

Mercury/PolyGram readies new Elton John release

Fresh on the heels of his enormous success via The Lion King Soundtrack, which featured the massive #1 hit Can You Feel The Love Tonight, pop music giant Elton John is set to release his new studio album, titled Made In England.

The album, which hits the streets March 22, will be led by the first single, Believe. With 1995 marking John's 25th year as a recording artist, PolyGram Music Canada is ecstatic that John is back in the PolyGram family, after a brief sojourn with MCA.

"Internationally he's been with Phonogram for a number of years," notes Mercury/Polydor's Gerry Vogel, "but now this one's gone over to the PolyGram family per se in North America. It was a nice surprise for us, and we're honoured and privileged."

Vogel adds that the album "harkens back to his classic projects of the '70s, but in no way is it real retro. He's working with Paul Buckmaster, who's worked with him a lot in the past. Paul Carrack and the London Session Orchestra appear on here."

Warner Music Canada signs up Great Big Sea

Warner Music Canada has announced the signing of Newfoundland artist Great Big Sea to a long-term recording agreement, a signing which took place at the recent East Coast Music Awards in Sydney, Cape Breton.

Great Big Sea has risen to prominence in Newfoundland in the past two years, fuelled by the success of the group's self-titled independent debut album, and the strength of their powerful live performances.

The group consists of Alan Doyle (guitar, bouzouki, vocals), Sean McCann (guitar, tin whistle, bodhran, vocals), Darell Power (bass) and Bob Hallett (fiddle, button accordion, mandola, tin whistle, Irish flute, vocals). The band is currently recording its second album with producer Danny Greenspoon for a summer release.

According to Warner Music Canada president Stan Kulin, "The signing of Great Big Sea compliments our new affiliation with Ground Swell Records, and an already successful relationship with The Irish Descendants. We are believers in the music of Atlantic Canada and the agreement with Great Big Sea is a further example of our commitment to its development."

With his profile at its highest point in decades from the Lion King phenomenon, and his current North American tour with fellow piano man Billy Joel, Made In England is primed to become John's biggest album since the days of Goodbye Yellow Brick Road and Captain Fantastic.

"His profile in a lot of ways has never been higher," Vogel points out. "1995 is basically his 25th year in the music business. I went back through the Canadian chart books and I counted 33 top ten hits, 13 of which were #1."

"There's also an interactive press kit coming out, along with a lot of other surprises over the next little while, because obviously, with any Elton John album, we'll hopefully be working single off it until this time next year."

Livia Tortella, Phonogram Canada label manager, says that she's happy just to be able to finally answer questions about Elton John without having to relay the calls to another company.

"Ever since I started as label manager at Phonogram three years ago, I kept seeing the Elton John faxes come through the fax, knowing that we had nothing to do with it, so yes, we're pretty happy."

According to Tortella, while the album does echo the sounds of his glory days, it also has a modern edge to it, so it should appeal to both old and new fans.

"The way producer Greg Penny describes it is that it's a very modern Elton John record, but it also has a very classic feel. Tumbleweed Connection comes to mind, and some of his other earlier records. A lot of the ballads on the record are much like the

old Elton John epics, so there's definitely a lot of substance here."

While the immediate focus will obviously be on AC and CHR-oriented stations, Tortella is hoping that, as in the old days, album-oriented stations might pick up some tracks as well.

"We're focusing on AC and CHR, but I

Julie Masse performs during presidential visit

Montreal native and Surge Records artist Julie Masse received the impressive honour of being invited to perform for Prime Minister Jean Chretien and US President Bill Clinton during the president's state visit to Canada.

On Feb. 23 at the Museum of Civilization in Hull, Quebec, Masse performed one song in each of Canada's two official languages: C'est Zero, the song which made her a star in Quebec; and Letting Go, the current single from her English-language debut, Circle Of One.

Already a veteran of performing for dignitaries in the international arena, Masse has previously performed for the Governor-General Of Canada and Queen Elizabeth II.

Recently, Masse was nominated for a Juno award for female vocalist of the year for her Circle Of One album. Masse previously was named most promising female vocalist at the 1993 Junos.

Circle Of One, distributed domestically by Select, has already been certified gold in Canada. Masse's previous two albums, Julie Masse and A Contre-Jour, have been certified double platinum and platinum respectively.

Loreena McKennitt firmed for San Remo Festival

Included in Loreena McKennitt's world tour is a performance at Italy's prestigious San Remo Festival.

This year marks the 45th anniversary of the festival, considered one of Italy's most important launching pads for new and established artists. Performances by international stars each evening of the festival adds to its popularity in attracting large audiences to the site as well as on television.

McKennitt joins Madonna, Elton John, Ray Charles, Annie Lennox, Chris Isaak and Take That as part of the international lineup. She will perform The Bonny Swans on the closing night of the festival (Feb. 25).

The concert will be televised to an estimated 20 million viewers worldwide. Tele Latino


in Canada was scheduled to air the entire concert on Feb. 25 from 2 to 7:30 pm and re-broadcast highlights that evening from 8 pm to 1:30 am.

Following the San Remo date, concerts are scheduled in Zurich (March 1), Paris (2), Nancy (3), Rezzato (5), Milan (6), Florence (7), Rome (8) and Genoa (9).

The tour then heads for Australia and New Zealand, beginning with Adelaide (14), Sydney (16), Brisbane (17), Melbourne (20), Auckland (23) and Wellington (24).

McKennitt's most recent WEA album, The Mask And Mirror, is now double platinum in Canada, gold in Spain and Italy and close to gold in Australia and New Zealand. Her previous album, The Visit, is now triple platinum in Canada.





kind of believe that there are tracks on the record that album radio can play, because there is a theme that ties all the tracks together.

"It really all depends on where the radio formats are at this time. Elton has had a lot of mellow tracks in his career that album radio has supported. It would be great if songwriters of his calibre could get featured on album radio again. It would be nice if album radio gave it a try, because it isn't The Lion King."

Tortella also noted that, while the timing of the March 29 Toronto concert by John and Joel is wonderful, it was purely coincidental. She did add that "they may have rushed the album because of the tour though."

Believe, the first single from Made In England, goes to radio the week of February 27.

Warner appointment gives nod to Bonnie Fedrau

For the past two years, Bonnie Fedrau has been working with Warner Music Canada's vice-president of A&R Kim Cooke.

She is now a full-blown A&R representative, a title change that "is incredibly well-earned," says Cooke.

The promotion, as Cooke goes on to point out "reflects Bonnie's unceasing devotion to her work and the invaluable contacts she has developed within the musical community nationwide."

Tribute to Rudolf Nureyev firmed for O'Keefe Centre

International dance stars from around the world will be among the lineup at Toronto's O'Keefe Centre on March 7 to perform in A Night To Remember.

This historic evening of dance is being staged to honour the memory of the legendary Rudolf Nureyev, considered the most famous ballet dancer in the world.

Nureyev last graced the stage of the O'Keefe as the principle in The King And I a few years ago. He died of cancer a short time later.

The one-day event is being held under the direction of Kirov Ballet artistic director Oleg Vinogradov. The producer is Toronto's Theatre Arts Production International (producer Solomon Tencer and associated producer Esther Zeppieri).

Mercury/Polydor adds to central region promotion

David Freeman, vice-president promotion and publicity for Mercury/Polydor, has announced the appointment of Tony Szambor as promotion representative for the central region. His appointment was effective Feb. 20.

A native of Hamilton, Ontario, Szambor has been assisting the central region promotion staff on a volunteer basis since last summer. Previously, he studied broadcasting at Hamilton's Mohawk College, worked two Dallas stations, KDGE (The Edge) and KZPS, and gained invaluable knowledge of the record business as a student intern at PolyGram Group Distribution's Dallas branch.

Szambor's responsibilities will include servicing radio, press and TV outlets in southwestern, northern and eastern Ontario. He joins co-workers Ron Harwood and Donna Lidster, working out of Mercury/Polydor's Markham office.

With more than 14 years experience in the entertainment industry as a presenter, producer and as a marketing and communications director, Cartwright has a Bachelor of Arts Degree in film and television from the University of British Columbia.

Most recently, she has produced and promoted music, comedy, dance and lecture programs for the Elgin and Winter Garden Theatres in Toronto. She has experience on a number of film and television projects and has worked with several major arts corporations in and around Metropolitan Toronto.

Roy Thomson Hall and Massey Hall are considered Canada's premiere concert facilities. With 2,812 seats and 2,757 seats respectively, the corporation presents major artists, primarily in music and lectures, aggregating 400 performances each year.

Men Of The Deeps sign with Duckworth/Atlantica

Canada's famed coal miner's choral, The Men Of The Deeps, has signed with Duckworth/Atlantica for national distribution through EMI Music Canada.

Based in Cape Breton, the popular group has been together for more than 28 years, performing across Canada, the US and China. It was the group's show-stopping performance of Working Man, with Rita MacNeil, at the 1988 Juno Awards that opened the door to national recognition. Appearances with Anne Murray and with The Rankin Family followed.

Duckworth will take the best songs from the group's five previously-released albums which will be packaged as Buried Treasures and released in late March.


Jazz professor takes on Verve label duties

WALT SAYS . . . !

We had fun . . . ! In all the confusion of getting back home after five days in the sun on Cape Breton Island, I forgot to mention how much fun we had. It wasn't St. John's, like the year before, when the parties went all night, but we still had a lot of laughs. Two, maybe three of the guys who did shake things up were Ed Lovick, manager of Newfoundland's favourite stand-up, lay down, or sit-up comic, Jimmy Flynn, Pat Reid, who handles promotion and everything else he can for Quality in the Atlantic provinces, and his boss, Bernie Willock, the guy who was paying all the bills. Lovick, watched very closely by Reid, was carrying around this huge hockey equipment bag, which was packed with Jimmy Flynn paraphernalia: joke books, CDs, cassettes and videos. He didn't miss a trick, selling from the parking lot, hotel lobbies and wherever he could attract a crowd, which wasn't difficult. (EC: *I hear it's in the works . . . ?*)

The Russian Tea Room . . . ? After receiving an invitation to attend a party after the Grammy Awards, I've received a couple more interesting invites. One that really floored me was an invitation to check out The Russian Tea Room in New York. The last time I only got as far as the front door. All those beards and hairy arms turned me off. Tommy is coming . . . ! Well, the Mirvishes, that should be Mirvi, have certainly stirred up a new generation of musical theatre goers. Tommy will premiere in Toronto at the Elgin Theatre on March 1. The age group interested in this production is certainly a lot younger than those who lined up for Phantom, Miss Saigon or Crazy For You. Who fans, obviously! Rumour has it, and I didn't hear it from JK, that Pete Townshend wants the Toronto production to be different from the Broadway show. Of course, with a talent like Tyley Ross in the leading role, it would only be proper to have something a little different, more relative to north of the 49th. (EC: *That doesn't work in musical theatre . . . ?*)



FEATURED ARTIST - by Ron Rogers

Mike Shields crosses all formats on Grace Motel

Radio people have this thing about labels. They like to know in advance what type of category a record falls into, even before listening to it, so as to determine whether or not it fits their format. The problem for an artist like Mike Shields is that he doesn't really fall neatly into any category.

Grace Motel, Shields' debut independent album, is a strong collection of versatile songs that often defy categorization. Radio is still somewhat hesitant to drop it into rotation because of this, but Shields believes that the record is slowly making its way into the market.

"It's making its way out there, and people are liking it, which is a good thing. My publicity people are really doing a good job. To tell you the truth, I'm getting more support out in the east than I am here in Calgary. I think if Old Neighbourhood (the current single) makes its way into the top 30 they'll start playing it, because they're pretty conservative out here."

The Calgary native is an artist who comes by his talents via some strong musical pedigree. Both parents were music teachers, who had hopes of their son becoming a classical pianist. But Shields, like most teenagers do, turned his back on the classical field once he discovered rock and roll.

"I was sort of a little child prodigy I guess. I won a few awards for my piano playing when I was a kid. At the time, I wasn't exactly into the whole classical music thing and practising every morning, so I rebelled against it. I suppose now I somewhat regret it. I certainly know a heck of a lot more about music because of it. But I think my parents are pretty happy with me now. They weren't too pleased at the time, but seeing how things are going now, they're back in my corner."

Shields knows now that having both parents as music teachers certainly aided his growth as a musician. While he didn't keep up his classical piano training, it is still the instrument of choice.

"My dad was a singing teacher as well, he was a band and choir director at our high school, so he helped me start singing. The piano is definitely my main thing, the instrument I do most of my writing on. I'm a bit of a poseur at it, but I'd like to think I can keep up with most guys."

Like most budding rock and rollers, Shields started his first band while still in high school, and acted as the main songwriter and leader of the band. But soon thereafter, he did a complete left turn and joined an a cappella group.

"That first band was a bunch of guys from my school and another school in Calgary. We snuck into the clubs, didn't tell anybody how old we were. Then I got out of the whole rock and roll thing for a while and joined an a capella group. We toured around Canada and parts of the states, doing everything from early renaissance music right up to swing and Manhattan Transfer kind of stuff."

"We got to be fairly good and we were flying around everywhere. We were on a flight one day, heading over to the Queen Charlotte Islands. We were practising, and I was the bass guy, going 'dum, dum, dum, dum' over and over, and I think at that moment I realized how stupid it was. I just thought, 'I'm not very happy doing this.'"

Interestingly enough, his connections to his old high school mates came in handy when it came time to make Grace Motel. Running into former bandmate, producer Doug Romanow, led to

a spot in a Toronto studio to record his debut.

"Doug was one of the guys from my very first band, and he suggested I go out to Toronto to record it. He had a lot of contacts in the studios, so it was really his idea to do it out there, and I'm glad I did. It was a little more comfortable going with a guy I knew. And with the band way back then I was kind of the leader, so it certainly helped in the studio,

"I sort of said 'Doug, this is how it's gonna go!' I don't know if another producer would go for my style of recording or not. He gave me a couple of hints on lyrical things he thought might go better, but for the most part the arrangements remained the same."

The songs on Grace Motel touch on a variety of musical styles, which again poses the question of what radio formats will attract. But Shields says the tough job for him was to cut the album down to 11 songs, when he had such an enormous breadth of material to choose from.

"It was tough to pare them all down. We tried to take songs that stood up well on their own. In a way it's a good thing and a bad thing. If you listen to the album it's pretty versatile, pretty spread out stylewise. Maybe next time we'll focus things a little more, but I guess we said everything we needed to say."

"Radio's kind of scary these days because of the whole classic rock thing. Fortunately, because I grew up in the '70s, with that urban classic rock sound, it's become my style."

While Shields' music is definitely of a personal nature, with a fair amount of personal introspection involved, it also touches an optimistic note, something he made sure to include.

"I like to show a little light at the end of

the tunnel. A lot of people out there write about some pretty heavy subjects. We have some heavy subjects as well, with songs like Confessions or Step Back. I'm not a brilliant musician or anything, but the lyrics are very important to me."

While a scattered number of radio stations have picked up the first two singles, Motel Row and The Old Neighbourhood, Shields is hoping that the powerful videos which accompany the two songs (now aired on Much and NCN) will gain some further airplay at radio. He also hopes that they might spur a little interest from the major labels.

"The majors have all shown some interest in it. They're cherry pickers essentially, they're not really developing a whole lot of artists right now. I understand that. That's fine. That's why we did this ourselves. The labels really like it, but I think they want me to sell about 10,000 copies independently before they sign on. But I certainly like this whole independent thing."

If the album doesn't fly, Shields will certainly be able to keep himself busy. He is currently a music director for a Calgary video production company. He composes jingles for radio and television commercials, and composes for live theatre and films. And he's also an active studio session player in the Calgary area. But as he points out, being a professional musician, especially in Calgary, can be a tough way to make a living.

"Being a musician is a pretty unstable thing. I think you just have to keep yourself busy, especially in Calgary. Calgary's way too small to be just a studio musician."

Mike Shields will be heading back to the southern Ontario region shortly to promote the album. After that, he will head back out to Calgary for this year's Alberta Recording Industry Association Conference, where he will offer his insights into the world of music videos as a panelist on the Wild World Of The Music Video seminar, hosted by MuchMusic.

BROWNSTONE

From The Bottom Up MJJ/Epic-57827-H

You know that if Michael Jackson wants to sign you to his own MJJ Music label, than you've got



something worth listening to. This R&B trio performed one a capella song at the MJJ offices, and that was enough to get them signed on the dotted line. The music is definitely R&B, but it has enough of a jazz influence to give it a bit more heart than most of the R&B vocal groups that seem to be popping up like flies in the last few years. The group is definitely worldly, featuring New Orleans-born Mimi, Detroit-born Nicci

and Guyana-born Maxee. And the phrase, From The Bottom Up, works perfectly, as this group works with a greater emotional background than most modern day du-wop artists. It's also refreshing to see that this group actually writes the majority of the material, with Nicci (real name Nichole Gilbert) taking on the lion's share of the writing. Like good radio-bound pop should, this stuff features some strong production backing some potent hooks, which should add up to decent chart success, particularly in the R&B-rich US market. Highlight tracks include Grapevine, If You Love Me, Pass The Lovin' and I Can't Tell You Why. With MJ's name on it, this one should get a look from radio. -RR

BOYS ON THE SIDE - Soundtrack

Various Artists Arista-18748-N


Not to sound politically incorrect or anything, but what a good way to promote a film starring three women (a rare thing in Hollywood these days) by putting together a soundtrack featuring female artists. Of course, it doesn't hurt that the ladies (is it okay to say that?) are finally starting to receive their due from the record biz, as is evidenced by the impressive slate of talent assembled herein. The females on this record are here because they make good records, not because of some subtle political machinations. Some of the tracks here you'll already know - Annie Lennox's Why, The Cranberries' Dreams, Joan Armatrading's Willow and Sarah McLachlan's version of Tom Waits' Ol '55 (which appeared on her Freedom Sessions album). There's also a few covers done for this album, including Bonnie Raitt's cover of Roy Orbison's You Got It, Jonell Mosser's version of

THE JAYHAWKS

Tomorrow The Green Grass American/Warner-43006-P

It's far too rare for albums of this calibre to be released. The simple, acoustic-inspired structuring of the well-layered instrumental backing serves as a perfect balance for the vocal harmonies. There should be no boundaries for this George Drakoulias production which will make inroads with all formats. The vocal harmonies are key, as is the work of guitarists Mark Olson and Gary Louris, who wrote most of the material, and new keyboardist Karen Grotberg. With the exception of the latter, there is a decade of experience here and it's fairly obvious, as the vocal properties give way to a little country funk and gentle folk, woven neatly together with a sometimes overpowering rock influence that, surprisingly, doesn't offend. Blue, which features string arrangements by Paul Buckmaster, who did the same for David Bowie and Elton John, has been taken as the first single and video. This album is more than a few singles deep. Patch into Two Hearts that features an interesting baritone guitar solo by producer Drakoulias, and Over My Shoulder, with some not-too-shabby fiddle work by Tammy Rodgers. Speaking of fiddle work, add to that list Nothing Left To Borrow, with Lili Haydn doing the honours on both fiddle and viola. But don't overlook Miss Williams' Guitar, which could be the left-fielder of all left-fielders from this package. The cover of Grand Funk's Bad Time isn't too shabby either. -WG


the immortal Robert Johnson ode Crossroads, and another version of You Got It by Whoopi Goldberg (yes, she can sing!). New songs include I Take You With Me from Melissa Etheridge, Keep On Growing by Sheryl Crow, Stevie Nicks' Somebody Stand By Me (written, coincidentally, by Crow), Indigo Girls' Power Of Two and The Pretenders' Everyday Is Like Sunday. For some reason, Raitt's version of You Got It is included twice, but that's just a quibble. Let's hope the movie is this good. -RR

JOHN LEE HOOKER

-Blues

Chill Out Pointblank/Virgin-40107-F

How, How, How, How...Hey, Heeyyyy! Now this is blues, done by a guy who's been doing it his entire life. Hooker celebrates his 75th (yes, 75th!) birthday in 1995, and he has truly never sounded better. The sad thing is that he's announced that he will no longer be touring, which is unfortunate, since an entire generation of music lovers will never be able to appreciate his impressive natural talents. Hooker is a true survivor, someone who emerged from the raw wilds of the Mississippi Delta some fifty years ago, and actually lasted in the business long enough to get some recognition from




the hundreds of artists he's influenced. The album features a generous helping of the blues, spanning both earlier Hooker tunes and some strong new material. The title track was recorded with Carlos Santana (a long-time supporter) and his band, and the energy of the latin rocker provides a nice launching point for the album. Hooker does a remake of his ghostly classic Tupelo, while R&B piano great Charles Brown lends his talents to Brook Benton's 1959 hit Kiddio. Other standouts include the classic One Bourbon, One Scotch, One Beer, Deep Blue Sea, If You've Never Been In Love, and a couple of new songs, Woman On My Mind and Too Young. If it sells great - if not, well, there's no accounting for taste. -RR

THE WALK

-Rock

Turbine Gritty City Records-005

This group began in the hinterlands of Sudbury back in 1987, and the mining analogy can definitely be applied to this band, which has plowed through the silt and found some solid rock sounds to work with. After relocating to Hamilton in recent years, the group has been able to pin-down its sound a little more, with their musical maturity quite in evidence here. The group's first independent CD, entitled Insomuch, gave them a bit of notice in the southern Ontario club scene.




Last year, the group came out with The Wellington EP cassette, a tight collection of songs that garnered the group a slot on Junkhouse's 1994 Canadian tour. Turbine simply brings the band's sound up another notch, while not belying the intensity and grit that first earmarked them for success. The thing that will leap out at you at first is lead singer Dave Allan's powerful vocals. The rest of the group (guitarist Jason Frederick, bassist Eric Forget and drummer Jame Prudhomme) provides a strong rhythmic foundation for Allan's voice, never overplaying and burying his passionate voice. Produced by Crash Vegas vet Colin Cripps, mixed by Mark S. Berry (Headstones, Lee Aaron), the album is available through Toronto's Gritty City Records. -RR

STEVE KOLANDER - Country/Plus Scoot Over, Move Closer

River North Nashville/Polydor-1098-Q

Chicago country? That's where this marriage took place, between Kolander and label owner Joe Thomas, who happens to be based in Chicago. Kolander's influences are fairly obvious, but it's his vocal individuality that will attract country programmers and record buyers. He eases into a potpourri of '40s, '50s and '60s country, with an incredible rockabilly, blues and jazz powerbase that's structured to create his own musical signature. Vocally, Kolander, an admitted songwriter first, straps himself into his own lyric world as only he can interpret best. He should have the New Country guys onside



with the first single, Black Dresses, which will also garner much interest from the traditionalists. But don't pigeon-hole Kolander. He's about as contemporary as a traditionalist can be, and with enough New Country grease to catch a large piece of the whole pie. He has 11 tricks in this bag, seven of which he solo wrote, and all which have that potential to break through. Try on Black Dresses, Can't Tame Your Love, Maybe and Night After Night, which was written about Hank Williams Sr. and Maria, which he co-wrote with Patrick Murnane, could be a left-fielder. -WG

RADIO

Edmonton's CFBR The Bear has announced the sales of the station's clothing line, Bear Wear, have reached the \$1 million mark, making it the most successful merchandising program in North American radio history. Sold through three Animal Nation locations in Edmonton malls, the clothing line now features more than 50 different styles of merchandise. With 10% of the sales going to The Bear Children's Fund, this achievement translates to \$100,000 towards the fund in total. That funding in turn has gone to such programs as an inner city schools hot lunch program, and neo-natal heart monitors at a children's hospital. The Bear Children's Fund has had a banner year, with an additional \$80,000 raised from other fundraising programs. Congrats CFBR.

Windsor/Detroit's The River 93.9 FM has announced the addition of Ann Delisi to the position of director of music and special programming, effective Feb. 22. Delisi will also host the station's midday program, 10 am - 2 pm. Delisi had been with Detroit's WDET for 12 years, where she was music director and midday host as well. According to Murray Brookshaw, program manager for The River, "The addition of Ann Delisi to our team is another building block in making the River 93.9 FM the most exciting radio station in Detroit. I am convinced that given her style and music sense, there is no one in the country that would be more of an asset to The River than Ann Delisi. This is a major coup."

Red Deer's Z99 FM has launched a new program, in conjunction with the local RCMP, aimed at curbing the number of car thefts in the Alberta town. The minute a vehicle is reported stolen, the RCMP call the station and go live with a description of the hot car, along with any other relevant information. On the morning of Jan. 30, for example, the RCMP called at 10:30 am with information about a car stolen overnight. Within three minutes of the broadcast, they received calls from observant listeners, and recovered the car.

Vancouver's CFOX got some healthy assistance from EMI metal mavens Megadeth in raising some food for the Vancouver Food Bank recently. More than 100 fans braved wind and cold temperatures to line-up early in the morning in the Imperial parking lot, behind the CFOX studios, with their Megadeth concert tickets and at least 10 pounds of food for the food bank. Those fans were rewarded with a

backstage pass to meet Megadeth after the group's Feb. 18 concert at the PNE Concert Bowl.

CJCM 1340 AM Grand Centre joined up with local libraries for the annual toy drive for the Dr. Margaret Savage Crisis Centre, inspiring overwhelming response from the Tri-town area. Executive director Joie Dery was enormously pleased with the results, with literally truck loads of toys being donated. The centre sees 300 children each year, many of whom arrive at the centre without their favourite toys. By the by, CJCM's Sean Burke informs us that, according to Mademoiselle Magazine, women come on to men as often as men proposition women in the '90s. Inspired by this, Burke polled listeners to find the best and worst pickup lines they'd ever heard.

Toronto partners AM640 and Q107 announced that Evelyn Macko is joining the Q107/AM640 newsroom to assume newscasting duties on the Q Morning Zoo as of March 6. Macko joins the Q after spending the better part of the past 15 years with CFTR. Macko's predecessor, Kathleen

Rankine, signed off Feb. 24 after nearly nine years with Q107/AM640 to move on to greener pastures. Rankine has dropped out of the radio game altogether to pursue a lifelong ambition of managing an equestrian centre at a Muskoka resort.

CAB introduces Canadian programming initiative

In an effort to ensure that Canadian services are front and centre on the information highway, the Canadian Association of Broadcasters (CAB) has proposed a comprehensive Canadian programming strategy to be aired at the CRTC's Information Highway hearing.

According to the CAB media release, the federal government cannot rely on public funding to achieve these objectives. CAB noted that while public funding needs to be directed to public broadcasters for the fostering of distinctive Canadian programming, "resources for Canadian programming must be generated mainly from within the system."


CAB also noted that Canadian programming for private broadcasters must be a business opportunity, "not a regulatory obligation." In keeping with that, the organization has established four cornerstones in their proposed initiative:

1. Ensure that Canadian programming services have access to audiences on all distribution systems and that priority is accorded in line with government policy objectives.

2. Direct more of the existing resources in the broadcasting system and a fair proportion of new resources that enter the system into Canadian programming and the services that produce and deliver it to audiences.

3. Enhance the recognition of rights in programming and broadcast signals in order to maximize revenue opportunities and maintain Canadian ownership of the system.

4. Establish a fair regulatory framework and equitable allocation of obligations in order to ensure sustainable competition for all Canadian service providers and provide the incentives to unleash all of Canada's production resources.


