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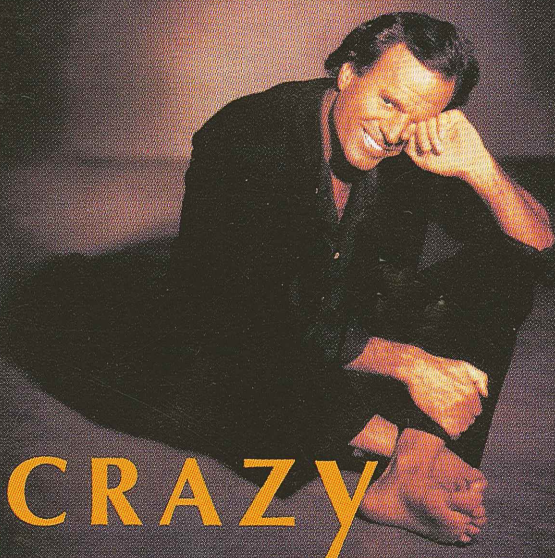

Canada Stand fee reflects change in MIDEM charge

Further to RPM's report on CIRPA's involvement in MIDEM '95 (RPM -Sept. 12/94), Canada Stand coordinator Mary Vrantisdis has announced a change in the fee structure.

In accordance with the MIDEM organization changing its fee structure, CIRPA's Canada Stand fee has been altered to \$1750 per person for CIRPA members and \$1950 per person for non-members.

Financial support for eligible companies is still available through the International Marketing program, which is now administered by FACTOR. Deadline for submissions is Sept. 30, 1994 at 5 pm. For more information

"I guess the best way to sum this up is in rock 'n' roll terms," says Ehm. "You only get better when you leave one band and find a new group of players to play with. It's best to exit the game when you're winning. I want to take advantage of all the great things that are going on in my life right now."

FACTOR to revise independent loan program

After reviewing the initial projects recommended for funding, FACTOR's Board of Directors has decided to make changes to the program for the next fiscal year.

The program, which was introduced April 1 of this year, offers up to 50% of the eligible production expenses to a maximum of \$7,500 toward the creation of at least four tracks for independent release. The program is open to artists who have not already signed a recording or distribution deal.

As the Board is seeking applications with strong financial commitments on the part of the artist, beginning next year, donated investments will be eliminated from budget forms.

The criteria currently in place will be honoured by FACTOR until the end of the current fiscal year (March 31, 1995).

This will be the 14th year that CIRPA has mounted the Canada Stand and the attendance this year, from every record buying country in the world, is expected to exceed 8,000 registrants.

18-year MIDEM veteran, Al Mair, president of Attic Records, has gone on record as saying that without MIDEM, "there would be no Attic Records. MIDEM is responsible for in excess of 50% of total foreign income from new and for renewed contacts for several major Canadian independents. Because this income is in the form of royalties on existing product with no manufacturing costs, it contributes directly to future productions and the company's profitability."

Holger Petersen, president of Stony Plain Records is also convinced of MIDEM's importance. "Personal contacts are invaluable in this business. MIDEM provides a unique opportunity to meet face-to-face with companies from around the world at one time and location."

The operation of the Canada Stand is due in part to financial support from FACTOR, the Department of Canadian Culture, and the Ontario Ministry of Culture, Tourism and Recreation.

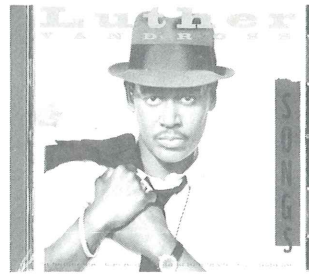

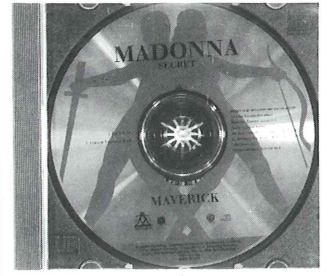

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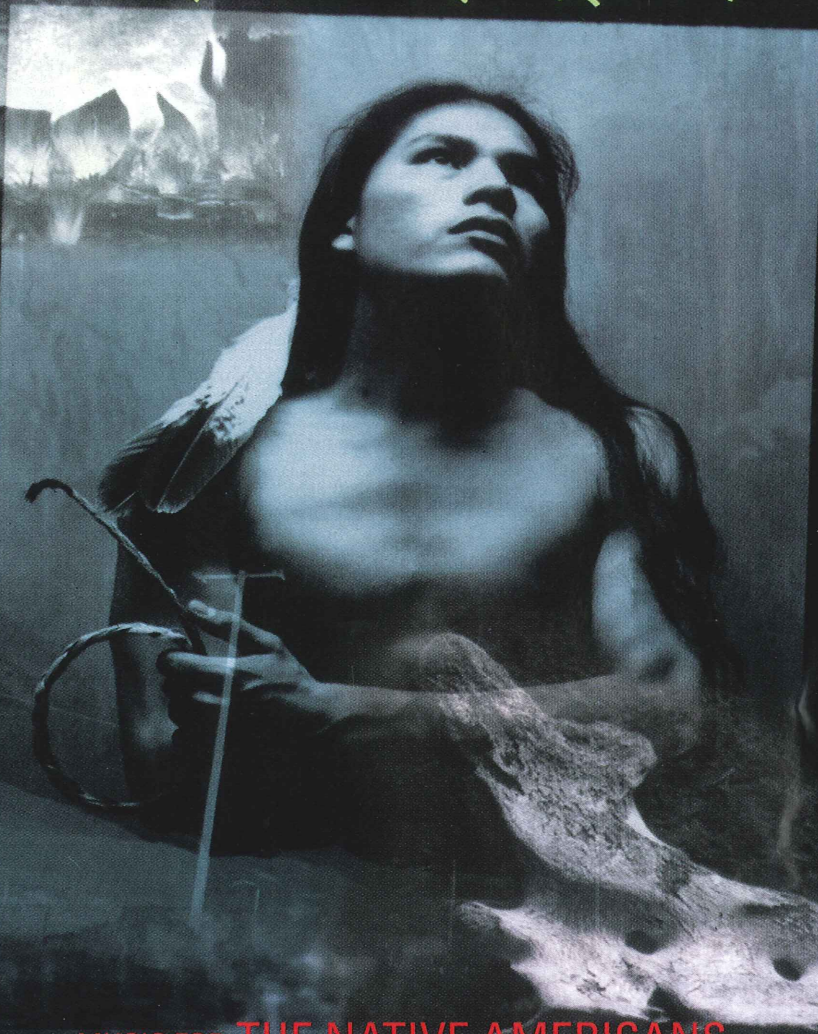

MUSIC FOR THE NATIVE AMERICANS

Paying tribute to his heritage, **Robbie Robertson** (a Canadian Mohawk descendant) has included not only his original compositions and collaborative works with the other featured artists, but also traditional Native songs such as the ancient "**Ancestor Song**". The first single and video "**Mahk Jchi**" (**Heartbeat Drum Song**) is a combination of traditional and modern sounds and images. Included are instrumentals/chants such as "**Coyote Dance**" and "**The Vanishing Breed**", the beautiful love song "**Golden Feather**", the rocker "**Skinwalker**", and "**Twisted Hair**" featuring Lakota opera singer, Bonnie Jo Hunt, accompanying a chorus of crickets.

Disney roaring into fall with **The Lion King**

The people at Disney Canada have a funny smile on their faces these days. You tend to get that way when you dominate the entertainment market the way Disney's *The Lion King* has over the past few months.

Since its release in June, *The Lion King* Soundtrack has already surpassed quadruple platinum in Canada, and will likely hit five times platinum by the first week in October. And these numbers pale in comparison to the six-million units sold in the US in that same time period.

The fact that a Disney Records project is enjoying success isn't really something new. After all, the Peabo Bryson/Celine Dion rendition of *Beauty And The Beast* was the #1 Adult Contemporary song of 1992 (RPM - Dec. 19/92). And the Bryson/Regina Belle version of *A Whole New World*, from the *Aladdin* sound soundtrack, was the #6 song on the 1993 AC year-end chart (RPM - Dec. 18/93).

But nothing that Disney Records has done before is an equal to *The Lion King* Soundtrack. Featuring the Grammy and Academy Award-winning lyricist Tim Rice teaming up with pop superstar Elton John, the album has already spawned one #1 hit, and may produce another.

Can You Feel The Love Tonight was #1 on the RPM Hit Tracks chart for four straight weeks, and #1 on the RPM AC chart for six weeks. The album, meanwhile, held the top position on the RPM Albums chart for five straight weeks, only recently bumped out of the top spot by another soundtrack, *Forrest Gump*.

According to Joe Etter, national sales manager for Disney Records Canada, there is really nothing to compare, from the Disney catalogue at least, to the success of *The Lion King*.

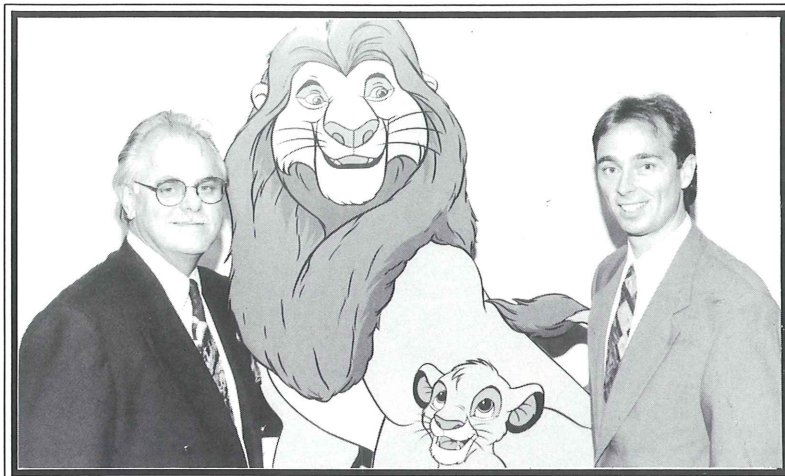
"It's certainly the fastest-selling one we've had in Canada, and the US as well, although I can't really comment on that. For a comparison, *Aladdin* took a full year before it hit platinum in Canada."

Equally impressive, of course, is that the movie is doing even better business than the soundtrack. According to Etter, the success of both projects should improve when they are re-released in November, just in time for the holiday season.

"The movie just broke into the #6 spot on the list of the all-time highest grossing movies, surpassing *Jaws*. But the movie is being pulled from the theatres on September 23, and being re-released on November 23, in time for the Christmas season. I know it's the first time

we've done anything like that, and I believe it's unprecedented for the reasons we're doing it.

"Other movies have been re-released after they've won Oscars or when they felt the run at the theatre wasn't long enough. But *Lion King* is being pulled strictly for marketing

reasons. November 23 is coming into the Christmas season, and there isn't any other family-type movies being released then. And because it's being released again, we're doing another re-launch of the soundtrack and all the other related products."

Along with the participation of pop star John, another unique aspect of *The Lion King* movie and soundtrack was their release time. While Disney has traditionally released its movies in time for the Christmas season, *The Lion King* was the first major Disney feature to be released in the beginning of the summer.

"It was new for us from that standpoint," says Etter. "*Lion King* was originally slated for last Christmas, but because it takes over four years to produce one of these movies, and Disney didn't want to compromise the quality, they felt it would be pushing it to try and release it at that time. So they wanted to hold off on it and make it as good as it is, and experiment with a summer release, and it's proven to be very successful for us."

Disney has had a rebirth of sorts in the last ten years, a rebirth that began with the release of *The Little Mermaid* in the mid-'80s, and has continued with the subsequent successes of *Beauty And The Beast*, *Aladdin* and now, *The Lion King*. Etter says the regeneration of Disney has something to do with the greater widespread appeal of the product.

"I'd say Disney's been reborn since Michael Eisner came on board, 10-12 years ago. The animated features have definitely had a rebirth since *Little Mermaid*, as has the music. When we came out with *Beauty & The Beast*, the love story appealed to the female audience. Then you had *Aladdin*, which

appealed more to a male audience, with the Robin Williams humour.

"Now, when *The Lion King* comes out, you've got a whole audience there that no longer feels they have to take a child to see the movie. They feel comfortable seeing the movie themselves because they enjoyed the last ones. I've seen the movie several times, and I've been in theatres where there hasn't been a single child."

Perhaps the biggest reason for the success of the Disney music is the important role the music plays in the film itself. It's a great tribute to the music that, undoubtedly, without the music, there would be no Disney films.

According to Etter, "Walt felt a long time ago that all you've got is a cartoon, unless you can put good music to it. That's what brings the story alive. The music is actually interwoven through the story, as opposed to being a separate entity. With the Elton John singles, it's taken *Lion King* to that extra plateau."

The addition of John was certainly a coup for the people at Disney, bringing the soundtrack, and even the film, instant credibility before it even went out to the public. Etter believes that Disney wanted to build on something that had started with Celine Dion on *Beauty And The Beast*.

"We were happy when Celine was chosen, because Sony wanted to keep her in the public's eye, and from our standpoint, she was Canadian, which gave an added push to the selling of that album. So I think Disney was looking for a big name, someone who could generate excitement about the single prior to the album being released.

"Without knowing Elton's thought process behind it, I think this single keeps his streak alive of 25 years with a top ten single. So I think he was looking for a vehicle to help push him onto the charts."

One would think that *The Lion King* would be enough to keep Disney's music side busy for quite a while. But Etter says that there

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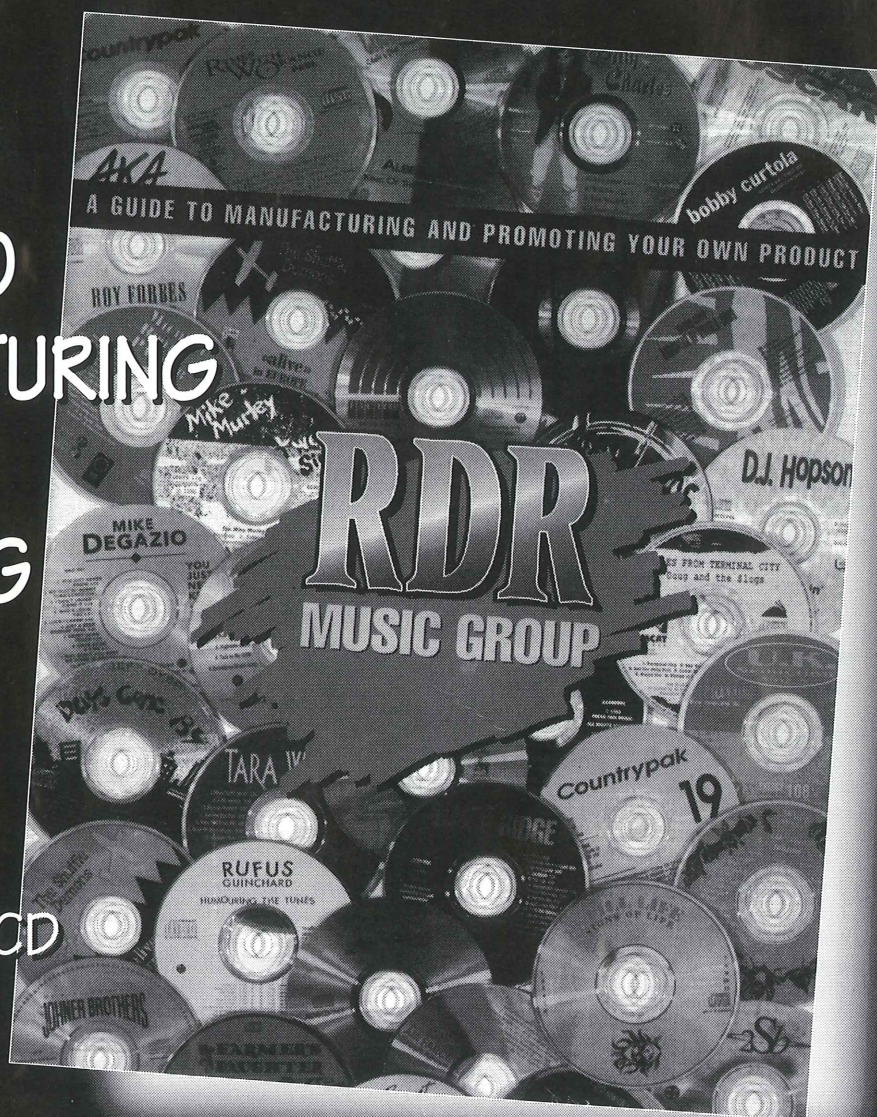

are a number of projects outside of movie soundtracks that keep the music offices humming.

"We've experimented with a number of things. We've got some compilation albums such as *For Our Children*, which was top name stars like Bruce Springsteen, Paula Abdul, Bob Dylan and Sting, doing traditional children's songs. All proceeds went to benefit paediatric AIDS, it was very successful, and it launched us into a different venue.

"We also have a line of children's artists. Here in Canada, we have an artist named Norman Foot, based in Vancouver. He's on the Disney Music Box label, he's got two albums out currently, and he's touring all the time. We did a country album for kids with the Oak Ridge Boys, Mary Chapin Carpenter and others."

But as the success of *The Lion King* demonstrates, Disney isn't just for kids anymore. The fact that Disney is selling more of the soundtracks in CD format than cassette (52-48%), is proof of that. Which is why the company is creating more products aimed at an adult consumer.

"We released a box set called *Disney: A Legacy In Song*, which covered 60 years of Disney music, from *Steamboat Willie* to *Beauty And The Beast*. Then we had the box set called *Annette*, the tribute to Annette Funicello. A lot of people don't know it, but Annette is Disney. She grew up with Disney, she had 15 albums, and five top 40 singles.

"This fall we're releasing a box set called *The Music Behind The Magic*, a tribute to Alan Menken, Howard Ashman and Tim Rice, who composed the scores for *The Little Mermaid*, *Beauty And The Beast*, *Aladdin* and *The Lion King*. And again, that's aimed at an adult audience. So we're trying to broaden what we're releasing. But as far as getting into pop music is concerned - I think we'll just stick with the soundtracks for now."

With *The Lion King* soundtrack continuing to ride high in the RPM 100 Albums chart (#5 - Sept. 26/94), that would seem to be a wise decision. Aside from the re-release of both the movie and soundtrack for *The Lion King* in late November, Disney's distant plans include the release of its next animated feature, *Pocahontas*, in the summer of 1995.

Impressive fall lineup spells big Xmas sales

With every record company attempting to release a slew of major product during the fall season, this Christmas promises to be one of the most successful in recent memory. The list of acts putting out new releases this fall will make it tough for new artists to find elbow room in what should be a crowded field.

Warner Music Canada is gearing up for what should be a tremendous fall and Christmas season. The label jumped the gun on many of its competitors with major releases from *Barenaked Ladies* and Neil Young, and continues that momentum with the highly anticipated Eric Clapton album *From The Cradle*, Clapton's tribute to the blues.

Following on the heels of Clapton in the month of September will be product from R.E.M., Emmylou Harris, Little Texas, Clay Walker, Tracy Lawrence, Slayer, Ginger Baker Trio, Michael Crawford, Liz Phair, and a Little River Band greatest hits package.

The momentum should continue in October with new releases from Madonna, Tom Petty, Joni Mitchell, Tom Jones, Kenny Rogers, Danzig and Testament. The company will also highlight greatest hits packages from Huey Lewis and Chris Rea, and a Natalie Cole Christmas album. Early November looks strong for the company as well, with releases scheduled for the Black Crowes, Van Halen, and the much-anticipated Led Zeppelin *Unplugged* album.

EMI is currently focussing on the recently released Alan Frew album *Hold On*, as well as other ongoing projects such as Bonnie Raitt, Richard Marx, Garth Brooks, Roxette, Moist and Freddy Curci. In the months ahead, look for new projects from Robbie Robertson, Megadeth, Queensryche, Dignable Planets, Dream Warriors, King Cobb Steelie and Robert Palmer.

EMI will also be focussing on an Anne Murray box set, Bob Seger greatest hits, John McDermott Christmas, and a Richard Thompson tribute album, featuring Bonnie Raitt, REM and X. The major release for the label this fall, however, will undoubtedly be *Sinatra Duets II*, which promises to feature another star-studded list of vocalists performing with the master himself.

BMG may have the most diverse list of new releases primed for the coming months. As usual, BMG's list of upcoming country releases is very strong, including Alabama's greatest hits, Brooks & Dunn, Clint Black, Aaron Tippin, Waylon Jennings and a collection of country stars on a Christmas compilation. That holiday vein will continue with seasonal releases from Kenny G, The Nylons and John Tesh.

Other major releases include a Barry Manilow big band record, best of albums from the Club Cutz series and Taylor Dayne, a Frank Sinatra/Tommy Dorsey box set, an Elvis gospel box set, and an interesting project called *Kermit-Unpigged*, featuring the famous Muppet in tandem with the likes of Vince Gill, Linda Ronstadt, Don Henley, George Benson and Ozzy Osbourne.

Also in the BMG window are new releases from Jeff Healey, Snap, Ofra Harnoy, Buddy

Guy, Carly Simon and George Winston, a new dance compilation entitled *Backspins*, and two new albums from the Olson Twins (of Full House fame).

From a domestic standpoint, Sony Music is putting focus on new albums from The Philosopher Kings and Kashtin, while continuing to work recent releases from *Junkhouse*, *Our Lady Peace*, and the *Borrowed Tunes* (Neil Young tribute) and *Kumbaya* compilations.

In the next few months, look for new product from such Sony artists as Gloria Estefan, Luther Vandross, Dolly Parton, Mary Chapin Carpenter, Pearl Jam, Cypress Hill and Big Audio (formerly Big Audio Dynamite), as well as various artists on the soundtrack for the new Sylvester Stallone/Sharon Stone film, *The Specialist*. One of the biggest albums of the Christmas season is likely to be *His-Story*, a two-CD greatest hits package from Michael Jackson, featuring seven new songs. The label is also releasing greatest hits albums from Sadé and Bob Dylan, with live albums coming from Barbra Streisand and James Taylor (actually a single compilation based on his earlier two-CD live set).

Holiday albums will be offered from Mariah Carey, Neil Diamond, Tony Bennett and, Alvin And The Chipmunks, with a guest appearance by Celine Dion.

A&M/Island/Motown is currently focusing its attention on major new product from Boyz II Men, Amy Grant and Jann Arden. In the coming months, the company will be highlighting a greatest hits album from Sting (featuring two new tracks), a double CD from Woodstock '94, a live package from John Hiatt entitled (humourously enough) *Live At Budokan*, and The Carpenters tribute album featuring Sonic Youth, The Cranberries, Sheryl Crow, Cracker and Matthew Sweet.

In the coming months, look for major new releases from Stevie Wonder (entitled *Conversation Peace*), Barry White (The Icon Is Love), The Cranberries (No Need To Argue) and Rymes With Orange. Having just signed him to the label, A&M will be reissuing the debut album by east coast fiddle master Ashley MacIsaac.

MCA has entered into the fall maelstrom with Peter Gabriel's *Secret World Live*, which will be followed shortly by new releases from The Tragically Hip (entitled *Day For Night*), Raffi, Furnaceface, Sara Craig, Lyle Lovett and Mark Chesnutt. The company will also highlight a dance compilation called the YTV Hit List, which will get a strong push via a six-week television campaign.

In October, the MCA schedule includes new Attic releases from the New Power

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Generation, 1-800-New-Funk and Nona Gaye. Other MCA priorities will include Trisha Yearwood, Victoria Williams, a Lynyrd Skynyrd tribute, and greatest hits albums from Jane Siberry and Aerosmith. The Aerosmith album, tentatively titled *Big Ones*, will include two new singles, and will be accompanied by a 100-minute video called *Big Ones You Can Look At*.

MCA's November lineup also looks strong, with scheduled releases including the Nirvana Unplugged album, and the brand new album from the reformed Eagles, entitled *Hell Freezes Over*.

PolyGram will be keying on a country compilation entitled *Red, Hot & Country*,

which features top-rank country artists such as Brooks & Dunn, Johnny Cash, Mary Chapin Carpenter, Dolly Parton and Mark Chesnutt performing some of their favourite songs, with all proceeds benefiting AIDS education.

Another novel item for the label will be a project entitled *The Glory Of Gershwin*, featuring notable pop artists such as Sting, Peter Gabriel, Bon Jovi, Meat Loaf and Elton John performing their favourite Gershwin tunes, with production handled by the legendary George Martin.

Other priorities for PolyGram in the coming months include a Bon Jovi greatest hits package entitled *Cross Road* (featuring two new tracks), new albums from The Cult,

Vanessa Williams, Black Sheep, Dead Can Dance, The Soupdragons, Emerson, Lake & Palmer, and James (featuring Brian Eno). The new ELP release will be followed by a single CD greatest hits package, taken from the four CD box set released last year.

Boys will be Boyz. Boyz II Men finally has a #1 hit in Canada. The group's *End Of The Road* was one of the biggest hits in US music history two years ago. However, the song only managed to peak at #3 here in Canada. That plateau is smashed with *I'll Make Love To You* this weeks #1 song.

Groups are leading. So far this year, 14 acts have claimed the #1 song in Canada. Boyz II Men becomes the seventh group to reach that level. There have been four male solo artists to accomplish that feat, while only three female solo artists have done it. Name those three artists.

An expected surprise! You just knew Eric Clapton's new album was going to be an early hot seller. You may not have guessed just how hot it was going to be. From *The Cradle* makes it debut in the #2 spot behind only *Dance Mix 94*. Even his massive *Unplugged* album didn't get off to this kind of start. That album debuted at #14 and didn't reach #2 until its fifth week.

Other familiar names . . . entering in the top quarter of the Albums chart include Sinead O'Connor. She returns with *Universal Mother*, which breaks in at #20. That's just ahead of the #25 entry of Peter Gabriel's *Secret World Live*.

So close. Sheryl Crow came oh so close to her first #1 hit. *All I Wanna Do* was edged out and has to settle for the #2 spot. I don't think she's complaining however. It has taken quite a while for her *Tuesday Night Music Club* album to kick in. It was the big mover last week and holds at #19.

Top Cancon song. After spending the past five weeks as the #2 Cancon song, first behind Sun's *Gonna Rise* and then Jane, Jann Arden's *Could I Be Your Girl* is the top homegrown song. It is also the #3 song overall in the country.

Award winning store. Congratulations to the Sam's store in Calgary's Chinook Centre on winning the *Retailer Of The Year* award at the recent CCMA festivities. Although one quarter of the Top 30 chart are country albums, only one managed to crack the top 10. Here is that list as reported by Rick Springer. 1. The Three Tenors 2. Michelle Wright 3. Mercury artist John Mellencamp has been forced to cancel the remainder of his *Dance Naked* tour, due to a newly discovered heart condition. The condition, an occluded artery of the heart, was discovered during a routine checkup at a hospital in Mellencamp's hometown of Bloomington, Indiana. Mellencamp had experienced unusual fatigue during the tour, prompting the hospital visit. Following the checkup, Mellencamp returned to his home in Bloomington for rest, with the prognosis good for a full recovery. Mellencamp's *Dance Naked* album was recently certified gold in Canada, led by the former #1 hit *Wild Night*.

Sire/Warner artist The Rheostatics has been confirmed for Toronto's Bathurst Street Theatre on October 6 and 7. The band is touring throughout Canada in support of its newest release, *Introducing Happiness*.

Tori Amos returns to Canada this fall with a series of dates in southern Ontario. Amos will bring her *Under The Pink* tour to Toronto's Massey Hall (Oct. 29), Kitchener's Centre In The Square (Nov. 1), two shows at Ottawa's National Arts Centre (7 and 10 pm, Nov. 3), and Hamilton Place (Nov. 5).

Guitar master David Lindley is set for October 12 at Toronto's Pheonix. Lindley, who has travelled to Jamaica, Spain, Portugal, Japan, Turkey, Uzbekistan and Kazakhstan in search of musical diversity, will be accompanied on his current tour by Jordanian percussionist Hani Naser. Opening the show is The Barstool Prophets' Graham Greer.

Steve Howe, the former lead guitarist for '70s progressive rockers Yes, is set for a special solo performance at Toronto's El Mocambo on October 1, with tickets going for \$15.

Imago/BMG artist Love Spit Love, featuring Psychedelic Furs' lead vocalist Richard Butler, will play Toronto's Lee's Palace on October 15 with special guests Gigolo Aunts.

Geffen/MCA artist Beck, will make a return trip to Toronto on October 21 for an all-

ages gig at The Opera House. Beck's *Mellow Gold* album has already surpassed platinum in Canada, with the song *Loser* quickly becoming an anthem for generation X'ers. Interestingly enough, Beck caused a bit of a stir during his last Toronto appearance when he performed a bizarre version of *Loser*, with little resemblance to the album version.

The Jazz Passengers, Windham Hill/BMG artist, will play Toronto's Opera House on Oct. 10, highlighting tracks from their latest Windham Hill release *In Love*. The Jazz Passengers will be joined by guest vocalist Deborah Harry, of '70s fave *Blondie*.

Warner's Dinosaur Jr. is set for an Oct. 31 date at Massey Hall in Toronto with guests Come and Juned. Dinosaur Jr. recently returned with its followup to the *Where You Been* album entitled *Without A Sound*.

Jonathan Richman, another underground star of the generation X club, will play one night at the Horseshoe Tavern in Toronto on October 24. Richman's latest effort, *I, Jonathan*, is available on Rounder Records.

The Rolling Stones have now sold more than two million tickets on the band's North American tour, with the sell-outs recorded over the weekend of Sept. 17-18 in Seattle, Vancouver, Little Rock, Minneapolis, Salt Lake City and Miami. A second Vancouver show has been added for December 17, and the band will also appear at Montreal's Olympic Stadium on Dec. 5. Still no word yet of a rumoured return to Toronto for a show at SkyDome.

Other stuff. The Barstool Prophets will open for The Dave Matthews Band, Oct. 6 at Lee's Palace in Toronto. Oasis will be joined by Why The Sky on Oct. 19 at Lee's Palace. Connie Kaldor plays Kitchener on Sept. 30, and Toronto's Bathurst Street Theatre on Oct. 1. The Jesus Lizard, with guests Girls Against Boys, plays Toronto's Opera House on Oct. 6. The Meat Puppets are slated for The Phoenix, Oct. 11. Robyn Hitchcock plays Lee's Palace Oct. 12, with guest Ron Sexsmith. DGC artist Ted Hawkins is at the Horseshoe Tavern Oct. 17, performing from his latest release *The Next Hundred Years*. EMI's Lucscious Jackson plays Lee's Palace Oct. 9, with guest Ben Harper.

Patty Loveless finds angels of a better nature

You get the sense that what Patty Loveless wants the most out of life is for everyone around her to be happy. Music is, by nature of its existence, a source of spiritual regeneration and emotional regurgitation. For the most part, it exists to purge the soul and mind of the artist, giving the person an outlet for their thoughts and feelings.

For Loveless, the emotions are bared, but she only wants to share the emotions with everyone else. She recognizes that the pain involved in relationships ending or friends departing isn't something experienced by herself alone. For her, the music on her Epic album *When Fallen Angels Fly* should be a healing source for everyone and anyone who has experienced loss.

"I felt the album, whether it's the fun songs or the very serious ones, is about people. The song itself is letting people know we're all human, and that we make mistakes, but there is always hope. When I talk about this right now I'm getting chills.

"Yes, I do believe in angels. Angels are hope, and I feel you have to have that in life. I feel there's people in my life that God has sent, to kind of give me guidance and advice. I felt the song *Why The Fallen Angels Fly*, described people, not just myself. That's why I felt the title was perfect for the album as well."

She felt so strongly about the song, in fact, that she petitioned Epic to change the album title.

"The record company wanted to go with *Here I Am*. I called Alan Butler at Epic and I explained everything to him, and I think I moved him so much emotionally that he couldn't help but call the album *When Fallen Angels Fly*."

Loveless has enjoyed tremendous success with this, her second album for Epic. The latest single, *I Try To Think About Elvis*, has already become a popular song at radio, becoming in its own small way an anthem for

positive thinking in the '90s.

But many of the songs on the record paint a poignant and powerful emotion picture. Songs such as *Halfway Down, You Don't Even Know Who I Am* or *Here I Am* are songs that express feelings we've all felt. Which brings us back around again to Loveless' motive for recording such songs. She wants her music to touch people, and she wants people to use it in their healing.

The song *You Don't Even Know Who I Am*, a song describing the neglected erosion of a marriage, is one in particular that cuts a whole in the heart of anyone who listens to it. Loveless feels that her own failed marriage contributed a great deal to the power the song conveys.

"That one does something to me inside, and I'm sure it does to a lot of other people too. This stirred some different emotions in me, because I've been through a divorce, and I got to the point where I felt he didn't know who I was. Because I was the one that left, when I sing this song it really hits home."

"But I am happily married now, and as long as you feel you're both working at it, marriage really can be a wonderful thing."

Loveless' husband happens to be her producer as well, Emory Gordy Jr., who also contributed his talents on bass to the project. Despite what some might think, working with her husband in the studio was for Loveless a rewarding experience, one she'd love to do again.

"He's a very sentimental-type of person, he feels the music himself. He's wonderful to

work with, I can't tell you enough. I hope we'll be working together for quite some time, because I just trust him wholly.

"When he criticizes me, it's really creative criticism, and I know that. He never really puts you down, he always praises the things you do. Even the things I don't do right he praises, he just gives it a little twist. I'm proud of the fact that when we're working together, the musicians have as much respect for him as I do."

While this album represents just her second on the Epic label, Loveless has been a respected member of the Nashville scene for nearly ten years. She only recently came into the spotlight after her move to Epic from MCA in 1992, a move she attributes to the all-important policy of looking out for number one.

"I'd been with MCA for six and a half years, and the only real successful album I'd had was *Honky Tonk Angels*. When I first went there it was just Reba and myself. Then came Trisha Yearwood, Wynonna, and it just seemed like the roster of girls was getting too large. There was part of me that felt the attention span had been stretched a little far.

"They gave me my first shot at making records, and I'll always respect them for that. But after six-and-a-half years, things were not moving as fast as I wanted them to. And Epic offered me a deal I couldn't refuse."

The success of this album is already keeping Loveless enormously busy. She admitted that in the last two months, she's had only two full days off. But the hard work is certainly beginning to pay off, as Loveless has moved into the first realm of country artists.



96 K-Lite in Edmonton awarded the grand prize in its Supersession talent contest to singer/songwriter Bobby Cameron, who won out over 60 other entrants. Cameron will now enter Homestead Recording Studio in Edmonton to do a five-track session with noted producer/engineer Randy Staub (U2, Bon Jovi). Once the basic tracks are laid down, the pair will travel to Vancouver to do a final mix at Bryan Adams' new studio, The Warehouse. Cameron also receives a music gear package from Edmonton's Axe Music.

Toronto's 297.3 FM will once again be the exclusive FM voice for Toronto Maple Leafs' broadcasts. The station will broadcast every pre-season, regular season and playoff game for the Leafs, featuring the broadcast team of Joe Bowen, Ken Daniels and Gord Stellick. 297.3 has also acquired the services of veteran Toronto newscaster Larry Silver, who will join Tom Rivers on the station's morning show from 5-10 am. Silver has been a part of the Toronto radio scene for more than 20 years, most of which was spent alongside Rivers at CFTR (now 680 News).

Montreal's Mix 96 has issued a petition to have the Montreal Expos declared the 1994 Season Champions of major league baseball. The station received more than 1,000 calls in response to the announcement, which was

made on Friday, Sept. 16. According to station PD Pat Holiday, "More than 2/3 of the season was played and that would be enough for a winner to be declared in an actual game. At the time the season was ended the Expos had the most wins of any team...so it seems only reasonable that they be awarded some sort of recognition for their record. We think that declaring them 1994 Season Champions will go a long way towards keeping fan interest alive for next year and the franchise viable in Montreal."

University of Toronto station CIUT-FM is celebrating the 400th show of *Celebration Starsong*, billed as "the only true Aquarian Age radio program." Host and producer Renee Gelpi began the show, which features new/meditation music, to provide relief for stressed-out listeners of all ages. The show has expanded to include interviews with "new paradigm personalities and musicians", and informative feature series on the Tarot, I Ching, Astrology and Numerology. The 400th anniversary show will feature an interview with new age comedian David Granirer. Like, cool man.

Kitchener, Ontario's 105.3 KOOL FM morning man Neil Hedley will become a human billboard beginning Sept. 26 at 12 noon, but thankfully, it's all for a good cause. Hedley has vowed to live on the billboard, located in downtown Kitchener, until the station raises more than \$10,350 in its annual fundraising drive for the United Way.

TMA to hold third Evening To Remember

The Toronto Musicians Association is holding its third annual Evening To Remember awards gala on November 11, in the Grand Metropolitan Ballroom of the Westin Harbour Castle.

The event honours excellence in music by artists from the Toronto area. The evening features the presentation of the Musician of Distinction Award (presented last year to Henry Cuesta) and the Toronto Musician Award (won last year by Rush).

Hosting the proceedings this year will be television personality and recording artist Doug Crosley. In celebration of this year's '40s theme, the artists performing include The Al Hirsch Orchestra with guest vocalist Arlene Smith, Bob Cary's Sentimental Journey Orchestra with vocalist Florence Lowry, and Bob Martin's Serenade In Blues with guest Lynn Roberts (formerly a vocalist with Tommy Dorsey, Benny Goodman and Harry James).

*Boxed set of Canadian folklore - a roots treasure***Sam Gesser lets his folk habit hang out**

Canadian folk music just might be saved from extinction through the unselfish and self-financed project of A Folksong Portrait Of Canada by Sam Gesser.

The three-CD boxed set anthology of more than 3½ hours of rare tape footage contains 94 songs taken from 38 albums of the



Canadian collection on Folkways Records. More than 70 singers and musicians from many regions of Canada are represented on these tracks which were recorded during the '50s and '60s.

This is folk music in its purest form. The pseudo-folk purists, looking for Gordon

Lightfoot sound-a-likes, might initially be disappointed, but if they are interested in real roots folk, Gesser has a package for you.

What's refreshing about this package, released on Mercury (PolyGram), is the fact that although it trumpets an historical era in Canadian music, no government was asked to contribute. A Folksong Portrait Of Canada was financed solely by internationally-acclaimed impresario Sam Gesser.

Gesser was born in Montreal's inner city 64 years ago. His expertise in booking and management was revealed early in his life. During the '50s and '60s his name became synonymous with folk artists and their music, but not strictly confined to this music genre. One of his first breaks in the record business happened to him in the early '50s with the New York-based Folkways label. A chance meeting with the label's president, Moses Asch resulted in Gesser taking on the distribution of Folkways in Canada.

This was the opportunity the 20-year old Gesser was looking for. There were no Canadian artists on Folkways, which pioneered early American blues, folk and jazz, so Gesser was given complete autonomy in hunting down and recording acts. During his 13-year association with Folkways, Gesser produced or co-produced more than 80 Cancon folk and traditional albums for the label. For this historical release, he had to dig into the vaults for many of these 94 tracks, which have been long out of print.

It was his day-to-day meetings with recording artists that led Gesser into the promotion business. "What better way to promote the records than to bring the artists in for concert dates."

During his colourful career he has promoted and produced more than 2,000 events which he staged in small to large soft-seat theatres and in one of the largest emporiums available, the Montreal Forum.

His shows ran the gamut, from the sublime to the ridiculous, and all added to his international entrepreneurship, not to mention financial gain. As a promoter, Gesser wanted to cover all aspects of entertainment. "I knew there was a ready market in Montreal for touring Broadway shows and I brought in my share of them. I also brought in the New York Symphony Orchestra. But, along with that came rock and roll acts and that's when I began to get worried."

Gesser recalls that his experience with Janis Joplin in 1969 brought him up short and made him realize his reputation might be better served if he was more discreet in booking acts.

Being as the Forum was the most sought-after for rock acts, Gesser opened the door to Donald Tarlton, a youngster who was promoting local rock dances. "It wasn't that great a decision, although thinking back, I probably would have done it differently."

Donald Tarlton, of course, has gone on to become a celebrity in his own right as head of Donald K. Donald Productions (DKD).

The 94-track anthology includes songs of

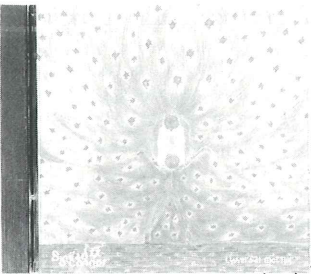

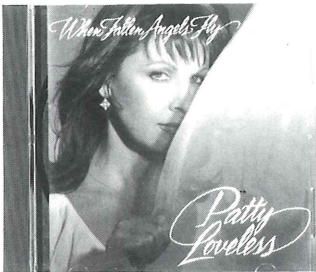
SINEAD O'CONNOR Universal Mother Chrysalis-30549-F

Okay, let's put aside all the things that have transpired in the past. Let's forget all that stuff about tearing up pictures of the Pope and refusing to have the national anthem played and breaking down and saying she doesn't want to have anything to do with the business anymore. Forget all that, because what O'Connor is, above all the silliness, is a formidable pop artist. Just listen to Prince's original version of his Nothing Compares 2 U, and then check out the powerful version that O'Connor did which became a major international hit. The difference is immeasurable, and that in itself is what makes O'Connor different. She refuses to be locked in a box labelled trendy or commercialized, and refuses to toe the '90s video pop star line. This latest release, produced by John Reynolds, Phil Coulter, Tim Simenon and O'Connor, features ten new O'Connor originals along with a pair of covers. The music is hypnotic, compelling stuff, which doesn't really deserve to be labelled pop. O'Connor's voice is better than it has ever been, potent and powerful, while still containing that squeaky edge that makes it unique. Some are calling this a comeback album of sorts. If that's true, her return is well worth the wait. -RR



LUTHER VANDROSS Songs Epic-77758-H

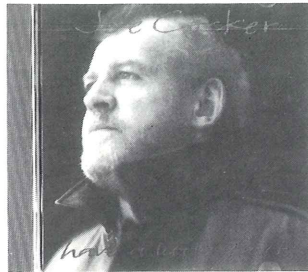
Vandross has been a monster performer in the US for more than a decade, but isn't exactly a household name here in Canada. But that essentially falls in line with the entire lack-of-success story of R&B/soul artists in general in this country. Luther's lack of notoriety up here is truly a shame, because his is one of the most brilliant voices in the business. Given the right vehicle, like Love Won't Let Me Wait, Here And Now or Don't Stop For Love, Vandross can sing rings around most artists in his field. Which is why this latest release should be a treat for all fans of true vocal talent. Vandross has personally chosen 14 classic pop songs to handle, and for the most part, his decisions are well made. Admittedly, some of the choices are a bit out of sync (The Impossible Dream, What The World Needs Now), but the majority of material is ideally suited for Vandross' velvet-coated voice. The lead single, a duet with Mariah Carey on the Richie/Ross classic Endless Love, doesn't really expand too much on the original. But others, Killing Me Softly, Evergreen, Since You've Been Gone and All The Woman I Need (a gender reversal of Whitney Houston's All The Man I Need), make this an ideal package for those cozy late night wine-sipping sessions. -RR



PATTY LOVELESS When Fallen Angels Fly Epic-64188-H

-Country

There's a vocal purring here that gives Loveless a distinct musical signature, and one that was carried over from her 1993 release of Only What I Feel. The market hasn't been that kind to Loveless, who if put on an equal footing, could sing circles around her contenders. Vocal purity aside, there is a bit of monotony with the song material. Perhaps I Try To Think Of Elvis, released as a single, is the best example. Loveless does display an edge at times, particularly on the Jim Lauderdale penning of Halfway Down. She could attract attention with the title track, written by Billy Joe Shaver and don't overlook the Emory Gordy Jr. and Jim Rushing penning of Feelin' Good About Feelin' Bad, a harvest moon-type of outing. -WG



JOE COCKER Have A Little Faith 550 Music/Epic-66460-H

-Rock/Pop

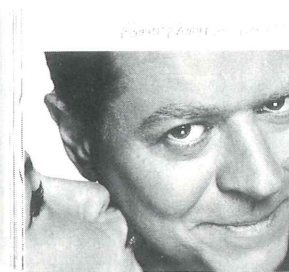
It would have been easy for Cocker to resign himself to the back catalogue sections of record stores, content with his place in the rock and roll annals as one of the more distinctive voices to emerge from the Woodstock era. But the thing that makes Cocker unique is that he's first and foremost a survivor. Which is one reason why the title of this album makes so much sense. Cocker's unflagging faith in his voice and his character have allowed him to flourish well into the '90s, when so many of his fellow '60s compatriots have faded into obscurity. Have A Little Faith is much like any other Cocker album, a 12-song compilation of covers that put that legendary gravel voice front and centre. Instead of enlisting a chorus of session players, as he's done in the past, Cocker instead brought his own touring band into the studio, and the result is some tight playing and a good personal feel. The lead song, Let The Healing Begin, could easily have been the title track, as it neatly sums up the ups and downs of Cocker's career. The Simple Things represents the most pop-oriented track of Cocker's career, and should make some noise at CHR stations. Don't overlook Take Me Home, a duet with new Fleetwood Mac lead vocalist Bekka Bramlett, which was featured on the Blown Away soundtrack. Other highlights include covers of John Hiatt's Have A Little Faith In Me, a reggae-esque version of the Lovin' Spoonful classic Summer In The City, and Out Of The Blue, penned by Robbie Robertson. -RR

ROBERT PALMER Honey EMI-30301-F

-Pop

If there was a defining voice for '80s pop, it might very well have been Robert Palmer. And if there was a definitive song for the '80s pretentious sensibilities, it might very well have been Addicted To Love. Palmer's music talked

the talk and walked the walk, at a time when such brazen self-importance was a recipe for success. Which goes a long way in explaining why Palmer quietly faded from the pop spotlight by the end of the decade. His polished pop



bravura was no longer fashionable, his outlandish videos filled with pouting models were no longer politically correct, his debonair British style was no longer in style. But time heals all wounds, the saying goes, and time has afforded Palmer the opportunity to readjust his sights for the '90s. This latest release may be the most personal of his career, attempting to combine the diverse influences of his early years with the more ragged-edge style of today. The result is an album that should bring Palmer back into pop prominence. Highlights include the heavy ballad You Blow Me Away, the African-tainted rhythms of Honeybee, and the aptly named You Dought To Know Me By Now, the most Palmer-esque song on the album. Produced by Palmer, with guest guitarist Nuno Bettencourt of Extreme. -RR

GLADYS KNIGHT Just For You MCA-10946-J

-Pop

The voice is unmistakable, and the first time you hear it on this new album, you start to wonder where it's been all these years. True, Knight spent much of 1992 performing the lead in a play called Madam Lilly. Yes, she currently has a role in the Fox TV series New York Undercover. But despite releasing a solo effort for MCA in 1991



(Good Woman), which had decent success in the US market, Knight hasn't really been an international success since her last hit with the Pips, Love Overboard, back in 1987. This new MCA release might be Knight's ticket back to the forefront, containing some of the strongest songs she's had to work with since the days of Midnight Train To Georgia and I've Got To Use My Imagination. The key here is that Knight has gone to two of the biggest writers and producers in the R&B field, Jimmy Jam & Terry Lewis and Babyface, to help shape the record. The result is an entertaining pop effort that is overflowing with hit potential. Highlight tracks include the Babyface-penned I Don't Wanna Know, Next Time and Home Alone (both produced by Jam & Lewis), and an album-ending medley of three great R&B tunes: If You Don't Know Me By Now, Love Don't Love Nobody and the Boyz II Men monster hit End Of The Road. Still, in spite of the famed songwriters and producers here, the voice is still the key. There may be others around today that are more famous, but there are few that are better. -RR

GREG HOLLAND Let Me Drive Warner Bros-45638-P

-Country

Holland, a fresh new talent, makes his Warner Bros. debut with this Mark Wright

production. The title track, written by Gerry House and Bob DiPiero, was taken as the first single, but failed to gain enough attention to maintain any chart presence. Holland has a distinctive vocal range that should gain him a strong fan base once he kicks in. He could do it with the Mark Wright/Ronnie Rogers penning of Still Goes On, or Sweetwater, written by Allen Shamblin and Jon Vezner. There are a couple of possible left-fielders as well: Hurts, Don't It, which Holland wrote with Sam Hogin and Jim McBride and a real attention-getter, Me And You And The Moon, written by Stan Munsey Jr., Cris Moore and Richard E. Carpenter. Song material is excellent and Holland adds a gentle yet persuasive touch in interpreting the lyrics. Holland is obviously in the class of the new, young breed to watch. -WG

JULIAN AUSTIN Back On Track TMA (No number)

-Country

This New Brunswick country talent has a healthy vocal approach that gives him a mean and matter-of-fact delivery. He runs the gamut here, from uptempo, line dancing to ballads, and all packaged up with a neatness that reveals his roots and allows for a gentle mix of the traditional with the contemporary. It is rare and at the same time, refreshing to hear a real country talent from down east without the Celtic or Newfoundland flavouring. Austin has a peculiar sense of timing and spurts of vocal energy that creates an interest factor with each track. He isn't too shabby as a writer either, best illustrated on True Love and Dashboard Lights. Pour Me Another Memory and Line Dancin' Country Girl, which he wrote with Phil McGeehan are also very impressive tracks. But don't overlook Lonesome Highway, which he wrote with Stephen Robichaud. Exceptional instrumental backing here with Stephen Silvea (drums), Lew Jenkins (steel), Phil McGeehan (lead guitar), Ian Vail (piano), Steve Hill (harmonica, slide guitar), Alan Gray (bass), John Jeffries (banjo), Lloyd Hanson (bass, fretless bass). Produced by Austin and Lloyd Hanson. Call 506-453-0901. -WG

LISA BROKOP Every Little Girl's Dream Patriot-89252-F

-Country

Now 21, this Surrey, BC talent is on the threshold of breaking big in the US. With manager Paul Mascioli setting the guidelines, and making the necessary contacts in Nashville, Jerry Crutchfield was suitably impressed to launch Brokop's career on his new Patriot label. Give Me A Ring Sometime,



the first focus single, has moved quickly up the Canadian charts and is now doing the same in the US. This is the voice of a polished professional, warm and tender, and aggressively attuned to the lyric content. Crutchfield, as producer, has called in some of the best pickers in the business which adds to the overall professionalism of the production. The song material was obviously very carefully chosen as well. Key here is You Already Drove Me There, written by Scott Edward Phelps and Cyril Rawson, which qualifies as two-parts Cancon (AL). Brokop should have a long run with this album, which is at least six singles deep. One Of Those Nights, written by Conway Twitty and Troy Seals, The Jeff Black penning of Never Did Say Goodbye, and Every Little Girl's Dream, written by Dave Loggins and Kenny Mimms, look good as single material, but don't overlook the Skip Ewing/Mickey Cates penning of Who Needs You, which could be a left-fielder. -WG

First box set among new Anne Murray releases

EMI Music Canada has set a November 1st release date for the first box set from superstar Anne Murray.

Entitled *Anne Murray - Now & Forever* (The Complete Collection), the 3-CD package contains more than 60 tracks, handpicked by Murray herself, including alternate mixes, live versions and previously unreleased material.

Included is *Little Bit Of Soap*, the first song Murray ever recorded (unreleased); *You Needed Me*, a never-heard-before version of Murray singing her hit with her son segueing into the original version; *Heaven Is Here* (unreleased, circa 1970); *Snowbird*, the first ever performance of this song on television; *Moments To Remember*, two versions of the song mixed together, one from her very first demo tape in 1964, the other from Croonin', which was released in 1993; *Lonely But Only For You*, written by K.T. Oslin (previously unreleased); and *Broken Hearted Me*, the Spanish version (previously unreleased).

The box set also contains a 40-page history in words and pictures, a discography and list of lifetime achievements.

A greatest hits package, *Now & Forever* (The Best Of Anne Murray), will ship to retail on Oct. 18.

The 20-track package features 19 of Murray's biggest hits in her 25-year career from *Snowbird* to *Make Love To Me*.

The 20th song, *Over You*, was found by producer Fraser Hill while he was going through the vaults in preparation for Murray's box set. The original tracks for the song, including a vocal track, were recorded by David Foster in 1985.

With the blessing of both Murray and Foster, EMI sent Hill back into the studio with the basic tracks to remix it with brand new additional tracks, bringing it up to 1994

standards. The track will be taken as the first single and released simultaneously with the album.

To complete Murray's fall/winter retail blitz, EMI is preparing the release of two of her previous Christmas albums on one CD. The 25-track release is entitled *Anne Murray - Best Of The Season*.

Included in the package is *This Season Will Never Grow Old*, which was only

Anne Murray's six-date swing through the US Atlantic seaboard grossed US\$409,810.84.

Murray pulled a house of 2,305 (96%) at the 2,389 seat Anderson Theatre in Birmingham, N.Y. (Aug 18), grossing \$43,203. The date was promoted by Stu Green of Magic City. Ticket prices ranged from a high of \$31.50 to a low of \$15.00.

The Hyannis, Maine concert in the 2,300

seat Cape Cod Melody Tent (19), attracted an audience of 2,237 (97%). With ticket prices pegged at \$40.00 and \$35.00, the Vince Longo promoted concert grossed \$75,210.50.

The North Shore Music Theatre date (20) in Beverly, Maine, promoted by Jim Polese pulled a 100% house in the 1,847 seat theatre. With tickets at \$39.50 and \$35.50, the gross was \$70,156.50.

An audience of 2,805 at the Melody Fair Theatre in North Tonawanda, N.Y. (24), grossed \$70,900.24 at the 3,400 seat theatre where tickets were posted at \$27.50. With ticket prices at \$29.45 and \$21.73, the 3,185 seat Starlite Music Theatre date (25) in Latham, N.Y., grossed \$93,592.10 from a capacity house (100%). Both shows were promoted by Ed Smith.

The 2,872 seat Oakdale Theatre in Wallingford, Connecticut attracted an audience of 2,417 (84%). The Beau Seagull promoted date (28) with tickets pegged at \$27.50, \$25.50 and \$17.50, grossed \$56,748.50.

legacy began with their internationally acclaimed debut album, "And Now The Legacy Begins". The album was certified gold in Canada on the strength of 3 chart topping singles ("My Definition", "Wash Your Face In My Sink", "Ludi").
