SUGAR SHOPPE TO CAPITOL

Toronto: After several months of negotiations Capitol Records (Canada) Ltd., announce the signing of one of Canada's most potentially explosive folk-rock quartets, The Sugar Shoppe, to a long term exclusive recording contracts.

Formed in July of 1967, the group has consistently played to "turn away" crowds at clubs and concerts where they first came to the attention of Capitol's A&R director Paul White. White arranged for Karl Engemann, head of Capitol's A&R

division, Hollywood, to fly in and catch the group in action. Negotiations commenced almost immediately.

Laurie Hood, Lee Harris, Peter Mann and Vic Garber, The Sugar Shoppe, are to be flown to Capitol's Hollywood studios the latter part of March, where their recording session will be laid on with Al De Lory in charge. De Lory produced the "Grammy" award winning disc "By The Time I Get To Phoenix" by Glen Campbell.

Donald K. Donald Expands

Montreal: Don Tarlton, general manager of Donald K. Donald Productions, announces the opening of their ultra-modern offices at 188 Dorchester Blvd., East, Montreal.

The new location includes 6 sound proof studios, to be used for auditioning purposes for both new groups and buyers of talent.

Aim of the new entertainment service is to market the Montreal product across Canada. One of the DKDP groups making strong inroads into the Montreal and area market are Simple Simon and the Piemen. Their most powerful assist has come from the release of their Regency single "People Of Time" (978) which has picked up considerable airplay at Montreal's most important rock outlet, CFOX.

A good portion of the top Montreal teen sounds are available from Donald K. Donald Productions.

Zimmerman Dies At 55

Toronto: Max J. Zimmerman, president of MacKay Record Distributors, responsible for distribution of London products in Ontario, until 1967 died at Toronto's General Hospital after a brief illness. He was 55.

Mr. Zimmerman introduced the London label to Canada in the late 40's and after the line became a successful coast to coast item, was granted the Ontario market by Sir Edward Lewis, head of English Decca (London Records). Heading up the MacKay firm Mr. Zimmerman moulded his operation into the most powerful in the nation. It was just last year that he retired from the business but was commissioned by head office, who took over the territory, to build a new office and warehousing complex, in Scarborough, Ontario.

Mr. Zimmerman is survived by his wife Nina, daughter Francine and Eileen, sons Earl and Mark and his parents Mr. and Mrs. Frank Zimmerman.

MAURIAT MEETS PRESS AT LONDON CONFLAB

Philips' recording artist, Paul Mauriat, currently has the number one hit record in North America, "Love Is Blue". His Philips album "Blooming Hits" which contains the "Love Is Blue" track is also topping the LP charts across the continent. Following his promotional tour and appearance on the Ed Sullivan CBS-TV Sunday night show Feb 18th, Mauriat, visited Montreal, where London Records who distributed the Philips label in Canada held a radio, television and press conference. Hosted by Fraser Jamieson, president of London Records Of Canada Ltd., and executive secretary, Alice Koury, radio personalities and press were jetted into Montreal from Toronto to attend the conference. Local radio television and press members were also in attendance. The French network, CFTM-TV had their cameras rolling for an on the spot interview and coverage.

Pianist, arranger, Mauriat, is one of the four top band-leaders in France and Mauriat said, "It is hoped that 'Love Is Blue'" will start an upswing towards instrumentals in France."

Taping dozens of interviews with radio and press, in both French and English, he charmed everyone with his modesty and genuine amazement of his popularity in North America. A follow up to "Love Is Blue" is currently being planned, and his next album release will be Latin America music which he recorded for Philips prior to his leaving for the U.S. and Canada. Upon his return to France he is planning to return to the recording studios to cut an album of international hits.

Plans have tentatively been made for Mauriat to return to Montreal this May for a week's engagement at the Place des Arts.



SAMMY DAVIS REVIEW

Sammy Davis returned to Toronto March 11 for another spectacular triumph. He loved what he was doing, the audience loved him and the love affair bloomed into a rapturous one half evening.

I say one half evening because he shared the bill with The Characters, a comedy-cum-song quartet and with classical guitarist Laurindo Almeida's.

Almeida's work on records has long been a favourite of mine especially those with Sally Terri and I was looking forward to hearing him. What a disappointment! He appeared after the orchestra had given us a trite medley of Broadway show tunes. How this group of over 25 musicians could come through sounding like a small dance band I will never know. They both shallow and banal.

But getting back to Almeida, after this noisy initiation, we were not ready for the small sound of the single guitar, that made many strain to hear before the ear accommodated to the difference in volume. But we Almeida lovers were still hopeful and listened carefully to the next selection played with the orchestra. It was well done but even as we began to warm to the performance and its sound, it was over. After two selections Almeida left the stage for good. Why on earth was he used in this shameful fashion? Either expose him properly or not at all.

Almeida was followed by The Characters. Three of these four men appear to be well past their prime; one is a former professional fighter and looks it. They perform around lead singer Johnny Ricco,

who does several (possibly unconsciously) imitations using the style of Sammy Davis (or was it Johnny Rae?). Their disjointed comedy is based on surprise, contrast and the use of bathroom and quasi-homosexual humour. The calibre of their performance was spotty, ranging from good (Ricco in "The Quest From Man Of La Mancha") down to juvenile.

This might have been a good warm-up group for other performers. However, Davis' audience needs no warm-up; since he is prepared to give his all he could have done the show alone as Petula Clark did, and pleased us even more. He appeared after the intermission, in grey moslem-type jacket and matching pants radiating pure joy at being on stage.

It is easy to see why he is billed as the world's greatest entertainer. He has polished each of his many talents to such perfection that the reflection from it dazzles one.

His songs ranged from ballads and show tunes highlighted by an Anthony Newley-Leslie Bricusse medley to the wild abandonment of the soul melody done as a tribute to Ray Charles. In between, he did a lengthy routine with only the perfectly disciplined drumming of Michael Silva as accompaniment.

By the end of his soul number he was working so hard I was exhausted. Panting for breath he still gave us more - a soft shoe to "Me And My Shadow" - Wearing a hat Maurice Chevalier had given him, a tap routine to "One For My Baby" which turned into a vehicle for impersonations

of Frank Sinatra, Billy Eckstine, Humphrey Bogart, James Cagney, Jimmy Stewart, Cary Grant, Orson Welles, a marvellously done Anthony Quinn (whom I've never heard impersonated before), Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis.

Seeing this man was a total experience. What more can anyone say?

CHERINGTON-HAMILTON'S NITE TIME SOUND

Hamilton: Give Hamilton radio listeners a chance to talk about fluoridation and almost 1000 try to get themselves heard on Tom Cherington's "Night Line". Throw them a cat bit and more than 1500 have a go at trying to get through to one of the most popular "hot line" hosts in the business.

"Night Line" heard weekly from 9:05 to 11 PM is one of CHML's most important productions. Listener calls come direct to a 10 line switchboard which is almost always jammed from the word go. To determine the actual amount of audience participation in the show, CHML has installed a Bell Telephone busy signal counting machine which tallies up all the phone calls that come in, but which are unable to get through because of the jam.

Cherington has a natural background for a show such as this. He was born in Egypt, of English parents, and spent most of his childhood in East Africa. He even managed a two year bout with the Royal Artillery during World War II. As well, he knows a great deal about the import-export trade, having worked at this trade in Sudan, Somaliland and Saudi Arabia. He has also handled the sale of raw cotton, operated an eight airplane airline, the chartering and handling of ships, and managing a warehousing company, responsible for the complete shipment of the Sudanese cotton crop.

Moving to Canada in 1953, Cherington spent some time in commercial credit, life insurance, and the meat packing business, and finally as a newscaster at a Winnipeg radio station, and then to CHML.

If there is any criticism to be made of Cherington, the most that could be said is that "he's too nice a guy". He does generate comment and sometimes even gets close to controversy, but perhaps follows too closely the old "hot line" adage that "The listeners make the show". Some callers deserve to be shot down, which of course satisfies the sadistic nature of most listeners.

An added treat to the listeners, and an obnoxious distraction to Cherington is the loveable pioneer of Canadian broadcasting sweetness, Jane Gray.

It was apparently the intention of the station to guest Miss Gray a couple times a month, but because of her popularity during her initial guesting, it was decided to increase her appearances until now she is almost a regular.

Being as most good radio ideas turn up as great television firsts, "Night Line" is now "Hot Line" and seen Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings at 11:40 PM over CHCH-TV Hamilton.

Cherington, on camera, guest preachers, politicians, doctors, and what have you. When he doesn't have a "what have you" he throws open the telephone lines and lets his viewers have a go at politics, preachers, politicians etc.

Gilles Marchand, of Polydor Records, is starting on the first half of a promotional tour, with George Walker, to launch his first Polydor album, "James Last Presents George Walker". Their first stop was Ottawa where they did the rounds of radio and television stations. The Cream, also on the Polydor label, are for a one nighter April 8th, at the Capitol theatre, in Ottawa. The Cream is one of the underground groups from England that have really made it big in the U.S. and Canada, with their two album releases, "The Cream" and "Disraeli Gears". Both LP's are on the best seller lists, and without a hit single on the North America continent that is quite an accomplishment. The Four Seasons prove once again, they are still one of the top recording groups with their latest Philips' offering "Will

You Still Love Me To-morrow". This was a million seller a few years back for the Shirelles. Appearing on the RPM 100 this week in the number 22 spot, it will no doubt be another million seller.

Capitol's A&R man, Paul White, and national promotion man, Gord Edwards, went on an all out campaign to launch the Staccatos' "Walker Street" which is breaking onto just about every chart across the country. The U.S. have gone on the flip side, "She Fancies Herself A Lady". Both numbers were written by Les Emerson. The Privilege (formerly the Lords, adopted the new name to avoid confusion with the Lords of London) from Western Canada, have debuted their first Capitol single "The Highly Successful Young Rupert White" which was recorded at Capitol studios in Hollywood. Early

re-action indicates it could top the charts shortly. A U.S. release is presently being negotiated.

Another group from Western Canada, The Eternals, are starting to receive a lot of chart action on their latest Quality release "Falling Tears". Produced by Bob Burns, in U.A. studios in Minneapolis, a large string and brass ensemble were added. Dave Britten, Ottawa, songwriter, now residing in Nashville, penned the song. Britten wrote many of the hits for the Staccatos and the Esquires.

Apex Records have come up with another Canadian group, again, from the West. The Grainsborough Gallery which consists of five very talented young men, not all from the West, but have made Calgary their home base. Formerly known as the Skeptics, for the past two years they have played professionally throughout Western Canada and have built a large following. Their first Apex outing "Little Red Book" and "Little by Little" just off presses has been reported by programme manager, Dave Lyman at CKXL, Calgary, as the most requested newcomer. Apex have released the disc with a promotional

sleeve featuring the group. "Jezebel" by the Witness Inc. is currently topping the CKXL charts.

RCA Victor's Ed Preston, is very excited over the Colgems new group The Fountain Of Youth. Their initial release entitled "Livin' Too Fast" and "(Angie Love Me) Make The Hurt Go Away" have a rock beat which should pick instant air-play. Ian and Sylvia's latest Vanguard recording "The Best Of Ian and Sylvia" is a compilation of their best selling records, including "You Were On My Mind", by Ian and Sylvia; Burt Bacharach's "24 Hours To Tulsa" and the duo's first big single, Ian's own "The Four Strong Winds". This LP is a likely candidate for plenty of sales.

Tartan recording artist, Honey Wells, from Amherst, Nova Scotia, follow up single to her first Tartan release "Johnny Get Angry" is "Stand By Me" and "Da Doo Ron Ron (When He Walked Me Home)". The disc should see top 40 and good music play.

Everyone's been wondering who the Lollipop Shoppe is? They are a new group out of California, on the Uni label. Their first release is slated sometime within the next two weeks.

Grahame Woods, acclaimed for his camera work on "Wojeck", "The Open Grave" and "The Chief", has accepted an assignment from "The Way It Is" series to photograph and direct an intimate study of the Liberal leadership campaign. Viewing date has been set as April 7 at 10 PM EST.

Toronto: Glen Gould's "World Of Music" series will complete its run with a two hour colour production of Mozart's comic opera "The Abduction From The Seraglio" Sunday March 17th at 1:30 PM EST. Performed in French, the opera was telecast in September of 1967 and stars Pierrette Alarie, soprano; comedian Jean Coutu; Louise Lebrun, soprano; Jean-Louis Pellerin, tenor; Joseph Rouleau, bass; and Leopold Simoneau, tenor.



He has set himself up to write about the business and in particular the country people who make the business. Bev Munro has been spinning country records since 1951. He began in Brandon, Manitoba, from there to Dauphin, CHAB in Moose Jaw, CKRM in Regina and for the past four years at CFCW in Camrose, Alberta. CFCW is a 24 hour country music operation. Bev MCs most of the Grand Ole Opry shows that play the Edmonton Gardens and has toured with many of the Opry stars.

Through personal appearances, air work and now via his Capitol discs, Bev's popularity is growing rapidly in Western Canada. Always willing to give a fellow artist a boost he says, "We're Country Music - 24 hours a day here and we always welcome anyone sending records. I'll be glad to give them a spin".

Music BIZ

Fear of plagiarism. Songwriters often complain that they are afraid that the song they have written might just resemble something that has been written before. At the highest level of songwriting volume-wise they really should be concerned because with so few combinations of notes it is possible that every musical phrase has been written and just by accident, you might come up with twelve bars of a song written and registered 20 years ago that never was a hit, and you never heard it, but you might be stuck with a plagiarism that no "tune detective" could have ever spotted.

There is a good chance that "there is nothing new under the sun" musically because everything has been written and every progression of notes isn't original anymore. What protection do you have if fate drags you into court to defend your "original tune" which really wasn't? It is a chance you take as a songwriter and only the decision of the courts can take you off the hook. The law is often fair enough if you can prove that the use of something already copyrighted was an accident. Often it is easy to prove but often the cruel finger of fate might stick you with a case you won't win.

Don't let this dissuade you from writing what you genuinely feel is original material. The courts are aware that too many bars of a protected song COULD crop up and so are the original copyright owners. No one wants to go to court to prove their case unless they feel that you have intentionally gone out and stolen a part of their song. If you have you deserve the punishment the court decides. If you haven't you have the truth on your side and frankly you break the law by accident so often that you shouldn't worry about it as long as it is an accident.

It is often said that if a professional tune detective has checked and okayed your material before you submit it for copyright this will stand in your favour if a litigation should result. Any attempt to assure yourself of not stealing a song would stand in your favour but the final and most important decision is the decision of the courts.

The whole question emphasizes the role of the publisher in this question and reflects on the self-publishing concerns who don't have at their fingertips all the information and the facilities to check out each tune and protect the songwriter. A reliable publisher should be handling your tunes if they are performed. Until they are copyrighted and performed, there is no plagiarism and nothing to worry about. Who could sue you when no one has heard the song?

Canadian talent proved themselves again this month. Unfortunately it's only a half victory for Canada because even though the artists are Canadian, they record in the United States.

Remember The Sparrow, who moved to the United States in search of fame and fortune? The group split up after a year. Three of The Sparrow, John Kay, Jerry Edmonton and Goldie McJohn, reformed and recruited two others to make a new group called Steppenwolf. Their new album on Dunhill, "Steppenwolf", contains 11 blues originals. Most songs are written by lead singer, John Kay. It's hard to pick best selections since all the material is done exceptionally well. The album is "a best seller" in Los Angeles. "Sookie Sookie", a cut from the album, has been released as a single and it's already receiving airplay on several stations.

This isn't all from Dunhill. The long awaited 3's A Crowd album, "Christopher's Movie Matinee", is becoming another top seller. The album features the group's current single, "Bird Without Wings", as well as other smooth-flowing selections. Listening to the album, it's no wonder that 3's A Crowd was chosen "Top Folk Group" in the RPM Music Poll. Hope RCA will release these two groovy albums in Canada.

The controversial "Suzanne" has been recorded by several artists. "Suzanne's" writer, Leonard Cohen, another Canadian, makes his album debut this month with "Songs of Leonard Cohen" (Columbia). The poet-novelist-composer-singer sings his poems in a sombre tone which relates the seriousness of his poetry. He's accompanied only by his own guitar on the 10 selections. One word describes the album--great! Cohen can proudly be placed beside such modern folk-greats as Bob Dylan, Joan Baez and Phil Ochs.

Hickory Records just released an album by Donovan titled "Like It Is". The album contains Donovan's early hits such as "Catch The Wind", "Universal Soldier", "Colours", "Hey Gyp" and "Sunny Goode Street".

Blue Cheer, a new group from San Francisco make their debut with a single, "Summertime Blues", (Philips) taken from their "Vincebus Eruptum" LP, which was setting sales records even before its release.

San Francisco is quiet and now the scene switches to a new market, Boston. MGM Records signed three of the city's best groups. Each of the groups have a new album release. The Ultimate Spinach concentrates on the psychedelic element, which is exemplified in a cut, "The Hip Death Goddess", a song that lasts over 8 minutes. Orpheus' album is full of meaningful love songs done in a beautiful way. Included is their chart-climbing single "Can't Find The Time". The third album, "The Eyes of The Beacon Street Union", comes complete with a dramatic recitation and 10 original songs. Included are Chuck Berry's "Beautiful Delilah" and The Beacon Street Union's first single "South End Incident". Another Boston group, The Earth Opera, has been signed by Elektra. Their first album will be released shortly.

CJSS RATINGS SOAR

Cornwall, Ont: Dave Mickie, the first and only real threat to topple Toronto's rock listening monopoly, has become a very important part of the now powerful CJSS. The Lineup includes Charlie Hunter, 6 to 10AM; Dave Lafave, 10 AM to noon; Fred Denney, noon to 4PM; Keith Clingen, 4 to 5 PM and Dave Mickie, 7 to 11 PM. Daytime showing is reported at having from 75% to 85% of the audience, and for the first time since 1964 CJSS is showing a night time of 85% to 90%, or an average of 70,000 listeners. This accomplishment has come about even with the competition of Ottawa, Montreal and U.S. stations.

GLENN GOULD'S "THE IDEA OF NORTH" FOR RE-BROADCAST

Toronto: Glenn Gould's production of "The Idea Of North", which was heard on CBC-FM's "ideas Series" is to be re-broadcast on the CBC-AM radio network Tuesday March 26 at 8:30 PM EST.

Gould interviewed people in Toronto, Ottawa and Winnipeg, who had lived in Canada's north, but rather than a report on history, population statistics or climate, he used the interviews to create a composition of sound that depicted the loneliness, the adventurous spirit and the disappointments.

With the technical assistance of Lorne Tulk, Gould overdubbed the voiced interviews with the clackety-clak of a moving train and created the sound so well that even with the overlaying of several voices there was no ear irritation.

STAFF CHANGES AT CJCS

Stratford, Ont: Lorne McClelland, program director at CJCS is leaving his 6 to 9 AM on-air show to take on duties as a salesman. Tim Wight moves into the early morning slot. Norm Morrison leaves the news spot to take over mid-mornings on board and George Bedford comes into the news department from CHYR, Leamington, Ontario. Paul Brain remains on afternoons with Ron Johnston on the night run.

CJCS has had much success with a St. Patricks Day Card contest using the album and single by The Irish Rovers to good effect.

JACK SCHOONE ACQUIRES CONTROLLING INTEREST OF CKNB

Campbellton, N.B: It's been reported that pending final transfer at the BBG sitting in April, well known on-air personality and station manager, Jack Schoone has acquired controlling interest of CKNB. This top rated "North Shore" outlet has been coming up with many interesting promotions which have been successful in pulling in the young listener. Latest promotion is a talent show among locals who will compete in a giant talent fest in April.

"TOPS OF THE FLOPS" - CBC "SHOWCASE"

Toronto: The Sunday March 24th edition of CBC's "Showcase" will bring to life some of the better musical numbers that suffered because of a short run on Broadway. Narrator Bruce Marsh, with script assist by Tony Galasso, brings back the sounds of Rodgers and Hammerstein, Jule Styne, Anthony Newley, Jay Lerner and Leonard Sillman. Also included is an interview with John Raitt who has starred in several of the musicals. Production is by Bob Wagstaff.

ANNAPOLIS VALLEY RADIO SPOTLIGHTS CANADIAN TALENT

Middleton, N.S: The Annapolis Valley Radio country Top 20 has recently given a large boost to Canadians Lynn Jones and Myrna Lorrie. Lynn's Capitol release "Gonna Put Some Lovin' On You" found strong listener reaction which moved it into the No. 4 spot. Myrna's "Tell Me Not To Go" on Columbia also took top honours.

The side is doing much better in Canada where airplay is considerable. // The group that spun off the Spencer Davis Group called the Traffic have a new side that is already a chartclimber. "No Face, No Name and No Number" this week entered the chart. // Paul Jones is one of the most deserved of artists who hasn't been able to cut a notch for himself in the charts. Could be that this one will be another chart topper. // The Musician's Union in Britain has reportedly banned the use of sidemen on group sessions. It all started when the British group the Love Affair supposedly used all sidemen on their session of "Everlasting Love" which went to No. 1 in England. The union has now drawn up a "code of conduct" for groups that will not permit the use of sidemen to augment the original groups sound. Obviously a move to return to honesty the "group" sound on record. It may even affect the earnings of a few sidemen but it is a move in the right direction and sound thinking. // The Beatles have been taking a lot of 16mm movies of their visits to India and their retreat with Maharishi mahesh Yogi. There has been some speculation that they might just edit all this footage and make it into a movie. //





THE AWARD WINNING GORDON LIGHTFOOT

Toronto: If you follow the Chinese calendar you'll find that 1968 is "The Year Of The Monkey", but if you're a day to day follower of the Canadian scene, you just might categorize 1968 as "The Year Of Lightfoot".

Even lacking the star system, Canadians from coast to coast (at least parts of the two coasts) are now recognizing the Orillia, Ontario boy that made good, Gordon Lightfoot, as a truly Canadian talent, with some limitations, that is.

Among the many honours becoming a part of the Lightfoot household is another vote of confidence from RPM's readers. "Top Male Vocalist Of The Year" (1967).

The real sign of success however is the ever growing snide criticisms, mostly from local hogtowners, "Lightfoot's becoming too moody", "He told the photographers to cool it during one of his Massey Hall appearances. That's

temperment, man". Do you think you could sing a sad, thought provoking song showing all your ivories? That's mood, man, and while you're in that mood do you think you could sustain it with all those damn flashbulbs popping all around you? Temperment? Maybe, but not likely.

The real Gordon Lightfoot, complete with his moods and temperment, is set for a March 18th showing on CBC-TV's "Show Of The Week" at 8 PM EST. Lightfoot's first television special "Wherefore and Why", a 60 minute variety special in colour was produced by Drew Crossan with Sandy Stern as writer and co-director.

Crossan and Stern have arranged an intimate study of Lightfoot the star, the poet-composer, and somehow, with unbelievable technical finesse, have crammed years of success and songwriting (Lightfoot has written more than 200 songs) into a one hour show.

This is not Lightfoot in concert. "Wherefore and Why" commences at dawn, outside Bernie Fiedler's Riverboat, in Toronto's Village. (Fiedler has been one of the people responsible for the Lightfoot success). You'll also see Lightfoot at Toronto's Stock Exchange, strolling through a fashionable boutique, and meandering near one of his many loves, the railroad.

Out of the 60 minutes, only 15 were set aside to dolly in on Lightfoot the performer, craftsman and perfectionist as he appeared before a CBC-TV studio audience.

The Lightfoot sound ranges from the quiet and interest demanding "Pussy Willows, Cattails" to the wrangy "Boss Man, Boss Man", which so impressed Harry Belafonte.

Lightfoot also performs his latest United Artists release "Black Day In July" (50281). His voice is heard over

filmed scenes of the Detroit riots.

Lightfoot's "Canadian Railway Trilogy", which was first introduced to Canadians on CBC-TV's New Year's 1967 special "100 Years Young" will also be used, as well as "General Store", "Face Of A Thousand People", "Does Your Mother Know?", "The Mountains and Mary Ann", "Did She Mention My Name", "Walls" and "Wherefore and Why".

Appearing with Lightfoot is his long time friend Ronnie Hawkins who, along with The Hawks, and Jackie Gabriel, will perform "Early Morning Rain" and "For Lovin' Me".

Bonnie Dobson, young Canadian folksinger will also guest and sing a couple of Lightfoot songs "The Way I Feel" and "I'm Not Saying".

Musical accompaniment for Lightfoot is supplied by Red Shea, on lead guitar, and fender bassman John Stockfish.
