolm Tomlinson, Hugh Brockie and Dwayne Ford. Their single has also brought much attention to their initial album release for Columbia.



A conversation with Walt Grealis

by Stan Klees

PART TWO

This is the second part of a conversation with Walt Grealis, taped on Saturday afternoon, February 9th, 1974. The transcript of the interview/conversation appears here verbatim.

SK: Let me just throw a few old chestnuts at you and get your reaction. How about RPM's chart credibility?

WG: You mean is the chart accurate and is it behind? I'd like to know how accurate any chart can be when it is based on only the information that is obtainable. I know that other charts don't find out what EVERY store is selling. I know that record company figures only tell you what is shipped,

take. No matter what we do, if the record company isn't pleased, they phone very quickly to correct the chart that "doesn't mean anything".

It means a great deal. We have made thorough checks, and we know that RPM's charts sell records. Maybe it's just fashionable to say they don't or just the Canadian attitude that we Canadians can't do anything right.

SK: But RPM's charts are behind the U.S. charts?

WG: Only because the Canadian record company doesn't get the product out at the same time.

SK: How about "RPM is negative"?

WG: Depends on who says it. We are often very positive toward one faction of the industry, therefore we are negative in the eyes of the opposing faction. We are very often positive. That would make us very negative to someone else. The source of the "negative bullshit" is one station that has an axe to grind and many people in the trade know their motives and feel badly that all this has gone on for so long. We have been more than willing to bury the hatchet, but we're a little tired of trying. So we have to live with this "personal thing" between Walt Grealis and so and so. The whole thing came about through a big misunderstanding and I don't want to add "credibility" (sic) to something that I had very little to do with. Confidentially, it isn't as serious as it is made out to be. We get a lot of cooperation from the group. It's just their leader who seems hellbent on putting us out of business.


SK: You've made that so vague that many people will try to fit into that shoe.

WG: That in itself is interesting. The more the merrier. You wanted some direct answers. I'm giving them to you.

SK: How much did RPM have to do with the 30% Canadian content ruling?

WG: Very little. Long before we started RPM, the government was concerned with the problem. There was already a content ruling on television and they were working on one for radio. The really aggressive groups that fought for the Canadian content ruling on radio have been forgotten. I can tell you that John Mills of CAPAC was one of the leaders of Canadian content legislation, by his own admission. In fact he was one of the most active people in that area even before RPM began. ACTRA was also active in lobbying the government. RPM didn't submit one formal brief to the government on Canadian content. Not one, and the record stands as proof that we made no formal approach to any branch of the government before the ruling was passed. I know, and you were a part of it, that a group of independent producers flew to Ottawa and met with the CRTC. We also know that Pat Pearce asked you to stop talking and had to pump the other producers to talk. We also know that that meeting was common knowledge to those opposing the ruling hours after it occurred. That meeting was also the reason you had a great deal of trouble in following your chosen career.

and Montreal. What is important is how the chart is read. The dealer should read it from the top. The most vital information is in the top ten. The top thirty should interest him and the top fifty is a good thing to study. The top one hundred will give him an advance look at what is going up in new singles or LPs and new additions to the charts are usually things he should be aware of and watch out for. On the other hand, the programmer reads the chart from the bottom and looks at the records that are coming into play. It's important that he be aware of the records that will soon be hitbound. The tighter the playlist, the more he has to worry about the quality of what he is playing. Bear in mind that his playlist is decided elsewhere and by someone else. That's what the industry means by "if in doubt, don't".

How accurate are the RPM charts? As accurate as we can make them from the information we receive. How current is the information? We have been checking our chart against the U.S. trade charts, the tip sheets, local charts and charts from across Canada and we are current.

SK: Do the RPM charts mean anything in the Canadian trade?

WG: I'm told they don't, but all we have to do is put a record on the day before it is released and the record companies tell us that they are caused all kinds of trouble, and if we (and only occasionally) transpose a record number, the record company will quickly tell you how many of the wrong items they have shipped because of our mis-

Lori Bruner (Polydor), Alex Sharpstone (CFTR), Vic Wilson (SRO Productions), Terry McGee (Columbia), and Johnny Murphy (RCA).

The \$25 a plate banquet was arranged without the prior knowledge of RPM publisher Walt Grealis who arrived with an invitation for a supposed GRT cocktail party and mingled with the guests for some time before realizing the true nature of the party.

Final presentation, and a very impressive occasion of the evening was the unveiling of a large plaque of the RPM masthead credo "...the prophets of doom, the messengers of mediocrity, will be overwhelmed by the new generation of competent, creative, confident artisans and by all those of preceding generations who have already demonstrated their freshness of mind, their talent and their capacity for inspired leadership." - Pierre Juneau - presented to Grealis by Vic Wilson on behalf of the industry.

The CRTC's Sjef Franken brought apologies from CRTC Chairman Pierre Juneau who, because of the current national television hearings could not attend, but did record a video-tape which was shown on a monitor for those in attendance.

We have taken the liberty of reprinting the text of Mr. Juneau's video-tape address which appears below:

It is with a sincere regret that I am unable to be with you today in person. Unfortunately, I have a rather pressing matter to

attend to in Ottawa.

I have in front of me a number of early issues of RPM. And what a difference there is between these early issues and the ones ten years later. From a mere 4 pages in 1964 to 30 - even 40 - pages in 1974. From a newsletter to a magazine. In the 13th issue there is a listing of the Annual RPM Awards. There were 8 to be made that year. The most recent RPM shows that this year no fewer than 24 awards are to be distributed.

RPM has grown over these past 10 years. And so has Canadian music. No doubt RPM's growth is partly the result of the blossoming of Canadian talent during this period. But I'm also convinced that the relationship works the other way; that, in fact, Canadian music owes a great deal of its success to the efforts of RPM.

Things have changed because of RPM. Yet RPM still stands for the same thing now that it stood for 10 years ago. The editorial in the 14th issue states it succinctly:

"Reporting on the Canadian scene, to Canadians, and by Canadians, from a point where Canadian things are happening. That is our purpose" . . . A little further the editorial goes on to say . . . "We would be happy to see the Canadian industry producing 8½% of the North American market, which is our rightful share. Up until now it has been no one's fault but our own."

I don't know whether Canada - 10 years later - is producing 8½% of North American recordings; I am sure we are making our share of the music. In December of last

year, 10 of the TOP 100 singles in Cashbox qualified as Canadian. And that reflects the impact of Canadian music on a foreign (unregulated) market. It is good news. It would be even better if such an event occurred more frequently.

Our task, however, is not so much to export our music to other countries, as it is to make music by and for ourselves. A letter to the editor in issue no. 15 states it very well: "For only when we do this can we hope to retain in Canada the talented writers, singers, musical directors, musicians and so on, who are making a continuing exodus to other countries."

The Commission shares this concern. There must be room on Canadian airwaves for the musical expression of our own composers and our own performers. Regulation is a last resort, and RPM has argued long and persuasively against the introduction of quotas, hoping instead that a voluntary effort would produce the hoped-for results.

Well, we do have regulations . . . as a necessity. They are not perfect, and they do not replace a more positive motivation. But I do not doubt that they have accomplished at least part of their purpose. And I also know that there now are many broadcasters who would voluntarily program 30% Canadian music if the regulations were scrapped tomorrow.

An ideal regulation is one whose ultimate effect is to render itself unnecessary. It is my hope that the Canadian music industry will reach such a level of productivity and excellence that even the least motivated broadcaster will want to program at least 30% Canadian music.

The regulations were intended as a step toward establishing that kind of climate. And that has been, and still is the purpose of RPM. If the past 10 years are any indication of the direction RPM will take in the next decade, we can expect an even greater awareness of Canadian music, here and abroad.


To speak of RPM is to speak of Walt Grealis, for seldom have the man and his work been more closely identified. It was Walt Grealis who gave up a career in artist management to start RPM - without partners, without capital other than his own.

And the only real reward he has reaped for his effort so far has been the knowledge that his work has made a difference - has made it a little easier for Canadian music and musicians to obtain the recognition that he so strongly felt they deserved.


On behalf of the Commission I wish to express our thanks to RPM - to Walt Grealis - for giving Canadian music the independent voice it so urgently needed.






Terry McGee, Columbia promo rep and member of the Committee for the Tenth Anniversary banquet, gets the show underway.


POLYDOR SHOWS STRENGTH IN SINGLES MARKET

Polydor's Richard Glanville-Brown reports a heavy concentration of radio play and sales for several of their single releases, much of it with Canadian product. Top of the chart action goes to Olivia Newton-John's "Let Me Be There" and Terry Stafford's "Spiders and Snakes", with Tom T. Hall's crossover hit, "I Love" now bidding for a Top 5 berth. On the Canadian front, Joey Gregorash is looking good in the U.S. and Canada with his "You've Been Wrong" deck. Several majors across Canada as well as breakout markets have playlisted and charted the single. Bill Gavin gives the deck a "personal pick" with action now showing at KRLA Los Angeles, WORC Worcester, WDAC Boston, KWHL and WBDQ Minneapolis and WDHF in Chicago. The Cooper Brothers, out of Ottawa, are still kicking at the national door with their Trillium production, "Finally (With You)". Major and breakout markets have recognized this brand spanking new talent as one to chart. Glanville-Brown also reports hefty sales to back up the radio play picture of the above singles.

The big album news from Polydor also concerns a Canadian group. Bachman-Turner Overdrive are jingling the cash registers with sales of their Mercury album, "Bachman-Turner Overdrive II". Sales on this one alone are reported to be in excess of 175,000 units sold. Their first set for the label has now rolled over the 250,000 units sold — a rare happening for a Canadian recording unit. Polydor's network of promotion people have been working overtime in an effort to set the stage for the group's tour of Ontario. Window displays, in-store displays, radio, television and press support is now being shaped into a massive promotion for this west coast group. A single release, "Let It Ride" culled from their second album, is expected to be making chart noise shortly.

POLYDOR (U.S.) OFF WITH FOLDY SINGLE

Kanata recording artist, Peter Foldy, has been attracting attention from record people south of the border resulting in



Polydor (U.S.) bidding for and firming a distribution deal for his new single, "When I Am So In Love". The deal calls for worldwide distribution excluding a few previously licensed territories.

The initial contact was made by Foldy's manager, Jack Thompson, who heads up the Agency For The Creative Arts. The deal was arranged by Quality's Vice-President and General Manager, George Struth in conjunction with Kanata's President, Gene Lees. The single was culled from Foldy's soon-to-be-released album. A release for the latter part of February is expected.

The "Love" deck has experienced good programmer acceptance on both the contemporary rock and "pop" levels. Kanata product is distributed in Canada by Quality.





CAPITOL (CANADA) FORGING AHEAD WITH CANCON PRODUCT

Paul White, Director of A&R for Capitol (Canada) reports: "There has been no slowdown in production of Canadian content recordings at Capitol-EMI of Canada Ltd." As well as a steady stream of releases and recording, Capitol have continued to search out and sign new talent.

Christopher Kearney is now under a new contract as an exclusive Capitol recording artist. He was formerly under contract with Sundog Productions with his recorded product leased to Capitol. White noted: "Under our agreement with Kearney, he will record for us with a new producer." Kearney is currently cutting a series of demos with his new back-up band before going into his actual recording session.

A new artist with Capitol is Justin Paige. His debut recording session is now being readied by White.

Karo, a very large name in the Quebec market, is ready for her first English language session. The taping will take place in Toronto mid-March.

Anne Murray's new album, under title of her hit single, "Love Song", is being rush-released to take advantage of the many happenings (i.e. Oscars, Grammies, Junos etc.) over the next few weeks.

Just completing new sessions for Capitol are: Edward Bear, New Potatoes, Tommy Graham, Susanne Stevens and Lise Thouin.

Nimbus 9's Jack Richardson was asked to lay down a fortyish-styling of "The Lady Is A Tramp" using only piano, bass and drums.

Cooper was one of the first to utilize the new Nimbus 9 studios, with much of his latest album being produced here by Richardson.

singles by Bill King, Larry Smith and Bob McBride -- all part of the H.P. & Bell Production stable.

Ready for a try at the disc business is singer/composer EM, who will soon bow his new single, which falls in line with Capitol's planning of doing more demo sessions with potential Capitol acts and announcing new contract signings.

White and his A&R division has also been busy on the international front, particularly with acts from EMI-UK. Foremost discovery is Cockney Rebel now ready with their first album release. White has also picked up the new album by The Shadows -- the group who became popular in the sixties, first as the back-up crew to Cliff Richard and then on their own as an instrumental unit. This will be their first session as a group in more than eight years.

BTO BREAKING FAST WITH NEW SINGLE

Bachman-Turner Overdrive, now established on the Canadian and U.S. record scene, would appear to be breaking fast with their latest Mercury single, "Let It Ride". First week of release saw chart action at CKLW (29) with a flurry of excitement on playlists at CKLC and CKWS Kingston, CHAM and CKOC Hamilton, CHLO St. Thomas, CKRC Winnipeg and CKLG and CFUN Vancouver.

The Vancouver-based group are currently touring Ontario, which should lend a great deal of sales strength to their new single and the album from which it was culled, "Bachman-Turner Overdrive II".

MISS TEEN CANADA 1974 TO BE BROADCAST ON CTV



SK: If you go any further with that, you'll be interviewing me, but . . .

WG: That wouldn't be a bad idea. You would have a great deal to say that would be interesting. What was the question you asked me?

SK: I asked if RPM really had a great deal to do with causing the ruling?

WG: The blame for the ruling lies in the hands of those who made it necessary. I know Juneau well enough that he doesn't want any regulations that aren't necessary, and would get rid of this one as soon as it wasn't needed. So who caused the ruling?

SK: What is wrong with Canadian record companies?

WG: They're behind the times. They are still living in the 40s and 50s and 60s. The industry has changed, and many of the people in power are still using the old concepts of promotion and merchandising. They are also holding back new ideas and concepts that are being brought to them by their younger staffers. That's just one problem. There are many.

SK: How about promotion?

WG: Too much concentration on Top 30 radio. Too much stress on promoting singles. Too much garbage being mailed to the trade. The industry has changed and a lot of the guys in it aren't willing to look for new concepts. Promotion men spend too much time chauffeuring artists around and not enough time in smaller stations. RPM would like to hold monthly seminars for promo men at which the best of promotion and merchandising people could be invited to speak and answer questions. It would help us, and help the trade. We would need the assistance of all the record companies to do this.

SK: Aren't RPM's Communications Meetings trying to do that.

WG: No. They are designed to fulfil a greater need and have to be very general. What we need is to zero in on promotion and publicity and advertising. One other thing. You yourself could be of great help in writing to the trade in RPM about advertising. You're one of the most knowledgeable people in the industry when it comes to advertising and it would help the trade and RPM a great deal if you did a series of articles on advertising and PR and promotion. You were one of the top promo men in Canada at one time and later a top executive of a record company and also Canada's leading producer in the late 50s and early 60s. You could tell the trade a great deal.

SK: Now that should be erased from the tape.

WG: We erase nothing and we change nothing. The interview will have to be lifted from the tape just the way we are doing it.

SK: Then possibly I'm one of the people you were talking about who had fallen behind the times?

WG: I don't think so. I think you've done a great job creating an image for RPM with

the funds that were available to you. It was you who got Marshall McLuhan and Judy LaMarsh to speak at C8 . . . not an easy task.

SK: How about the image of the record companies in the Juno Awards?

WG: I asked you to ask me that before we began because I wanted to answer. I really believe that the trade reflects its opinion of the record companies in the poll, and so far I agree entirely with the nominations. I will also agree with the winners. One thing record companies can learn from the poll is that they need some sprucing up in the marketplace. Just because you have the right product to sell at the moment doesn't mean the people who you are dealing with respect your operation. If it is important to the companies to win, they better look again at what kind of image they project to the trade. It's fine for the companies to scream "Unfair!", but it's really unfair for them to feel they have an image in the trade when they haven't. It's about time some companies went out into the trade and checked their image. Some are bloody awful. They may make a profit, but it is in spite of their lack of polish and professionalism. Their profits could be greater if they were more effective.

SK: Will the record companies buy that?

WG: If they don't, there will be another poll (hopefully) next year. At that time they will find out if they did a good job and if their money was well spent. Some small companies stood well in the poll. I'd like to know why (if I already don't know) and it should be of great concern to the companies that didn't. We had a major shakeup in RPM recently, and the reason was that we were starting to drag our feet. I'm not going to let our image suffer for a minute. I'll fire every ass out of here the minute they don't tow the line. We pay good wages and we expect our people to do a good job, be dedicated and believe in the industry. We have enough troubles without having internal conflict and staff dissension. We owe it to the industry to project a fantastic image no matter how much it costs.

SK: The only way to get a story in RPM is to buy an ad?

WG: Stupidity. There are weeks when there are forty to fifty stories and only ten ads. Someone is dropping the ball in checking the ads against the stories. On January the 19th that wasn't true. No one bought an ad and RPM was filled with stories. Funny though, an ad is usually linked with a current project and we can't hold back the story because an ad comes in. What kind of people would say such stupid things. By the way, the best time to advertise is when you've got something going. It's also the best time for us to do a story. Nothing else makes more sense. I can name a dozen companies that haven't advertised once in ten years but have had stories in RPM regularly. We're so busy, we can't take the time to check the stories against the ads. News is news and that is what makes people want to advertise. It's bullshit.

SK: Who owns RPM and is it about to be sold?

WG: RPM Music Publications Ltd. and its

affiliated companies is owned entirely by myself and always has been. It was, and is solely financed by myself. We have never had any partners, bank loans, government funding or outside financing of any kind.

Yes we have had offers to buy, and the price has always been right, but I don't like the conditions of sale or the parties who want to take RPM over. I would like to keep it institutional and not a mammoth money maker. It was started to help the industry and I would like to carry on that way. I'm sure the trade would not like some of the opportunists who have approached us to buy or buy in.

SK: What if RPM fails financially? I mean it could happen.

WG: It could, but we would just change our format and become a little more political. Funds are available to us, and if we ever went on our own, it would be a more interesting sheet. It wouldn't be as big, but it would continue for some time. I hope that day doesn't come.

SK: If anything ever happened to RPM would you like to write a book?

WG: I am writing a book with weekly installments. It's called RPM and it has chronicled the industry every week for the past ten years. I will worry about that when it happens. I wouldn't let RPM go down the drain without a fight, and the idea doesn't particularly please me. Yes I would write a book if RPM folded. Listen, we're in the greatest period of growth of RPM and the last thing that concerns me is the end of RPM. This is just the beginning.

SK: Would you ever sell RPM to a foreign interest?

WG: Don't ask me that. You know how I feel about foreign domination of Canada's cultural resources. I don't think I could, and it wouldn't be in the best interest of Canada.

SK: But if the money was right, it would be in the best interest of Walt Grealis?

WG: If we were worried about the best interests of Walt Grealis, we wouldn't have an RPM today. Don't worry about Walt Grealis. He can look after himself without "selling out".

SK: You have a great deal of faith in yourself.

WG: The only way to succeed is to believe in what you are doing, and do it to the best of your ability. We enter the game with a feeling that we want to play. We want to win, but we want to win by following the rules. Especially in this business.

SK: What does that mean?

WG: It means there are no rules and you better make good ones as you go along.

SK: Is RPM a success?

WG: A very big success in that we never compromise our principles and that is what I call success. Financially it is a giant of a success in view of the fact that we have pioneered the industry in Canada.

SK: How do you feel when the record

SK: Have you ever been referred to by someone important in the trade as a "pipsqueak"?

WG: Yes, but what the hell.....those who throw stones and you know the rest.

SK: Anything more before the tape ends?

WG: Nothing except to say that you have drawn a great deal out of me. Have you ever thought of being an interviewer?

SK: I've been everything else. Why not?

WG: Thank you, it has been interesting.

SK: Then that's it.


