

CIRPA MIDEM presence upped through SRDP

CIRPA's MIDEM coordinator, Mary Vrantsidis, cites the support of the federal government's Sound Recording Development Program, as a major factor for the increased number of CIRPA members attending MIDEM '88. "Two years ago, when we didn't have this type of support," relates Vrantsidis, "and people were going to MIDEM on their own, we had only 19 companies. This year, all the rules and procedures are in place, and we have 30 companies."

As well, Molson Breweries will be sponsoring a reception for CIRPA. They are shipping a large number of cases of beer to MIDEM, which will give more of a Canadian presence at the CIRPA booth. The reception, which will be catered, will feature two Canadian Happy Hours.

This is CIRPA's eighth year of participation in MIDEM, and the organization is well armed with prior-promotion material. A compact disc and cassette will be available through the CIRPA booth, and these feature 17 tracks of current Cancon material. Flying the banner, Canada - Tune Into The Future, under an attractive logo designed by Garnet Giesbrecht, the CDs have been sent, in quantity, to Canadian Embassies throughout Europe. These will be passed on to more than 350 business contacts. As well, CIRPA has sent another 150 CDs to contacts to several countries including Japan, Sweden, Australia, Brussels and more.

"I'm very excited about this year's MIDEM," continues Vrantsidis, "because

It was 23 years ago when Bernard Chevy founded MIDEM, an annual event that has grown to be the premier trade market organization for the entire world of entertainment. MIDEM was sold to TELSO Communications, whose parent company is Television South PLC, in July 1986. The management team of Xavier Roy and Robert Bingham, recently appointed Managing Directors of the MIDEM organization, will take over Chevy's responsibilities when he retires.

Grammy recognition for Cooke's Redding package

Kim Cooke, Atlantic Label Manager for WEA Music Canada, has been informed that his compilation of the Otis Redding Story - Volume 1 & 2 has been nominated for a Grammy in the Best Historical Album category.

Cooke admits to always being "tremendously personally" interested in Atlantic Records' Rhythm & Blues and

Soul history. "Up until they (Atlantic) released the 14-record box set a couple of years ago, I felt they had really been remiss," recalls Cooke. "So, I approached Stan Kulin (President WEA Music Canada) and told him I would like to, on my own time, compile some of our back catalogue artists into some appropriate compilations. Stan deserves a lot of credit for letting me put these compilations together."

The first of Cooke's compilations was in 1985 when he packaged the Aretha Franklin 30 Greatest Hits LP, which was subsequently released in the U.S. "That LP actually sold well beyond what a usual reissue does," Cooke points out. "We moved almost 20,000 copies in Canada, which is pretty substantial for a repackaging in Canada, and that gave me

the impetus to continue on. The next artist I felt needed a new coat of paint was Otis Redding.

"Myself, in tandem with well-known Toronto musicologist and freelance writer, Rob Bowman, over the course of 1986, put together what came out in Canada as a 2-record set: The Otis Redding Story - Volume 1 & 2." He continues with "The Americans were interested in putting out the package, but as a 4-box record set. They repackaged it, combined the liner notes into a little booklet, and released the package in July of 1987."

As a matter of course, these albums are submitted to the Grammy people for nomination in Category 60, which is the Best Historical Album category. Cooke will be attending the awards presentations which will be held in Los Angeles, March 2.

Cooke is somewhat disturbed over the lack of recognition to Bowman, through an oversight. He stresses that Bowman "worked very hard and diligently together with me in putting this Redding package together."

The Cooke entry is up against four other compilations: Bristol Session, Country Music Foundation; The Gershwin Collection by Teledisc; Singers & Soloists of Swing Bands from the Smithsonian Collection; and The Thelonious Monk Complete Collection by Riverside.



We hear that NBC's David Letterman, who recently referred to all record company executives and record promo people as weasels, has now lashed out at Canadian artists like Anne Murray and Gordon Lightfoot, who sit around their teepees and igloos, perfecting their music style. 

Messenjah tired of being pushed around the block

Having toured practically every inch of Canada, says guitarist and vocalist Eric Walch, with the possible exception of Nova Scotia, Messenjah have finally secured national distribution, through Electric, for their latest album and are now actually on the verge of signing an international deal as well.

The band, who were once again nominated for yet another Juno Award this past year, spent over two years writing and recording their new material, hoping to achieve some degree of recognition for their improved sonic quality from within the industry itself.

However that recognition isn't coming that easily, adds Walch, though reggae music today enjoys as much popularity as it ever did. "The people within the industry," he comments, "they're not giving reggae music a break. At one time the production wasn't good enough, but now we're getting the production up to par with our counterparts and what excuse do they have?"

It's the same merry-go-round thing," Walch continues. "They're trying to push us around the block all the time because . . . let's look at Bob Marley, for instance. They weren't playing his music but still if you went to Maple Leaf Gardens, it would be sold out. They're still treating reggae music second

class. It's like you're in the house but you're in the kitchen."

His argument is the same used by Canadian country artists, or funk, or R&B; that if as much money and effort were spent on these musical genres as was spent on rock music then each would be a viable music form unto itself. Unfortunately, it remains a David and Goliath situation, with the various independents fighting an uphill battle, with not only the Canadian record industry, but also the American.

"Here in Canada," he explains, "we have the potential to be leaders, musically, and determine what we want to do and what we want to hear. It's like everybody's sitting down and saying 'If the States doesn't put their stamp of approval and say this band is good, then nobody will get behind it.' It's the kind of mentality where you're no good until the guy next door says so, and if that attitude would change everything would run a lot better."

"There are a lot of damn good bands out there," Walch elaborates, "this country is rich when it comes to that kind of stuff but we need outlets. Nobody here recognizes this and says 'Let's get behind these guys and do something.' This is a Canadian thing, this is

not a personal thing."

He stretches his point to include radio, retail, record companies and the investment community, yet when asked whether the band themselves have saturated the West Indian population (in Toronto alone, these numbers exceed 100,000) with their material, Walch replies this is a "minority" group and their music is crossover reggae, attempting to broaden their own market base over and above pure reggae.

"This is the first time we really settled down and said 'Let's get everything done here from scratch,' because our last two albums we went down to California to record. But we had a lot of good songs that didn't go on this album. It's just putting your priorities together and putting what you think the public can relate to more, in terms of marketing."

Although producing a commercially viable reggae album seemingly was the easy party, selling it is not. "If you're selling records, and say we're talking about Michael Jackson, Sting or Lionel Richie," he concludes, "you know it's guaranteed sales, as far as percentages and money in your pocket. But if you're going to take a group that's not on that label, it's going to be harder for you to make money."

"So, that's where the gap has got to be bridged and if we as Canadians don't want to do it for ourselves, I think nobody is going to step in and do it for us."

Music industry should be wary of piggyback rides

In an editorial published last May in RPM, Warren Cosford expressed grave concern with regard to the corporate sponsorship of the music industry and its overall impact on the musicians themselves. "First," he began, "they ruin some of my favourite songs by turning them into jingles . . ."

Obviously to some, this is the most effective means to an end, the short term goal: sales.

Neither an advertising agency nor a corporate sponsor could give one iota when an artist's career is at stake, and this is ever so apparent today. Witness the interesting circle of events leading up to the release of *Hands Up*, the popular theme to the current Club Med commercials, with both the Attic and Virgin labels now battling it out at radio and retail for air time and rack space for the same song, albeit performed by different groups.

Club Med's advertising agency should be congratulated, they're simply using a very effective sales technique, and one that has helped countless other artists as well. Though it is a chicken and egg situation, Molson's, Levis and Chevrolet are just several examples of corporations that have recently revitalized interest in a song to such a point of its eventually being re-released and actually re-entering the charts.

However, when record companies decide to release singles after first of all letting the various advertisers release their commercials, now there's a dilemma. Naturally, the argument is that the record companies are capitalizing on a great marketing opportunity, and that they need the money.

Certainly, record companies are not banks from which artists can draw freely

against, yet at the very same time, those artists are counting on a label executive's expertise, whether selecting singles, marketing strategies or deciding any host of other factors crucial to their respective careers.

There is no long term gain undermining the efforts of the A&R department in developing a competitive roster, whereby all parties can prosper. With advertisers rather artless (it's a craft) approach to inducing sales, and their apparent disregard for music's origin, then perhaps the music industry should reconsider this ill-fated partnership.


Music is "the art of making pleasing or harmonious combinations of tones," according to the dictionary. Indeed, music is an art. It fosters emotions. Unfortunately, again to some, it is a craft; one to be practised and skillfully perfected, with the primary motivation - or the end result - being money.

On his first date in Seattle (Feb. 20), he will turn his concert at the Paramount Theatre into a benefit to aid the Central American Peace Campaign. This is an organization that Cockburn has had contact with over the past several years.

Apparently the idea for the show came through conversations Cockburn had with author Dr. Charles Clements, who gained much recognition through his last book, *Witness To War*.

The band is currently charting on the RPM 100 with their latest LP, *Mending Wall*, which has gone gold. 20th Century Boy's follow-up, *N.I.M.B.Y. (Not In My Back Yard)* has been shipped across the country and is already showing a pattern of acceptance by CHR programmers.

Vancouver's Bergman signed to Duke Street

Vancouver recording artist Art Bergman has been signed to the Duke Street label. The signing was arranged through the Vancouver-based S.L. Feldman and Associates.

Bergman, who has been associated with such bands as Los Popularos, The Young Canadians and Poisoned, is presently preparing material for an album expected to be released early this year. The album will be supported by a major Canadian tour.

PART THREE OF A SERIES**A cautionary approach is suggested for 1988**

Although 1987 was an "excellent" year, there were a few events that caused concern within the industry, a few of which our contributors touch on in this part of our ongoing series. While the door was opened to Cancon, there wasn't enough enthusiasm or, for the lack of a better description, "pride", to keep the door open.

Canadians, by their very nature, are sensitive about things Canadian, particularly when it comes to recording artists. Broadcasters have adopted an attitude of "when in

doubt... don't", when it comes to Canadian content, and without the "stamp of approval" by American programming gurus, the majority of Canadian programmers "pass" on what could be potential stars in a star system that fades in and out.

There is a light at the end of the tunnel however, as a new breed of programmer emerges, displaying a faint sign of nationalism, an encouraging sign that will contribute significantly to the Canadian star system.

A message from S.I.L. sans "hearts and flowers"

As a music retailer, I regard 1988, and beyond, with growing concern. A quick inspection of StatsCan and music industry figures suggests a decreasing pre-recorded music market. While the music industry can boast unprecedented dollar sale achievements, the units of product making up these dollars, and the number of customer transactions required to purchase these units, have both decreased over the past four years.

The most recent consumer survey statistics available establish that the average number of customer visits to all music retailers has decreased by 10 percent in the past 18 months. The music industry's consumer base is eroding, and fast.

Coupled with this worrisome trend, I also see a growing conservatism in the business practices of our suppliers. Payment terms are tighter, return privileges are reduced, advertising dollars are diminished and wholesale prices are up. Retailers are finding it continually more difficult to promote and otherwise encourage increased purchasing by our growing number of less-frequent and lapsed consumers.

As a typical example of the retailers' dilemma, we have watched the compact disc market stagnate at approximately 5 percent penetration of Canadian households. Consumer studies continue to indicate that the single strongest resistance to the purchase of compact disc hardware is the expense of subsequent software purchases. And yet, with the one far-sighted exception of MCA Records, we see our suppliers maintaining or increasing wholesale prices on compact discs despite significantly decreased costs. Retailers are denied plus-sales opportunities and thousands of Canadians remain dissuaded from experiencing the sonic pleasure of the compact disc.

The music industry must have the self-discipline to continually and effectively con-

sider the "bigger picture" in our daily decision-making. We have no guarantee that there will be a music industry in twenty years, or even in ten years, if we don't take responsibility for the on-going care and development of our consumer audience. Short term profit cannot come at the expense of longer term growth. If we are not sensitive to their needs and expectations, our consumers will have no difficulty in finding a variety of other uses for the \$10,000 or \$15,000 that should have been spent on a cassette, album or compact disc.

With proper development, you like to see growth patterns emerge, and I am truly excited and confident about the fortunes of Current Records and the industry as a whole for the upcoming year.

FACTOR has provided an industry "heart"



1987 was the year of changes. On the multinational front changed ownership.



Negotiated pacts with major users of music such as the CBC, Canada's private radio broadcasters,





Price increases a major concern for wholesalers

1987 was an excellent year in each of our wholesale operating groups as well as the Music World chain. Our fiscal year ended June 30 with growth of 40 percent with a further 35-40 percent growth in the recent six months. Geographically, this growth is particularly strong in Central and Eastern Canada with modest increases in the West. Highlights of the year include the availability of a broad selection of excellent product from all suppliers and the increased market share of those companies which have historically been medium size. With few exceptions, the relaxation of rigid policy enforcement by some suppliers has contributed significantly to simplified, profitable operations.

The major concern for our Canadian industry and particularly Canadian artists has to be the unjustified price increases which have been announced at the year end. Clearly the Canadian consumer is subsidizing both the foreign marketing organization and the foreign manufacturing plants of the multinational corporations.

The beginning of 1988 is certainly looking better than we expected after October 19. The impact of cost increases which may develop from government action involving publishing rights and a federal sales tax increase would be negative. We appreciate the positive, aggressive support of our customers and look forward to this coming year with confidence.



CBS re-introduces multiple sales campaign

A CBS marketing campaign, designed by Senior Director of Marketing, Dave Platel, and launched last year to encourage multiple sales at the retail level, is once again in effect. The campaign, which runs through Mar. 31, allows consumers who purchase any of the "specified" CBS frontline LPs, to pick up either a CD or cassette compilation, priced at \$9.99 and \$6.99 respectively. In-store p.o.p. is now in place, which adds excitement to the campaign. It was pointed out that "in order to establish a very low customer cost for Hit Singles II, and secure the artists involved, CBS negotiated the rights to the material based on the premise that the compilation would be sold only with the purchase of a regular CBS recording by one of the participating artists." Participants are further cautioned that, "The Hit Singles II must not be sold for any price on an individual basis. It can only be sold with the sale of one of the participating products listed on the back of the LP jacket or cassette/CD package."

The Hit Singles II compilation includes hits like Platinum Blonde's *Contact*, *Lost In Emotion* by Lisa Lisa & Cult Jam, *Gowan's Great Dirty World*, *Dan Hill's Can't We Try*, *Hazy Shade Of Winter* by The Bangles, and

Shorewood Packaging is regarded as North America's leading manufacturer of packaging materials for the music and entertainment industry.

Anne Murray makes list of Top 50 concert acts

In answer to the question: "What does Anne Murray have in common with Madonna, Whitney Houston, Anita Baker and Tina Turner?" They are the only female recording artists listed among the Top 50 concert acts in the U.S., based on their average box office gross for this past year.

The above information was supplied by Pollstar.

As well, Amusement Business Publications reports in its year end issue, that Murray is the only female and the only solo act to be listed in the Top 25 Country Music Box Scores for 1987.

Ross Ferris, of CBS Sales, points out the reason for this campaign so early in the year. 
Ferris continues with, "The campaign was reasonably successful last year, considering there were a lot of unknowns, particularly at the retail level . . . they weren't exactly sure how to promote the thing and it took us a little while to convince everyone about the way we wanted it to work. We had great support from everybody . . . great merchandising in most of the retail chains, and this year we have the added support of the rack jobbers."

The campaign also includes *Masters At Work II*, which is similar to *Hit Singles II*, with comparable prices for both the CD and cassette sampler.

Norman Miller, Director of CBS Masterworks, points out that the campaign was "designed to stimulate additional sales," continuing with, "Even if sales had increased by 50 percent, I'd still be inclined to introduce such a program." He further points out that the program was "quite successful last year." There was a problem however, in that some retailers were selling the sampler only. "We decided to make the extra effort this year," continues Miller, "to ensure that everyone was crystal clear as to the concept."

The most significant plus for the classical program this year is the inclusion of five new releases on the sampler: Claudio Abbado (Tchaikovsky: Symphony No. 6), Yo-Yo Ma, (Brahms: Double Concerto - Isaac Stern), Wynton Marsalis (Baroque Music For Trumpets), Murray Perahia (Bartok: Sonata For 2 pianos - Sir George Solti), and Esa-Pekka Salonen (Prokofiev: Romeo and Juliet).

Miller further explains, "What the consumer can do is literally sample the new Wynton Marsalis record, the day it appears on the street, because both the LP and sampler shipped together."

Dave Skinner, Managing Director of the National Alpine Ski Team, summed up Hall's connection with the team as follows: "Everyone at the National Alpine Ski Team is excited and intrigued by the view Albert Hall has taken. It's a first. It's a first that all members of the team will be taking part in the singing and filming of the music video . . . it's a first that the team will have their own anthem, *I Want You*, as they strive for medals . . . and it's a first that the intense emotions of their moment has been described in a musical work."

Initial single release, *I Want You*, has now been shipped, with the *Courage* LP to follow the last week of January.

Elegant WEA launch for Foster's Symphony LP

WEA Music Canada arranged for the launch of David Foster's new LP, *The Symphony Sessions*, while the world-renowned writer/producer/performer was in Toronto to judge the finalists who will perform the song at the opening of the Calgary Winter Olympics (Feb. 13).

The reception was jointly hosted by WEA, Coca Cola and Hans Gerhardt, President and General Manager of Toronto's Sutton Place Hotel.

Held in the newly-renovated Queen Victoria Ballroom, the elegant setting and gourmet buffet was in keeping with the prestigious event of both honouring Foster for his participation at the 1988 Olympic Winter Games and previewing his video of Winter Games, a 45-minute production, unique in its concentration on members of the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, an audio/visual concept, that creates an aura of mystique and excitement around the instruments and the player, with Foster as the centrepiece.

Foster admits that his new LP, of which *Winter Games*, is key, is a departure from his past releases. "This won't be an easy record to sell," he confided. "but I believe there's enough appeal in this LP to attract all age groups . . . there's a part of me in this production . . . that's how much I believed in what I was doing. It's going to be a work record, one that has to be listened to, carefully, and I believe it will be around for a long, long time."

Foster's involvement with Coca Cola, of course, revolves around the new composition, *Can't You Feel It*, a four-minute commercial that will be intertwined with the goings on throughout the Calgary Winter Olympics. Film footage from the opening ceremonies will apparently be spliced into Coca Cola television commercials to be used in a high-powered promotion campaign. Two prize winning vocalists from each participating country will comprise the choral ensemble, singing the praises of Coca Cola, one of the sponsors of the Olympics.

A country-wide talent search was conducted during last December, from which 11 finalists were chosen. They were required to answer questions and display their vocal talents on Foster's Winter Games. Staci Michelle Wuerch from Winnipeg and Steven Pitkanen from Toronto were chosen as the Canadian members of the Coca Cola World Chorus.
