

## Keith Porteous to helm A&R for BMG Music

Keith Porteous was obviously high on the list to take over as head of BMG Music Canada's A&R operation.

In making the announcement of Porteous taking on the role of vice-president of A&R, recently-appointed president and general manager of BMG's Canadian operation, Paul Alofs, brashly stated that having Porteous on board "is a grand understatement."

He went on to say that Porteous "is smarter than the average bear, cut from a different bolt, imaginative as hell and a nice guy to boot."

Alofs also credits Porteous with having "a fresh perspective gained in part from his experience on the west coast. Every artist and every person in the industry who knows or has worked with Keith holds him in the highest

regard."

It's not only Alofs who holds Porteous in such high regard. Over the last number of years, he and partner Allen Moy, through their Gangland Artists firm, have managed the careers of both 54-40 and Mae Moore.

Says Brad Merritt of 54-40, "Our best wishes go with him into the new jungle he has chosen -- he has the creative appetite of a lion, we believe he has the heart of one too." Says Moore, "I hope BMG is aware that they will be introduced to creative, spontaneous, solid modernist thought -- this represents very savvy development in corporate mindset."

Girded by this gentle and congratulatory push from the west coast, Porteous has now set up shop at BMG's downtown Toronto office. His first job in the "jungle" will be to coordinate the new recording of the Crash Test Dummies album. The sessions will get underway in January at the Compass Point Studios in Nassau.

On hearing of the BMG appointment for Porteous, Jeff Rogers, manager of the Dummies, said, "Keith is probably the most experienced A&R person in Canada for someone who has never worked for a major label. He also brings with him a host of international contacts and a global perspective."

Finally, Porteous has the floor. "I think I must be one of the most fortunate people in the world to be given the opportunity at BMG to do what I love most, with people I admire and respect

and with whom I share a set of values."

Alofs sums up his announcement with further praise of Porteous, who he says "fits my vision of a new style of A&R at BMG. Keith's values and views on A&R are ballsy, passionate, innovative and informed."

The Canadian roster for BMG includes Crash Test Dummies, Charlie Major, Prairie Oyster, John Bottomley, Sven Gali, Varga, Mrs. Torrance and The Monoxides.

## Anne Murray will host 1996 Juno Awards

Anne Murray will host the 1996 Silver Anniversary Juno Awards to be telecast live on CBC-TV on Sunday March 10 from Hamilton's Copps Coliseum.

Murray, who is internationally acclaimed, is one of Canada's most popular recording/performing artists. From the release of her first album, *What About Me* in 1968 through to 1993's *Croonin'* session, she has released a total of 29 albums, selling more than 25 million in Canada alone.

She is currently in the studio working on her next album.

Over her 25 years, Murray has won four Grammy Awards, three Country Music Association Awards, three American Music Awards and 25 Junos. She was inducted into the Canadian Music Hall of Fame in 1993. She is a Companion of the Order of Canada and was recently presented with a Governor General's Performing Arts Award.

## Warner Music releases McKennitt Christmas EP

Warner Music has released a five-song EP of traditional Christmas carols by Loreena McKennitt. Entitled *A Winter Garden*, the release came about as the result of a three-day musical workshop last July at Real World Studios.

Recalling that July date, McKennitt recalls, "It had all the mechanics of a blind date. I wouldn't say I was nervous, but we were all holding our breath to see what we would come up with."

McKennitt had apparently been looking to create an opportunity to work with new musicians, along with her band, "and explore the chemistry that could result."

There was obviously a lot of thought that went into choosing the material. "I felt that, in one sense, Christmas carols were familiar pieces that we could use to focus more on the musicianship, on the process of collaboration and creation itself. So, we turned down the lights, turned down the temperature, and got out the snow machine."

The five tracks range from Good King Wenceslas to McKennitt's own hymn-like setting of the traditional English lyrics of *Seeds Of Love*. The album was self-produced.

## Heavy security for new Beatles single

*Free As A Bird*, the first new single from the Beatles in 25 years, will be released on Dec. 5. And tight security at the EMI Music Canada camp, is making sure no copies get loose before that date.

The song was originally written by John Lennon in New York sometime in 1977, but apparently never finished. Yoko Ono released her grip on the unfinished tape in 1994, handing it over to Paul McCartney, George Harrison and Ringo Starr, to complete.

The finished version now has writing credits of all four Beatles and was recorded in Sussex, England, over February and March of last year. McCartney, Harrison and Starr take production credits along with Jeff Lynne.


The single will be released in Canada as a limited edition 7" vinyl UK import.

The flip side features *Christmas Time (Is Here Again)*. The music for the song was recorded at London's EMI studios on Nov. 28, 1967, while the Christmas greetings were recorded on Dec. 6, 1966.

It's interesting to note that from 1963 through 1969, The Beatles gave their official fan-club members a special gift at Christmas; a record that was unavailable anywhere else. The 1967 record was titled *Christmas Time (Is Here Again)*, extracts of which were scattered among the sketches. This will be the first time an uninterrupted recording of the song will have been released. Superimposed close to the end of the song are some spoken seasonal greetings that were taped in 1966.

The Beatles Anthology 1 goes to retail on Nov. 21.



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
# WALT SAYS . . . !

**Cancon's future???** By the middle of next year, I think the Cancon regulations will be a thing of the past. My spies at the CRTC tell me that KS and his friends are so happy that they are going to take the advice of Bryan Adams and scrap the regulations. This will put the ball in the broadcaster's court, who promise they would do a great job if there were no regulations. (EC: *Now, two and a half years from that date, we'll have to take a look at what they accomplished!!!*)

**A big secret???** That big Woodstockish-type show that was promoted as the end-all of all Woodstockish-type shows, must have got caught up in the chinooks. Was it a success or a flop? Maybe that merchandising star wasn't happy with the lack of star treatment he got. Actually, he paled beside the big names that were supposed to be there. Were the big stars there? I understand there were a few record company people wrapped up in sleeping bags, but only a few. (EC: *Somewhere over the chinook!!!*)

**More talk radio???** Well, as predicted here a couple of months ago, a major chain will soon make big moves into the news and information field with their AM stations. That means talk radio. The problem is getting hosts who are entertainers, not the yap-yappers, who hardly let their callers get a word in. Anyway, the first AMer to switch will be in Vancouver and the second in Montreal, and maybe, just maybe, in a couple of years, in Toronto. That means there will be a few more talented people on the loose. (EC:  *Surely, not before Christmas!!!*)

**Born again radio???** While some broadcasters are leaning towards talk radio, others see a greater future in Christian music. There's no denying that The Bridge in Vancouver made the right move and at the right time, and there are a few more. Add to that list an FM station in Timmins on the frequency of 102.3 MHz. The licence for this station whose call letters will be revealed at a later date will expire on Aug. 31, 2000. Get this, a minimum of 95% of the music broadcast on the new station will be non-classic religious music drawn from Christian sources. These guys were lucky. Not so with the guys who wanted a low

power FM station in Dryden. They wanted to broadcast a minimum of 20 hours each week of locally-produced Canadian programming and to rebroadcast 106 hours each week of programming received from the Moody Broadcasting Network in Chicago. The CRTC said "no". End of story. They should apply for a digital radio licence. (EC: *And they could ask Lou to consult for them!!!*)

**Deny all you want!!!** There's a lot of hollerin' going on down on Merton Street. (EC: *There's only two places on Merton Street where there's a hollerin'!!!*) Our special spy, said the record club sponsorship of the Junos is being denied, but can you spell "done deal"? (EC: *How do you spell that???*) D-O-N-E D-E-A-L! If someone's head is going to roll, haircut or not . . . someone said yes! (EC: *And the saga continues!!!*)

**Meanwhile!!!** Back at the awards, rumours persist that next year's Juno Awards will have a definite bi-cultural touch when the producer of a very successful non-English television award show out of Quebec, will be coaxed to produce a Hamilton-based award show. (EC: *Could this bring Canada together? Who needs a referendum when we have the Juno Awards???*)

**Pay audio services???** Now, here's a can of worms that should be capped. Imagine getting CD quality recorded music piped directly into your home, 24 hours a day, with multiple channel choices and no commercial interruption? And we're talking every conceivable music genre here; rock, pop, classical, Christian, country, oldies, goldies et cetera, et cetera. Well, hold onto your hat. Mr. Brian Robertson is on the case, and boy, does he know the territory. The bottom line, of course, is that he's fighting for his job, and your job, and your job, and even my job. Hey! If they can get this stuff channelled into homes or whatever, why have record companies, record stores, or a music trade journal, for that matter? We should watch these hearings with a lot of interest. I don't know if it's too late to mount an intervention, but let's find out, and get your pens ready. Remember, a faxed message can get to the CRTC in minutes. (EC: *The line's always busy!!!*)

**Too sappy???** Radio listeners in the golden horseshoe have to resort to short-wave stations, or even one in Hamilton, to hear Def Leppard's *When Love And Hate Collide*. Seems the guys down at HTZ-FM in St. Catherines won't put it into rotation. They say it's "too sappy". One listener called in and told them to leave that particular type of music for CHFI. In the meantime, Polydor/Mercury's promo guy, Tony "Slam" Szabor, is camped out on the lawn of the station, with a ghetto-blaster, pumped to the limit, playing the song non-stop. He's collecting canned goods for the food bank as well, so they're not going to throw him off the property. (EC: *He could've picked a warmer month!!!*)

**What a month!!!** It looks like every major was saving at least one of their priority releases for this busy buying season. EMI and Columbia

are both pushing their Sinatra catalogue to coincide with his 80th birthday, Island is giving Melissa Etheridge's latest offering a major push, Virgin's got the Stones, Columbia's got Bruce Springsteen, MCA has Don Henley, Warner's released yet another Madonna release that is setting retail on fire and EMI is touting The Beatles and Robert Palmer. That Beatles Anthology 1 is going to be huge and I mean HUGE. The front-cover image is a painting by long-time Beatles associate Klaus Voormann. The painting is of a torn set of posters from 1958 to 1964, the era covered by the albums. (EC: *And guess what? We have snow on the ground!!!*)

**Bryan in Hogtown!!!** Bryan Adams was in Toronto for the SOCAN Awards banquet, but also to sign his \$30. coffee-table book at a local bookstore. The crowds were as big, if not bigger than his book signing in his hometown of Vancouver. Now, is there a message here? His Toronto date was only promoted by A&M and Marthe Love of Opus Productions. No radio! (EC: *Toronto doesn't have a rock radio station!!!*)

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

## Ashley MacIsaac is a novelty -- and he agrees

"Sure I'm a novelty. Last night (Nov. 7) I played the Phoenix Theatre in Toronto. Have you ever heard of a fiddle player playing the Phoenix Theatre? So, I guess that makes me a novelty. That's cool!"

Since the Cape Breton fiddle player first gained recognition two years ago, he's gone through a seemingly non-stop round of concerts and media stops. Even before the release of his A&M album, *Hi™ How Are You Today*, the 21-year old fiddler had a national audience, which parlayed into an incredible demand for the album. The demand for the album, of course, was music to the ears of A&M's Allen Reid, who discovered and signed him to the A&M label.

Although he's gone through a gazillion interviews much of it the same old same old, MacIsaac keeps his cool, displaying that gracious old Cape Breton charm.

"I like talking about how the album came to be, because it's something complete and finished and it's something that no longer changes. In my live show, which has been like such a huge part of everything I've done for the last couple of years, it's like instant gratification all the time. But with the record, it's like okay, the day that I finally finished it, I had all the elements of the things I wanted to do, complete. Well, it was great that day, but the next day I watched another Partridge Family Show and heard another base line that made me want to do another tune from it. But we had changed things already and we had come to a completion of it and it was great. So, I don't mind talking to people about how it came to that point and I don't mind talking to them about it objectively. That's good, but I would also rather have it be a conversation piece in itself."

MacIsaac admits that the highlight of the album was "the process", explaining that it was the hardest part. "I did everything that came through as a development, and like I did three different recording sessions and I learned more and more each time. I was in probably seven different studios and seen different techniques and seen different engineers and different musicians and how they approached things in a musical sense. And the best thing was that I really learned a lot about how to do things, regardless if I would do it again, whether I would do another album using this process or not."

The writer suggested that perhaps MacIsaac was a pain in the ass, making so many changes as he went.

"Well, yeah I guess so, but I was doing it independently, in the sense the record company didn't interfere in any way with what I was doing, because nobody had any particular idea of how it was going to happen. I had an arrangement idea set out at the end of January when we started recording and we worked with different musicians to try to get ideas down. But with some of the stuff I was too much geared to a certain way. I have about 16 or 17 hours of tapes, about nine reels. I think I've become the sample king."

MacIsaac threw a curve to his followers by including two vocal tracks on the album with *What An Idiot He Is and Kill Your Foes* (the latter is a bonus track not even listed). Not wanting to draw similarities to such a novelty act as MacIsaac, nevertheless this writer suggested that he sounded

a bit Dylanish. Not surprisingly, he agreed.

"When I heard myself afterwards, I said the same thing, and it does come off that way to a certain degree. Like someone said the other day, 'you sound like Dylan when you could make him out.' Remember, I never sang before, but everytime I played the fiddle, I wanted to feel like I do when you sing, where it just comes out, like you're talking. Actually, I really like singing, but I don't allow myself to do it, because I don't think tonally, I have that good of a control yet over my voice. I don't sound that good, but when I heard it after we finished it, I said 'okay, this sounds cool.' And the sort of openness approach we took to that one and the same with the other one on the end, they were both just meant to be honest, something like a fiddle tune. Just an honest openness. I didn't put a song on the album where I sang, so that someone would say 'Oh Ashley could be a pop singer', or whatever. It's there for probably 15 people who it may be relevant to and not to those who won't understand why it's there."

Playing live to an audience is a far cry from recording in the studio and it did present a bit of a challenge to MacIsaac.

"One of the things I wanted to do with the recording was present that one aspect of my character, just me. Because anything I had ever done before these past two years, I was completely immersed in the fiddle scene, completely immersed in what I was doing, and never looked at anything objectively, and never did it for any particular reason. And, I just did it, played the fiddle. With the record, I wanted much more, musically and I wanted it to be able to stand up by itself and be sort of abrupt. That's why I called it *Hi™ How Are You Today*. It was meant to be sort of fiddle music, but in your face to a certain degree. With the singing, I think it shows a whole element of my stage show in just what the songs are. I'm not jumping around on the album. When we do a live show, we're basically a Celtic rock band. I would never want things to change into an oompa oompa oompa sort of thing, the typical way a Celtic rock band sounds when they do any traditional music. So, it's not just like the live show because it's meant to be a song on a record."


"One thing I've learned from working with a band over the last couple of years and something I never realized before, was the whole idea of feel. Rhythm is everything with the fiddle. When you're playing on stage in Cape Breton, nobody is watching you or paying attention to a certain degree. If you're playing bad they'll let you know. They're there to dance and I'm there to provide the rhythm. That's what it's all about, feel. But I never knew what that was. But working with the band and learning how to play on top of things -- which is something fiddlers don't tend to do, I think I've been able to get that live feeling. And I got that from hanging around Gordie Johnston and Al Cross."

There has been some criticism of MacIsaac abandoning the traditional way of fiddling. "Some people look at what I'm doing as being untraditional. Well, everything has changed where I come from. Years ago, the fiddle players were really close to the language and dirty and soulful and that was traditional music and that's why people still liked it. I feel like I'm doing a '90s version of it. I'm playing the fiddle now more traditional than I ever did. It's a dirtier sounding

fiddle and it's like listening to an older fiddler compared to some of the stuff that's come out in the last 10 years. People down home will listen to it and say it's my fiddle album and say 'Ashley's playin' the fiddle crazy.' No, I'm playing the fiddle sane. It's the arrangement of the stuff that's different. Sort of like if you look at the back of the newspaper and you see sex, sex, sex, and now that we've got your attention, we've got a car for sale. Same as the album. If you like a guitar player and a drummer, now that I've got your attention and because you're from Winnipeg and you think you need a guitar player and a drummer in order to dance, now, here's a fiddle player."

An active fiddler player can go through a number of bows, and MacIsaac goes through his share. But he found a good source in Toronto, Heinl's, down in the pawnshop district. "I always heard stories about the old fiddlers from down home coming up to Toronto and hanging out at Heinl's and seeing all those expensive fiddles. So when I began recording I became friends with George Heinl and he got me a deal that was cheaper than rehairing them. So I bought a bunch. Last summer during inside shows I would go through two or three a night. Outside shows I would go through seven or eight, like forty a week."

Is MacIsaac adjusting to his new life as a recording artist and his new-found wealth? "Well, I heard someone say something the other day that 'knowledge' was constructive and destructive, and I never actually heard it put that way before. Everything that I've learned has been great and wonderful. Fortunately, it only takes three hundred dollars for me to get on a plane and go to West Maboo and sit in a tree for a half hour and feel completely connected again."

## CRTC opens floodgate for digital radio licences

The CRTC moved into position on digital radio, revealing its policy which will govern the introduction of the new technology.

CRTC Chairman Keith Spicer explains in the Oct. 29/95 news release that "During the transitional period, which starts today, and until a long-term policy is developed, we will issue licences valid for three years.

"During the next stage, we will replace the transitional digital radio licenses with regular-term licenses. This replacement will be virtually automatic and will likely involve a simple and streamlined process."

## Warner launch of Dadawa a study in contrasts

The launch of Warner Music's newest gem, Dadawa, at Enoch Turner Schoolhouse in old Toronto was a study in contrasts.

The resplendent museum of Canadians that once housed Toronto's great-great grandparents in quiet scholarly endeavours, on this evening, would be the setting for a waif of a woman from China, whose mastery of demanding vocals left the onlookers catching their own breath. Her tribute to Tibetan folk music was accentuated by the eerily transformed wooden schoolhouse.

This new artist should not be taken too lightly. Warner heavies from New York, London, Burbank and Hong Kong were found among the carefully chosen crowd (even Fozzy-Bear and Jason's dad were spotted).

Dadawa's debut CD, Sister Drum (WEA-99592), is seen as having the potential to cross over into mainstream North American markets.

Dadawa (whose real name, to further the theme of contrasts, is Zhu Zhequin) teamed with composer He Xuntian on Sister Drum. The stirring drums and haunting Tibetan vocals may be a gamble on western markets weaned on sugar-coated pop. However, the title track and Paradise Inferno have an erotic quality that is sure to touch a primal chord in those who listen.

If one could find fault with the premiere offering from Dadawa, it is that the seventh and final track comes up far too quickly, forcing me to hit the replay button on my stereo.

The two-stage approach has apparently been adopted by the Commission as the result of its Public Notice 1995-95, issued last June, which welcomed comments and/or criticism.

Spicer also revealed that all existing AM and FM radio licensees who want to transfer programming using digital radio facilities will automatically qualify for transitional licences. Regulations such as those related to Canadian content will apply to these short-term licences, as will the specific terms and conditions outlined in the public notice. It's expected that over the next three years, the Commission will have in place a public policy process, which will establish a long-term licensing system for digital radio.

On the question of transmission facilities, the Commission let it be known in its public notice that "while it will wish to consider the issue of transmitter ownership in the context of a public policy process at a later date, it does not expect to prohibit the ownership of digital transmission facilities by any Canadian individual or entity in the long term, as long as issues of fair access are addressed."

## Rainbowhirl debuts with Salome Bey release

Rainbowhirl Music will make its debut with the release of Christmas Blue, the label's inaugural recording by Salome Bey and the Relatives. The launch was scheduled for Toronto's Somewhere Else on Nov. 20 at 6 pm.

Bey is well-known in Toronto's music community as both a performer and playwright. She is the winner of a Toronto Arts Award, she won a Dora Mavor Moore Award for her Indigo work, she was a Grammy nominee for the Broadway musical Your Arms Too Short To Box With God, and she was a featured performer on the David Foster fund-raiser, Tears Are Not Enough.

Bey's album was produced by Orin Isaacs. Her daughters Jacintha Tuku and Saidah Baba Talibah supply background vocals.

Rainbowhirl Music was founded in 1994 by chairman Howard Matthews, president Joseph Trainor, vice-president Erroll Anthony Starr and vice-president of A&R Michael St. Clair.

Interestingly enough, anyone can apply for a digital radio licence. It isn't necessary to have any broadcasting background, but priority will be given to licensed broadcasters. There have been mixed feelings in the broadcast sector with regard to this most recent edict from the CRTC.

One of the more outspoken is Gary Slaight, president of Standard Radio Incorporated.

"My feeling is they're going too fast at this point in time. To have people applying for digital licenses without having all the guidelines and parameters in place could present a problem. What's probably going to happen is they are going to grant some licences and then have a review process in a couple of years.

"I still don't think we have quite enough information in terms of how many signals will be per market place. We haven't proven that the consumer even really wants it. We have to see what happens in the states which I think will have an impact. If they don't do digital in the US, I can't see it working in Canada. And there are serious doubts in the states as to whether or not it's going to go through. There's a big lobby against it down there."

A major concern with some broadcasters is the cost factor in the changeover to digital radio.

Slaight suggests "It's going to cost a fortune to transfer. And is the consumer going to want to pay for new equipment for home and for cars? It's like AM stereo. It was supposed to save AM. It hasn't made any difference. No one is prepared to pay for it.


"I just question the wisdom in terms of opening up a procedure right now where people can apply for temporary digital licences. What's the point in that?"

We will have pro and con comments from other broadcasters next week.



## Songwriters, composers and music publishers honoured

The 1995 SOCAN Awards, held in Toronto (Nov. 16), honoured 33 songwriters and composers, and 26 music publishers at its annual banquet.

The awards are presented to the creators and publishers of the most frequently played pop and country songs by Canadian songwriters in the first year of their release. Awards are also presented for frequency of play and outstanding achievement for music for film and television, jazz and concert music.

This year, 14 songs, all of which have logged more than 100,000 radio airplays since their initial release, joined the ranks of Classic Award Winners.

The black-tie affair attracted many of the big names of Canadian music, including Tom Cochrane, Charlie Major, George Fox, Moe Koffman, Cookie Rankin, Larry Gowan, Barney Bentall, Gordon Lightfoot, Colin James, Terry Jacks, Ian Thomas, Ken Tobias and Bryan Adams, who was in town for his book signing.

The Wm. Harold Moon Award, SOCAN's highest honour, was presented to Milan Kymlicka. The award is presented each year to the Canadian songwriter or composer who has done the most in the last year to bring international attention to the music in Canada. Kymlicka is considered one of Canada's most prolific and accomplished composers for film and television. Among his recent work is music for the Babar series by Nelvana, the just released film Margaret's Museum.

The Classic Award winners were the co-writings by Bryan Adams and Jim Vallance of The Best Was Yet To Come, performed by Adams and Laura Branigan, and Heaven, performed by Adams; Straight From The Heart, co-written by Adams and Eric Kagna and performed by Adams and Bonnie Tyler, Fly Little White Dove Fly, co-written by Bob Bilyk and Marty Butler and performed by The Bells; Wondering Where The Lions Are and Lovers In A Dangerous Time, written by Bruce Cockburn and performed by Cockburn and Barenaked Ladies; Sometimes When We Touch, co-written by Dan Hill and Barry Mann and performed by Hill, Vic Damone, Cleo Laine, Oscar Peterson and Tammy Wynette; Which Way You Goin' Billy and Where Evil Grows, written by Terry Jacks and performed by The Poppy Family; Summer Side Of Life, written by Gordon Lightfoot and performed by Lightfoot; the co-writings of Eddie Schwartz and David Tyson of All Our Tomorrows, performed by Joe Cocker and Special Girl, performed by

Schwartz and America; Stay Awhile, written by Ken Tobias and performed by The Bells; and I Just Want To Make Music, written and performed by Tobias.

The Pop Music Awards went to Could I Be Your Girl, written and performed by Jann Arden; Hasn't Hit Me Yet, co-written by Jim Cuddy and Greg Keelor and performed by Blue Rodeo; Soul's Road, co-written by Lawrence Gowan and Annette Ducharme and performed by Gowan; Dancing On My Own Ground, written and performed by Gowan; Jane, co-written by Steven Page and Stephen Duffy and performed by Barenaked Ladies; Afternoons & Coffee Spoons and Swimming In Your Ocean, written by Brad Roberts and performed by Crash Test Dummies; North Country and Borders And Time, written by Jimmy Rankin and performed by The Rankin Family; and Anniversary Song, written by Michael Timmins and performed by The Cowboy Junkies.

Country Award winners were Such A Lonely One, written by Russell deCarle and performed by Prairie Oyster; Nobody Gets Too Much Love and The Other side, written and performed by Charlie Major; and Sweet Sweet Poison, co-written by Jim Witter and Johnny Douglas and performed by Witter.

I Swear, co-written by Gary Baker and Frank Myers and performed by John Michael Montgomery and All-4-One won the award for the Most Performed International Song.

the Award for Jazz went to Jane Bunnett and the award for Music for Film and Television went to Jim Morgan, Ray Parker and Tom Szczesniak.

R. Murray Schafer won the Jan V. Matejcek Award for Concert Music.

## Vancouver's Adam H on release in US

Adam H has worked with the Hektoen label on his debut album, entitled 604-2-212 for over two years.

The first single, Feel Good, is available on 12" vinyl with six mixes and as a CD single with 10 mixes.

The single, which qualifies as three-parts Cancon (MAL) has already picked up good reviews in US trade charts.

It all began for Adam H when he met Mike Hektoen, who heads up the Hektoen label, and who owned Media Sound Recording Studios. He recognized the potential of Adam H's talent and invited him to New York where he teamed up with well-known "funk-master" Steve Washington. The two of them worked on the first single, Feel Good, and Shining Star, an original hit by and featuring the Manhattans. Adam H wrote or co-wrote all the songs on the album.

Adam H was suitably impressed with Washington. "The chemistry worked. I was recording my music on the 212 vibe with one of my funk idols -- then it got even better, we were co-writing together. Before I knew it, I was bustin' out a new version of Shining Star featuring the Manhattans, and one week later I was in Harlem at the famous Cotton Club, shooting part of my Shining Star video with the Manhattans. The whole 604-2-212 vibe is alive and very real."

The Question is pretty appropriate for a title of this new project by the famous Sidney Mines family. It was always a question as to




how much or how far they could go with the Celtic sound, and they didn't do too bad. Now, we have a contemporary sound, not that the Celtic influence isn't still there, but it's not as prominent. Myopic has been taken as the first single, and AC programmers were quick to give it the nod. Country programmers followed, perhaps a bit cautiously. But, interestingly enough, both NCN and CISS-FM are going heavy on the single, which is a pretty fair indicator of what can happen with this release. By the way, that's Stewart MacNeil on the accordion. The power of the Barra MacNeils, lies in their live shows, which they will apparently be doing a lot of beginning in the new year. Most of the music was written by Stewart, but there are three that weren't, and they are notable. Firstly, Bruce Cockburn's *Going Down The Road*, features the folkmeister himself singing one verse and playing the electric guitar. The MacNeils' younger brothers helped out on this one, with 19-year old Ryan playing Uillean pipes, and 13-year old Boyd on the fiddle. Cockburn recorded his bit in a Toronto studio after which it was mixed in at Solar Audio Studio in Halifax. Another is Shel Silverstein's penning of *The Ballad Of Lucy Jordan*, which gave Marianne Faithful a leg up, and should do the same for Kyle MacNeil. The third, *Goin' Back*, written by Goffin and King and also sung by Kyle, is key as well. At the end of the album, the question no longer is a question. This is the Barra MacNeils with a tad more sophistication, not that the gold-certified *Closer To Paradise* wasn't sophisticated, but the parameters here are a bit more relaxed. Like the *Paradise* album, this one will be a work album as well. If you want to get back into the MacNeils as we knew them, try *Seallaibh Curaidh Eoghainn*, a traditional "pair a beal" (mouth music) song that was taught to the MacNeils by Cathy Ann MacPhee and Fiona Moore. That's Lucy on the lead vocals. Whether they're Celtic, pop, country or even a bit of rock, don't pigeon-

hole this family. They are sheer entertainment.

Greatest Hits releases aren't usually slated for review, for obvious reasons, but the Jackson collection is somewhat unique. 





**Shania Twain** has the most added single this week with her latest Mercury release, (If You're Not In It For Love) I'm Outta Here, entering the chart at #77. This is the follow-up to The Woman In Me, the title track of her album, which topped the chart on Oct. 23/95 and is now moving down (12).

**South Mountain** are back on the chart, this time with Truly, Madly, their latest Stony Plain release, which enters the chart at #85. The band recently saw chart action with their previous release, Radioland, which enjoyed good chart action over this past summer, peaking at #20 (July 31). The track was taken from their album, Where There's A Will, which was produced by the band, and is also on Warner CD comp 260. The band is named after their hometown, which is just south of Ottawa.

**Chely Wright** is making chart noise with Listenin' To The Radio, the same song that Canadian Rebecca Miller made her debut with, peaking at #20 after 17 weeks on the chart (Oct. 9/95). The song was written by Nashville writers Stephony Smith and Sunny Ross. Wright's release enters the chart at #94.

## A Tootsie role figured in success of Terri Clark

Born in Medicine Hat, Alberta, Terri Clark rarely gets home, now that she is living in Nashville. She left the Canadian west in 1987. Her parents live in Florida.

As for her "overnight success," which she refers to as more like "An Alaskan Night", gaining a toehold in Nashville took a lot of years. Included was a stint as a performer for \$15 a day plus tips at Tootsie's Orchid Lounge, which backs onto the famous Ryman Theatre. This was where most of the Grand Ole Opry gang hung out, before, during intermission and after their shows. She was so fearful of losing her guitar, she tied the case to her hand with a shoestring as she walked to work.

Perhaps the best introduction to Clark is the opening paragraph of her Mercury/Polydor bio sheet. "She wears a hat because she likes it, and jeans and boots because dresses are uncomfortable. 'I've never felt real graceful so I don't dress for it,' she says. Her laugh is hearty and contagious. She's a little goofy and gawky, and certainly gracious. She's short on formality, shorter on ego, and very long on wit and legs. At 5'11", her talent is just as imposing as her height. She plays guitar, bass, drums and 'anything in the key of C on the piano.' She writes songs that are strong, yet her heart is tender. She sings powerfully with authority and soul. She's not shy, and she's not kidding; this country music thing was meant to be."

Clark was in Toronto recently and did the rounds, including CISS-FM's Live At Five. She was promoting her Mercury release, Better Things To Do, the first single from her self-titled Mercury album. She wrote the song with Tom Shapiro and Chris Waters. In fact, she co-wrote 11 of the 12 songs on the album."

Interesting enough, Jay Hitchen, program

has gone Christmas with his Holy Night release which was produced by Chuck Howard. Berry is currently heading up the chart with his newest release, If I Had Any Pride Left At All (#61).

**Andrew Turner** has the Canadian, European and Asia rights for the Patsy Cline Show, Always Patsy Cline. The two-act musical has been running in the US since 1993 and, according to Turner is

and music director at Medicine Hat's CHAT was one of the first country programmers to pick Clark's follow-up single, When Boy Meets Girl (RPM - Oct. 30/95). The single enters the RPM Country 100 this week moves up to #80.

The third single will be one of Clark's solo pennings, If I Were You, which by the way qualifies as three-parts Cancon (MAL). "Songwriting to me, always comes from different places. Somebody will have an idea for a title, or I'll have had an experience or a friend of mine will have an experience that we'll write about -- just everyday life -- they always come from different avenues and different places."

As for her height, particularly with her hat, which is a great hook, does it bother her? "It doesn't bother me now. It used to when I was a teenager, when all the boys were shorter than me."

One of the nice happenings for Clark along the way was meeting Ted Stevenson, a fiddler in a local band. They married in 1990 and apparently he was the support she needed to continue in her quest for a label deal. After being disappointed more than a few times and brought back to reality by her husband, she finally got her break in 1994. Keith Stegall, vice-president of A&R for Mercury Records, and a longtime friend and fan, finally got his chance to show off Clark's talent with a live audition for the label's president Luke Lewis. She was signed to the label the next day.

She's reached one of her goals, to have a label deal, which opened the door for yet another. "I'm always striving to better myself. My next goal is to have a gold album, before the end of this year is what they're predicting, which would be great. We're halfway to gold in the states already, after only nine weeks on release. I'd like to get on a tour with a big artist next year so that I can play for as many folks as possible."

Clark put together a band this past summer, and they have been playing several dates. Hubby Ted isn't in the band, but "he comes with us and does a lot of other great stuff for us. He does guitar-tech work and helps keep me down to earth, that's for sure. And he helps to keep everything straight up, because there's a lot to do. I don't have a name for the band yet, but they like to be called The Posse"

Clark expects to be touring with George Strait next year, and hopes to play several Canadian dates including the Calgary Stampede.

Clark has been welcomed into the Nashville community, although she did find it a little tough in the beginning. "It used to bother me when I would go places and they would start making Canadian jokes. But they're great people and I get along real fine. They think it's really interesting actually, that I'm from Canada. 'You're from Canada? No way!' But it's a great place to live. And there are a lot of Canadians down there."

Clark still keeps that shoestring tied to guitar case. Perhaps it's a good omen.


