MCA Concerts/Molsons acquire BCL Concerts

MCA Concerts Canada and Molson Breweries have announced the acquisition of BCL Entertainment Corp.'s concert divisions, which includes assets in Concert Productions International (CPI), Perryscope Concert Productions and Donald K. Donald Productions.

The acquisition instantly makes MCA Concerts the preeminent concert promoter in Canada, strengthening their already formidable hold on the Canadian concert scene. The acquisition of Donald K. Donald Productions, in particular, will help give MCA a stronger presence in the Quebec marketplace.

According to Jay Marciano, president of the Los Angeles-based MCA Concerts Inc., "The acquisition of BCL assets provides a cornerstone in the development of the Molson/MCA Concerts franchise and demonstrates our commitment in bringing Canadian concert-goers the best in live entertainment."

Molson Breweries president John Barnett added, "MCA has been a terrific partner in Canada. And with what our consumers are telling us about the importance of music in their lives, this enhanced partnership will help us further deliver the best entertainment in Canada."

The MCA/Molson purchase of the concert divisions of BCL from Labatt Breweries (a subsidiary of the Dutch-based Interbrew Corporation) was actually finalized on July 26. The Canadian marketplace

represents approximately 10% of the \$1 billion North American concert industry.

Interbrew made it clear when they purchased Labatt that they had little interest in retaining the Canadian brewery's entertainment subsidiaries, including BCL. The Dutch brewer is also anxious to sell-off the Toronto Blue Jays baseball club, also largely owned by Labatt. The MCA/Molson buyout was completed after 18 months of negotiations.

Under the terms of the agreement, Donald K. Donald Productions will now be known as DKD, an MCA Concerts Canada Company. CPI and Perryscope Concert Productions will now fall under the umbrella of MCA Concerts Canada. A complete rundown of the new corporate structure will be detailed in the coming days.

Added Marciano, "Both Donald K. Donald Productions and Perryscope Concert Productions are exceptional promotion firms that will contribute

their long-standing industry relationships to a company that will continue to be aggressive and innovative in attracting international talent, orchestrating national entertainment tours, and supporting local Canadian talent."

MCA Concerts Canada was formed in 1990 in a partnership with Molson Breweries. The company pioneered large outdoor festivals throughout Canada, beginning with a sold-out, cross-country festival tour headlined by Bryan Adams. In May of 1995, the company launched the state-of-the-art Molson Amphitheatre in Toronto, and produced more than 500 concerts in Canada in 1995.

BCL Entertainment Corp. was founded by entrepreneurs Michael Cohl and Bill Ballard, in partnership with Labatt Breweries. Cohl and Ballard recently sold back their shares in the company to Labatt, with Cohl then launching his

EMI/Malofilm to release Beatles Anthology on video

On September 5, Malofilm Distribution, in association with EMI Music Canada, will release the home video version of The Beatles Anthology, the landmark 10 hour video history of the legendary rock and roll band.

The Fab Four renaissance began last fall with the release of The Beatles Anthology 1 double CD, which featured rare bits and bites from the group's early years, including rare radio broadcasts and studio outtakes. The musical anthology was continued this past January with the release of the second Anthology, which covered the years between Hard Day's Night and Sgt. Pepper. The third in the series, covering the band's final years, will be released later this year.

In November of '95, CTV premiered The Beatles Anthology three-part, seven-hour television series (aired by ABC in the US), featuring hours of previously unreleased video footage, along with updated interviews with the three remaining band members. The broadcast was one of the most watched programs of the year, garnering an audience of 60 million viewers in the US alone.

Featuring substantial hours of exclusive footage, the eight-volume Beatles Anthology video package will have a suggested retail price of \$175.99, with a pre-order date set for August.

According to Stuart Snyder, executive VP and GM of Turner Home Entertainment (domestic

home video department), the US video distributor, "The 60 million person audience for the 1995 ABC broadcast of The Beatles Anthology not only proved the scope of The Beatles' appeal more than 30 years after their music reached American fans, it effectively seeded the largest possible market for the video release of The Beatles Anthology with its incredible video footage."

The release of the video set will coincide with the rebroadcast of the television version of the anthology, on August 31, September 5 and 7, on CTV in Canada and ABC in the US. The video release will also coincide with the release of the third double-CD package in the anthology.

Notes Capitol Records president and CEO Gary Gersh, "The Beatles Anthology on home video was a top priority for Capitol and EMI. We saw the tremendous synergy between the audio and video and we wanted to manage the two side by side."

Malofilm is also releasing a subtitled French-language version of the video package.

The double-CD collections, Anthology Volume I and II, have sold more than two million units in Canada to date.

The marketing of the video set and Volume III of the audio series will involve an \$8 million campaign across North America, with \$3 million of that devoted to television and radio buys.

Dion headed for more diamond

Sony Music Canada president Rick Camilleri presents a six-time platinum award to Celine Dion for her latest Columbia album, Falling Into You. 

own concert production company, The Next Adventure Inc.

While the new deal will give MCA and Molson a virtual stranglehold on the Canadian concert industry, Marciano was quick to quell any talk of a monopoly.

"There will continue to be substantial competition from the many independent promoters," Marciano noted in a Canadian Press story.

Marciano also felt that concerns about the deal meaning a rise in ticket prices were unfounded, arguing that it's usually business competition that inflates prices.

"As in most sports and entertainment businesses, generally speaking when there is a

bidding war for talent, whether it be a ball player or an international rock star, the concert ticket bears the price or the brunt of the price paid to talent."

Industry watchers are viewing the new concert conglomerate with some wariness, concerned about all the ducks being on one pond, so to speak.

EMI Music Canada president Deane Cameron hopes that developing Canadian artists looking to tour don't get lost in the shuffle of the now-unified concert promotion business.

"I guess very shortly we're going to find out if this is going to benefit Canadian artists, or not. But it definitely looks like a lot of people on one side of the fence. I won't use the word monopoly yet, but it definitely puts a lot of people in one pile. And is their economic balance going to come from promoting international acts, or

developing local ones? But the reputation of those companies individually was tremendous before, particularly Donald K. Donald, he was a tremendous supporter of Canadian music. So hopefully this will strengthen it."

Responding to the possibility of potentially juiced up ticket prices, Cameron feels that the sluggish musical market wouldn't really support such a move.

"The first that comes to mind is, you get a monopoly, you crank up the prices. But the market is driving all that sort of stuff these days. Look at the Garth Brooks tour. If his ticket prices are \$10-15 higher, he might have sold less tickets. It's not as healthy out there, and I don't think it would sound good to say 'well there's enough of us here at one company, we can just drive up the prices.'"

At the end of September, Zomba will switch its distribution services from BMG to Pinnacle in the UK and Rough Trade in Germany, Switzerland and Austria. Zomba will also open a regional office in Singapore in January from where all Zomba product will be independently distributed throughout the Asian marketplace.

NARAS creates Discover Grammy tour

In its ongoing effort to bring music to the masses, the US-based National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences (NARAS) launched the Discover Grammy Festival, which kicked off on July 12 in Chicago.

The festival will offer more than 150 musical events in 10 US cities (Philadelphia, Seattle, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Dallas, Minneapolis, Miami, Washington/Baltimore and New York being the other nine cities). The festival will spend at least a month at each stop, and will feature regular concerts, free performances and educational programs.

The initial concerts, Robert Cray in Chicago (July 12) and Crosby, Stills & Nash (July 27), were each preceded by question and answering sessions for students. The performers will be announced on a city-to-city basis, prior to the festival launch time in each city. Other artists involved in the program include Steely Dan, Roberta Flack, Harry Belafonte, Spin Doctors, Santana, Michael Bolton, John Tesh and Indigo Girls.

Zomba purchases 75% of Windsong/Pinnacle

The New York-based Zomba Group of Companies has purchased a 75% share in London-based Windsong/Pinnacle Group. The deal makes Zomba one of the largest independent music operators in the world.

The purchase gives Zomba complete control over Windsong/Pinnacle's corporate portfolio. That portfolio includes Windsong Exports, one of the largest exporters in the UK, and Pinnacle Distribution, the UK's leading independent distributor.

Other Windsong/Pinnacles subsidiaries included in the deal include the Music For Nations label, the Connoisseur Collection Compilation company, the Windsong In Concert label, Collins Classics and Pinnacle Imports.

Warner Bros. to distribute home video in China

In an unprecedented move, Warner Bros. has signed a distribution deal to release its home videos in China, becoming the first major video company to be represented in that country.

The deal, signed with Shenzhen Advanced Science Enterprise Group, also covers videos from the MGM Studios, as Warner owns the rights to MGM videos through the year 2003.

The deal comes less than two months after China and the US narrowly avoided a major trade war over China's failure to curb rampant copyright piracy. Under the June 17 trade pact, China agreed to take major steps to crack down on pirate factories and on exports of illegal copies.

Warner Bros. said an exact timetable of

Zomba has also acquired an 80% holding in Rough Trade Records Germany, along with 100% of Rough Trade's Benelux arm. Windsong/Pinnacle's chairman, Steve Mason, will retain a 25% stake in the company and will remain on as chairman.

According to Zomba's chairman and CEO, Clive Calder, the deal makes his company a near-rival for the six majors.

"Steve Mason and I share a common business philosophy and an aggressive commercial spirit. Zomba's dominance in music publishing, record labels, studios and producer management dovetails beautifully with Windsong/Pinnacle's leadership in international distribution and exports. This deal will enable Zomba to extend our presence to the

releases, and a declaration of which titles would clear the Chinese censors, is still under negotiation.

Exact terms of the licensing agreement with Shenzhen were not released, although the deal does also call for distribution of Mandarin-dubbed motion pictures, and animated product to be made available on video CD and LD formats. Shenzhen is one of China's largest manufacturers of video CD, and laser disc hardware and software.

Some of the top Warner releases over the past few years include *Twister*, the three *Batman* movies, *The Fugitive*, *Maverick*, and the two *Ace Ventura* movies. MGM, now being sold to former owner Kirk Kerkorian, has offered *The Birdcage*, *Goldeneye* and *Get Shorty* in recent years.

We know that more than 50,000 rock'n rollers went through the turnstiles, but not all were fans of this particular band. The other 30,000 were there to booze and trip it up and burn the place down. However, if in fact the pay-out was based on 50,000 fans at \$150.00 a head, the band and JG were cheated. Anyway, how do I know. I wasn't invited. But the band made history. They'll go down in the chronicles of Canadian rock 'n roll history as getting the highest fee ever for a Canadian band, even if it was for 120 minutes. JG should be very proud. But it won't get in the history books, if the lid is kept on. What a goal for other entertainers to shoot for. (EC: *There's only one leap over the moon allowed each century!!!*)

Right on! Rob Salem!!! Rob Salem, the Toronto Star's movie critic, is a rare breed of writer. What a delightful piece he put together on Hollywood's bright new and emerging star, Matthew McConaughey (July 19/96). I mentioned last week that I saw *A Time To Kill*, the movie that catapulted McConaughey into stardom, which opened across the country a few days later, making Salem's article very timely. What I like about Salem is his ability to feed the right questions and then he lets his subjects do the talking, filling in just enough to add interest, not boredom. Presented by Livent, the show was mounted at Toronto's Bluma Appel Theatre, a nice intimate setting for this type of entertainment. Martin was Funny, Funny, Totally Funny. She was naughty and nice and a hilarious reminder of where it all began - SCTV, with a hip-hop comedic approach and subject matter ranging from Ethel Merman to Anne Murray to Alanis Morissette. The first-nighters were obviously an Andrea Martin audience. And she didn't disappoint, bringing to life her outrageous characters in front of their eyes, like

Dr. Cheryl Kinsey, Dutch van Dyke, Libby Wolfson and more. Edith Prickley, of course, Martin's classic character from SCTV, was a showstopper. Fortunately, she didn't perform in the nude. (EC: *Fortunately for whom???*)

Ultrasound with class???

This past Wednesday, the industry had a rare opportunity to see how an independent label, supported by a corporate investor, wisely spends its dollars. Andrew McCain, CEO of you know what, wheeled his food machine into Ultrasound, hiding the grunge with white table cloths and sack cloth over the windows, (because it was an early evening gig). The food was, what else, lobster and scallops, all the way from Woodstock, New Brunswick, spiced up with veggies and lots of fruit, and wings and rolls of whatever, and, AND, lots of Moosehead beer, and I mean lots of it. No ticket required, which will no doubt upset the Star's star star-snooper Rita Zekas, because she wasn't there. Anyway, we didn't go there to just eat. Mr. McCain and company is behind Loggerhead Records, weighted down in Toronto by Paul Church (EC: *Is that a pun???*) and the label's first signing, Nicholson, was the reason we were all there. Nicholson's performance was as filling as the New Brunswick fare. A class act with incredible energy, this, in spite of the 22-hour drive from the maritimes which got them here minutes before showtime. Loggerhead, by the way, is distributed by Denon. (EC: *Let's have more private investors in the record industry!!!*)

A Bliss-FULL night!!! Gail Bliss, who portrays Patsy Cline in *Patsy*, which is in its final weeks at Toronto's Queen Elizabeth Theatre, stepped out of her role to showcase herself to a packed Horseshoe Tavern. There were more than a few irate fans, who paid for their tickets, only to find the ringside tables were reserved for the media. There weren't many tables left, which caused the stir. These ticket-paying patrons had to stand throughout the whole performance. Bliss, herself was annoyed. She's a sittin', not dancin' act, so she had hoped the tables would have butted up to the stage, which would have left room for a lot more table space. I don't think the Shoe has enough tables and chairs to set up like a honkytonk. Bliss, without the Cline wig, was a perfectionist in country swing, blues and rock. Watching her sound check, she's obviously an act that's in charge of her own act. She calls all the shots, which resulted in an energized show that connected with an equally energized audience. Lots of interesting industry people were on hand. Can you imagine, BG was there, claiming to be somehow connected to Bliss. And he was seen talking to PM, who later said to me "he's the demise of the record industry." Nice to have a reputation like that. (EC: *Better than none!!!*)

The Alanis Way??? Apparently there's a move underway to get a byway, street, cul-de-sac or even a freeway, named after Alanis. Thankfully, Parson Manning's Reformers, won't have a say in the matter. They're admitted opponents to sex in theatres. It will be left up to the city of Ottawa, which has its share of prudes on council, but they're

not dealing with a flash in the pan. Alanis has sold more than 11 million copies of *Jagged Little Pill*, and a lot of them were sold in Ottawa. Come to think of it, *The Alanis Free Way*, makes good sense (EC: *Are you promoting free or safe sex???*)

Radio COPPS??? Well, Sheila's back and pushing her weight around again. Now, she thinks she can go to the head of the line and hand a radio frequency over to the CBC, a frequency in Toronto yet, where the CBC is almost dead in the water. I happen to listen to CBC radio, and I do take offense to the reported remarks by Doug Bingley of Barrie's Rock 95 (Toronto Sun - Aug 1/96), where he was quoted as saying that the CBC is "mostly listened to by white Anglo-Saxon Protestants", and that's "a little bit elitist." 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Surviving radio in the '90s

With the shrinking opportunity of radio in the '90s (ie syndication, automation, changing of formats), the down-sizing of companies to economize, supposedly to become more profitable, it has become increasingly difficult for on-air personalities and other broadcast talent to ply their craft.

Gone are the days of a radio station with ten or twelve full-time air staff. For young talent just breaking into the business, it has become apparent that many ground level positions, such as overnights in a small market are far and few between. Where can a young hopeful learn, grow and develop? And for a young veteran of the radio game (10 years of more) what happens when the format is changed -- when they can't afford you? You have become the victim of a hidden agenda. What do you do? Where can you go? Who would hire you?

You could decide that selling vacuums isn't a bad idea after all. Maybe your brother doesn't have it so bad making \$23.85 an hour building cars. But, like me, radio and broadcasting are in your blood. You'll never listen to radio like a "normal" person ever again. And you'll never give up trying to land that next job. Dedication and perseverance has got you this far in the biz. So why not stick it out and hope and pray that message light on your answering machine will bring good news. If you honestly believe this is the only job you'll ever do and you find yourself seeking employment for whatever

reason then you'll have to make concessions.

It's quite possible you may have to go back to a smaller market to help achieve your goals. It's quite possible you'll have to work in a format you may not have the drive for. Well, you'll have to find it and learn to like it. Why? Because this is the profession you've chosen. With the ever-increasing and successful news/talk format, a rock jock could very well survive doing a lifestyles show. They may even find it to be more interesting. And hey, you can finally do what a PD has been telling you to do less of -- talk! But as the job search continues to find dead ends at every turn, what can you do to keep your sanity?

There is always the lucrative world of voice work. Oh sure, no agent no work. But if you do the ground work yourself, there is the possibility of finding a few things here and there. Acting? Why not! Local theatre productions, college film projects, even murder mysteries. But if you're a "radio star", why would you simply take anything? To keep your sanity, for one. To keep grounded and to keep active with all of the aforementioned, it keeps you in touch with people, who in turn, talk to other people.

People talk to other people who may know about something you may not. Something like a possible job in another market. Networking, if done correctly, could be your salvation. Go ahead and write a list of all your friends and past employers in the business. Call them all. Write them. Don't be a pest. be persistent. There is a fine line between the two, so be aware. Utilize those contacts. Make them all part of your network. Your new-found network will most probably include PD's, some

you may not have spoken to before. Don't beat around the bush. Get right to the point and tell them you are actively seeing a gig. Ask them about other markets and who you should contact. But remember, the last thing a PD wants is a pest. Again, be persistent, not bothersome.

A good PD will help direct you -- tell you where you should be checking. Remember most PD's were once in your shoes and hopefully, they won't have forgotten how hard they struggled to get to where they are.

In the meantime, write down those funny thoughts, amusing stories and happenings. Save them all for the day you can use them on "your show." If you believe it, it will happen. Remember it's a small industry and someone, somewhere knows someone who may need your talent at some point. If radio is your life, only you can keep the blood pumping. No one can make your career happen except you.

This article is to help other radio people who may be jobless. I am currently seeking a full-time gig and wish others to join me in launching a networking system. It could be extremely beneficial to other, out-of-work radio people. I have been in broadcasting for 13 years at various stations around Ontario. With a networking system in place, it could be more cost effective and easier for others who are looking for work. Even after I find work in radio, I still wish to have this networking system in place on a continual basis which I will oversee. 




MUDGIRL -Alternative

Someone very wise once said that if an artist doesn't create a musical persona, he or she will be given it. Despite a general sense of agreement that came when those words were uttered, it still seems that the Madonnas and David Bowies of this world are outnumbered by the Rick Astleys fashioned in the lofty boardrooms of downtown highrises. When the exception makes itself known, as in the aforementioned and in the case of Mudgirl (and with a name like that you can bet the farm that it came out of the brain of some artist), the difference is strongly felt. Mudgirl is the nom de plume of Kim Bingham who you might remember as one of the founders behind yesteryear's cult favourites Me, Mom & Morgentaler. That band's lust for all things even remotely diggable made them as pliable as Elizabeth Taylor's wedding vows and though Bingham has left the manic erraticness behind, she has maintained that sense of never doing the same thing quite the same way twice. Not surprisingly Bingham manages to cover a lot of ground over the five songs on this EP, and the album's vibrant alternapop playability topped with vocals sweeter than honey dipped chocolate should take it straight to radio. An unlikely name, but we anticipate some great things for Bingham's Mudgirl. Engineered and mixed by Odds guitarist and husband Steve Drake and released on Bingham's own label. -RG

Montreal's Likwid have burst on the scene with a release both progressive and rock solid. The dam bursts open with The Ballad Of X, one of those tunes with a great riff in a loop, heavily and mightily punctuated by big drum kick. Sub Zero Records and MCA have opted for lighter fare by way of Good Bye!, a polite introduction to the band (one would think) which manages to adequately fan itself



out in a harmless theatricalism that nevertheless gooses the flesh. More rock than alternative, Likwid has a sense about it of purpose and definite direction, and though it wanders the badlands of generic rock, it manages to keep a fervent pace, never staying in the same place too long. Highly competent if exceptional musicianship allow Nigel, Rad, Marcello and Andre to show off their without lapsing into impropriety. We said progressive earlier on and we meant it; if anything, Likwid have progressed the format to a more palatable incarnation without losing the format's interest to write and perform compelling, challenging heavy rock. -RG

Radio has already fallen head over heels for first single Popular, propelling it to #16 after five weeks on RPM's Alternative 30. 

This release is already shaping up to be a collector's item. Imagine having six songs, actually performed by Patsy Cline and six by Gail Bliss, who has been critically-acclaimed in the role Cline in Patsy, a musical tribute to Patsy Cline. The powerful vocal similarity between Cline and Bliss is awesome. Bliss is not mimicking Cline. She could be tagged as an incarnation of Cline, displaying the same vocal anxieties that made her listeners hang onto every word. On the Cline side there's Walkin' After Midnight, In Care Of The Blues, Lovesick Blues, Got A Lot Of Rhythm In My Soul, Life's Railway To Heaven, and Stop, Look And Listen. Bliss gets a bit of an edge here with her immaculate version of Willie Nelson's Crazy, a warm and tender offering of Leavin' On Your Mind, which was written by Webb Pierce and Wayne Walker, Hughie Cannon's penning of Bill Bailey Won't You Please Come Home, I Don't Want, written by Eddie Miller, W.S. Stevenson and D. Haddock, the sobering, but very popular Just A Closer Walk With Thee, and a cleverly reworked thought-provoking version of Don

Gibson's Sweet Dreams (Of You). This is scary stuff. Interestingly enough, Bliss brought Harold Bradley in as session leader and to produce the session. He was Cline's bass player and session leader. That's him on the tick-tack bass guitar. Harold brought his brother Owen in to help on the session. He was Cline's producer, and gave that little extra help that makes Sweet Dreams so exceptional. 

Piano and violin together is a staple of the concert stage or chamber, but not all compositions lend themselves to such presentation, even those so intended. 

Creepy tales of revenge from beyond the grave and the unexpected death of star Brandon Lee made a strange brew of the first film and got it onto newspaper headlines. But it was the tortured soul of the thing captured in songs by Nine Inch Nails, The Cure and Stone Temple Pilots that actually sold the movie, and not surprisingly, since the music was also the direct cause for comic book creator James O'Barr having come up with the idea of the ghostly avenger in the first place. The results were phenomenal; as cinema, The Crow was pure comic book horror played out like a full length video in tone and sound. City Of Angels is the unavoidable sequel and though it might be lacking the grim realism of the first, it follows the cinematic idea of it to a tee, availing itself of a selection of tunes to evoke a malignant saraband of fantastic nightmare. Among the collaborators in this festival of spooks are White Zombie doing a playfully deranged version of KC and Sunshine Band's I'm Your Boogie Man, the slow, darkly nagging Knock Me Out by Linda Perry and Grace Slick, Bush X painted black by Tricky, Filter, Toadies, Korn, Iggy Pop (who stars) and PJ Harvey. Is this going to do good? Does Peter Pan wear funny slippers? -RG

that's the intention, well and good, but not everyone appreciates it. Hoe-Down from Aaron Copland's fully orchestrated ballet Rodeo was transcribed by the composer for violin and piano. See our earlier comment on Ives. Brazilian composer Guarneri's Cantiga de Ninhar is diminished by the lack of percussion. Only John Corigliano's Sonata for Violin and Piano emerges as true chamber music. Now, forget everything we've written to this point and purchase, at twice the price if necessary, the album, for the single track of Deep River, the traditional spiritual. This is the fundamental arrangement of Mischa Elman. He was America's greatest violinist before being surpassed by the technically more skilled (in the opinion of some) Jascha Heifetz. The performance of Messrs, Schwarz and Weiser is one of dreamy enchantment, true to the composition and to the arrangement. It is the salvation, if one is needed, of the entire album. -BW



For Muldrow, the chief one was Wes Montgomery, who himself had admired and emulated Charlie Christian, Barney Kessel and even Django Reinhardt. Though the inspirational thrust is evident throughout, it's also manifest that Ronald Muldrow is his own man, both as player and composer. The ten tracks on the album include some originals and some standards notably Little White Lies and a haunting Our Day Will Come. Classic support is given by Yoron Israel on drums; Kendrick Gueno, other percussion; Peter Washington on bass; keyboardist James Williams; and Steve Nelson sounding like Terry Gibbs, on vibes. -BW

Montreal power rock quartet releases debut on Sub-Zero Records

MCA ships Likwid metal

Talk about pressure. It starts off when Pierre Dumont of Zero Records in Montreal spies with his little eye a band that makes THE BIG IMPRESSION. He hooks up with them after the gig, four polite down to earth guys, easy to keep track of since they're not in the habit of using last names. He believes in them so much that he's willing to add a new branch to his label just to properly promote the group whom he also believes has what it takes for a full out cross Canada release. The problem is his pockets aren't deep enough and his label, though established, doesn't have pull enough to fit his grand designs.

He decides that the group has got the goods to make THE BIG IMPRESSION on a major and convinces MCA to slot a gig for the band at their convention - a hush hush thing for MCA since they are not in the habit of letting unsigned bands play those particular in house shows. Dumont tells the band that the show will be the make it or break it moment. If MCA jumps in, it's a partnership and the entire project (including the label's new branch) goes forward. If not, then band and label will have to "rediscuss."

For Nigel, lead singer of Likwid, that moment was pure heat. "It was total pressure," he says. "You finally play your set and it's like ahhh! there's all this release. And then [MCA President Ross] Reynolds comes back stage and everything was just very, very cool."

Cool indeed. No sooner had the band towelled off backstage than a licensing deal was being penned between MCA and Sub-Zero Records. The show, as they say, was on. Their self-titled release has just hit retail and despite the "Canadian-German-Italian-born-in-India-of-Vietnamese-descent" cultural hodge podge that comprises the different ethnicities of the members, it provides an unsullied, solid and percussive

dose of in yer face rock. That was entirely intentional, says Nigel, who believes that the format, of late forgotten after the demise of hard rock sometime in the past decade, will speak to fans of aggressive music once again.

"I find the musicianship coming back, you know, I find the attitude thing is worn out, being depressed and all that," he says. "I find that people are understanding a good song and a good player and that's where the timing of Likwid comes in really good."


Once known as Cinema V, three of the four members of Likwid (plus drummer and keyboards) rose over the Montreal indie scene a few years back, scooping up the prize for a Canadian Homegrown Music Search contest and an invitation to play at the Tokyo International Pop Music Festival along their way to the first record. The independent release eventually saw the light of day, though it was immediately followed by the departure of their drummer. The group sought the replacement needed to promote the album and found a little more than they bargained for in Andre, a frenzied skin pummeler with early musical influences along the line of Iron Maiden, Rush and Van Halen.

"He's a power drummer," says Nigel, "he plays so loud, the energy that this guy gives off from behind the band is incredible. [His arrival] was sort of like the next step [in the creative development of the band], you know. And I guess we all sort of fed off that."

Andre apparently made explicit what was always implicit in Cinema V's music which was a desire to break away from a soft and subtle form of rock to all out hard rock proper.

"When we were finishing the Cinema V independent album, you could see the songs were starting to change from what we were before to what we are now and there

Rimes, who will be 14 years old in a couple of weeks, has skyrocketed to country music fame in the US, with an obvious spillover effect here in Canada. The follow-up single will be Hurt Me, which was written by Deborah Allen, Rafe Van Hoy and Bobby Braddock. Allen had a hit in the US in 1983 with Baby I Lied. Rimes CD is now at retail, where this week, it is the second best selling country album throughout the powerful Sunrise chain.

Vince Gill is on a winning streak with World's Apart, this week's biggest gainer. The single, taken from his MCA album, High Lonesome Sound, jumps up the chart to #43 from #87, its second week on the chart.

Peter Walker is the new music director at KX-96 FM in Durham. He replaces Andy Hayes. His pick this week is Vince Gill's Worlds Apart.

Toby Keith has the most added single this week with A Woman's Touch, the latest track from Blue Moon his Mercury CD, entering the chart at #83.

Twain, Brooks & Delaney add punch to CCMA

Shania Twain has been firmed to perform on this year's Canadian Country Music Awards show, while Garth Brooks will present the fan's choice entertainer of the year award via satellite hook-up from the stage at his concert in Saint John.

As well, veteran country performer Myrna Lorrie and Country Music News publisher and editor Larry Delaney will be inducted into the CCMA's Hall of Honour.

Lorrie, who won Juno Awards in 1970/71 as female vocalist and a Big Country Award in 1977 as outstanding female performer, will be inducted into the hall of honour, while Larry Delaney, publisher and editor of Country Music News, a seven-time recipient of the Country Music Person of the Year citation, will receive the Stan Klees Hall of Honour Builder Award.

Sammy Kershaw is back on the chart, this time with Vidalia, the follow-up to Meant To Be, now descending the chart (#47) after 16 weeks of charting. The new single enters the chart at #88. Both tracks were taken from his Mercury CD Politics, Religion & Her.

Trina has a charter with her latest Carina release, Even God Must Get The Blues. The single, which was written by Nashville writers John Scott Sherrill and Dene Anton, qualifies as two-parts Cancon (AP). The track was taken from her upcoming CD, A Woman's Work, which was produced by Mike Francis and recorded at Toronto's Inception Sound. Trina's career is being guided by Michael Ardenne, who heads up the Halifax-based Ardenne International. Trina's new release enters the chart this week at #90.

Geordie Barnett has a new charted single. Shot Down Again, a Barnett original. The track, which enters the chart at #92, was taken from his four-song Radio Singles compilation. This is the follow-up to Father Father, a song he co-wrote with Mark Dineen, and which peaked on the RPM Country 100 at #47 (June 10/96). Both tracks were produced by Rick Durrett. Barnett's compilation is available by calling 1-800-Joe Radio.

Booker scam sours Brooks' Edmonton dates

According to an Internet report by the Edmonton Sun's staff writer Mindelle Jacobs (July 30/96), Garth Brooks' Edmonton dates attracted more than just fans.

An unnamed Camrose booker reportedly offered pre-paid packages of \$139.00 plus taxes which were to include transportation and a pre-concert party at Cowboys Country Saloon with a buffet and one complimentary drink, plus, of course, tickets to the show.

According to Jacobs, 360 of the ticket packages were sold, mostly to fans in the Camrose area, which is just south of Edmonton. One, however was sold to an Edmonton fan. This, despite

Brad Hewey, whose career is also being guided by Michael Ardenne, has a new single. Right Where I Wanna Be, the title track of his album is the follow-up to You Be The Judge, which peaked on the RPM Country 10 at #40 (July 8/96). A Hewey original, the new focus track enters the chart this week at #93. The album was self-produced and recorded at In Session Studios in Halifax. The album was mastered by Harold Tsistinas at Solar Audio, which is also in Halifax.

The Beach Boys aren't going to be a shoo-in with country radio programmers. Little Deuce Coupe, the band's debut for River North, is getting the once-over, and it will probably kick in, but it won't be an out-of-the-box happening. James House, who also comes from the surfin' state of California, was given the song, to give it the country flavouring. He added a little blues to the rockin' surfin' basics of the song, and Brian Wilson and Joe Thomas, who produced Stars And Stripes, the initial album release, were so knocked out by House's treatment, they issued it as the first single. The album will be at retail mid-August. Wilson and Thomas have really tapped Nashville's top country roster to turn their sound into country. For instance, Ricky Van Shelton does Fun, Fun, Fun.

the fact concert officials had apparently decreed that tour buses couldn't pick up patrons within a 130 kilometre radius of Highway 2, which would automatically disqualify Camrose-area ticket-holders.

It was also reported that the booker in question had sent out a letter informing the ticket-holders that the tickets had been cancelled and refunds would be forthcoming.

After receiving a number of complaints, the police in Camrose mounted an investigation and met with about 50 frustrated fans to map out a plan to recoup their money. No specific charges have been laid against the booker, nor is there any indication that charges will be laid.

A number of the out-of-luck fans are apparently trying to pool enough money to launch an action against the booker. However, as a local lawyer points out, there could be a problem which could hinge on the financial position the booker happens to be in.

It's possible that if Brooks, who is one of the most fan-aware performers in the entertainment industry, gets wind of the Camrose problem, he could come up with a solution.

In the meantime, the Brooks, record-breaking, first-day advance ticket sale bonanza continues to move eastward. His two shows at Ottawa's Palladium (Sept. 2-3) completely sold out, selling 33,000 tickets, breaking the record set by the Eagles earlier this year, where their June 13th show sold 15,000 tickets.

As well, his Sept. 3 date at Hamilton's Copps Coliseum captured 16,000 fans, and his Sept. 6 date at Toronto's Skydome, chalked up sales of 24,000 tickets.

Brooks begins the Canadian leg of his world tour with three sold-out shows at Vancouver's GM Place (Aug 1-3), followed by Calgary's Saddledome (7-9), Edmonton's Northland Coliseum (10-12), Saskatoon's Saskatchewan Place (14-16), and the Winnipeg Arena (17-19).

MCA and Rachel Matkin sign distribution deal





Johnston, and Carl Wilson, have dates pencilled in to June of next year, where they are scheduled to play the military base in Prince Edward Island for the opening of the causeway between PEI and the mainland. John Brown ad 902-436-3938 is the promoter for this date. He's also hoping for a Newfoundland date.

CKDM's Bruce Leperre is one of biggest risktakers and one of the strongest supporters of Canadian country music. Over the years since he has been sending in his "picks", he has often been the first to give the nod to both Canadian and American releases that have gone on to the top of the charts. Last week he picked Charlie Major's Waiting For You, the first "picker" to give Charlie

a nudge. Closer to home, this Cancon conscious music director of the Dauphin, Manitoba station, together with the Agasea label's Dan Schur were instrumental, in getting Tara Lyn Hart, her deal with Sony Music Canada. The deal with Sony is valued at \$300,000 and includes two albums (with an option for five more) for the 18-year old resident of Roblin, Manitoba. As Tara Lyn Mohr, she was the winner last year of the Today's Hot New Country Talent Search which was organized by CKDM. Her prize package included a two-song CD single, which was recorded at Sunshine Studios in Winnipeg with producer Danny Schur. Full Grown Man, which came out of that session, is now at radio. Leperre gave it a "pick", the week of July 8/96. Since winning that competition, she married her manager Perry Mohr, who is also in radio.

was less keyboards involved," he says. "That's why the keyboardist left; he got more and more frustrated because we were actually writing songs and then trying to fit keyboards in."

After the departure of the keyboardist, change came rapidly and entirely to the extent that the band felt they couldn't operate under the same name and it was then that Likwid was born.

Despite the move into hard rock, however, the new band fully expected its sounds to be potentially embraced by commercial alternative radio. Thus far the music has proven itself rather well, allowing their first single Good Bye to hit #1 for two weeks on Montreal's highly coveted top rock CKMF chart. That bit of success has been a major achievement for a band that had to bear the cross of vying with an unsympathetic geographical placement to develop a good fanbase for their music.

"People from Quebec city don't come to Montreal because they say I only speak English and if you go to Ontario people there say 'I never go to Montreal I don't speak French.' People have different views of what Montreal is, you know, but you'll be surprised how much it resembles other Canadian cities."

One way in which it does not resemble other Canadian cities is in its lack of support for English music, a sore little point of contention for the

people's residing in the only truly bilingual spot in Canada.

"It's tough," says Nigel, "because the Quebec government is really behind the French artists here and they get a lot of loans, grants, stuff like that. If you are an English band, you can't get a loan or a grant here because you are not reflecting the culture of your province. So then we have to apply to FACTOR from Toronto but then we're not from Toronto."

Adding to the unsupportive climate is the fact that there is only one extant English rock station which could conceivably broadcast the material in a market conditioned by a 60% French music mandate. The remaining forty per cent, says Nigel, services English music from the US and would leave only a 5 to 10% margin for local English music. Trying to squeeze unproven home grown material into that little slot is as tough as it sounds, he says, and bands have to do whatever they can to get in (and incidentally, says Nigel, Montrealer punk overlords Grim Skunk decided to beat the rap by adding a few French ditties to their new album).

"It's a tough situation being in Montreal, but there are a lot of bands here and I really find there's a Montreal sound, a melody, [which comprises] a progressive background from Montreal. You can hear it a lot in most of the bands, even on the Likwid

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
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
