Big Tree & WEA Int'l pact worldwide agreement

WEA International has obtained exclusive rights to the Big Tree catalogue for distribution outside the U.S. through its 11 affiliate companies and 33 licensees around the world.

Initial release is the England Dan & John Ford Coley single, I'd Really Love To See You Tonight, already a hit in Canada and No. 11 this week on the RPM 100. The first album release for the duo, Nights Are Forever, which contains the Love To See You single, is being rush-released in the U.S. and will be shipped simultaneously via WEA International. Dan and Coley have been firmed to share the CNE Grandstand (Toronto) billing with Neil Sedaka for Sept. 2.

In making the above announcement

Nesuhi Ertegun, President of WEA International, noted: "I'm very excited about this project, which we have been planning for quite some time. There has been a smooth working relationship over the past two and a half years between Big Tree and Atlantic Records, its U.S. distributor." He continued with: "It was natural therefore, that when Big Tree's prior distribution commitments outside the U.S. expired, the label would be free to join WEA International, the company that represents Atlantic worldwide. Atlantic's success in the U.S. with Big Tree must be given credit for bringing the label over to WEA International."

The New York-based Big Tree is headed by Doug Morris, President and Dick Vanderbilt, Vice President.

Kerenyi appointment

beefs up Cap press

Kris Kerenyi has been appointed Press Information Officer for Capitol-EMI Records of Canada. She replaces Mike Docker who has joined the label's A&R staff.

Kerenyi, a Ryerson graduate in Journalism, spent some time with the government in the Youth Secretariat prior to this appointment. She will report directly to Karen Ball.

Part of the duties Kerenyi will involve herself with include the documenting of biographical material on new and established acts within the Capitol roster and making this information available to radio programmers and the press. There will also be a heavy concentration on keeping the label's branches up to date on domestic and international happenings.

British Soundart product to be handled by Aristocorp

Aristocorp Ltd., a diversified marketing company with offices in Toronto, has been named a sole agent for Canada, the Caribbean and South America for Soundout Laboratories based in England. Soundout produces a line of electronic and audio equipment aimed at the discotheque market.

In making the announcement, Aristocorp president Boris D'Juran explained that besides a variety of mixers, speakers and the like, Soundout specializes in self-contained

twin-turntable stereo disco control consoles, with 170 watts per channel R.M.S. amplifiers that would be suited for a mobile disc jockey.

The company also handles a new decorative lighting device called Rope Lights, which can be bent and twisted into names or shapes.

All of the equipment handled by Aristocorp is on display at their Scarborough, Ontario offices.

Quebec disc market continues independence

Quality Records has announced that Walter Murphy's A Fifth Of Beethoven has gone gold in Canada, following the similar success of Andrea True's More More More. The success of the two songs is somewhat unusual in that their success began and remains concentrated in Quebec, although they are both English-language records. (Murphy's an instrumental). This isn't the first occasion for this type of happening - Tina Charles, for example, sold 50,000 copies of I Love To Love in Montreal alone, and held the number one spot at CKGM for six weeks, before the rest of Canada picked up on it. This seems to further demonstrate the independence of the Quebec market.

"The unusual thing," says Quality's George Struth, "is that the broadcast media in that market is giving us better exposure than the broadcast media in the English language market... 28% of the Canadian market (Quebec) has established Walter Murphy as a hit."

Perhaps even more unusual is the fact that both records went gold in Canada before achieving equivalent status in the U.S.

"Quebec has always been known for being self-contained and independent," one observer told RPM. "Now it seems strong enough with its disco scene to be the focal point in North America for some English-language record action as well as its own French language discs."

U.A.'s ELO : gold again may tour here in fall

U.A. reports that the Electric Light Orchestra has hit gold for their Ole ELO LP. The British group is currently on tour, and will be setting another Canadian concert series to be announced in the fall. The Jet-label group is touring with Widow Maker, also a Jet act.

Widow Maker features Ariel Bender, formerly Luther Grosvenor of Mott The Hoople and Spooky Tooth, and former Love Affair singer Steve Ellis.

GRT opens prairie sales office in Winnipeg

GRT National Marketing manager Jim Corbett has announced the opening of a sales office for the company in Winnipeg which will service Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

GRT had been distributed in that market by Laurel Records, and Corbett reports complete satisfaction with their work, and expresses regrets at termination of their agreement.

Don Gunter, formerly with Laurel, will be heading up the new GRT sales office. Assisting will be Dawn Smith, formerly with the Winnipeg Convention Centre.

Anka and Andy Warhol teamed for new U.A. LP

Either Paul Anka has gone underground, or Andy Warhol has surfaced. But the unlikely pair have teamed for Anka's upcoming U.A. LP, untitled at present.

Anka, as is his forte, is providing the music; Warhol is creating the album jacket design.

Roctrone's new fogger for quick cloud action

Roctrone, a Cambridge Massachusetts entertainment lighting firm, has developed a new electric cloud maker.

Roctrone's fogger holds one gallon of fog-producing liquid mixed from chemicals, Roctrone claims, which are available in hardware stores anywhere. The machine requires no hand pumping of the liquid into the heat chamber.

Roctrone has priced the new fogger at approximately \$100.

Max Webster - The new breed

One of Canada's more unusual bands is Max Webster, on SRO's Taurus label distributed by London. Their sounds are instantly recognizable by their unpredictable musical progressions and their absurd and abstract lyrics. On stage, guitarist, vocalist and composer Kim Mitchell dances around dressed outrageously and becomes the focal point of the audience's attentions. Mike Tilka, bassist, is only slightly less outlandish in his appearance and maintains a healthy share of an audience's affections. Max Webster believes that silliness is important, and that attitude has helped them build a devoted following through the levels of the Toronto bar-scene to the concert circuit. Their debut album, Max Webster, is number 32 on the RPM 100 this week and, lately, they've been critically acclaimed, even though critics usually abhor self-indulgence of any kind.

The problem with having an unusual name is that everyone asks where it came from. No one in the band is named Max Webster. They're getting tired of explaining it, but half of the name comes from a band Tilka used to play in, and the other half comes from a song that band used to play.

Tilka is from Detroit, where he divided his time between teaching high school and



playing in rock bands. Mitchell comes from many bands and backing one particular singer found himself working for a time on the Greek island of Rhodes. There's also drummer Paul Kersey from London Ontario and keyboard player Terry Watkinson, (formerly of Dee & The Yeomen) who writes some of the band's material, including a single called *Blowing The Blues Away* which has been garnering airplay since its release a few weeks ago. Watkinson is also an artist of the graphic kind, and is responsible for the inexplicable artwork on the album cover.

There's an important invisible fifth member who serves the same function as Keith Reid or Bernie Taupin. His name is Pye Dubois and his sole association with the group is as their lyricist. He writes part-time, and has a full-time job as a psychotherapist at the Clarke Institute of Psychiatry. (“We all met there one day as patients,” jokes Mitchell.)

“I don't think I write strange stuff,” Dubois told RPM. “It's very poetic. It may not be lyrics, but it's very poetic.”

Since the release of the album, Max Webster has been doing more concerts and moving out further and further from Toronto. A few months ago they scored the opening slot on Alice Cooper's Canadian tour, only to have their elation dashed when Cooper postponed the tour and cancelled his Canadian dates due to illness. They've been working harder because of that, and it seems to be paying off. They opened for Rush on that band's Ontario

dates, and received the rare compliment (for an opening band) of being brought back for an encore on all three nights of the Toronto dates. Recently they opened for Ritchie Blackmore's Rainbow in Montreal. It was Max Webster's first appearance in that city, but both David Freeston and Juan Rodriguez (from the Star and the Gazette respectively) had nothing but kind words for them (kinder, in fact, for them then for the headliners.) Freeston reported that Max Webster; “fronted by a charismatic loose-limbed loony... is the first Canadian group I've seen in a long, long time that actually has some class.” Rodriguez, meanwhile, found that: “Lo and behold, Max Webster won over the Montreal crowd - perhaps the day is not far off when they join Shawn Phillips and Genesis in the affections of the local audience.”

Tom Berry of SRO, Max Webster's management firm, reports that July was the group's most profitable month ever. He also reports that a concert at Ontario Place Forum drew over 6,000 fans.

Observers at the Sunny Days weekend musical festival near Peterborough Ontario reported that the band was one of the best-received, and that many fans were heard to say that they had come to the festival just to see Max Webster over more than a dozen other featured performers.

SRO and the band are looking to the fall for a major tour that will at last take them across the country. They'll find time to play for a week at a Montreal club to take advantage of their acceptance in that city.





New CIRPA Newsletter

CIRPA members concerned over reciprocal action

The first issue of the CIRPA NEWSLETTER, states: "This is the first CIRPA newsletter. Our purpose is to keep in better touch with our members about current CIRPA activities; issues which affect all of us; and what's happening in our segment of the Canadian record industry.

Our other purpose is to keep the media, radio stations, government and other segments of the industry informed about the activities of CIRPA and our members.

The success of the Newsletter depends upon the support it receives from CIRPA members. Please send us all your press releases, and up-to-date information on new releases, signings, touring and chart positions.

The newsletter will appear once a month."

CIRPA has contracted Earl Rosen for one year as Administrator. His primary functions are to improve internal CIRPA communication using newsletters, consultations and establish liaison with governmental and other organizations involved in the record industry.

At present, he is meeting with many CIRPA members to discuss their needs, and preparing briefs to different government departments and grant-giving agencies.

Also on the agenda is a membership drive.

CIRPA is approaching all independent record producers in Canada inviting them to join CIRPA. From their preliminary discussion with people in different positions in government, they have realized that CIRPA must be able to speak for most Canadian producers before they can begin to have a major impact on government policy makers and grant givers. The greater their membership, the greater opportunity to serve the Canadian record industry.

On June 16th, a new Board of Directors and Officers was elected for CIRPA. The new executive is Tom Williams - Attic Records - President; Jack Richardson - Nimbus - Vice President; Terry Brown - Toronto Sound - Sec. Tres.; Greg Hambleton - Axe Records - Past Pres.; Willi Morrison - B.C. Management - Director; Paul Hoffert - H.P. & Bell - Director; Terry Fludd - Aquarius Records - Director.

At the same meeting, several members expressed the need to be able to buy current records at a discount in order to be able to keep up with current trends. CIRPA has made an arrangement with Sam's whereby CIRPA members can purchase records at very close to cost price. This arrangement is only good at the stores Sam's owns, not franchise outlets.

In February, CIRPA commissioned Clarkson-Gordon to conduct a confidential study of information, along with the answers to a more general questionnaire, sent out at the same time, will be an essential part of any briefs CIRPA presents. The

study is almost completed, and is to be released in September.

CIRPA took a position on the Ontario Government's "Klopfch Report" and states: "In April, the Ministry of Industry and Tourism of Ontario circulated copies of a study of the recording industry prepared by one of their staff economists, Peter Klopfch. There were several points of great controversy in the report, particularly the recommendation that Ontario recommend that the Federal government impose a tariff

on imported masters which reflects the true value of the performance, not just the raw tape. Most upsetting about the recommendation was the implication that the recommendation came either from CIRPA or several of its members, in spite of the denial that any CIRPA member made such a recommendation. Several CIRPA members who are also CRIA members met with the Minister, Claude Bennett, along with the Deputy Minister and Peter Klopfch to clarify the situation. The delegation was assured that the matter would be studied further, but thus far, no word. A more positive aspect of the meeting was the interest the Minister took in the problems which will be caused by the reintroduction of the 7% sales tax on studio costs. This is a major issue which affects almost all CIRPA members, and we will be making several representations to the Ontario Government to try to have the policy changed."

CIRPA is also facing a problem with Federal taxes. The method of calculating the 12% Federal Sales Tax on records has been changed to increase the amount of tax payable by several companies. Since this cost cannot be passed on to the consumer, most of it must be born by the producer.

This issue is currently being taken up with the government by several CIRPA members.

President, Tom Williams has sent the following Telex to the Hon. Jeanne Sauve Minister of Communications on August 12, 1976.

"The Canadian Independent Record Producers Association, which represents the majority of Canadian owned record companies and producers, wishes to express its strong support for the policy of the Canadian government to encourage the development of the Canadian television, film and record industries.

At the same time, we wish to express our concern that these policies do not lead to countermeasures which inhibit or bar the export of Canadian productions to the United States. We feel that the policies proposed in the letter from Senators Jackson and Magnusson to Henry Kissinger would work against the interests of both countries and indeed, be a contravention of the principle of freedom of speech supported in both countries. The proposed bill, as it stands, works only to support the interests of the U.S. border broadcasters and will no doubt be opposed by the American film and record industries.

In the record industry, for instance, United States-originated products account for approximately 85-90 percent of the 131.7 million dollar Canadian market, (1974 wholesale figures). Royalty payments to the United States are estimated at between 15-30 million dollars. This does not include the profits of U.S. owned companies operating in Canada. In comparison the sale of Canadian records in the United States, relative to the sale of U.S. records in Canada is very small, although crucial to the viability of the Canadian record industry. It is clear from these figures that if the United States implements legislation of this kind, it could lead to reciprocal action which would cost U.S. industries far more than they would gain. At the same time any limitation of Canadian access to the U.S. market would be very damaging to our members.

The goal of CIRPA is not to eliminate U.S. access to the Canadian market, but to improve the conditions whereby we can compete in both Canada and the United States on a more equitable basis.

We urge that in the upcoming discussions between the Hon. A. Mac Eachern and the Hon. H. Kissinger, and in all future negotiations, the Canadian government press for increased opportunities for Canada in the United States market, and not accept any proposals which in any way limit our already limited access.

We believe that successful relations with the United States depends on the free flow of communications in both directions on an equitable basis. Such a free flow depends on having strong Canadian film, television and record industries.

CIRPA hopes the Canadian government will continue to encourage the development of these industries."

No sooner had Polydor released this album than it appeared on the RPM album chart at No. 99. This week it moves up to No. 34 after impressive American trade action.





Coyote gets Cap nod through new A&R deal

One of the first to be signed under Capitol's A&R agreement between Canada and the U.S., Coyote is now being readied for a two country release in September. The session was produced at Thunder Sound by John Copek.

Coyote were discovered by Ed Cowan who collared Capitol's Paul White who, in turn, caught the ear of Rupert Perry, Corporate Vice President at the Tower and it was an instant love affair.

The group, managed by Ron Dennis and booked through Music Shoppe International, comprises Gary Comeau, who dates back to Ottawa's Esquires in the early 60s, on pedal steel and electric guitar. Al Manning, lead guitar and vocals; Glen Le Compte, drums and vocals; Paul Lockyer, piano, organ, flute and vocals and Chuck Bergeron, bass and vocals.

Little Caesar re-records Sloopy, tours with Rollers

Tom Wilson, head of the Concept 376 Toronto booking agency, announced that a reformed Little Caesar and the Consuls was added to the Bay City Rollers Canadian tour.

The band, led by original drummer Gary Wright, have re-recorded their hit from 1963, My Girl Sloopy, produced by Paul Hoffert for Gronk Records, distributed by London.

The song was originally done on Red Leaf as a production by Stan Klees and reached the Top 50s on U.S. trades.

Wilson also announced the appointment of Rachal Rapaport to the position of artist relations manager for the Concept agency.

The positions responsibilities include the handling of all TV and radio relations for Concept artists.

Rapaport is still involved in artist management and public relations working with Brent Titcomb, Graeme Card, Jack Tobi, and Don Freed among other activities.

Aarons has been working freelance with the firm producing various commercial jingles and radio station IDs, both of which are specialities of Lip Service.

Both he and Ackley turned to production and studio work, and, besides his work with Lip Service, Aarons' recent credits include the production with Ackley of the Polydor single, Super Do Nothing Day by Rick Livingston.

Gino Empry - World renowned

Canada's Mr. P.R. touts CNE acts

One of Canada's best known PR and management personalities, Gino Empry, has acquired a client's roster that should guarantee him to be numbered among the top PR people in the world. As Tony Bennett's personal administrative assistant, he arranged Bennett's complete London, England date - by phone. Included in his PR clutch are the Royal Alexandra, the prestigious Imperial Room of the Royal York Hotel and the west coast-based Irish Rovers, among many more. He also finds time to manage the careers of Shakespearean actors Bill Hutt, Pat Galloway and Sean Mulcahi. The latter is Artistic Director of the Gryphon in Barrie. He also manages Ken James, Robin Ward and country folk and television personality, Tom Gallant and has just taken on the PRing for a new independent television series out of Ottawa, *Bang-Bang Your Alive*, which has already been syndicated to 16 stations across Canada.

You can also see the Empry touch in the handling of PR for Shopsy events, Carman's (a well-known Toronto steak house) and the Johnny Lombardi Shows, and just this past summer, the Variety International gathering that took place in Toronto.

One of the most satisfying projects for Empry is his handling of PR for the Canadian National Exhibition's Grandstand show. Empry got his feet wet with this giant extravaganza with the late Jack Arthur during the years 1966 through 1968. He was replaced for a couple of years but bounced back in 1972 and has been continuing ever since. During some of the CNE's controversial times over criticism of the lack of Canadian talent for the Grandstand show, Empry was front and centre defending the policy of the CNE and coined the expression, "Being nationalistic means never having to say you're Canadian."

Although, according to some critics, the CNE Grandstand show for this year isn't


the best, Empry nonetheless attacks the job of PRing the three week extravaganza as he has in the past. "We're going to make a profit this year, just like we did last year", he told RPM. "The CNE is one of the wonders of the world and the Grandstand extravaganza the best all-round entertainment package money can buy - and at a ticket price the whole family can enjoy." Empry also confided that "one of the most excit-

Aug 24 will be Canada Day with Mercury's top moneymakers, Bachman-Turner Overdrive, expecting to register "sold out" notices days before the event. Opening their show will be the Randy Bachman discovery, Trooper, who release on Bachman's Legend label and are currently making exciting national chart news with their single, *Two For The Show*, which has climbed to the No. 34 position on the RPM 100.

The Bob Hope Show is scheduled for Aug 25 with the Kral Sisters, juggler Dieter Tasso and Mary Lou Collins.

Lawrence Welk, one of the most popular

acts to appear at the CNE, moves in for two dates, Aug 26 and 27.

America with John Sebastian, is set for the 28 and Johnny Cash takes the week out on the 29th.

The new week (30) starts with Frankie Valli and his show featuring the Four Seasons with Rolly Hammond. Linda Ronstadt and Capitol-EMI's The Band are in for the end of the month.

Chicago is set for Sept 1st. followed by Neil Sedaka with England Dan and John Ford Coley (2) and then the Beach Boys move in for Sept 3rd and 4th dates with a matinee on the 4th and a possible matinee on the 3rd. Like last year, the CNE has already posted "sold out" notices which could necessitate the second matinee. Opener for this act, and a nice break, is Mercury's Garfield, a Toronto-based group headed up by Garfield French and experiencing strong sales for their initial album release, *Strange Streets*. There is also a re-

surgence in sales of the group's single, *Old Time Movies*, which had a good run up the RPM 100.

Mac Davis sets the stage for another top-rated Canadian group, The Mercey Brothers for Sunday (5). This RCA recording trio are one of Canada's most successful country acts and have become increasingly popular in the MOR field as well.

The capper, Sept 6 will be the Marching Bands Spectacular. Top Drum and Bugle Corps and Marching Bands from all over the continent will demonstrate their skills. The bands have between 100 and 200 members from ages 14 to 21.

And..... as the sun sinks slowly in the west and the fireworks end another CNE extravaganza, Gino Empry begins to concentrate on his next project. Says Empry: "You're as good as your last show and you have to take advantage of the points you've just made."

RCA & Nicholson groom Lydia Taylor

Lydia Taylor is a new RCA artist, her first single being *Love A Little Harder*, written by Willi Morrison and produced by the Three Hats team of Morrison and Ian Guenther. Their previous achievement was





with the studio band the T.H.P. Orchestra. Taylor used to sing with a band called MacArthur, which had a single *Out of Every Dark Sky*, on the RPM MOR chart for six weeks the first part of '75. That song was also on the RCA label, and Willi Morrison knew enough of Taylor's singing talents to ask her to work with him when the band broke up.

Although the new single was recorded with sessionmen, Taylor performs live with a band called Trixter. They've been doing the nightclub circuit around Ontario and the east with dance and show sets of rearranged standards. Trixter manager Craig Nicholson told RPM that since the release of the record, the band has been booked into more of the better clubs.

Two final versions of *Love A Little Harder* were recorded - one in English and one in French for the Quebec market. It seems that Taylor's voice is suited to the language, and the Three Hats team is taking advantage of that fact.

There has also been some listener complaints to the lyrics of the song, which has added to its interest at the consumer level.



Amram waxes enthusiasm over Canadian recording

Although not known as a great commercial success, David Amram has a large and devoted following all over North America. Much of the reason is that while many artists are tagged as versatile and unique, Amram wins both titles hands-down. A holdover from the beatnik movement, Amram has lived in New York's Village area for 17 years. He's played jazz with Dizzy Gillespie and Charlie Parker. Bob Dylan taught him to play folk guitar. He's probably the only person who plays blues on a French horn. He returned from Kenya recently with a new musical influence, and traditional African chants now form the basis for some of the songs in his repertoire. All of this just covers the songs he performs in clubs and coffeehouses. He has also scored for Shakespearean plays, and for the movies *Splendour In The Grass* and *The Manchurian Candidate*. Finally it shouldn't be surprising to know that he was also the first composer-in-residence for the New York Philharmonic Orchestra.

During a recent engagement in Toronto at the Chimney, Amram took time out to discuss with RPM his career.

"It's amazing that with all the stuff I've done, I'm still playing in bars. I'm playing at the folk festival in Philadelphia this year, but in March Eugene Ormandy is conducting a piece I was commissioned to write for the Philadelphia Orchestra. And recently I learned that I'm one of the 20 most-performed composers of classical music in the U.S."

Amram's newest album was recorded in Toronto, as a result of several ties he has developed here. One of those ties, Glenda Roy, who recently became Amram's manager. She was formerly with RCA's promotion department. Amram and Roy decided that one of their first projects should be a new album.

It seemed logical to the pair that, first, it was time for a live album, and second, as Roy explained, "if we were going to record with a live audience anywhere, it should probably be in Toronto."

"We headed for RCA and spoke with

Ed Preston about the idea of recording it for RCA Canada as opposed to anyone else. Ed had always shown a lot of interest in David and he thought it was a good idea."

He's just so totally versatile," Ed Preston told RPM, "I've caught him at practically every little club he's played in Toronto."

"The reason he could record with RCA Canada," he continued, "was because his contract with RCA in the U.S. was up. We know there are some regional pockets where his product sells. We wanted to take

advantage of that, and record him in the style most Canadians were accustomed to hearing him, and that's in concert. We pretty well gave him and Glenda Roy a free hand with the material."

A special concert was set up at Minkler Auditorium using the Filtrosen mobile recording system out of Montreal. "Minkler has such great acoustics," Amram said. "And even though Cat Stevens was in town that night, and there was a big blizzard, we had a nice turnout."

"We used the time we had to our best advantage," explained Roy. "Shirley Eikhard came in and did background vocals on the ballads. We rerecorded the ballads (which meant bringing the band back into the studio) because they didn't come out as well, with people coughing and shuffling about. The uptempo stuff is basically how it was recorded live, with people clapping and singing along."

Amram explained his reason for recording here as, "I felt that I could probably make the best record possible with the least amount of mental torture. I could concentrate on trying to make it good music and representative of a lot of the things I had gotten together over the past few years . . .

. . We made the record here for probably four times less than the same record would have cost us in the States. And we had nobody come in and ask to overdub 46,000 instruments.

"I regard the opportunity to do the record here as good fortune, certainly on my part. I love it here. Most of the musicians who come here from the States, anybody who's played anywhere in Canada always loves it, and that's hard to explain unless you come here from a different place. There's a general respect for music and for people and humanity that's still here, and it makes you feel good about being here. I've always felt that way."

The title track of the album will be released as a single, being as it has pulled the most airplay activity since the album's release. Negotiations are underway for a U.S. release of the album.

Canadian fairs need more PR - Stampeders learn lesson from home

Stampeders manager Mel Shaw took his band back to the Stampede, this time as headliners, and learned a little about how the grandstand shows build their audiences.

"They had their own set of promotions going, pushing the event as a whole. If we had known the promotion was Stampede-oriented, rather than pushing the individual concerts we would have had more concentration on our own posters." Shaw also bought about \$800 in commercials on local radio.

"The management has to look into doing the extra promotion; if you're involved with a guarantee and percentage, it's wise."

The Stampeders, who grossed more than \$19,000 at their Stampede Corral date, were playing a series of western dates as part of their current quadra-concert Hit The Road tour.

In Saskatoon, where the Stampeders were part of a week-long lineup at Pioneer Days, Shaw took advantage of the fact that the group was playing a number of dates around the province and generated good local press coverage to supplement another radio spot campaign. BTO, which was also on the Pioneer Days bill, bought heavily into radio time to promote their night as well.

The Corral shows had very heavy promotion budgets, Shaw points out, but they didn't run individual newspaper ads for each act as the CNE does.

Shaw looks for the promo situation at the Stampede to improve; it's the first year the Stampede organizers have booked big talent for so many dates: "They made money on every night, so to that degree

people did show up. Next year I think you'll find them zeroing in on audiences."

The Stampede is working to attract more than 1 million people for the entire series of events there, Shaw points out, and any one Corral show, give or take a thousand or two gate, may not get the attention, people in the music business might think it deserves.

"Maybe a promoter should cooperate with the Stampede for a given night; if they take over the dates in accordance with the Stampede board, they could make the individual dates work better."

Shaw explained that perhaps the individual Canadian acts could provide more promotion for their dates if they were booked at the big grandstand shows as part of Canadian tours, as the Stampeders and BTO are doing this summer. The problem, he realizes, is that the big fairs book so far in advance, and Canada's tour promoters really don't know who they're sending out in the summer until May or June. Dates for a band touring in the area may also be less expensive for the fairs to book.

Playing the big dates should be an angle for good exposure for Canadian acts in the local press. Shaw and the band were all excited, he reports, about returning home to Calgary and playing the biggest show in town; but the media there didn't pick up the story.

There was no PR man for the Stampede to connect the group with the local press.

"The TV stations didn't interview the group," Shaw told RPM, "but they were covering the chuck wagon races; but that is a big deal. I can understand that the event



overshadowed us, but we were part of it. Good media could have sold the date out."

The Calgary dailies covered the big names; Bob Hope appeared on the front page of the Herald.

"The other fairs can take a lesson from hiring someone like Gino Empry, to have somebody there just to get press on the performing artists."

Quality to distribute Pyramid in Canada

During a recent trip to New York City, Quality president, George Struth, signed a deal whereby Quality will distribute the Pyramid label Pyramid is headed up by Morris Levy and Dennis Gannon and is part of the New York-based Roulette Records.

Initial releases include album product by D.C. Larue (Cathedrals) Pat Lundy (The Lady Has Arrived) and Phil Medley & the M.V.B. Orchestra (Happy Walk.)

Spicer and Ryan to CBS Promotion

Ken McFarland, Ontario Promotion manager for CBS Canada, announced recently that Bill Spicer has been appointed to the post of eastern and northern Ontario regional promotion rep.

Pat Ryan is also, a new addition to the CBS promotion staff as a regional rep responsible for the peninsula and western Ontario areas.

Both will be working under Ken McFarland with local media.

It took but two hours to sell out the concert, which fans had eagerly been waiting for since the Rollers' lengthy studio visit a while back. They played before a screaming, hysterical mob for about an hour, and, surprisingly, drew agreeable responses from the local pop critics who have been somewhat cool toward the Scottish band.

An attempted visit to CHUM radio was called off when the group's limousine was unable to get through the fans to the station's front door. Two dozen police officers did their best but some observers report that at least one fan proceeded to jump up and down on the limo roof and caved in the panels, with the Rollers inside. They escaped unharmed, however, and made it to a special hotel reception. Capitol's Scoot Irwin, who was

on the scene at CHUM, reported to RPM that the situation was much more intense than it ever was on the Beatles' visits in their early days.

The Rollers' new album, due for release at the end of August according to the Capitol people, is called Dedication and was recorded at Sounds Interchange in Toronto.

Spirit, one of the original West Coast psychedelic bands, provided by an effective opening set.





Condor's Lonnie Salazar is building yet another star to his growing roster of country, rock and folk acts. The latest, a former

choir boy out of Niagara Falls, Brian Austin, is showing a crossover trend from country into MOR with his initial single for Condor,



Morning's *Breaking Over California*. The plug side was penned by Nashville's Joe Bob Barnhill and published through Happy Bear (BMI). The flip, *Rain*, was written by Austin. The session was produced at Toronto's Eastern Sound by Salazar. An album is currently in the works with a hoped for September release.



CHUM chart number 1,000 a North American record

Radio station CHUM in Toronto celebrated the issuing of its 1,000 pop chart last week.

The CHUM chart, which has been published every week since May 27, 1957, claims the record of being the longest continuously issued radio chart in North America. Only WHB in Kansas City has been printing a chart longer than CHUM.

In a Toronto Sun article, CHUM music director Roger Ashby explained the credibility of the CHUM chart. "Retailers stock records according to our charts. If it isn't in our top 30, department stores won't stock the record. We've had 20 years of compiling charts and the record industry has to look to us." Ashby explained that

complaints are often received by the station from record people who don't see their record on the chart, "They want to know why it's not on. They know if it isn't, chances are that the record won't sell. It's pretty important to them."

The chart in '57 listed the top 50 records (the first chart had All Shook Up, Love Letter In The Sand, and Bye Bye Love in the top three spots) but was trimmed to 30 in 1968. In 1971 the top LPs were added and in March of last year the station stopped issuing the pocket-sized edition. Apparently it seemed unnecessary since the Toronto Sun reprints the chart every week, and retailers across Ontario carry a display sized edition for their customers.




