

CHOM MTL support for Quebec Music

One of Montreal's major English language FM stations, CHOM, has come to the aid of Quebec artists with a promo package they tagged CHOM Gout de Quebec Sampler. Tim Thomas, director of programming for CHOM and formerly with CHUM-FM in Toronto, has experienced a new music adventure in Quebec and is concerned that this music remains only within the borders of that province. Thomas points up the fact that this year's Juno nominations leaned heavily toward English Canada: "I guess the reason is a general lack of familiarity with the product throughout the rest of the country." It was because of this situation that Thomas and his programming staff put together the Quebec sampler.

The sampler is being made available to program and music directors, free of charge. Those interested in receiving this package of albums and singles should direct their requests to Thomas at 1355 Greene Ave., Montreal (514) 935-2425.

CHOM's Robert Boulanger prepared the following description on the recorded product included in the sampler.

Our first Sampler album is Jean Pierre Ferland's "Jaune".

Ferland met with early success as a Quebec "chansonnier", and moved to France for a time. But in the early sixties he found him-



MURRAY/CAMERON WAIL FOR EDMONTON SYMPHONY

Like the headline says, it was billed as a benefit performance for Edmonton's well respected symphony. Like most symphonies, the Edmonton entourage needs a little fiscal revitalization from time to time, whether it be from government or co-operative minstrels like Murray and Cameron. True to its billing, the March 29th production at Ed-

monton's Jubilee Auditorium packed 'em in, some of 'em being packed in at the handsome score of fifty bucks per seat. The result no doubt was a hefty contribution to the Symphony's coffers. The twenty seven hundred and some odd seats were snapped up in quick order leaving the box office with a waiting list for tickets numbering in the hundreds.

The show really needs little comment. John Allan succeeded in melting an icy heart or two with his homey ditties and pericardium-piercing persiflage. Sadly, John's Mabou accented melodies often were unintelligible in the first balcony where yours truly was entrenched due to some peculiarity of the Jubilee's acoustics. This was particularly disappointing since John was obviously warming up to his task down there on the stage and since so much time and effort had gone into the sound system. Happily, the reviewers for the local papers either had better seats than me or they too understood what was going down and were able to appreciate Cameron's warmth and wit in spite of the technical flaws. Their reviews were justly full of praise.

After intermission, out she came to thunderous applause. The first few numbers were a little slow in getting the audience off the ground but after ten minutes or so, most of the ice had been broken and I sat surrounded by a sea of smiles and clapping hands.

The Edmonton Symphony, under the di-

rection of Tommy Banks, provided a tasteful, if often overly understated role in the proceedings. The scores of musicians only really came into their own during the incredible "Robbie's Song For Jesus", one of the best flops ever released as a single. During the balance of the program, Anne and Richard sustained the tempo with only minor contributions from the assemblage behind them. Understatement is no doubt a good thing, but you can have too much of a good thing.

"You Won't See Me", the Beatles tune soon to be released in single form by Capitol, was the real event of the evening. The Symphony began to cook on this, the last number of the program, but as soon as it had begun, it was over and we had only had a taste of what could be accomplished with a fine voice, a little old rock and roll band and a symphony orchestra. Then, a standing ovation, roses cast into the folks and an encore, followed by a little do for the neurosurgeons, lawyers and other worthies who had shelled out half a hundred each to become "patrons of the Symphony". - J.W.

A&M APPOINTMENTS FOR BEAUCHAMP & CHAPPELL

Pete Beauchamp has been appointed A&R manager for A&M Records along with Doug Chappell who takes on the position of national promotion manager. The appointments were announced by Gerry Lacoursiere, vice-president of A&M (Canada).

Beauchamp has been with A&M for almost four years, experiencing the growing pains leading to the label emerging as one of the strongest independents in Canada. Prior to becoming associated with A&M, Beauchamp took his lumps in the Quebec market, managing and booking local Montreal groups as well as hustling records in one of the major record retail outlets in Montreal, the now defunct Record Cave. His goal however, was to get into the promotion of records which took him to Trans World and then on to Musimart. As his knowledge of the record business increased so did his reputation and

he finally took on the job of promotion manager for English product with Columbia Records, tramping the territory from Ottawa east to Newfoundland. He joined the Lacoursiere team as national promotion manager and found himself heavily involved in A&R work which lead to this appointment. Beauchamp is now located at A&M's Madison Avenue (downtown Toronto) A&R house along with the label's publishing arm Irving/Almo Music of Canada which is headed up by Graham Powers.

Chappell came to A&M through MDC Dis-

U.S. LIGHTHOUSE PRODUCT BEING DUMPED IN CANADA

GRT Canada's president Ross Reynolds is concerned over the dumping of Lighthouse album product on the Evolution (U.S.) label in Canada. Lighthouse product is distributed in the U.S. on the Evolution label and the product coming into Canada has been reportedly deleted by the U.S. company. There are four Lighthouse albums involved: "One Fine Morning", "Thoughts Of Movin' On", "Lighthouse Live" and "Sunny Days", now being sold by some Canadian retailers at \$2.99 per album. Reynolds points out that GRT has never entertained the thought of deleting Lighthouse product all of which has remained active in the catalogue.

Bringing Lighthouse product into Canada in this manner is a violation of the Copyright Act and Reynolds is now notifying retailers, rack jobbers and the importers involved.

For the information of the trade, the section of the Copyright Act involved is printed herewith:

Subsection 4 of Section 17 Canadian Copyright Act.

Copyright in a work shall also be deemed to be infringed by any person who

(a) sells or lets for hire, or by way of trade exposes or offers for sale or hire

(b) distributes either for the purposes of trade, or to such an extent as to affect prejudicially the owner of the copyright

(c) by way of trade exhibits in public or

(d) imports for sale or hire into Canada any work that to his knowledge infringes copyright or would infringe copyright if it had been made within Canada.

tributors which handled the distribution of A&M product. His roots are in the Canadian music industry, having been associated with the group scene for almost fourteen years. It was back in 1960 when he first became involved as a guitarist and settled in to become one of the top bass men in the business. It was while he was with Ritchie Knight when he first experienced "the wonderful world of hitdom", Knight scored with what some referred to as "a hit" with "Charlena". The Mid Knights disbanded in 1970 and the shattered parts were put together as The Counts, described as "a Vegas type lounge act". After twelve years on the road, Chappell decided to chuck it for a behind the scenes job as Ontario promotion for MDC. He moved over to A&M in the same capacity and a year later was promoted to national promotion co-ordinator. Chappell will work out of A&M's national headquarters in Agincourt, Ontario.

Just like the opening night of a Broadway show, the night of the Juno Awards was to be an exciting and important night for RPM and its organizers.

Twelve months had been spent in the preparation of the biggest night in the Canadian

created at the end of 1973 regarding another awards presentation that would conflict with the Junos.

It was the night when the Juno Awards would be on view with the idea of next year looking at television as a vehicle to create Canadian stars and create work for artists and musicians. We were trying to build a star system and a music industry in Canada.

SOLD OUT LONG BEFORE

Cooperation came from all quarters, and in the last week, tickets for the Junos started to become rare. We had sold out long before the Juno night.

The concept of this year's awards was to be a concentration on the young artists and musicians who had contributed to the great increase of interest and work for Canadian artists and musicians in the last three or four years.

It was to be a great night for the industry. It was to be a test and a try out for RPM.

After the Awards were over, the media had given good reviews to the affair and the production. Even Toronto's hard-to-please dailies raved about the affair.

It was big, lavish and well organized. To the industry and the press it was "star-studded". I wonder if it would have effected a television audience in the same way?

To be fair, we asked Canada's leading trade writers to submit articles to RPM (which appeared in last week's RPM) and we gave them permission to write exactly what they felt. Their criticisms were very valid. In some cases we would like to answer their criticisms and their questions. In this column we would be remiss, as reporters, if we didn't let the trade in on some of the background to that night.

In view of the fact that it was an unqualified success (except for some housekeeping and a few details), it will be interesting to let you know some of the things that went wrong in the last hours of preparation.

To many across Canada who couldn't be there that night, it will be a form of parti-

cipation in the Juno Awards.

The fact is that the Juno Awards were too well attended. There were 1300 seats available and we estimate that if all of them were full, there was another two hundred people standing.

SIDETRACKED FOR FOUR HOURS

In lining up the presenters, we found that most of the nominees and past winners were very glad to participate. Each artist or their representative were contacted and all agreed. At the last minute, one artist changed his mind and refused to appear. We had to do some juggling and along with other problems (which I will discuss later) we caused some of the presenters to name themselves as nominees. It was difficult to arrange the presenters, reading the nominations and the winners in such a way that this wouldn't happen if there were last minute changes. The voting put certain winners in the position of winning many times. Had we not had to make the last minute changes and had we not been sidetracked for four hours by a union technicality, this would not have happened. That answers one of the criticisms.

SHOW BEGAN 45 MINUTES LATE

Prior to the actual presentation, we did have instruction sheets for the presenters and a specially marked off section near the stage for the presenters to sit with their guests. In the union hassle that occurred, none of the presenters were instructed and when the show began 45 minutes late, they were scattered throughout the ballroom and didn't have the vaguest idea of what to do when they got to the stage. At this point I would like to pay tribute to the presenters who, realizing that something had gone wrong, came up on stage and did an admirable job of making the presentations. They did this on instinct and the fact that they were performers and professionals. There was no criticism of their part in the show. They truly were trouvers in the real show-business tradition.

SHOW STARTED ITSELF

To my knowledge the hassle with the musicians' union was never settled, and the last I heard was that we would be billed for the musicians at demo rates because there was a tape recorder backstage. In fact, the show started itself, without our consent and we had no choice but to go on without having looked after our last minute details. Few in the audience knew there was anything amiss.

OFFERED FOUR DUBS

Another problem that occurred because of our misunderstanding with the musicians' union was that the passes for musicians, hired help, photographers and press and media were not distributed before the show. Our security was obliged to keep them out until one of our staff could be contacted

to permit them to enter without tickets.

The show, scheduled to begin at 9PM got underway at 9.45PM and in the Juno Awards tradition went off like clockwork.

Backstage I was surrounded by tape recorders and at press time I'm not sure if the one in question (ours), was among them. It is impossible to estimate the number of cassette recorders that were being used throughout the audience but none of them were ours. I have since been offered four dubs of the Juno Awards recorded in full. So the logic of not having a tape machine backstage to record a reference tape escapes me, but it took five hours of arguing with a union representative about our machine (which I understand would retail at about \$400. and is inferior to our own office tape machine).

AWARDS WITHOUT MUSIC

To settle the matter quickly and not to offend the union, at 5PM that afternoon we offered to pay the musicians in full and do the Awards without music. This was the situation right up until the music started and the curtain went up. During all the arguing (which I felt was entirely unnecessary), a great deal was not looked after.

After twelve months of preparation and anticipation, the Juno Awards turned out to be a great disappointment to the staff and people who had worked so hard putting it together.

As the curtain rose, I looked at my people backstage who were obviously dejected and disappointed and truly concerned about what was about to happen, and I felt their

RCA SETS DATE FOR CAMPUS SEMINAR

John Murphy, Ontario promotion manager for RCA and instigator of the label's annual campus radio seminars, has firmed April 13 as this year's date. A new setting has been arranged — Conestoga College in Kitchener.

Murphy has also thrown the seminar open to other record companies and has already received affirmatives from promotion managers of major labels.

Unlike the first two seminars, Murphy has arranged for this year's meet to be more structured, dispensing with the confusing free form method. The panel will consist of fourteen radio, press and university people but will be restricted to six fifty minute sessions with no more than three panelists facing the audience at any one time. A strict time limit will be maintained on all pre-selected topics.

Subjects selected by Murphy include: Progressive vs. Top Forty — Programming a Campus Station — News (Radio) — Promotion on Campus vs. Promotion on Commercial Radio (How do you promote your station) — and Utilize the Industry.

Panelists include: Bob Laine (CHUM-FM), Larry Wilson (CHUM-FM), Dave Charles (CHUM), Jerry Stevens (CJ-BK), Bob Ansel (CKOC), Paul Godfrey (CFTR), Gary

efforts had been undermined by the thoughtlessness of a few (and by the way the best paid people involved). We were there to honour the hardworking Canadian musicians and performers and the whole thing was going wrong because of a technicality.

We would have appreciated the whole-hearted cooperation of the American Federation of Musicians of the United States and Canada and their participation. Instead we were thrown into panic.

As we go to press, I still have no idea how much we lost in putting on this year's Juno Awards, but we had counted on dropping about \$5,000. We were more interested in promoting the industry and the artists, not showing a profit.

"STARS" IN THE TRUE SENSE

Again I want to thank everyone who was part of the Awards and particularly I would like to apologize to the presenters who rallied to the situation and did a great job. I am grateful to them for showing their ability and professionalism in a trying situation and my sincerest thanks to all of them.

That night you were all "stars" in the true sense of the word. The show features John's easy-going manner and a mix of Scots-Irish music of Eastern Canada with Canadian pop. Also with Cameron as regulars are the Cape Breton Symphony (a group of fiddlers) and Les Danseurs Du Saint Laurent (a folklore dance troupe). Edith Butler and Jesse Winchester, in his first television appearance, are featured guests.

The show was produced before a live audience by Nancy Pitton for Champlain Productions — a wholly owned subsidiary of Multiple Access Limited which also owns CFCF-TV Montreal.

JUNO INFORMATION AIRED ON CHUM-FM

As an added service to the record industry and their listeners, CHUM-FM set aside the evening of March 25th to pay tribute to the annual Juno Awards. The station's program manager, Bob Laine and newsman Larry Wilson were in attendance at the Juno Awards and kept in touch with the station as to the progress of the presentations and the winners.

Bringing the Juno night into proper perspective for CHUM-FM listeners was David Marsden who began promo'ing the Junos on his show from 7:05PM with the first telephone call coming in from Wilson at 10:05PM announcing the first winners. Wilson telephoned news of the winners every twenty minutes until the Junos were completed. Marsden interspersed his evening show with records by those nominated for Junos and performances by the winners as they occurred.

MCA PROMO MUSCLE FOR CREAMCHEEZE

Some critics like the new Creamcheeze Good-Time Band album and some don't but all agree that this is one of the most entertaining young groups in the business. Their jug-cum folk with a sprinkle of contemporary rock styling sets them just above the usual "copy-all" groups providing a "real" package of entertainment for their live shows.

One such show was at the Horseshoe Tavern in Toronto recently and the MCA promotion team of Scott Richards and his Ontario promo rep Jeff Harris, gathered together a sizeable table of press and radio people, all of whom appeared to be favourably impressed with the young Stratford area group.

Creamcheeze are: Billy Kell, his sister Patti, brother Jimi, Dave Harwood and Doug McNaughton which gives you a bit of kazoo, banjo, recorder, mandolin, fiddle, a lot of guitar and good time vocals.

Creamcheeze recently played to a "sold out" house at the Avon Theatre in Stratford, a benefit that drew old friends and new fans from the Kitchener and Stratford areas. They received rave notices in The Beacon Herald (Stratford) and the Kitchener-Waterloo Record. Victor Stanton of the Record described the group as having a "light and easy style and an infectious variety of toe-tapping, hand-slapping, and joint-right-in country folk, rock, gospel and jugband sounds," which leaves very little to be added.

MCA are currently touting the group's new "Home Cookin'" album which contains their very popular single "Uncle Jed", a Billy Kell original.

LONE WOLF INTO RECORDING FRAY

Lone Wolf Productions are now flying their banner via a single release, "Workin' On The Railway" by Bill Houston. The initial release for the Lone Wolf label was penned by Houston through Ojibway Country Songs-CAPAC. The flip, "Northern Journey", also written by Houston, is from the National Film Board film, "The Superior Scrapbook".

Houston also wrote and performed "Ojibway Country" which was used in the Imax film, "North of Superior" which many thousands saw at Ontario Place. The single subsequently sold in excess of 10,000 copies in the Toronto area alone.

Houston was born in Whitehorse, Yukon Territory and raised in Northwestern Ontario — a solid foundation for his material on the North country.

The Lone Wolf single was produced at Eastern Sound by Shelby Gregory with Tom Brennan doing the board chores. Folk, spiced with country, the single is described as having "no frills, no elaborate musical arrangements, no big production — just simple and a little uncouth — like the country itself." Distribution is handled by Lone Wolf Productions.

Charlie Russell's letter in RPM a few weeks back brings to my mind a similar problem in regard to country music, that being the availability of country music, particularly singles, to the record-buying public. For years now, we have heard the blanket statement that "Country music doesn't sell". The way certain record companies and rack jobbers operate, this unfortunately becomes true. I doubt if anything angers a record buyer more than hearing a good country song and not being able to buy it in a store. And considering that many stores stock only the top five country singles at any one time, I imagine this is a common occurrence. Conversely, a number of songs that are not released in Canada later, (and in some cases much later) appear on albums. Now, let's be honest. How many people are going to buy an album when they haven't even heard the title song? It's no wonder that country product doesn't sell in this country. If some of the big record companies would take a chance, let the people hear the songs, and make the records available to the public at the time when they're popular, then maybe country music will reach a reasonable level in this country.

Belafonte's last eastern Canadian date will be at Montreal's Place des arts (June 4-9) after which he returns west to the Queen Elizabeth Theatre in Vancouver (11-15), the Jubilee Auditorium in Edmonton (17-20) and the tour capper at the Jubilee in Calgary (22-23).

Although Belafonte is no longer with RCA (U.S.) the Canadian operation will be working with Belafonte with heavy promotion schedules now being scheduled for each of the concert centres. The big push will be on Belafonte's most recent release "Play Me" (APL1-0094) although a concerted effort will be made to promote his catalogue items as well.





ELVIS: ON STAGE IN MEMPHIS AFTER 13 YEARS

Elvis Presley rocked and rolled his way to Memphis, Tennessee recently with five sold out shows at the Mid-South Coliseum, his first concert at home in thirteen years.

Fan reaction to Elvis being back in town were so strong the entertainer stayed at the Rivermont Holiday Inn, the flagship hotel of the Memphis based worldwide chain, and worked his decoy actions from there. At times



up to 5,000 followers gathered at the gates to Graceland, Presley's Memphis estate, hoping to catch a glimpse of him in transit to or from the concert hall. Back at the Rivermont the scene was the opposite with, at most, fifty fans waiting for a chance to see him off stage. Those few, because of their small numbers, were not disappointed. Elvis came to the window of his eleventh floor suite on two occasions and waved, and also used the regular elevator route through the lobby when coming or going. When it did come time to leave for a show he exited out the back door to his waiting limo and drove to the hall, not having to use the standby helicopter that hovered at 10-15 feet about 100 yards from the hotel over a parking lot.

At the Mid-South Coliseum, a circular cement arena at the Memphis Fairgrounds, he did not let the ticket holding fans down.

Following a comedian, and the Sweet Inspirations vocal group, Elvis entered the stage area in a high collared white outfit with red stones and silver studs. From that point he could do no wrong as hundreds of flashbulbs fired so continuously that the arena became so well lit it resembled a movie set, and the audio levels of the crowd often attempted to exceed the sound system he sang and talked through. Nodding his thanks from three sides of the stage he strapped on his guitar and started the show with a fast version of "C.C. Rider". After this number he abandoned the guitar and worked a stand-up show that skirted the stage, often tempting fast moving fans to try and reach him. His song selection was an hour and ten minutes of some of the 50 gold records he has recorded and the works of other artists like Chuck Berry's "Johnny B. Goode" and Tony Joe White's "Polk Salad Annie". The electricity in the air did seem, however, to increase as he sang some of his old hits including

"Hound Dog", "All Shook Up", "Teddy Bear", "Don't Be Cruel", "Love Me Tender" and "Treat Me Like A Fool" and several fans throughout these songs unsuccessfully tested the sixty man security force as they burst from their seats in fruitless attempts to reach the stage. Seeming to contradict his security precautions at times Elvis did allow several fans to come to the stage side, one at a time, where he would present them with a coloured silk scarf from around his neck and then watch them bounce back to their seats with souvenir tightly in hand. A sideman would then place the next scarf around Presley's neck.

Localizing, and obviously reaching many of the southern Americans in the audience Presley sang an American trilogy, a medley of songs including "Dixie" and "The Battle Hymn of the Republic". The arrangement ended with the lights fading and the spot-

lights shifting to a 20 foot version of the Stars and Stripes hanging as a backdrop 30 feet above the stage and drew the crowd to its feet with thundering applause.

Too soon in coming, at this point, the selection from the movie "Blue Hawaii" that closes his show. As he sang "Can't Help Falling In Love With You" the last of the timid but intent fans attempted to storm the stage without success. After several words of thanks to each section and direction of audience he left the stage to be closely followed by the announcement "Ladies and gentlemen, Elvis has left the building!" The man who had opened the show with "Hi, I'm Wayne Newton and welcome to my show" was indeed on his way back to the hotel after once again proving on home ground that the President may live in Washington but the King lives in Memphis.


A FIRST FOR COCKBURN AND THE EGRESS CLUB

BEECHWOOD RE-ORGANIZES CANADIAN OPERATION (Special to RPM)

Up until two years ago, Beechwood (BMI)/Capitol (CAPAC) was essentially considered a "country music" publisher, since RCA recording artist Gary Buck, who was then General Manager, was country oriented as an artist, producer and publisher. Beechwood/Capitol had their share of the "pop" limelight as a result of the "super hits" — "Snowbird" and "Put Your Hand In The Hand" both composed by Gene MacLellan,

their most successful exclusive composer. These two internationally successful songs were instrumental in sustaining Beechwood/Capitol during the lull in which Gary Buck set off in new directions and new management was being sought by the company.

In February, 1972, Joey Frechette came on the scene. Frechette, former lead singer with The Beau-Marks, a top Canadian group of the late 1950's, and composer of their biggest hit — "Clap Your Hands" (BMI) was hired to re-organize and revitalize the structure and thrust of Beechwood/Capitol Music.

In the summer of 1972, Beechwood/Capitol discovered singer-songwriter Karl Erikson. In signing Erikson to an exclusive writer

contract with Capitol Music (CAPAC), this writer joined Beechwood/Capitol's small but elite stable of exclusive writers which included Gene MacLellan and Shirley Eikhard — among others.

Following the production of an excellent demo tape, and setting up an audition for several Canadian record companies, Beechwood/Capitol was successful in helping Karl Erikson get a recording contract with United Artists. Four months after the formation of the new Beechwood/Capitol administration, the new organization had successfully completed its first project.

It was the beginning of a new era of growth. Beechwood/Capitol have found considerable acceptance with Erikson's compositions and his songs have already been sub-published in the U.S., England, Japan and Sweden. Erikson's works have been receiving extensive radio-play in Canada and some of his tunes received chart status here.

During this period, Beechwood/Capitol also successfully negotiated the sub-publishing of original material by Capitol Recording artists Pepper Tree, getting the group's material represented by Larry Page of the U.K.'s "Page Full Of Hits".

Realizing the mass appeal and financial viability of country music, and controlling a wealth of country songs, Joey Frechette says: "We haven't left the country field — we just took time out to acquire other types of songs."

One of Beechwood/Capitol's first objectives was to get Gene MacLellan's name back into circulation — this objective was shortly met with new recordings of MacLellan songs: Karl Erikson recorded three on his first U.A. album and several others were recorded by Cliff Edwards, Mike Graham and Gary & Dave. Further concentration on MacLellan material is planned during 1974.

In 1973, Beechwood/Capitol continued acquiring new copyrights from England, Australia, Scandinavian Countries and the U.S. and placing songs with as many Canadian acts on as many labels as possible.

Beechwood/Capitol has started to deal with such notable firms as Buddah Music in the U.S. (which owned Steve Goodman's hit "City Of New Orleans", subsequently acquired for Canada by Beechwood) and such "indie" publishers as "Ironside Productions" of Nashville, who had good chart action on such songs as Tommy Overstreet's — "Heaven Is My Woman's Love". These successes have caused Beechwood/Capitol to expand its horizons and they plan to continue negotiating with publishers world-wide. Another of their objectives is to place their Canadian copyrights with major U.S. artists. As well, they are investigating and pursuing entry into film music and the further importing and exporting of hit material. To date, the company's main fruits of their "hustle" formula has been at home.

In May of last year, Beechwood Music won four BMI Awards for its success — more than any other one publisher.

Beechwood/Capitol also broke into the French, Quebec market last year. They were responsible for records coming out

by Willie Lamothe, Pierre Lalonde, Renee Martel and Suzanne Stevens.

Beechwood/Capitol wants to be "people-oriented" says Frechette, and sees this as a virtue, describing his philosophy as — "If a writer brings in ten songs, and I can use two, I'll tell him who to go see about the other eight. I don't believe in signing his entire output if we can't use his entire output. We won't sign up songs just to prevent the competition from getting them.

"This has built the company's notable rapport with writers and artists, and by word of mouth in the creative community, has brought a lot of new people to Beechwood/Capitol from all across Canada and even south of the border. I think the Canadian industry should be a more cohesive force — and we're beginning to get some amazing feedback as a result of this attitude. Artists and composers are not accountants and lawyers and most are emotional and sensitive people so when they sense that you're a 'feel' man, the vibes become conducive, not only to business trust but friendship as well. Besides, being an ex-songwriter and entertainer, I think I can, and I try, to relate to the creative community."

For the past six months, while adjusting to staff changes and office moves, Beechwood/Capitol has been quite active in getting their songs recorded by Canadian artists on all labels.

Pierre Lalonde's most recent Quebec smash, "Amoureux", released on the RCA label is the French version of "The Happy Song" recorded in English by Tommy Graham on Capitol, both Beechwood copyrights. Karl Erikson's first album for United Artist Records, containing all Capitol Music songs, has received extensive air play on MOR stations and three singles culled from that album, "Aerogramme", received chart action on some top forty stations across the country. Erikson has completed his second album for United Artists, which is now released. Called "I Am Next", this excellently produced album contains nine songs composed by Erikson who is signed exclusively to Capitol Music. A single culled from this new album, is showing signs of being a double sided hit. "It's Gonna Be Alright" which was the "A" side, is being charted and playlisted at various contemporary MOR and Top 40 stations including CHUM (Toronto) and CKGM (Montreal). "Kersbrook Cottage", the "B" side, called a country "action side" in RPM is now

being playlisted and charted by Canadian Country stations. Furthermore, Erikson's new United Artists album "I Am Next" has just been picked up for release in France. Looks like a promising year for a very talented composer-artist, Karl Erikson.

Two other songwriters signed exclusively to Capitol Music of Canada, Willie Creagh and Melvin McGary, are the leaders of a "pop-rock" group from Marion, Ohio in the U.S. Their group, "The Boppers", have just signed a recording contract with "Care" Records of Columbus, Ohio, and their first single released in the U.S. is a Creagh-McGary composition called "Cleveland Dolls" f/s "Dancin' In Rocket City", the latter song also co-written by the team. This single will be open for a Canadian lease agreement shortly.

Non-exclusive composer-artist, Marty Reno, who has nine songs contracted to Beechwood Music of Canada, is currently negotiating a recording contract with several companies. Reno worked in concert last year with friend, Gene MacLellan, who gave him the opportunity to "do his thing" and, from the audience reaction, it was evident that Reno's material and stage presence were highly conducive to the concert stage. A seasoned vocalist and guitarist with a lot of harmonica thrown in, Reno now hopes he has seen the end of twelve years of "bar gigs" and that other artists will "hear" his material and record it. Frechette says: "Some people may disagree, but I believe Marty Reno is a writer."

Lisle's recording of Capitol Music's "Shelly Made Me Smile" was charted on some eighty radio stations in Canada and attained excellent sales figures followed by chart status on CHUM which had "Shelly Made Me Smile" at number 25 during the week of March 23rd.

Despite the move to downtown offices, Beechwood/Capitol Music of Canada will actively maintain constant communication with Capitol Records' A&R Department located in Malton. They are now located on Scollard St. Miss Linda Smith, a native of Moncton and a writer/performer herself, has been appointed personal and office secretary to Frechette.

On begetting a watchful briskness

LONDON, Eng.

A cup of tea, as any sensitive palate can tell you, is one of the most pleasant beverages known to man. Yet one wonders how many of us tea drinkers realize that the tea habit might never have caught on in the Western world if it had not been for London's 17th Century coffee houses!

Tea first arrived in Britain early in the 1600's when the Portuguese Princess Catherine

of Braganza brought several chests as part of her dowry to marry King Charles II. Predictably tea became a fashionable drink in Court circles of those times, and then spread into public favour in the numerous coffee houses along the Strand.

Coffee had been introduced to the heart of the Empire a few years earlier, and it was in the coffee houses where tea was first sold, advertised and promoted. In addition to serving tea to their customers, the coffee houses gave free instructions in how to make it. The first London coffee house was opened at Cornhill in 1652, and by the end of the century, there were more than 500 of them.

By 1750, tea had not surprisingly ousted coffee and become the principal drink of all

classes — this despite the remarkable fact that a pound of the cheapest tea cost about one third of a skilled worker's weekly wage packet. Clearly wanton profiteering is no newcomer to our free society.

A few weeks ago, I contacted the Tea Council of the U.K. in an attempt to find out more about the tea phenomenon. The material which the Council duly sent me is both fascinating and formidable.

First off, there are the legends which surround the origins of tea. One concerns a Chinese Emperor who used to boil his drinking water some 5,000 years ago. One day some leaves from a nearby tree accidentally fell into the hot water and delighted the monarch with a new scent and flavour — that of course being the wild tea plant.

Another tale, and one which would do justice to the assorted myths of western religions, involves a Buddhist hermit who, having devoted himself to meditation, started to doze off. So he cut off his eyelids and threw them on the ground, from whence sprang a plant whose leaves could make a drink to banish weariness. If you believe in people walking on water, then you could hardly doubt this legend either.

It is definitely known that tea-drinking was instigated in China, and that it was fairly common by the Sixth Century A.D. By the 800's, it had spread to Japan and formed part of an elaborate ceremony. But it wasn't until 1610 that the first tea reached Europe, shipped by the Dutch from China to Holland via Java.

The name tea derives from the original T'e or Tcha and pronounced Tay. The English language now boasts three expressions for the drink — tea, cup of cha and cuppa.

Early medical support came from a Dutch doctor who in a book published in 1679 recommended the use of eight to ten cups of tea a day, and found nothing harmful in 50, 100 or even 200 cups daily. Indeed, he claimed he often drank as many himself. Since I fall into the latter category myself, his findings are solace to the soul.

The first full British medical treatise on tea was published in 1750 by Dr. Thomas Short as part of his "Discourse on Tea". It includes this stunning endorsement: "What should mightily recommend the use of Tea to Gentlemen of a sprightly Genius, who would preserve the Continuance of their lively and distinct Ideas, is its eminent and unequalled power to take off, or prevent, Drowsiness and Dullness, Damps and Clouds on the Brain, and intellectual Faculties. It begets a watchful Briskness, dispels Heaviness: it keeps the Eyes wakeful, the Head clear, animates the intellectual Powers, maintains or raises lively Ideas, excites and sharpeneth the Thoughts, gives fresh Vigour and Force to Invention, awakens the Senses and clears the Mind."

Some pretty fantastic curative claims have been made about tea through the ages.

A certain Mr. Thomas Garway declared it: "to be wholesome, preserving in perfect health until extreme Old Age", and more specifically, "good for clearing the sight, removing difficulty in breathing, strengthening the stomach, vanquishing heavy dreams and improving the memory"; for "griping of the guts", cold dropsey, scurvy and making the body "active and lusty" . . . in short, a dope smoker's ideal nectar.

On a more practical note, tea comes from an evergreen tropical bush which belongs to the camellia family. The bush will, in the wild, grow to a height of some 30 feet, but commercial exploitation requires it to be kept at about 3-4 feet high, by constant plucking of the new shoots. The younger and softer the shoots, the better the tea, so growers' claim.

The term "Pekoe" applies to the size of the leaf, and has nothing to do with the variety. Orange Pekoe tea can be grown in India, Ceylon, China, Brazil or Indonesia. But the size of leaf does not have a lot to do with flavour or quality.

If you'd like to experiment with new varieties of tea, might we suggest pure Darjeeling, grown in the high foothills of the Himalayas; up-country Ceylons such as Uva, Dimbula and Nuwara Eliya; and the strong, malty Assams. The taste, not surprisingly, can vary, just as Moroccan, Lebanese and Afghan have different flavours and strengths.

Those people who are novices in the art of tea-drinking should bear in mind the following golden rules, as provided by the Tea Council. Buy the best quality tea you can afford (personally, I'd avoid tea bags) and keep it in an airtight container. Use freshly-boiled water, and firstly warm the pot by rinsing it out with a cupful of boiling water . . . the full-flavour of tea is released in a hot pot, not a warm one. Allow five minutes to draw. And then pour for the most reviving and soothing beverage money can buy.

The Tea Council says a cup of tea contains, on average, a little under a grain of caffeine and about two grains of tannin. The caffeine is released gradually, and the tannin is allayed by the casein in the milk. The stimulus due to the caffeine comes about 15 minutes later.

There is no evidence that tannin stains the inside of your stomach, as it does with pots and cups. Tea, the Council admits, is a true stimulant, unlike alcohol which is a depressant.

We shall close with the words of the renowned Dr. Johnson, a voracious tea-drinker who once proclaimed himself in The Literary Magazine as a "hardened and shameless tea drinker, who has for many years diluted his meals with only the infusion of this fascinating plant: whose kettle has scarcely time to cool: who with tea amuses the evening, with tea solaces the midnight and with tea welcomes the morning."

That, I'm sure you'll agree, is a hearty testimonial.

self back in Quebec searching for his roots and a new musical identity. He found his way by 1970, and produced "Jaune", which sold more than 50,000 copies in Quebec alone. He has developed the various aspects of his "sound" in subsequent recordings and in performance — he just finished an exceptionally well-received two week engagement at Montreal's Place des Arts — and he's currently preparing a new album.

Robert Charlebois is in many ways Quebec's first Superstar. In 1968 he formed "Losstidcho" with Yvan Deschamps and Louise Forestier, and from his interaction with others on the front lines of Quebec culture came the "Lindberg" album.

A short unsuccessful trip to Paris followed, and Charlebois vowed not to return until the French begged for him. Now that's what they're doing — as at his tremendously successful appearance at the Olympia last year. French national radio has dubbed him "The Genius", and his career includes appearances in films and a less-than-perfect try at manufacturing an aluminum guitar.

His upcoming show at Place des Arts will feature 18 new songs.

Before launching her singing career, Louise Forestier graduated from the National Theatre School, and toured Canada with a drama group performing Moliere's works.

Her start as a singer came at a local club, Le Patriote, and she went on to Expo '67, played in Quebec musical comedy productions, and appeared in the National Film Board's film, "1 x 13".

Her fourth album, done with Claude La-France and Jacques Perron, was released in 1973.

She'll soon be representing Canada at the Spa Music Festival in Belgium.

Diane Dufresne has been called "a female Charlebois", "Janis Joplin reborn", and "a beast".

In "La Chanteuse Straight" she actually tells her audience, "If I'm too wild or too weird, you can put cotton in your ears." Her dynamism makes her one of Quebec's leading stars today, and her serious musicianship is evident in the first Quebec Circus Opera which forms side two of the enclosed album. Much of her material is written for her by her friends, Francois Cousineau (music) and Luc Plamondon (Lyrics).

If you like Diane Dufresne's Circus Opera, you'll be interested in the "Rock Mass for the Dead" complete with Orchestra, Offenbach Chorus and even a priest. It was recorded in Montreal's famous shrine to St.

Joseph, the Oratoire. The full story is on the jacket.

Pauline Julien doesn't like comparisons, but a frequent parallel is drawn between her and the late Edith Piaf, for her voice and interpretation, and between her and Jane Fonda for her outspoken political views.

We chose this album as representative of her fine performing ability, but also because it contains the work of Gilles Vigneault, the poet-author of the award-winning "Mon Pays". We think the album gives the listener a unique glance at the heart of Quebec culture.

Gilles Valiquette played with many local singers both on stage and in the recording studio before bringing his talents to the fore in his own recordings.

One of the things that makes Quebec music particularly exciting today is the closeness of the musical community, the kind of fraternity and interchange that had earlier produced a "Detroit Sound" and a "San Francisco Sound".

And, like Valiquette, many of Quebec's currently popular performers bring to their music a sophistication which could only be the result of years of varied experience.

You hear this same type of musicianship in the Ville Emard Blues Band, represented here by their current single, "Yama Nekh". These musicians in a slightly different configuration form a group called Contraction (with an album on Columbia) and you'll find their names frequently on other artists' albums. They form a major part of Quebec's outstanding core of studio musicians.

Renee Claude, once a secretary, wanted to sing the compositions of Quebec's "Chansonniers". When she got her chance they liked the results so much that now many of them are writing expressly for her.

She sings a mellower side of the Quebec sound, and in Je Reprends Mon Souffle she does just that — catches her breath as she considers the broad possibilities open to her in developing her career.

Harmonium's album gives us special satisfaction, since we have been fortunate enough to participate in their development. This is their first album, although they have been performing for some time — they did a live concert on CHOM early last fall and we look forward to a return engagement.

Like many other Quebec artists, they perform in both French and English, reflecting the bilingualism that is so characteristic of modern Quebec.

We've included Guy Trepanier's second album, which came out last June. Trepanier is a Montrealer in his early twenties, and

another excellent example of the outstanding performers currently producing music in Quebec.

The other singles in the "Gout de Quebec" selection seemed to us to be particularly valid for play on stations outside the province.

Anne Anderson has been working for Gamma Records while she developed her talent and her relationship with other musicians in the province — like Randy Bishop, formerly of the Wackers, who worked on these songs with her. Her style is her own, and yet it seemed to us to represent tremendously well one of the characteristics of music in Quebec today, the music we take such pride in.

Lewis Furey's classical training will be apparent to anyone who listens to the mastery of rhythm and presentation on "Lewis is Crazy". Other broadcasters in Canada are already playing this one, and have expressed a lot of interest in it, so we felt it would add an unusual and very appealing tone to our selection.

We couldn't present a well-rounded portrait of the Quebec music scene without The Hotel Orchestra.

This album is a Quebec production, a Quebec concept — and in terms of execution it's a masterpiece.

Is it old? Is it new? It's being called Jazz, MOR, Progressive . . . but it defies all labels. Maybe that's why it's so important to include it in this selection, because that's also true of Quebec's music in general — it defies classification. — R.B.





CRTC ORDERS CBC TO BECOME COMMERCIALLY PURE

With only two hours to go before the midnight deadline and possible sign-off, the CRTC renewed the CBC licences Sunday March 31st. The licences carried severe restrictions and directions regarding advertising and programming.

Advertising is to be eliminated on CBC radio by the new year and cut back on CBC television to eight minutes an hour from the present ten minutes. By the 1978-79 season, only five minutes an hour of advertising is to be permitted, with eventual elimination to take place in the future. Starting this fall, advertising on children's programs is to be eliminated.

This divorce from advertising now frees the CBC from having to air revenue-producing U.S. shows in prime time. As such, the CRTC ordered the network to fill the lucrative 8-9PM hour with 50% Canadian programming. More money will obviously be required by the CBC for such programming and the CRTC indirectly suggested strongly that more funds be directed to the network "to increase the quantity and improve the quality of its Canadian programming capacity immediately".

Other recommendations include:

- a special trust fund to finance programs that expose the French and English cultures to each other.
- at least a dozen Canadian feature films a year to be aired.
- CBC affiliated radio stations to carry at least 35 hours a week of CBC programming.
- commercial breaks to not disrupt programming flow.
- an end to pre-occupation with mass-audience programming concepts and pre-dominance of American programming in prime time.

In touching on private broadcasting, the Commission warned private broadcasters from viewing the reduction of advertising on CBC as a means to more profit and that the increased revenue should be used to improve services and quality.


