

MURRAY McLAUCHLAN - "Bad kid from the inner city?"

MCA APPOINTS WILLIAMS NATIONAL SALES MGR.

Richard Bibby, vice president and general manager of MCA Records (Canada), has announced the appointment of Jack Williams as National Sales Manager of MCA Records (Canada).

Williams was MCA's district manager for western Canada operating out of Calgary prior to his posting in Toronto. Before joining MCA in 1972 as Ontario sales manager, he had been Alberta branch manager for MCA's distributor there for four years.

In commenting on the appointment, Bibby said "Jack has played a key role in the tremendous growth we have realized in the past three years, as well as being instrumental in the planning and development of all our branch operations. Our sales in western Canada since opening our own branches in March 1973, have increased by 134%."

Ted Firman will now assume duties of Alberta branch manager. Firman, who joined the Calgary operation at its inception, previously handled sales and promotion in the Calgary Market.

Herb Forgie will become Calgary sales and promotion representative. He had formerly been operations manager in Calgary, and prior to that, Edmonton sales representative.

Judy Thomas will assume duties of operations manager, having previously worked as Forgie's assistant.

APRIL WINE PLAYING TO PACKED HOUSES

The Montreal-based April Wine are storming across Canada on a major tour that is drawing "sold out" houses and critical acclaim from rock writers. Opening in Winnipeg to two "sold out" shows at the Playhouse Theatre the group moved to Lethbridge where they did 3000 people for a \$13,000 gross which netted them a return date for April 30. They sold out in Medicine Hat; drew 3800 for a packed house in Edmonton; sold out the Red Deer Memorial Centre; pulled 1700 to the North Battleford Civic Centre; a sell out at the Saskatoon arena with more than 5000; and played three sell out days in Regina.

The tour is continuing through British Columbia from April 25 to May 15 with a return to the Atlantic Provinces for an extensive tour commencing June 24 and running through July 12.

Supporting the April Wine dates have been Moonquake, newly signed to Aquarius and now beginning to pick up air play on their new single release, "Starstruck."

Tour promoter Donald K. Donald and group manager Terry Flood both credit the success of the tour to the cooperation they have received from radio stations across the country for "establishing the group's career and building a viable Canadian star system."

April Wine are currently seeing good success on the RPM 100 Album Chart with their Aquarius album, "Stand Back" and have made strong strides with their latest single, "Cum Hear the Band" which moves to No. 43 with a bullet this week on the RPM 100 Singles Chart.

FOREIGN ENTRIES FAVOURED BY SONG FESTIVAL RULING

The largest international songwriting competition, The American Song Festival, annually publishes a number of entry regulations. Rule No. 3 states that no song may be entered if it has been commercially recorded and released in the U. S. - a ruling

which increases the chances of songwriters who could come from any country in the world.

In accordance with Rule No. 3, songs that may have been recorded in Canada and reached the top of the charts, could be entered as long as those songs have not been recorded or released in the U. S. All entered songs will be screened and judged by professionals in the U. S. music industry who will evaluate these songs on the basis of their potential success in the U. S.

Songs may be entered in the competition if they have not been released prior to the final announcement of the winners of the competition. This feature would be applicable to U. S. songwriters as well as foreign.

All entries in the competition, which offers \$129,776 in cash awards, must be sent to the American Song Festival no later than June 3, 1975. ARISTA RELEASES INITIAL ALBUM FOR ERIC ANDERSEN

Eric Andersen, who was recently in Toronto with his band to fill an engagement at The Riverboat, has an initial album release on the Capitol-distributed Arista label.

The album is titled "Be True to You" (AL 4033). All selections were written by Andersen with one exception, and among those contributing to background vocals were Jackson Browne, Joni Mitchell and Maria Muldaur.

ROCKERS TO CAUSE GENETIC DISORDER?

A startling revelation has it that after an eighteen-month long study conducted by the British Academy of Sciences, conclusive findings have been handed down to Parliament stressing the need for British rock-stars to be prohibited from selling their semen to commercial sperm-banks. The Academy feels the restrictions are necessary, for a lack of control in this area might generate a "sperm bank pop-war."

The scientists are concerned that certain rock-idols like Mick Jagger and David Bowie might sell their sperm to the banks, which in turn would advertise and eventually market the product to thousands of Bowie offspring, but rather they are concerned as to the fate of the kids when they eventually grow up. The Academy warns that the offspring could wind up marrying one another without realizing that they were fathered by the same guy, and therefore such incest could lead towards serious genetic complications in the future.

The Academy's report has been turned over to the British House of Commons for further extensive investigation.

WAKEMAN TO PORTRAY MERLIN THE MAGICIAN

It has been confirmed that A&M's Rick Wakeman will be performing a stage production of "The Myths and Legends of King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table." On May 30th, 31st and June 1st, Wakeman, accompanied by 17 professional ice skaters, the 58-piece New World Symphony Orchestra, a 48-piece English Chamber Choir, an 8-piece Nottingham Festival Singers, and his regular band, the English Rock Ensemble, will appear as the magician Merlin at Wembley Pool in London. He'll perform atop a castle erected in the centre of the ice at Wembley, while skaters, including world champion adagio ice dancers as Guinevere and King Arthur, interpret the musical.

Conductor David Measham and narrator Terry Taplin (an actor with the Royal Shakespeare Company), will be assisting Wakeman in the production. Both Measham and Taplin accompanied Wakeman when he took his "Journey to the Centre of the Earth" production on a world tour. The cost of the "Arthur" extravaganza is estimated at nearly \$150,000.00.

SUBLIMINAL TEACHING IS DISCOURAGED BY TURKEY

The New York Post reports that a complaint registered in Turkey states that a map of North America presented on Turkish Television looks identical to a profile of Russia's Lenin.

The map therefore has been designated as Communist Propaganda. The state-owned Turkish Radio and Television network, said that an unidentified citizen made the complaint before a public prosecutor and an official inquiry has therefore been put into effect.

Any form of supposed Communist propaganda is regarded as an illegality in Turkey.

STEPS is a new band that "re-establishes the tradition of musical brilliance and innovation that characterized such great bands as Kensington Market, the Paupers, Leather and Breathless". Actually, Steps is the re-formed version of Breathless. On board from this group are keyboard player Sandy Lowe; Ed Kopala, the lead guitarist; and the drummer Peter Griffin. A new face is Paul Saunders who has been associated with Eli, Leather and Steel River as well as starring roles in *Jesus Christ Superstar* in Los Angeles and Las Vegas and *Hair* in Toronto. Also new is Jim White, bass player, who has just finished a lengthy gig with Justin Paige and prior to that was with Abraham's Children.

Direction for Steps is being looked after by Bart Schoales, who notes: "We've kept the kind of super-tight playing that Breathless was known for, but have expanded into a lot more commercial, highly danceable, very much rock and roll uptempo repertoire".

Steps move into Eastern Sound Studios in Toronto for a recording session and perhaps a summer single release.

TRACKS

Stompin' Tom is currently recording at **THUNDER SOUND**, on the heels of Sylvia Tyson, who has just finished her new solo album for Capitol. Murray McLauchlan was in to re-mix his new single, "Down By The Henry Moore" for True North, and Tommy Ambrose is busy doing the music for his syndicated gospel series "Celebration" to be aired on the CBC network. The Good Brothers are scheduled to begin work on their new album starting May 1st, with Adam Mitchell producing.

RCA STUDIOS has Robin Moire of Fiddlehead Music in Halifax laying down tracks with producer Harry Hinde, while Keith Hampshire is occupied in sessions for Hokee Productions. RCA's Ronnie Profit and Roy Payne recently booked time and Harry Hinde was scheduled to bring in Susan Jacks at the end of April. Commercial work at RCA includes ads for "Earth Born" shampoo and the Metro Zoo.

Dave Nichols checked in at **SOUNDS INTERCHANGE** to record his new single "Boy" which he co-produced with the help of Inter-Productions. Both Devotion and Bill King are busy doing demos for future albums - King is producing himself with assistance from Paul Hoffert. The audio portion of the Ian Thomas special for CHCH TV in Hamilton has just been completed at the studio.

At **PHASE ONE**, Pagliaro flew in from Montreal to remix seven tunes, and Ahed Music's Bill Amesbury is booked for time in April and May. The studio was the scene for audio work for the Tommy Hunter Show at the end of April, and Lou Reed has confirmed the entire month of June to record his new album with help from freelance engineer George Semkiw, who will also be co-producing.

POLYDOR'S "RUSH" ALBUM GAINING HEAVY SALES

Polydor's director of promotion and advertising, Allan Katz, says that the success currently being enjoyed by the "Tommy", Eric Clapton, and Rush albums are due to a combination of strong product, extensive airplay and radio advertising, and widespread in-store exposure.

Katz continues, "we are particularly excited by the success of the new Rush, 'Fly By Night'. It is currently our best selling album - amazing when you consider the company it is keeping - and clearly underlines just how fast this Canadian group's career is developing." He predicts that the group's development will be boosted with the release this week of their new single, "Fly By Night", which is being pulled from the album.

MOTOWN'S DISCO SERIES KICKS OFF ALBUM RELEASES

Motown Records has scheduled a special series of album releases geared for disco play. The albums will feature former single and album tracks containing the most "danceable" music from Motown. The first edition, titled "Disco-Tech No. 1", will be released in early May, supported by a major promotion campaign designed to give maximum coverage. Volumes 2 and 3 of the series are already in the works.

Also under the heading of upcoming album releases for Motown are The Jackson Five's "Moving Violation", an anthology volume for The Marvelettes, T. G. Shepherd's (Devil in the Bottle) new album for Melodyland, and an album by Banco on the Manticore label. Banco, currently Italy's number one group, boasts a 400 pound lead singer and heavy influences from classical backgrounds. Motown's Mike Reed says their sound is reminiscent of Emerson, Lake and Palmer.

Albums by Smokey Robinson "A Quiet Storm", and Keith Christmas "Brighter Day" (on Manticore) have just been released. Reed reports that "Brighter Day" is beginning to generate heavy action in Montreal on CHOM and CJFM.

And now the news . . .

Last weeks Comment may have caused all kinds of reactions in the trade. We can expect that at first reading, a number of music people felt that cutting the percentage of

Canadian content in half would be disastrous. Others may have felt that no legislation could be the answer. Still others could take the view that the current 30% Canadian content ruling was working and working well.

It is hoped that the article did stimulate some thought among programmers, producers, composers and artists and may have even raised a few eyebrows at the CRTC.

You can be assured of one thing. Nothing RPM will ever write here or anywhere else will change anything that has to do with the domestic content regulations on AM or FM

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if the industry is not in favour. A majority of those with a vested interest must come forth with objections or new innovations. The ruling may indeed stand as it does now. It could be advanced or it could be modified. The industry's acceptance or reluctance to any change will be the determining factor.

It is flattering to us to think that anyone in the industry would be naive enough to think that single handedly we have the power to change the thinking of the industry or the CRTC. If we do indeed possess that power, then I for one would place a full page ad in every issue encouraging the industry to endow RPM with advertising and subscriptions.

Industry response is the great determining factor.

In Canada particularly, we have problems that are unique to the international music industry. It is therefore important that we take a unique approach to the music business and build in a particular fashion.

We will no doubt be criticized for challenging the wisdom of the CRTC and we will probably be accused by "the critics" of motivating a "plan" to bring more advertising to RPM. Rest assured that we are interested in bringing more advertising revenue to RPM, but we are also aware that the additional advertising would be generated by a healthier industry and ultimately the two factors would be most desirable.

The Comment that suggested 15% of 100% domestic content on AM and FM was an alternative.

In our minds it changed little. It merely gave radio stations a choice of a lower percentage in return for double the criteria. I state again that it would only be an advantage to the music of today programmers who have a scarcity of new product. It would not have any advantage to the stations that program easy listening, ethnic or country or classical segments during the day. The advantage to them would be so slight that they would probably stay with the 30% two part ruling that is currently in effect.

Perhaps the industry doesn't want to be told what it should do. It should however be ASKED if there are alternatives.

The idea that the domestic content on AM and FM radio and its regulation will disappear or will improve because of no dialogue, is false. There is no doubt in anyone's mind that the CRTC is presently looking at some move to make.

What is important is that the industry will be involved in exactly what that move will be (or might be) and that the industry can afford to live with a situation that might cause or create other problems.

I personally believe that some of the critics (artists and producers in particular) of the 30% ruling will probably pull back drastically when they really consider what we have said here. While they claim they don't need the ruling as a crutch, the 15%-100% suggestion will cause a complete about face.

That, in itself, will be a lesson in what this industry and the people in it are all about.

To those who say that this isn't the time for any change, I can say that it isn't our choice to PICK the time. The time is either NOW or very very soon. We may divide into camps, but as Canadians we will not take a 'don't make a wave' or the 'head in sand' attitude.

Forget the idea of discussing a change? Your very wish is our command, but we are now on record as having said to the industry that there is an alternative.

This is a unique country with a unique music industry and every attempt should be made to make good moves and make them in such a manner to be of benefit to all.

On the other hand, the old ruling does fulfill the demands of the Broadcast Act and could stay the same for some time.

We might consider leaving it alone or seeing what the CRTC will come up with.

The responsibility of what the future holds in store for producer, programmer, songwriter, manager, booker, and/or record company is about to become an issue. We have made a concrete proposal to the industry. The industry can react to this proposal.

Blame it on RPM. It is our idea and we have put it in print. The programmers of the nation can approach the CRTC with an endorsement of RPM's idea with no risk of being the instigators: the producers can riddle the idea full of holes; the songwriters can find reasons why the idea doesn't suit their expectations; the artists can converge on Ottawa and picket the CRTC; but the idea stands as a model that can be approved, disapproved, revised or forgotten.

In 1970, many said that they hadn't been told what the CRTC had in mind. In 1975, you are being ASKED. You can never say that you didn't have the opportunity to assure that any change in the domestic content ruling was made without your knowledge or input.

It might be an advantage to the trade to look at last week's comment again and read this week's. Look at them as news items.

PORNO COULD BE A CASE OF FEELING

The town of Clarkstown in Rockland County New York are censored by an established 9-member "obscenity committee" that screens movies, nightclub acts and various forms of printed matter. The committee is led by Harry Snyder, a sixty-year-old retired restauranteur and businessman. Mr. Snyder who lost his sight four years ago and has since remained totally blind, explained how he helps set community standards in spite of his sightless condition.

"Pornography isn't a case of seeing, it's a case of feeling", Harry said.

He explained that other members of his government acknowledged "obscenity committee" sit next to him at movie screenings in order to fill him in when the screen goes silent.

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
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KOT'AI RELOCATES TO NEW OFFICES

RCMP LAY PIRATE BOOM ON PRETS CHAMPLAIN

A total of fifty-one charges have been laid by the RCMP against Prets Champlain Ltee., Michel Camirand and Nicole Morissette. The charges came about after an extensive investigation by the Federal police force and involves the exposing or offering for sale infringing copies of copyright works.

In question was copyright material recorded by Elvis Presley as well as various Quebec artists.

An additional seventeen charges were laid against Camirand for possession of "plates" used for the purpose of making infringing copies of copyright works.

The charges were the result of the seizure last October in Quebec City of 1200 pirate tapes, approximately 100,000 labels, a winding machine and a wrapping machine. Arraignment has been set for May 9, 1975.


TOM BERRY

Tom Berry was born in Toronto, March 24th, 1950. He started at RCA in 1972 as a mailboy when "I realized that was the only way I was going to get in." Before joining RCA, he studied anthropology at York University for two years, taking a year's break in between to tour Europe. He plays guitar and says "like many promotion men, I'm a frustrated musician."

Tom fully intends to stay in the music industry: "the growth of this business in Canada over the past four years has been incredible, and I'd like to be there at the top as it happens. I feel I've got some things to offer and I know I can contribute something to the continuing upward trend." For Tom, promotion gives him a chance to be in constant contact with "special people" at all levels of the music business. "Every new act is a new experience, even the routine things always end up being a little out of the ordinary."



CAPITOL PROMO FOR BABE RUTH

"Babe Ruth" were the subject of an intensive promotional effort on the Yonge Street strip during their recent appearance at Toronto's Massey Hall (7). Capitol's Rick Nickerson, who has recently been given responsibility for Arista product in Ontario, put together window displays and arranged for plastic bats and baseballs to be on hand in stores advertising the "First Base" album.

During their tour, Babe Ruth did interviews with the Toronto Sun's Wilder Penfield III, CBC Radio Winnipeg's Jim Millican, and Wayne Dion of CHAM for his syndicated radio show. Capitol's "Copperpenny" were supporting act for the group. Their just-released single "Disco Queen" has been play-listed at CHUM, CFUN and CHEX.

GOOD BROTHERS PLUGGED IN FOR BUSY SUMMER DATES

The Good Brothers, tagged "Canada's leading bluegrass band, have just completed a heavy April which will set them up for several key dates in the U.S. Their April gig at Carleton University's Roosters (Ottawa) for which they received top money ever paid by the club, turned into a "sold out" week which was followed by a week at Toronto's El Mocambo and critical acclaim from the Toronto press, usually considered a "hard nosed" lot. They are set for a Sunday concert in Simcoe, Ont. which is followed by three days at Humber College and a high school one-nighter with Fludd. Next on their schedule is a recording session at Thunder Sound from April 28 through May 13. Adam Mitchell will be producing. This is the first recording session for the group since 1971 when they taped an album in

California for Columbia. They were then known as James and The Good Brothers.

On completion of their session they swing into a Sudbury date (14) and then tape several television shows including George Hamilton IV (15), and the John Allan Cameron Show in Montreal (16).

The Good Brothers then move south to the U.S. for dates at Williams', Alexandria, Va. (21); the Red Fox Inn, Washington, D.C.

(23); a major showcase appearance at the Calloway Bluegrass Festival in Maryland (23 - 25); and then back to Renfrew, Ontario and the White House Inn (27 - 31).

The Goods will also let the Canadian bluegrass fans see them at work at a major Canadian bluegrass festival when they are showcased at Bluegrass Canada '75, a popular pre-summer event held at Carlisle, Ontario, June 6 through the 8th. They will be sharing the bill with the Country Gentlemen, Norman Blake, Country Gazette and Bill Munroe and his Bluegrass Boys.

“bad kid from the inner city”?

Murray McLauchlan, as of the beginning of May 1975, entered into the fourth month of a major North American tour. He's come a long way from the days of living an almost cliched earlier life in a cockroach-ridden hotel in Greenwich Village, where he was struggling to make his mark as a singer/songwriter. Today, McLauchlan has established himself as one of Canada's foremost recording and concert artists and the latest indications are that he's picking up a very substantial following in the U.S. His fourth and most recent album, "Sweeping The Spotlight Away" (released in both Canada and the U.S.), is by far his biggest selling album ever. Preparations are underway for the release of a new single, "Down By The Henry Moore", as a follow-up to his double-sided hit "Do You Dream Of Being Somebody" and "Maybe Tonight".

After his tour ends in New York on June 13th, McLauchlan will be working during the summer months on a half hour television documentary to be shown on both the BBC and the O.E.C.A. (Ontario Television service), in early 1976.

In the following interview, during a rare few days when he was home in Toronto, McLauchlan talked about his past, present and probable future.

Canada's third national stage band festival gets under way May 8th and 9th at Seneca College, (Toronto), Minkler Auditorium. A line-up of All-star bands from across Canada will offer a fortunate Toronto audience the spectacular sounds of the Big Band greats such as Maynard Ferguson, Woody Herman, Buddy Rich, Stan Kenton and Buddy DeFranco.

Over fifty bands will have competed across Canada in order to be selected as one of the ten National finalists to perform at Seneca College May 8th and 9th for top honours and the national title. When they gather in Toronto, not only will these young musicians participate in the festival, but will have experience of association during educational clinic sessions with some Canadian artists such as Moe Koffman, Rob McConnell, Don Thompson, Russ Little, Tommy Banks and many more.

Wind-up of this sensational festival is the Friday night (May 9th) presentation that includes the Canadian All-Star Stage Band,

and in the U.S., where you're not as well known, is there a big difference in the way you perform in the two countries?

There's not as much pressure on you in the U.S., other than to relax and really enjoy what it is you're doing. You can sit there and crack jokes with people in the audience, because it's a lot more intimate. Your raps get longer - there's not such a time thing involved, it's a lot looser.

Do you think U.S. audiences miss some of the references in your more Toronto-oriented songs?

"Down By the Henry Moore" never mentions Toronto, it's pretty obvious that when you're talking about the Palm Grove, you're talking about a bar, or the Silver Dollar as a place where you hang out. Some of the more obvious lines people will miss, but they'll pick up on lines like "the ice was in my hair" (for skating at Nathan Phillips Square), etc.

What are your feelings on the tour you did in the U.S. with Neil Young - did you find it difficult touring with a more well-known act? Were audiences hard to reach because they were waiting for Neil Young?

There were a few classic concerts on that tour, particularly one we did in New York City at Queen's College. The hall holds about 4,500 people and they were all university kids and so whacked out that they

PROFESSOR SAYS SING

Dr. Elizabeth Elrod, a professor of education and music at the University of Maryland, cites a German study to support her claim that "Children whose mothers sing to them, will grow up to be happy and have positive attitudes."

didn't know their ass from a hole in the ground. The first act went out and everyone was throwing stuff and screaming and then I went on, and they were still carrying on and that's when I started swearing at them. They found that very engaging and started swearing back and we had this great swearing session. Finally they ended up digging it and they asked me to come back for more. Then when Neil came out, they were still yelling for Neil Young when Neil was already on the stage.

On the other hand, there was Berkley Community Centre (San Francisco) which was one gig where you could hear a pin drop. People were there to listen to the music. When they aren't, those are the roughest gigs.

Was there any difference for you in the way you felt after performing at Massey Hall the second time as opposed to the first time?

I think I was probably a bit more scared or nervous the first time. It was sort of an historic moment for me - treading across the old boards you know. My family was going to be there, and all that kind of stuff, but it's not so bad now.

"Bernie got stage fright and I thought I was going to get lynched."

For 1973, you won three Junos, partly because of the success of "Farmer's Song." Were you surprised to win all those awards that night?

Yeah, it was pretty strange. The worst part was when Bernie made me go up and get his. He got stage fright, but by that time I was afraid I was going to get lynched. It was a complete surprise to me, I didn't expect it.

Why do you think "Farmer's Song" was so successful?

Mostly because I think a lot of people heard the song a couple of times and said 'Oh yeah, that song's about me.' It happens a lot of times that people will come up and talk about it. I'll go out to a bar, and when somebody finds out that you're the guy who wrote that song, first thing you know, you're getting drinks poured down your throat and people are calling you out to dance. They don't want to get heavy, intellectual, or philosophical - they just want to pat you on the back. That's really great, I really liked that song.

When you were on the road years ago, living "the Woody Guthrie experience" did the life live up to your original conception of what it would be like?

I'd gone through those things before, by reading books and fantasizing, but when I started to go out and try to do it, and the experiences turned out to be quite real, it was a different story. By the time I got out there, a lot of the fantasy and enchantment had disappeared, the reality was quite enough - to live from day to day in a space

where you had four directions you could go and it didn't matter which one you took. You had no money and there was absolutely nothing keeping you wherever you were anyway. I worked in a sawmill because we quite literally had no money, and we were starving. Working in a sawmill is very romantic, but unfortunately, you've got to stack four tons of timber for nine hours a day, and when you weigh 125 pounds it's hard work. I quit after a week and a half, my hands were just black with splinters.

"It's very difficult to sit around for two or three months and eat rice and ketchup....."

Why did you keep pursuing a musician's career when so many other aspiring folk-singers and rock musicians from the original Yorkville just folded up?

I just wanted to really do it badly, so I figured I'd better get it together in some fashion or other. Other people, maybe times were rougher, or their circumstances were rougher, or maybe they just didn't want to do it bad enough; it's very difficult to sit around for two or three months and eat rice and ketchup and not contemplate that maybe you should be doing something else. It wasn't really a matter of gritting my teeth and saying 'By God, I'm going to storm the beaches, this is what I'm going to do, I can see it all now.' It's just like, 'there's nothing else I can do, if I do anything else, it'll just bring me down so much that I might jump off a bridge.'

Did all the bad experiences contribute heavily to your writing?

That kind of life tends to colour your atti-

tudes towards everything. You're more liable to see a lot of things as being transitory, relationships, money, friends, success, whatever. It's just basically a roller coaster ride. I like to think it's made me a little bit more tolerant. I'm very sympathetic if somebody's going through really rotten times, and by the same token I realize there's really nothing I can do for them.

Looking back on the earlier part of your career, do you see any one person as having had a major influence on your music?

The obvious thing would be to say 'yeah' and name a certain person, but I've thought about that an awful lot and decided that it really isn't that true. My development was part of a rather large, ongoing, eclectic folk music scene, that involved Jack Elliott, Woody Guthrie, Bob Dylan, just guys from all over the place. Your own family, your own philosophy, the books you've read, are all going to make a difference along the way.

Right now, critics say that you're more motivated by city life, while Bruce Cockburn is influenced by nature; would you yourself explain it in that way?

That tends to evolve more from the stance that people have taken in their attitude, towards what both of us do. He's God and I'm the devil's advocate, or whatever - it's got essentially nothing to do with whatever both of us are doing. If there's any difference in what we're doing, it has nothing to do with city or country; it has to do with our approach and philosophy. My trip is to get out and look and to relate to other people - to check it out. Bruce's trip is an internal, philosophical, rather lonely exploration of whatever his vision of the world is.

Do you think that people have an erroneous idea of you as being the "bad kid from the inner city"?

I've never understood that impression myself. One of my best friends was a guy who

was secretary-treasurer of the Vagabonds, but I was best friends with him because he was a really philosophical cat. He had a terrific attitude, made me happy. I wasn't a criminal or a badmouth.

For your writing - do you go out of your way to explore bars, etc. or do you tend to just sit back and watch what's going on?

I go out and mess around and watch people quite a lot, watching is one of my chief occupations, watching my friends, and their relationships, or just going out and sometimes getting into a conversation with a stranger. It's not a matter of going out and seeking down and out people, or people who don't have any money and people who are drunk on Parliament Street because they're more real. That's just one element. A lot of the human condition pertains to all levels of people. My trip is to find what those things are, I'm not touting any kind of lifestyle, or saying having no money is much groovier than having money, it's not important.

"Morrissey appeals to a sort of wacky sense of humour in me....."

I read an article about you that described the Morrissey Tavern (a Toronto pub) as being a peculiarly "Murray McLauchlan kind of place." What's a Murray McLauchlan kind of place?

Everybody that ever writes anything about you, hopefully present company excepted, is that wherever they meet you, or wherever they see you and whatever circumstance they see you in, they freeze time. They flow from day to day but they don't understand that other people do as well. The Morrissey is my kind of bar sometimes primarily because you can go in and have a beer and watch the hockey game and there isn't some bunch of yo yo's screaming away, you can talk to people. It's just sort of a working class tavern. Sometimes it's deaf and dumb night and that's really interesting. It appeals to a sort of whacky sense of humour in me. I always wanted to invite those people and put them in the front ten rows of a concert.

How do you write - do you write about something very quickly, or do you let several ideas build and then put it together?


I drop back into a period, I'm not prolific particularly, I don't write a great deal, when it happens, it happens. But it usually happens in a sense where you drop a little back from your life or from being on top of everything, and you just sort of get into communication with the old muse, whatever it is that just all of a sudden makes you start thinking about things. I lay back and start thinking about all the shit I've seen for the last four or five months and start remembering, reminiscing. After being just wasted out from travelling for example, I'll write something like 'Maybe Tonight'. The earth doesn't move for me, rockets don't go off. It's a quiet pursuit.

In early 1970, an ad appeared in the trades, requiring any interested musicians to help form a band.

Early in 1975, Columbia released a single called "Dancin' (On a Saturday Night)" and



it was well on its way for the gold in them thar' charts, in only a few short weeks.

The boys in this band are called Bond.

Bond is composed of cousins Bill Dunn-bass and Jeff Hamilton-drums (who placed the original ad) John Roles-rhythm guitarist and Barry Cobus (now band-manager), plus keyboarder Ted Trenholm and lead guitar Alex MacDougall who had joined a bit on.

This debut album (complete with hit "Dancin") will put you back on yer' feet as you hear the disc begin with some heavy walking that proceeds to unlock the chains that are supposedly shackling up the boys' music. "Dancin" sounds a Liverpooled "Somethin' Tells Me I'm into Somethin' Good" at times but even so that ain't too bad.

"I Love the Things You do" has some good blasts by Bruce Pennycook on sax which helps to make the number very tight and very clean.

"Hold on" is a good-grease number that insists that you hold onto yourself, before it commences to a-churnin' and a-steamin', finally building up and letting go, to swim in an electronic-daze of instrumental miasma and orgasmic confusion and that's not too bad either.

"We are not free" has a novelty cricket-effect setting it up and "Mardi-Gras" has a novelty Mardi-Gras effect to it. The effects are not too original, but at least they're being done.

Engineering for the album goes to Ricky Recordo (no relation to Fred Megahertz) and production chores were handled by Bob Gallo at Manta Sound in Toronto.


Bond has come up from the grind of the jug 'n mug circuit with a smash hit-single and tight co-ordination.

Delights

"All day, all night, day waited. Da voices shut, de eyeball dilated... For delight, delight from demoon."

Cover conception: Beautifully aged man, smiling and at ease... pipe in hand and the



lights of delight adancin' in his head. Ian Thomas, Canadian wunderkind in the style of Rundgrenish self-production and multi-faceted synthesizer, mellotron and guitar work, has definitely come of age, for most of the songs presented here are the finest that your ears can be offered.

The charted song "Julie" is included in this pressing but for my bread the big winners are "Star" and "Pennydarren."

Sit down and blast out the Thomas-song "Star."

It is a musician's ode to hype and the big-push of commercial-selling methods. Thomas doesn't dig it, but he knows to make mention of it. The selection starts off milky as Thomas relates that he's running around on a road that he doesn't know, going through all the trips in order to be a recognized star, looking down from his perch from way up high. "Making a show" is emphasized heavy. He laughs with the absurdity of spending money on laffs, and the nuisance of dealing with chickies 'o no clue. But then blammo' his real love has been right in front of him all the time. The truckin' and buildup starts with pluckin' strings and Milan Kymlicka arrangements that dip and swoon like a Blackboard jungle track. Its all worth the hassles he implies, and when you make it as star, you soar and soar ever higher, ever freer.

Every important phrase in "Star" is highlighted by Thomas' image-making production values. The song is a definite winner.

"Pennydarren" complete with synthesized bagpipes and high-tuned hymn-vocals recreates the beauty and innocence of the Welsh valleys and breeze-forests. We don't hear of neighbouring racial strife and terrorist bombings, we hear of the sun waking up and shining upon the tips of Pennydarren, where life is never changing and always refreshingly beautiful.

"Pennydarren" is a very sweet winner. The rest of the L.P. is fine but only these two selections stand out in my mind's ear.

Steve Hogg puts in an effectively throaty bass, Mike Oberle handles the drum work and Hugh Syme flashes and splashes on Fender Rhodes.

Julie looks to be the definite hit, but "Star" is the slow burner. After all Ian Thomas is now a star, making "Delights" a worthy addition to any collection. **MD**

NILS LOFGREN

Nils Lofgren isn't perfect by any musical means.

In this disc-first solo attempt, Lofgren plays with his organ and axe-flashes in an annoyingly redundant self-production aimed to score with a teeny-bopped waxing. Themes like "One more Saturday Night" and other school-daze delights recreate a skim-o-the-top awareness of dimpled giggling over the phone, the stature of hickeys in the social scene, and other pubescent interests which could make some novelty listening if written with intelligence and feeling. Lofgren apparently feels that his audience is sure-bulged 'neath his belt because of past successful involvements with Neil Young and the Crazy Horse. Unfortunately any new musical development will only come about through hard years and not what he thinks as the tenth round of beers. His snarled Jeff Beckers set up each new cut with a milky anticipation, but the finished effect is the creaking grind of 45's. He appears to program all his numbers for the many shrieking little gals, whose main concern would be to fingernail the bubble-gum left under the auditorium prep-school seating plan. Aynsley Dunbar sounds a monotonous pounding on each number and he never once reeks from his non-varying time.

At the age of 22, Nils can still reach for music, instead of the teenage cutesie-pie. When he succeeds at some good greasy vibes, then maybe all rock-men will crack wide and Gren. **MD**

EDDIE KENDRICKS
For You
Motown T6-335S1-Y

Eddie Kendricks made his decision to leave the Temptations in 1970 and in the following few years, his singles "Keep On Truckin'" and "Boogie Down" were both certified gold. His first two solo albums were on the charts for six months and he has followed their success with a third set "For You". The album is a collective effort on the part of writers and arrangers, but the best combinations seem to happen on tunes arranged by Leonard Caston and Jimmie Haskell, especially with "Please Don't Go Away" and "One Tear". Caston also wrote both cuts and assisted in writing two others; he provides background vocals as well. "Please Don't Go Away" is an especially well done track with the Motown sound at its mellow best and "Deep and Quite Love" falls into the same category. "One Tear" and "Let Yourself Go" are true R&B movers while "If" by David Gates (formerly of Bread), along with Jim Croce's "Time In A Bottle" round things off nicely to create a set that caters to a variety of moods. On the majority of tracks Kendricks seems to be most comfortable singing in a range much like Smokey Robinson's, although he can and does reach back down the scale occasionally. Set should do as well as his two previous releases. **KE**







Who were you thinking of when you wrote "Do You Dream of Being Somebody?"

It was kind of a dissertation on really death-dealing ambition. I wrote that after I saw a picture of Judy Garland, one of the last pictures that was ever taken of her. She was really drugged out, it was one of her last performances, she looked really bad, mascara all over the place, obviously she was still singing "somewhere over the rainbow." So I was looking at that, and going through dance magazines, and just thinking about all that stuff, wondering why people perform, why they have ambition, why they want to do it, what's in them in the first place that makes them want to do it so bad, that they destroy themselves just to do it. That's what the song is about.

Do you ever go through periods of being discouraged?

The thing that saves me most from any kind of heartache or monstrous bringdown, is that by and large I still recognize the fact that I do it because I want to, not because it's a job. Everybody's life is hard when they're starting, when they really want to do something, but there's a long way to go between wanting to and being able to. I guess the only exceptions to that rule are with people who come right out of school and go into a nice job with their father's law firm.

Is your time completely occupied by music these days?

I still paint, write a little bit of poetry, and do quick sketches. I'm into amateur inventing, into walking, into working on cars, into going to shows, but mostly I'm into doing what I'm doing now and it takes up more and more time.

Do you see your music evolving in any particular direction?

No I don't. The progression that's been going on now is good enough for me. I feel that I'm able to reach inside and be a little bit more concise, a little bit more honest, a little bit more to the point, and just put words together better than I used to. My songs have got more melodic, I'm enjoying playing a lot more. It just seems like a better way to live, rather than to constantly push circumstances - just let things alter around you, pick up what you want, discard what you don't. Save yourself a lot of trouble.

Do you ever worry that maybe an amassing of wealth might interrupt a certain creative flow for you?

I think more than anything else, what happens, or what's going to happen to me if it's any logical extension of the trend of events, is that with the more well-known, the more successful you get - all of a sudden you have a lot of things you can do. You can get into acting, or producing records, you get sessions to play on, you have more variety, more work. Certain types of people amass a great deal of property and wealth and just insulate themselves from whatever's going on, that's always a real possibility and a very dangerous possibility. I certainly hope it doesn't happen to me, but I don't think it will.


Do you want to produce records?

Yes, very much so, I'd love to do that. Just going through changes myself like that, has given me a great deal of sympathy for what people have to go through when they're initially starting to make records. I think it's a very important thing to encourage people to trust their own ideas, and conceptions of what they want to sound like. It's important to draw them out, to work with them, to suggest, and not say 'you don't know anything, stay out of the mixing, leave me alone.'

In your personal life, do you tend to associate mostly with musicians, or do you like to get away from the music scene entirely?

That's an interesting question, because I find that most of my friends aren't musicians, I've made better and more lasting friends that aren't. I do have pretty close friends that I meet on the road, and I never see them anywhere else, like Jackson Browne, or Joni or Neil - we can sit up and rap all night, but that's just sort of one area of your life. But the people I normally hang out with tend to be painters or sometimes an actor here and there, or my brother. The things that musicians have in common that's so groovy to me, is that for the period of time you're on the road, everyone knows the bullshit and the stupidity that goes down, and you don't have to talk about it. You can talk about something else.

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
