


Franken appointed CRTC radio chief

Sjef Franken has been appointed chief of the radio division of the Canadian Radio-Television Commission. The announcement was made by Peter McDonald, Director of the Broadcast Programs Branch of the CRTC.

Franken, a well-known figure in both AM and FM operations, was born in Amsterdam thirty-eight years ago. He took his formal education in Canada and enrolled in the Radio and Television Arts program at Ryerson Institute of Technology, graduating in 1960. While at Ryerson he became familiar with the practical workings of a radio station through part-time employment at CHFI-FM where he filled in on duties as operator, announcer and programmer.

On graduation Franken moved to Ottawa and employment with CFRA-FM and then with CFMO-FM later being appointed to station manager. In 1964 he returned to Toronto and duties with CHUM-FM where he assisted in establishing guidelines for fine arts including programming material by young Canadian poets. Resigning from the Toronto FM station in 1967 Franken enrolled for studies at the University of Ottawa. Again he took part-time employment in radio — announcing and programming for CBC Ottawa as well as freelancing for several national accounts. It was in 1971 when he joined the radio division of the CRTC Broadcast Programs Branch

CANADIAN SINGLES STRONG ON CASH BOX & BILLBOARD

Canada has been maintaining its reputation of having a foot in the door of the international market. This past week's Cash Box lists eight Cancon singles while Billboard has found seven.

Topping the list on both is Terry Jacks with his Goldfish single, "Seasons In The Sun". Anne Murray is next with Capitol's "Love Song".

Wednesday, who created a national name for themselves in Canada with "Last Kiss", are still represented on both U.S. trades, although their follow-up single, "Teen Angel" will most likely become a hotter chart item.

CREAMCHEEZE PLAY STRATFORD BENEFIT

It's been more than two years since the Creamcheeze Good-Time Band have played their hometown of Stratford but March 9 was a special occasion and their old stompin' grounds was the obvious setting. The event was the release of their new MCA album, "Home Cookin'", and what better way to promote it with homeowners than with a benefit for the United Way. March 9 was the date at the famous Avon Theatre and with tickets pegged at \$2.50, early indications had the special concert marked "a success". Promotion for the concert spread out to smaller areas as well as the major centre of Kitchener/Waterloo.

Creamcheeze (Billy, Patti-Cake, Jimi Kell, Dave Harwood and Doug McNaughton) have been busy on the concert circuit as well as receiving good exposure on local and national television shows including specials. They have been firmed for Toronto's Horseshoe Tavern the week of March 10. That same week MCA's national promotion manager, Scott Richards and Ontario promo rep Jeff Burns have arranged for a press party during which radio, television and press people along with key dealers will catch a little bit of Creamcheeze "live".

DATES NOW BEING SET FOR ALPERT TOUR

A&M's Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass will soon be playing dates once again. Off the scene for several years, looking after his record interests at A&M of which he is part owner with Jerry Moss, Alpert will be playing dates in Texas before moving north.

Canadian promoters are now attempting to secure dates but the full extent of his return to the public is not known. A&M Canada are currently putting together a new Alpert album for release within the next few weeks. This will join his other seventeen releases, some of which are ready for deletion.

Alpert's wife, professionally known as Lani Hall and a former member of Brazil '66 will be a vocal addition for the instrumentally-known group. Alpert's backup group is comprised mostly of members of his former group.

The Ampex people are breaking this one in Canada now.

Cash Box is ahead of Billboard with Bill Amesbury's "Virginia", but both agree that the single has slowed down as it has in Canada where the Yorkville single reached the Top Twenty.

One of the powerhouses would appear to be Bachman-Turner Overdrive and their Mercury release, "Let It Ride". Both trades give this one bullets.

Cash Box also gives bullets to Joni Mitchell's Asylum single "Help Me" and "Star Baby" the RCA single by the Guess Who.

Both trades list Southcote's Buddah single, "She", as new entries this week.

LEGENDARY PRESLEY TOPS POPULARITY POLL

Recently released statistics reveal that Elvis Presley is still the most popular recording artist — and his reign covers the past eighteen years. Presley outpoints the Beatles by almost two to one.

The study which took place from 1955 through 1972 by Joel Whitburn was published in the recently released Top Pop Records, 1955 - 1972. The points were apparently awarded on the number of weeks each artist was on the weekly chart of best-selling singles published in Billboard. Presley chalked up 1790 points with the Beatles managing 960.

RCA Canada recently released Presley's "Elvis — A Legendary Performer Vol. 1" which includes a twelve page "Memory Log" of rare memorabilia and photos from the Presley era; five never-before released recordings; and a full-colour photo insert.

TENTAM BUILDS A NAT'L AUDIENCE

Robert Tennison, who heads up Tentam Records, is doing it the hard way and, without a national distributor, has cracked the national barrier. His initial single release, "I Can See", a Tennison original through Brief Encar-BMI, was mailed to every radio station across Canada resulting in an almost immediate acceptance by pop programmers. Tennison moved into the consumer arena as well and was able to convince several retailers and rackers to stock the single. Play and sales to date have been so encouraging that Tennison is now busy putting together an album, "Two Words, Three Words". The album session is being produced by Tennison at RCA's Toronto studios. His first single was produced at the eight track Zazza Studios.

The Robert Tennison Troupe is comprised of four of Toronto's top male and female singers with instrumental backing by an equally professional lineup comprised of: Gord Fleming, Jack Zaza, Dave Browne, Jim Morgan and a string section.

Negotiations are now underway for chain store and rack jobber distribution of the soon-to-be released album.

LONDON BRINGING VILLE EMARD BLUES BAND TO C8

One of the highlights of London's hospitality suite at the Inn on the Park during RPM's Communication Eight (C8) will be the newly discovered Ville Emard Blues Band. The label has prepared a heavy schedule of events for the group. Says Ken Verdoni, London's national promotion manager: "This will be the largest and most lavish tour and promotion ever planned for a Montreal group."

March 4 saw the group taping a CBC-TV Special while the 6th was set aside for a press party, which gave members of the press, television and radio an opportunity to meet the Blues Band.

The wraps will be taken off March 12th when Ville Emard make their first public appearance at the Sherbrooke Arena. This will be the start of their Quebec tour which will see them play twenty-seven cities. The topping on the cake will be their Montreal Forum date (April 26), an important first for local contemporary music talent.

The tour will be interrupted to bring the group to Toronto where London will present them as part of their hospitality suite presentation (March 24). An album is now in the works with release date to be announced shortly.

DUANE WADE APPOINTED SUPERVISOR OF SCOTTY'S STORES

Duane Wade has been appointed Supervisor of Scotty's Records and Tape stores. The stores, which operate in Edmonton and Calgary, were recently acquired by Capitol Records-EMI of Canada.

Wade will be responsible for the day-to-day functions of the five stores including buying, merchandising and advertising. He had performed similar duties for Scotty's for a period of three years prior to the takeover.

Arnold Gosewich, President of Capitol Records-EMI of Canada Limited, in making the above announcement, stated: "Duane has shown a keen sense of understanding that is required to successfully merchandise records, tapes and audio products; and in reporting directly to me, I look forward to a close working relationship with him in further developing these stores and the company's retailing growth in Western Canada".

A sixth store is expected to be opened in the fall of this year.

Wade is a graduate of the University of Alberta with a degree in Business Administration and Commerce.



peg); Milt Brown (Saskatoon); Cam Main (Calgary); Denver Wood (Edmonton); and Gordon Parkes and Terry Clutchey in Vancouver.

Children's records, marketed properly, have proven to be year round sellers, particularly those easily identified with the Walt Disney family (Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck etc.). Walt Disney projected this relationship over the years with colourful and attractive self-service display units. The Walt Disney name is revered among adults and young alike for the "tender" approach in films (cinema and television) and the mind-boggling amusement complexes of Disneyland Park in California and Walt Disney World in Florida.

The Walt Disney people have also taken into consideration the bi-bi potential in Canada. Saturday evenings at 7PM the CBC-TV French-language network hosts "Le Monde Merveilleux de Walt Disney", together with "The Wonderful World Of Disney" on the CBC-TV English Network Sundays, supplies a unique and massive exposure vehicle for the Disneyland label. Don B. Tatum, Chairman of the Board and chief executive officer of Walt Disney Productions, recently noted: "Never before has our company been on as high a platform of public acceptance and confidence as it occupies now in every country in the world."

An interesting aspect of children's records is the fact that the product is not, and should

not be restricted to record retailers, or chain stores. Boutiques are now commonplace for displays of children's records. The display sells the product and it has been proven that pilferage is minimal. A study has indicated that pilferage on children's records is one tenth of one percent compared with five percent in other categories.

Prices for Disneyland product is also inviting. Suggested list, for example, of a "Sleeping Beauty", "Mary Poppins", "Snow White" or "Black Beauty" is \$1.59. This includes a 7" 33 1/3 disc with a twenty-four page book. A 12" 33 1/3 disc of "Bambi", "Donald Duck" or "Dumbo" carries a suggested list of \$2.49. Packages containing a 12" album and an eleven page book carrying a suggested list of \$4.49 include stories on "Robin Hood", "Swiss Family Robinson", "Winnie The Pooh" and many others. The Disneyland label also carries two-record sets which carry a suggested list of \$3.98. These include "The Best Stories of Aesop — Animal Stories of Aesop", "Walt Disney's Dog Songs — Incredible Journey" and many more.

The Vista line graduates the youngster into real record appreciation with Walt Disney Motion Picture Sound Tracks ("Bedknobs and Broomsticks" and "Mary Poppins") with a suggested list of \$6.49 and Fantasia Original Soundtrack ("Fantasia") carrying a suggested list of \$12.98. The above are also available in French.



Among those taking hospitality suites at Communication Eight (24) will be three "shoestring record labels" (their words), Nick Sloth and Woodshed.

Nick Records was organized by members of Stringband, currently enjoying local (Toronto) exposure on their initial album release. The album has been tagged "the most requested record of the week" by University of Toronto radio. All fourteen cuts on the album were written by Bob Bossin and Marie-Lynn Hammond.

The Original Sloth Band (Chris and Ken Whitley and Tom Evans) who specialize in "goodtime music" offer a varied package of instrumentation including trumpet, clarinet, guitar, jug, banjo, mandolin, harmonica

and fiddle. They are well known in the Toronto area. Their vehicle, "Whoopee After Midnight", an album that has sold very well and has resulted in the group receiving solid Toronto bookings, and a large following.


Woodshed is represented by its founder Dave Essig, a well-known slide guitarist in Toronto. His first album, "Redbird Country" was recorded at Thunder Sound in Toronto using the talents of Dennis Pendrith, Bob Lucier, Chris Whitley and Billy Usher to bring home his American country and blues styling.

The group's hospitality suite will be somewhat unique, where members will serve homemade refreshment and cider. Says Bossin: "All three of us have produced albums, each for different reasons, and we have all chipped in to introduce ourselves and our records to people in the industry." Group members will also be on hand to play cuts from the records, perform live, and answer any questions about what they did, how they did it and why.

It should be noted that these record labels do not have national distribution. As Bossin puts it: "We like to think that the six of our three respective record companies is out of proportion to the musical contribution they can make."

I would like to add a few comments to Dave Johnson's letter to the Editor (RPM 26/1/74 edition) with which I am in complete and absolute agreement with Dave, and I believe that with his help and the help of other Major Market stations, this problem would come to a complete halt.

To shed a little further light on the subject in question, it is that of records being sent to a few major stations (from the U.S.) and those records never being released in Canada. This week after checking the RPM Country Playlist, I found that we had not received EIGHT of the singles listed which were RCA singles, so, I made a long distance call to

**HUMPHREY & DUMPTRUCKS
FREE AGENTS AND LOOKING**

Sometime ago it had been reported in RPM that the Saskatoon-based Humphrey & The Dumptrucks were no longer with United Artists. The information, as it turned out, was premature and it wasn't until just recently that the Dumptrucks received official word from John Poser, A&R chief for United Artists, that the label was no longer interested in the group's product. The group are therefore "free agents and looking", according to Michael Taylor, a member of the Dumptruck organization. While with the label, Humphrey & The Dumptrucks chalked up an impressive "pop" and "country" playlist score. They have, in fact, been nominated as "Country Group Of The Year" in this year's Juno Awards.

Being dropped from the label has been a bit of a blow to the group, currently enjoying a fair amount of popularity in the west. Writes Taylor: "Perhaps we are just stubble-jumpers from way out west who don't understand the mysterious ways of the industry. As we never expect to be superstars or millionaires, we can only go on believing in what the people who do like us come up to tell us in our concerts. They say we are fulfilling a need in the commercial music world of today. They say they would like to buy our records but can't find them on sale. They wonder why we are not appearing on TV as much as the other groups. There is no answer for them. We are what we are and we do what we do and as long as we can survive, we'll keep on doing it. If the main motivation for being involved in the music industry is money, there is something wrong.

"We hope that our friends and fans across Canada will continue to look for our records (regardless of labels) and us when we play in the area."

RCA only to be told that only ONE of the eight were released in Canada, and the other seven were released ONLY to major stations for airing. No; these were not the only records we don't have, but I knew that at least I would get an honest answer from RCA and not spend money and time beating around the bush.

Why? Why? Why? In Hell do the major Canadian stations list these singles on their charts if they have not (and never will be) released in Canada? Moreover; Why in Hell does RPM list these (American Only) releases on the Country Playlist? To Hell with Billboard. Does Billboard chart a Canadian Record which has not been released in the U.S.? (By the way, that constitutes one helluva lot of Canadian product.)

Let's impose a (Canadian release) stamping on U.S. records, guaranteeing a Canadian release before we program it, and before RPM lists it. Until something of this sort is done, I will not be convinced that RPM Country Playlist reflects what is TRULY taking place on the Canadian Country Music Scene.

Fox really hasn't been out of the business, he has been busy on the image front with Jason, visiting forty-seven cities in eleven states as well as personal calls on Unit Co-ordinators, program directors and student committees at more than one hundred U.S. colleges (members of the National Entertainment Conference). All of which, of course, has armed him with a "very heavy" list of statewide contacts which could be of much benefit to future clients.

One of his first duties, back in Canada, got him out of the country again. He took off for the five day NEC meet in Houston, Texas, representing Concept 376 and Celebration Music's King Biscuit Boy and Thundermug. Fox will also be handling PR for Gary & Dave, chart moving Axe artists now happening with "I Fell In Love With You Sometime".

**DAMRON READY WITH
NEW COLUMBIA SINGLE**

Dick Damron will return to the single business shortly with the release of his Columbia single, "Bittersweet Songs" and "Somewhere There's A Mountain", both Damron compositions. The session was produced by Gary Buck at RCA's Toronto studios.

Damron is also busy with personal appearances which include the Kountry Kuzzin's Kove, Calgary's newest country night spot; taping the Family Brown television show at CJOH in Ottawa, an album session in Toronto and a show at Expo '74 (May 5) in Spokane, Washington.

Goodnoise brings back big band sounds

Goodnoise, the pop/English side of Barclay Records, is using a unique hook to bring attention their way - the resurrection of the big band sounds through The Hotel Orchestra. The Montreal-based orchestra is the creation of Andre Perry, one of the


first and most successful of French Canadian producers.

The suggestion that The Hotel Orchestra is a revival of the sounds of the twenties could be misleading. Producer Perry has

more than fifteen years of jazz under his belt, an obvious influence on the group's album - but he has introduced the sound of synthesizers "to match an entire orchestra". He recorded the conventional rhythm section along with a couple of solo instruments using the old fashioned overhead microphone positionings and even went as far as using old drums and cymbals which adds a little more authenticity to the sound.

Perry and his musicians, all accomplished sidemen between the ages of twenty-two and twenty-six, have presented a package of sound that is now showing indications of finding favour with pop programmers looking for a new twist to nostalgia for their listeners. Several cuts on their album are being programmed heavily particularly "Caravan" which was originally brought into popularity of Duke Ellington; "Tuxedo Junction", one of Glenn Miller's best selling records later recorded by Benny Goodman, Earl Hines, The Andrew Sisters and many others; and "Song Of India", originally recorded in 1937 by Tommy Dorsey featuring Bunny Berigan's popular, at that time, trumpet solo.

Polydor, distributors of Goodnoise, have expressed much enthusiasm over the Hotel Orchestra's album and have launched a national promo push behind the album. One of their first promotions was a lavish brunch at Toronto's Park Plaza Hotel, where invited guests from the press, radio and key dealers and rackers were given an opportunity learn more about the Hotel Orchestra from Perry and the label's national promotion manager, Bill Horan. The get-together was arranged by Lori Bruner of Polydor's Toronto office.

PERCEPTION'S DR. TURICCHI TO REVEAL PHYSIOGRAPH SECRETS AT RPM'S C8

Dr. Tom Turicchi, an internationally-known musicologist, has been firmed as a speaker at the upcoming RPM Communication Eight meeting (Mar. 23). Dr. Turicchi, of Texas Woman's University (Dallas), has developed a method of accurately predicting the hit potential of new record releases by measur-

ing the physiological functions of the body using a physiograph. He holds a Bachelor's degree in Mathematics, a Master's Degree in Psychology and a Doctorate in Musicology and has spent more than five years developing interpretive techniques and formulae that allow him to accurately quantify involuntary responses to entertainment material.

Dr. Turicchi is currently under contract to eight of the largest record companies in the U.S. He has tested pre-released records over the past year and a half chalking up an amazing score of 90% accuracy in predicting the eventual Top Ten success or failure

At long last I have arrived at the realization that I've got to remove my body and soul from the city as soon as possible. I can stand it no longer. This city life, which I have always abhorred, has finally done me in. I sometimes imagine that I can actually feel it spreading its poison in my soul.

Of course there can be no question that I've

NFB'S "ROCK-A-BYE" SPOTLIGHTS CANADIAN RECORD INDUSTRY

The National Film Board's new documentary, "Rock-A-Bye", takes a penetrating look at what the business is all about. The sixty minute colour film was written and directed by Jacques Bensimon. Through his close association with Canadian record, radio and press people - over the months producing the film, Bensimon has become one of the few observers of the industry to fully understand the social and musical problems facing the young recording hopeful.

Rock and roll takes its roots from the early rock-a-billy and Gospel sounds which suddenly emerged on its own in the mid fifties and became big business in the sixties. Rock and roll is now regarded as an art form and will probably be known as the folk music of the sixties. The international rock business is phenomenal, taking in more than an estimated \$2 billion per annum. Bensimon has captured this big business coldness and softened it with some of the moods and behavior of artists, businessmen, on-air personalities, sometimes catching them with their guard down.

There is interesting film footage of the Rolling Stones and Alice Cooper in concert at Montreal's Forum — marketing techniques that bring much needed record sales to the record retailer and exciting product to the radio programmer. Bensimon also zeros in on the importance of the new progressive FM radio concept.

Canadian groups, in action, including the Stampeders, and Crowbar bring the action of "Rock-A-Bye", front and centre for those involved or just observers of the Canadian music scene.

always been a son of the soil (and as some would have it, not much else) — but one thing they can never accuse me of is being a sonny-come-lately in Nature's field. And I've always known, deep down, that no matter what, this infatuation with the rock music scene was just a highway back to my roots in the soil. Out in the country, far distant from the roads and the airports and the high-rises and the clamor and the terrible ugliness of our urban times . . . cut off from a universally-lamentable future by trees and grass and sun and shade and streams and the unadorned earth.

It's been building up inside my head for quite a while. Not long ago, I was talking about this very subject with Jimmy Page, a man who shares my contempt for city life. He reckons that remaining sane in the big city must be doubly hard for an Australian: one raised in a spaced-out (physically) environment. Very likely he's right. In his own case, he's been able to do something about it.

Jimmy Page similarly believes he is living in the wrong time. I know I came to that conclusion many moons ago. Some of us feel absolutely alien to this technological age and environment — like tigers cast in an ocean, we continue to struggle just to keep our heads above water but always knowing that eventually — unless we venture back onto land — we must drown. That ultimate future is always as near as tomorrow. And thus we grow to loathe these times with a passion of unparalleled force.

To me, urban life is sheer madness, long gone desperation point. I detest the noise, the multiple invasions of sensual privacy, the filthy fumes of machines, the terror of pedestrian crossings, the giant dog turds which splatter the pavements, the shoving of the primal mass in the tube stations, the feeling of the sub-surface antipathy between class and color, the galloping rush to nowhere, the horrible rantings of drunks, the hideous visions of advertising and promotion, the black muck that smothers the buildings, the cold and brooding heartlessness that infects us all.

I just can't stand it anymore. London I fear has become too much like New York, and that's too damn much for me. The claustrophobia is nearly overwhelming. Am I getting old? Or weary? Or just plain smart? I wonder but not for long. Some even say the old smoke will do it to you.

NEW CANADIAN MUSIC PROGRAM FOR CTV

Hosted by Terry David Mulligan, the half hour show will feature the best Canadian rock groups in a concert setting. Appearing in the first show will be Von Ryan's Express, Bachman-Turner Overdrive, Jason and Arpil Wine. "ROQ" is produced by Gerard Rochon and Michael Steele.

I would imagine that even the urban-boosters are getting a bit jaded with the pseudo-sophisticate city bit. They may be blind and deaf and pretty damn dumb but they must be feeling something of the sting.

All I know is that I just don't need discotheques, press receptions, heavy hanging out, record company visits, free lunches or even concerts. Very little of it thrills me anymore, and I'm positive I don't need any of it to get where I'm going.

The key to opening the door to this prison that technology has created for us does not come easily or cheaply. But if you're prepared to make the sacrifices, you can earn the key and unfold your escape.

The thing is you've everything to gain and not a bloody thing to lose. I have searched long and hard but I am unable to come up with a single redeeming attribute of city living. We've lived in quite a few cities along the way, and we've found that they're all bad: it's merely a question of degree.

I am nonetheless the first to admit that there are many great, great stories to be written about these monster metropolises and machines in which we are enslaved. But they are for braver souls to labor upon. I must be free of it. Is it bravery to stay? Or is it the ultimate ignorance?

For myself, I prefer to get back closer to the soil . . . and no doubt, to elaborate upon the events which have confronted and sometimes amused us in these past few years. Goodness knows, the sack is overflowing with stories waiting to be written.

The thing is I did most of my growing up on a farm belonging to my mother's sister and her husband, a farmer whose parents and theirs too had tilled the same soil. There were many acres of sugar cane, a muddy but still-living creek where you could catch mud crabs, several massive mango trees, the odd fox and koala bear, several species of poisonous snakes, a mile of 2'6" gauge miniature railroad belonging to the Moreton sugar mill, a profusion of wild bulbs producing pink and white lillies, a small banana plantation, a virgin hillside and some of the most real people I've ever had the pleasure of knowing.

My education was supposed to have taken place in the State-administered schools, yet I knew even then that my real learning was happening in the holidays up on the farm — where things were as they really are, not necessarily what men wanted them to be, or had distorted them to be.

And now, as I sit here, alone except for the people upstairs and the people downstairs and the Victorian house across the road in which 70 humans are living in a neighborhood far removed from the ghetto . . . listening to the awful sounds of motorised vehicles, electric heaters and our daughter's frequent coughing from some insidious germ she has had bestowed upon her in the tube, the supermarket or at nursery school, the only thing left to ponder the night away upon is why it took me so long to see the truth and to do something about it.





GALLAGHER/BUCHANAN SET FOR DATES AT TORONTO'S VICTORY

Two guitarists, considered among the world's greatest rock guitarists, have been firmed for dates at Toronto's newest showcase, the Victory Theatre.

Rory Gallagher does his one nighter March 8 with Roy Buchanan following March 15.

A recent poll in Melody Maker, Gallagher placed No. 5 in the guitar section with Buchanan at No. 8 in the same section. Both artists are considered top sellers by Polydor and both have sold out previous Canadian dates.

Polydor's Richard Glanville-Brown reports a hefty promotional push by the Toronto branch, ensuring window displays and other promo goodies prior to and during the play dates.

WEA ARTISTS ON THE MOVE

Just getting over one of their biggest years, WEA have a truckload of new product, much of it coinciding with tours across Canada.

Gordon Lightfoot doesn't really need the exposure of a tour to sell product, his "Sundown" set is already a runaway with a single soon to be released. Lightfoot is now on the move with three Ottawa dates (Mar 1-3) under his belt. He will move into Toronto's Massey Hall from Mar. 21 through the 25th with firmed dates to follow in Quebec City (Apr. 18) and in Montreal (19-21).

Badfinger are into their Canadian tour having completed dates at the Vancouver Gardens (8), Jubilee Auditorium Edmonton (9) and Calgary (10) and capping their tour (12) at the Centennial Concert Hall in Winnipeg.

Hamid Hamilton Camp & Skymonters are set for Egertons in Toronto (11-16) with Frank Zappa at Vancouver's Aggridome (14) and Arlo Guthrie teaming up with Pete Seeger for a Place des Arts concert (17).

Tower of Power do the western circuit with dates in Lethbridge (17), the Jubilee Calgary (18) and Edmonton (19). Fleetwood Mac and Kathy Dalton catch a bit of the Canadian winter with a Winnipeg Arena gig (26). Britain's T. Rex skirts much of Canada this trip and settles for the Jubilee in Calgary (29) and the Vancouver Gardens (30).

The west coast will also play host to Donny Hathaway who has been firmed for Oil Can Harry's from April 1 through the 4th. Still in Vancouver, Black Oak Arkansas has set an April 3rd date at the Coliseum.

Genesis returns to Canada for an Ottawa Civic Centre showing (Apr. 19) followed by the University of Montreal (20-21), Sherbrooke Cultural Centre (23) and the Grand Theatre in Quebec (24-25). Harry Chapin, climbing the charts with "WOLD" is being brought into Toronto's Victory Theatre (Apr. 26) by S.R.O. Productions.

HOUKA/A&M (U.S.) SIGN DISTRIB DEAL

Vancouver-based Houka Records has entered into an agreement with A&M Records of Los Angeles for release of product by Comox in the United States. The duo of James Papp and Paul Stephens is currently enjoying disc success with "My Country Lady". The single is the fourth Houka release in its four months of operation and the first to be distributed internationally.

The agreement with A&M also calls for distribution of an album by Comox, already completed at Can-Base Studios and New Creative Production Centre.

To mark the signing of the contract Houka through principals Ross St. John, Bill Kelly and Peter Cook threw a press reception last week at the Georgia Hotel, Vancouver. This was followed by a concert at the prestigious Queen Elizabeth Theatre featuring Comox. The duo will shortly undertake a cross-Canada tour to be followed, it is expected, by dates in the United States.

BUDDAH HEADING HOME WITH SOUTHCOLE FIRST

After fourteen weeks on the RPM Singles Chart, "She" by Southcote (Smile 104) is now receiving the benefit of a promo push, in the U.S., by Buddah Records. A recent mailing to Buddah reps points out that the single has scored heavily in major Canadian markets "CHUM (The biggie in Canada) reports no. 25 this week."

The single is also reported to be at no. 26 on CKLW and at no. 35 at KLIF Dallas. The Detroit area has been bolstered with adds at CKNX, WSAM, WWCK-FM, WRIF and WCWA.

The "Heavyweights" report notes "We've got ten thousand promises from programmers in just about every market." The single has sold a reported 14,000 copies in Canada where it is distributed by London.

CHUM was one of the first majors to express an interest in the single but it was CFTR who first charted the single and brought about a heavy consumer demand for the single which apparently influenced a chart berth on CHUM. Other majors followed with CKLG and CFUN in Vancouver bringing it into prominence on the west coast.

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



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Music industry resembling movie industry

In a recent issue of Time Magazine, CBS's Goddard Lieberson was quoted as being concerned that the record world seemed to be "drinking that fatal glass of beer" that many movie studios had taken — a switch in emphasis from artistic control to mere entrepreneurship. Later on he says "I don't doubt that there were times when record companies

exploited artists, but it had come to the point where the artists were exploiting the record companies."

The record industry is now the biggest entertainment medium in North America, if not the world. Motion pictures have taken a back seat to the music industry and many of the music men who have been on the scene long enough are looking for the music industry to start making the same mistakes the motion picture industry made.

UK ENERGY CRUNCH NO DETERRENT TO HAMILTON IV TOUR

George Hamilton IV's tour of the UK isn't suffering any from the current energy problem. He is playing to packed houses including the London Palladium. The U.S. Embassy in London booked the RCA (Canada) artist for a one man show and lecture on "The History of Country Music From The British Isles to North America and Back Again" — another successful date. Hamilton is now waiting for the "go ahead" which looks 90% set, of dates in Prague, Czechoslovakia and in Moscow.

Canadian songs being showcased by Hamilton on this tour include: "Dirty Old Man"/Bob Ruzicka, "Farmer's Song"/Murray McLauchlan, "Countryfied"/Dick Damron, "Canadian Pacific"/Ray Griff and "Early Mornin' Rain"/Gordon Lightfoot.

In an effort to buy up established artists, record companies have been out-bidding one another to the point where an artist coming out of a contract could write his own ticket with a record company willing to pick him up. The word "Superstar" meant super money and often the star faded before the company saw any return.

More and more, companies are looking for new stars and stars of their own that are developed and controlled by the record company.

A star would often be built by a record company only to go on to another company, where his career ended. Stars demanded more in money and extras. Many artists were really given "the star treatment" by the record companies.

The doors of studios were wide open for the star to take as long as he wished, to produce a session. Money was being made at such a

BISHOP TO LOS ANGELES FOR RECORDING SESSION

Randy Bishop, former member of The Wackers, will quit Montreal to work with his publishing company, Warner Brothers Music, in Los Angeles. It's expected that while on the west coast he will huddle with several record company VIPs who have shown an interest in his recording future. He hopes to return to Montreal, which he calls his home, after finalizing his recording business.

Having just completed a successful engagement at Montreal's Rainbow Bar, Bishop is now working the Nelson Hotel (Mar. 5 through 17). He is not scheduling any other dates for several months. Supplying backup for his new act are: jazz percussionist John Rudell; Marty Harris, bass; and guitarist Gordy Langsner.

The second week of the engagement features Gamma recording artist Anne Anderssen. Her debut album, produced by Bishop, will be released this month.

rate, that it was being thrown around just as freely. The record industry became more and more like the movie industry every day.

The movie companies began to be the bank-roll that financed artist's temperaments, producers' ego fantasies and unions looked at all of this and demanded more for their craftsmen. Even with a slight decline in moviegoing, the industry was headed for trouble.

The ingenuity to find new exciting talent went down the drain when the star system guaranteed box office at a price. The price became very high and very often the return wasn't what was expected. The bill still had to be paid.

Now the motion picture industry looks mainly to outside producers to bring finished product to them. The large studio lots went one by one and now production goes where it can be done well and inexpensively. The new system hires and fires actors and looks for new exciting faces. The talent is the key . . . not the money. The story has taken precedence over who will play the lead.

Fan magazines haven't discovered the music business yet and the movie industry lives with fan writers who deal mainly with explosive exposés. There really isn't a star system in motion pictures anymore, but a few diehards still look at Hollywood as the home of the stars.


The motion picture studios changed hands and the money people took over. Many of the creative geniuses of motion pictures were pushed out.

Now as we look back at the motion picture industry it is hard to believe that so many bad pictures and bad actors were allowed to survive and the industry really motivated itself on publicity and promotion.

There are so many comparisons that can be made to the motion picture industry that it becomes interesting to analyse just how many of the music industry problems are beginning to resemble the movie industry.



New Albums

PTARMIGAN — Columbia ES 90257-H

The album itself is Canadian, but to listen to the group there is an eerie feeling that you are experiencing a San Francisco music trip. Glen Dias and Monte Nordstrom are the writers with excellent mixing by Paul Horn, no stranger to the Canadian recording industry. This is not the same sounding group that backed Horn. The songs seem to have little variety and are too lengthy to be interesting. The backgrounds are very similar with some very good effects, but again can lose your attention in a short span. Side One has "Go Dancing" and "Vancouver" to get the album moving, and "Coquihalla" to end side two.

KARL ERIKSON — I Am Next — United Artists UA LA 209-F

The material in this album could be classed as popular, but with the use of the Moog synthesizer, it gains a quality of its own. Karl seems to have found a style and identity in his music that compares with no other artist. It seems to be very refreshing to hear an artist and not an overpowering background for a change. His use of the flute and sax round out the total sound of the disc. The mixing seems to be of special interest, it gives a tremendous performance on a good stereo. Side one is mostly his own material with "An Audience of One" and "Cathedral" giving a good show. Side two is equally as strong with three cuts worthy of mention; "Downwind of the Buffalo", "Kersbrook Cottage" and "Immigrant".

MICHAL HASEK — Naja





This is the first release for the new record company, NAJA. It is composed almost entirely by Hasek with the exception of one cut by David Wiffen. His style varies from one cut to the next, throughout the album. In some areas his instrumental work is almost classical, and then reverts to an easy electric rock. Anyone listening to him can tell that his talent has been perfected over a considerable period of time. Side one features "Natural Man" and "You Lighten My Load". Side two keeps the pace with "Horses" and "Song to The Country". At times you get a feeling that the popular music was written and then stylized to get the end result. We hope that both Hasek and NAJA keep up the good work.

STRINGBAND — Canadian Sunset — Nick 1

Marie-Lynn Hammond's voice mixed with that of Bob Bossin and backed by the group would seem to have struck out a very different product. Canada is written all over the album with many references to the country and people, in language that cannot be misread. The variety to be found here is hard to believe, from pure folk to East Coast style, and even to some sing-a-long melodic cuts. Unlike most folk we find, this album mentions sex and drugs with a very contemporary approach. Some of the songs of interest are, "Over the Waterfall", "Vancouver", and "Monday Morning". If you're expecting the average folk album, you will be very pleasantly surprised.

THE IRISH ROVERS — Emigrate Emigrate — Potato POT3203-Q

There's an old saying that "If it's Irish" which could turn many people off, but tuck away the resentment for the Irish and set yourself up for a package of entertainment surprises. The Rovers supply a musical explanation of "bustin' out of the auld sod", and integrating their Irish culture with that of the



North Americans. It's the usual rollicking Irish approach, well produced and surprisingly clear, vocally. They do get into the Irish problem, "Children Of Hate", reflective, but a downer which doesn't fit the usual happy Rovers.

SLADE — Old New Borrowed And Blue — Polydor 2383 261-Q

This is a group that should tear up North American audiences but there electrified rock 'n' roll just doesn't get off the ground. This set, if properly promoted, should get the group a strong Canadian audience that could influence the U.S. market. Their visual impact greatly influences the sales potential of the group. Favourites include: "When The Lights Are Out", "How Can It Be" and perhaps the most impressionable cut on the album, "Everyday".

Outstanding is the powerful, craggy performance of the Elgar Concerto, one of the greatest works in the Cello repertoire. The Bloch Schelomo is followed by the Sarabande from the Suite in D minor for Cello solo. One wonders why the great artist has not recorded the Six Bach Suites complete before now. LE PIANO FRANCAIS DE CHABRIER A DEBUSSY
 Magda Tagliaferro - pianist
 ERATO EFM 8063

The brilliant French pianist Magda Tagliaferro for years headed the piano department of the Paris Conservatory and will be remembered by many record collectors for her early Angel recording of the Villa-Lobos Momoprecoce for Piano and Orchestra which the great Brazilian composer dedicated to her. Collectors of 78's still treasure her earlier recordings of the Concerto in E major by Reynaldo Hahn and the Mozart "Coronation" Concerto both conducted by the composer Reynaldo Hahn. Today, her assured technique and sparkling style are unimpaired as she presents a cross-section of music which must be very close to her. Side one begins with the Scherzo-valse and Idylle by Emmanuel Chabrier, Le Retour des Muletiers by Deodat de Severac, Les Reveries du Prince Eglantine by Reynaldo Hahn, and the delightfully amusing Etude en Forme de Valse. Side two is devoted entirely to Claude Debussy and contains the suite Pour le Piano, the Deux Arabesques, and ends with a truly remarkable performance of the brilliant L'Isle Joyeuse. The disc is available in Canada through RCA. Don't miss it.

Music from French Opera
 Richard Bonynge conducting the London Symphony Orchestra

The Vancouver Opera Company is to be warmly congratulated in attracting Richard Bonynge as its new Director. Mr. Bonynge has earned an enviable reputation both as a conductor of opera and as a researcher into less familiar operas of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. This latest release contains many interesting "finds" from lesser known French Operas. Massenet is a charming and much neglected figure in French music and he is represented by an orchestral Nocturn from La Navarraise, an extract from Act three of Cherubin, a brilliant Sevillana from Act three of Don Cesar



de Bazan, a prelude to Act five and Valse from La Roi de Lahore, and the Invocation from Les Erinnies (most commonly known as Massenet's Elegie) played on the cello by Douglas Cummings. Meyerbeer is represented by the Coronation March from Le Prophete, and Gounod is featured in the Grande Valse from La Reine de Saba and the Danse Grecque from La Tribut de Zamora. Overtures include La Dame Blanche by Boieldieu, and La Neige by Auber. I am sure Sir Thomas Beecham would have loved the entire programme and the playing.

Two important twentieth century works receive definitive recorded performances by the greatest of chamber orchestras, London's Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields directed by Neville Marriner. The Walton Sonata for Strings is a re-working of Walton's String Quartet which was composed in 1947. In its new form, the Sonata was introduced in Australia in 1972 by the Academy. Prokofiev's Visions Fugitives is a collection of twenty short piano pieces sixteen of which were selected by Rudolf Barshai, conductor of the famous Moscow Chamber Orchestra, and re-worked as an orchestra suite. Both works receive first rate performances and recording in what should be a highly popular Argo release.

CBC Radio drama - 30 years of service

Almost everyone is aware of the upswing in interest in radio drama these days. But whether it's an upswing in audience interest or the programmers interest (as audience) is hard to say. The whole thing probably started a few years ago with an all night man throwing up a tape of an old drama broadcast, instead of the standard comedy album, for his nightly pause for the cause. And the audience reaction was probably there. At any rate, the thing has taken off — for a trial flight anyway — in the United States with the CBS Radio Mystery theatre and the NBC Program X series.

But while the pan is and has been flashing, radio drama is and has been alive in Canada for over thirty years with CBC Radio's "CBC Stage". Earlier this year, the man who founded CBC Stage — Andrew Allan — died. Mr. Allan produced radio shows for the BBC in the pre-war early days of radio and started producing for the CBC in Vancouver in 1940. In 1943, he was appointed supervisor of radio drama and began the stage series in 1944 and reigned as "the Sun King over the Golden Age of radio drama" in the fifties.

Bob Weaver, the current head of Arts and Drama at CBC Radio, reports a great upswing in interest in Canada for radio drama — but, oddly enough, only in the media and not in the listeners. Mr. Weaver describes his audience as middle aged from the middle class, with no new change in those demographics. Considerable interest has grown in many European countries though, such as West Germany, Great Britain and the Scandinavian countries but these countries are not plagued with distance and time zone considerations as in Canada. At any rate, the CBC has supplied a steady diet of radio drama for many years with CBC Stage, Studio 74 (FM), CBC Tuesday Night and CBC Playhouse, where drama constitutes almost four hours of programming a week. Such amounts of programming require a large input of material and, even though

over 2,000 scripts pass Mr. Weaver's desk every year, it is hard to get good quality plays for radio. The CBC pays considerably more for plays (\$500 for a half-hour manuscript and \$1050 for an hour - minimum rates) than the American networks (\$350 for an hour play on CBS Radio Mystery Theatre). Actors are scrutinized just as carefully as the scripts with usually

only one out of ten being rated acceptable. Productions originate from various centres right across Canada — Halifax, St. John's, Montreal, Toronto, Edmonton, Winnipeg, Calgary, Vancouver, Windsor and Regina.

Auditions are made at these cities on an

infrequent basis, mainly drawing from university, college and community theatre groups.

Television is the theatre for the masses by a very wide margin, but radio is unique. "It is the most personal form of entertainment — just you and the radio and your imagination. It's the theatre of the mind. Movies and television can't duplicate it." — to quote Hi Brown, producer of CBS Radio Mystery Theatre. If it's radio drama that you want, CBC has been doing it for a long time and will probably continue for a long time to come.

SCARBORO CABLE RADIO TO SHOWCASE CANADIAN TALENT

Scarboro Cable TV/FM will be instituting an impressive line-up of community oriented information and entertainment programming.

Harvey Rogers, Program Director, describes his operation as Canadian Talent Showcase Radio "to help the Canadian people become aware of the great talent that surrounds us . . . whether it be writers, singers, etc." Programs, lined up for airing on a weekly basis, include interviews of and readings by Canadian authors, community access programs such as "Radio Free Women", information and happenings in Scarboro, various music shows and various interview programs concerning the arts and relevant social topics. The station is staffed completely by volunteers from the community and operates on a commercial free basis. Initially, Rogers plans to broadcast from 5PM to 9:30PM Monday to Thursday with expansion in hours to come with expansion in acceptance. Rogers got his show underway March 1st.

NEW CINEMATOGRAPHY/AUDIO COURSES AT GEORGE BROWN

New part-time courses in basic cinematography and audio techniques will be offered at George Brown College in early April. Basic Cinematography, a ten week course, offers "hands-on" approach to the production of various short colour films, some with sound. Classes begin April 2 and will be held Tuesday and Thursday evenings, 6-9PM. Basic Audio Techniques, also ten weeks in length, offers practical experience with various audio systems and their application to films and slide-sound programs. It will cover areas such as magnetic recording, microphones amplifiers and studio and location techniques equipment. Classes begin April 1 and will be held Monday and Wednesday evenings, 6-9PM. Unfortunately, classes will be limited to 16 students so early enrollment is advisable. Courses in Closed circuit TV, graphics and displays and applications of the media are planned for the fall. 
