Ed Preston to head up RCA Canada operation

Ed Preston has been appointed Vice-President and General Manager of the Record Division of RCA Limited (Canada). Mr. Preston's appointment took effect December 1st. He replaces R.F. (Bob) Cook, who has been appointed Managing Director RCA Limited (Australia).

Mr. Preston has many credits to his name including that of a top notch Dixieland-cum country drummer. He was eighteen when, in 1947, he joined the music library of CHML in Hamilton and also hosted the Club 900, a radio bandstand. He remained at the station until February of 1967 when he was appointed promotion and sales representa-

tive for Ontario with RCA. He went on to become regional branch manager (Ontario, which also included overseeing warehouse activities.) He was appointed to the post of national promotion manager in 1971 and in 1974 took on the duties of operations manager for the central and western regions.

It was in this latter position where Preston rounded out his complete knowledge of the operation of a record company. He was responsible for the activities of sales, promotion, A&R and studios, which led him to his most recent appointment as head of the giant RCA record complex in Canada.

RCA scores a first with direct-to-disc production

RCA's Jack Feeney scored a coup for the label with his "Direct-To-Disc" production by John Arpin. This is the first time an album using this system has been released in Canada and the results has been twofold for RCA - radio play and sales have been encouraging and the album has pointed up yet another facility available at the Toronto studios.

Feeney admits the production wouldn't have been possible without the highly professional talents of Arpin and his backup crew Bill Turner (guitar) and Dean MacDonald (drums). Also taking a bow are RCA technicians Dave Balan, Steve Hazelton,

Alan Moy (mastering engineer) and Hayward Parrott (engineer).

The direct-to-disc process isn't that new. This was the only way to record prior to the introduction of tape, but with modern technology, Feeney has trimmed two expensive steps from recording (1) recording to multiple tape tracks and (2) mixing down from the multiple tracks to regular stereo or two track tape. The result is a package of entertainment with a much cleaner sound. The process also has its drawbacks, one being that a single can't be culled from the album and if a mistake is made, that's it. The disc has to be destroyed and the recording begins all over again. Groups or artists who wish to

take advantage of the direct-to-disc process must have their program down to a fault (for each side). When the session begins, the group continue straight ahead with about seven seconds between selections. There is a rehearsal time allowed prior to the session giving the engineers and producer an opportunity to mike but when that's set up, there's no turning back.

Feeney has already made plans for another Arpin session and will be recording other artists as well.

Arpin, one of Canada's most accomplished pop pianists and arrangers, is currently playing Toronto's Chelsea Inn.

Toronto group talking purchase of GRT Canada

The attempts of a Toronto group led by Bill Ballard to acquire GRT (Canada), rumour for several weeks, has now become news.

Ballard, vice president of Maple Leaf Gardens and president of Concert Promotions International (which books Garden concerts) also leads a group bidding for a Toronto FM broadcast licence.

The deal is less than certain at press time, the major outstanding issue is price, RPM was told by Ed Cowan, publisher of Saturday Night magazine, a principle backer of Thunder Sound recording studios and participating with Ballard in the GRT deal. Ballard says the group is now revising its offer.

Also figuring in the GRT purchase bid is Bernie Finklestein, Canada's leading manager (Murray McLauchlan, Dan Hill, Bruce Cockburn), owner of successful True North Records and partner in Finklestein-Fiedler, a well-rounded management, booking, publicity and concert promotion firm, told RPM. "As a successful record producer it's just natural to be interested in a bigger record operation. As a promoter I compete with CPI".

Finklestein has nothing to do with the bid for a Toronto FM station. He wishes Ballard's group the best "I want to see as many radio stations as possible."

Ballard told RPM that he sees no conflict between owning a record company and a radio station. "The station programs Canadian music and GRT would be an all-Canadian company." He says Canada needs a more concentrated effort in the music business, "Too many small guys dealing with small pieces of the pie."

With Ballard in the FM bid are CPI men Micheal Cohl and David Wolinsky, Myron Wolfe of the Oshawa group (IGA and Towers chains), who has participated with Ballard in past music industry deals, is also a major investor among 25 (mostly out-of-industry) figures.

Rainer Schwarz, currently with Ontario Education TV network's "Night Music", is slated to be the program director of the proposed FM outlet.

Ballard promises to disclose more details next week.

A year ago Ballard was involved with another discbiz deal when he and others

bailed out floundering Love Productions. Ballard became Love board-chairman. Myron Wolfe became executive v.p. and Gardens' secretary Donald Crump became also secretary of Love's board.

WEA Canada unveils new Ontario branch

Ken Middleton, President of WEA Canada, announced October 27th, the formation of a separate sales/warehouse branch, located at 1970 Ellesmere Road in Scarborough, Ontario.

"The need to set apart our Ontario sales/warehouse function from our national orders administration/warehouse facility has become increasingly more apparent in recent months", he said.

"To head up our new sales warehouse facility", Middleton announced, "I am pleased to announce the appointment of Andy Abbate as Ontario Branch Manager. Andy's diligence, determination and dependability as Sales Manager of the Ontario region unquestionably earns him the right to this promotion."

Abbate informed the Ontario customers on November 14th as to when the new branch was to become operational.

London inks Quebec acts pushes Philharmonic

London Records have inked two Canadian acts, Montreal-based-Cockroach and Gilbert Bécaud. The label has released Cockroach's "So Many Things."

London's Ray Williams has been running with a new single by Neon Philharmonic,

"Long Distance Love Affair". The single is the first release by "Neon's" Ray Williams and Ron Demmans, both Canadians, since their hit "Morning Girl" in 1968.



Gino Vannelli moves to int'l superstar status

"It's hard to be original, but it's even harder to be original and good."

It's all a question of being able to live with yourself, saying 'that's really me
... that's my soul'."

Gino Vannelli ... 23 year old Juno award-winning wonder.

Through his vibrantly-emotional expression, Vannelli has a built-up an intensely loyal following, not only in his homecoming Canada, but right across music-starved U.S.A.

Gino Vannelli is a former native of Montreal, the son of a local barber who spent his free evenings crooning in various nightclubs.

His father's vocational-hobby stamped impressionable on the young Gino, for at the tender age of 3, he was caught many a time swivelling his hips ala Presley.

Gene Krupa through the medium of his cinematic life-story, inspired the young kid to bang out his juvenile-desires on a pair of homemade drums, until he finally landed his first band-gig at the "mature" age of 11.

By the time he hit 16, under the stage-billing of "Vann Elli", Gino cut his first record with RCA entitled "Gina Bold."

The disc made a successful rise up the Montreal top-ten.

After three long-years of New York door-knocking around, Gino returned to Montreal, and with brother Joe conceived a new band-sound, opened the ears of trumpetman Herb Alpert, and found himself on his way towards a lucrative signing with A&M.

Gino's recent wrapup of a major concert-tour saw him through many eastern U.S. markets, including New York, Detroit and Boston.

Berklee College in Boston, noted for its fine jazz-instruction, counts among its students, many diehard Gino fans.

Gino's massive Canadian following contributed to the sell-out pandemonium generated during his band's appearances at Montreal's Place des Arts, Ottawa's National Arts Centre, and Toronto's Massey Hall.

The Vannelli show consistently alternates between the sinewy athleticism of Gino front-man performer, to the snug cushioning-sounds of his backup's r&b, disco/jazz mixture.

His voice effects an instrument unto itself, ranging from full-bass groanings to effeminately high-pitched wails, coupling an immaculate phrasing control that power-thrusts his macho-stance.

The Vannelli band strings along sans guitars, but the listener never feels a sense of depriva-

tion ... Gino's brother keyboard/synthesizes along with Richard Baker to layer out sounds in accord with three percussionists, Graham Leer, John Mandel and a man known simply as Dido.

Gino's A&M discography includes his first entitled "Crazy Life" (SP 4395), "Powerful People" (SP 3630) and the beautiful "Storm At Sunup" (SP 4533) which is rapidly-approaching its well deserved gold status.

"Love Me Now" was the first single pulled from 'Sunup', and it is still enjoying an enthused response from programmers across North America.

"Mama Coco", Gino's tribute to a chocolate-lipped dream, is definitely the gutsiest within his surreal repertoire, with an American-release already in swing, and a Canadian action that should be coming up shortly.

Not only does Gino Vannelli project the lyricism akin to the archetypal romantic musician, but his band is technically-proficient at synthesizing his complex arrangements into a wonderfully placid plateau.

The outcome is the sound of a unique sensual expression.

U.S. market "wide open" for Columbia's Middleton

Tom Middleton had his share of the small time. At 26, though his name is hardly a household word, he's making the personal effort that too few young singers make to become an accomplished artist.

At the same time he may be getting a break with his first Columbia label single (he's had a few and an album all cut by Can-Base in B.C.) which has the record company's promo men happily backtracking.

Columbia's Mike Watson admits they thought Tom's "One Night Lovers" had stalled. "We released the ballad in August and it got lost in the summer shuffle with the up-beat teenage stuff." Columbia also deleted Tom's Can-Base album.

But CKLW (Windsor) put "One Night Lovers" on their all night playlist, got a response, put it on all-day rotation and then charted it. "The retail response on the U.S. side of the border was great" Watson reports, "Michigan retailers picked up 4000 copies in first-time orders, compared to the usual 500 when one of our Canadian releases is charted in Windsor".


Tom was in Toronto in late October to work with producer Bob Gallo on his first Columbia album.

Tom first saw the country at 19 when he left Vancouver Island to sing with a touring one-night-stand rock band "The Marquis" and returned to Victoria broke and sick. He gigged weekends while working in a bank, then found work at a local radio station and in 1972 began to sing full-time with a group called "Jade" at Victoria's Empress Hotel. From there he got his chance in a recording studio.

Last year Tom toured western and prairie centres with a five piece band, performing with local Junior Orchestras. Their music was scored and sent ahead to the conductors who hosted the group. He was impressed by the variety of things the musicians did with their material.

"It exposed me to the wealth of music I was not really enjoying. As a rock singer I was just a front man with a wall of music behind me."

When he returned to Victoria, Tom took a part-time job with the post office and enrolled in Victoria's Conservatory of Music to learn theory and is taking private lessons on the guitar. "It's a way of developing my writing abilities and it's essential to making a worthwhile career for myself....A lot of musicians are frustrated vocalists but I see now that a lot of vocalists are frustrated musicians."



Tom has written and recorded some original material and wants to eventually base his work on his own music.

"The album I'm now recording won't show what I've been doing but producer Bob Gallo and I have chosen material that suits me." He likes working with Gallo who he feels appreciates the well-paced way he's developing. "When I'm ready to do my own material, then I'll push for it."

Tom doesn't feel there has to be tension between developing as a recording artist and as a performing artist. "You can't do both at the same time but you have to do both. As long as an artist makes the decisions himself there are no problems."

If his record takes off, Tom will put together a 5-piece band and go on tour (he's booked by Vancouver's I.P.C.), but he won't stop developing his music. "I want to perform with the guitar, after that I'll work on the piano."

it's not just a business. I want to tour when it's good to tour and write and record when that's best." Tom feels his studying has made him better able to decide what's good for his music. "And I'm enjoying music a million per cent more."

The Tom Middleton story is probably just beginning after ten years of Tom's work, but he wouldn't want to be a star before he's a competent musician.

"The slower the better for me... I've got the time. I just want to be ready for what ever happens."

Middleton's single, "One Night Lovers", has run out of action and now that the young west-coaster has established himself south of the border, a follow-up could just break the barrier.

A&M expands jazz scene with push on Horizon

A&M Records have finally released their long-awaited Horizon Jazz series.

Horizon Jazz is NOT intended to appeal to just one particular market.

The aim of the series and the intention of all jazz expression is to cover a wide range of appreciation within all music-loving audiences.

Packaging is extremely professional with the quality of pressing sounding the best available today.

Summary of the first batch of an anticipated 15 Horizon efforts are as follows:

Alto-sax man Paul Desmond and "acoustic piano-great" Dave Brubeck debut on the Horizon with "1975: The Duets."

Showcased as a "pure duet", the two musicians had never played alone together until June '75 when they were featured among many other contemp. jazz greats during the annual SS Rotterdam Jazz Cruise.

Pieces of that performance were taped up by the BBC, which has been included on Side 2 of the album.

"Take Five" Brubeck has been garnering accolades for his odd time signature improvs since the early 60's and Desmond, former

Brubeck Quartet alto player, in his own words sounds "like a dry martini."

Former Miles Davis sessionman Dave Liebman blowing out sounds as laid down by Coltrane, has several of his solo ventures available on the amazing European ECM line, gratefully distributed in Canada by Polydor.

"Sweet Hands" is the name to this collection of sax/flute expression, with Dave and his Lookout Farm comprised of the best of the New York loft-musicians.

Lookout Farm are Richie Beirach on keyboards, Jeff Williams on drums, Frank Tusa on bass and Badal Roy on tabla.

Horizon has tapped Charlie Haden on bass, John Abercrombie on guitar, Don Alias on percussion, Arooj Lazewal on sitar and Gita Roy on tamboura.

Thad Jones, cornet and flugelhorn extraordinaire, combos with his Big Band co-leader percussionist Mel Lewis in a "Suite For Pops", a tribute to the late Satchmo Armstrong.

Originally recorded in '72, the album was produced and engineered by Phil Ramone with additional recording in '75 by producer John Snyder.

Although guitarist Jim Hall considers his latest CTI-released "Concierto" to be a "solid effort" he considers his debutting Horizon entitled "Live!" to be THE definitive release.

The album was taped up during Hall's June '75 gig at Toronto's Bourbon Street.


Two of Toronto's finest musicians, bassman Donny Thompson (who recently keyboarded on Moe Koffman's "Live At George's") and drummer Terry Clarke complete this Hall presentation. Both gentleman are part of the Moe Koffman band and can be seen working with practically every artist that comes into Toronto.

Jim Hall in this writer's opinion is one of the world's finest, when it's down to jazz guitar improvisation, weaving fragmented lines into exceptionally melodic tapestries.

Sonny Fortune, 36 year old reedman, has been associated with former Miles Davis piano-whiz McCoy Tyner, as well as Miles the man himself.

Supporting Fortune on his Horizon debut are Kenny Baron on piano, Billy Hart former George Benson drummer and Charles Sullivan on trumpet. The album was produced by Ed Michel.

Doug Chappell National Promo chief for A&M Canada is confident of the Horizon series as are all good music buffs across the programmer board.

Suzanne Stevens'

success gives Capitol gold fever

Suzanne Stevens' first English-language album is the best chance for stardom for any Canadian singer since Anne Murray.

"Love's The Only Game In Town" features her current hit single "Make Me Your Baby", a tasteful remake of a 60's pop hit, and the title cut has to be the strongest sentimental love song since "The Way We Were."

Last year Stevens became only the second primarily French-language singer to win a Juno Award and her recent French album, "Moi, De La Tete, Aux Pieds", and single have been big Quebec hits.

A protestant from Quebec, a Quebecois in Canada and a Canadian in the North American music world, Stevens hasn't looked back since Capitol called her the day after she appeared on a Montreal TV amateur show 3 years ago. Capitol hasn't looked back, either. A&R man Paul White was just in L.A. arranging a U.S. release.

Three producers have used her versatility to make the new LP package one of their biggest Canadian investments to date. Ives Lapierre produced 3 "disco"-style cuts (she had already done them in French though they are originally English songs) and Paul White and Milan Kimlicka produced the seven classy sentimental songs.

Stevens has done very little live performing lately but is putting together a band based on musicians she worked with in the studio.

She hopes to be ready for TV and touring in the spring.

Publishers and songwriters can take heart because here is an artist who's going somewhere who doesn't pen her own material. The new LP has 5 all-Canadian cuts: a Sylvia Tyson song which the composer has not yet cut ("Woman In Love"), a number by Gene MacLellan and Ives Lapierre and Judi Richards wrote the songs Lapierre produced.

Canada actively involved in U.S. Bicentennial

Canada saluted the U.S. Bicentennial last month with a first class theatre, music, opera and ballet series in Washington, D.C., the highlight of the predominantly "high brow" series was a one-night performance by the Canadian Opera Company of Harry Somer's 100% Canadian opera "Louis Riel."

The dramatic opera of Manitoba's 19th Century Metis rebel leader was commissioned in 1967 by the Chalmers Foundation and supported by the Centennial Commission, Ontario Arts Council and Canada Council. "Riel" played the company's

1967 season in Toronto and at Expo in 1967 and had not been staged since 1968 until it played the company's 25th anniversary season this fall at Toronto's O'Keefe Centre.

CBC crews taped the Washington performance, the last before the present cast, led by baritone Bernard Turgeon, breaks up. The taped performance was featured in the early November inaugural broadcast of the new coast-to-coast CBC FM programming network.

"Riel" is a modern production and unlike most classic opera it has a strong "middle brow" appeal because of its convincing char-

acters in a rich episode of Canadian history. But because it is "opera" its audiences are those fortunate enough live in Toronto and Ottawa and pay top ticket prices.

The expensive production is difficult to tour. Even at home, the company's publicity director Harvey Chusid told RPM, it costs \$50,000 every time the curtain goes up on "Riel."

Nonetheless, opera audiences are growing in Canada. In 1950 14,641 people saw the 10 performances of the company's premier season and paid a total of \$32,116 at the box office. Around 100,000 people have seen 36 performances in each of the last 3 seasons. This year's box office was almost \$1 million.

What are the recording possibilities for this Canadian classic? Bill Bessey in the CBC's broadcast recording department told RPM that CBC considered recording from the taped Washington performance themselves but costs are prohibitive. All members of the 35 member cast and production crews would be entitled to recording fees.

Bessey explained that the corporation has "an arrangement" with the A.F. of M. to facilitate broadcast recordings of "recognized Canadian Symphonies" but other CBC people pointed out that with operas or musicals there are other performer and production rights to be considered. An actor or singer is an Equity member on the stage and also an ACTRA member of the performance is broadcast or recorded. The CBC's "remote broadcast" arrangements to tape Riel in Washington involve rights for members of 5 performers and technicians organizations.

Cost estimates for record production of "Riel" range between \$30 and \$50 thousand for recording fees alone. No record company could recover that through sales even though the opera market may be growing.

But it raises another question to people around the opera and CBC.

Highbrow music in Canada is a kept child, made possible only through subsidy. Why isn't some of that subsidy directed so that the child may be kept on vinyl or tape?

Every time the curtain goes up on "Riel" a good part of the \$50,000 costs are met with subsidy - the opera box office averages \$27,000 for every O'Keefe performance.

In a recent Toronto press conference Canada Council director Andre Fortier hinted that the council is looking to find ways of bringing "high brow" music into the world of the record and broadcast music industry. The international success of "Riel" may be an inspiration to get that ball rolling.

"High brow" music fans can take consolation in the fact that not so long ago Canadian "low brow" music was a sleepy business.

Tape piracy continues in spite of many busts

an expensive but winning battle against tape pirates

The U.S. recording industry has waged an expensive but winning battle against tape pirates - quick buck artists who re-record legit records and sell the tapes at bargain prices.

Access to professional tape duplicating equipment - which can cost as little as \$8,000 can be a licence to print money costing the record industry hundreds of millions of dollars in lost sales.

The judge ruled that it was legal to re-record and sell any music as long as the mechanical royalty fees were paid.

In 1971 the industry was shook into action when the pirate tape firms, backed by two newly-formed, well-financed groups, The Independent Tape Merchants Association and the Music Anti-Monopoly Association, were ruled 'legitimate' by a U.S. district court.

The judge ruled that it was legal to re-record and sell any music as long as the mechanical royalty fees were paid. He also ordered the industry to stop warning retailers about handling pirate tapes.

As the judge was ruling, the major associations of the U.S. music industry were holding the first meeting of their anti-counterfeit council to map strategy in the fight to protect their product from piracy.

Throughout the next four years each side fought with suits, counter-suits and injunctions which culminated in supreme court decisions, federal legislation and anti-piracy laws in most states.

In March 1972 NARM set up regional anti-piracy committees and RIAA put up \$1 million to stop swiped sound.

In April 1972 the San Francisco appeals court overturned the lower court and ruled that paying mechanical fees was not enough to legitimise the pirates. CBS immediately launched a \$25 million class action suit on behalf of all legit labels.

In February 1972 congress passed a new U.S. copyright law updating the 1909 legislation. Piracy was all but ruled out. But the duplicating firms won lower court decisions claiming the law's language still permitted re-recording music copyrighted before February 1972.

The reprieve allowed the pirates to keep their licenced machinery in gear, which legit firms charged was also used to record new music as well, now forced underground.

But the law gave federal and local authorities, aided by industry associations (NARM hired 1000 "shoppers" to police the racks), the chance to move in on pirate strongholds. One early raid in New Jersey netted 2 million tapes and a bust in L.A. uncovered facilities to produce 40,000 pirate tapes a day.

Between July 1972 and December 1974 federal agents seized \$12,198,858 worth of pirated tapes and duplicating equipment and won 181 convictions for re-taping post February 1972 copyrighted records. Sentences totalled \$158,350 in fines paid and 159 years in prison.

Early in 1975 the justice department ordered a crackdown on pirate pre-1972 copyright material in line with appeals court anti-pirate decisions.

Raids were carried out across the country and record companies, artists and publishers put new pressure on state capitols for strong anti-piracy legislation following a court decision which gave states freedom to ban piracy in their criminal statutes. One FBI raid last May covered 15 states and 99 cities.

Last spring the Supreme Court upheld lower court decisions which wiped out the February 1972 copyright distinction.

The federal law and court decisions erased any claim to legitimacy for tape pirates. Driven underground, some claim into the waiting arms of organized crime, some pirates have pulled down the skull and crossbones on their independent labels and are flying forged flags of legit labels.

Underground, and with no "legit" pirate companies to compete with, fake tape artists can flourish in the face of weak

penalty clauses in the federal law, varied state laws and a hungry market for bargain tapes.

Above ground duplicators turned to "sound-alike" tapes for a quick buck - taping well known hit songs, just like the original, but sung by an unknown artist. Producers of sound-alike material report a recent surge of interest in their product from licensed duplicators.

The U.S. justice department has successfully prosecuted retailers who face a maximum \$1,000 fine and one year in jail on each count.

Record firms have found some "sound alikes" include pirated instrumental and backup tracks from original recordings. To counter this the RIAA is studying encoding systems - electronic identification of any legitimately recorded track - developed by Muzak and Audicom. None have been found both economical and foolproof.

Combatting new forms of piracy requires stepped up enforcement of the federal law which holds retailers also responsible for handling fake tapes and tougher state laws which change piracy violations from a misdemeanor under business practice regulations to a felony under criminal statutes.

The U.S. justice department has successfully prosecuted retailers who face a maximum \$1,000 and one year in jail for each count. Usually sentencing is based on one count for each pirated title.

Stiffer anti-piracy laws were introduced in New York and New Jersey but neither will become law until 1976. Both make pirating a felony and the New York law defines possession of 25 or more pirate tapes of the same title as the "intent to sell", a misdemeanor.

California stiffened its laws to 2 years and \$50,000 maximum for manufacture and making the second retailing offence a felony.

Weaker legislation was passed by the Oklahoma house 91-0 last June. A similar law in Alaska added a misdemeanor for any retailer selling recorded products not bearing the full name and address of the manufacturer and name of the performer. Illinois

Jazz giant Stan Kenton on the type of people into country and western music:

He considers country music to be uninspired and overly commercial.

His reasons?

"I don't think this music does anything for people."

"It's based on self-pity . . . music for the masses."

His feelings about the masses is that "they don't have any taste. Sophistication only exists in 1 or 2 per cent of the masses. And that 2 per cent has to support jazz, classical music and the arts. The masses can't communicate with art."

The reason is because "there is not enough perception. The masses are not gifted with enough perception to communicate with artistic things."

Often accused of a prejudicial-snobbery, Kenton has countered with "Well, it may be snobbery . . . it's a shocker. People say that I'm cynical and negative, but I say that I'm neither.

In actuality, I'm a realist."

"Kronborg 1582 to B'way now as "Rockabye Hamlet"

Toronto composer Cliff Jones is spending weekdays in New York reworking his pop musical of Hamlet for its January 27 opening at Broadway's Minskoff Theatre with the new title 'Rockabye Hamlet.'

Jones has written 6 new songs, rewritten three and Broadway choreographer Gower

Paul Nicholas . . . was originally selected to play Hamlet

Champion has put together a new "sexier" staging making the show a bit different from the "Kronborg 1582" version produced by Charlottetown's Jack MacAndrew in '74 and '75.

Jones wrote the pop "opera" with soft ballads for Hamlet and Ophelia, painful blues for the Queen and a boogie-woogie duet for Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, for CBC's "The Entertainers." Singer Rory Dodd (Horatio) from the original December 1973 broadcast and Charlottetown stage is going to New York with the show. Two others from the Canadian stage presentation, Beverley D'Angelo (Ophelia) and Bill Hosie (the C&W singing grave digger) also won their chances in the Big Apple. (Hosie has since withdrawn).

Paul Nicholas (from the movies "Tommy" and "Lisztomania") was originally selected to play Hamlet but the British singer was not allowed on the stage by New York's Actor's Equity. He is replaced by Larry Marshall who sang in the music version of "Two Gentlemen of Verona".

Montreal's Champlain Productions had stage, film and record rights to Jones' musical when New York producer Lester Osterman saw "Kronborg" at Charlottetown but the Canadian firm has not participated

in the financing of the Broadway effort which is bankrolled by Osterman and Joe Kipness. A U.S. cast album is also in the works.

Champlain's Rising Records recently released one song from the show "The Last Blues I'll Ever Sing" by the Lisa Hartt Band, mid-October - an RPM "pick".

Cal Dodd, who performed Hamlet on the original broadcast recording, has recorded

"That It Should Come To This", which was released on the RCA label. RCA's Barry Keane told RPM that Dodd's single picked up a fair bit of MOR airplay but never hit the charts. Dodd has recently switched to Champlain Productions.

"Hey Marilyn" based on the life of Marilyn Monroe


Meanwhile, Cliff Jones' own favourite work, the 40 song "Hey Marilyn" based on the life of Marilyn Monroe, is ready to follow his pop Hamlet's hit trail. Written for CBC it premiered on "The Entertainers" last winter and highlighted a CBC International Music Week broadcast series this fall. The U.S. born Beverley D'Angelo (Ophelia) who began her musical career singing with Toronto rock and jazz groups including Ronnie Hawkins' Elephant, sang the title role.

Jones still holds the rights to record and stage "Hey Marilyn" and has had serious talks about a Broadway stage deal. MacAndrew wanted to do it in Charlottetown this year but his budget blocked any new productions.

Jones' broadcast compositions include satirical songs for CBC Radio's "Inside from the Outside" and a children's musical series for Ontario educational T.V. He has been commissioned to write a third CBC broadcast production around the theme of Alice And Wonderland.


The man's a singer with no peer, possessed of a wavering, almost crying vocal-register.

Quebec tape pirates convicted on charges

The state monopoly "Melodiya" reports countless incidents of thousands of fans lining up all night to buy tickets for Reed's many concerts with his four Russian-based LP's selling upwards into the millions.

Dean Reed is NOT as many North Americans believe, a Russian with an anglicized name.

Dean Reed is a boyish-looking 37 year old, born and raised in Denver, Colorado.

"I don't like to argue about politics", he says.

"I'm just a guy who likes peace and people."

The man has successfully glittered his way via concerts and youth festivals throughout Eastern Europe, racking up Czechoslovakian and Hungarian peace prizes as well as a medal from the Czechoslovak Young Communist League.

Whenever making an appearance in North America, Dean Reed has been promoted by the Communist party and other "progressive" groups.

Soviet fans cannot believe that Reed is not as famous in North America as he is in Russia.

Many people think that the Communist countries have no "rock stars" at all.

Canada and the U.S. will begin "peace talks" next month in Ottawa, concerning the increasingly bitter "border war."

On January 13th, high-level officials from the External Affairs Department will meet with U.S. state department officials to discuss the issue of the three Buffalo stations asking for permission to jam their reception to Toronto, as well as the issue of the ABC-network trying to interfere with the sale of major Hollywood features to Canadian broadcasters.

Jeanne Sauve, the newly-appointed Canadian federal communications minister is not involved at this stage.

It was a CRTC policy, to call on cable TV companies to cut commercials out of the U.S. signals, which prompted the Buffalo TV owners to raise the possibility of jamming their reception.

This has been described as "the catalyst" which finally convinced both governments that the time was near for serious discussion.

Mrs. Sauve in interview agreed with the CRTC policy of ordering the cable television outlets to delete commercials from U.S. border station programming and to substitute them with local ones.

"I'm not against the Americans", she said.

"It's for us."

What say you Commission will it be Harry Boyle?

Our Broadcast Act states that,

"... the Canadian Broadcasting System should be effectively owned and controlled by Canadians so as to safeguard, enrich and strengthen the cultural, political, social and economic fabric of Canada."

The CRTC was initially created 7 years ago to take over the functions of the **Board of Broadcast Governors** who were ineffective in stopping American-produced programs from flooding the Canadian air-waves via cable.

The accomplishments of the CRTC to date?

They've successfully cut off the growing control by American investors of Canadian radio and television cable systems, imposed minimum levels of Cancon in radio and television, they've helped to "persuade" the CBC Radio Network to drop all of its commercials, and are in the midst of maintaining a Cancon policy for the production of Canadian-based commercials.

Pierre Juneau is gone but his legislative imprints are still wedged indelible.

The man positioned as Acting Chairman is the former CRTC Vice Chairman and ex-25 year CBC Radio and Television programmer, **Harry J. Boyle**.

Is Harry suited for the role of Chairman?

"Harry Boyle is a man of passion", said one media consultant of him, "and he's just not

She went on to say that the Canadian television industry is not all that prosperous and that money given to U.S. border stations from Canadian advertisers was needed in this country in order to build up our own industry.

These first discussions on a formal scale are not seen as a negotiating session. Rather, they are termed to be "exploratory", a chance for each side to express its own particular grievances.

Any talk of "jamming" signals has been blamed on viewers, broadcasters, and regulators, and not necessarily international controllers.

The Buffalo stations, WKBW, WBEN, and WGR have led the campaign towards threats... Canadian broadcasters were and still are concerned over the millions of dollars Canadian advertisers are spending over the border, rather than spending it on their own floundering industry.

Together they shared with Boyle a romance dedication to radio... creative ideas ala Orson Welles as opposed to commercialism solely motivated by commercial rewards.

Boyle attempted to root many idealistic goals into his television programming, but he continually hit his head against the wall of old line bureaucracy... grabbing advertising at the expense of viewer-intelligence.

As an author who has written many anecdotal books, and copped the "Stephen Leacock" medal for his humorous insights in the novel "Homebrew And Patches", Harry Boyle stands as an enigma within the ranks of an industry consisting of hard-nosers who insist that he's not suited for stern legislation.

According to Boyle, the pursuit of idealism in broadcasting is the only salvation towards a lasting improvement... to the media-attuned masses and his own unwavering conscience.

Harry Boyle is a DEFINITE friend to creative broadcasters, but is he the right man for the Chairman position?

Where do you position idealism in communications?

Should we pattern all our media after what has been regulated in the States? Need we compare with the FCC, or is there another way. How would you like your industry to go?

passed the first state law with explicit provisions for seizure and destruction of pirate tapes and recording.

New federal legislation giving agents the same powers they have when dealing with interstate traffic, sale and receipt of stolen cars and securities and sparing U.S. attorneys the complexities of the copyright law was introduced last summer.

Recent amendments by the Senate's judiciary committee have put teeth into the bill. The proposals give states rights to protect pre 1972 recordings in their antipiracy acts and protects them from pre-emption by the federal statutes. The committee gave the nod to stiffer penalties - up to 3 years for first offenders and 7 for repeaters and fines of \$25,000 - \$50,000. The bill will go to the Senate floor and then to the House.

A recent Mississippi district court decision opened the way for federal agents to destroy the millions of dollars worth of equipment and tapes they seized over the past few years.

Even with the gains made to date, the ease of re-recording will always present new forms of fake tape sales.

Disco tapes are emerging in U.S. cities with new hits of top stars. There are reports of legit record reps breaking disco singles on the pirate tapes which often bring the song out faster than the radio.

Top 40 tapes sold in high school courtyards, "private" tape exchange clubs, fake "sound alikes" and outright counterfeit packaging of pirate tapes promise to continue to cost the industry, artists and publishers millions in lost sales. But it is getting tougher for the pirate.

I'll take a look at the pirate scene in Canada over the next few weeks.
