

A&M red carpets Vannelli

The setting was Toronto's Colonial Tavern (Aug 26) and the stage was set for A&M's showcasing of one of their hottest items, Gino Vannelli. Gerry Lacoursiere, managing director of A&M's Canadian operation, his director of national sales, Joe Summers and their national and regional promotion departments had pulled all stops in their effort to introduce Montreal's Vannelli to the plum of the market - Toronto. This was the first time a record company had arranged a champagne party for an act's Toronto opener and a particularly unique happening for a Canadian act. It was A&M's party and with an audience draw of almost three hundred retail, racker, press and radio people as well as representatives from other record companies, it was obvious that A&M had taken over the complete club for their "bubbly" evening. Vannelli's single, "People Gotta Move" is currently making good gains on the RPM Top Singles chart (*32) and is showing indications of breaking in the U.S., with picks by Gavin and Cash Box as starters. Martin Melhuish, freelance music writer (Billboard, Performance, That's Showbusiness and others) had come across the Vannelli sound in its early stages and RPM asked him to do a piece on his findings which follows:

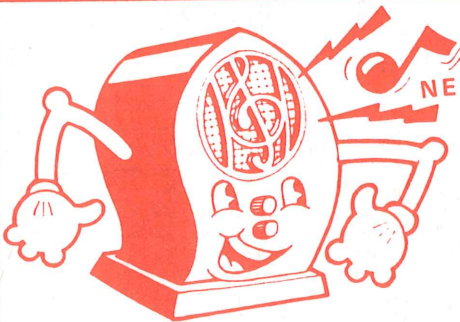

DISTRIBUTION CHANGES FOR MUSHROOM LABEL

The Vancouver-based Mushroom Records has shifted its eastern Canadian distribution from GRT to Merit. The deal calls for Merit to distribute Mushroom product in Ontario, Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces. Shelly Siegel, national sales and promotion manager for Mushroom has also formed a deal with Merit Distributors of Detroit to cover Michigan, Ohio and Pennsylvania. Talks are underway for other U.S. distribution setups.

Mushroom is now distributed by Emerson Sales/British Columbia, Taylor, Pearson & Carson/Alberta and Laurel Records/Manitoba.

Siegel is just wrapping up a cross country promo tour that has resulted in eastern Canadian recognition of Jayson Hoover and his single, "Love Will Get You", produced at Vancouver's Can-Base Studios. The single has received exceptional support in the west and is now showing signs of breaking in Detroit (CKLW) and Montreal (CKGM).

Just released on Mushroom is Songbird's follow-up to their "I Believe" single, "Dirty Work", produced at Can-Base by Mike Flicker. Alexis is back on the single scene once again with "Everybody Knows" an original published through B.C. Music-BMI.

Production chores for this Can-Base session were handled by Steve Douglas with Billy Strange looking after arranging.

Paul Horn's two record set, taped "live" at Vancouver's Gassy Jacks, will be ready for release on Mushroom to coincide with his eastern Canadian tour. He is set for Moncton, New Brunswick (10) followed by Mt. Allison U/Sackville, N.S. (11), Acadia U/Wolfville, N.S. (12), Dalhousie U/Halifax, N.S. (13-14), Truro (15), St. Francis Xavier U/Antigonish (16), Xavier Jr. College/Sydney (17), Memorial U/St. John's (19),

Cinema Outremont/Montreal (21), Grand Theatre/Quebec City (23) and Ottawa (25-28).

A total of five albums are being scheduled for release by Mushroom before Christmas.

JONES' "LOVIN' " SINGLE RELEASED IN S. AFRICA

Barry Haugen, A&R manager (country) for RCA, reports the South Africa release of Lynn Jones' recent Arpeggio single, "I Love Your Kind Of Lovin' ". The Tony Hatch original will be released on the RCA label.

Haugen also reports that Jones is back into RCA's studios with arranger/producer John Arpin, to cut several sides which should see a single release within the next few weeks. A new album is expected by late fall.

PROPHET PROMOTING DATES AND SINGLE

Orval Prophet has been scoring well with his self promotion of his Columbia single, "Eastbound Highway", now an established country hit. He has just completed recording the Les Barker penning of "Johnny Canuck" to be used as the theme of a Canadian film production, "180 Rooms", filmed at the Grand Central Hotel in St. Thomas, Ontario. The recording session was produced by Gary Buck at Toronto's Manta Sound Studios.

Prophet has also been maintaining a fairly hectic schedule of club dates and one nighters. He will be appearing with Jeannie Shepard and Tommy Cash at the London Memorial Gardens (18), the Kitchener/Waterloo Arena (19) and the Civic Arena in Ottawa (20). He flies to Frankfurt, Germany for a promotion/holiday trip (22). Prophet's latest Columbia album was released in Germany a few months ago where it has apparently experienced some success.

Prophet is also taking on duties as studio musician and sideman with groups. It was Argue who, while a member of Chester, wrote the group's big hit of 1973, "Make My Life A Little Bit Brighter", which was produced by Bob Morten and released on the Celebration (Quality) label.

The publishing deal between Argue and Quality's CAPAC publishing arm, Shediak Music, was finalized by Bill Kearns, manager of both Shediak and Qualrec-BMI publishing companies.

Argue and his manager Wayne Thompson of Celebration Music (no tie-in with Celebration Records) are currently putting together a backup group for a fall tour, dates of which will be announced when firmed.

QUALITY PREPARES ARGUE PROMOTION

Quality Records recently announced the signing of Michael Argue to an exclusive recording and publishing contract. Almost immediately after the signing, Quality's national promotion team of Joe Owens and Gary Slight, mapped out a national promotion campaign to tie-in with Argue's initial single release.

The recording deal was firmed by Argue and Quality's vice-president and general manager, George Struth, and the label's A&R director, Bob Morten. The latter will be Argue's producer.

Argue has, until now, relegated himself to a behind-the-scenes position, writing mater-

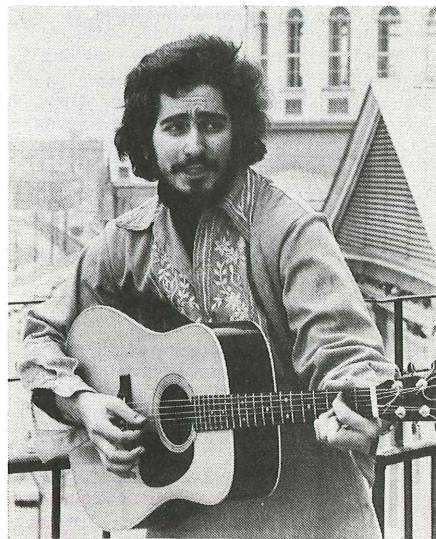

PUMPKIN READY WITH BROWN & GUY SINGLES

Pumpkin Records, a new record label out of Montreal and distributed by London, is ready to go with two singles, "Laugh And Cry" by Shelley Brown and "Mary-Go-Round" by Guy.

Brown is a twenty-one year old Montreal student of philosophy who has travelled

extensively in Canada and Europe, using much of his practical and school knowledge in his compositions. His initial single is described as "a transitional song, a story of going home". A student of the violin at the age of eleven, Brown went on to study at the Quebec Conservatory of Music and at sixteen switched to guitar. It was during this transitional period when he became aware of his writing talents which he found blended nicely with his classical background.

Guy is also a young Montreal singer/composer and well-known within the Quebec rock circle. He has been associated with and headed up several rock bands and finally decided to solo.

Pumpkin Records is Mark Goldnman, a twenty-eight year old Montreal music producer, musician and writer, who has taken his years of experience in one of the toughest markets in North America and put them to use in the formation of his own company.

record or that and more often than not you have to conclude that the man's ears must have slipped around to the back end of his anatomy.

And then I think of my chance encounter with the music of Gino Vannelli. I first heard Vannelli's debut single for A&M "Crazy Life" on an old stereo set at the quaint offices of CHRC in Quebec City — the station at which you have to walk through the washrooms to get to the P.D.'s office — last winter. I had been in Quebec to see Shawn Phillips' concert at the Capitole Theatre there and had spent the better part of the day visiting some of the radio stations in that city with Charley Prevost, who was at that time the Quebec promotion man for A&M before leaving to take up an on-air spot on CHOM-FM in Montreal and then return to A&M, this time at their Toronto offices, as national press officer.

I remember that Prevost and the P.D. only spoke French to each other and because of my lack of expertise at the language, I contented myself with sitting off to one side smiling and nodding at regular intervals to indicate that I was still very much involved in the conversation as each record on Prevost's schedule was played and commented on.

And then they played Vannelli's "Crazy Life". "Au bout" I uttered, drawing on some French slang that I had been practicing for the few days previous. It was the most novel sound that I had ever heard and Canadian to boot. You see Vannelli and his cohorts Graham Lear, Richard Baker, Anthony Gillia, John Mandell and his brother Joe Vannelli had been kicking around Montreal for quite a few years beforehand and I am told that he even had a contract with RCA in Canada previously under the name Vann Elli. Needless to say, it was a less than auspicious association.

After leaving RCA, Gino and Joe began looking for other opportunities and soon realized that nobody was paying much attention in this country. They did a demo tape in their own basement and then geared their thinking towards the U.S.

Their break came when a friend of the family offered to go to the U.S. with them — specifically Los Angeles — to make a deal for them and off they went, Gino and Joe and their newly found and more than optimistic mentor.

There had been previous contact with Trini Lopez who was very interested in Gino's music but they wanted to try a few other alternatives to just see what they could come up with. Feeling that they might find sympathetic ears with a person of their own nationality, they took the tapes to Frank Sinatra's office. The problem is they had to get passed the secretary first and she was not at all helpful with their cause in fact she only assisted them in pointing out the door that they had entered the office by.

Undaunted, their next stop was the A&M headquarters in Los Angeles where they left the tapes with Lou Mancuso — another Irishman — the A&R director of A&M. Mancuso found time to listen to the material and within a few songs he knew he was interested. He took the tapes into Herb Alpert and so taken was he with what he heard that he called the Vannelli's, who had since returned to Montreal, and told them to fly back down to talk to him as soon as possible. Alpert actually produced the first Vannelli album "Crazy Life."

As it turned out, "Crazy Life" didn't make any great impact on the market but there was new material and this time instead of Gino and Joe virtually playing all the instruments on the session, they had returned to Montreal and picked up four other musicians: Richard Baker on organ and keyboard who had just played local Montreal clubs in the past; Graham Lear who had played with the semi-successful Canadian band Natural Gas; Anthony Gillia on congas and John Mandell on percussion also from Montreal.

With these new musicians the band went into the studio again and put together another album "Powerful People" that did justice to its title. It was powerful alright and driving and in spots, even intense. Though Gino has said many times that he would rather not button hole his style — he writes all the material by the way — let me just say that to this writer's ears anyway, he has managed a perfect blend of bossa nova, rock, jazz and r&b that emerges sounding as fresh as anything to come along in the last ten years. No doubt about it, Vannelli is the father of "bonorojarb."

As it became more and more obvious that they had a unique talent on their hands, Richard Burkhart, who is Herb Alpert's as well as Vannelli's manager began lining up club and concert dates. He made his official American debut playing second on the bill to Liza Minelli for two nights and then was booked for a couple of weeks into Lake Tahoe and Las Vegas.

It was while he was in Las Vegas that I first spoke to Vannelli and was surprised by his very quiet and polite manner which seemed to contradict his recorded performance. It was just about the time also that CKGM in Montreal had started to play the cut "People Gotta Move" from the album and was not long after that on the basis of the excitement that the album cut was generating that A&M decided to release it as a single in Canada.

Soon other stations across Canada started to go on it and chart positions became as plentiful as playlists. As the action continued to grow, Burkhart decided that it was time to look into some bookings in the Canadian market. The Colonial in Toronto was the first club to confirm a week's engagement for him and then the Kego Club in Vancouver. At his Vancouver opening A&M invited all of the local press and radio people in the area and Rick Davis, the manager of the Kego Club reports that everyone was thoroughly impressed by what they saw and heard.

The past week Vannelli was at the Colonial in Toronto and A&M pulled all the stops to make sure his debut in that city was a success. According to A&M's national press officer Charley Prevost, it was a champagne party and all of the club's 250 seats were bought up by the record company for the opening night. Some prominent journalists were flown in from the U.S. and other parts of Canada for the affair including Arthur Levy one of the editors of the Ft. Lauderdale, Florida-based music paper Zoo World which has in the past been a great booster of Canadian talent in the U.S.

In October, Vannelli will play the In Concert club and a venue yet to be announced in Ottawa. A North American tour is also being discussed, the magnitude of which will likely depend on the reaction that Vannelli gets in Canada in the next month.

At the moment Gino Vannelli stands a good chance of being the next Canadian artist to make a significant impact on the international charts. He is very high on my list of prospects

anyway. There are very few others on the roster that are making gains as Vannelli at the moment and that certainly has to make him an even money favourite. At any rate make that \$10. to show Mr. Bookmaker. Martin Melhuish/Billboard

Some interesting facts about the record business

The record business has been getting a big boost lately because of the growth of the industry. Many of the phenomenons of the industry have made good reading as the

public learns about the enormous strides being made within the industry.

Record sales in North America will hit a figure well over two billion dollars this year, according to some sources, and this has been compared to movies, estimated to gross only two-thirds of this, and professional sports with approximately one-third of the two billion. It has made interesting

reading to the public and is an excellent promotional hype for the industry.

According to the proportions of population of the United States and Canada, this country should experience two hundred million dollars in record sales this year. Recent figures have indicated an industry of one hundred and thirty million or, six and a half percent of the North American market.

The gigantic growth of records hasn't been properly researched nor explained, but the public becomes more and more interested in records and tapes each year, and with more leisure time available to North Americans, the record industry continues to grow.

Record "superstars" will earn as much as two million to ten million dollars this year and a million dollar LP (dollar gross) is now making way for a million seller (units sold).

CAPITOL MUSCLE GIVEN TO STAMPEDE'S U.S. RELEASE

Capitol U.S. have launched one of the most aggressive, if not unique, promotions ever afforded a Canadian group. The Stampede's, who recently signed with Capitol (they release on their own Music World Creations label in Canada distributed by Quality), are now off with their second album release for the label and indications are that this one, "New Day" will definitely make it for them.

Their first release, "From The Fire" brought them into focus as having much FM appeal and removed, once and for all, the Canadian-critic-myth, that the Stampede's were "strictly for teenyboppers". Peter Goddard, freelance critic (Toronto Star etc.) checked out their recent Forum (Ontario Place) concert and discovered the "band's new maturity", adding "The old tunes were played in concert but were not emphasized. Instead the band, with guitarist Rich Dodson showing an increased importance, constructed solid music - totally their own".

The U.S. market is now apparently ripe for the Stampede's and their "new sound". The group and their manager, Mel Shaw, flew into Los Angeles for a meeting with Capitol Inc. execs and then up to San Francisco (Aug. 25) for a concert promoted by Bill Graham. Dates in Portland (27) and Seattle (28) followed, with the group returning to the east and the American Song Festival which, at last reports was being held in Saratoga Springs, N.Y. (Aug. 30-Sept. 2). Television specials were also on tap including "Midnite Special" (Sept. 10) and the syndicated "Rock Concert" (11).

Concert dates, arranged by Premier, have been on the increase. The Stampede's have been sharing the bill with many of the top names in the business including the James Gang, Black Oak Arkansas, Santana, Brownsville Station, and others. Their dates have taken them throughout the southern states, midwest and both coasts.

Their "New Day" album, released on the Music World Creations label in Canada, has been given top priority by Quality's promotion network. "New Day" breakfast kits, which includes a complete breakfast (orange juice, Kellogg's "K", melba toast, marmalade) have been shipped to programmers, along with a copy of the album, to be followed by a heavy concentration of hype in the major markets. Quality's national promo people, Gary Slaughter and Joe Owens, will be matching, if not bettering, the south of the border campaign for "New Day".

Carole King's "Tapestry" LP has reportedly grossed \$75 million dollars.

During the sixties the Beatles made \$100 million dollars on record sales alone.

Add to this the monies earned by artists from tours and appearances and the stars of rock are the biggest grossers in the history of entertainment. Many rock stars live today in the mansions that were the homes of Hollywood's big stars during the heyday of the movie industry.

According to the consumer press, rock stars are becoming the big stars of the seventies and living in much the same style as the stars of motion pictures, with limousines and posh airliners to take them on tour. They are also surrounding themselves with the same breed of hangers-on that the Hollywood stars became known for, during the big years and big money of the movie boom.

The actual recording artists are getting the biggest boost in the consumer press, but many record producers, concert entrepreneurs, songwriters and record label owners are doing equally as well and living in the same style.

As a weekly to the trade, we indulge very little in this kind of "puff".

In the consumer press, this kind of publicity can't harm the business, and the more you give them to write about, the bigger the interest in the record business. Record sales are assisted by this kind of press.

As the movie business killed off their star system for economic reasons, the record business acquired it. With all its advantages, the superstar status of the industry could have its drawbacks.

In Canada, although we haven't had artists who have become great superstars, we have produced a number of big stars internationally.

With the growth of the industry, Canada could come up with superstars for the international market. The industry is growing and the timing seems to be right for a Canadian phenomenon. It could happen, but it would have to happen in Canada first.

It's something to work for and better than just sitting back and concentrating on just what is happening. We could and should make something happen.

KAYE'S TIGER PEOPLE RELEASED ON POLYDOR

New to the Ben Kaye fold, the Montreal-based Tiger People will be given the red carpet promo treatment by Polydor for their just released single, "Gimmewachoo-woan" (Gimme What You Want). The plug slide was written and arranged by Art Phillips and produced in Montreal by Ben Kaye.

The Tiger People release is part of the production agreement between Polydor and Ben Kaye Associates. Their first effort, "Shang-A-Lang" by Tinker's Moon, a group of Montreal studio musicians, has already captured several markets across Canada and has picked up U.S. action where the single was released on the Polydor label.

The Tiger People single has been scheduled for release in the U.S. by the end of August. By that time, Mark Hodes, national singles promotion manager for Polydor, hopes to have his national Canadian picture set for the group.

CAPITOL'S A&R TEAM EFFORT CREATES EASY ATMOSPHERE

Capitol/EMI Canada have stepped activity in their A&R department where they have been winning a silent battle to bring their artist roster into its proper perspective. The signing recording and developing of new Canadian artists is at an all time high reports Paul White, the label's director of artists and repertoire and executive producer.

Says White: "We have developed a completely new look as far as our artist's roster goes, and as a company, we are restructuring our thinking, too". Capitol/EMI are apparently

far ahead of what they were doing last year. "Capitol Canada is now more totally involved at all levels of an artist's career development", claims White, adding: "We are there to assist in developing of a stage act, help gain TV exposure, attract prospective managers, and booking agents... anything that helps further the overall expansion of someone creative who has faith in Capitol when they sign their contract with us."

White reports that the actual studio time used by the label in July and August of this year was as much as they used in the first six months of last year, and there isn't any indication of a slowdown, which could make 1974 Capitol's biggest year in the studios. White's of the opinion that by early Winter, Capitol Canada could have the strongest line-up of potential international talent than any company — Canadian or otherwise.

White explains that "My main objective was to let the acts who signed with us go into the studio and express themselves on tape with the maximum of freedom, creative support, and the minimum of hassles. Each act gets to work with a producer, and if both sides find there is that spark happening, then we let them go into the studio and create. We do demos with our acts and various producers long before we do actual recording". Producers have become very important to Capitol. Says White: "Actually, producers are as important to my function as anyone. We have come up with policies at Capitol that allow the independent producers who work on projects for us, more creative freedom and better financial percentages so that they, too, can grow and be rewarded, as the company and our artists do".

There has been a great deal of comradery emerge between artists and Capitol's A&R department. What has been missing most on the Canadian group scene would appear to have been found in the Capitol camp — team spirit. White has found "For example, we

now find our artists are starting to drop into each other's sessions, then maybe staying to add something to a track. Session guys are also coming back, long after their job is completed, just to see how a particular project they had something to do with is getting along."

New artists signed to Capitol/EMI Canada include: West Egg, a pop vocal group; Peter Donato, a potentially powerful songwriter/performer; Maneige, a five piece instrumental rock/jazz group from Montreal who were showcased at the Capitol/CHUM Youth Day at the CNE (Aug. 26); and Justin Paige, a bar singer who will shortly bow the scene with an album release.

Christopher Kearney, although with Capitol for several years, is considered a new artist. He is now signed directly with Capitol, has a new backup group and is ready to roll "in a new direction."

The Capitol crew have also been busy with French language product. Top of their list is Suzanne Stevens, who recently struck a happy chord with both French and English programmers with "La Soleil". Reaction was enough for Capitol to go with an English language release "Mother Of Us All" which established the young bilingual star with pop programmers across the country. A French language album is to be released shortly, to be given a boost with her new club and concert act.

Other Capitol hopefuls ready for the market are Karo, Beau Dommage, New Potatoes, Alain Dorval and Lise Thounin.

Edward Bear are off and looking good with their "Freedom For The Stallion" single.

Anne Murray's new album, "Anne Murray Country" has been released to coincide with her major U.S. tour with her single, "Just One Look" (for pop programmers) and "Son Of A Rotten Gambler" (her country side) ready to roll as well.

Waiting in the wings is Gene MacLellan, off the scene for sometime, but now readying an album for release.

As a footnote, White points out that: "most of the new acts are still in the process of recording", adding that "it may have looked as if the label has been sitting back, but as people can see by the new names and the amount of recording, we have actually been working even harder in this past year to find talent. The enthusiasm with A&R, Marketing, and Sales is running higher than when we first cracked open the International scene a few years ago. You could say that our job at Capitol is to discover and nurture Canadian talent, and open the doors to the International market for them. We are still on the lookout for new signings to our label. We're going into a new era at Capitol Canada".

U.S. RELEASE FOR STONE ON PRIVATE STOCK LABEL

J.C. Stone's "Carrie's Gone" is being scheduled for release in the U.S. on the New York-based Private Stock label. The deal was firm by Leo's president Robert Johnston and Irv Beigle of Private Stock.

The Vancouver-based Leo label, part of a complex comprising UBIC Records, has been active on the west coast. Their sessions are produced at Little Mountain Sound.

Initial releases included the Stone single, now entering the RPM Top Singles chart, and "Candy Baby" by Strongheart. The latter was released on the UBIC label and, like the Stone single, has received heavy play throughout the west.

WINNIPEG FOLK FESTIVAL TO BE AN ANNUAL EFFORT

"It was a success", to use the words of Mitch Podolak. The "it" being the Winnipeg Centennial Folk Festival, held August 9-11 at Birds Hill Provincial Park, just north of the city. Mitch and Colin Gorrie were co-directors, and prime movers, behind the festival.

All the performers liked the festival, the crowds were appreciated and appreciative, and hassles were kept to a bare minimum. Overall festival attendance, though, estimated at 30,000 was far short of the predicted, and hoped for, 100,000 (RPM, August 3, 1974).

Highlights of the evening concerts, as gauged by audience response, included Bruce Cockburn, John Allan Cameron, Booker White, and virtuoso fiddler Jean Carignan (Fri. Aug. 9), Murray McLauchlan and Fraser and Debolt (Sat. Aug. 10), and Leon Redbone (Sun. Aug. 11).

Michael Cooney delighted and charmed the children at a Sunday morning "Children's Workshop". That workshop along with "Women's Songwriters" hosted by Sylvia Tyson and showcasing the talents of Mimi Farina and Shirley Eikhard among others were just two of the most popular.

Several relatively unknown performers also received what was probably their first major exposure to large audiences. Included in this group were Raffi, a singer/songwriter from Toronto, Winnipeg's Carol Brant, and Cathy Fink and Duck Donald, also from the Winnipeg area.

Friday evening's crowd, estimated at 5,000, was the festival's smallest. Sunday's, estimated at 12,000, was the most appreciated by the performers "because the liquor stores were closed", according to one of Sunday's acts.

This year's festival was free due to Winnipeg's centennial and the sponsorship of the city of Winnipeg, the province of Manitoba, CBC Radio, the Canada Council, and Coca Cola Canada Ltd.

The CBC's Peter Gzowski, co-host of the festival along with Winnipeg native Oscar

Brand, urged Saturday's audience to contribute to next year's proposed continuation of the only major international folk festival in western Canada.

About \$2,000 was collected from the Saturday and Sunday crowds. This is at least a start to funding a continuing festival — a desire of both organizers and performers. Doug Powers

CANADIAN ARTISTS ACTIVE WITH LONDON RECORDS

London Records' Vancouver branch reports increased activity on their product by Canadian artists. The new Chilliwack album, "Ridin' High", is being reported as selling strongly in the Vancouver area, particularly at the influential A&B Sound.

Stock of the new April Wine album, "April Wine Live" is now hitting the branch. Sales are expected to be brisk as a result of interest in the group's current single, "I'm on Fire For You Baby", last week No. 14 at rocker CKLG.

CANADIAN BRASS RECORD IN PARIS

While in France representing Canada at the Festival Estival, the Canadian Brass recorded their second album. The session was arranged by Eleanor Sniderman who produced the quintet's first album. Dave Green of Toronto's Manta Sound was flown to Paris to act as sound engineer on the session which took place at the Europasonor Studios.

Besides being the first Canadian classical group to record abroad, the session also marked the first time a Canadian technician has been called in to assist in the production of an album recorded in Europe. Green was also involved in the production of the group's first album.

The first Canadian Brass album, produced by Mrs. Sniderman and Dave Green, has been the most successful classical album ever produced in Canada. Their new album, as yet untitled, will be released this coming fall.

CKLG promotion involving contest giveaways and interviews by the giant west coast rocker. His current single, "Moonlight Special" is an established hit in this important market.

A chance to dine with the DeFranco Family after a contest giveaway of one hundred albums went to a lucky CKNW listener. Their latest single, "Write Me A Letter" would appear to be breaking first on the west coast.

McLAUCHLAN WAS HIGH ON "SHOESHINE" DECK

"History will vindicate me", was Murray McLauchlan's comment on the not altogether overwhelming response to "Shoeshine Working Song", his latest single release.

The pop stations, in particular, have not been particularly quick in picking up on the song, either because of its length (5:15) or the conspicuous use of pedal steel guitar.

Murray said he intended to put out a country single — hence the pedal steel, played by Ollie Strong.

"So far, the song has had a fairly big impact on country and western stations", he added. "The response is probably due to the fact that country listeners, in general, are more lyric oriented than the pop audience."

Murray's manager, Bernie Finkelstein, said that Murray writes good country songs "so why not put out a country single . . . but the song was not written to be a hit, radio makes the hits."

Murray also admitted that the country feel of "Shoeshine Working Song" was probably influenced by the fact that "The Farmer's Song", his first major hit, first broke in the country markets.

"I have sort of a half-assed loyalty to some country stations and country jocks", he went on. "Also, I like country and western music; I grew up on it, partly. Basically, our roots are the same — Scottish and Irish ballads."

The song has recently crossed over to the pop markets and only time (or history) will tell of its success. Doug Powers

STRINGBUSTERS TO TOUR ACROSS CANADA

The Stringbusters, a group of young Maritimers who got together at the School for the Blind in Halifax, are back on the scene after a short hiatus. Their manager, Don Turner of Showmart Productions (Toronto) brought the young group into the Ontario market last year on the heels of their Marathon album. They released four albums on the label. A tour of the clubs proved fairly successful but the group split up on their return home.

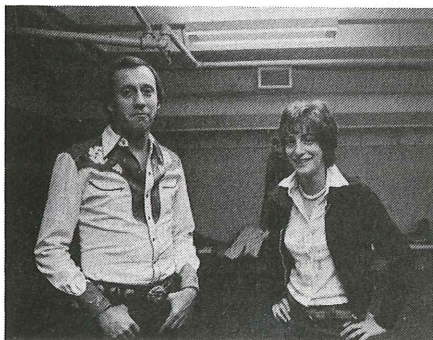

Jerry Warren, A Canadian country artist for many years and now releasing on the United Artists label, has just returned from a trip across Canada. Purpose of his trip was to promote his single, "This Lovin' Feelin'" and it would appear from the number of stations now playlisting the single, Warren has established himself among the ranks of winners. The success of his single prompted a rush release of his album followed by an 8-track tape release.

Warren's mini-tour of the west brought him face to face with many country radio personalities, cementing a good relationship. He dropped in at Jerry Brown's Town Pump in Regina to catch Gary Buck and found himself on stage for a set resulting in a week's engagement now set for the latter part of September. Warren has also set up talks with Jerry and Jay-Way Productions of Alberta for a grandstand and rodeo tour of western Canada for 1975.

Niagara Falls resident Jerry Warren keeps himself busy with studio work for other artists as well as writing material which is published through his publishing house, Side-Man Music-BMI. Nine of the compositions on his album, "From The Falls To The Coast" are Warren originals.

That brings us up to date on a series that will now run open-end. RPM has commissioned me to continue with the series until such time as the subject is exhausted.

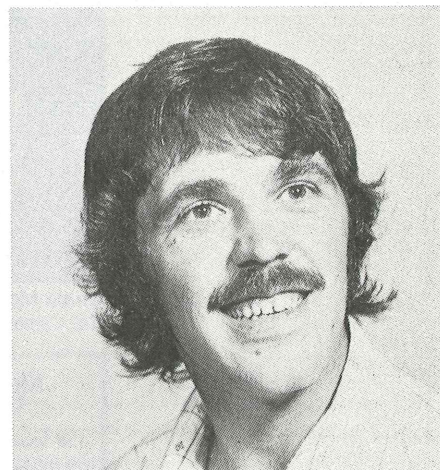

That makes the record business the largest entertainment industry in North America. That's something that can be an inspiration to everyone in the record business.

Thunder Bay resident, Gene Peter-James (real name Gene Silvaggio) has entered the record business with his initial release, "The Pine Trees" on the Gaiety label. The plug side and the flip, "I Believe Marie" were written by him and published through Silvaggio Music-CAPAC. Promotion for the single is being concentrated on the pop (MOR) and country markets, through Don Grashey and Chuck Williams of Gaiety Records.

The session was taped at Winnipeg's Century 21 Studios with instrument backing by Jack Brigadere, piano; Davie Yasasawa, drums; and Richard Rigby, bass with Peter-James on lead and rhythm guitar. Jack Hildebrand of Century 21 gave an assist with the production as well as co-writing the string parts with Peter-James and the background harmony for three of the compositions. Two young 'Peg female singers were used for the vocal background with local musicians adding to the sound. Ronnie Halderson, well-known Winnipeg steel player can be heard on the "Pine Trees" side.

Peter-James' "Pine Trees" is a fast introduction to what he has to offer. He wrote the song in twenty minutes and is ready with more original material to keep the Peter-James image rolling.



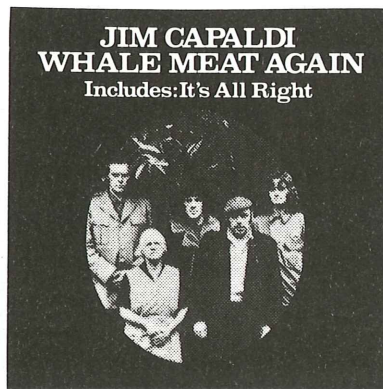

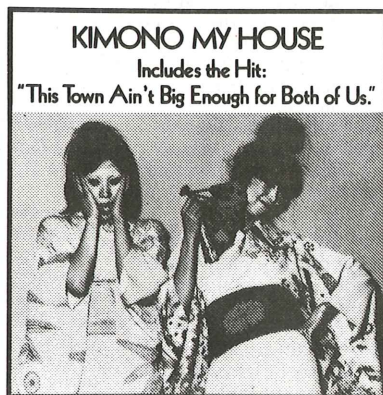

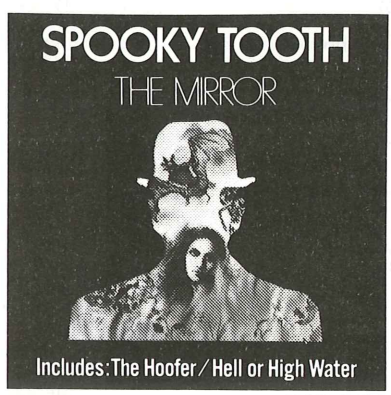

BABE RUTH SCORES HEAVILY IN QUEBEC

Not only do French Canadian productions embarrass English Canadians but so does the Quebec province's knack for discovering other than French stars. Case in point, Babe Ruth. This British group, who release on the Harvest label (Capitol) have chalked up sales on their "First Base" album of more than 35,000 — in the province of Quebec alone. On top of this they have made two tours of Quebec, both of which pulled good houses, particularly their Aug. 14 date at Place des Nations at Montreal's Man & His World. Their show at Ottawa's Civic Centre (12) where they shared the billing with Manfred Mann was "sold out" and that's the deepest into English Canada the group has been able to register action.

Babe Ruth is led by "gutsy vocalist" Janita Haan whose choreography has been described as a "cross between modern ballet and some obscure martial arts". The Haan excitement is increased with the assistance of Alan Shacklock who matches the Haan "intensity with screaming vocals and fiery guitarwork".

GORDON SINCLAIR ON "EX CANADIANS"

The following letter, written by well-known Canadian broadcaster, Gordon Sinclair, appeared in the Toronto Star (21/8/74). He expresses his feelings about Canadians living abroad and still being regarded as Canadian by those in the arts. This has been a sore point to many in the Canadian recording and broadcasting industries. Permission was obtained from Mr. Sinclair for the reprint. I saw a reference to "Toronto-born Percy Faith," who conducted a concert here last week, and to "Canadian-born" John Kenneth Galbraith who continues to tell us about inflation. I also see that Toronto-born Mary Pickford has only once been out of bed in the last seven years.

Ottawa-born Lorne Green is going into a new play and Vancouver-born Arthur Hill has not been renewed in his role of Owen Marshall, the lawyer who saves everybody without sending a bill.

This constant reference to people born here, people who turned their backs on us a generation or longer ago, is demeaning to many Canadians who were born here, live here and have no intention of moving.

They are not one of us. They quit us. They turned their backs.

I see no mention of Canadian-born hooligans or riff-raff or tarts; but when somebody gets a measure of recognition, even Art Linkletter, who left Canada at the age of 77 days, he is "Canadian-born".

Come off it. Canadians are Canadians.

Exiles are not.

CLOMPIN' CLOD ATTRACTS LARGE CROWD AT CNE

Although the CNE was criticized for "presenting a second rate imitator", Clompin' Clod drew a fair crowd (considering Toronto's transit strike) to his CNE Bandshell performances (Aug. 15-16). His management agency is not pretentious about their young artist — in fact they bill him as "the worst band, singing off key, timing horrible and his backup group as rejects from the Sally Anne line". Bumper stickers were provided for patrons of a bar where he was playing recently which read "We saw the Clompin' Clod show (and regretted it)". Signs in the lobby warned customers not to complain to the management.

In spite of all the downers, Clompin' Clod is emerging as a novelty act with much potential. He's no newcomer to the business, having released product on the Marathon label and gathered a sizeable following throughout Ontario. The fact that he played Canada's "Greatest Exposition" is another feather in his cap and an obvious boost to his image. His CNE appearance attracted radio and press comments and with the interest that the Toronto Star's Frank Rasky was showing, it's possible that Clompin' Clod could become the subject of a feature in the Star.

Circle "C" Productions, Clompin' Clod's Ajax, Ontario-based management firm, aren't saying but a new record could be in the works to take advantage of the growing publicity.

CAB suggests delay in commercial regulations

The powerful Canadian Association of Broadcasters (CAB), representing 257 AM, 57 FM and 54 television stations, filed a brief with the Canadian Radio-Television Commission (CRTC) supporting the Commission's proposed regulations calling for

Canadian produced commercials, but asks for a five month delay. The CRTC has set a target date of October 1, 1975 for implementing the regulation prohibiting a radio station or network operator from broadcasting "any recorded commercial message that has not been produced in Canada".

Dr. Pierre Camu, president of the CAB, found no real fault with the proposed regulations, but did have some reservations. He stated: "unquestionably, it is in the best interest of all Canadians that, so far as possible, commercial messages broadcast by Canadian radio and television stations be produced in Canada and make use of Canadian talent. We believe that the production in Canada to the maximum degree practicable, of all forms of broadcasting, including commercial, enhances the potential development of a distinctively Canadian broadcasting system. We further believe that all possible means should be explored to encourage and develop Canadian talent. The Canadian Association of Broadcasters is committed to these goals".

It was Camu's suggestion however, that "in the case of locally-created commercials, the

use of production aids from a variety of sources be permitted as long as there is a predominantly Canadian input through creative writing, talent and technical productions". The CAB suggests a delay until March 1, 1976 for both AM and FM broadcasting stations. Camu suggests: "A delay in the effective date and the exemption of locally-created commercials will allow for the expansion of Canadian companies, and the creation of new ones that specialize in the production of commercials", adding "In due course, these companies should be able to increase their production, their quality, and make their prices competitive with their U.S. counterparts. It will also permit the smaller stations in Canada to honour long-term commercial components which are inexpensively mass-produced in the U.S.A."

Insofar as television is concerned, the CAB does support the CRTC view that national television commercials should achieve a higher percentage of made in Canada commercials. The minimum proportions have

been suggested as 70% for the year ending September 30, 1976, 75% for the year ending September 30, 1977 and 80% for the year ending September 30, 1978 with a subsequent review of annual objectives to be determined during the year 1978. The CRTC has proposed that effective October 1, 1975 "no television station or network operator shall broadcast any commercial message unless a registration number has been assigned to the message by the Commission". The Commission will assign a registration number to a commercial message on being furnished the name and address of the advertiser to benefit from the commercial message along with the title or number used by the advertiser to identify the commercial message. The CAB has asked that the above proposal become effective March 1, 1976 and that locally-created commercials be excluded. Dr. Camu explains that "Commercial production is a very important part of the service to local customers. Retail advertisers are accustomed to, and often require, extremely fast, flexible service for both scheduling and commercial production. This local production service not only benefits the advertiser, but creates additional employment opportunities in stations, and permits the full utilization of production equipment", adding that "Many television stations in particular owe their expanded production capacity to the demand for local commercial production". Dr. Camu went on to explain: "Among the great attributes of broadcasting as an advertising medium are its immediacy and flexibility. It would be unfortunate to see these curtailed by a registration procedure for locally-produced commercials."

The CAB will be appearing at the CRTC public hearing which has been set at October 8, 1974 in Ottawa.

CBC'S "THIS COUNTRY" RETURNS - SEPTEMBER 3

CBC Radio's "This Country In The Morning" starts its new series September 3 at 9:13AM. The name and format remain unchanged, but its fourth season will feature a new team, which will undoubtedly give a new sound and shape to the program. Toronto journalist, Michael Enright, takes over as major host, filling the position left vacant by Peter Gzowski, who, along with former executive producer Alex Frame, continues with CBC as a program consultant. Enright's previous broadcast experience was as co-host of "Daybreak", the early morning information show out of CBM (the CBC English station in Montreal). His journalism career began at age 18, and included positions with the Toronto Globe & Mail, Time Canada, and, just prior to joining "This Country", the Toronto Star, where he was with the editorial board.

Carried over from the old regime are producer Bill Casselman, production assistant Marilyn Meenan, and technician Ron Grant, as well as contributors Arthur Vaile, Danny Finkleman and Marg Carney. Marilyn Powell is a newcomer. Story editors are Mardi Matthews, Maxine Bass, Trudie Richards, Judy Brake and John Slinger, and regular free-lancers are Alan Handel reporting on the Quebec front, and Sheila Kieran.

Executive producer, Anne Gibson, hopes to take the show to the Okanagan Valley some time in September, and later, perhaps, Chicoutimi, carrying on the TCITM tradition of originating from different and seldom visited parts of Canada in order to give a true perspective of the people and mood of the country as a whole. The program continues the usual pot-pourri of interviews, music, reviews, recipes, quizzes, contests, and other fun and games.

"FUNNY FARM" THIS FALL - CTV

CTV's new show, "The Funny Farm" to be telecast Thursdays, 7-7:30PM, premieres September 12. The cast of characters include Dwayne, a very effeminate cowhand; the Newsboy who runs on stage and reads the news; Clem, the village idiot, the Preacher; Daisy Mae; the Little Girl; a Jewish Farmer, Ruben; Dylan, a misplaced hippie; Shirley Will, the classic dumb blonde, and many others. Five of the regulars on the show will be Benjamin Gordon, John Evans, Monica Parker, Jank Zajfman, and Linda Rennhoffer, as well as the little animated character of Old MacDonald, who keeps vanishing in the midst of one-liners and tall tales. Musical chores will be handled by Blake Emmons and the band, Maple Street.

Scheduled guests for the season include Dick Shawn, Leroy Van Dyke, Ted Zeigler and Del Reeves. "The Funny Farm" is produced by Glen-Warren Productions in association with the CTV Television Network and its Toronto affiliate, CFTO-TV. Producer is Gerard Rochon, and director is Ed Richardson.

NOBLEMAN/YORK MOVE ON CBC BUDGET CUTS

North York Alderman, Ben Nobleman, recently elected as president of the Toronto branch of ACTRA, has enlisted the aid of York Borough in his fight to have the CBC reconsider its recent budget cuts.

Nobleman presented his resolution to the Council (Aug. 19) pointing up a 1974 submission by the CBC to the CRTC where they promised "to place priority on its contribution to the artistic community".

Nobleman's resolution, seconded by Mayor Philip White, requested that "the CBC and the Federal Government reinstate a recent cut of \$1,200,000 in the CBC programming budget which will seriously affect the work opportunities of Canadian performers". The resolution was passed by Council.

CJVI'S COUNTRY SPECIAL — A BIG SUCCESS

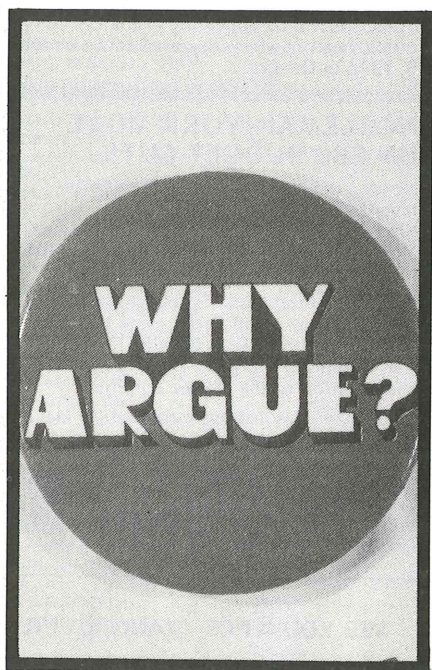

At 8:30PM Saturday evening, RPM will host a cocktail party to which all C9 registrants are invited.



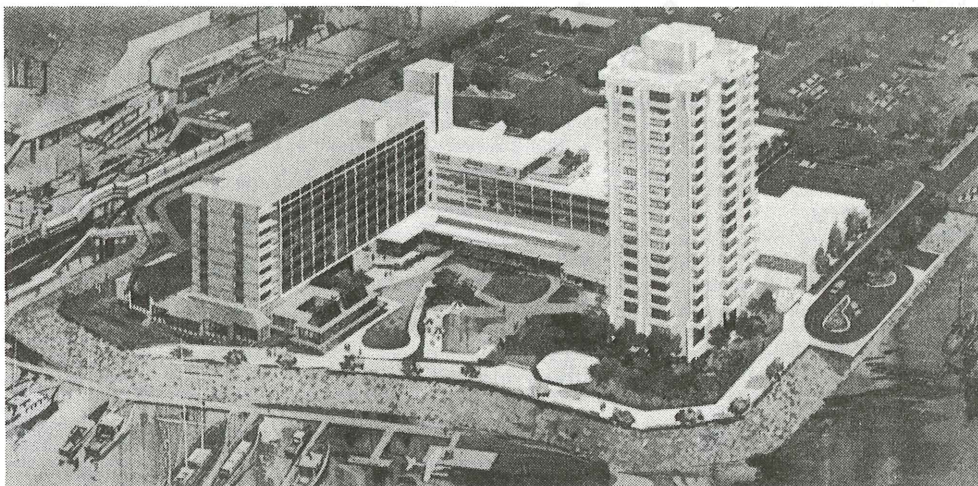

Public Announcement

OTTAWA, AUGUST 21, 1974.

BROADCAST ADVERTISING TO CHILDREN AND CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING

On October 16, 1973 the Commission announced its policy with respect to broadcast advertising to children and children's programming.

The Commission indicated, in its public announcement of that date, that all broadcasters would be required to provide the Commission with specific individual commitments that they would act in accordance with the provisions of the Broadcast Code for Advertising to Children, developed by the Canadian Association of Broadcasters.

The Commission intended that the Code should have virtually the strength of a CRTC regulation, "while maintaining the flexibility and responsiveness of an industry code."

Since that announcement the Commission has undertaken extensive monitoring of television stations in Canada for those periods of television broadcasting related to the viewing habits of children. Members of the Consumers' Association of Canada have also undertaken extensive monitoring across the country.

Concern expressed to the Commission has indicated that even though the self-regulatory procedures of the Code have proven effective, further assurances were required to ensure adherence to the Code by legally enforceable procedures.

The House of Commons Standing Committee on Broadcasting, Films and Assistance to the Arts, in its report on children's advertising, indicated that regardless of how excellent the procedures of self-regulation through the Broadcast Code might be, a stronger enforcement system would be desirable.

The Commission, in conformity with its previous undertaking to ensure the effectiveness of the Code and to meet the expressed concerns, hereby gives notice

1. to all holders of licences to carry on broadcasting transmitting undertakings in Canada and all applicants for such licences, that adherence to the provisions of the Broadcast Code on Children's Advertising will be made a specific condition of each licence; and,
2. that a representative of the CRTC will formally represent the Commission at all deliberations of the Children's Advertising Sections of the Advertising Standards Council/Conseil des Normes de la Publicité which have the responsibility for pre-clearing all children's commercials.

The Commission has noted that discussions between the Canadian Association of Broadcasters and the Consumers' Association of Canada and other parties have resulted in a further amendment to the Code which was announced July 22, 1974.

This new amendment will limit the amount of time in a television commercial that may be used to describe a premium offered with the purchase of the product to be advertised. At the same time it was announced that a simplified presentation of the provisions of the Code would be prepared for distribution.

The Commission is confident that these new developments and procedures will further assist the effective implementation of the Code.

At the same time the Commission continues to assist in the organization of activities to study improvements in the Canadian standards of children's programs. The Commission has been encouraged by the formation of the **Children's Broadcast Institute**. The objective of the Institute is to improve the quality of television programs for children's viewing. It has brought together broadcasters, advertisers, and public bodies in a concentrated effort to achieve its major objective. The Commission will support this important activity.
