

Slightly ahead of his time - Ed Preston

Ed Preston, a part-time Dixieland drummer with an unsatiable thirst for the radio business, began it all at the age of seventeen at CHML in Hamilton. He ran errands, cleaned up the library and absorbed what was going on. He soon took on duties as music librarian and finally developed into one of Ontario's top music directors.

Preston left the radio business in 1967 to take on sales and promotion duties with RCA. It was that same year when he won a Juno Award as Top Regional Promotion Representative. In 1969 he was promoted to the post of Ontario promotion manager. He also took on duties as Ontario branch manager. He was upped to the national promo post in 1971 and in June of 1973 to his present position as Manager, Operations, Central and Western Regions of the Record Division. He is responsible for the studio, A&R, sales and promotion for these regions.

Preston is now considered one of the industry's most knowledgeable young record executives - on both sides of the border. He has completely immersed himself in the business and still chalks up every day as "one to remember". He wants to know more about the business and he is doing it while still retaining that "nice guy" image. He was asked the following questions.

WHAT WAS THE MAJOR DIFFERENCE COMING FROM RADIO INTO RECORDS?

Well, not having had any sales experience, particularly in records, I was offered a job opportunity in promotion which I really

DISCOTHEQUES & POLYDOR WORKING WELL TOGETHER

Polydor's national singles promotion rep, Mark Hodes, has stepped up his local disco action and can now boast a few examples of hit-breaking from this newly recognized element. Montreal discos were fast to pick up on "In The Bottle" by Brother To Brother and Gloria Gaynor's "Never Can Say Goodbye". The latter has already surpassed the 12,000 units sold mark and Hodes reports by Telex that local radio stations have chalked up the following action: CKGM 20/14, CJMS PL/16 and CFOM 23/16.

Hodes also reports solid action on "Do It ('Til You're Satisfied)" by B.T. Express and has sufficient national radio action to tag this one a national breakout. Action includes CKLW 3/2, CJMS PL/17, CKGM PL/21 and CFTR 29/24.

FOLDY FIRST WITH CHRISTMAS SINGLE

Kanata recording artist, Peter Foldy, bows a brand spanking new Christmas wish that could become a perennial hit. The single, "Christmas Eve With You", a Gene Lees penning through Shediak and Nuna Music-CAPAC, was produced by Dave Bird at Toronto's Thunder Sound Studios.

The flip, "Spanky" is a Foldy original and is published through Nursewood Music-BMI.

Both sides have a lush backing with the flip very reminiscent of Foldy's initial success, "Bondi Junction". A heavy concentration is expected on the "Christmas" side which should see Foldy in high gear by the first part of December. It's also expected that the flip could sustain Foldy's image through the New Year.

ISLAND'S OWENS INTROS VIDEO TAPE RADIO PROMO

While most record promotion men carry their talent (singles and albums) under their arms, Island's Ontario and Manitoba promo heavy, Joe Owens, has introduced a new twist to calling on radio station music directors. Owens has incorporated the help of a port-a-pac video machine and he has a couple of Canadian artists to tout — The Huggett Family and Klaatu. The latter have been picked up for U.S. and U.K. distribution by Island Records and are slated for a Nov. 20 "Music Machine" (CBC-TV) showing.

Dubs of both acts have been distributed to Island/Daffodil reps Roger Cross in Vancouver and the Montreal-based Jean Marie Heimrath. Owens also has extra copies which will be made available to television stations on request.

The Huggett Family are currently taping their next album session at the Air Studios in London, England. The session is being produced by George Martin who produced their initial album, and will rely heavily on music from the fourteenth and sixteenth (renaissance) centuries. They are currently showing excellent pop action with their single, "I'll Be Gone", already being heavily programmed on CFRB/Toronto, CKNW/Vancouver, CFRN/Edmonton, CKCK/Regina, CKXL, CFCN and CHQR/Calgary, CHML/Hamilton and CHOM/Montreal as well as many other FM and pop AM stations.

The Klaatu single, "California Jam" written by group member Chip Dale through Overlea Music-BMI was produced at Toronto Sound Studios by Terry Brown.

Both Klaatu and the Huggett Family are released on the Daffodil label in Canada, distributed by A&M.

MERCURY ACQUIRES DISTRIB. RIGHTS FOR HOLM SINGLE

No sooner had Mercury's Charlie Fach firmed a North American (Canada included) deal for the Ariola single of "When A Child Is Born" by Michael Holm, U.S. tradesters were touting it as a hit. Kal Rudman tagged it as "Looks like a world-wide hit. A song of hope".

Polydor, distributors of Mercury in Canada, are mounting a national campaign for the single which was rush released by the label's A&R director, Frank Gould. The coming Christmas season will play a major role in the development of Holm as a major international artist.

ISLAND TO ISSUE "FREE" STORY

Island Records have made plans to release "The Free Story", a two record set on the origination of the famous British group through to 1971. Original members Paul Rodgers and Nick Ralphs are now with Bad Company. The album will be numbered from 1 to 75,000 and will display a small Maple Leaf for product distributed in English Canada and a fleur-de-lis for Quebec Province.

The Free album met with exceptional success in the U.K. where it was also released in numbered copies, selling almost 50,000 units. It's expected that Island will be releasing all back product by Free.

Island is distributed in Canada by Quality Records.

ISLAND/DAFFODIL HAVE FULL PRODUCTION/PROMO HOUSE

The Daffodil and Island operation in Canada have now completed their initial stage of organization with representatives from coast to coast in Canada.

Roger Cross, based in Vancouver, and will look after promotion for Saskatchewan west to British Columbia. Joe Owens, at headquarters in Toronto is looking after promotion in Ontario and Manitoba and Jean Marie Heimrath doing similar duties in Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces.

Holding down the post of national promotion manager is Liam Mullan, who concentrates most of his time on the giant markets of Toronto and Montreal. Sharon (Sam) Murphy has been appointed promotion co-ordinator with offices in Toronto. She was recently joined by Bob Dunne who will look after publicity and artist relations. Dean Cameron, also based in Toronto, is in charge of production control.

LEO RECORDS IN LABEL DEAL WITH SWEETWATER

Vancouver-based Leo Records has concluded a label deal with Sweetwater Records, operated by Timbre One Sound Studios, Leo will now distribute Sweetwater product and be responsible for its promotion.

First product to issue under the new deal is a Roy McAuley single, "All Time Sunshine Woman", his second for Sweetwater. McAuley is a veteran of the stage, having appeared in clubs throughout the country and performed a variety of styles of music. McAuley appears with his group, Wild Country. They are currently working out a year long stay at a Vancouver area nitery.

"All Time Sunshine Woman" is now hitting stations across the country and has now been charted by CKWX, Vancouver.

POLYDOR'S KATZ TO EUROPE FOR TALKS

Allan Katz, national promotion for Polydor, is currently in Europe for talks with head office execs. He will also spend a few days in Copenhagen where he will meet with Mireille Mathieu and her manager to firm promotion data for her upcoming tour of Canada.

Katz will meet with headquarters staff at Polydor International in Hamburg.

WEA'S ACTS ATTRACTING AIRPLAY AND PRESS

WEA's Jesse Winchester has received a good deal of recognition lately for his single which has been getting airplay on both MOR and country stations — programmers have been picking both sides. Winchester, who is a draft resister, has also been the subject of several articles in American publications, among them Rolling Stone and Zoo World. The stories deal with the amnesty question in relation to Winchester who is now a Canadian citizen.

Ray Materick's single "Linda Put the Coffee On" has just been mailed and Larry Green (National Promo) expects good results, especially with the initial enthusiasm on the part of western programmers. Materick is currently preparing for his western tour. Green also expects very good reaction to the Waldo de los Rios single which has just been mailed.

U.A. STEPS UP RELEASE ACTION

United Artists' Allan Matthews says that recent releases on the label are beginning to gain momentum; among them are Paul Anka's single "One Man Woman" which has already been added to a number of major market stations, and Mike Graham's "Ghost Story" which has been added to playlists on practically all country stations across Canada. Programmers are showing an interest as well in the "B" side of Craig Ruhnke's single "Sweet Feelin'." CHUM, CKOC, CHAM and CHLO are some of the majors who have been giving the Ruhnke release airplay.

GIGLIOTTI RETURNS FOLLOWING ACCIDENT

Frank Gigliotti, Columbia Records of Canada's western regional promotion representative, is now back at work following an automobile accident in Edmonton. Gigliotti's return brings to an end a lengthy absence from the western scene by him occasioned by a combination of a trip to Nashville for the CMA Convention, some time off and the Edmonton accident.

Gigliotti suffered cracked ribs and a bruised lung in the collision. He covers the western territory for Columbia from the company's offices in Vancouver.

CONCERT SUCCESSES FOR COLUMBIA

Columbia's Charlie Camilleri confirms that the O'Jays are scheduled for a week at the O'Keefe Centre beginning December 2nd and that promotion for the date will be underway shortly. Donovan's Canadian dates are beginning to look like a complete sell-out with the Montreal concert slated for December 1st already sold out and the city now is negotiating for an additional show. Ottawa's Donovan concert (6) was sold-out and Toronto is negotiating for a second show after the December 2nd date reached the capacity mark. Donovan's latest album is expected to be in stores within two weeks so that product will be available for the Montreal and Toronto dates. The artist has just completed a press tour in Montreal, doing radio and TV interviews.

Camilleri also reports that Edith Butler was a smash success at Montreal's Place Des Arts (2,3).

GOLD LEAF AWARDS CERTIFICATIONS SHOWN IN RPM

When record companies certify their outstanding record sales with the Gold Leaf Awards, they are announced in RPM in a full page spread. The announcement is an actual replica of the Award and an indication to the trade that the record has been properly certified.

The Gold Leaf Awards are a standardization of outstanding record sales in Canada that can be certified with RPM. The plaques denoting the outstanding sales of a single and album, acknowledge to the industry that the sales have been certified with RPM and are subject to an audit. There is no greater tribute to an artist than a genuine Gold Leaf Award. There is also a Platinum Award that is available when the appropriate sales figure is reached.

New CTL releases include country singles "Maggie" by Frankie Gibbs and "Think 'Bout Me And You" by Freddy Hannah. Another country single titled "Guilty" by Lynn McNeil is pending. Keith Barrie contributes an album to the CTL group called "Keith Barrie Sings of Love And Places" which contains his singles "San Sebastian" and "Apalachicola".

Kotai recording artist Ellen McIlwaine whose most recent release is "Let Me Be"

has applied for landed immigrant status in Canada and according to Matthews, the arrangements should be finalized in the very near future.

PSI MANAGEMENT SETS FOUR ACTS

PSI Management, a division of Vancouver-based PSI Records, is currently at work developing a stable of artists for the independent label. PSI Management has, at present, four acts under contract, The John Beggs Band, Tricky Linkage, Carson and Wheeler and Slippery Elm.

The Beggs Band is a five man group displaying considerable versatility. The presenta-

tion includes country, rock, blues and gospel material. Tricky Linkage is the former Wizard, a jazz-rock group of wide experience. The duo of Carson and Wheeler produce a folk rock sound which has found favour with audiences at Ottawa's Le Hibou, Grumbles in Toronto, Montreal's Karma Coffee House and on CBC Radio.

All acts, handled for PSI Management by Peter Wilhelm, will be recording at PSI's Vancouver Studios. Details regarding product release are expected to be announced shortly.

Donna & Jeff Smith shake industry

The Canadian music industry's brightest new star is a plush and exciting 24 track recording studio boasting the most modern and sophisticated equipment in the world of recording. Flying the flashing (neon) banner of Sounds Interchange, the new recording complex is located in the heart of old Toronto (Adelaide Street East).

Jeff and Donna Smith, two Toronto musicians who happen to be married to each other, decided to splurge and come up with a recording studio that would supply comfort and technical finesse, and when they threw open their doors, they literally shocked the industry.

The Smiths held a studio warming in the form of a lavishly prepared cocktail party and invited the who's who of the industry.

What they saw was an unbelievably appointed studio, designed by Tom Hidley of Westlake Audio.

Various areas in the studio have been specifically designed for certain instruments and sounds i.e. the brass section for getting the best possible sound and likewise a room for strings or vocals, which has a natural delay time of two and a half seconds, but can be lessened by drawing a series of drapes.

The control room has equal disbursement of sound, both vertical and horizontal. It was here where most of the "oohs" and "aahs" could be heard. The studio has complete quadrasonic facilities, a con-

sole with 32 inputs with 24 out and expandable to 32 out and with quad panning. There are Studer tape machines - mono with sync, 2 - 2 tracks, 2 - 4 tracks, 8 track, 16 track and 24 track. There is

WONDER SINGLE & LP TOPS MOTOWN LISTS

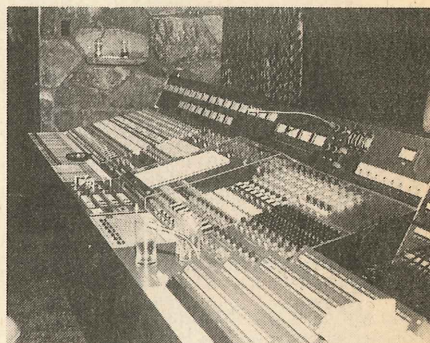
Stevie Wonder tops both the album and singles best sellers list for Motown. His album, "Fulfillingness First Finale", has now been established from coast to coast and shows up constantly in the RPM Sampling. The Wonder single, "You Haven't Done Nothing" has had a successful fifteen week run on the RPM Singles Chart and rests at No. 17 this week.

Motown's national promotion Ken McFarland, is now shaping a massive campaign for Wonder's new single, culled from his album and ready to roll for the Motown artist's western Canadian dates. He will appear in Edmonton Nov 30 and in Vancouver Dec 1. CHED in Edmonton will be running a Special Stevie Wonder package prior to the concert date.

The Motown fever has begun in the west with a special weekend for the label at CHED/Edmonton (8), and CKXL/Calgary (22). They'll also move into the Quebec City market with a T-shirt and album giveaway through CFOM.

The Miracles have shown early indications of a return to the charts with major stations charting and playlisting their latest single, "Do It Baby". These include: CHUM, CHED, CJME, CKCK, CKOM and an impressive jump at CKGM from 27 to 18. The group will be appearing with Dionne Warwick at Toronto's O'Keefe for one week commencing Dec 9.

WEA CONCERTS AND SINGLES

WEA was honoured at the CEC Convention in Kitchener with the award for 1974 as the most cooperative record company for concert promotions. RCA was awarded recognition as the most cooperative record company for radio. The presentations were made November 10th.

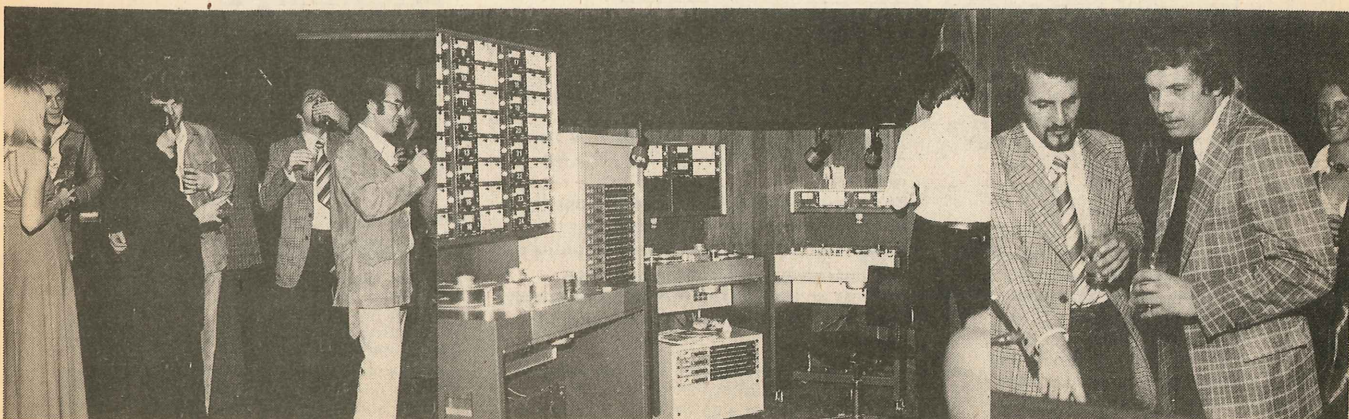
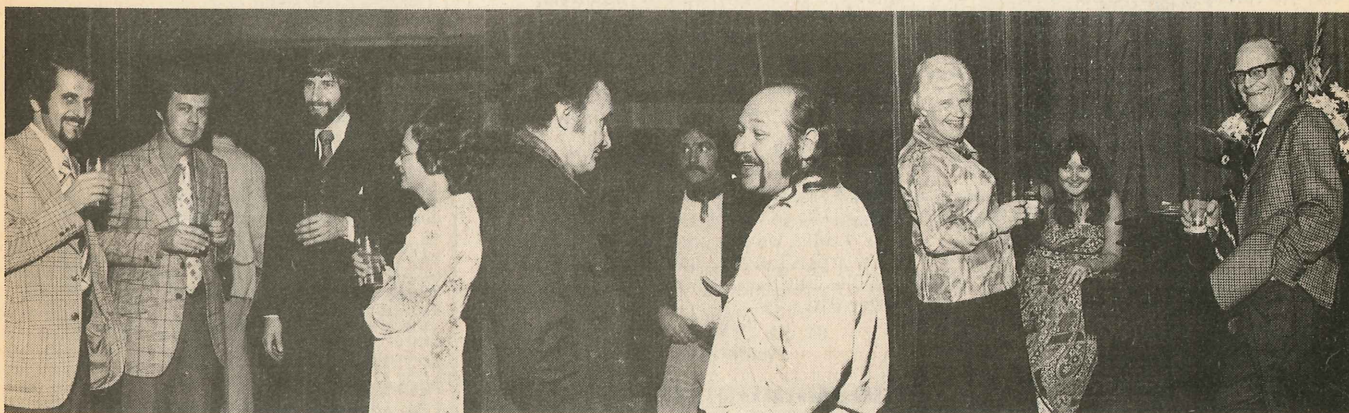
Larry Green says that Ray Materick's "Linda Put the Coffee On" continues to show promise and that CHUM AM and FM have both playlisted the single. The Waldo de los Rios single "Naducco" is beginning to create playlist action in Canada and is breaking onto the charts in England. The single has been very well received in Europe, especially in France and Spain. Canadian records "Third Rate Romance" by Jesse Winchester and "Memories" by Michael Tarr are getting good support and both singles are experiencing crossover airplay.

In terms of size the Sounds Interchange studio is the third largest in Toronto and with the almost immediate rush for booking, the studio already ranks among the busiest and most popular in Canada.

Besides boasting competitive prices, Sounds Interchange also has the advantage of a former British Decca engineer, Mike Jones who, besides being manager of Threshold Records, was involved in record sessions for Trapeze, Nicky Jones and the Moody Blues to name a few.

The Smiths would appear to have left no stone unturned in their bid to command the Canadian recording scene. Although there will be a heavy concentration on label work, the studio will also be used for radio and television commercials and jingles - a whole new era of sound excitement, soon to be handed to the industry by the CRTC.

felt good about. RCA, at the time, was not doing an awful lot in that area. I felt that I really could offer something so....for me.....the big difference seemed to be that in promotion I had to learn the policies of Top Forty radio stations. I had worked in MOR radio all the time and that was a little strange getting into the rock product after playing all the soft music. I think my radio experience was the key to helping me in my initial promotion activities with the company.

COMING FROM RADIO INTO PROMOTION DID YOU FIND YOU HAD A CLOSE AFFINITY TO RADIO PEOPLE AND COULD SYMPATHIZE WITH SOME OF THE PROBLEMS THEY HAD WITH RECORD COMPANIES?

I think mainly that would be the key to most of the success I had at that time, in that most of the people in radio in Toronto had come from CHML or Hamilton, one way or another and I got to know them quite well. But, more than that, I think they respected someone else who had been in radio. It was a really good experience.

PROBABLY ONE OF THE REASONS THAT RCA CONSIDERED YOU IN THE FIRST PLACE.

I think so. There was a lot of that thinking going on at the time. A couple of other record companies had approached me along the same lines. I think that's what they were thinking about.

DO YOU FIND A LACK OF EXCITEMENT IN THE CANADIAN BUSINESS?

I don't know if there's really a lack of excitement. A lot happens when you're a hot record company. This year has been the most exciting I have ever had in the record business, because we have been hot. Everything seems to have broken for us this year. Sure, when things aren't going that way, it's not quite as exciting, because you're not in there with the top ten records all the time. But when the product is rolling and you just can't keep up with the hits as they come.....that's really exciting. For me the excitement has always been getting the piece of product and.....I've always likened it to having a baby. It's born, you bring it along and it starts to walk and then run. It works for both Canadian and foreign records. We've had some luck at starting some foreign records in Canada first and that's always been exciting. Steppenwolf, a Canadian group released in the States first, would be the best example I think.

DO YOU FIND THAT IT'S REALLY A LONG HAUL IN PROMOTING A CANADIAN RECORD THAT YOU PARTICULARLY BELIEVE IN? DO YOU REALLY HAVE TO GENERATE A LOT OF EXCITEMENT HERE?

I think so. It's definitely a long haul, there's no question about that. I would go back to your many articles on the star system. I see it in Quebec where it's so easy to get something going. The papers themselves contribute immensely to the industry. They go out of their way to get what they can on the music business and they'll give you a full page spread. They'll hype the groups for you because they're just interested in bringing them along. It's very difficult here to get that kind of space for your artists. If you want to get a full page, you have to pay for it. It's not one of those things you can go out and get for nothing, unless the product starts to break and then there's a story to tell

about the artist and then they come to you. But we really don't have those kind

of magazines around the country that really do a job on Canadian acts.

HAVE YOU FOUND THAT PROGRAMMERS ARE GENERALLY DOING WHAT THEY CAN FOR CANADIAN CONTENT?

I have.....of course, having a music director background, I very seldom get uptight if somebody says I can't play your record. There's usually a reason for it. So if you can't get it there you try some place else, until you're convinced it's a tune-out factor and people aren't going to get into it. So you get off it. But I think that's one of the things that you have to be aware of today as well....that's when to get off a record and move on to the next one. We've put out records that we considered really as a door-opener - just something to get people's attention first and then we come out with a better release.

HOW DO YOU PACIFY THE ARTIST WHEN YOU EVENTUALLY HAVE TO TELL HIM IT'S NOT WORKING?

You hope the artist is man enough to take that conversation. We try to stay very level with everybody right from the start when we discuss their contract and everything else. I think most of them know before we get the first record out, how we operate. Naturally they always want more, but it's not always possible, and I think if you show that you still believe in them as an act even though their first record didn't happen and you're willing to get rolling with the next one, they'll understand. I think the biggest problem, and I think you've heard this before, is the lack of good management.

DO YOU FIND THAT BECAUSE OF THIS YOU'RE BEING MORE DISCREET IN YOUR RELEASES AND THAT YOU'RE DEVELOPING AN ARTIST NOW RATHER THAN JUST RELEASING PRODUCT?

I would say so - more so in the coming year. I think we will prefer to work with fewer artists but do a better job. Just over the long haul, I think we can do it better that way.

For Your Information:

A GUIDELINE TO HOW THE RPM 100 IS COMPILED

The RPM 100 is a national chart compiled weekly from national sales and radio station airplay and chart action. The top 50 records are computed from sales and airplay.

The computation of the records from 51 to 100 is based on early airplay, chart action and regional sales and breakouts.

The chart is based on samplings from markets across Canada and indicates trends that may not be prevalent in all areas of Canada.

Shaded numbers indicate a strong upward trend and gains in airplay or sales. This chart is offered as a guide to new product and an indication of trends in Canadian markets.

The RPM 100 singles and album chart (or any part thereof) may be reproduced with a proper credit.

DO YOU FIND THAT THE CANADIAN TALENT THING IS FALLING MORE IN LINE; IS THERE GOOD TALENT AVAILABLE?

I've never felt that talent was the big problem. I've always felt that it was material. I think the producers here are much better than they've ever been. Studios in Canada are excellent and there's some awfully good product being turned out. It goes back to material. I don't think we have a lot of great writers here.

YOU'VE HAD EXPERIENCE IN EVERY ASPECT OF THE BUSINESS, FROM ROCK THROUGH COUNTRY, WHAT DO YOU FIND IS THE PROBLEM WITH CANADIAN PRODUCT ON THE RETAIL LEVEL?

Having been a musician and played country shows, the old Main Street Jamboree at CHML with Gordie Tapp and all the guys, I've always had the feeling that it's just music. There wouldn't be anything wrong with the Canadian country music scene if somebody just had a hit record that crossed over, and everybody would say "Canadian country music is really alive", but I really don't think it has to fit into any bag. Most of the Canadian releases that we put out, we service to every station in Canada, except what we purposely record for regional markets. We ship to all the radio stations in hopes that there will be some cross-over potential.

THAT FALLS RIGHT INTO LINE DOESN'T IT.....YOU HAVE A DICK NOLAN, FAMILY BROWN, A GEORGE HAMILTON IV AND THEN YOU HAVE THE FAMILY BROWN AND CARLTON SHOWBAND AND MERCEY BROTHERS, AND THEY'VE ALL BEEN ACCEPTED AS POP AND COUNTRY ACTS.

Sure, I think guys like Gary Buck and Tommy Hunter can cross over into any market. I hear Tommy Hunter on the CFRBs and CHMLs as much as I hear them on country stations.

BUT DO YOU THINK THE CANADIAN PUBLIC BUYS THESE ARTISTS?

This is the big problem, but I don't blame the stations and I don't blame the public. I think it all boils down to the song. We've sent a lot of product to the States in hopes that we'll get an American release but it really comes down to that. We get their attention for a verse or two but we don't hold it. Something falls apart somewhere down the line. That's the direction we have to go. We have to spend our time looking for better material.

COULD IT BE THAT WE'RE PRODUCING FOR THE WORLD AND FORGETTING ABOUT OUR OWN MARKET?

I guess that's really a question to be answered by the industry. We at RCA produce both ways. We do produce for regional markets. For example the George Hamilton IV "Down East" and "Out West" country albums and the Dick Nolans for the Maritimes. Then we have Al Cherney who has done some Ukrainian....so we do chase the regional market, and the records by Gary Buck and Tommy Hunter can certainly be played anywhere in the world.

RCA WAS ONE OF THE FIRST COMPANIES TO TAKE A HARD LINE ON RETURN PRIVILEGES, HOW HAS IT AFFECTED YOU?

I guess it's the better part of three years now that we've been into a 15% exchange

policy on LP product and it's working very well. Naturally that kind of a stand hurts you the first year when it's very tight and you get a lot of resistance, but over the long haul it has created better buying and we're still able to get all our product out there that we really want to. The newer artist is always tough with a policy like that because nobody wants to take the gamble. It's a cream situation.

HOW DO YOU WORK YOUR SINGLE RETURN PRIVILEGES?

Singles are on a 100% guarantee still. We're not involved in the free goods situation at all.

HAVE YOU FOUND THAT THE SINGLES HAVE ADJUSTED THEIR IMPORTANCE IN THE MARKET?

This year they really have. It's unbelievable, even with the price increase in the spring when they went to \$1.29. It's been phenomenal and when you've got all the hits it makes your yearly single quota something else.

SO YOUR REASON FOR THE SINGLE INCREASE IS THE FACT THAT YOU HAVE HAD THE HITS?

That's obviously one good reason, but I think there would have been an increase in singles this year anyhow. I think the spread on album prices too, have effected younger buyers who are really into the singles. That's what he can afford.

HAS THE VINYL SITUATION ADJUSTED ITSELF?

No.....it's still a problem. We're faced all the time with having to look at it very seriously. The costs never seem to stop going up, but that's the same with everything else, at the moment.

CAN YOU SEE MORE INCREASES IN ALBUM PRODUCT?

Yes, not necessarily at the retail level, in the next year, but we certainly expect our costs will be going up.

THE PICTURE OVERALL IS VERY GOOD ISN'T IT.....YOU'RE SELLING MORE ALBUMS AND MORE SINGLES THAN YOU'VE EVER SOLD?

That's for sure. We're feeling pretty balsy about 1975. We think it's going to be a pretty good year.

DO YOU FIND THAT WE'RE GOING THROUGH AN ERA OF TOO MANY CONCERTS, PARTICULARLY IN THE MAJOR CENTRES AND COULD THIS BE AFFECTING MAJOR SALES?

I'm not really sure if it does or not, because I've always been convinced that the concerts will sell album product for artists and especially someone who hasn't been to town before and the combination of what they've heard on the radio and finally they see the artist.....it usually results in pretty good record sales. If we're talking Toronto, yes I think there are too many concerts in Toronto, but I don't see the same thing happening in the rest of Canada. Vancouver has really exploded this year. We've had an awful lot of acts playing in Vancouver. Where we used to have two a month, we are now running sometimes two or three a week.

DO YOU FIND THE BUYING HABITS OF CANADIANS SIMILAR?

I'd say generally yes, but there are certain artists who don't sell as well in a Montreal area, such as a John Denver or a Jim Croce, they would have a much harder time, selling that kind of product than we do in my region and the central and western region. The Maritimes, of course, have al-

ways been country-oriented, but I think that's really a myth, because there's an awful lot of young people down there, and our sales of people like David Bowie and Lou Reed have certainly increased in that area this year. The prairies and the coast have been phenomenal this year. They're really up with us. It's just gangbusters, especially B.C. They're really into the David Bowie product and other contemporary albums.

YOU PAINT A PRETTY ROSY PICTURE OF RCA, BUT THERE MUST BE SOME PROBLEMS OUT THERE THAT YOU'VE COME ACROSS. WHAT'S YOUR MAIN COMPLAINT ABOUT THE BUSINESS?

I guess it would be distribution and some of the merchandising in the stores. Obviously a lot of space has been lost in the stores to accommodate K-Tel-type product and so forth, and these people, of course, sell direct to the buyers and a lot of our racks have great complaints about not having the space they used to have to carry our product and in order to do so they constantly ask for better deals. We haven't been a company of deals in the last couple of years. It's been very straight ahead with a fall plan program and maybe a tape program in the spring. I think that's really it.....the amount of space that's been lost to normal good catalogue items, which you only get back at Christmas time when these accounts really open up their record department.

DO YOUR PEOPLE GO INTO THESE RACK JOBBER ACCOUNTS AND SEE WHAT THE SITUATION IS?

Yes we do. We often spot check stores and more so this time because it's to our advantage as well. They are quite receptive to having us come in and see what's happening, what's sold out.....that they might have missed.....and they don't mind at all if we send them a little note or pick up the phone. I've gone so far as to draw floor layouts showing what percentage of their department has gone to premium or cutout-type product.

ALBUM REVIEWS

IAN TYSON

O' Eon

A&M SP-9017-W

Tyson has long been trying to crack that country barrier and this album comes pretty close. He has an arrogance in song that relates to his television image and whether



that combination will work remains to be seen. Tyson might do better to scout the writing field and experiment with other than his own material. His choice of writers here, like his own material, just doesn't fit the Tyson vocal. Excellent vocal and instrument backing from Sylvia Tyson, Adam Mitchell, Red Shea, Pee Wee Charles and others. Sound quality from RCA and Thunder Sound is exceptional with production credits from Adam Mitchell and Billy Misener. Our choice of good programming material would be "Some Kind Of Fool" and "Blueberry Susan", both Tyson originals.

RONNIE HAWKINS

**The Giant Of Rock 'n' Roll
Monument KZ 32940-H**

If anyone writes the true story about the rock business, Rompin' Ronnie Hawkins will surely be one of the principal characters. Hawkins came to Canada, in between hits and long before this country became a haven for draft resisters. Hawkins was a welcome breath of fresh rock air to the Canadian business and he can be credited with many Canadian happenings including The Band. Hawkins is still rompin' and he just might take hold this time through the production skills of Fred Foster. Hawkins is a powerful name in the Canadian music business and this is one album that should be the object of a high energy promotion, to bring the Hawkins image back into its proper perspective. Give a listen to "Dream Lover", "Lonesome Town" and "Tennessee Waltz". Tracks for the latter were recorded in Canada. Some of the background voices belong to the Jordanaires, Holladays and the Joint Venture. Could be Hawkins re-entry into the record business.

JUSTIN PAIGE

Capitol SKAO 6419-F

Listen, but carefully, to the lyrics: "Rough trade, never laid, keeps his banana in the palm of his hand" or "Steam Queen, waits in the dark, sits in her room, waits for her man to walk in and begin". Paige tries his hand at some of the "raw" gay talk which he obviously picked up from Toronto's

"slightly to the left" community. There's a lot of creative entertainment here, which is rather unique for Canada and well produced by Lee De Carlo at Toronto's Manta Sound. Single action could go to "Rock And Roll Band", a high energy flat out rocker that could stir up the Montreal discos. FM progressives should also get off on set, particularly with the brief (2:58) "What On Earth". Jacket is Canadian in origination and should win an award for Roly Legault.

SHANKAR FAMILY & FRIENDS

Dark Horse

A&M SP22002-W

This album, though in many ways exactly what you would expect, is surprising in that it mixes eastern melody with western rhythm. The two styles intermingled create an unusually listenable album which is performed by a motley crew indeed, with the performers running the gamut from Ravi Shankar to Vinny Poncea to the inimitable Hari George-son. Conceived as the background to a typically simplistic play, the album would make an interested addition to many stations' sound.

PAUL WILLIAMS

A Little Bit Of Love

A&M SP3655-W

Though firmly entrenched among the world's top composers, Williams has yet to break through to the level of recognition as a performer he deserves. This musically powerful set sees Williams adopting a dramatic, almost theatrical, vocal approach which at times it reminiscent of Richard Harris. And, as is the case with Harris, the album should be heard in its entirety to be fully appreciated.

TOM JANS

A&M SP3644-W

Just listen to songs like "Margarita" and discover what a literate, no gimmick composer can do. Jans is an absolute delight here. Material is beautiful throughout, vocalizing clear and straightforward and the production just right. Material is super strong and would fit nicely into any format and add a touch of real musical class in the process.

HELEN REDDY

Free And Easy

Capitol ST11348-F

A Helen Reddy album is always a treat and this one is no exception. Tastefully produced and featuring a handsome selection of material, "Free and Easy" moves quickly through lyrical selections like "Angie Baby" to heavier material such as "Raised on Rock". The title is a cut worthy of any programmer's consideration as are "Emotion" and "I'll Be Your Audience". Reddy's crystal clear vocalizing is as well presented here as it ever has been.

BEST OF URIAH HEEP Vol. II

Mercury SRM1711-Q

Among the foremost proponents of that stylish avant garde British rock, Uriah Heep present here a collection of some of their most advanced and sophisticated material. Among the top cuts are "Traveller in Time" and the well known "Salisbury", title track of their second album. Really good potential here for progressives, each track flows into the other, unusual for a compilation like this, making it a good bet for whole album play.

DONALD K. DONALD BOOSTS CONCERT FEVER IN QUEBEC

"Montreal is hot . . . Montreal is burning", according to concert promoter Don Tarlton, head of Donald K. Donald Productions, the company responsible for an exceptionally successful string of concerts in Quebec this fall.

It started on September 7th with Edgar Winter who grossed \$55,000.00 at the Forum in Montreal. Winter was followed by Caravan on September 28th at Quebec City's Municipal Convention Centre, where the group played to a sellout crowd and collected \$14,000.00. The momentum continued in October with Forum dates for Eric Clapton who returned for a second show (1), pulling 10,000 people, and Rick Wakeman who played the Forum (8) and grossed \$38,000. Chicago followed (20) drawing 12,609 fans. Tickets went on sale October 22nd at 9:00AM for Elton John's November 17th Forum date and by 2:00PM wickets were closed to gross returns of \$138,000 from 18,500 fans.

The Stampeders enjoyed sold out shows all through October in Cornwall (19), Sault Ste. Marie (25), Sudbury (26), Timmins (27), Kirkland Lake (28) and North Bay (29).

Shawn Phillips grossed \$15,000 with an October 24th sellout in Quebec City and followed with a five-show advance sellout at Montreal's Place Des Arts for a total gross of \$90,000 — returns for concerts on October 25th, 26th and 27th. Tarlton says that Phillips' successful dates are tribute to a great artist with effective management and an excellent agent in I.F.A.'s Budd Carr who, along with Tarlton, has worked the act from a \$500.00 college attraction (four years ago) to a superstar attraction in '74.

PUBLISHING PEAK FOR SUNBURY/DUNBAR

Barry Keane, President of Sunbury/Dunbar music publishing for RCA, reports an exceptionally active season with releases for both English and French-Canadian artists in top 40 and country categories.

In the top 40 field, Robert David's "Sunshine Man" and Jack Cornell's "In the Park" are still getting good airplay. "Morning Song" will be followed in the very near future by his new single "Country Pride" to be backed with "Souris River Valley". The recently signed Hans Staymer Band is finding that half the programmers picking up their single "Six Feet Under" are playing the flipside "Instant Comfort". Buster Brown's "Falling Out of Love" has been added to playlists at about 30 stations across the country and the single is currently No. 69 on the RPM top 100. Lou Reed's album "Sally Can't Dance" looks like his biggest to date with good sales and an RPM chart position at the no. 22 spot with a bullet. Reed's single of the same name is getting good response as well. Rockin' Horse and Sweet Pete complete the top 40 roster with their recently-released singles.

Sunbury/Dunbar's country artists are equally active with Tommy Hunter following up his single "The Departure" with a Roy Payne tune called "Born to Be a Gypsy". Payne's own single "Whisper to Me Tina", was pulled from his new album "One Step Forward" which has just been released. Another single titled, "That's Why I'm in Love with Life" is scheduled to follow "Tina" shortly. Channel 19 has scheduled a special for November featuring Roy Payne and his music — the live performance was taped at

The hitline triumph comes at a good time for Bell distributors, Taylor, Pearson and Carson. TPC's Ray Ramsay is currently running a series of spots for the Quatro album over CKLG FM and will soon co-op a series of print ads with prominent Lower Mainland retailers. Miss Quatro is now back in England, having completed a highly successful American tour.

"TOMORROW WE MEET AGAIN" PREMIERES ON CHUM-FM

Premiere airing of Lip Service Studio Productions Ltd's first full-length radio program, "Tomorrow We Meet Again", aired on CHUM-FM/Toronto, Halloween, Thursday, October 31st. The special, produced by David Marsden of CHUM-FM in the new eight-track studios of Lip Service/Thunder Sound, consists of a blend of contemporary music, spoken word, and documentary, delving into the current upsurge of sightings of and interest in UFO's. Mr. Marsden states "The evidence is really overwhelming that we have been visited, and are still being visited, by beings from outer space, whether they be from other planets or other solar systems. Yet the various governments on this planet continue to deny their existence. Why? Don't they feel we are mature enough to accept the facts? The CHLO/St. Thomas "Wanted Poster", depicting the station's on-air staffers, has

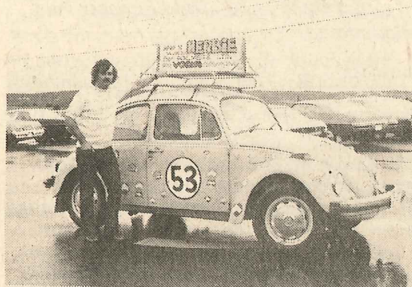

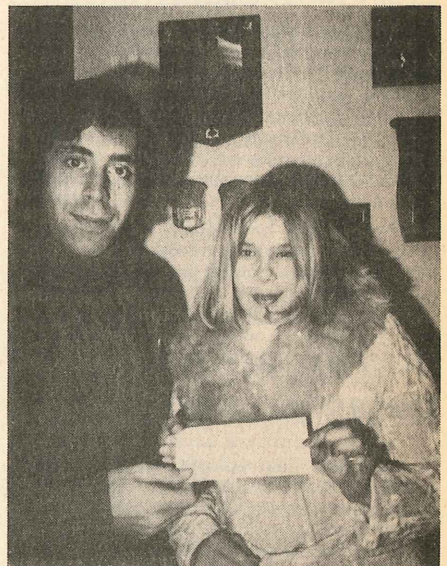
the controversy.

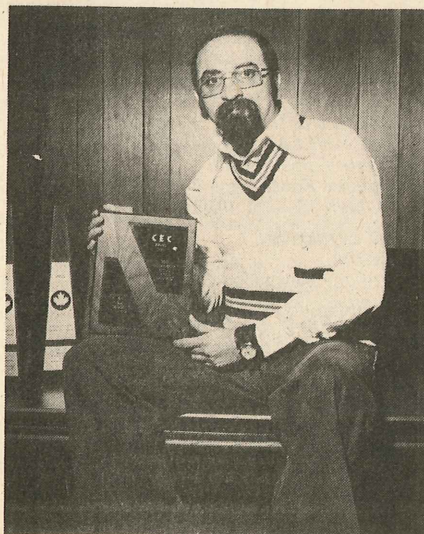

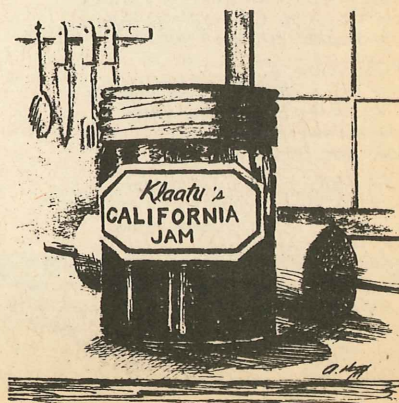

DOES THAT HAVE ANY EFFECT ON THE RACK JOBBERS?

It has in a couple of cases.

GORD EDWARDS MENTIONED THAT HE BELIEVES THE RECORD COMPANIES ARE OUT OF TOUCH?

Oddly enough the mention I made about the floor space happened to be in one of Gord's accounts. So, that particular time, when I brought it to Gord's attention, he too was out of touch with the fact that that store had been buying more premium product than he was aware of. The only way you can stay in touch is to get back on the street and stay out there.

HOW ARE YOU HANDLING THE DELETE SITUATION?

Well, what we've been doing or what we did last year because of the heavy import of deletes.....when everyone was buying these things up from the States.....we went to our parent company in the States and we creamed their cutout list and brought it in for our accounts. This year we felt, particularly with the vinyl situation, we'd do much better to put out cutouts that would sell fast and the others we would just destroy and regrid. Cutouts this year won't be a big factor.

THE IMPORTING OF DELETES FROM THE U.S. HAS BEEN A PROBLEM?

One thing that has worked to our advantage with the 15% exchange policy is the fact that you're not in any kind of a loading program, so you're not pressing up that kind of product any more and you're not caught with records that stiff on you after a couple of months. You might just have a couple of hundred records on your hands whereas in the old days you'd be looking at anything from two to forty thousand.

WHAT ARE YOUR FEELINGS ABOUT PRINT MEDIA OVER RADIO OR TELEVISION SPOTS FOR ADVERTISING?

Having come out of radio and seen the effect of radio advertising, it's always been my first love, but there's no question that K-Tel has shown a lot of us how to sell records on television and they've done a phenomenal job at it. I think you've seen in this past year that a lot more record companies have gone into television advertising as well and I think it works but I don't think anyone is going to back off on what they were doing on the radio. I think if anything they'll increase it. I recently spoke at York University and found out from the students that they seldom ever read the papers and most of the students I talked to mentioned they didn't know there were record ads in the newspapers. That's got to tell us something. It's sort of been traditional with the dealers.....they've felt that that was the best thing to do. They run their weekly ads, but until this past year, we saw some pretty bland ads in the newspapers. I think this year it has picked up considerably. There's a bright new wave of things happening.

THERE HAVE BEEN COMPLAINTS OF AN OVER-SATURATION OF RECORD COMPANY ADS ON THE RADIO IN THE U.S. AND THAT IT HAS EVOLVED INTO A MEANINGLESS METHOD OF ADVERTISING. DO YOU THINK IT COULD HAPPEN HERE?

I think it could. A lot of ads I hear are starting to sound the same. Sounds like they've been written by the same copywriter or producer. They like a certain style and use it all the time. I think you have to vary that somewhere. I don't think

everything can be soft sell.....I don't think everything should be hard sell. I think it would drive you crazy.

SOMEONE SUGGESTED THAT RADIO ADVERTISING IS REALLY PAY FOR PLAY?

A lot of people ask why do you use CHUM or why do you use CKGM in Montreal, or whatever.....we use it because we are looking for audience.....they have big audiences and that's the audience we're trying to reach. As far as getting the records on the air.....I've never seen a music director influenced by the sales department with "you've got to play the guy's record, he's one of our best sponsors". I don't think that will happen here.

YOU MENTIONED FM AND THE HEAVY CONCENTRATION OF LISTENING ON FM, WHAT CHANGES DO YOU THINK WILL BE COMING ALONG IN RADIO IN GENERAL?

I think you're seeing one of the changes now, where format Top 40 has loosened up a little bit. It started in the summer. There's a little more personality back in radio. That's always been my personal preference anyhow. It's amazing what an announcer can do for a song that he's particularly into, or an artist. When it's all rapid fire weather reports and time signals.....I've never felt that was radio. You get the same thing from a jukebox.

SO YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT PERSONALITY RADIO RETURNING. ISN'T THAT WHAT FM IS INTO ANYWAY?

I believe so. With FM you're always hearing something about the music and the artist, and they've stayed very public service minded. I think they're really on top of what's going on.

THE FM PROGRESSIVES SEEM TO BE THE ONLY ONES THAT ARE DOING THAT. HOW ABOUT THE GIANT FM OUTLETS THAT ARE STILL REALLY JUKEBOXES AND REALLY AREN'T GIVING INFORMATION ABOUT THE RECORD. MANY TIMES THEY DON'T EVEN MENTION THE ARTIST OR TITLE OF THE RECORD. DO YOU THINK THAT WILL CHANGE?

I'd like to see it change, but I have some doubts unless the CRTC wants to do something about that, and I'm not really sure about that. As you know I came from CHML and helped set up CKDS when it was first starting and it's been very successful, but it uses that kind of format. I really hear it a lot. Many people are into that. They really like that kind of thing. I've been at several offices where I've been waiting to see buyers and clients and I hear that kind of background. They really listen to that kind of programming. It just doesn't disturb them, I guess. It's similar to going to a supermarket and having music while you shop, except you get the news every hour.

IS RADIO THE GREATEST FACTOR IN SELLING RECORDS?

No question about it. We're selling sound and they're the only people putting it out.

HOW DO YOU BACK UP YOUR NEW RELEASES ON THE RETAIL LEVEL?

Mostly with in-store play copies. We have produced a couple of in-store samplers where we've taken some of the best cuts from new LPs so that they can play examples of twelve or thirteen different albums that we have out, and in-store play is really important and here again it's like a jock who is really into the music, he can really do a lot to sell that kind of product as can a store with their in-store play.

DO YOU DO THAT WITH TAPES AS WELL?

Yes, We recently ran John Denver weekends through a chain of stores and it was very very successful. They put the Denver tape in and left it playing all day. It was phenomenal. You get great results. People are glad to walk into a music store and hear music again.

ARE TAPES INCREASING OVER ALBUMS?

They really are. This past fall has really been phenomenal. We've had about three straight months where they have run as high as 40% which is really tremendous.

ARE YOUR TAPES OUT FROM BEHIND THE LOCKED CABINET?

We've had some very good luck recently with wire rack setups that run from the counter to the ceiling and expose four or five hundred pieces of tape. That seems to work very well. One of the other things that has been very successful in the west is dump-trucks.....similar to dump tables.....where they actually have a pickup truck loaded with tapes and they roll the truck into the store and that's been very effective.

DO YOU FIND THAT PROMOTION HAS CHANGED?

It stems right back to the promotion man being into his product. The promotion man can do wonders if he's a good listener. We expect our promotion people to be good artist relations people. We expect him to be very knowledgeable about his product and have good communications with radio and be on good speaking terms with the owners and buyers of record stores. Store reports are very important to us and to radio stations, when they're making up their charts. So, we like the promo man to go into the store, not only to do displays but to generally rap about what's happening.

HOW ABOUT PROMOTION PEOPLE AND THEIR EFFECT ON RADIO STATIONS?

Radio stations these days are very interested in what's happening with records. They get the same reports that we do.....tip sheets and so forth. They know mostly about what's happening in the States, but they also like to know if the promotion man knows what's going on as well. More so, if he's got a record that's broken out and there are record sales to prove it. That's something they want to knowif there's another area in the country that's having phenomenal success, particularly with something they like and are looking at but that they're not really ready to go with yet. It may move that record onto their playlist a week or two earlier if they have this kind of information. We've also been using a gimmick we call "prime the pump". In an area where we get a breakout, even if it's in an isolated area and where there is some significant phone response at the station, we've allowed our sales and promotion people to put four or five records into the key stores in town, at no charge. It works several ways to both the advantage of the store and to us. First of all, people who've heard it and like it right away are able to buy it. It helps the artist because his new record is there, particularly if it's Canadian, and thirdly, if the guy got five records and sold them by the end of the week, chances are, when the station checks he will say that was one of his best selling records. He'd start to report it as well and so the radio station would see that there was some reaction to what he was doing on the air. We're always looking for new methods of impact promotion.

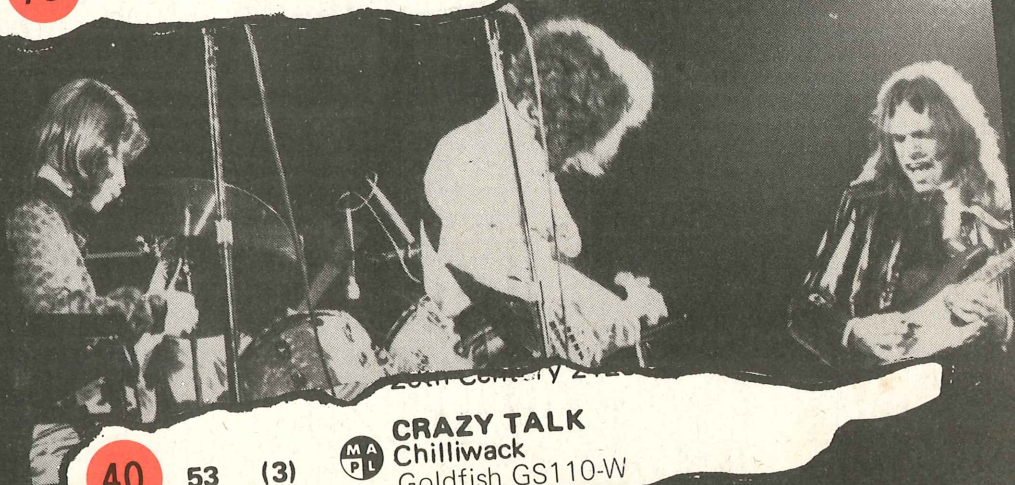
