



## Harrold announces major appointments for Polydor

Tim Harrold, President of Polydor Ltd., has announced 6 major staff appointments for '76.

Dieter Radecki, who began with Polydor as Vancouver Sales Manager then promoted to Director of National Sales, has been named to the position of Vice-President of Marketing and Sales; Leo Da Silva, formerly Managing Director of Polydor Hong Kong, will continue to co-ordinate the activities of Polydor's centralized warehouse system and has been named as Vice-President of Operations.

Allan Katz continuing to direct the activities of Polydor's regional promotion teams while administering national publicity, press and advertising from Montreal headquarters, has been appointed Director of Promotion

and Creative Services. Peter Horvath, having joined Polydor 8 years ago as a member of the Ontario Sales staff and then as Special Projects Manager in Montreal has been appointed Polydor A&R Director.

Alun Elias will continue to operate from Polydor's Toronto offices at the post of Director of National Accounts. While continuing in his position as Regional Sales Manager, Elias will act as liaison officer between Polydor and the major national Accounts. Pierre Fyfe, having joined Polydor 6 years ago as a branch manager and most recently to the position of tape and import manager, has been appointed to the post of Senior Manager Special Projects and Sales Coordination.

## Columbia's Pagliaro to Ben Kaye for management

Ben Kaye has signed Pagliaro to "a multi-year personal management contract" running the full gamut of management from getting up in the morning to going to bed at night. Kaye, one of the original and perhaps most successful of Quebec's producer/managers, will guide Pagliaro's career from the administration standpoint as well as the coordination of Pagliaro's production and publishing companies.

Kaye will also shoulder the chore of "talking deals", on behalf of Pagliaro, with agents and recording execs in Europe and the U.S.

Kaye became one of the "strong-

men" in Quebec music in the early 60s when he successfully launched and managed the careers of the province's top recording groups including Les Baronets and Les Clas-sels. He was also lately involved with English Canadian groups including Tinker's Moon and Joey Gregorash and others. His knowledge of the music industry covers the full spectrum from production to publishing to management.

Pagliaro is presently working on material for a cross-Canada tour to be launched, through Kaye, at Place des Arts in Montreal. He will also be performing at this year's Juno Awards' show, March 15.

## Harmonium & new appointees guested at Columbia dinner

Columbia took advantage of the 1st day of March to host an intimate dinner for their new CBS Disques' acquisition, Harmonium, and to introduce a few of the new appointees to the firm. The dinner, attended by members of the major and trade press, was held in the Crown Room of the Prince Hotel and was hosted by the label's president Terry Lynd, who welcomed Harmonium to the fold with a few well chosen words with Jack Robertson, executive vice-president and the firming end of the Harmonium deal, "Bienvenu" the group with his Scot's French.

In for the dinner, as well as for meetings, were members of CBS Disques and Columbia's sales and promotion people. Introduced to the group was Quebec's new branch manager, Johnny Desjardins, formerly with RCA, the new Calgary branch manager, Wes Franchuk and Ontario's new promo rep, Ken McFarland.

Harmonium are now back in Montreal where they are putting the finishing touches on their initial LP for CBS Disques. The session is being produced in Harmonium's home stu-

dio with an assist from Johnny Williams, Director of A&R for CBS Disques.

Harmonium personnel are: Serge Fiori, Louis Valois, Michel Normandieu, Serge Locat, Pierre Daigneault and Denis Farmer. They have been nominated for a 1975 Juno as Group of the Year and are considered as the group with the most potential for Quebecois music.

## Sal Soul and RCA pact distrib & manufacturing deal

Ed Preston, vice-president and general manager of RCA has announced the manufacturing and distribution deal between RCA and Sal Soul.

Initial release is the Carol Williams and The Sal Soul Orchestra's disco/vocal version of More.

RCA moved in quickly to distribute a special 12" Disco-Mix 45, Feb 23 and shipped the single 2 days later.

Vincent Montana Jr. produced, arranged and conducted.

## Appeal denied

### to CBC and staffers

The CBC and 2 of its radio network employees, have been refused an appeal of conviction for contempt of court, by the Supreme Court of Canada.

Reasons were not given behind the denial of the request made by the Crown Corporation and Mark Starowicz, Max Allen, producer and story editor at the time of a CBC airing of an As It Happens feature concerning lead poisoning in January of 1974.

Canada Metal Ltd. and Toronto Refiners and Smelters Ltd., had received an advance notice that they were mentioned in the program and sought and received an injunction restraining the CBC from using certain portions of the program.

Changes were made to the feature, but the Ontario Supreme Court ruled that the program still violated the injunction.

Starowicz and Allen were both fined \$700, but the fine was to be suspended perpetually if costs were paid within 4 months. They lost their appeal to the Ontario Court of and had asked the Supreme Court to consider the case.

## Faith record product

### not Canadian - CRTC

The CRTC's Sjef Franken (AM Chief) has taken exception to RPM's obituary on Percy Faith (Feb 21/76) - in particular the information that Faith's record product qualified as Canadian content for the first year of the CRTC's content regulations for AM radio (1971). Franken advised RPM that Faith became a citizen of the U.S. in the 1940s.

One programmer observer expressed surprise and indignation over the news, explaining that he had been programming Percy Faith back catalogue as Cancon for many years, having never been advised that Faith's product from the 1971 era and prior did not qualify as Cancon. He suggested that the CRTC could assist programmers in advising on the citizenship status of name recording artists i.e. Joni Mitchell, Neil Young, the Band, David Clayton Thomas and others including the new west coast-based Heart.

Columbia had never indicated that Faith's record product was Cancon. They, like most record companies, utilize the RPM-designed MAPL logo to identify Cancon product. Charlie Camilleri, national promotion director for Columbia, advised RPM that although Faith spent many of his summers in Canada and constantly visited friends here, he had relinquished his Canadian citizenship several years ago, but had never made a public issue of the fact.

## Rainfall's Holt inks Higgins to personal management deal

Rainfall Productions' Jim Holt informed RPM that the management firm has signed Dee Higgins to a personal management contract.

Rainfall also manages Ray Materick, who is a partner with Holt in the firm.

## Rolf Harris debuts on new CTV series

Australian-born singer-entertainer Rolf Harris, best known for his hit of many years ago, Tie Me Kangaroo Down Sport, debuts on his own CTV variety series March 14. The series, entitled The Rolf Harris Show, features Harris' talents as an entertainer, painter, and character actor, as well as that of singer of Australian-flavoured novelty songs which established him in North America.

In the sixteen years since Tie Me Kangaroo Sport became a hit in North America, Harris has been successfully doing an international concert circuit, recording and writing songs (one which was recorded by Alice Cooper on an early album), and filming several series for the BBC.

Harris first came to Canada in

Swiatek is confident that Amherst will emerge as a "major manufacturer and distributor in Canada" with his recent releases. These include: three Amherst 45s, including 1 each by Canadians Scrubbaloe Caine and Bullwhip Brothers and 1 Amherst LP along with 4 recent 45s and 2 LPs on the Dick James label.

**Quality's Murray promo coast to coast in Canada**

Bruce Murray has been part of an extensive promo campaign co-ordinated by Quality Records and Balmur Ltd.

The push began in late December

with an advance hand-delivery of the Murray debut LP and various press interviews. By mid-February, Quality launched initial product with the album, the current working single titled *Miracle Man*, a poster, bio, photo and photo. Quality's Cancon promo manager Nick Panaseiko followed up with a "blitz of radio stations" February 9th-16th with stopovers to outlets in Toronto, Hamilton, London and Kitchener markets.

Following interviews with CKEY-Toronto's Pete McGarvey, CHML-Hamilton's Johnny Murphy, CFPL-London's Ian Davies and the London Free Press' Judy Malone, Murray trekked along Western Canada logging interviews with CBC-Winnipeg and the Winnipeg Free Press' Janice Keys, before hitting Saskatoon (20) where he

guested at CFQC-TV with Ned Powers of the Star-Phenix. After completion of interviews at CFAC-TV and CFCN-Calgary (23), Murray rehearsed with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra



(24) and taped an appearance with sister Anne (25) for a forthcoming television special.

"Rounding out his schedule" with a 2-day visit of the British Columbia market (26-27), Bruce returned to Toronto (28) beginning rehearsal with his new band for 3 weeks before hitting the road.

"Though Anne has provided a valuable avenue of exposure for Bruce," notes Quality's Panaseiko, "his own talents will ultimately determine the degree to which he is accepted in the marketplace." According to Quality, approximately 70 Canadian radio outlets have playlisted cuts from the Murray LP, with MOR stations favouring *Belle Of The Ball*, *Bitter They Are Harder They Are, Harder They Fall* and *Sunshine Song*.

**American songwriting fest ready for 3rd annual event**

The American Songwriting Festival has announced its third annual songwriting competition and showcasing is now open for entries.

Tad Danz, managing director, has also announced the naming of Al Kasha, Academy-award winning composer of the Maureen McGovern hit, *The Morning After*, as final judge in the new lyric competition segment of the Festival.

Kasha will not only be responsible for selecting the final winner of twen-

ty top entries, but has also been commissioned to compose an original melody to accompany the winning lyrics.

The lyric competition is new to the annual fest, which gives recognition to deserving talent selected by respected professionals in the music industry, because of numerous requests from both writers and publishers, for

Musical categories include country, MOR, folk, gospel and soul - in amateur and professional divisions.

All in all, there will be 650 prizes offered this year, more than double that of last year.

Last year's Best Song winners, Peter Thom (a Canadian) and Phil Galdston took top honours with their song, Why Don't We Live Together. Besides receiving more than \$30,000 in prizes, they had their song recorded by Barry Manilow on his Tryin' To Get The Feelin' album, even before they were selected as grand prize winners.

### Singwell success with Metro entry

Singwell Ltd. Creative Productions Centre, headed up by former major market programmers, Ken Sebastian Singer and John Wells, reports to RPM that the Saskatchewan recording artist, Metro, was recently presented with a "cast-iron" disc commemorating sales "beyond all expectations."

The Eleven Days From Christmas LP, recorded by Metro at Vancouver's Singwell Studios, was test-marketed in Saskatchewan. As well, airplay in Edmonton "sparked unbelievable response."

"Product was sold out in Saskatchewan in 3 days. Marketing was limited due to the fact that this was the "test" year for the LP, but due to the overwhelming demand, plans are now underway to sell the album in Manitoba next year. A second LP will be scheduled over the summer months.

Singwell Ltd. has plans to syndicate a series titled Metro's Metric System, with sessions planned over the next few months.


The system was debuted with the C.B. Victoria LP recently produced there by Mat McCaulay.

## Ross leads Motown action for February and March

Leading Motown's pack of solid hit releases is Diana Ross with *I Thought It Took A Little Time (But Today I Fell In Love)*, now getting the Ron Newman personal promo treatment. The original Supreme was recently in the news, attending the funeral of a former Supreme member who had died "in poverty" of a heart attack.

Off and looking good are LPs by The Temptations, Marvin Gaye, the Jackson 5, Rare Earth and country's "bottle-popper" T.G. Sheppard.

Toronto's El Mocambo will be home for Jr. Walker & The All-Stars, the latter part of March.

## Charlebois doing it to European film industry

Quebec-Canada's Robert Charlebois "the man who revolutionized rock with his fractured combination of French and American sounds" is featured in a new Italian "spaghetti western" titled *Un Genie deux Associes et une Cloche*, distributed in French Canada by Films Mutuel. The film is directed by Damiano Damiani and produced by Clint Eastwood trilogy director Sergio Leone.

Paris is already setting a strong box-office pace for the film with more than 150,000 fans attending the film during its first week of release.


Charlebois' current LP is titled *Longue Distance* and reveals "an older and sadder Charlebois, compared to the almost wild gaiety of his more youthful productions." The cut, *Creole Punch* "hearkens to the southern blacks of French tongue." Total effect of the LP is described as "mocking as ever and yet gently underscored with sympathetic strains of harmonica, fiddle and the faint rhythm of steel drum." One cut, *Le Frog*, that could emerge as a single, has the heavy influence of CBS Disques' producer, Johnny Williams, who dropped in on the session and offered a few suggestions that were apparently considered.

Charlebois has had enormous record sales in France, and was previously distributed under the Barclay label by Polydor, Canada.

Prompted by a statement to a Quebec underground magazine, that it's now the time "for people to look reality in the face . . . the answers can no longer wait on the hesitations of nationalist politicians. To save man, decisions must be made for the entire planet," Charlebois projects his taking over the luxury liner *France*, which he'll turn into a "Bateau Ivre" (a reference to a poem by the French poet Rimbaud). He'll fill the ship with scientists, artists, rich food and music, cruising the seas with alternate loads of North Americans and Europeans, sparking off the "understanding of nature and life", without which he fears for man's future existence.

The Charlebois rock-sound sprang as a product of the Quebecois nationalistic mood of the late 60s. The performer has been noted as Quebec's original "King of Rock."

# The Juno Awards

RPM held its first music poll at the end of 1964, canvassing the industry to find out who rated and how they rated. The results of the poll appeared in the December 28th, 1964 edition of RPM.

Grealis: It was kind of strange that the year hadn't ended and here we were announcing the results. We polled the industry and made the announcement the same month.

As artists and companies discovered who was nominated, they were quick to place ads to further promote the poll. Then the companies wanted a scroll or a plaque - or "something".

Grealis: In early 1970 we decided to have the first formal award presentation. I can remember that Diane Leigh received the first award ever presented and because it was a new thing, she practically didn't come up on stage to accept it. The date was Feb 23rd, 1970.

Attendance at that first award presentation was 250 people and it was all by invitation.

Grealis: It was a night for the industry and we invited everyone we could think of - to come and eat and drink and it worked well. . . the first year. The second year the Junos became a social event and we had a bit of trouble. Obviously, when you invite some and leave out others, you have a problem. The third year the Junos were so accepted that it became a bit of a monster. In 1973 we held the last Junos by invitation and I think about 1200 people attended. The food and liquor bill was incredible. The Junos had become too big.

Toronto Star's Marci McDonald wrote of the 1972 Junos: "it was a ceremony that lasted not quite an hour, lagged not a second and was carried off with such simple panache and despatch that it made all those interminable bigtime glory shows, the Grammies and the Oscars and even the Canadian Film Awards, look like amateur night at the high-school gym."

Grealis: This was really a great compliment to Stan Klees who had produced every Juno show up to 1973 - small reward really for all the work and effort he put into the shows. It's interesting to look back and realize



that we had solid support from all the artists including Anne Murray, Gordon Lightfoot, Stompin' Tom Connors, the Guess Who and many more.

It was obvious from the reviews, and comments of those in the industry that the Juno Awards had made the grade and were becoming a nationally-known industry affair.

Klees: Grealis always wanted to keep it (the Junos) an industry show. I agree with his thinking that the mystique of the Awards was a big selling point. Outsiders looked at the Junos as some kind of an inside thing that they could only read about. The idea of all these stars and record people getting together at a mammoth do, tantalized them and they wanted to hear or read more. The media acceptance of the Junos was great. So were the costs. They were staggering for a small publication like RPM. The next year it was a pay affair.

Grealis: That ended the problem of who was invited and who wasn't. You just paid - and got in.

In 1974, the industry decided that the Junos should be on television. Initial approaches to RPM indicated little promise of more than a low-budget show with too few viewers, so the 1974 ceremonies were planned to be a prototype performance of a televised Juno show. It was expensive and not

without problems. Mainly, the Junos were concerned with "rock artists and rock music" and that wasn't considered prime-time TV fare - at that time.

Grealis: In 1975 we had to go to television. We had no choice. The Junos went to television.

Fortunately it was a good year for the industry and the show came off reasonably well. Most criticism was aimed at the dress of the artists and the unimaginative acceptance speeches.

Grealis: Now that the Academy has been formed, it has distributed the share of responsibility a bit better. The Junos became very big and we needed the help in getting the artists together and it helps to have the nominations and voting in the hands of representatives of the industry.

Klees: The Academy has worked very closely with us to assure that the Junos are a success. After all, it is the industry that is at stake and everyone wants the best show that is humanly possible.

So we come to this year's Junos and a crucial point in the industry. It's TV Juno Awards show number two and it has sparked a great deal of interest. In its 90 minutes it promises to answer the criticisms of last year.



# 13th annual Juno presentation

## to be viewed by more than 3 million

This year's television production of the 13th annual Juno Awards presentation, the biggest CBC-TV variety special and most widely-viewed showcase of Canadian recording talent to be exposed via television in Canada, promises to firmly establish the event as prominent national network TV fare.

CBC's Variety staff has been planning this year's 90-minute live broadcast with the directors of the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences from the time the curtain went down on Juno 1975. Following detailed planning involving 20 CBC production people over the past 6 weeks, at midnight, March 9, CBC crews will descend on Toronto's Ryerson Theatre to begin the week's work on the setting and technical systems for the Mar. 15 telecast.

They will more than double the area of the existing 2000 square foot stage and prepare for the 100 input audio control, 7 camera video, lighting, staging and makeup systems to be manned by more than 55 CBC production personnel on the Juno night. "Ryerson Theatre is just 4 walls," explains CBC's Juno producer, John Thompson, "We have to rebuild the entire theatre to be a television studio for just 1 night."

Even with the massive conversion work, Ryerson Theatre's 4 walls will be pressed to house the staging of dozens of Canada's better-known show-business stars, performing or receiving or presenting this year's 19 awards, backed by a 27-piece tuxedoed orchestra with chorus and dancers. The streets outside will be crowded with more droning mobile equipment than are seen outside Maple Leaf Gardens on hockey broadcast nights.

CBC Variety chief Jack McAndrew says that last year's broadcast was a satisfactory first effort but this year demands changes by both the CBC and the music industry people involved, "I can build the frame, put the wire behind it, put the nail in the wall and even say what the picture is," says Thompson, "but the industry people are going to have to paint it."

Thompson and McAndrew estimate that more than 3 million Canadians will see this year's telecast to be aired live east of the Manitoba border and

delayed for western telecast. Ratings for last year's show are not available as it was aired during disruption of the mail services.


CARAS secretary-treasurer Brian Robertson emphasizes that now the Junos are more than a trade occasion, "We have to showcase the entire industry." CARAS directors and CBC production people are concerned about the often non-serious appearance of many Juno participants last year and stress the importance that everybody look and act as if they are facing 3,000,000 Canadians through the eye of the live camera even though many have no previous experience on such a stage.



Juno producer John Thompson came to Canada from Australia in 1963 and worked for the CBC as a cameraman until he became a service producer (editing supervisor) in the late 60's. Two years ago he became a full producer responsible for a number of variety specials and the televised Juno and ACTRA Awards. He says of this year's Juno telecast "I can build the frame, put the wire behind it, put the nail in the wall and even say what the picture is, but the industry people are going to have to paint it."

"Music people are imaginative people as well as professional performers," Thompson remarked, "and they have to dress and act in a way which makes this obvious to the viewers, most of whom will be seeing many of the stars for the first time."

Rehearsals for this year's show begin Friday March 12, with sessions on Saturday and Monday. On Sunday (14) the CBC will host a suite at the Inn on the Park, which is housing an RPM-sponsored industry conference weekend, to view last year's telecast



Jack McAndrew, who recently became head of CBC TV Variety programming says that the network has been paying a lot more attention to the Canadian music industry lately and are opening new lines between themselves and Canadian record producers. He says "The Junos itself is a big boost for CBC-TV because it helps to establish as TV fare the same artists we want to expose throughout the year. The Junos on TV are not preaching to the converted as were the Junos of the past. If we all produce a good show, all our interests are served."

and cassettes of this year's rehearsals. "Last year," Thompson remembers, "we were under the misapprehension that most music industry people knew each other, but there was an obvious lack of familiarity and casual warmth between many participants before the cameras." Thompson hopes the longer rehearsal time, participation at the Inn and a buffet dinner between Monday's rehearsal and show will bring out a sense of community among the show's participants.

This year's musical presentations, both the live performances and the incidental music, will be punchier and more contemporary than last year. All but 1 featured headline performance will be done live before the camera.

The 27-piece show orchestra will be literally up-front this year (last year it was buried off-camera) and its star-backup and medley performances are arranged to sound as close to the original hits as possible. The incidental music in last year's show was criticised for not being in the same style as the sounds for which artists were getting awards. All music this year is arranged by Toronto's David Woods.

The 90-minute telecast will be more varied than 1975's 60-minute presentation and the award announcements more dramatic. Thompson will direct 7 cameras, 5 of them to screen nominees as the names are read from the stage and 1 will capture each winner the moment the announcement is made. The video work for this and the full staging of live acts requires 2 directors and 3 assistant directors.

Each live act will appear on its own set on the original theatre stage. While crowd ceremonies take place on auxiliary staging, sets will be switched behind the drawn curtain which opens 4 ways to reveal each new act.

In addition to the live acts staged between award presentations, the home and theatre audiences will be treated to a medley of the songs which

earned their songsters composer of the year nominations and a taped short to heighten interest in the best album graphics award.

Responding to complaints that record ads between segments of last year's show was not in good taste, CBC and CARAS agreed to sell no commercial time to music industry firms this year.



The Juno Awards' telecast is not only a big event for the recording industry but for CBC TV Variety as well. CBC Variety chief Jack McAndrew points out that several performing artists will be making their English network TV debut and that many of the featured nominees have been seen often on regular and special CBC musical broadcasts. In fact, most of the 75 nominations for awards in the 14 artists categories are held by performers who have recently or will soon appear on CBC variety productions.

CBC is now beginning production of a Hagood Hardy special, planned to prelude the ACTRA awards presentations to be televised April 21. The show will stage Hardy's band with 2 ballet stars and Toller Cranston. Hardy will perform on Juno night and is nominated in 3 categories.

Preliminary talks with Joni Mitchell, McAndrew reports, find the singer-composer agreeable to a 1-hour special next year and 2-time nominee Anne Murray, who broke in on CBC broadcasts out of Halifax, has a 1-hour special next season. Sylvia Tyson, nominated for 3 Junos, recently had a 1-hour special and she and the CBC are discussing another.

Bachman-Turner Overdrive, having nailed down 4 nominations, have produced a documentary show on themselves and McAndrew says he has been waiting to see it. Homemade Theatre is working on a CBC children's series and is talking about other appearances.

By the time the Junos are staged Murray McLauchlan will have completed taping a 1-hour special in Vancouver. Bruce Cockburn appears with him and Howie Meeker is doing the mid-show highlights.

categories, will be featured on his own 1-hour special next season and the CBC has set a 1-hour special for Gino Vannelli, who has 2 nominations this year.

Flautist Moe Koffman appears regularly on the noon-hour Bob McLean show and the CBC is planning a special featuring guitarist Liona Boyd.

Folksinger Valdy appeared on Sylvia Tyson's recent special and the CBC is considering a Valdy special for next year. Dan Hill has recently appeared on the Bob McLean show but his performance on the Juno night will be a prime-time CBC network debut for him.

In country music, Tommy Hunter hosts CBC variety's most popular show viewed by more than 2,200,000 Canadians. The show has featured nominees Susan Jacks, Carroll Baker and the Mercey Brothers and the CBC is planning to present winners of next fall's Big Country Awards, to take place in Edmonton, on Hunter's show.

Quebec artists are much more prominently represented in this year's

Juno presentations, both as nominees and performers, and all of the Quebec nominees and performers have been featured on CBC-Radio Canada's French network broadcasts recently. Weekly network music show Vedette En Direct has staged Beau Dommage, Raoul Duguay, Maneige, Harmonium and Michel Pagliaro. The latter is making his English network debut on Juno night.

Also making her English network debut is Suzanne Stevens who has appeared recently on Saturday Night network show Monsieur B. and noon-hour Les Coqueluches. Pagliaro has also appeared on Monsieur B.

Jean-Pierre Ferland and Andre Gagnon have each had 1-hour specials on Sunday night national feature show Les Beaux Dimanches.

Juno host John Allan Cameron has a very successful weekly CTV network show and many other Juno nominees, such as the Carlton Showband, appear often on CTV shows, Pig & Whistle, Bobby Vinton and Funny Farm.

## Cameron and live acts highlight Juno Award night

Headed by Juno host, Columbia Records' and CTV star John Allan Cameron, more than 40 recording artists and media people will be on stage for the March 15 nationally televised Juno Awards ceremony. Performing live with a 27-piece orchestra, will be Michel Pagliaro (What The Hell I've Got), Hagood Hardy (The Homecoming), Carroll Baker (I've Never Been This Far Before), Suzanne Stevens (Make Me Your Baby), Dan Hill (You Make Me Want To Be), Valdy (Yes I Can) and Blood Sweat & Tears (Mean Old World).

Video Clips of Gino Vannelli and

Bachman-Turner Overdrive will also be screened.

Sales figures to be submitted are net unit sales times suggested list price. Tape sales should be included in album sales. (Each company may submit one entry per category. These entries will be submitted to an independent auditor. Submitting companies must be prepared to submit to examination by the auditor.

Budget, premium, promotional and record club sales should not be included on entries. Budget is defined as selling at less than half of regular full line retail price.

Net sales figures should be for a fourteen month period beginning with November 1st of the prior year and concluding the last day of the subject year.

Five nominations in each category will be listed on a ballot that will be mailed to each member of CARAS. These ballots will be returned to an independent auditor who will tabulate the results. The winners will be kept confidential until the presentations of the Awards on March 15.

Nominees for Composer of the Year will be the first ten Canadian composers as determined by the best selling single records (Category 2). These ten nominees would be listed on the ballot with the titles of their qualifying compositions. A co-composer would qualify.

Nominees for Female, Male, Group and Country Female, Country Male, Country Group and Folksinger would be based on the top five best selling artists in each category. The definition of sales would be the same as in the sales category except that the figure submitted by each company for each entry would be net unit sales during the 14 month period for all qualifying recorded product: i.e. singles, LP's and tapes. Each company may submit up to five (5) entries in each category. If an artist has product released on more than one label, total sales would qualify.

Nominees for the Best New Artist category would also be based upon sales with the following qualifications. The first record by the artist must have been released within the subject year or the prior year. A prior winner would be excluded from the nominees. A group with a name change along with a significant change in personnel would qualify as a new group.

Nominees for Producer of the Year will be those associated with the five best selling singles and five best selling albums.

Recording Engineer category will be voted on by a panel of five (5) members of the Canadian Independent Record Producers' Association. Results will be submitted to an independent auditor.

# Juno Awards and the Academy

Some controversy reigns about the nominations and voting in conjunction with the Juno Awards. This is nothing new for the Junos and any other complicated awards system. The problem is mainly a lack of understanding. On the opposite page, we have published the regulations set down by the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (CARAS) which outlines the rules.

To anyone interested in knowing how the nominees come to be, the rules are quite clear.

In some cases the Academy officers admit that the process will have to be continually refined.

This year the Academy invited more outside assistance, namely an

The input from these people to the Academy is what creates the rules and regulations to govern the nominations and voting.

All Academy members can study the regulations as they stand now, and make suggestions for improvements to the Academy (in writing) which would be discussed at future meetings. That input to the Academy is necessary if the rules are to be representative of the membership.

We talked to Brian Robertson, Secretary Treasurer of CARAS. We asked about the possibility of falsifying record sales for the nominations. Brian told us. "When we see the provisional list of nominees, we have the option of making spot audits, which we have done this year, of a number of companies."

Even record dealers were canvassed at random to verify sales figures of records that didn't look right to the CARAS organization. Every attempt was made to assure that the figures were accurate. When there is real doubt companies will be audited.

Record companies generally felt that their prestige and position in the industry was at stake and there could be no suggestion of false sales figures.

Robertson told us the voting ballots were mailed under the supervision of Thorne & Riddell, a Canadian chartered accountancy firm with an international reputation.

Canadian citizenship was also a question that the Academy anticipated trouble with. This too proved not to be a problem.

Mel Shaw, President of CARAS and

more important, it must look right.

CARAS also looks after the presenters and the performers and they have agreed that no performer will appear two years in a row. Most presenters and performers are chosen by the Academy from lists of past Juno winners and nominees, Academy suggestions and those who have some status in the industry. The executive agrees on the lineup and then it's a case of finding those who are willing and available and who will cover the various aspects of music.

Shaw felt that this year the artists appearing on the Junos are very conscious of the criticism of their dress last year and their acceptance speeches. This year there would appear to be a great deal of concern by the artists appearing and those expecting to win - about coming across well on national television. The backlash of last year's show is causing many to be concerned.

CARAS was originally formed when Juno Awards gathered together representatives of the industry to assist in advising Juno on future Awards presentations. From these early meetings grew the Academy which is a non-profit organization which assists the Juno Awards in bringing the industry to the attention of the public and promoting the Canadian recording artist.

The Academy believes they are really getting the whole thing together and are encouraged by the interest that has been generated from all across Canada. Shaw felt that the Awards had to work because, "so many people wanted them to work."

He concluded with, "Speaking on behalf of the Academy, we are all enthused about Walt Grealis being on the show and getting the recognition he deserves for being the originator of the Awards. That's very important."

### RAY MATERICK

It's Materick's 3rd LP which he says stems more from his 1st, Side Streets rather than his 2nd, Neon Rain. With steel, mandolin and acoustic support from Ancaster, Ontario's Don Lanois and bass and fiddle from Bob Doige there's an added country ring helped along by producer Don Potter, a singer-songwriter from Nashville.

Potter heard a 2-track tape of a couple of Materick's songs, decided he wanted to produce the LP, met the artist in Toronto and went into Phase One studios the next day to begin 10 days session work on 11 original Materick cuts, some good on the first take. Materick says that Potter demanded and got the kind of spontaneity and freshness that goes with his newer more definite material. Materick's voice has matured since Neon Rain.

The featured title song and the current 3-chart hit, Feelin' Kinda Lucky Tonight, and other cuts will establish Materick as a songwriter. They're direct and sensitive enough to be performed by a variety of artists including MOR and country singers as well as in Materick's own rough-folk style. The 3-chart appeal is not limited to the hit and there are some songs introspective enough for FM fare as well (i.e. Lady of Night, Goodbye Again).





# WEA's Ray Materick - feelin' kinda lucky this year

Ray Materick's promo has been saying this is going to be his year. That's a hard act to follow but the Asylum recording artist is doing just that.

Right now he has a 3-chart hit on *Feelin' Kinda Lucky Tonight*, released last month and shipped in the jacket of the album released just this week. The 45 is now No. 25 on the RPM Country Playlist, 31 on the RPM Pop Playlist and breaking into RPM's Top 100 (No. 81 with a bullet).

Following the LP's release, Materick and Jim Holt, who with the artist, manages his career through their Rainfall productions, have set a 2-week date at Toronto's Riverboat and a swing through the west, covering Winnipeg, Calgary, Edmonton and 10 dates in B.C. The month of May sees Materick heading into the northwest U.S. and down to Pasadena and Denver. WEA and Rainfall are looking for a U.S. release for the LP to heighten the tour. Electra/Asylum (U.S.) president Mel Posner and international A&R Jerry Shorel recently caught a guest set of Materick's at Toronto's Riverboat and were reportedly very happy with what they saw, which should influence the company's action south of the border.

*Feelin' Kinda Lucky* broke first on the country playlists and this is indicative of the direction Materick has been taking. Materick says the new LP takes off from his first LP, *Side Streets*, more than his last one, *Neon Rain*. "It's a return to my roots, country music has been a big influence on me but I'm really not a country singer. I'm sort of uptown, uptown country."

The new LP was produced by Don Potter of Nashville and shows off the pedal steel and fiddle work on several very tasteful and uncomplicated arrangements of 12 Materick originals. Even though they met only the day before going into Toronto's Phase One

to tape the LP, Materick felt very close to Potter who he says has a style very similar to his own. Potter recently played a week at the Riverboat himself. "He's a free-form producer who demands spontaneity."

On the LP, Materick worked with steelman Don Lanois and bassman Bob Doige and cellist Mike Bacon. Lanois, from Ancaster, Ontario, also plays mandolin and acoustic guitar and Doige doubles on fiddle and flute. Both are now part of Materick's travelling package.

Rainfall's Holt singles out the national promo done by Rainfall and WEA for the quick success of the new single. Rainfall now has an office in Calgary which broke the record on western stations simultaneously with the east. Holt expects the dates in B.C., where Materick hasn't appeared in almost 2 years, will firmly establish the artist there.

WEA promo chief Larry Green says that the best promo tool he has is Materick's live performances, especially out west. On top of that they've done a full mailing of the LP and plan to beef up in-store display. Their promo really began 1 month before the LP release when they mailed out the 45 in the LP jacket to bring attention to the album.

The new LP is already giving Materick a break in Europe. Michael Soren-

sen of Danmarks Radio (Radio Denmark) picked up some Materick material on a recent visit to Canada, aired a Materick special Feb 26 and called in to tell the artist that the response was great. Holt plans to go to Europe in the fall to set up a Rainfall office there to manage European promo and tours of a number of Canadians.

Materick feels he has developed his songwriting to a point where it is more sensitive and more true to how he and most listeners actually feel. "I'm writing about things which people have more definite feelings about." This makes his material more accessible to new fans and to other artists and Rainfall through Materick's Fat Music, which co-publishes his material with WEA's Don Valley Music, is actively working to place several of his songs with other Canadian and U.S. artists.

Materick has slowly built a following since his first Riverboat appearance when he played 1 set to 2 people. "If you were a Canadian folksinger 5 years ago," he says "you're lucky to be alive today."

Materick however, has learned the business. As well as singing, songwriting, recording and performing, he has a hand in publishing and management for himself and other artists. Now he wants to produce, possibly on a co-production basis with Potter. He's already talking about his own next LP and would like to work with Potter, possibly tracking on Dee Higgins, who has just signed with Rainfall.

## Bay City Rollers rolling with Capitol Platinum

Capitol-EMI (Canada) marketing director, Dave Evans has announced that the 2nd Arista Bay City Rollers LP, *Rock and Roll Love Letter*, will be shipped Platinum (initial orders above the 100,000 mark needed for platinum status) when released Mar 8. The Scottish group's debut LP, *The Bay City Rollers*, has topped the RPM Top 100 LPs chart for the past 5 weeks.

This is only the 4th time in Canada that a record company has reported platinum shipping here. Previously, Elton John, Pink Floyd and Capitol's *Beau Dommage* have had LPs with initial shipments topping 100,000. Evans reports that Toronto shipping alone exceed 100,000 and the Calgary branch will ship more than 50,000 to fill advance orders.

The Rollers have a North American tour set for the summer with at least 1 Canadian date. The new LP contains their current hit, *Money Honey*, which is No. 1 this week on the RPM 100 Singles chart.

## Good Brothers establish sounds of "good grass"

Twins Bruce and Brian (autoharp, guitar), younger brother Larry Good (banjo), Michael McMaster (bass) and fiddler Carl Kees are the Good Brothers - a "new grass" bluegrass band that have developed an exceptional audience rapport and distinctive harmony style to make them giants in the club and festival business in Canada.

Their sound is traditional bluegrass, toe-tappingly renowned as one of the basic strains of North American popular music.

The band was originally formed in 1969 with lead singer James Ackroyd. Known as James & The Good Brothers, they played small clubs and coffee-houses and cut an LP for Columbia with an assist from the Grateful Dead's Jerry Garcia. The album, unfortunately, "never sold particularly well" and James went the way of musical oblivion, splitting from the band.

The "fan phenomenon" of the Good Brothers began to emerge 4 years ago, as club owners began to notice SRO crowds thronging to experience the pleasure of a Goods performance. Owners of Toronto's El Mocambo Tavern, who had been featuring the band in their sans covercharge downstairs room, decided on establishing the boys upstairs in their "key" covercharge area - the result of which had the LLBO demanding that crush barriers be installed and structural engineers called in to check on the dancing area.



The Carroll Baker backup is Roy Penney's Country Sunshine. For some of her engagements Baker was backed by Regina's Sheila Ann Show.

Baker's last 2 releases hit No. 1 on RPM's Country Playlist. Her latest, One Night Of Cheatin', topped the RPM Playlist this week which, along with Palmer's Lady single, gives Gaiety 2 No. 1 singles in the last 2 weeks.

There's a new LP by Funny Farm's Blake Emmons, Brian Sklar and Ron Jeffery, both members of Emmons' band Prairie Fire, each have an LP and Con Archer has 2.

Condor's Hosier reports that over the next 2 months there are LP sessions slated for 11 others including former Marathon yodeller Bill Snow and Newf singer Jean Pardy.

Country group, Buckshot, will be cutting a session shortly along with bluegrassier Tom Wadom.

March is set for fiddlers Ricky Cormier and Eleanor Townsend, with each cutting LP material. April sessions have been set for Diane Leigh, Carl Elliott, Ben Weatherby, Good Tyme Singers and Winston James.

Just added to the Condor roster are Dave Burton and Gord Honeyman, a duo who have played the southern Ontario circuit. Their initial single, Two of A Kind, has been shipped.

Charmer and straight-ahead promo person Joyce Barslow did her usual





disclosed amount of single product.

The St. Michael cut from the LP, That's The Kind of Man I Am, will be culled as a single for release within the next few weeks. The LP, Good Grass, is being projected for a late spring release.

Included on the album will be half of the material recorded last fall (with Mitchell) and the remainder, comprising new material with Cliff Edwards doing the producing. The session is now underway at RCA's Toronto studios.

Margaret Good, wife of Bruce (and singer on CTV's Ronnie Prophet series) had been managing the business side of the Good Brothers - since their development from coffeehouse act to record-breaking houseband. Thwarted in her previous attempts to secure the band a recording contract, she turned to the Toronto firm of Dixon-Props Ltd., resulting in a management contract guaranteeing the band exposure throughout Canada and the U.S. The Good Brothers also retain Dick Flohil's Creative Arts Company for the handling of publicity and promotion.

The live signing of the Good Brothers over the Bob McLean show was considered a coup for the Dixon-Props firm, but the additional 15 minutes of playing bluegrass over the 30 minute show was definitely a coup for the thousands of noon-hour television viewers.


