## CIRPA seminar addresses independent sector

In a bid to reach the Canadian independent market, CIRPA recently organized a panel seminar in Toronto that took place last Wednesday October 3. State Of The Independents assembled experts from the United States to address several issues of import to the independent sector and to encourage and advise the small but attentive audience of approximately one hundred. The trio of New York based panellists consisted of Barry Weiss, President of Jive/Zomba Records, Eddie O'Laughlin, President of Next Plateau Records, and Cory Robbins, President of Robbins Entertainment. Attic Records President Al Mair moderated the event.

The seminar aimed primarily to inform and encourage those present on pertinent subjects from starting and funding an independent label, the global influence of the independents and their advantages, relations with multinationals, and what does and what does not sell internationally. A cross the board background in urban, r&b and rap music kept the discussions specifically and generally to those quarters, however. Ironically, there was a general sense among panellists and some attendants that Canada offers one of the smallest established markets of urban music, independent or otherwise, in the world.

### Farmer's Daughter signed to MCA

MCA Music Entertainment has entered into an agreement with Farmer's Daughter. The first release will be the trio's new album, *Makin' Hay*, which will arrive in stores on Oct. 23. The album was produced by Monroe Jones, a Nashville-based producer.

The agreement also includes distribution of their debut album, *Girls Will Be Girls*, which is close to gold.

Regarded as one of the hardest working acts in Canada, the trio played more than 200 dates last year and have just completed final arrangements for a 38-city Canadian tour.

The trio and their manager Gerry Leiske will be in Toronto Oct. 7 for a media CD launch at Club 424.

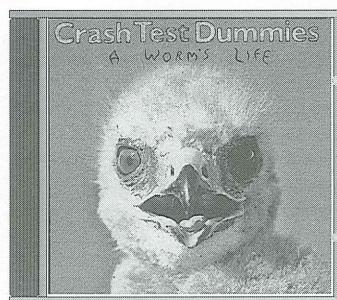

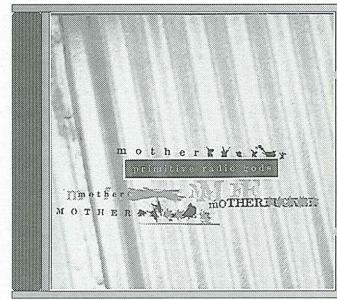

"In terms of hip hop and rap [Canada] doesn't seem to have that radio support or major label support," commented one audience member. "The main problem [with local hip hop] is that radio support is nil."

Robbins commented that while there may be good records out of Canada, a dwindling interest in the format could be due to the fact that rap remained inherently an American phenomenon.

"Most rap records don't do well anywhere but

America, even the really big records in America," he said.

He remarked that he had worked platinum rap albums in America that sold only two thousand copies in Europe. "There is no interest at all," he said, "the slang is different, and [foreign audiences] don't understand what the rappers are talking about; certain areas are just not known as rapper markets."

### MIDEM to extend trade fair with Latin music

MIDEM, the music industry's international trade fair has established a new Latin American and Caribbean division with plans for a festival in Miami next year. The MIDEM Latin American and Caribbean Music Market will be held next September 8-11 and is estimated to draw some 2,500 attendants.

Xavier Roy, MIDEM's chief executive, remarked that the Latin American music industry has been long fragmented and that format has suffered unduly as a result. There has, however, been a recent increase in popularity and demand for the music, and Roy expects this will be emphasised with MIDEM.

American independents, he said, can get away with retailing incredibly high without major label distribution, simply because of a strong local community whose purchasing behaviour is severely influenced by word-of-mouth. It is, he said, a privilege that countries outside of the United States do not enjoy.

He suggested that a possible option was for independents to simply relocate, noting that the key to success at the independent level was to maintain the target market at close quarters.

"If you are in Canada and make an arrangement with some independent distributor to put out your records in America and you think all you have to do is hire some independent promoters and they'll break your record - that might happen once every ten years but it's really not going to happen because records don't break that easily," he said. "You really need an American record company there, to look after it every day and be there and react to situations that occur every day."

Shopping for a deal with a label in a foreign market had to be governed not necessarily by having the most success in Canada, he said, but by starting a bidding war between competitors.

"If you can get two companies that want your record your leverage is tremendously increased," Robbins explained. "It doesn't happen every day and obviously you can't plan on it happening but if you manage to get two companies that want your product, then it's going to drive the price way up."

Robbins nevertheless encouraged listeners to work from the ground up on their product, instead of looking for local support from major record labels or from radio. Weiss echoed the sentiment, saying that street credibility is the precursor to a

"Music is more than a cultural phenomenon, it's a way of life," he said. "This way of life is reflected by a multitude of musical styles; salsa, samba, socca, merengue, tejano, bailantes, rock en español and reggae to mention just a few and all of these styles make the whole world dance."

The decision to situate the festival in Florida was crucial to its success stated Roy.

"Miami has become the very heart of the Latin entertainment industry," he said.

MIDEM holds annual conferences in France and in Hong Kong, where it draws music industry executives, publishers, artists and agents involved in European and Asian music markets.

demanding market that is the necessary alternative to pushing product from the top.

"I think what most record companies operate on from a marketing promotion point of view is that radio is always the first port of call. We work under the assumption that radio is the last port of call, even if it's a radio record," he said.

With CD singles still being an issue in the dance market, the question was raised whether CD singles are a viable profit centre or have simply gone the way of the promotional tool. The singles market in the US, insisted Weiss, is having problems because its sales are being pushed on promotional grounds and thereby compromising the single's retail value. The only profit margin, he said, was in the CD maxi-single which offers bonus tracks and live outtakes in addition to remixes of the song.

"We tend to be very discriminating about when and how we put out commercial singles," he said. "The big cancer in America right now is single sale pricing; you see people virtually giving away singles for free to get over the counter SoundScan numbers. And the industry is sort of biting itself in the ass because if a record does see immediate big

SoundScan singles numbers, it's almost a self-fulfilling prophecy in that it loses a little bit of its effect and its impact with the stern radio stations that know what is going on."

Mair was satisfied with the feedback from audience members and discussion generated from the panellists. The information and opinions proclaimed, he said, were indispensable to the independents and especially those in dance and urban formats.

"CIRPA has done seminars before aimed at the black and dance community and it's a very active part of the business here," he said. "But because of the limited sale for local dance and rap artists it's been difficult for them and they don't have access to people of this expertise."

"The lack of knowledge within the local black community is scary and it's only because they don't know. The reason we did this was for those people who don't have access to people of this expertise, so they can really hear from it the horses mouth."

Attendees seemed equally pleased with the proceedings though there were some reservations regarding the urban slant and the perception of

panel members regarding urban product in Canada.

"I thought it was interesting that they would bring three urban people to talk about building a label when so far in the history of what's happened in Canada is that there is no urban label that's done anything from the ground level up with any success ratios," said Zak Werner from Werner/Sanders and Associates. "So perhaps there were good lessons to be learned but really [the panellist's] experience is pretty foreign to what people are trying to do here."

Werner believes that the seminar was as good as could be expected, however, and that it signalled a definite move in the right direction. The target audience, he says, is bang on.

"It really has to come from a new breed of young entrepreneurs who are willing to make this thing happen and waiting around for the majors to do it might be a long wait, though with BMG and with EMI there are people looking to give it that extra push," he says. "I think it's just fine that America is not paying attention to what's happening here; we should do it ourselves and do it from the ground up."

## Digital Courier makes broadcast history

Digital Courier International (DCI) celebrated a milestone in the radio broadcasting industry on Sept. 24. The Vancouver-based digital audio distribution network welcomed New York's WMXV-FM, the 3,500th radio station to sign on.

With the new addition, DCI is now connected with more than 3,7800 radio stations, duplication companies, production studios, record companies, and other organizations that have traditionally relied on conventional tape and courier delivery.

DCI's vice-president of marketing, Remy Kozak, is obviously overjoyed with the progress the company has made in such a short period of time. "The fact that Digital Courier has reached 3,500 stations is a major accomplishment. The fact that we've done it in just over a year is a tribute to the value of our service and the dedication of our employees."

The network recently released Phil Collins' newest single, Dance Into The Light, to 38 radio

stations in five time zones across Canada. The single marks the third single released over DCI and the second by a major label in Canada.

Warner Music Canada, Collins' distribution label was extremely pleased with the results.

"I thought the service was wonderful," remarked Melody Sieger, National Promotions Assistant at Warner. "Everybody got it at the same time and I didn't have to worry about a thing."

DCI was launched in 1994 and remains the only two-way digital audio distribution network in the world. The service allows members to send and receive CD-quality advertisements, traffic instructions, short-form programming and music releases across North America in less than 60 minutes.

Kozak expects that with an estimated 400 stations signing on each month, DCI should boast 4,500 subscribers before year-end.

## CD/video release a final farewell to singer Hoon

EMI Music Canada is giving fans of the pop/alternative band Blind Melon one final memory of the late Shannon Hoon and his bandmates. Nico will be released November 12 along with a documentary video, Letters From a Porcupine.

The enhanced CD, dedicated to Hoon's daughter Nico Blue, contains previously unreleased photos, interviews, concert footage, several unreleased videos and various outtakes and rarities that would otherwise never be heard.

Letters From a Porcupine features club footage from 1992, the band's appearance at Woodstock '94 and some behind the scenes shots during the recording of Soup, the band's final studio album.

A portion of the proceeds from Nico is to be donated to MAP (Musician's Assistance Program), a drug and alcohol recovery program for those in the music industry.

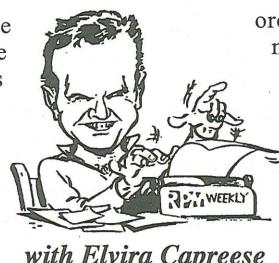
# WALT SAYS . . . !

We're going through a bit of a lull, don't you know. Adams does have another hit single going for him, and this album, despite the negatives, is going to be huge. I've heard this same guy cutting up other artists and continually painting a dismal picture of the industry. There are a lot of positives in the industry right now and three of them are Canadian, Alanis Morissette's album is close to the two million mark, Celine Dion's not far behind and Shania Twain is right behind her. (EC: *That says something about the women's movement, wouldn't you say, or is that being negative???*)

**As promo people go!!!** And you have to get up pretty early to beat BMG's guy on the move, Dale Peters. # Theatre history made by Livent and BMG Music Canada

On October 1, a great moment in the history of Canadian theatre was created at the Ford Centre for the Performing Arts. Livent's chairman and CEO Garth Drabinsky and Paul Alofs, president of BMG Music Canada, jointly unveiled the world premiere recording of *Songs From Ragtime - The Musical*.

The concept recording, the first in Canadian history to be released prior to the opening of a production, took place in July of 1996, before the cast was even in rehearsal.

The special evening for the unveiling took place in the acoustically-perfect George Weston Recital Hall. On hand was the entire 41-member cast and key members of the production, including Ragtime recording producer Jay David Saks, lyricist, Lynn Ahrens and composer Stephen Flaherty. Also present was playwright Terrance McNally, RCA Victor New York A&R Director Bill Rosenfield and orchestrator William David Brohn.

A 30-minute documentary on the making of the concept CD was also viewed and was televised on Bravo across Canada one hour later.

The party that followed was an appropriate follow-up to an inspiring evening that introduced media and retailers to the show which will have a short run in North York and possibly go on to Broadway.

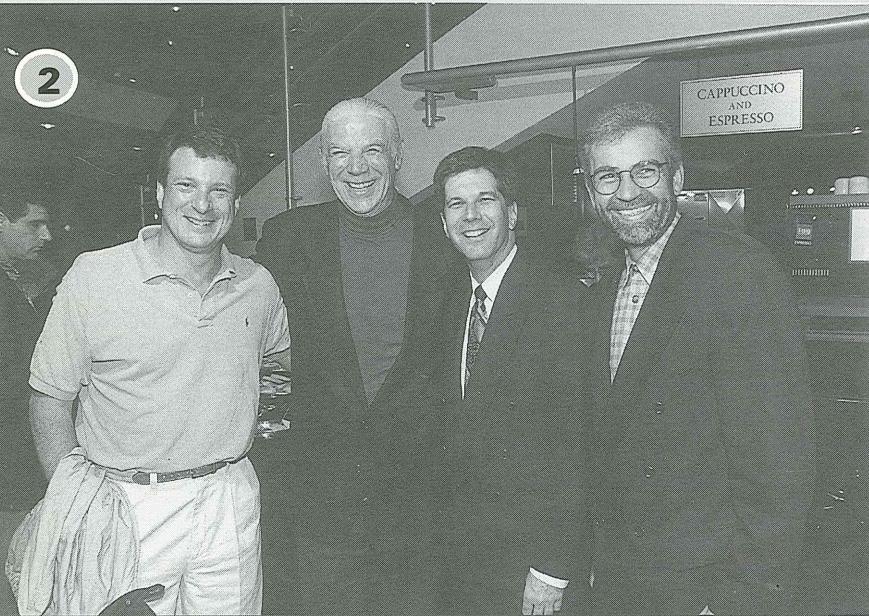
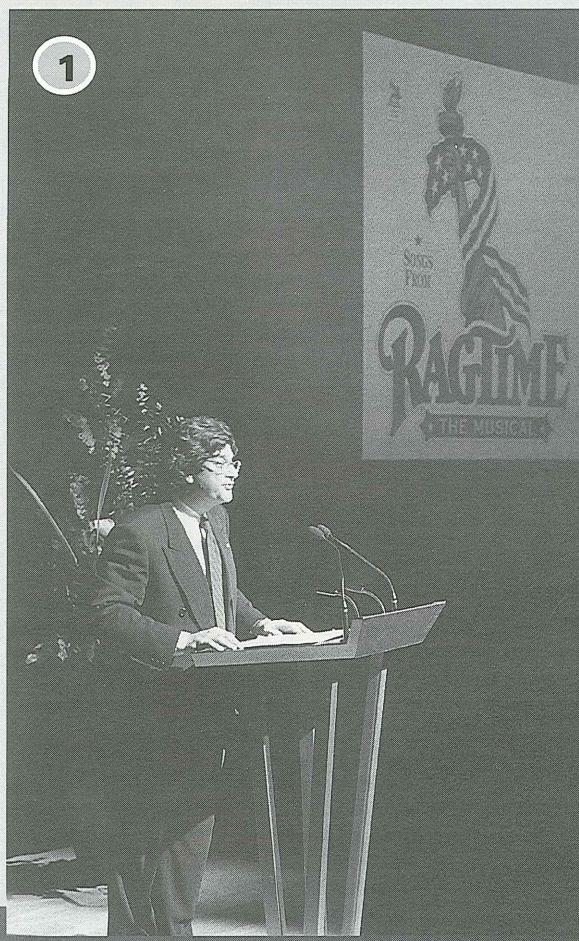

## Rise of a bold new Creature

Vancouver's Moist are on a roll. Having scooped up a Juno in 1994 for Most Promising Band, the boys have lived up to the award with three top 10 hits, two #1 videos (on MuchMusic and MusiquePlus) and triple platinum sales in Canada for their album *Silver*. Not bad for a garage-made debut that saw six weeks of indie retail life before it was nabbed up by EMI Canada.

Such achievements are pretty impressive, but there is still the not insignificant test that comes at the heels of very big success the first time out, namely, victory over the dreaded sophomore jinx. To combat the creature, Moist have produced an album called just that, which though it does not aim to abandon the sound that made them big in the first place, nevertheless has tampered with it significantly. It seems that the possibility of not meeting up to expectations was something that could not be wholly avoided.

"It's something we were aware of, yeah," admits Mark Makowy, Moist's main chord man. "When we came off the road a year ago labour day, it was a matter of basically turning off the touring machine and start writing the record. And we were definitely aware of the pressures that were going on and I think it probably took us a couple of months just to get beyond *Silver*."

Apparently the band struggled with the spectre of having material which sounded suspiciously like the stuff on *Silver* show up on the new album. Once they identified the malady, however, they went out of their way to make sure that it was not going to happen.

"To catch the vibe of where we wanted to go with this record we had to experiment a little bit and some of the experimentation we did showed up on the record," says Makowy. "The use of cello and trumpet is something we hadn't done before."

The cello and trumpet referred to (which

appear on *Tangerine* and the title track, respectively), are only part of the experimentation Makowy speaks about. There is also a transcendent ballad called *Disco Days* which features vocalist David Usher pouring out some poignant sentiments to a solo piano. Still, some of those decisions, insists Makowy, were not that intentional.

"It's funny when you get into the writing of the new record," he says. "It's hard to know what direction it's going to go in, particularly with the band being pretty much a collective vision where everybody contributes to the songwriting; it's hard to really control where it's going."

Makowy nevertheless insists that one of the things the band was definitely aiming to do was to create more of an album and less a collection of songs.

"The first record is more indicative of a collection of songs than a more unified piece," he says. "When we made the first record, we recorded it in middle of the night sessions in a week and a half of studio time."

This time around the band took a little more time than that, approximately twenty-eight weeks more to be precise, in working out an album that aimed for a musical rather than lyrical concept.

"We wrote for eight months so we wrote a lot more than the twelve songs that are on the record," says Makowy. "When it came close to recording time we went through the songs that we had and chose songs that worked together well and somehow, in some abstract

way, told a story together."

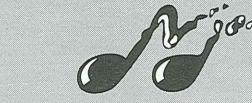
The band has also welcomed another important change at the heels of their release, the departure of long-time manager and personal associate Keith Murianovich. The band looked for and found a replacement in Terri McBride, who will be managing their affairs from here on in.

"Because we had endured several lifetimes of insanity, he just decided that he wanted to move on and do other things," says Makowy. "He wasn't sure that he wanted to dedicate his life to managing a rock group. So we started looking around. We talked to Terri, we liked him; we liked his organization and the fact that he was young and extremely driven and we have a lot of things in common that certainly vibe well."

If it's all in the vibe then Moist have it where they want it. The album is already showing promising chart action and retail and a tour of global proportions should follow within the next weeks.

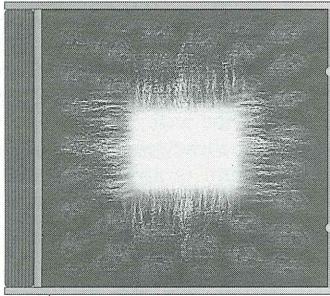

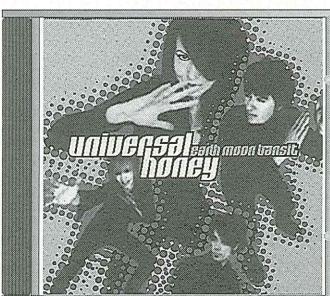


**TOOL** **Aenima** **-Alternative**

By now Tool have established themselves as connoisseurs of heavy rock with a sweet tooth for the bizarre, lying somewhere in the same infernal plane as White Zombie, Ministry and The Revolting Cocks. And like their siblings, record sales aren't lying about the strong appeal of the music to the young and the rowdy. Last year's *Undertow* reached gold in just six months' time. *Aenima* marks a much anticipated follow-up to that album and, conceptual cover art notwithstanding, have delivered on the goods. What separates Tool from the rest is immediately identifiable; they attempt at a type of dark exotic beauty, the type that might explore the aesthetic behind an automobile accident or some violent action. For all of its dark anarchy, there is a seductive quality about the songs that has worked its aphrodisiac with radio programmers who are spinning the hell out of the charmingly titled *Stinkfist*. Bio notes and previous press have tried to make a big deal out of Tool as an aesthetic phenomenon, but the music seems to speak its own language prone to tangents which are difficult to fathom. Tool undoubtedly remain a strong draw on the concert front and at retail, where we expect to see this new album for a long while to come. An erratic release whose run will publicize Tool's name once and for all as one of the innovators of modern 20th century rage rock. **-RG**

**UNIVERSAL HONEY** **-Pop/Alternative**  
**Earth Moon Transit**

This pop rock quartet has entered the domestic alternative scene with an almost inexhaustive quantity of melodies. The remarkable thing is that rather than go the route of chewing gum rock, *Earth Moon Transit* manages a surprising degree retention value. What that means is that this debut possesses the quality of never becoming boring; a not unflattering complement taking into account much of the

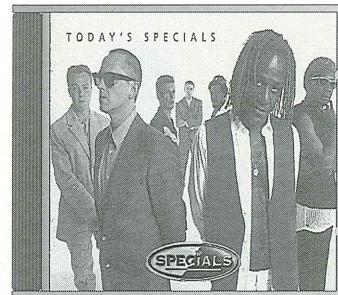


indie material that never quite achieves memorability. The word *infectious* (with regard to its overuse aside) certainly comes to mind, as does Universal Honey's competent hold on technical aspects of pop which too often overwhelm first timers; things like pacing, timing and a knack for balancing new ideas just right. *Any Road Back* is the single currently being worked to radio, a tune with all of the quirkiness of a Devo track and the smooth polish of a meticulous finish. Simply a shoo in. The rest of the album follows in the footsteps of that track, tunes like *Going Nowhere*, *Nightmare* and *Pacific Atlantic*, all of which show a strong ability to go a long way on alternative radio with their simple and educated grooves. 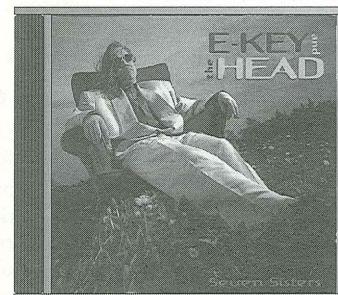

The Specials have been around a long while now and for good reason; they are a band with talents that, instead of vying for attention time, tend to complement one another. The riffy, professionally articulated instrumental that opens their newest album is testimony



to that in a way we cannot quite convey in print. Suffice to say that in terms of bands, no one quite compares to these guys once they get together to make some sounds. It is from this legacy of *jammin'* with power that this compilation of covers makes its claim to modern audiences. That's right, in a release that could have been their *Thank You* to the musical traditions from which they have drawn heavily, The Specials have undertaken to re-record some of the best of the best. Marley's *Hypocrite*, Peter Tosh's *Maga Dog*, the Clash's *Somebody Got Murdered* and even *A Little Bit Me, A Little Bit You* from Neil Diamond are some of the tracks that appear on this release. Whether intentional or unintentional, there are instances where some of the traditional elements in the music are overlooked for the sake of modern interpretation, though that is largely unavoidable with such releases. The compilation nevertheless presents the work from a band that is obviously still in top musical form. High points include the aforementioned instrumental opener *Take Five*, *Goodbye Girl* and *Pressure Drop*. **-RG**

Ballads like *Hold Me To My Word* and *Thankful* will bring out the romantic in even the most hardened of hearts, while *Still Free* and *We Could Be Grooving* will coax even the shyest of wallflowers to the dance floor. Produced by Arnold Lanni (Frozen Ghost, Our Lady Peace, Wild T and The Spirit) and featuring guest performances by Phil X and Wild T Springer, *Seven Sisters* is an album that stands head and shoulders above the crowd. **-LT**

Sometimes persistence is as much a virtue as patience. And they both usually pay off in the end. Such is the case with Latitude Records/EMI's year-long pursuit of Booming Airplanes. After finally signing and recording their debut CD *Yarn*, this musical troupe is bound to join the ranks of Sloan and other east-coast bands who have garnered



success in a nation-wide market. Although *Booming Airplanes* is a bit of a misnomer (their music contains none of the heavy, droning sounds one might expect with such a moniker), their style is nonetheless an intoxicating mix of pop and folk that will endear them to fans of a more subtle sound. *Yarn* is Latitude's first enhanced CD -- containing information on the group, the making of the album and alternative versions of some of the songs. The first single, *Silver Lining*, is a jangly, up-beat pop song with an accompanying video-release directed by Stephen Scott (Sandbox, Damhnait Doyle, Treble Charger.) Produced by Booming Airplanes and William O'Guru, this CD nicely combines the vocal harmonies of Mark Savoury and Ruth Minniken with a heavily acoustic collection of music.

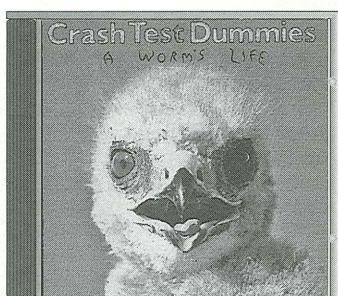

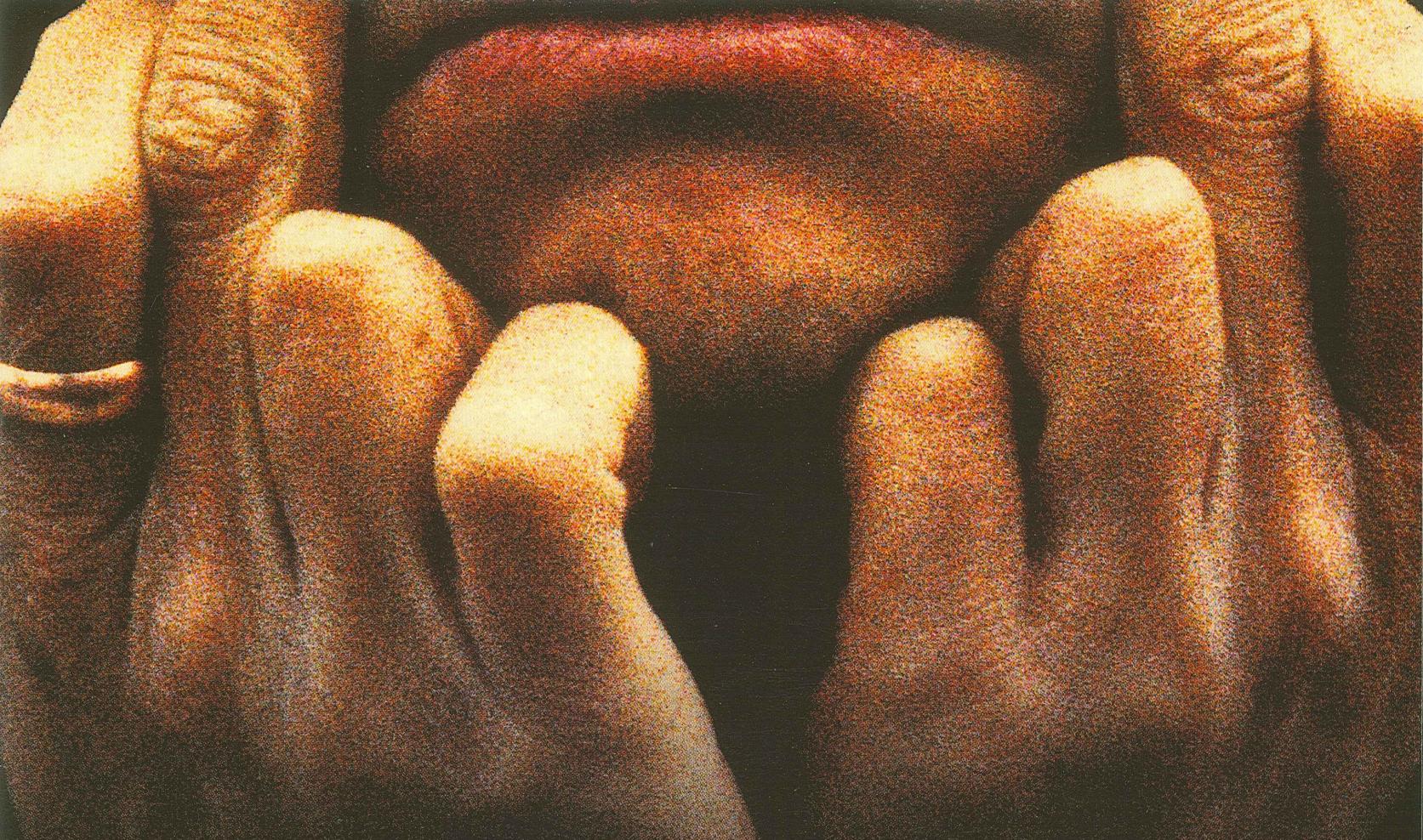
**CRASH TEST DUMMIES**

**A Worm's Life**

**Arista 39779-N**

Probably one of the most comprehensive marketing strategies in domestic rock history propels this highly anticipated album from one of Canada's top grossing international acts. The excitement at BMG, which is extending itself over a massive radio, internet, television, street posterizing and wall mural awareness campaign, can hardly be underestimated with worldwide sales of 5 and a half million for the Dummies' *God Shuffled His Feet*. That ain't a hill of beans. Having established themselves well as a permanent pop band with serious creative intuition and wisdom, the Dummies have chosen to avoid the path of least resistance on their newest album and released something a little different. The new sound, which is evident from the first single *He Liked To Feel It* (and the accompanying gruesome video) is substantially more guitar based, though it is not maintained consistently throughout the twelve tracks that comprise the release. Like the single, *Overachievers*, *My Enemies* and *All Of This Ugly* lean to a rockier sound that tries hard for CHR but *Our Driver Gestures*, *There Are Many Dangers* and the title track progress the album into lighter, more sophisticated territories. Beyond all that, however, there are still more than a few tracks here which meet up to staple Dummie material. We suppose that a stylistic change from a product with major market value is always a risk, and maybe there will be a fluctuation in the numbers, but there is something to be said about a group of musicians who don't shy away from maturity, no matter what the pressures. Whether expectations will be met or not, this Dummie release is miles from crashing. **-RG**

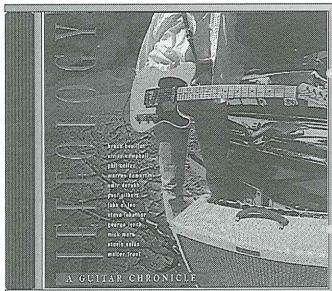

**Jeffology: A Guitar Chronicle**

Although this CD is a tribute, of sorts, to Jeff Beck, it didn't start out that way. Originally conceived as simply a collection of guitar-oriented rock, with contributing artists covering a song of their choice, all the submissions wound up being from either a Yardbirds or Jeff Beck album -- hence: Jeffology. This collection of some of today's



most prolific guitar virtuosos, contains 12 Yardbirds/Beck classics done in a fashion all their own. A heavy-sounding Shapes of Things featuring Sass Jordan on vocals, is the first release with Stevie Salas of Dokken (who delivers a scorching solo on this interpretation) on guitar. Dokken's alternate axeman George Lynch renders an electrifying version of People Get Ready, with some incredibly Rod Stewart-ish vocals by Dante Marchi. Produced by Billy Sherwood, Jeffology features Def Leppard's Phil Collen and Vivian Campbell on two separate instrumental tracks, as well as performances by Toto's Steve Lukather, Paul Gilbert of Mr. Big (who pounds through Heart Full of Soul with a distinct '90s edge), Mick Mars and John Corabi of Motley Crue as well as Rough Cutt's Amir Derakh and Paul Shortino. -LT

**3 LEGENDARY TENORS** - Classical

Caruso, Gigli, McCormack  
BMG Classics-09026-68534-N

Recorded between 1904 and 1950, this selection of classic tracks by the original three tenors consists of some of the greatest recordings ever made at the beginning of the era of sound recording. Whoever put this package together knew exactly the right buttons to push. And all the tracks have been enhanced to make them suitable for the technology of today. What a pity that a CD like this will end up in the bins under some strange classification and be seen or heard by so few. Radio wouldn't know what an effect all this would have on live radio and sound recording. And remember, that one of these tenors had the first million seller in history -- Enrico Caruso, and it wasn't even a rock number. -SK

**3 TENORS OF THE GOLDEN AGE** - Classical

A different set of tenors, but, again, this is hit material. Many of these tracks as singles topped the sales charts, and most that are featured here are titles that are asked for in record stores historically, because they were



such popular singles. Best example is Bluebird Of Happiness by Jan Peerce. If it was to be played today on a hit radio station, would it still light up the switchboard? We'll never know. Thank you to the three tenors for bringing about the two three tenor CDs that might be heard for the first time by anyone who appreciates the history of sound recording. Mario Lanza? ## BMG's Paul Alofs to address Strategic Leadership luncheon

Paul Alofs, president and general manager of BMG Music Canada, will make a presentation on "leadership and growth" at the Strategic Leadership Forum luncheon on Oct. 24.

The setting will be the Ontario Club, Commerce Court South, 5th Floor, 30 Wellington Street West at Bay in downtown Toronto. Registration and networking will take place at 11:45. Lunch will be served at 12:15 with Alofs' presentation to begin at 1:15, to be followed by a question and answer session.

Alofs took over the helm of BMG Music Canada last year, after a highly successful tenure as president of HMV Canada. It was in 1989 when he took on the mantle of president of HMV, the youngest president in the history of this giant record retail chain. Prior to that, he honed his business practices and leadership qualities with Toronto's Marketing and Promotion Group (MPG).

Needless to say, given the autonomy he enjoyed at HMV, he was able to turn the company around to his way of rethinking the needs of both his internal and external customers. HMV sales jumped from \$38 million to more than \$200 million. At the time he moved to BMG, HMV was enjoying status as the number one music retailer in Canada, a position it has steadfastly retained.

Alofs took his revolutionary business approach to BMG where he turned a few heads in the industry. This was uncharted territory for him, as was HMV beforehand, and where he put his strategic marketing expertise to full use. The result was a steady, but market-trailing 8 per cent share, with annual sales of \$70 million and climbing.

Among Alofs' most recent "left-field"

projects was buying all the ad space in the industry's two trade journals, which obviously made an impact on the business world. This was a project that was six to eight months in the making, and a first for a large corporation. Four weeks after the trades hit the street, Bell Canada took all the ad space in a special issue of the Financial Post. Bell was rumoured to have been influenced by BMG's precedent-setting trade buy.

The BMG Sonic Boom bus tour, a bizarre enterprise to say the least, was next. Loaded with thousands of copies of both special trade issues, plus t-shirts and giveaway CDs, Alofs and two of his vice-presidents, Tim Williams and Larry Macrae, went on the road for a 20-city tour that took them to the front doors of record retail stores and radio and television stations from Halifax through to Victoria. At the completion of the 12,000 mile trip, BMG had scored invaluable media coverage, and cemented a warm relationship with record retailers and radio station personnel.

The Beatles' Anthology 3, covering the period of 1968-1970, is a collection of 50 songs, including out-takes, first takes

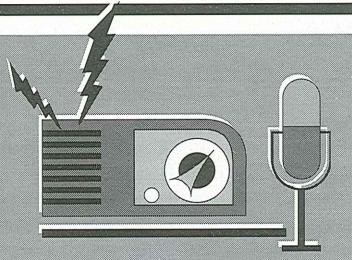

**It seems Primitive Radio Gods**, who's Standing Outside a Broken Phone Booth With Money In My Hand held the number two spot on RPM's 100 Hit Tracks chart, aren't adverse to a little creative borrowing when it comes to song titles. Fans of Bruce Cockburn may recognize the title from one of his early, and rather obscure (Columbia never released the album in the United States) albums. Although the title in question is the same, the two songs are completely different and original compositions. In fact, PRG frontman Chris O'Connor readily admits that the title was taken directly from the Cockburn tune. He says that he had completed all the tracks for Rocket, the indie band's debut CD, but still desperately needed a title for one last tune. O'Connor says he was thumbing through his record collection, found the Cockburn tune, liked the title and copped it for his own. Apparently, when contacted on the matter, Cockburn's comment was simply "I always wondered who bought that record."

**More Jaymz Bee** news for all you groovy lounge fans. It seems Jaymz and BMG president Paul Alofs are bound and determined to turn the country into one big cocktail party. In addition to a number of morning-show cocktail parties being thrown at radio stations cross the country to promote the sure-to-be CD classic *Cocktail Shakin' And Stirred*, BMG's Dale Peters has filled us in on what could be "the" party event this October 31st. Sponsored by MIX 99.9, Jaymz and his Royal Jelly Orchestra will be providing the harmonious background ambience for a Halloween bash at the Keg Mansion. The only catch is, you have to win a ticket to attend. Peters says that 250 tickets are to be given away on MIX 99.9 starting October 6 and

50 more will be given away through a retail outlet that has yet to be decided. Apparently the idea for such an event has been tossed around for quite some time and recently got the okay from MIX 99.9 Program Director J.J. Johnson. "It's going to be an incredible time," promises Peters.

**Fans of classical** music can tune into CBC radio and stereo for a series of concerts to be broadcast in October. Eight of the 12 main concerts in the Made In Canada Festival of Canadian Music will air (three of the performances will be live-to-air) starting October 4. The live-to-air broadcasts will include the Saraste Chamber Players' concert in honour of CBC's 60th anniversary (heard October 8 at 8 p.m.), the Toronto Symphony Orchestra's Images from Massey Hall (heard October 10 at 8 p.m.) and the Esprit Orchestra from Glenn Gould Studio (to be heard October 6 at 10 p.m.) Other broadcasts will include: Continuum, October 5; the Hannaford Street Silver Band, October 7; the Composers' Orchestra, October 9; the New Music Concerts, October 11. Tune into Concert Music at Noon, Encore!, Radio Concert Hall, Two New Hours and Music Around Us to hear these nationally broadcast concerts.

**And not to be outdone** by their radio counterparts, CBC Television brings us a 13-part, weekly music series titled *Hot off The Docks*. Named after the historical Winnipeg shipping and railyard docks, the show is a showcase of Manitoba's best up-and-comers. Look for a diverse group of entertainers -- Wyrd Sisters, Global Village Trucking Company, Jennifer Hanson, Wild Band of Indians, Spur of the Moment, Mark Reeves, Chains on 20, Cecile Brown, Wendy Isaac,

Foster Martin Band, Chantel Kreviazuk, Special Fancy and The Blue Meanies. Also new this season, Prairie Roadhouse will premiere on the CBC Television network at midnight October 8. However, CBC Saskatchewan airs the program Mondays, beginning October 7 at 7 p.m. local time. Taped in front of a studio audience, the series is unique in that it has no host or interviewer, but allows the performers to share their experiences and inspirations on writing and performing original music. A wide range of popular artists, running the full gamut of music genres, from acoustic rock to blues, country and aboriginal pop will be showcased.

**Since we're on the subject** of CBC...octogenarian Clyde Gilmour, host of Gilmour's Albums, is celebrating 40 years of broadcast with the CBC. Eighty-four-year-old Gilmour, who hosts the longest running one-host network show in Canadian broadcast history, will celebrate his 40th anniversary on-air October 5 on CBC Stereo at 11:08 a.m. and October 6 at 12:08 p.m. Gilmour, who was named a member of the Order of Canada in 1975, is also an inductee to the Canadian News Hall of Fame.

**This year's winner...Spider Chuck Jones!** Jones, a former boxer, and now a tell-it-like-it-is broadcaster with The Fan 590, has been named 1996 Commentator of the Year by Top Rank Incorporated in association with Don King Promotions. Jones was also recently inducted into the Boxing Hall of Fame as a broadcaster and journalist.

**And since we're on the topic...** The Canadian Association of Broadcasters (CAB) has announced they will be inducting nine private broadcasters into its Hall of Fame. Posthumous kudos go to Dr. Charles Alexander Allard, founder of the Edmonton Free Press and to Patrick Burns who became a household name after making his hot line debut with CJOR in 1962. Other inductees include: William J. Brady, a past president of the Central Canada Broadcasters' Association (now the Ontario Association of Broadcasters); Wally Crouter who, during his 50-year career at CFRB Toronto, once scooped the Boyd Gang jailbreak; Harold L. Davis, who retired from WIC (Western International Communications) and continues as a part-time consultant and broadcaster at CKNY New Westminster with whom he has been affiliated for many years; Gilles Grégoire who began his 40 year career at CFCM-TV Quebec and retired in 1995 from CFAP-TV Quebec; Elmer Hildebrand, President and CEO of Golden West Broadcasting, Altona; Robert A. McLaren who began his career as a disc jockey at CKCW Bridgewater N.S. and retired 43 years later as the station's vice-president and general manager; and Jessie McLean (nee Geldart), Director of Finance and Administration with CAB.

**John Michael Montgomery** has the biggest mover this week. *Ain't Got Nothin' On Us*, which shows Montgomery's leaning toward Western swing, jumps up to #37 from #63, after three weeks on the chart. This is the first track taken from his new Atlantic release, *I Do The Best*, which was produced by Csaba Petocz.

**Clay Walker** has the most added single with *Bury The Shovel*, which enters the chart at #89. This is the follow-up to *Only On Days That End In "Y"*, now descending the chart (#94) after 18 weeks on the chart. Both tracks are included on Walker's Giant release, *Hypnotize The Moon*.

**LeAnn Rimes** had a short run up the chart with *Hurt Me*, which backs down the chart to #44 after seven weeks of looking good. This was the follow-

up to *Blue*, her debut for Curb, which hit #1 on the RPM Country 100 on July 29/96. US country programmers were apparently giving priority to the album track of *One Way Ticket (Because I Can)*, which is now making chart gains in the US. Canadian country programmers backed off *Hurt Me*, but only a handful have supported *One Way Ticket*, which is expected to kick in shortly.

## Lawnie Wallace: Wild child with a bright future.

Lawnie Wallace isn't star-struck. But, like any 18-year-old, she still has her idols -- namely, Garth Brooks. "I'd love to meet him. He seems like he'd be a really cool person...I'd love to see one of his shows," she enthuses, "I didn't get to see him recently because I was in Calgary." Attending the recent CCMAs where, in 1994, she was discovered and signed to a 5-album contract with MCA. Not exactly your typical 18-year-old after all.

Wallace, a native of Stouffville, Ontario, credits good fortune and good timing to her "discovery" at the 1994 CCMAs "I was there with everyone else hoping to get noticed and, weirdly enough, the MCA guys [Ross Reynolds, Stephen Tenant and Ed Harris] had just come back from a cancelled meeting at the same time as I was showcasing. We had lunch the next day and negotiated for the next six months before everything came together. And now here I am." And "here" is the only Canadian artist to ever be signed directly to MCA, and a debut CD, *Thought I Was Dreaming*, released this past March. "It's definitely the highlight of my career so far."

And, though only 18, Wallace already has an

11-year career under her belt. She claims being roused from her sleep at 2 and 3 in the morning by the sounds of her father's band rehearsing in the basement is part of what inspired her to a career in country music. "There's always been music in the family. My dad [Bill Wallace, Lawnie's manager] worked shift work, so sometimes I'd hear them practising in the middle of the night...I'd just get up, go downstairs and start singing with them."

From there, Wallace says, the need to perform steadily grew. She wrote her first song at the age of seven following the untimely death of a favourite uncle. "I missed him and I've always been better at writing about how I feel rather than talking about it."

Not only did she pen her first song at an early age, but she played her first real gig that same year. When dad, Bill, was invited to play a benefit concert in the early '80s to benefit victims of the devastating tornado that left many Barrie residents homeless, Lawnie joined him, making her performing debut with the likes of Ronnie Hawkins and Murray McLauchlan. "It was the first time I'd ever gotten up in front of people and sang a song that I had written."

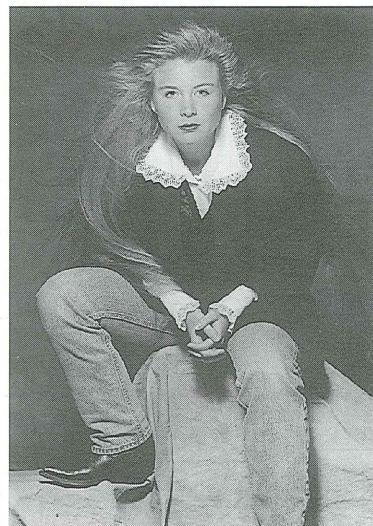
And when most kids her age dread facing a tiny classroom for show-and-tell, Wallace says she was never nervous about performing for a crowd. "I was never intimidated, even at that young an age. I think I was just born to perform. There's something about it that I love and can't get enough of. It's a feeling that I can't really explain."

Prior to the release of *Thought I Was Dreaming*, Wallace's resume read like a who's who in country music. Opening for such artists as Don Williams, Rodney Crowell, Waylon Jennings, Eddie Rabbitt and Billy Ray Cyrus at venues the size of Maple Leaf Gardens, has certainly paved an impressive on-ramp for the talented singer/songwriter's career.

Wallace says her varied musical tastes influence her songwriting as much as basic human experience and emotion. Her ability to jump from a passionate ballad straight into a spirited, up-tempo country rocker is an obvious reflection of her diverse musical tastes, which include everything from the Doors and the Moody Blues, to Vince Gill and Trisha Yearwood. "I love all kinds of music -- from rock'n'roll right down to country. And I think now, jazz, rock and blues is all becoming part of country music."

With a refreshing combination of self-confidence and humility, Wallace looks toward the future with anticipation and an eagerness to learn more about herself and her craft. "It kind of sounds cliché, but I learn something new about myself, about life and about the music business everyday. I'm constantly honing my writing skill and trying to improve on myself as a vocalist. And as a person, in general."

Having just completed her first cross-Canada tour, Wallace is getting ready to go back into the studio for her sophomore album, to be released mid-1997. "I really got my feet wet on this tour. But it wasn't a major tour," she grins, "not like touring with Garth Brooks -- hint, hint."

separate piece) will hit the road Oct. 9 for an extensive tour of soft-seat theatres and arenas, which will wind down Dec. 9 in Toronto. The popular trio and their manager Gerry Leiske, are scheduled for an industry reception in Toronto at Club 424 on Oct. 7. Their new single, Cornfields Or Cadillacs, written by Marcus Hummon, Monty Powell and Mike Noble, jumps from #47 into the #27 slot this week. This two-parts Cancon single (AP) was taken from their new album, Makin' Hay, which was produced by Monroe Jones.

**Sean Hogan** has a new single that's caught the ear of country programmers. Vulnerable, the follow-up to Beg, Borrow And Steal The World (#42), enters the chart at #91. This is another Hogan original. Both tracks are included on his self-titled album, released on the Barnstorm label.

**Quartette** is ready for Christmas with their Denon release titled It's Christmas. The album will be in the stores mid-October. Quartette comprises Cindy Church, Caitlin Hanford, Colleen Peterson and Sylvia Tyson. Their self-titled debut album and the follow-up, Work Of The Heart are also available on Denon. Also available is their critically-acclaimed a cappella version of O Canada, the profits from which go to Frontier College for their Canadian literacy programs across Canada.

**Chris Cummings** was in Toronto for a taping of CBC-TV's Rita & Friends. This segment isn't expected to go to air until November, which will make his performance of I Waited, his first single, somewhat outdated.
