## CMW '98 turns sights on Latin America

As part of the ongoing emphasis to encourage the Canadian music industry in international markets, Canadian Music Week '98 will be turning its sights on Latin America. The annual week-long event, which is being moved to the Westin Harbour Castle and adjoining Convention Centre on March 4-7, will be bringing in key players from the Latin countries in the hopes of giving industry players at

home the opportunity to cement deals for Latin America.

CMW's international spotlight puts the focus on a different territory every year that Canadians can do export business with. The organisational

logic, says CMW president Neil Dixon, is purely pragmatic and educational with the aim of getting quick results. Considerations such as market intelligence including the size, scope and potential of the target markets, the type of music that is suitable for it, local customs and costs of doing business including international rules and regulations and the identification of key players in those areas. Ultimately the strategy is to provide a chance for domestic and international heads to network and take advantage of the time to speed the process up of doing business.

"A lot of people attend MIDEM and MIDEM Asia and PopCom and various things," says Dixon, "but they don't attend them every year and there are always new people in the business because the market is ever changing. So we kind of feel it is a necessary thing that we need to do to expand now."

CMW's focus comes at a crucial time with respect to both Canadian and Latin American markets. Recent International Federation Of Phonographic Industry statistics indicate that Canada has dropped in the world market for sales from sixth place overall (with 3% representation of the global market) to seventh place with 2%. Ironically, the market that bumped Canada from sixth place is Brazil, with 4% of the market share. Overall the Latin market represents a 6% of the global marketplace, fully triple that taken up by Canadian product and second only to Asia in

## Tragically Hip and Leahy on the rise at SoundScan

The Tragically Hip's newest release *Live Between Us* has already lived up to universal expectations with a #1 debut this week on SoundScan. The top spot was secured after sales figures from the weekend came in (not the full monitoring period of the entire week, as the album was released on May 24th). The early success was secured after a strong several weeks of pre-hype from Universal Music, including several Internet related events, contests and a two hour live Sound Service interview which was beamed via satellite across Canada.

Leahy, the hottest family band to come out of the country just got hotter this week when their self-titled debut crashed the ceiling on SoundScan's Top 100 retail albums with a #95 last week. The group continue their tour of western Canada with sell out shows in Kelowna, Victoria, Vancouver, Calgary, Fort McMurray and Edmonton. They have just finished up running their first single, *The Call To Dance*, to radio and currently have the video in heavy rotation on CMT, where it is charting top 10. Look for Leahy in Charlottetown's Bridgefest and opening ceremonies for Confederation Bridge, at the end of this month.

## Voiceprint premieres AudioCinema service

Through AudioCinema, developed by AudioVision Canada (AVC), one of three divisions of The National Broadcast Reading Service (NBR), watching movies can now be "a portable leisure activity."

Heather Lusignan, Director of VoicePrint, and Marc Rosen, Director of AudioVision Canada, explain that "Narration of the visual elements essential to the meaning of a film are woven into the original soundtrack and packaged on audio cassette. Movies can now be enjoyed on a walkman or a car tape deck."

AVC operates the only audio-description production centre in Canada. It was further pointed out that while the purpose of audio description is to make video products accessible to people with vision-restrictions, AudioCinema products "offer a dynamic entertainment experience for everyone."

VoicePrint has scheduled May 30 at 12:30 pm

worldwide sales figures. To date, Latin America is the fastest growing market in the world, superseding growth rates in Europe which is the largest consumer market for music product in the world.

"If you're going to try to do international business, Latin America wouldn't be a bad place to start," says Dixon. "Sales in the rest of the world have gone up and Canada is stagnant."

Not surprisingly, there has been a resurgence of interest in the format in Canada, with retail across the country making room for Latin product and Latin sections and specialty programming on day radio and multi-cultural stations.

"The industry here is really putting a lot of focus on it," says Dixon.

CMW will continue its established series of band showcases in downtown Toronto clubs and is expanding and developing its trade centre, introduced last year, to put the emphasis on networking. Plans to maintain the central lounge area of last year's exhibition will remain, but with the added organisational feature of the different companies around the perimeter of the display. The reason, says Dixon, is strictly to facilitate interactivity.

"There will probably be a couple of areas for receptionists so that people can make appointments with other people and there will also be an international business centre too where there will be phone and fax machines so people can stay in touch with their office," he says. "So it will be a bit



## Barbados Week kicks in at The Old Mill

The Barbados Tourism Authority and Toronto's legendary Old Mill, through General Manager Hans Gerhardt officially launched Barbados Week at a media event at the Old Mill on May 26. Chef Gina Lee Johnson, head chef of "Enids" Almond Beach Village in the Barbados, prepared the traditional Barbadian lunch.

The Troubadours, a 30-year Barbadian musical treat, were among the performers at the luncheon, along with Barbadian author Austin "Tom" Clark and other surprise guests. Most captivating was a performance of Inkle and Yarico, a Barbadian opera in three acts, written in 1787. Johnny Kidd, a major player in the Barbados Opera Festival, was instrumental in reviving this opera about a rich merchant who is shipwrecked in Venezuela where he was rescued by Yarico, an Indian Princess. He eventually takes her to Barbados where he sells her into slavery. Kidd called on Barbadian musicians to update the music which has created an exquisitely mounted, sad, but entertaining, folk opera.

Founded in 1964, The Troubadours pioneered their "indigenous sponge beat" with the late Barbadian entertainer Jackie Opel. The band became synonymous with the musical sounds of the Islands over the next 10 to 12 years, before becoming dormant for almost 20 years. It was in

1992 when Ken Jones and guitarist Alps Corbin approached Allyson Leacock to assist the band in planning a reunion for Crop-Over '92. The Troubadours have since returned to Barbados for Crop-Over every year and their "Bajan Bacchannal" has become one of the highlights of the yearly event.

In 1993 the band released De Ting Sweet, an album that Rainbow WIRL included on two series of CDs. As well, the band organized its own T-Shirt band.

Interestingly enough, it was in Canada where the Troubadours made their biggest impact on what is described as "the extra-regional scene," where they played some of the biggest venues in the country, including Ontario Place, Bonaventure, La Siesta, Sutton Place, Zodiac 1, Winnipeg Inn, Marlboro Inn and the Convention Centre as well as the Ramada, Delta and Holiday Inn chains.

Also interesting is the Canadian connection. Michael Thompson, who was born in Barbados, made Canada his home in the early '80s where he has been a major player on the Toronto music scene. He is one of the band's lead vocalists, songwriter, co-vocal arranger and fan club operator.

## Malcolm Perlman closes down 336 Yonge Street

When a shuttered Sunrise Record store at 336 Yonge Street in Toronto's downtown core greeted industry representatives, the worst was thought.

However, the chain's president, Malcolm Perlman, quickly noted that the store was "closed for a good reason.

"We're re-doing the whole store to greet the new millennium, so it's obvious we have a lot of confidence in the future."

A giant, glassed-in atrium will take up the entire front entrance, 25 feet deep and taller than the two-story building with a sky-effect, a la Las Vegas.

The stairwell has been removed from the front entrance, making the store wider and the second floor visible from Yonge Street. As well, the ceiling on the main floor is now a uniform 15 feet high throughout the store.

The design includes modern-age materials which will give the store that steely, yet comfortable "next millennium" look.

Perlman also promises "an outstanding sound system," highlighted by a glass-enclosed DJ booth in front of the second level. A target date of June 15 has been set for the grand opening.

The figure is somewhere around \$150 million US for the executive shakeup. As grand marshall of the parade, the former chairman and CEO of EMI Records Group North America, has, or will, reportedly get a payout of \$50 million, which kind of puts him in the pauper category, considering the \$150 million Disney paid to walk Michael Ovitz. Virgin's Ken Berry takes over as president of EMI Recorded Music. (EC: *No tag day necessary for CK, obviously!!!*)

**Meanwhile, back home!!!** There's been some downsizing going on north of the border as well, some of it subtle, most of it deadly, involving, in one case, service of 17 years. It must have been a couple of decades ago when the CNE (Canadian National Exhibition) in Toronto was severely criticized for booking a complete series of foreign acts to headline the Grandstand show in what was called a "Canadian" and a "National" exhibition. That was then, but checking the paper the other day, it was almost déjà vu when I came across an ad for the Casino Rama near Orillia. The ad was trumpeting the following acts to star at this Canadian venue. Yes, it operates in the Dominion of Canada, and here are the headliners featured in the ad: Kenny Rogers, Melissa Manchester, Sheena Easton, Neil Sedaka, The Everly Brothers, Linda Ronstadt, Huey Lewis & The News, The Oak Ridge Boys, Tanya Tucker, Kenny Loggins, The Temptations & Gladys Knight, Lorrie Morgan & Sawyer Brown. Why am I not surprised that all the dedication of the Canadian record industry, the CRTC and every radio station in the land as well as other well-meaning Canadians is not reflected in this lineup? I know the big Canadian stars are booked elsewhere and making big money . . . but don't you expect a little "this is about us . . . while making the big dollars" to be part of all this? Toronto Alderman Ben Nobleman was a crusader who made the front pages of Canada's dailies. I doubt if this will make any page in the dailies other than some paid for advertising space. Ben Nobleman . . . where are you when we need you? Sam and Sheila! Pay attention. This is "non-Canadian!"

from the same disease . . . no time for business, but lots of time for personal hygiene, like filing their nails while an important message is being piped into the voice-mail system). It wasn't too many years ago when CARAS held a Juno Awards Variety Club Luncheon the afternoon before the awards show. The annual event that drew upwards of 800 and 900 industry people and the public alike, raised a lot of money for Variety's Kids, not to mention the stature of CARAS. Anyway, that was then and it was a pretty touching swearing-in ceremony by veteran broadcaster Barry Nesbitt a tireless worker/supporter of Variety. Take a couple of minutes and read the Barker's Oath. "You are about to be admitted to membership in Variety Clubs International. You are aware that Variety has its existence justified only through its earnest efforts to give the fullest measure of aid to the unfortunate.

## Post '76: the year of the prodigy

If Dan Frechette had his way, the history of rock music would stop sharply at the end of 1976. It is a significant year for the twenty-one year old, not only because it marks his birthday but because it is the year that rock music became something else. It was a year for transitions and change, many of them for the worse according to the young musician, which is why, in an ironic twist, he has branded his band with the eponymous name of Post '76.

But what happened after 1976? Disillusioned by disillusionment, Frechette thinks that the eighties played some sort of cruel joke on itself by pulling the rug out from stardom and grandeur and all of the great things that went into making a rock band the greatest thing on earth.

"Kids just don't scream anymore," comments the singer/guitarist/songwriter. "Everybody's got so much more to do nowadays it's not like a guy comes to town and everybody is like 'oh my God, he'll never come around again!' You got a guy's face on TV and in your magazine all the time, you get sick of him. If your girlfriend walks around naked in the apartment all the time, you're not going to be looking at her after a while."

A native of Pinawa, a sleepy little speck on the Manitoba wasteland, Frechette cultivated a song writing addiction that rollerballed him an exhaustive compendium of songs before adolescence was over. At seventeen, he decided to

fire off a few selections from his 300+ song catalogue for some professional feedback. His songs landed on the desk of virtually every label contact in the country, including EMI Publishing's head office in Toronto.

"Mike McCarty the president called me back, his voice booming like God over the intercom: YOU'RE GOOD, LET'S SIGN YOU," says Frechette. "Then they asked me how many songs I had -- I was seventeen or something -- and I said, oh, three hundred. They liked that so they said ok, let's get this kid on board."

While most people can only daydream about getting that much output in an entire lifetime, being prolific was simply never a problem for this budding songwriter.


"I didn't have that much else to do, I wasn't really an outgoing person," he explains. "But I'm a nice guy, people always confuse that and think I'm outgoing and all that but I'm very much to myself, I like to be alone. That's the thing a lot of people ask me, where do you get the time to write, and it's because I'm always alone."

Jumping aboard the first airplane, the self confessed hillbilly made his way to Toronto, there to eke out a living while pursuing a career in music. Initially concerned with getting some playing experience under his belt, Frechette happened upon a few session musicians who jumped at the chance to lay down a few tracks from the songwriter's exhaustive roster. The result was a self-titled six

track EP tinged as much with pre-'76 influences as it is with a contemporary sound. He plans to work the album full time once he reassembles his band, whose other staple member is backing vocalist Napoli Ceniccola, in St. Catherines.

"I've met some people already," he says. "It's really friendly in this area; a lot of trees and birds and stuff. It's kind of a return for me back to Pinawa in a sense but I'm very involved in my career still. It's not like I'm sitting here on a pleasure cruise or anything."

We certainly don't doubt it, Dan.

## Tariq: Don't call him a folk singer

Despite having garnered the nickname Cat (from a penchant toward performing the songs of Cat Stevens) during his University days, a string of folk influences and a summer spent playing a slew of folk festivals in an effort to hook himself into the Canadian music scene, singer/songwriter Tariq says there was a time he hated being referred to as a folk artist.

"To me, folk singers sounded like Peter, Paul & Mary and I wanted to do something that was a little more hip -- a little more contemporary."

However, it's clear that this Montreal native isn't quite as concerned these days as to which musical style his audience is drawn from. As a matter of fact, his own influences are so varied that

he runs the appreciation gamut from singers like Stevens, Graham Parsons and Simon & Garfunkel to such legendary artists as Jimi Hendrix and Elvis Costello.

"With me, it's the song that's important," explains Tariq, who now resides in Calgary, "I remember liking Eagles songs and some of the silliest things from the radio like Hall & Oates' Rich Girl. But even when I started playing and learning songs, I never really followed an artists' whole repertoire -- I just picked particular songs."

Raised in a strict Muslim household (a religion he no longer follows), Tariq says that, as a child, his only contact with the world of popular music was listening to a tinny, transistor radio under the covers late at night. But following the death of his father, when Tariq was just 14, he says that he was able to pursue his interest in music with a more hands-on approach.

"I met a couple of friends in school who were guitar players," he says, "For some reason I just gravitated towards it. They showed me a few chords and taught me a few songs and from there my interest just kind of developed."

He says his exploration of music was a slow process and that, in fact, he didn't really become serious about a career in that direction until a few years ago. With a BA in theatre from Bishops University and well on his way to obtaining a Masters in Literature from Sherbrooke University, Tariq realised that he had been bitten by the bug -- hard.

"I had all the course work done and had even gone through the whole jury process of having my

thesis approved, when I finally stopped and said to myself 'what am I doing?' It was kind of an extended growing period, but I decided that I'd better (pursue a musical career) before I get hit by a bus or something and never get the chance."

Since "things just weren't happening" in Montreal, Tariq decided his best bet would be to pack up his VW stationwagon and turn people on to his music all across the country. With his independent recording, Graffiti Artist, Tariq made his way from festival to festival and eventually settled on making Calgary his home.

"I hadn't intended on staying," he explains, "it was only supposed to be a trip to visit some friends and check out the summer folk festival scene."

After being bestowed with the Scott Liddle Memorial Prize for songwriting in February 1995



Rhythm&Blues/Virgin 42962-F


Sometimes it happens that the particular styles and strains of music concentrate in a certain place to produce genuine anomalies; musical masterpieces that make everyone else wonder why they hadn't thought of it before. Such is the case with Culture Clash, the second volume from Rhythm & Blues Foundation's Sacred Spirit Series which, wonder of wonders, attempts to fuse the raw essence of blues with classical music. It's a sound difficult to conceive, strong talent to effect and pure genius to pull it off as great. It's a sound that, seen through an ambient veil of mastermind Fearsome Brave, ends up working almost too well. Vocal tracks by John Lee Hooker, Lightning Hopkins, Dee Hound Dog Jeffs and others gel comfortably in a translucent sheen of classical cello, violin and piano. The results are a delicatessen of the delicious and the delectable; smoother than liquid chocolate and as exotic as the curves of La Diabla. Unbelievable. Chants And Dances Of The Native American Indians was the first volume which drew in a healthy double diamond cash draw at retail that seems entirely capable of being followed here. It's obvious that there are more than a few discerning consumers out there who are responding mightily to these experiments of symphony and culture. Four thumbs up. -RG

**URSA MAJOR** -Rock/Alternative

Driven Deep

Solar Flare 6974-Independent

Contemporary rock in and around Toronto hasn't lost its flare for conservative chords and the unflinching desire to pursue melody. It's an interest which can be seen in a host of upcoming indie bands in the city, most recently in a band by the name of Ursa Major. Their debut album, Driven Deep, is made up of material that is made familiar by the time the chorus for the first track (Don't Turn Away)




comes around for the second time. The track's easy rock sound and graceful structure from a decade ago makes it one of those songs that could have been evoked out of a radio where it seems to be unavoidably destined for (as of this writing, 102.1 The Edge has taken interest). Singer/guitarist Craig Smith helms the getup with an appealing, solid voice that is backed by lead guitarist Colin Mills, bassist Barry Westin and Dan McGovern. We liked this record, but more than that, we think this band has the talent and creativity to take themselves far in the current alternative rock climate. We restate for posterity that the trend seems to be regressing rather than progressing and in this sense this band scores full points for bringing back something that might have been forgotten when the '80s rounded the bend on the '90s. Weight Of The World and Looking For A Way allow the band to showcase the fact that they're not afraid of acoustic guitars and are abject about those strong melodies. Song writing never sounded so natural. Or so proper. Definitely worthy of a spin or five. -RG

**ERIC SERRA** -Soundtrack

**The Fifth Element O.S.T.**

Science fiction being all the rage now has caused big budget Hollywood to outdo itself with wild special effects and stylistic extravaganzas. Hence *The Fifth Element*, not your typical sci-fi fodder largely because of the sheer volume of cash that has been dumped



into creating as meticulously detailed a future society as possible. Enter Eric Serra, one of the biggest players of soundtrack in film, with credits ranging from academy award winning *The Big Blue*, *La Femme Nikita*, *The Professional* and more recently *GoldenEye*. Serra uses all of his expertise to conjure up as exotic a sound imagery as possible, with middle eastern motifs, boomy orchestra, drum and bass electronica and one pop song. Again, it's atypical soundtrack fare because of the sheer scope of the thing, but still largely score music in the long run. The best part is that this album is showing on SoundScan's chart (at 93 this week, down from 82 on its debut) which argues that when you hit a public nerve with a soundtrack you hit big. Nevertheless, the single being serviced is *Little Light Of Love*, a clean cut pop song which will be the first and last word on this thing as far as any commercial servicing goes. Well, the folks responsible for this disk realize that the grim reality of the disease isn't going to make people rush out to buy this disk and have therefore packed it chock full of little goodies to help them along the way. The Latin world is turned on its head with tracks from Los Lobos, Sepultura, Melissa Etheridge, Cibo Matto and collaborations between Los Fabulosos



**Cadilacs + Fishbone, Cafe Tacuba + David Byrne, Cuca + Youth Brigade, Los Pericos + Buju Banton and Diego Frenkel + Laurie Anderson.** The results are as diverse as they are unique with the bottom line (and dollar) on a great selection of really hot tunes. All things told, *Red, Hot + Latin* is sheer indulgence and for that reason primarily it benefits from high entertainment value and a good chance at running the cause far into public sector once again. **Sound Of Truth (The Independent Collection)**

The godfathers of the Canadian alterna-pop/rock scene, 54-40 have been mainstays on the music scene since the band's inception in 1981. With a string of best-selling albums (*Dear Dear*, *Show Me, Smilin' Buddha Cabaret*, and *Trusted By Millions*) and chart-topping singles (*Baby Ran*, *Miss You*, *Baby Have Some Faith*, *Nice To Luv You, She-La*), the B.C. collective of Neil Osbourne, Brad Merritt, Phil Comparelli and Matt Johnson has gone back to its indie roots with this latest release. *Sound Of Truth: The Independent Collection* marks the re-release of two previous efforts, *Selection* -- a six-song EP -- and *Set The Fire*, originally on




**TOAD THE WET SPROCKET**

When Toad The Wet Sprocket made their debut in 1989, the general public was left with a perplexed look on its collective face trying to figure out the meaning behind the cryptic band name. Fans of Monty Python snickered to themselves. All were left with an indelible impression that can only be left by a band that has truly found its musical niche and mastered it. Subsequent releases saw chart-topping singles like *Walk On The Ocean*, *All I Want* and *Fall Down* all follow the mellow-pop pattern that has become the Toad The Wet Sprocket signature sound. Coil marks the fifth full-length album from the Santa Barbara-based band and, once again, stays close to the path previously travelled, but far enough to one side that the 12 new songs are fresh and new. Although it had originally been decided to go with a new producer, Coil brings the total of collaborative releases with cohort Gavin MacKillop to three. A new-found maturity is present in this release -- perhaps due in part to the fact that several band members became dads since the last album. Whatever the reason, Coil makes for easy-listening pop that should quickly be

## Shark scores Highway Man soundtrack

Geffen recording artist, Toronto-born Shark, has been selected to score the soundtrack for *The Highway Man*, which will star Danny Aiello. Director Keoni Waxman has used guitarist Shark's music in two of his previous films.

Shark's talent at composing film music is recognized on both sides of the border, resulting in approaches by film makers in Hollywood and Canada. His music is currently being considered as part of the soundtrack of *Dinner At Fred's*, an upcoming Canadian film directed by Shawn Thompson.

A graduate of Toronto's Queen street music scene of the '80s, Shark gained an audience and valuable music experience as the guitar/vocalist of The Ramblers, a band that went on to play extensively in the UK.

When the band returned to Canada, Shark opted to remain in London, joining Simon Tedd in putting together Big Bam Boo, a band that gained popularity throughout Europe and went on to record for MCA Records. The band was the first to perform throughout the US at the Hard Rock Cafe clubs and also toured the US with Todd Rundgren. The band scored a hit with *Shooting From My Heart*, which was taken from their debut album *Fun, Faith and Fairplay*.

Shark's music performances and his own compositions were included in two independent films and in a motion picture soundtrack from Disney. His TV credits include music



**Tariq** continued from page 5 and gaining notoriety in a number of Alberta newspapers and periodicals, the A&R staff at EMI Canada were so impressed with his indie-release, *Splat*, that they sent a representative to see him perform at an indie showcase in Calgary. The result -- a major-label four-album recording contract.

"They've been really supportive in letting me do things the way I want to do them," says Tariq of his new colleagues at EMI.

The release of *Basement Songs* and its first single *Chevrolet Way*, a clever social commentary on narrow-mindedness and misplaced machismo,

heard on various TV programs aired in the US on the ABC, NBC and Fox networks as well as on the Sci-Fi channel.

Shark's musical creativity in motion pictures hasn't gone unnoticed by the media. A critique by Kevin Thomas of the L.A. Times of the Keoni Waxman film, *I Shot A Man In Vegas*, starring Janeane Garofalo, read in part, "Waxman has chosen well with his composer, Shark, whose spare mood-setting score is superior to many in far more expensive movies." The film made its debut in December of 1996 and is scheduled for a wide release this year. Along with creating the entire score, Shark contributed an additional three songs for the film.

Not only is his guitar playing and scoring adding to Shark's stature in motion pictures his on-camera segments have also been rewarding. In Waxman's film, *Countdown*, starring Lori Petty, Shark appears on camera in scenes performing along with Paul Cantelon. The scene was created by Shark to feature Tryptich, a modern classical music group. His guitar work in films includes his unique version of Tom Jones' hit *It's Not Unusual*, that was included on the soundtrack album of the Disney film, *Mr. Wrong*, which starred Ellen DeGeneres and Bill Paxton. He also co-wrote *Victim*, a song for a film starring Cameron Diaz, and co-wrote *This Misery*, which is heard on the soundtrack of *Unhook The Stars*, starring Gena Rowlands and Marisa Tomei. He is expected to be working with Dan Rosen again, writer of *The Last Supper*, on his newest production, *Dead Man's Curve*.

Shark's TV credits are also growing with his music having been utilized by producers of *Party Of Five* on ABC, a *Rockford Files* movie on NBC, and the *UR* series now seen on the Sci-Fi channel in the US.

On the record scene, Shark has co-written most of the material on the first two *Wild Colonials* albums for Geffen Records.

marks a starting point for the soft-spoken performer that will, no doubt, clear a path for a career destined for success.

And despite his apparent aversion for the term "folk singer," Tariq admits that his roots do, in fact, lie with the genre.

# BIG COUNTRY AWARDS

## MALE VOCALIST NOMINEES

### PAUL BRANDT

It seems that winning a \$1,000 prize at a talent contest during the 1992 Calgary Stampede was just the first in a number of successes for Calgary native Paul Brandt. He began fostering a passion for performing his own material while still in high school -- a passion that drove him to enter talent contests and competitions in both Canada and the U.S.

And although his faith and confidence in his talent was far from wavering, Brandt -- ever the conscientious student -- decided to simultaneously pursue a career in professional nursing rather than leave his future entirely up to fate.


Following in the family tradition -- dad being a paramedic and mom having returned to school to become a registered nurse -- Brandt spent two years as a paediatric nurse at Alberta's Children's Hospital in Calgary where he often worked with terminally ill children and experienced a wide range of human emotion that he says comes through a lot in his songwriting.

But fate would eventually intervene and bring Brandt back to his first love, music, when he entered a nationwide SOCAN contest and took the second place performance prize as well as first prize for the Best Canadian Country Song, *Calm Before The Storm*. Little did he know the ramifications of this coup.

*Calm Before The Storm*, Brandt's debut on Reprise Records, has seen remarkable success including two number one singles *I Do*, which hit the top of RPM's

Country 100 on August 26/96 and *My Heart Has A History* which was at number 1 in April/May of '96. Both songs merited SOCAN #1 Awards.

This year, Brandt is nominated for three Big Country Awards: male artist, song of the year (*My Heart Has A History*) and album of the year (*Calm Before The Storm*).




### JASON MCCOY

Copping last year's Big Country Outstanding New Artist award seems to have propelled this 26-year old Minesing, Ontario native towards bigger, better and brighter things.

MCA's decision to release a string of albumless singles spawned the label's subsequent release of his self-titled debut. This Used To Be Our Town, Learning A Lot About Love and Candle reached the top of RPM's Country 100 July 31/95, November 13/95 and March 18/96 respectively. A fourth single, All The Way, made it to the number 4 position.

Extensive touring, including dates with Martina McBride and John Berry, proved fruitful in making a name for himself as McCoy went on to win two CCMA awards as 1996's Vista Rising Star and best male vocalist as well as well as two 1997 Juno nominations.

Appearances on *Rita & Friends*, *Inside Country*, *The Country Beat* as well as TNN's *Music City Tonight* have propelled McCoy into the public eye and given him the opportunity to make some musical connections -- including Delbert McClinton, Al Anderson and former Stevie Ray Vaughn band-mate Reese Wyans -- who will show up on his soon-to-be-




released sophomore album, *Playin' For Keeps*. A first single, *Born Again In Dixieland*, hits radio June 5 and a summer tour that will see performances from one coast to another will kick off June 14 in Ft. McMurray, Alberta.

This year, McCoy is nominated for three Big Country Awards: male artist, country song of the year (*All The Way*) and songwriter of the year (with Chris Lindsey for *All The Way*.)

### CHARLIE MAJOR

Already a Big Country Award winner three times over for favourite male artist and Canadian country artist of the year, Ottawa native Charlie Major has become a serious force to be reckoned with in the



Canadian country music scene.

In the past few years, Major has hit the listening public with a debut, *The Other Side* -- which spawned an incredible six #1 singles, reached the top of RPM's Country Albums chart and is nearing double platinum sales -- as well as a sophomore release, *Lucky Man*, that has produced such hits as *Tell Me Something I Don't Know* (which reached #1 on RPM's Country 100 March 14/96) and *It's Lonely I Can't Stand* (which hit the top May 13/96.)

Of course, prior to these phenomenal successes, Major made an indelible impression on the country community in the U.S. with his penning of the #1 *Ricky Van Shelton* hit *Backroads* in 1990. Using his songwriting finesse, Major parleyed his way into a record deal with Arista Records and BMG and the rest, as they say, is history.

A Juno award winner in '94, '95 and '96 as favourite country male vocalist, Major has become one of the biggest success stories of the '90s. His significant commercial and critical accomplishments have made him a household name and his rich crooner's voice have kept him a favourite.

This year, Major is nominated in four Big Country categories: favourite male artist, album of the year (*Lucky Man*), song of the year (*Waiting On You*) as well as two nods in the songwriter of the year category (*Waiting On You* and with Barry Brown for *Tell Me Something I Don't Know*.)

### DUANE STEELE

Music has always been the focus for newcomer Duane Steele, who admits that the bug bit him early on after starting a band called Northern Sunrise with a few friends and cousins at the tender age of 14.


After playing in bar bands and spending time as a forestry surveyor in Northern Alberta, this Hines Creek native forged ahead into the music scene and formed The Rock'N' Horse Band, a foray that garnered several hit singles as well as a 1992 Juno nomination in the best country duo/group category.

Never one to give up a dream, Steele ventured back to Nashville after the band's demise and captured the interest of the Warner/Chappell publishing house. A showcase of new material during 1994's CMW in Calgary further impressed Mercury/Polydor Canada President Doug Chappell and merited Steele a contract as the first country artist signed directly to Mercury in Canada.

P.O. Box 423 marked Steele's Mercury debut to the listening public and with hits Anita Got Married, Stuck On Your Love and Two Names On An Overpass, it's easy to see that quite a few more people had been impressed.

This past year saw nominations at the CCMA's for favourite male vocalist as well as the Vista Rising Star Award.

This year, Steele is nominated for two Big Country Awards: favourite male artist and song of the year (Stuck On Your Love.)



### JAMIE WARREN

The assault of Canadian talent on Nashville is being aided by Kitchener-Waterloo native Jamie Warren, an artist with a diverse musical background and a string of hit singles that date back to 1983.

Warren, who lassoed the Big Country Outstanding New Artist award in 1985, admits that it has taken time for his talent to be recognised nationally and internationally. But instead of selling out to what he thought might attract a huge audience, he maintained his personal pop/rock-injected style of singing and songwriting and has found a more than appreciative audience in today's new country scene.


With his debut album, Fallen Angel, on the River North Nashville label (distributed in Canada by Mercury/Polydor), Warren has gained chart action on a number of single releases including Ready To Run and What Goes Around Comes Around - which was originally recorded in 1988 as a rock song.

Although some initial rejection was encountered toward this album, due in part to the falsely-perceived notion in Nashville that Canadian country artists don't sell, Warren and producers Rick Hutt and Frasier Hill dazzled now-manager Larry Mazer into entering the country field and adding Warren to his roster.

This year Warren is nominated in the favourite male artist category at the Big Country Awards.

# BIG COUNTRY AWARDS

## FEMALE VOCALIST NOMINEES

### TERRI CLARK

There isn't a cowboy around who doesn't know Terri Clark by now. The Medicine Hat, Alberta native might have had a modest start waiting tables, but the past few years have been tremendously good to her as regards her popularity and her ability to break the American market with her Canadian country sound.

Clark traces her love of country to a home life with lots of strong support for and interest in the music. Her maternal grandparents, Ray and Betty Gauthier, were veterans of the Canadian country circles and even appeared at the Grand Ole Opry alongside George Jones, Johnny Cash and others. A kid at the time, Clark remembers being captivated by her grandparents' collection of country records, especially those by Loretta Lynn and Patsy Cline, who were to serve as early influences.

Early gigs in Medicine Hat eventually gave her enough confidence to venture out into Nashville, country's mythical land of Oz. She made a bold entrance as house singer at the legendary Tootsie's lounge, a job she would hold on for dear life for her first 18 months in Music City. But by the time May 1994 rolled around, she had already caught the eye of the roving execs and A&R vultures that prey in the city. Her self-titled album was released in the summer of 1995 to high critical acclaim in Nashville and back at home, where singles When Boy Meets Girl, Better Things To Do and If I Were You topped Canadian charts.

Her sophomore effort, Just The Same, has been hovering on RPM's country album chart for 26 weeks since its release and is proving its mettle at radio with the hit singles Emotional Girl and the title track. No stranger to the Big Country Awards, Clark returns with four nominations including female artist, songwriter and country song (If I Were You) and album (Terri Clark).




### PATRICIA CONROY

This Montreal native arrived on the country scene back in 1990 with a debut album titled Blue Angel. Bad Day For Trains followed in 1992 with four top ten hits on RPM's Country 100 and was eventually tabbed as album of the year at the 1993 Canadian Country Music Association Awards. What was particularly gratifying for Conroy was that the album contained three of her own compositions, including the hit Blank Pages, which earned her a 1994 Big Country Award nomination for country composer.

Conroy's arrival on the crowded Canadian country music scene was cemented at the 1994 CCMA Awards in Calgary, where she surprised everyone by winning top female artist honours.

It was just after that '94 CCMA win that Conroy released her third album with Warner Music Canada, You Can't Resist. As Conroy herself put it, "I set out to find my own sound, and I did." Produced by Mike Wanchic, the album once again features three Conroy originals (I Don't Wanna Be



The One, Crazy Fool and Keep Me Rockin') and spawned major hits in the title track, Somebody's Leavin' (which topped charts at #1), What Else Can I Do, Let Me Be The One and the aforementioned Keep Me Rockin'.

### SHANIA TWAIN

What can be said about this Timmins, Ontario native after a blockbuster run last year with her Woman In Me album? Twain has reaped heavily on that smashing debut; double diamond in Canada and a host of awards, not least of those which were won at Big Country in 1995, Canadian Country Music Awards and several Junos, including the special International Achievement Award recently introduced.

This year, the Big Country Awards honour Shania Twain yet again, not for the sake of adding accolades to her already monumental list of honours, but because of the ongoing success of her album.

Twain's musical focus began at an early age, with her parents pulling her out of bed as a child to go and perform at local clubs after the liquor sales had stopped at 1 am. Soon, Twain was performing at every TV station, radio station and community centre in the area, developing what already were indications of an extremely promising career.

Things took a tacit turn, however, when both of Twain's parents were killed in a car accident when the budding artist was just 21. Despite her relative youth, the accident suddenly made Twain responsible for her entire family and in a strange twist of fate, propelled her even faster into the world



of professional music. Forced to put food on the table for her siblings, Twain took a job at a nearby Dearhurst Resort in Huntsville, singing in the resort's nightly showcase, honing her skills on everything from country music to show tunes.

## RENA GAILE

"Country music reached my soul with its depth and truthfulness and innate honesty. I feel good when I sing country music, I passionately bare my soul. It's like a catharsis... a healing, and I think people connect with that."

That's London, Ontario native Rena Gaile talking about why, after some ten years of being one of the most in demand studio singers in Toronto, she turned her talents full time to country music. That's after, if should be noted, she had lent her efforts to playing society galas, Saturday night dances, conventions and charity balls, jingles, commercials and back up vocals.

But Gaile's natural grace for country music was seen early with the release of her first album, titled *Out On A Limb*. With the help of a host of top rate musicians from guitarists Mike Francis and Bernie La Barge, South Mountain's Steve Piticco, fiddle player Don Reed and supporting vocalists Don Neilson and David Blamires, Gaile came on top with an outstanding debut. The industry at home raved over the release and supported the chart success of a slew of singles including *Better Off Blue*, *All She Wants*, *Cloud Of Dust*, *Hand That Rocked The Cradle* and *Girl Thang*.

It's been hardly a surprise that Rena Gaile was singled out at the 1996 Big Country Awards with a nomination in the Outstanding New Artist category. As the run for the title track of her album begins what we're sure will be a remarkable run at radio, Gaile enters the 1997 Big Country Awards with top honours as a nominee for Female Artist of the year.



## MICHELLE WRIGHT

Growing up in smalltown southwest Ontario, Michelle Wright often tagged along with her parents when they performed at various clubs and community centres. She took that fascination with her to high school, where she played in various bands before venturing on her own and touring throughout Canada and the US. She eventually signed with Savannah Records who released her first album titled *Do Right By Me* in 1988.

Through arduous touring and independent record releases, Wright's popularity steadily grew. Eventually, her talent received some notice in the US, which led to Wright's signing with Arista Nashville. While her self-titled Arista debut drew some raves in country circles, it wasn't until the release of her second album, *Now & Then*, that Wright was on her way to stardom. That album went on to produce five #1 hits including the title track, *He Would be Sixteen*, *Guitar Talk*, *One Time Around*, and the biggest hit of her career, *Take It Like A Man*, which hit top 10 in the US with the video reaching #1 at CMT.

The Academy of Country Music named Wright the top new female vocalist in 1993, while back home she picked up an astonishing 15 awards based on the success of *Now & Then*, including CCMA artist of the year, Big Country's artist of the year and a Juno for country female vocalist. *Now & Then* eventually surpassed double platinum in Canada.

In 1994, Wright released her third Arista album, *The Reasons Why*, produced by longtime friend Steve Bogard, Val Garry, Mike Clute and John Guess. The album shipped Gold, eventually rising to platinum in a few short months. Her latest release, *For Me It's You* (released in June 1996), banged off a list of singles including *Nobody Knows* (penned by Gretchen Peters), *Crank My Tractor* and *The Answer Is Yes* while the album has remained on RPM's Country Chart for forty weeks.

This year, Wright is nominated for top female vocalist at the Big Country Awards.


**TERRI CLARK** **RPM July 24, 1995**

Growing up in Medicine Hat, Alberta certainly had its impact on Terri Clark. The

prairie weather and non-pollutant air must have been contributing factors to the development of this healthy 5'11", 26-year old discovery. The powerful vocals leave an immediate impression that Clark is hellbent on gaining a foothold in the business. *Better Things To Do*, written by Clark, Tom Shapiro and Chris Waters, has been taken as the first single. Clark contributed to the writing of 11 of the tracks, and solo wrote *If I Were You*, a key track. Unfortunately, there's no Cancon credits here, but Clark doesn't need that crutch. She has the talent to match anything coming out of Nashville, and if guided properly, could become one of the big names in country. Produced by Keith Stegall and Chris Waters, this album should spawn half-a-dozen chart singles. Check out *Tying A Heart To A Tumbleweed*, *The Inside Story* and *Something You Should've*



## OUTSTANDING NEW ARTIST NOMINEES


### THE CRUZEROS

Kelowna British Columbia has kept a relatively low profile when it comes to country music, though the mould seems to have been broken by The Cruzeros, the new country duo of Barry Mathers and Curtis Tulman who have been working together since 1985. A self-titled debut album in 1994 established them as a serious songwriting force with the four singles reaching top 20 status and three videos that aired heavy on CMT.

Because of those successes, The Cruzeros swept up at awards time, adding to their heap of accolades awards from the British Columbia Country Music Association for group of the year, entertainer of the year, album of the year, video of the year and the Ray McAulay Memorial Horizon Award (best new artist). Back east, in Toronto, they were the proud nominees of two Big Country Awards including group of the year and outstanding new artist.

Currently The Cruzeros are continuing country wide support for their first release, with featured appearances on television and radio, notably on Toronto's CISS-FM Live At Seven and CMT. They have brought their seven man live act to the stages of Prairie Oyster, Blackhawk, Lee Roy Parnell, Asleep At The Wheel and other distinguished country acts. Their current single The Last Time, is climbing RPM's Country 100.

The Cruzeros are the proud recipients of three Big Country

a few heads on Music Row, is happening on both sides of the border with his initial single release, My Heart Has A History. The song was co-written by Brandt and Mark Sanders, a Nashville writer. It appears Brandt has run the full gamut of his country parameters here; ballads, western and flat-out country. Every track shows a potentially powerful singer/songwriter who knows where he's going and he doesn't disguise his country roots. Brandt has a natural baritone vocal that has the purity of a graduate choir boy. He's not in a hurry with his lyrics and layers them on with a precision that's usually only mastered by the trained voice. He's got some hurtin' here as well, which adds to the tremendous vocal property he possesses. How Brandt happened is common knowledge. What's here is much more important. He's done it right. He's got a commitment from a major US label and the excitement at the label level in Canada is absolutely refreshing. A pumped-up marketing and promotion team can make all the difference. What's key?

There isn't a track here that couldn't stand alone. Suffice to say, the album is six singles deep. Brandt has cozied up to some great Nashville writers; Pass Me By (If You're Only Passing Through) by Hillman Hall, Take It From Me by Brandt and Roy Hurd, Brandt's solo penning of I Do, and On The Inside by Brett Jones. Produced by Josh Leo and recorded in Nashville. **-WG**





Nashville country music community. The tape made such an impression on Leggett that he decided, after watching the young artist perform live, to move the music division of his company to Nashville so that he could personally manage Cummings' career. A development deal with Warner Bros Records was just around the corner at that point and the show, as they say, was on.

The public has responded quickly to this young artist's indisputable talents in front of a crowd, and a number of appearances on TNN's Ralph Emery Show, concert dates with Martina McBride, John Michael Montgomery and Garth Brooks have boosted his popularity. But success was secured with the single I Waited which was added as a bonus track to the compilation This Is The Sound Of New Country 3. The video for the song was added directly into heavy rotation at the New Country Network in Canada and eventually peaked as a top 5 single across the country.

July 1996 saw the release of Somewhere Inside, which was introduced with a monumentally successful new single called Sure Enough and Almost Always, which continues its climb to the top of the charts.



## THE NEILSONS

The family unit just doesn't come any better than it does with The Neilsons. Ron and Betty Neilson,

and their three children, daughter Tami (19) and sons Jay (18) and Todd (13) hail from Ontario and bring a unique nostalgic twist and stunning vocal harmonies to bear on their very special brand of Canadian country music.

The secret to their sound is the result of Ron, an accomplished musician for thirty-five years,



playing accompaniment on guitar, with Jay on bass (he has been playing the instrument since the age of nine) and Todd on drums (hitting skins since the age of seven) while mother Betty and Tami provide the lead vocals.

The Neilsons' self-titled CD, consisting of

songs written by Ron or Tami, has yielded two top 40 singles and an award winning video Windows Of The Past. Interest in the group has brought them out for appearances on virtually every major television station, including the Global Television Network, CBC, NCN, CMT and ZTV.

The interest has also spilled over into artist circles, which has demanded they work with people like Vince Gill, Jason McCoy, Johnny Cash, Charlie Major, Blackhawk and Prairie Oyster. They have gained two International Gold Awards for their video for Windows To The Past and enjoy the distinction of being the first Canadian band to play at the General Jackson festival in Opryland.

Big Country welcomes The Neilsons with two nominations for group of the year and outstanding new artist.

## LAWNIE WALLACE

Although a fan of such artists as the Doors, Moody Blues and Southern Culture On the Skids, this young Stouffville-native's heart is entrenched firmly in the world of country music.

Discovered in 1994 during the CCMA conference in Calgary, Wallace was signed to MCA Canada at the age of 17 and had her debut album, Thought I Was Dreaming, on the shelves by the age of 18.

Drawing part of her inspiration from her musician-father's basement band rehearsals -- for which she would sneak out of bed to take part in --



He has that vocal magic that attracts immediate attention and a fast-forward projection that puts him in a class of his own. Country programmers have already recognized the potential of this album by charting and putting the first single, (I Do It) For The Money, into heavy rotation. Back-orders for the album already indicate that retailers are ready to move this one out. Major wrote most of the music with the exception of It's Lonely I Can't Stand and Solid As A Rock, which he co-wrote with Barry Brown and Remember The Alamo, which was written by Jane Bower. This is the only track, by the way, that doesn't qualify as Cancon, but nevertheless, is a key track. He should get more than half-a-dozen hits out of this one, including those mentioned, the title track, Someday I'm Gonna Ride In A Cadillac, and, of course, Waiting On You. Steve Fishell is the producer. -WG

This Timmins, Ontario native has already made a few waves in the US with her debut album, but with this sophomore release, she's ready to tackle the Nashville giant head on. Twain definitely has all the key parts in place, and with the strong support

of PolyGram, she should be on her way. Twain has always had a strong voice for country, but what makes her distinctive is her songwriting ability, something that wasn't in evidence on her first record. Twain has a good ear for a hook, and mixed in with the subtle touches of her co-writer/producer/husband Mutt Lange, the result is a core of strong country tracks that will fit right in with most station's New Country format. Twain has everything it takes to make it in the tremendously crowded New Country field. The question is, will PolyGram help her get that far? -RR

**CKQM-FM's Rick Fleming** is a little concerned over the state of releases. The Peterborough station's music director is questioning the validity of same song releases by different artists. "First there were two versions of A Dozen Red Roses (Joan Kennedy and Tammy Graham) fighting for airplay at the same time. Now, Bob Carlisle, The Raybon Brothers and Jeff Carson have all released Butterfly Kisses within a week of each other. And LeAnn Rimes, along with Trisha Yearwood, each have their own version of How Do I Live. While I will consider each song on its own merit, only one version may earn airplay. I feel this kind of doubling (or tripling) up doesn't help the artists involved, and only confuses our listeners." The Carlisle version, which he wrote with R.Thomas, has a bit of an edge, entering the chart at #92, but a giant entry at #32 on the A/C chart. The Raybon version enters the RPM Country 100 at #93. Watch for a Jeff Carson version, now at radio.

**Alabama hits #1** with Sad Lookin' Moon, squeezing into the slot from #2 after 13 weeks. The song is included on their RCA release, Dancin' On The Boulevard.

**Reba McEntire** has gained back much interest from country programmers. Her latest MCA release, I'd Rather Ride Around With You, is the biggest mover, jumping up to #44 from #66. The song was written by Mark Sanders and Tim Nichols and taken from her album, What If It's You, which she produced with John Guess.

**Sammy Kershaw** has the most added single this week. Fit To Be Tied Down, took a little work, but enters the chart at #79. The track is probably the last to be taken from his Mercury release, Politics, Religion & Her.

**Montgomery Steele** continues to make connections with country, campus and A/C programmers, resulting in his Indian Woman bulleting up to #46 from #51.

**Thomas Wade & Wayward** have the second most added single, with She's Getting Serious, his latest Peg release, entering the chart at #88. Written by Wade and Tim Taylor, the track is included on their self-titled album. This is the follow-up to Lying Here With You, now descending the chart (#72). The video of the single, produced by Terrence Odette of Toronto's Toad Productions hit #1 on CMT Canada's Top 20 Countdown on May 25, seven weeks after making its debut at #14 as a Breakout Video.

**Lisa Erskine** gets her foot in the door with her debut, See You On The Other Side, which enters the chart at #95, a respectful beginning for a newcomer. Written by Erskine and Dean McTaggart, the track was taken from her HVG album (RPM New Releases - May 19/97), produced by Johnny Douglas. The album was recorded in Nashville. The single is being tracked by Catherine Douglas from her C.D.Promotions office in Nashville.

**Ray Bonneville's people** are trying to decide what country follow-up to Nothing To Lose should be. It's going to be quite a toss-up, because he's a very strong blues artist with just enough of a country

edge to attract the attention of country programmers. Say Those Things and Solid Ground, the title track could be contenders, but the Cajun-influenced Blonde Of Mine, could be a big winner. The Montreal-based Bonneville, who releases on the Audiograph label, has been playing dates in both Canada and the US, including Louisiana. He is scheduled for Toronto's C'est What during Toronto's Jazz Festival (June 25-26), the Moncton Jazz & Blues Festival (27-29), the Owen Sound Festival (Aug 15-17), a date in California (Aug 31-Sept 8) to be announced, the Halifax Jazz and Blues Festival (Sept. 12-14) and Vancouver Island (24-29).

**Verna Charlton** is getting a massive promotion push on her just released album, Third Time Lucky, from her Mighty Peace label, which is based in Dawson Creek, BC. The title track, a cover of the 1979 Foghat hit, written by Dave Peverett, has been taken as the first single. All of the tracks were recorded at Vancouver's Crosstown Studios with producer Al Rodger, except She's So Many Women, which was produced by Ralph Murphy and recorded in Nashville. Watch for an upcoming review.

**Lawnie Wallace** is on the verge of a major Nashville signing. Bill Wallace, who has been negotiating the Nashville deal, dropped by the office to play a couple of tracks from her upcoming album.

## CCMA to honour Sniderman and Family Brown

The Canadian Country Music Association (CCMA) will honour Sam (The Record Man) Sniderman and Family Brown during Canadian Country Music Week '97, which will be held in Hamilton, Ontario (Sept. 3-8).

Canada's best-known record retailer, Sam Sniderman, has been a fixture in Canadian retailing since he began selling records at Sniderman's Music Hall, the Sniderman's first store on Toronto's College Street. When he moved to his prime

location at 347 Yonge Street, he became Sam The Record Man and was the first record retailer in the world to discount records, a practice that became the norm for giant US chains that followed. That was in 1959. Ten years later he introduced his franchise stores, a chain that stretches across Canada.

Mr. Sniderman received the Order of Canada in 1976 and has been honoured with numerous awards ever since. His induction into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Honour with the presentation of the Stan Klees Industry Builder Award is one more prestigious honour for this industry icon.

The Ottawa Valley's Family Brown, a six-piece band, was founded by Joe Brown in 1968. The band released 14 albums and 41 singles over the years, had its own television series on CJOH in Ottawa and won 17 Big Country Awards (now the CCMA Awards), including two Canadian Country Artists of the Year awards in 1981 and 1986 respectively.

The band comprised Joe's children, Barry, Lawanda and Tracey, plus musicians, drummer Ron Sparling, who handled the band's business affairs, guitarist Dave Dennison and steel guitarist/fiddle player Gary Spicer. Tracey's husband, Randall Prescott, joined the band in 1985, and with the sudden passing of the elder Brown in 1986, he took on a more prominent role. Both Joe Brown and Ron Sparling are members of CCMA's Hall of Honour, with Joe inducted posthumously after his death in 1986.

The band was finally disbanded in 1990. However, Tracey, Barry and Randall formed Prescott Brown that kept the family name in prominence for a number of years. Prescott concentrated on developing his Lakeside Studio and Barry has become one of the most successful songwriters in Canada.



- Wallace wrote her first song at the age of seven and got her first stage break that same year when she performed with her father at a benefit concert along-side Murray McLauchlan and Ronnie Hawkins.

The energetic performer co-wrote 9 of the 12 songs on Thought I Was Dreaming -- an album that spawned three singles with The Heartache, Wild Child as well as the title track.

Currently working with fellow Canadian Eddie Schwartz on her sophomore release, Wallace -- who

composes on the piano -- is also in the process of adding guitar and harmonica skills to her repertoire.

This year Lawnie Wallace is nominated for a Big County Award in the Outstanding New Artist category.

## THOMAS WADE & WAYWARD

Burford, Ontario native Thomas Wade claims that having the tenacity to just "hang in there" until the right record execs took it upon themselves to discover this under-appreciated band of country-rockers was the main virtue necessary in that all-important first step toward recognition.


The big guns at Peg Music, a subsidiary of Oak Street Music (a Sony distributed label), were the clever execs with the foresight to sign Thomas Wade & Wayward -- the result being a smash self-titled debut.

Sitting Pretty and Zero To Sixty were the first single releases (which reached #14 and #8 respectively on RPM's Country 100 chart) and they were followed with Lying Here With You, a song whose accompanying video reached #1 on the CMT Top 20 Countdown.

The success of this first album led to recognition at the Ontario Country Music Association as

group of the year as well as a 1997 Juno nomination for best country group.

This year, Thomas Wade & Wayward is nominated for a Big Country Award in the Outstanding New Artist category. As well, Wade and bandmate Joey May are nominated in the producer of the year category for Zero To Sixty.




