



## The U-Know Awards - the listener's choice

Toronto: In view of an unprecedented demand for tickets this year's U-Know Awards had to be switched from the Royal York's Concert Hall to the much larger Canadiana Room. More than 1,500 industry people and general public (CFNY-FM listeners) witnessed what one observer described as "a very real happening - an awards show that reflects the music tastes of the radio listener and record buyer."

The U-Know Awards, the brainchild of CFNY-FM Program Director Dave Marsden and hosted by the station as an annual event, began as a parody of the Juno Awards, and has grown in popularity and status to become the most important regionally-oriented award show in the country.

The U-Knows focus on Canadian independent recording artists - and some who haven't reached that plateau, but, through the U-Knows, will have a much better opportunity of breaking into the industry.

Voting was by the public, most of whom are CFNY-FM listeners using a ballot available through Now, a Toronto entertainment paper.

Emcee for the evening was Jim Carrey, an exceptionally talented comic, who set the pace for the events that followed, with his very funny and bang-on impressions of movie and record stars including Michael Jackson, E.T., James Stewart, Billie Holiday and more.

The spotlight this year was on Parachute Club, Current recording group, who took four of the 14 awards, winning Group, Album and Female Vocal (Lorraine Segato) of The Year, and Engineer/Producer of The Year, which went to Daniel Lanois, who produced the group.

WEA Music Canada scored well at this

year's awards with Montreal's Men Without Hats picking up two awards, one for Video, the other for Single of The Year, both, of course, being their Safety Dance release. WEA also won in the Most Promising Male Vocal category where Dale Martindale of Images In Vogue was honoured. Images tied with 20th Century Rebels as Most Promising Group. The latter were named Best Independent Artist as well.

Capitol recording artist Sherry Kean, who has experienced national recognition in the very short time she has been on the recording scene, was awarded the U-Know as the Most Promising Female Vocal, while Paul Humphrey of Ready recording group, Blue Peter, was named Male Vocal of The Year.

Maja Bannerman, won as Best Non-recording artist and the Tears For Fears album, *The Hurting*, was named Best

International Album. The duo of Peter Nobel and Dale Heslip picked up the award for Best Album Art for the Spoons' album.

This year's U-Know Remembers, a special award presentation went to the early Canadian recording group, Richie Knight and The Midnites, best remembered for their hit, Charlena. George Semkiw, who now heads up Amber Studios, and Doug Chappell, now a Vice President of A&M, "the only survivors," claimed presenter Ronnie Hawkins, accepted the award.

Another surprise of the evening was the presentation of a special gold record award to CFNY-FM's Dave Marsden. From the major record companies and associated labels, the award was a tribute to Marsden as "Communicator extraordinaire".

A new addition to this year's event was the introduction of the Humanitarian Award from the U-Knows. Dave Marsden presented the award to Walt Grealis, Publisher of RPM, for his contribution to the music industry over the past twenty years.

## CITY-TV wins licence for Pay-TV music channel

Toronto: CITY-TV has won a licence to launch a national, 24-hour all-music network on cable television in Canada.

For as little as \$1.50 per month, viewers will be able to subscribe to the service, beginning as early as August 1, 1984. The new service, as well as the all-sports licence granted to Labatt Breweries for a similar service, is expected to be offered by the cable companies in package deals. The federal government hopes that this approach will accomplish several things; encourage viewers to remain with cable as opposed to private satellite transmissions, attract extra customers for pre-existing pay TV networks, and boost revenue for several financially uncertain cable operations.

RPM spoke with Dennis Fitzgerald,

Vice President and general Manager of CITY-TV, specifically concerning aspects of the licence and what the future holds for the music video industry.

In answer to the question of whether CHUM Limited's financial support was crucial to the bid being approved by the CRTC, Mr. Fitzgerald answered, "This was certainly one of the major criteria in the course of the decision-making process. Anyone undertaking this type of thing would be looking at a loss situation in its initial stages."

He was asked how the commitment to the Commission's dictum concerning screening music videos be handled.

"Right now the material is screened internally by two people who bring anything deemed debatable to the attention of myself and Moses Znaimer," he explained. "Once we get further into the project, we'll set up a more permanent process."

The future of music video programming in Canada is still chancy, but as Mr. Fitzgerald explained, "We feel like pioneers! The nice thing about it is that we have both the technical and human resources to be able to get this thing off the mark in about 90 days. I don't think music videos are quite the fad that some people are making them out to be. We'll have some repetition, but that's not unlike rock radio, where you have certain songs which are hits, and create strong listener response." Mr. Fitzgerald concludes with, "The key to music video is that people can enjoy the concept when they want to, literally at any time of day."

Mr. Moses Znaimer, President of CITY-TV, is succinct in his view of the decision:

"We are of course honoured by the Commission's choice, and are determined to live up to the responsibility implied; MuchMusic (as the new service will be named) is in for the long haul to make both this new art form and this new industry stick."

## Club Blue Note aids United Way fund

Toronto: The Club Blue Note is putting together what is being billed as a "Very Special Gathering", to aid The United Way. It's hoped that music industry people will get together for the evening to enjoy food and drinks, renew old acquaintances and, says Shelley Markowitz, "Help us help the kids of Toronto."

The special evening will take place at the club, 128 Pears Avenue from 7 to 9 p.m. The \$7.50 per person tab includes hot & cold hors d'oeuvres, wine and beer, plus an evening of rhythm and blues by George Olliver & Gangbuster. "We are anticipating this special evening to be as successful as our past fund raising functions," concludes Markowitz.

The Club Blue Note has lent its facilities to raising funds for the United Way in the past, the most notable being their presentation of the Blues Brothers last year, resulting in a sizeable amount of money being raised for the charity. The monies raised for this year's event however, will be directed specifically to the Children's Services of The United Way.

A Danceathon, to be held at the club in early May, also in aid of the United Way, is now being pencilled in.

## Court taps Yoko Ono for album royalties

New York: Jack Douglas, co-producer with Yoko Ono of the award-winning Double Fantasy album, has been awarded \$3.1 million in royalties and interest, in the course of a decision rendered this week by a New York court.

The six-member jury ruled unanimously in favour of Douglas, who claimed that Ono agreed in 1980 to give him 4% of the retail price for the first 500,000 albums and tapes sold, and 5% for any sold over that amount.

## Rare publisher award to Lennox & Stewart

Toronto: A rare happening was the presentation of publisher's platinum awards which went to Annie Lennox and David Stewart of Eurythmics, following their sold-out date at Massey Hall (April 2).

The award, presented by Sunbury/Dunbar Music commemorated sales in excess of 100,000 units for their albums, *Sweet Dreams (Are Made Of This)* and *Touch*.

Sunbury/Dunbar represent the publishing interests in Canada of this team.

## WEA's Bob Roper sees the return of Top 40

Toronto: With the emergence and popularity of music video, Bob Roper, A&R Manager for WEA Music Canada, has seen indications of where the song itself is becoming important again and hopes that their recent Canadian signings will benefit from this.

"We're seeing it already," he noted. "It's the comeback of contemporary hit radio and Top 40. It was exciting before - in the '60s. In the '70s the artist became strong. At one time, if you didn't have a follow-up song you were finished. Top 40 is taking more chances now. I think the listeners are into songs."

Roper believes the reason for the change in CHR and Top 40 can be attributed to the competition between the AOR FM stations. He believes that radio should set trends, not follow them.

Roper pointed out that WEA has recently been concentrating more on developing Canadian acts, which began with several Canadian signings.

"I think we're taking chances at WEA," he said of their recent signings and commitment to Canadian acts. "No one else would sign the Messenjahs, Mortifees or Cheri Camps."

In view of the company's attitude toward new talent, Roper is receiving more tapes than he did in 1983 - averaging 25 to 30 a week, some of which are in the soft-rock category while many comprise male pop singer-songwriters.

"Again, the music is of a pop genre," he continues. "There are some great songs, but it's not what I'm looking for right now. We're looking for tapes that reveal an artist edge that doesn't sound like other things. It's a judgement call. When I came to WEA I had the opportune time to build. I didn't want seven bands that sounded like Chilliwack or Loverboy. I try to find what the roster's missing."

Although WEA has indicated a signing spree, they haven't scored to any great significance as yet.

"I'm not totally satisfied," continues Roper, "because it's still too early. Images In Vogue laid some good groundwork and we had some success with Darkroom's initial release. I believe that Ann Mortifee is going to grow into an international act."

Roper pointed up the importance of tapes being submitted to the company. "Every act had an independent record. It's still the life blood of the industry. We received 700 tapes last year, strictly Canadian, but you've got to have hit songs."


Roper continues with "Two or three years from now, I could be out on the street, but I think what I'm doing here will work. You've got to be careful when you're building the career of an act. Solid Gold has done exceptionally well as a rock label."

Roper added that he is concerned at the number of acts on the market that are strictly hype. "Where are they going to be tomorrow?" he asked.

## Positive reaction to CHUM-FM adjustment

Toronto: CHUM-FM Program Director, Ross Davies, reports the station has received good initial response to their recent sound adjustment to more new music, but noted that it's still too soon to determine whether their campaign has been a total success.

"We'll be checking over the next few months," he said. "I'm quite excited about

this sound we have with the blend. It's a slight adjustment or refinement that's been made over the last few months in varying degrees."

Davies stressed that the station had already been airing new music for some time, but are now leaning more in this direction. He points out however, that the station will continue to play the well-established popular FM rockers, but with less frequency.

"We're trying for a blend and playing good quality music," he said. "I think the new Van Halen album, for instance, blends well with something like Simple Minds."

"I think listeners are tired of names like the Kinks, Who, and maybe even the Stones. The idea was to go to a more current and fresher sound instead of burnt out

oldies. The sound was just getting too predictable and stale."

Davies explained that the reason why the station waited until recently to make the move was because "it's taken a while for the new music acts to 'click' in". He also pointed up the fact that the quality and quantity of the music wasn't there until just recently.

"Whenever you make an adjustment, you run some risk. We'll probably lose the listener who likes to hear heavy metal, like Iron Maiden, but I think the CHUM-FM listener is pretty intelligent and diverse. The adjustment wasn't much of a gamble. CHUM-FM has been playing new music in recent years. We're still an album rock station, and we seem to have done well with the modification."

Davies said that although the station is strong with the teen market, they want to gain more in the upper end. "We'd also like to get people to stay with us longer."

Davies also stressed that the station was happy with its previous sound but that it became apparent it was time for an adjustment.

"We have to reflect what's popular with the public. I think it's probably ultimately the public who establishes the trends. I don't think we should dictate trends."

As for the resurgence in the popularity of hard rock, Davies believes that heavy metal never seems to go away and would always be strong. However, he doesn't believe this music will ever have the mass appeal.

"I think bands like Def Leppard and Judas Priest have a very modern sound. The British metal groups are good at that. They're not out of place on our station."



Assembly Language is headed up by Michael Sarazen. Product is distributed by The Record Peddler, a Toronto-based retail/wholesale operation specializing in imports.

**New Eddy Grant LP ready for shipping**

Toronto: Eddy Grant's new album, Goin' For Broke is now ready for shipping. The first single taken from the album is titled Romancing The Stone, which is also a track included on the soundtrack for the new Michael Douglas film.

The new Grant album was produced in the Barbados, and is a follow-up to his highly successful Killer On The Rampage which spawned his hit, Electric Avenue.

Grant, who has been producing the upcoming Musical Youth album, was in Toronto (March 28) for the Black Music Awards.

Many of the humorous little bits were used in promos and as ad-libs.

CJLB and McLean Hunter Cable TV held its first ever Comedy Search - So You Think You're Funny contest, which ran for two months prior to the final run-off, held at Thunder Bay's Sleeping Giant Hotel. There was an overflow crowd of 400 rooting for the 12 contestants, each of whom had ten minutes on stage. The panel of judges awarded first, second and third prizes of \$300, \$150, and \$100. CJLB morning man, Mark Taylor, hosted the show.


### New logo and stereo for CHEC

## The Pretenders: back to chart action after tragedies

The Pretenders have overcome major obstacles and moved into chart prominence once again with the release of their *Learning To Crawl* album. Produced by Chris Thomas and released by WEA on the Sire/RR label, the album has already gone

platinum (100,000) after only two months on release. The album was further fueled by the double-sided hit single, *Middle Of The Road/2,000 Miles*, which made impressive gains up the RPM 50 singles chart. The group made an impression last year with the release of their *Back On The Chain Gang* single, an original by group member Chrissie Hynde (vocalist/guitarist) and reminiscent of the late Sam Cooke's 1960 classic, *Chain Gang*. Both these singles are included on their new album.

A follow-up single, *Show Me*, has been released and early indications show this one breaking much more quickly.

Founded in 1978 The Pretenders were made up of American Hynde and British guitarist James Honeyman-Scott and bassist Pete Farndon. Their first single, *Stop Your Sobbing*, produced by Nick Lowe was released on Dave Hill's Real label. Drummer Martin Chambers joined the group a short time after the release of their single.

Hynde's sensuous vocals, backed by a tough guitar sound, became the band's trademark, a style not unlike that of the early British blues groups and a sound that many fans could relate to.

The door to their own U.K. market was slightly ajar for this new group and during a highly successful U.K. tour in 1979, they released a couple of singles, *Kid*, followed by *Brass In Pocket*, the latter topping the

charts. The single success was followed by their self-titled album, produced by Chris Thomas, which entered the British album charts at No. 1. That same year, 1980, the band toured Europe and the U.S., establishing themselves in North America with their hit single, *Talk Of The Town*, which was followed in early '81 by another successful single, *Message Of Love*.

Pretenders II followed, along with a Top 10 hit of *I Go To Sleep* and an extensive world tour that ended in April of 1982, and that's when the first of their tragic happenings occurred. It was in June of 1982 when Honeyman-Scott died of a drug overdose. Just prior to his death however, Farndon had left the group, and he too died under similarly tragic circumstances almost one year later.

The deaths were tough on the remaining Hynde and Chambers, who were determined to continue with the group. Using guest artists, guitarist Billy Bremner and bassist Tony Butler, they cut their *Back On The Chain Gang* single in July of '82, a single that became a Top 5 chart item in the U.S. and which went on to be included on the soundtrack of the Robert De Niro movie *King Of Comedy*.

Then followed a long period of re-assessment and rebuilding and finally Hynde and Chambers recruited guitarist Rob McIntosh, formerly with Night, and bassist Malcolm Foster, who had previously been with The Foster Brothers. This lineup has been intact since December of 1982. The group's North American acceptance was evident by their successful appearance at the U.S. Festival, evidenced by their Top 5 status on the U.S. trade charts, the latter part of last year and their No. 4 position on the RPM 100, dated March 10th of this year.

"There was a lot of anticipation with this album," said Bill Johnston, Product

Manager for WEA Music Canada, "because 50 percent of the band is new. The album is 'classic Pretenders'. There's a half dozen great cuts on the album, not just a couple of good tracks. Sales are fairly evenly spread right across the country."

It's expected that with the U.S. break-out of their current single, *Show Me*, the spillover effect could bring *Learning To Crawl* up over double platinum. Strangely enough however, and unlike Van Halen's 1984 which is running on a one to one ratio (albums versus cassettes), the Pretenders' release is running on an almost two to one ratio, in favour of albums.

The band's current North American tour has only taken them to Vancouver, so far, where they sold out their date which is credited with giving heavy prominence to their album which remained a No. 1 chart item for six weeks. There are no other Canadian dates firmed at press time, however it's expected they will be playing a couple of Eastern Canadian outdoor dates over the summer months.

## Iglesias/Nelson duet crosses over to Top 40

Toronto: To All The Girls I've Ever Loved, a duet by Julio Iglesias and Willie Nelson has become one of the hottest single releases of the month from CBS. Country and Adult Contemporary Adult programmers were quick to pick up on the single, but after only two weeks of release, the single began forming a pattern of rapid success with the CHR (Top 40) programmers, which moved it into the RPM 50.

The single was produced by Richard Perry and co-written by Albert Hammond and Hal David. The flip, *I Don't Want To Wake You*, is an Iglesias solo. The single is not included on an album. ## ON STAGE

### PERFECT AFFAIR

**El Mocambo - Toronto - March 15/84**

Showcasing their recent Attic debut, Perfect Affair's single set was no-frills rock, showing a propensity for tight instrumental exchanges and full-blown vocals from singer Rick Rose. The first single released, On The Edge, has created interest in the band at the CHR level. Recent proteges of Mick Ronson, they showed a confident stage manner, generating a sort of Foreigner-style bomb and a sense of humour to go along with it. Others in the band are: James Green, guitar; Fred Rose, keyboards; Brian Brackstone, bass and vocals; Franki Reach, drums. Dates are scheduled for the following markets: Regina (April 2-7), Vancouver (13), as support for Huey Lewis and The News, Winnipeg (16-19), London (23-25), and a date at Toronto's Heaven (26), before heading out to the Maritimes. They have also played dates in Calgary and Lethbridge, the latter part of March.

### URGENT

**Heaven - Toronto - March 22/84**

Some rock and roll never wears out its welcome. So it is with Urgent. This kind of music is timeless: unrepentantly guitar-based, sporting Doug Baynham's soaring vocals, and punctuated by Wayne Siberry's fiery guitar solos.

Surviving a first set marred by PA and lighting problems, the band soldiered on, moving confidently into a second set which included several covers, as well as their first single, You're Not The One.

Other band members are Kim Hunt on drums and John McGoldrick on guitar and keyboards. All of the band members contribute vocals. This was a date in support of their CBS album, Timing. Managed by Platinum Blonde's TBA office, Urgent have a good chance at cracking the AOR market.

### BON JOVI

**El Mocambo - Toronto - March 24/84**

Bon Jovi are no more or less than they seem; a likeable bunch of guys from Jersey who like to have some fun now and then. March 1983 saw the inception of the band, with vocalist/songwriter Jon Bon Jovi recruiting a team he felt to be an appropriate vehicle for the songs which would appear on their debut release. Certainly not innovative in format, the band utilizes numerous homages to previous American bands such as Aerosmith and the New York Dolls. A startling difference in their presentation is the freshness of the playing and the comic edge to their stage show. Vocalist Bon Jovi would appear to be the epitome of any kid who just likes to sing and have a good time with his friends. The band's tightness reflects the individual

members' experience in the business with keyboard man David Rushbaum bringing classical training to the music. A good pick if they can get the necessary airplay, especially considering the number of shameless imitators currently in the market. Other members are: Richie Sambora, guitar, Alec John Such, bass, and Tico "the Hit Man" Torres on drums.

### EURYTHMICS

**Massey Hall - Toronto - April 2/84**

Putting to rest any considerations that they might be a little flat in a live setting, Eurythmics, fronted by the chameleonic Annie Lennox and mop-topped Dave Stewart, gave what will be remembered as one of the shows of 1984 at Massey Hall. Sporting an outfit that would have made David Bowie proud, Ms. Lennox sang to all corners of the hall, a voice that chills while simultaneously seducing all who fall within its reach. Co-hort Lennox, resplendent in tails, was a respectful partner, occasionally stepping into the spotlight to deliver a penetrating guitar solo, but for the most part playing a deferential second to the incredibly talented Annie Lennox.

The band was another matter. Two horn players, who seemed to be fuelled by plutonium, and three female back-up singers lent a very funky dimension to the proceedings. This is '80s music, clear and simple; glacial when it wished to be so, resilient, and a synthesis of numerous influences culled from the pop fabric of the last twenty years. A keyboard/synthesizer player, and a rhythm section that boomed out a convincing framework for the songs, rounded out the troupe. After only two records, one shudders to consider what remains for this band to accomplish.

### JUDAS PRIEST

**Maple Leaf Gardens - Toronto - April 2/84**

Uncompromising, brutally loud and compelling to a fault, Judas Priest would appear to remain virtually uncontested as international metal kings. Fusing a number of influences into an aural and visual assault that would rival a Messerschmidt strafing, the band makes no apology for being flashy, occasionally repetitive, and vaguely disquieting. The Gardens will probably have to wait for the Clash's scheduled appearance before this type of manic aggressiveness is seen again.

Judging from the look of glee on Rob Halford's face, the band is pleased to see this combination of high-powered medieval imagery coupled with studs-and-leather pomp go over so well after waiting so long.

### PUKKA ORCHESTRA

**Bamboo Club - Toronto - April 3/84**

A gig billed as a record-release outing, but really more of a celebration, this Bamboo date was a good opportunity for a large number of people to witness a band who have kicked up a lot of dust in a relatively short period of time.

Centred around the collective talents of Neil Chapman, Tony Duggan-Smith, and Graeme Williamson, the band is proud of its affinity for unpredictable gatherings of musicians on their stage, and emits a chaotic, heady, and pleasantly dissonant sound that had many out shaking on the sizeable dance floor at Bamboo. Already it would seem that material such as Tom Robinson's Listen To The Radio, and the original Cherry Beach Express have entered the national consciousness in a big way. Keep an eye open, for we may soon be seeing a lot less of these guys.


